FF MEN ARE BEST EXECUTIVES, DECLARES LEADING PSYCHOLOGIST

ENCH LICK, Ind., May 28 (AP)—A cross section of the traits which executive leadership, taken from American industry, was presented before the National Association of Office Managers at its meeting here.

The report was from Dr. Donald L. Smith, director of Colgate university psychological laboratory. He was assisted in the studies by E. S. W. L. Webb and Everett L. Smith.

Summarize Men
The findings summarize qualifications of "strong men" marked by superior for more pay and economic leadership responsibility. He said that "weak" men who just failed to get the job.

Dr. Smith said many pet theories were met. Neither type differed in "interest in people," "hard work," the key to success as being the two groups. Self-control, trying conditions also applied of small importance, and the leaders rated slightly in the patience.

Understanding general traits of the strong leadership, said Dr. Smith, "were how he impresses as having self-confidence, well he plans and organizes and subordinates, general judgment and aggressive foresights in anticipating developments, his knowledge details of his present job, his ability to take over responsibility and his ability to carry it out.

On Cliffside

NEW HELIUM GAS PLANT STARTED

AMARILLO, May 28 (AP)—Production now is under way in the government's new helium gas plant near here and the first shipment of 200,000 cubic feet of the non-combustible gas has been sent to Langley field, Va., for use in the army's lighter-than-air craft.

The Langley field shipment was made in one of the specially built tank cars owned by the army air corps. The gas was compressed into the three huge cylinders under pressure of 2,000 pounds per square inch.

liquid. The helium is then drawn off. The remainder is returned to the gaseous state by raising the temperature back to normal. Part of this gas is used by the helium plant and the rest is piped to Amarillo for industrial and domestic use.

The process of extracting helium is a continuous one and involves temperatures lower than 50 degrees below zero, and pressures as great as 2,500 pounds per square inch.

