



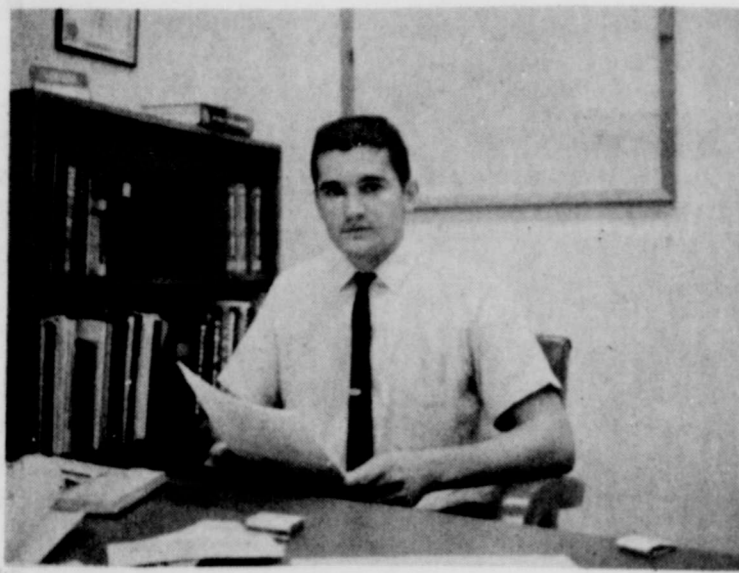

Col. Faver, RAFB Commander, Addresses Lions Club Meet

As Special Guest Of Golden Ferguson

Colonel Dudley E. Faver, Wing Commander of Reese Air Force Base, was special guest speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Abernathy Lions Club held Tuesday, July 6. Colonel Faver was special guest of Golden Ferguson, president of the Lions.

Colonel Faver traveled to Abernathy in a propeller-driven T-41A, the type plane which will be used in the Reesetraining program to be stationed at Abernathy Municipal Airport. He was met there by Ferguson, Mayor Roy Jones, Chamber of Commerce President Andy Reid and Manager Robert Barnes, and other local citizens. In brief ceremonies there, Faver was named as an honorary citizen of Abernathy and an honorary member of the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce.

Colonel Faver spoke to the Lions on the mission and facilities of the Reese base. Reese is one of eight undergraduate pilot training bases in the U.S. Its purpose is to train officer candidates for jet aviation. Until this year they had been trained for 132 hours in the two-engine T-37 jet and for another 120 hours in the faster T-38 model.

Under the new program beginning August 5, students will be required to obtain 30 hours of flying time in the T-41 model

here at the local airport. They will graduate to the tandem T-37 jet model for 90 more hours flying time. The last step will be 120 hours of training in the supersonic T-38. The new program will increase safety measures and assist in pilot material selection.

Other guests at the luncheon included Major Raymond Sofaly, who is in charge of training at the local airport; Captain Goldstein, Airman 1C James A. Veirs; William Mariman, a partner in Valley Aviation; and Harry Kumlin, Flight Operations Supervisor for the training program.

AT CITY COUNCIL MEET

SWPS Reveals Plans For Improved Street Lighting

(By Mike Skipper) The Abernathy City Council met Tuesday, July 6, to discuss several routine matters. The meeting date for the regular July meeting was changed to the 6th in order to avoid conflict with the Soap Box Derby to be held in Lubbock on the regular meeting night July 12. Mayor Roy Jones will be a participant in that event in the

lamps over a period of five years. Thirty will be changed Oil Can Derby when he will contest Lubbock Mayor Max Tidmore or his representative.

Melvin Rape, local southwestern Public Service representative, brought a five-year plan for improvement of street lighting before the council. The plan calls for the replacement of all present incandescent lamps with mercury vapor

each year. The Council also discussed a new ten-year contract with SWPS.

Truman Richerson, who is Abernathy's Civil Defense Director, brought a proposal to install a new siren system in the city. After discussing the proposal, the Council decided it would be best to contact the state Civil Defense office and ascertain what siren system they thought would be most adequate for Abernathy.

The Council discussed other routine matters, including final preparations at the airport for the RAFB light plane training program. Another matter discussed was placement of left-over funds from the \$300,000 bond issue voted here last October. No final action was taken on that subject. Other discussion included the financial statements for the month of June.

Aldermen W. T. Settle, Royce Henson, Dan Z. Ward, James R. Smith and Bill Skipper were all present at the meeting along with Mayor Jones and City Manager Robert Sokoll.

Melvin Rape urged that several of the members of the Chamber attend an industrial development training course which will be held at Texas A & M on September 15-16. The program is designed for members of the Chamber and outlines ways members can assist in industrial development.

New Officers For 1966 Stock Show Elected At Committee Meet

Election of new officers for 1966 highlighted a meeting of the steering committee of the South Plains Junior Livestock Show June 7 at the Chamber offices.

Clyde Gordon was named general chairman for the 1966 show. Jim Sexton was elected vice chairman and Curtis Barrett was named general superintendent. Dr. W. L. Stangel, dean emeritus of the School of Agriculture at Texas Tech, was appointed advisory committee chairman.

Other officials include O. J. (Bo) Sexton, sales clerk; Tom Simmons and Raymond King, both assistant clerks; and Lee H. McElroy and L. M. Hargrave, both assistant general superintendents.

