New CISD head coach is named



William Grissom

The Colorado ISD Board of Trustees voted unanimously to accept Superintendent Russell Merket's recommendation that former Stanton Athletic Director and Head Coach William Grissom be hired to fill the same positions at CISD.

Grissom is bringing with him a career record of 122-78-3 and adds that it was the anticipation of a new challenge that attracted him to the Wolves.

He stated that like the Wolves, the Stanton program was not in good shape when he took over as head coach. His career in Stanton began in 1991 with a season record of 1-9.

In 1992 the season improved

with a 3-6 record and in 1993 Stanton had what is considered a winning season with a 5-4 record.

The 1994 football season yielded seven victories and three losses for Stanton and although the program has turned around Grissom said the new challenge to turn around another program was too enticing for him.

"We've played Colorado City and I've seen the ability that these kids coming up have," he said. "I think the situation is there to turn the program around and I believe it will happen faster here than it did in Stanton."

Grissom said he plans on getting high school coaches more

involved at the junior high level.

"I think if we get more coaches involved at the junior high level we can create better attitudes before they come into high school," he said. "If the kids start to respond to what we ask them then I see some good possibilities for the entire athletic program."

Russell Merket said he felt that Grissom's record spoke for itself.

"We're really fortunate that we have somebody of his proven ability and caliber who is willing to come to Colorado City," he said.

He added that Grissom will be taking a small cut in his salary to come here.

Grissom began a career as head

coach in 1976 at Hamlin with a 62-27-1 record; five district championships; four bi-district championships; one area championship; and one regional championship.

In 1984 Grissom accepted the head coaching job in Breckenridge where he won two more district championships, one bi-district championship and was runner-up as district champions twice.

In 1991 he began his career in Stanton, where he helped to turn the athletic program around.

Grissom has signed a two year contract and begins his first day as CISD athletic director and head coach on January 16.

Stock show will include auction

The Mitchell County Stock Show will be conducting its first ever premium auction on January 14 at 6 p.m. Dates for the stock show have been set for January 11-14.

According to Bryan Limmer, a member of the Livestock Committee, the auction will not be a sale.

"There will be bidders that will pay prize money or premiums for the exhibitors' animals, but the buyers won't get to keep the animals," he said.

Limmer said the committee decided on this year's auction as a way of consolidating the Westbrook, Lorraine and Colorado City communities to help raise more money for the youth involved in the show.

He added that in previous years the committee raised monies for the show by collecting donations from individuals and businesses.

"Previously our maximum had been about \$15 thousand," he said. "We hope with the auction to raise \$20 thousand or more this year and in the coming years."

This year committee members asked businesses that have made monetary donations in the past to participate in the auction by acting as bidders.

"This is something new for the donors and contributors," he said. "Now we're asking them to come out to the sale and participate."

He added that by doing so businesses are able to see firsthand where their donations go. Limmer also stated that anyone who does not wish to be a part of the auction can still make a donation to the stock show.

Although 192 county youth and approximately 330 animals are expected to take part in the stock show, only 120 sale slots have been allotted for the auction and only one animal per exhibitor can be sold, Limmer said.

"You have to place so high in your particular class to be able to participate in the sale," he said.

"We had the option to do it this way or to let every exhibitor sell one animal."

According to Limmer, the committee chose to limit the sale as a way of promoting competition among the participants.

"If someone is not in the sale one year he or she may develop a competitive edge," he said. "This may encourage the individual to work harder to make next year's sale."

Police offer assistance to elderly

Monday night's snowfall was a pleasant surprise for some Mitchell County residents who took to making snowmen and snow angels as soon as they could get out into the cold.

However, there was no accumulation and the snow disappeared as fast as it came. Luckily for those snow lovers throughout the county, the forecast called for more of the white stuff Tuesday and possibly Wednesday night.

No accidents have been reported as a result of icy road conditions in the county but law enforcement

officers are asking motorists to follow a few safety precautions.

They are:
• Do not drive unless it becomes absolutely necessary;
• if you must drive, slow down and use caution;

• limit the use of brakes by using lower gears to aid in slowing your vehicle; and
• keep in mind that even if you do everything right you may still find yourself involved in a minor accident.