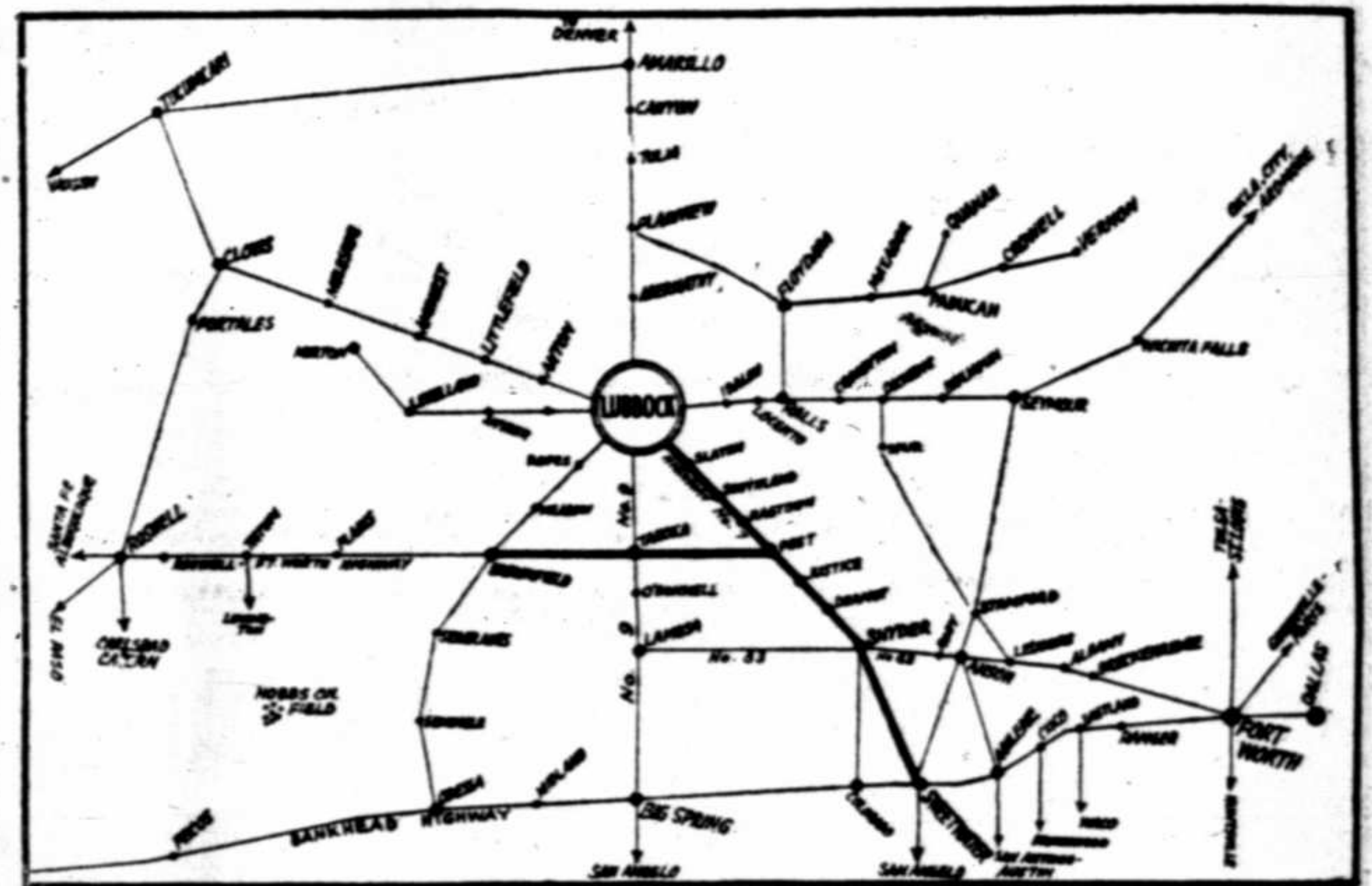

Somewhere in the war-torn land of Mexico, if the last news I heard of him still holds good, is an aging athlete making a gallant fight against the enemy who wins in the end over all athletes. This man is Hal Chase, a graceful and sure athlete as ever, donned a baseball uniform. The last I heard of Hal was that he was managing a semi-pro outfit in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico. Whether the revolution caused him to move back to the United States or not, I do not know. Chase, who played a shining trail of stardom while with the New York Americans, Buffalo Federals, Cincinnati Reds and New York Giants, before fading out of organized ball to join an outlay league in the south-west, was the greatest first baseman baseball ever saw.

The little red books in which are enshrined the star performances of major league players and present are dotted with the feat of Hal Chase. For instance, he accepted 22 chances in each of two games. In 1906 Hal made 22 putouts in one game, and so on.

As a first baseman in the days when Chase was in his prime, and after seeing most of the past and present-day guardians of first base in action, I have no hesitancy in awarding the laurel wreath to Hal Chase made the most astonishing plays with careless confidence and his quick thinking and execution of plays put him in a class by himself. In the dirt, high in the air, wide throws or wild throws, few bails escaped the brilliant Chase at first base. In addition to his great defensive play, Chase was an excellent hitter, although not ranking with the sluggers of his time.

Hal Chase was a college man. It was while playing baseball at Santa Clara college, California, that he first attracted notice. Later he played with the Los Angeles club of the Pacific Coast league before going to the big leagues.

Each is resolved to win the most highly prized honor in racing this year.

Track Chatter
Out in the paddock where the drivers gather to chat between trial runs and tinkering on their tiny cars Louis Meyer confides, "Gosh, I never expected to win that race—couldn't have done it if Jimmy hadn't had that accident, because he certainly was going places that day," and the return of the return, "Aw, be yourself, of course you could have."

Out on the track Louie is the master of his car, but in the garage he bows before the commands of J. Britt, best known mechanic at the speedway, of whose eccentricities the drivers love to tell. "Red-headed" Riley is just about the most superstitious person in the racing game and there's one thing he won't tolerate—a woman sitting in a racing car. "I just don't like it," he says.

Speedway Superstition
Other drivers recalled that the writer sat in George Souder's car last year just before he met with a serious accident which has left him with a crippled arm. Such happenings as that strengthen the superstition of who's lucky and who's not.

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ENGLISH VOTE ON THURSDAY

YOUNG WOMEN GIVEN RIGHT TO VOTE; INTEREST HIGH

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, May 28.—Great Britain will go to the polls tomorrow in its first general election since October, 1924. Young women will vote for the first time. Elections will be on members of the house of commons, residence of each constituency returning a conservative, liberal, or socialist candidate as suits them. When results are known, King George will ask the leaders of the party gaining the majority of parliamentary places to form a cabinet, which to all purposes will be the British administrative body for five years, or until non-confidence is demonstrated.

