Area residents protest

Condos cleared to cross Fulton road

A request to cross Fulton Beach Road with a building by the developers of Nautical Towers was approved Wednesday, May 25, by the Aransas County commissioners despite protest from several area residents.

Nautical Towers developer Jerry Haldeman asked the court for formal approval and acceptance to cross the road with a building, leaving a 16-foot underpass. The primary purpose is to provide a walkway so those residing at Nautical Towers may cross from one side of Fulton Beach Road to the other without going outside.

Architect William H. Holland revealed plans to widen Fulton Beach Road in the immediate area to four lanes, all which would pass under the building. The road would take up the entire 60-foot right-of-way.

After discussion, it was agreed to raise the height of the underpass to 18 feet to prevent any problems posed by parade floats or large vehicles.

A county building permit for the development has already been issued.

Several residents of No Man's Land, the area where Nautical Towers will be built, protested several aspects of the development including the added traffic it will bring to Fulton Beach Road.

Development spokesmen said the plans to widen the road would take care of any traffic bottlenecks.

"That's going to widen the traffic over one or two blocks of Fulton Beach Road. What about the rest of it?" asked area resident Skip Dinkler.

"I understood this was to be a walkway," said resident Betty Muth. "Is it going to be an actual building?" When Haldeman told her it was, she said that this was a dangerous precedent to be setting in the county.

No Man's Land resident Harold Pinchin spoke up saying, "If you want this all over the county, you can't give it a permit unless you give everyone a permit. Do deed

restrictions in this county amount to anything? We have deed restrictions that do not allow these types of buildings."

Aransas County Judge John D. Wendell explained to audience members that the county has no jurisdiction over building permits and cannot issue height restrictions since it has no ordinance making powers.

"I may ask for a little remuneration from these people to prevent me from looking at the back end of this building," stated Pinchin.

Nautical Towers attorney G. Bickford Shaw told Pinchin that the deed restrictions do allow multiple family dwellings, which applies to Nautical

Towers.

Juanita Waley, who was the previous owner of the property on which Nautical Towers is to be built, told those present, "I feel like this will be a great improvement to this area although it will block the view, but that's something we just have to live with." Waley added that apartments and condominiums are going to be built in the area whether Haldeman does it or not. Moreover, she said, it will be bringing sewers to Fulton.

"We, as the commissioners court," said Commissioner W.B. (Pete) Sanders, "have no control over high-rises. If Nautical Towers is going to be built I think the

Sewer rates go up on June billings

Customers of the Rockport sanitary sewer system will see a 20 percent increase in their sewer rates effective with the billings in June.

The 20 percent across-the-board rate hike will mean an additional 62 cents per month for residences or apartments currently paying the minimum rate. City Manager Herman Johnson told city council members Tuesday night before they granted the rate increase on second and final reading.

The additional revenue is to help amortize \$600,000 in certificates of obligation issued by the city to meet Rockport's share of the \$2.4 million cost of expanding the city's sanitary sewer treatment plant and system from the existing one million gallons per day to a two-million-gallon capacity. A \$1.8 million federal grant will pay the balance of the costs.

Johnson said the city anticipates receiving \$554,000 from the developers of Nautical Towers on Fulton Beach Road when that project connects to the city's sanitary sewer facilities. That money, he said, will be used to recall \$554,000 of the certificates.

Alderman Murray McMillan moved to adopt the sewer rate hike ordinance and Betty Jean Ward seconded it. The motion carried by a 3-0 vote.

Also adopted on second and final reading during Tuesday's council session was an ordinance annexing 3.572 acres of the proposed Oak Villas Retirement Community site on Enterprise Blvd. The remainder of the 10-acre-plus tract is already inside city limits.

The council opened bids on purchase of two new police cars and voted to buy the vehicles from Commercial Motors for a price of \$18,947. A bid submitted by Bay Chevrolet was lower — \$17,393 — but Bay Chevrolet did

not meet the bid specifications which called for cars equipped with the "police package."