According to Colorado City Police Chief David Montgomery,

elderly persons in need of necessities, but who feel unable to drive in icy conditions may make arrangements with the police department "to have someone pick up their medication from the pharmacy or something from the grocery store to hold them over for a few days."

"Rather than [allowing them to] get out into a dangerous situation, the police department will provide a means to help them," he added.

Recycled trees improve fish habitat

The Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce and the Colorado City State Park will be collecting your old Christmas trees for recycling until January 11.

The trees will be used to create several new fish habitats in Lake Colorado City.

Trailers have been set up at pick up points designated in the parking lots of City National Bank and Mitchell County Home Health in Colorado City; the south side of Westbrook City Hall; and across from Lorraine City Hall at 201 Main Street.

The Chamber is asking that all trees be completely cleaned of hooks, tinsel and other Christmas decorations that could cause problems for the fish if eaten.

The Chamber adds that it is also important not to turn in trees that have been chemically treated or flooded.

This project will serve to improve the fish habitat at Lake

Colorado City as well as reduce the amount of materials going into local landfills.

Habitats such as these trees are targeted toward largemouth bass, crappie and panfish.

It is important to set up artificial habitats for the fish

because the lake is man-made and natural habitats are less likely to occur.

These habitats will provide fish with places to feed, hide from predators and nest and is intended to maintain and increase the current fish population.

Local residents to begin dialing 915

Yesterday marked the first day that Mitchell County residents had to start dialing the 915 prefix when making long-distance telephone calls within this area code.

Previously, customers could dial "1" or "0" followed by the seven-digit telephone number to make their connections.

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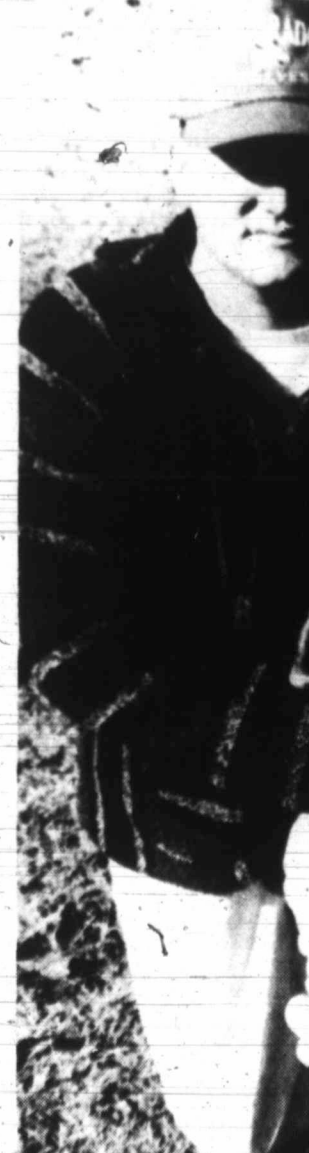

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CHIEF LONE WOLF

Before we close the book completely on the year 1994, let's look back at the Christmas season in Colorado City. In some ways, Christmas traditions never change, while in other ways, change gradually creeps in.

Consider the change in presents bought at Ramage Appliance, for instance. The big seller 20 years ago, according to Alan Ramage, was microwave ovens. Ten years ago TVs and VCRs were the hot items. This year? Satellite systems with the RCA dish, followed closely by big screen TVs. Times do change.

Speaking of traditions, how's the Christmas card business? "Probably as good or better than it's always been," answers Rick Perkin of Perkin's Apothecary. Increased costs and higher postage rates haven't affected card sales. "No sir," Perkin adds.

We heard about the same story from Eddie Piland of Eddie's, 10th and Hickory. He says he still keeps as big an inventory of Christmas cards as he did 10 or 15 years ago.

"Oh, yeah. It's still a big business," Piland adds. In fact, "it's here to stay."

Turning to Christmas gifts, we checked with Billy Joe Wood at Woods Boots. What was his best seller this past season? Exotics? Leathers? Neither.

"Justin Bay Apaches," Wood told us without hesitation. Really? What separated them from the other boots?