Clyde Fort and Gene Linn were appointed co-chairmen of the finance committee. Jerry Fletcher, Chamber agriculture department manager, is show secretary.

The steering committee revised weight limits for two classes of barrows, setting lightweight at 190 to 205 pounds and putting medium-weights at 206 to 220 pounds.

Heavyweights were left the same at 221 to 240 pounds.

The steering committee also approved plans for the show to provide carcass cut-out information on up to 12 calves, 14 hogs and eight lambs. The meats laboratory at Tech will process top animals submitted for cut-out information.

Judges announced for the 1966 show include Fred Wilkinson of Crane, Lambs; Dr. Robert Totusek of Oklahoma State University, steers; and Dr. J. D. Hillier, also of OSU, barrows.

Fletcher showed a 20-minute slide presentation that has been prepared to promote the 1966 stock show set for March 21-23. He pointed out that the exposition, sponsored annually by the Chamber, draws approximately 2,000 exhibitors from 26 counties. He said the value of livestock seen at the 1965 show totaled approximately \$100,000.

The slide presentation is especially designed for civic groups and similar gatherings, and organizations wishing to schedule the program should call Fletcher at the Chamber, PO 3-4666.

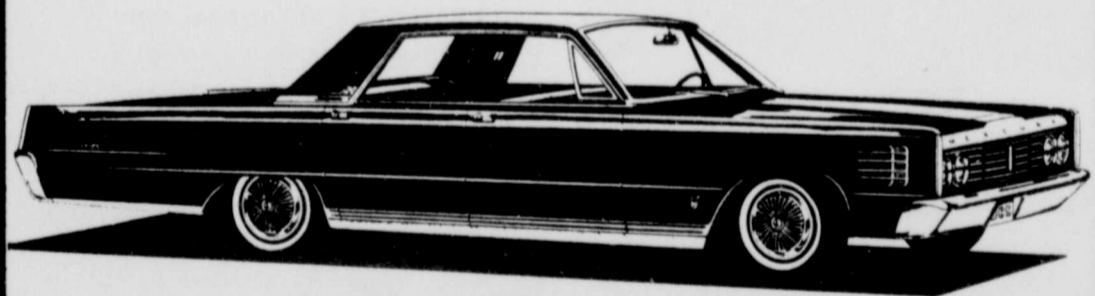

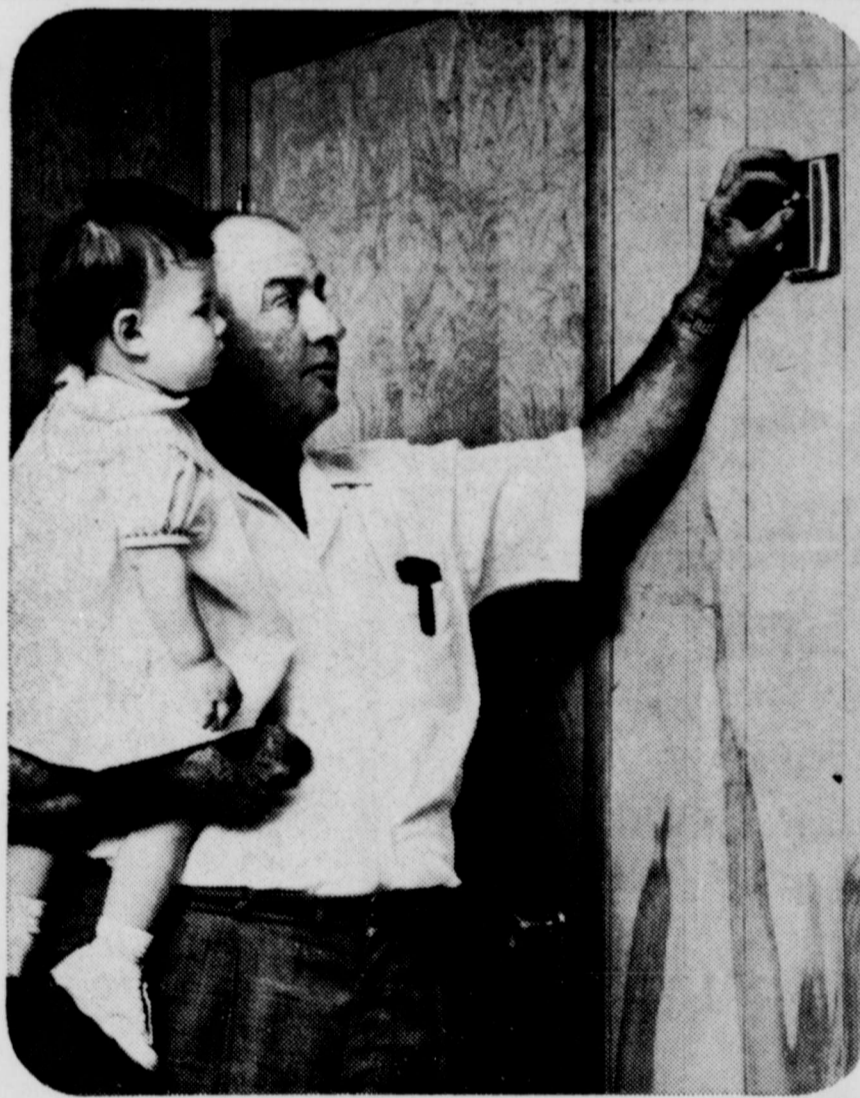