The council held the first public hearing at 7 p.m. Tuesday on a request by Rockport Country Club Inc. for annexation of the 15.131-acre Unit 1A of Rockport Country Club Estates, adjacent to RCC Estates Unit 1 which is already inside city limits. No comments were heard for or against the proposal and Rockport Mayor Burt Mills closed the hearing shortly after 7 p.m.

In other action during the regular council meeting that began at 7:30 p.m., the council gave first reading of a proposed ordinance annexing 1.0399 acres on the corner of Glass and Percival avenues. The request was brought by McMillan and public hearings were held March 28 and April 12.

City Attorney Allen Lee told the council there is some additional land to be added to that request and the addition will be made prior to the next reading of the ordinance.

Johnson reported on a meeting in Austin May 18 on the city's proposal to sell effluent to Rockport Country Club Inc. for use on the golf course. A temporary permit, good for 180 days, was issued May 19, Johnson said.

The Texas Water Commission will require that daily samples of the effluent be run at the plant and the effluent must be channeled into ponds on RCC land and sampled again before it can be used in irrigation. Johnson said the effluent must also be treated by the addition of chlorine.

Johnson said there is a question on whether the city or RCC must pay for the required treatment. If the city must pay for it, he added, the price at which it will be sold to the country club must be amended.

Aston explains EMS to ACTA membership

Bill Aston, director of emergency medical service systems for Aransas County, spoke to the membership of the Aransas County Taxpayers Association Tuesday evening, May 24. Aston told members of the history of EMS in Aransas County as well as its functions and how it is funded.

Aston said that EMS was set up in late 1975-early 1976 as a nonprofit organization by a group of residents concerned about the treatment of critical emergency patients. He credited Dr. Ron Levy with the idea of establishing a paramedic/ambulance system.

Aransas County's EMS is considered an advanced life support operation, meaning that trained paramedics with equipment may disburse drugs and set up intravenous treatment, as opposed to a basic life support operation where emergency medical technicians load patients in an ambulance, administer oxygen if necessary and transport to the nearest hospital. The main difference, Aston said, is that an advanced operation like the one in Aransas County stabilizes a patient's condition at

the scene before transporting.

Most of the funding for the county's EMS comes from contributions from organizations and individuals as well as grants from foundations. In addition, the cities of Rockport and Fulton and the county each contribute to the cost of paying the salaried personnel.

Aston told ACTA members that EMS personnel is comprised of four salaried paramedics plus approximately 35-40 volunteers. "These people are the backbone of this system beside the people who contribute money," he said.

The county has two modulances and one four-wheel drive vehicle which is also fully equipped with life support equipment.

He predicted that the EMS will have to expand as the county does and envisions another station near the causeway with a full-time staff who would answer 15-20 calls every day by the year 2000.

ACTA President Willis Pfeifer chaired the business meeting which followed Aston's presentation. After the minutes were read and the treasurer's report made, Pfeifer gave members an update on the effort to get Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox to rule on whether or not posts replaced by H.E. Butt Inc. in the water off Live Oak Point are illegal. ACTA member Frank Riordan, who has organized the effort to get a ruling on the posts, said that he has not heard any new developments in the case. It was reported at the meeting that ACTA has received a letter from State Senator John Sharp thanking ACTA for sending him a copy of the letter which was sent to Mattox. Sharp has added his name

City planning, zoning commission reorganizes

Members of Rockport's recently reappointed planning and zoning commission took their oaths of office, elected officers for the coming year and drew for terms of office in their first formal meeting Tuesday evening, May 24, at City Hall.

Six of the seven board members were present to take the oath of office administered by Rockport Mayor Burt Mills. The P&Z board was reappointed earlier this month under terms of the new city charter, adopted by Rockport voters in April.

In their first official action, following a joint public hearing with the city council on a zoning request by Dimas G. Sanchez, the P&Z board recommended that Sanchez' request be denied and that consideration of a plat for the proposed Easy Acres

subdivision and amendment of Rockport's requirements for fences be tabled again.

Members of the P&Z board, appointed by the council May 10, are Al Vandever, Ralph Winkelman, Rachel Garcia, Jack Guillet, Edwina Stranahan, Oscar Alvord and Barbara Armstrong. All but Armstrong were present at Tuesday's meeting.