Parliamentary Seats Up
Six Hundred and fifteen parliamentary seats are involved, with some 27,000,000 residents of England, and Wales eligible for voting. This number includes an estimated more than 5,000,000 "flappers," between the ages of 21 and 25 recently enfranchised.

Three major parties are battling for control. The conservatives, given a popular mandate in October, 1924, and headed by the prime minister, Stanley Baldwin, seeks a continuation of their four and one half years of power. The labor party, led by Ramsay MacDonald, wants a labor commonwealth, so as to initiate the broad fundamental changes in British social and economic life which it has espoused. David Lloyd George, former coalition premier, heads the third party, the liberals, which though only negligibly powerful in the existing house of commons occupy a key position in tomorrow's elections and subsequent political developments.

GREENVILLE, May 28—Severe flooding of lowlands near here were inundated today after the Sabine river had left its course. A 2.35 inch rain had fallen since last night.

AUSTIN, May 28—The Colorado river was falling today, after having gone on its biggest spree since 1913. After reaching a crest of 25.6 at the foot of Congress avenue, a few blocks from the capitol, it had receded to 21 feet.

OAKWOOD, May 28—More than 1,000 acres of land were inundated here today by a rise in the Trinity river which took the water three feet above flood stage. The river was still rising.

CORSICANA, May 28—Creeks were out of their banks and roads were impassable today as a result of 2.13 inches rainfall up to 7 a. m. today. However, no serious damage has been reported.

TEMPLE, May 28—Flood waters of Little river near here, were receding today, and for the first time in nearly 24 hours some highways out of Temple were opened to traffic. The greatest damage has been to crops.

SAN ANTONIO, May 28—Russell Caldwell, 16, of San Antonio, and his uncle, Alex Scott, 43, San Antonio, were drowned while attempting to cross a bridge over the Rio river, 15 miles from Leakey, yesterday.

J. R. Scott, brother of Alex, and Ernest Caldwell, father of the drowned boy, were also in the party but escaped.
The party tried to cross the Rio near Leakey. Flood waters were over the top of the bridge. All got out to push when the motor became flooded. Two got back in the car when nearly across, and the boy and Alex Scott continued to push. A sudden wall of water descended, sweeping the two away. The bodies were recovered two miles down stream.

The American plane was manned by Roger Q. Williams and Lewis A. Yancy, the French by Rene LeFevre, Jean Assolant and Aremno Lotti.

ENID, Okla., May 28—Six tank cars of a Rock Island freight train caught fire after being derailed six miles north of Medford, Okla., today. No one was injured. A broken beam was blamed for the derailment.

S. M. U. EMERITUS DIES SUDDENLY

DALLAS, May 28—Dr. Robert Stewart Hyer, 68, president Emeritus of Southern Methodist University, died at his home here today.

Death was due to a heart attack. He was one of the foremost educators of the southwest.

Dr. Hyer was born at Oxford, Georgia, and was graduated from Emory college in 1881. Coming to Texas in 1882 he became professor of physics at Southwestern University at Georgetown and in 1887 was elected president of that institution. In 1911 he became the first president and head of the department of physics at Southern Methodist University, Dallas. He was made president Emeritus in 1919 when he resigned the active presidency to devote his entire time to science.

EDMONTON, Alta., May 28—Discovery of a skeleton identified as that of Thomas Mund ended a nine-year search for the man, wanted in connection with the slaying of two children.
Mund disappeared in 1920 at the

time the bodies of Sylvia MacDonald, 15, and her brother, Andrew, 10, were found with the skulls crushed.

GALVESTON, May 28—A motor launch in Galveston channel caught fire and is reported to have sunk before coast guards from Pelican Spit station reached the scene. Guardsmen are searching the vicinity for survivors of the launch's crew. One report said all aboard had been rescued.

WICHITA FALLS, May 28—The trial of Ed Pryor, former El Paso constable, on charges of robbing an El Paso hotel last summer, was expected to end here today.

PARIS—The signature of Marcel Proust, a novelist who wrote only "for the few," brought \$67 at a recent auction. This was a higher price than was realized for signatures of Pierre Loti, Anatole France, d'Annunzio and Georges Clemenceau. The latter two sold for \$11 and \$9 respectively.

HAVANA—A measure suspending the census, which was to have been taken next year, has been approved by President Gerardo Machado y Morales.