"They were so ugly," Mr. Wood continued. "Yep. An oil treated leather and it's probably the number one sellin' boot in the country."

The cost was about \$99 a pair.

For children, gifts have changed dramatically over the years. Just ask Gay Houston at Corky's Tru-Value. She says forget the gun and holster sets little boys used to ask Santa to bring them. This year the big seller was something called "Power Ranger." (If there's one at your house, don't throw it out one of these days. It'll be big in the antique shops.)

Footballs, Gay says, have just about gone the way of the guns and holsters. She recalls not too many years ago every little boy wanted a Dallas Cowboy jersey, helmet and football, which were packed in an NFL box. They're history now, folks. (Another candidate for the antique shops.)

There is one Christmas tradition which is still alive and well, though. Red wagons. "Still good. Still good," Gay says. "Bikes and trikes, too."

Turning now to the little girls' perspective...dolls. "We don't sell them like we used to," Mrs. Houston said. "Used to be even adults came in and told us, 'I just want to look at the dolls.'"

The doll business mushroomed some 10 or 12 years ago when the Cabbage Patch dolls were introduced. Baby Alive, which was alive diaper-wise, later helped boost doll sales. Of course, through the years, Barbie has pretty well hogged the doll market.

Well, if Christmas cards, red wagons and ugly oil treated boots were big this year, what do you suppose has happened to the sales of live Christmas trees? Local grocer Raymond Fuller has the answer to that question.

"We sold more trees this year than we ever sold before," he confided. (Well, he didn't really confide; it was more of a boast.) "196 trees. Sold out, except I'm sure some of 'em walked off by themselves, you know."

Actually, Fuller says the tree business is not very profitable. Most years it's a break even proposition, but this year, with no one else selling real trees in town, "I may have made a little."

Why mess with the trees, then? "I've always tried to keep trees so people wouldn't have a reason to go out of town to look for one."

The outlook for live Christmas trees? "A bright future," Fuller said with a twinkle in his eye (and a little jingle in his pocket).

Incidentally, the longtime grocerman related a story concerning Christmas trees which involved the late Hiram Mann.

A number of years ago, Mann went into Fuller's store about five days before Christmas and wanted to buy a tree. Unfortunately, the store had already sold out.

"Well, I'm in a lot of trouble," Mann replied. He said he had not planned to put up a tree that year, until he learned a grandson was coming to visit him.

"I went out in the country and cut down a cedar tree," Mann told Fuller. Then he decorated the tree and waited for the grandson to arrive. Mann said the cedar tree really looked nice.

Enter the grandson. The boy walked around the tree two or three times, eyeing it closely. Occasionally, he would glance over at his grandfather, then walk around the tree some more, still looking at it. Finally, he spoke.

"Papa, this ain't gonna work," the youngster told his grandfather.

We also talked about the religious aspect of Christmas with Dr. Travis Monday, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church. The possibility of too much commercialism during the Advent season bothers him, but he's not overly concerned.

"In my own preaching and teaching, I try to focus more on the positive and less on negatives," he told us. And he feels the approach to Christmas is "still pretty traditional."

At any rate, Dr. Monday says, "it [Christmas] will never go away."

One more tradition—Santa Claus! Jack Starr, local "jack" of all trades, helps Santa each year by wearing a red suit and whiskers. He reports that this year every little boy wanted a Power Ranger. He also says the kids of today are not any more timid, nor any bolder, than children from years ago. (He averages about one youngster a year who tries to lift his beard.)

Santa Jack had a heartwarming experience this year, which he passed along to us. Bradley Gandy, six-year-old grandson of Ken and Pat Whitel, operators of the Villa Restaurant, had his picture taken with Santa this year.

Several days later, Starr, dressed in his civilian attire, dropped by the Villa. "Bradley said he wanted to show me something," Starr related. The boy led him to a picture of himself with Santa!

"I saw the real Santa Claus," Bradley said proudly as he pointed to the picture. He had my picture with him on the wall at the Villa," Starr said.

And that brings us full circle on the story of Christmas. It begins with the birth of the Christ child and ends with the beautiful innocence of another child.

And that's the one tradition which will never change.