Commission members drew for two and three-year terms after being sworn in. Drawing three-year terms were Winkelman, Vandever, Garcia and Alvord. Those serving two years will be Guillet, Stranahan and Armstrong. After this initial term, all terms on the commission will be for three years.

Vandever was elected chairman of the commission after having been initially appointed temporary chairman by Mills

pending the commission's elections among its members. Armstrong is vice chairman and Garcia secretary.

The one zoning request heard by the commission Tuesday, Sanchez' request was for a special use permit or zoning category that would allow him to repair alternators, generators and starters at his residence located at 820 N. Pearl.

City Manager Herman Johnson told the city council and P&Z members during the joint public hearing that the garage in which Sanchez proposed to do the work faces Sabinal.

A property owner on Sabinal protested the proposed change, saying, "There is no commercial property in that area" and to allow Sanchez to operate the proposed business would lower the value of adjoining

property. He later said, "My objection is not to what he is doing but to all the cars lined up out there." He said there were "four, five, sometimes six cars lined up for days at a time."

Sanchez denied there were that many cars at any one time on the premises.

Left on the table was a request by Texas Commerce Bank and M.D. Morrison for approval of a preliminary plat for Morrison's proposed Easy Acres subdivision on Enterprise. The plat was first brought before the P&Z May 10 and was tabled at that meeting on the basis that it was incomplete.

Nothing new was presented at Tuesday's meeting, according to Vandever who reported on the P&Z commission's action. Also tabled was action on amendments to

the city zoning ordinance pertaining to fences in front yards. That matter also came before the May P&Z meeting and board members at that time deferred action for the new commission.

Under provisions of the new city charter, the planning and zoning board that was seated Tuesday night will be responsible not only for exercising the authority of a zoning commission but also for making, amending and adding to a master plan for the physical development of the city.

The P&Z commission is also charged, by the charter, with submitting annually to the city manager, not less than 90 days prior to the beginning of the budget year, a list of recommended capital improvements for the coming two years.

Death penalty appeals to slow

In a speech that was unusually candid for a U.S. Supreme Court justice, Lewis F. Powell Jr. told judges of the 11th Circuit, made up of federal courts in Georgia, Florida and Alabama, that unless Congress and the courts find a faster way to handle death penalty appeals, states should abolish capital punishment.

One of the things that made the talk unusual is that Powell believes the Constitution permits capital punishment and has voted to sustain death sentences.

Powell's remarks were interpreted in legal circles as a call for help from Congress in dealing with the high court's mounting work load. He endorsed a recent proposal by Chief Justice Warren E. Burger for a new court that would relieve some of the Supreme Court's burden by resolving conflicting opinions among federal courts of appeal.

The associate justice talked about the court's workload and predicted that the need to decide 100 cases before the current term ends (two months from now) is likely to result in "opinions of inferior quality."

We sympathize with the court's problems in coping with an increasing workload. Part of it could be the court's fault for not having handed down a clear ruling on capital punishment. In recent years, it has been known to reject some of its own guidelines in capital punishment cases.

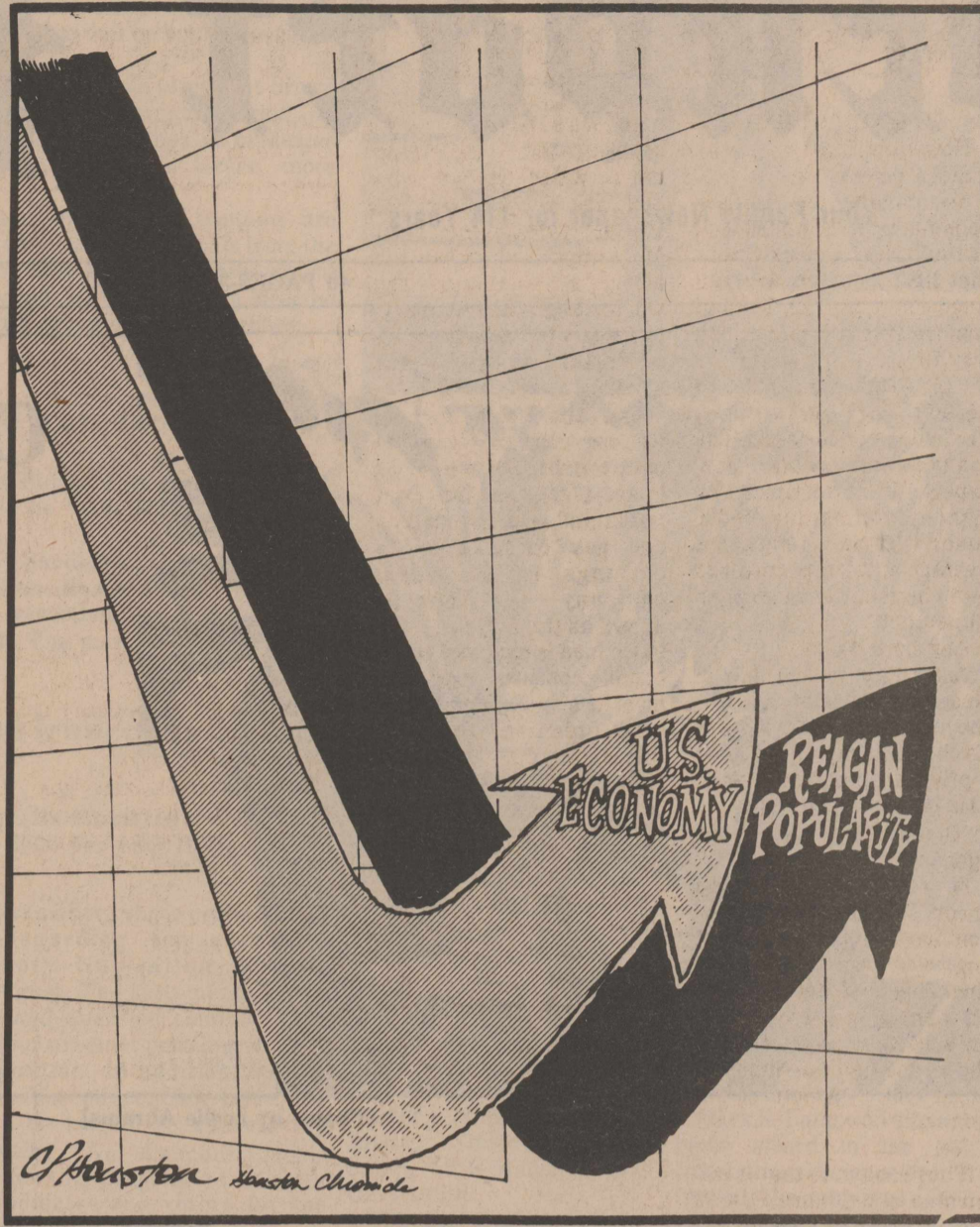
States with capital punishment laws have been looking to the Supreme Court for guidance in rewriting statutes that would stand up through appeal processes, but instead of definite rulings there have been more vague decisions.

We would like to have heard Justice Powell's explanation of the court's handling of some capital punishment appeals that have resulted in helping to further complicate state prison space problems.

Multiple appeals now typical of death penalty cases represents a "malfunctioning of our system of justice," Powell told the judges. He said the appellate process, lasting for years and often covering the same issues again and again "undermines public confidence in our system of government and the will and ability of court to administer it."

He also predicted the crunch of the term's remainder will lead to an increased amount of "separate writing by justices" as opposed to unified majority opinions for the court as time for working out differences will be limited.

"unless the courts and Congress discharge their respective duty to move effectively to address this (workload) problem, legislatures of the several states should abolish capital punishment," Powell declared.

Second you are bound to agree that before a burger is consumed you have a soggy mess in hand. There is no way to firm a burger bun without burning it to a crisp. And so, were I Mr. Whataburger, McDonald or whatever among the burger kings I'd solidly corner and monopolize the trade by taking a pleasant trip to a little cay in the Bahama Out Islands, Man-O-War. There at a little place called "The Bite Site" you'll find the world's best burgers, hamburger or even better, conchburger. The real secret is in the burger roll, tasty, crisp, thinner than the ones we know. The task, naturally, to charm the secret of making burger rolls from two pretty, rosy-cheeked young ladies. Learn the secret, but don't I beg you else my curse will be upon you forever; don't try to lure those lovely lasses from their charming island.

An Italian writer, Luigi Barzini, appeared a few days ago on Bill Buckley's "Firing Line" and offered me more food for thought than I can begin to cover in my allotted space. However, a few points. One of the great differences between Europeans and Americans is that on the continent people think of building and

creating things, business, whatever, not just for themselves but for their children and grandchildren. Hence they are in not so much of a hurry as we Americans who want to accomplish and acquire now, right now.

That I think is the reason we are so careless of our resources. This is quite natural, I think. When our forebearers came here, especially from crowded Europe (even several hundred years ago) the vastness of resources, land, forests, water and everything else seemed endless. How could they have dreamed of the America of today?

Even so visionary a man as Jefferson thought of us as forever being an agricultural nation. I read the other day that only about 2 percent of our people are engaged in producing food and fiber, even though we still produce more from the land than any other people in the world.

Europeans have never been and perhaps never will become integrated. Integrated is Barzini's word. They are, and have been, separated by languages, temperament, custom and tradition. True, I thought to myself, true despite their being mostly a part of the Aryan race.

I have been trying to apply Barzini's words and thoughts to our own country, a melting pot of not just nations but races. Ours then is a far more complex problem. In England, France, Germany, Italy and others have fought and argued, almost to no end, for more than 1,000 years. Ours is a mixture of all the nations of the world, and all its races. Will we ever become integrated? I am sceptical. More, I am also doubtful that it would be a good thing were it ever to come to pass. Yet, if you would have a bright note, I am inclined to think that Europeans who have settled in this nation have in general pretty well melted together. Other opinions are in order.

Recession worldwide

Although President Reagan is unjustly blamed for American's economic problems, the recession that caused them is worldwide in scope.

In some countries, problems created by the recession are much worse than in America, which is showing signs of recovery. Inflation and unemployment have been more severe in other nations than in the U.S.

In West Germany, for example, more than two million people are out of work and have been for months. Many of these workers find unemployment almost too much to bear. Every working day many people in the factory-filled Ruhr region get up early, take lunchboxes and leave as they have done for years.

But they are not going to work. They are trying to cope with being out of work in a hard-working society that is much like America's working class.

West Germans don't want

their children, and especially their neighbors, to know they're out of work. American journalists who have observed this surmise it may have something to do with the German mentality.

There is a negative aspect to being unemployed, even though it is not a German worker's fault his employer went bankrupt because of the recession.

A similar negative aspect prevails in America, but the attitude of jobless workers here is markedly different. American workers do not try to hide their misfortune and lose no time in applying for income replacement funds available through labor union and government sources.

While the depressed world economy is showing signs of revival, the so-called "trickle down" process in the economic cycle won't immediately affect rank-and-file unemployed.

Being unemployed in West

Germany, however, may be more a psychological setback than a financial one for most workers. The government pays jobless people two-thirds of their take-home pay for up to a year. It also pays pension plan and health insurance costs.

There is no standing in line as unemployment checks are automatically deposited to one's bank account. The jobless do not have to register with their local employment office and indicate what kind of job they're looking for, as they do in America. But with few jobs available, many are told not to come back for a couple of months. About one in 10 is sent to school, at government expense, to be retrained for better qualified positions in more promising fields of work.

We are just getting around to job retraining in America, but even that may not be enough to stabilize the labor market when the recession finally over.

Bill will hurt smugglers

A small private aircraft carrying 252 pounds of cocaine landed at night without lights on an abandoned airstrip in Florida.

A U.S. Customs chase plane landed in pursuit and collided with the parked aircraft. The pursued pilot had escaped, leaving behind identification.

In Tennessee, a private plane made a forced landing. All passengers escaped before the plane and a \$500,000 cargo of marijuana were confiscated.

Fortunately, there were no casualties in either of these two incidents. Unfortunately, we are seeing more and more air crashes related to illegal drug trafficking, and it's no wonder.

The Drug Enforcement Administration estimates that in 1981, 50 percent of the cocaine, 35 percent of the marijuana, 75 percent of the Southwest Asian heroin, 55 percent of the Southeast Asian heroin and 80 percent of the dangerous drugs brought into this country were smuggled in by air. Although some of these drugs are carried aboard

commercial airlines, most are transported by private aircraft.

Even if pilots are caught and convicted of drug smuggling charges, there is precious little that can be done to keep them from flying again. Under current law, the only action the FAA may take against a pilot convicted of drug trafficking is a one-year suspension of his pilot's certificate and a \$1,000 fine. Such action was taken by the FAA only 17 times last year.

Nor could the FAA take any action against the owners of planes, such as the ones abandoned in Tennessee and Florida, either to prevent them from continuing registration of those planes or to prevent them from registering other planes in the future.

I have introduced legislation that will help crack down on pilots and aircraft owners who abuse the privileges of their certificates and registrations to engage in drug smuggling.

My bill would give the FAA Administrator the power to suspend for one to five years the certificate of pilot who has not been convicted, but who has been found by the Administrator to have engaged in illegal drug trafficking.

Pilots who smuggle drugs not only add to the serious problem of drug abuse in this country, they also pose a definite threat to air safety. I want to put them out of business.

who goes ahead and flies without it, or who flies with a false certificate or false registration numbers, would face a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$25,000 fine.

But that's not all.

The Administrator of the FAA already has the authority to revoke a pilot's certificate for any number of safety violations. There's no doubt that smuggling drugs by air creates a safety hazard since smugglers frequently take off and land on unmarked fields, fly without flight plans or run out of fuel because they're overloaded. The FAA reports that 211 airplane crashes in 1980 alone involved drug smuggling.

Registration is main element

A U.S. Census Bureau survey showed that less than half of the nation's residents old enough to vote in congressional elections last fall went to the polls, but three-fourths of those registered voted.

The survey report leaves little doubt registration is the main element in getting people to the polls. However, figures revealed that 25.6 million Americans who said they were registered failed to vote in November 1982 elections.

The Census Bureau, in a tabulation based on surveys taken two weeks after the November elections, found that 48.5 percent of persons 18 and older voted, up slightly from four years earlier. Among registered voters, 75.7 percent voted in 1982.

The report showed the largest number of voters was in the 25- to 34-year-old bracket, but the best percentages of participation were among women 55 to 64 and among men 65 to 74.

Slightly less than half of eligible whites cast ballots last fall compared to 43 percent of blacks.

In 1978, the last non-presidential year, the overall turnout was 45.8 percent. In 1974, it had fallen to 44.7 percent, well below the 55.4 percent recorded in 1966.

In presidential years, the percentage of those casting ballots among those old enough was 59.2 in both 1976 and 1980, still below the 69.3 high recorded in the 1964 race.

Of the 165.5 million people old enough to vote, nearly 106 million said they

were registered, or 64 percent. Of that number, 80.3 million, or 75.7 percent, said they voted last year. Four years earlier, that percentage was 73.3. A bureau official said traditionally 70 to 80 percent of those registered go to the polls.

The survey disclosed the turnout for men of all ages out of those old enough was 48.7 percent. Participation was highest, 67.9 percent, among those 65 to 74.

The highest numerical turnout in 1982 among men was in the 25- to 34-year-old group, with 7.4 million reporting they voted. The same held true for women, with more than 8.2 million in that age bracket saying they voted.

For women, the total turnout was 48.8 percent, with the highest rate among age groups the 63.1 percent for those 55 to 64.

By race, the turnout among whites was 49.9 percent. Among blacks, it was 43 percent, and for those of Spanish origin, it was 25.3 percent. A bureau analyst said the low figure for Hispanics indicated many are not citizens and are ineligible to vote.

The report concluded that the percentage of those old enough to vote was highest among:

1. Residents of the North Central States, 54.7 percent.

2. Those who live outside metropolitan areas, 49.1 percent.

3. Those with four or more years of college, 66.5 percent. The low was 35.7 percent for those with up to an 8th grade education.

Dear Editor:

There's an argument going around that Congressmen should be limited to two terms instead of holding on to their jobs for life, but I've discovered an argument on the other side. An ex-Congressman sometimes draws more money from the government than he did when he was in office. A former Speaker of the House for example pulls in \$85,000 in pensions, \$20,000 more than he got when he was on the job, and over \$75,000 more than he'd get on Social Security.

Or take the Presidency. From a tax-saving standpoint, it's now cheaper to keep a President in office than it is to turn him out.

According to an article I read the other day, the cost of maintaining the three ex-Presidents we now have



on hand is \$27,000,000 a year, which comes to an average of \$9,000,000 per ex-President. In addition, practically any ex-President can make at least a million dollars writing a book, which I don't understand as I've never encountered anybody who's ever read one.

When a President is defeated or declines to run again or quits just ahead of an indictment, the government allots him \$1,000,000 for moving expenses, which seems like a lot just to get him out of those periodic rate increases.

Moreover, it costs about \$15,000,000 a year to staff and maintain ex-Presidents' libraries scattered around the country, which seems a little one-sided as all the books and papers in any of them is confined to just one subject. Even a small town public library has a wider range of books than that.

So it appears that once we elect somebody to something we're stuck with the bill from then on, whether he's in office or out. The British are ahead of us on this. You don't hear of them swapping their Kings or Queens every few years.

Never fight a rising market

How time flies! Stock prices, too. Six months ago in this column, we took a hard look at the boom in stock prices that had occurred between August and late October and concluded it still had a long way to go.

"If rates continue to decline," we wrote then, "reaching 9 or 10 percent, as many economists now expect, P-E multiples for typical companies could reach their long-term average of 13 times earnings — an increase of more than 40 percent."

And here we are. According to the Media General Financial Weekly, the median New York Stock Exchange company reached a price-earnings multiple of 13 in late April, up from nine in October and 7.6 a year ago.

Is there room for an encore? Can stock prices continue rising in the face of ongoing uncertainty about financing the federal deficit, an increasing trade deficit, an uncertain recovery, and the all-too-familiar litany of angst with which we've learned to live?

Yes. The problem is that it will involve a lot more risk of loss. All the valuation models — the tools

professionals and sophisticated individuals use to judge relative value and risk & "blow up" as interest rates come down. More important, rather than looking at "the market" as a whole, it becomes necessary to focus very closely on the potential of individual stocks.

The table below, from our October column, shows the relationship between the interest rate on long-term bonds and what an investor can pay for a dollar of earnings in a typical company — otherwise known as the P-E ratio. The basic idea is that stocks and bonds compete and that investors will demand a "risk premium" to reward them for taking the higher risk and uncertainty of common stocks.

Unfortunately, when you go through the same arithmetic with bond interest rates at 8 percent, P-E ratios rise to a hysterical 40 times

earnings. At 7 percent the P-E ratio explodes to infinity.

Not too useful. But look at that table again. It is telling us that the stock market is (almost) a win-win situation.

Here's why: Right now, inflation has slowed to the lowest level in years — just over an annual rate of 1 percent for the first quarter of 1983. With interest rates on five-year U.S. Treasuries at 10 percent, this means an

inflation-adjusted interest rate of almost 9 percent, a staggering figure. Stock prices will be influenced by how that real interest rate changes.

— If the rate of inflation remains low, interest rates will continue their decline. While our measuring tools aren't very precise for estimating the potential, it's clear that further massive upward pressure on stock prices could result. You could begin to think, for instance, about seeing major growth stocks such as IBM, 3M, and American Home Products at 20 times earnings.

— On the other hand, if inflation begins to come back as recent stiffening of gasoline, oil and other commodity prices suggests, it can return to 5 or 6 percent before the current interest rate structure is threatened.

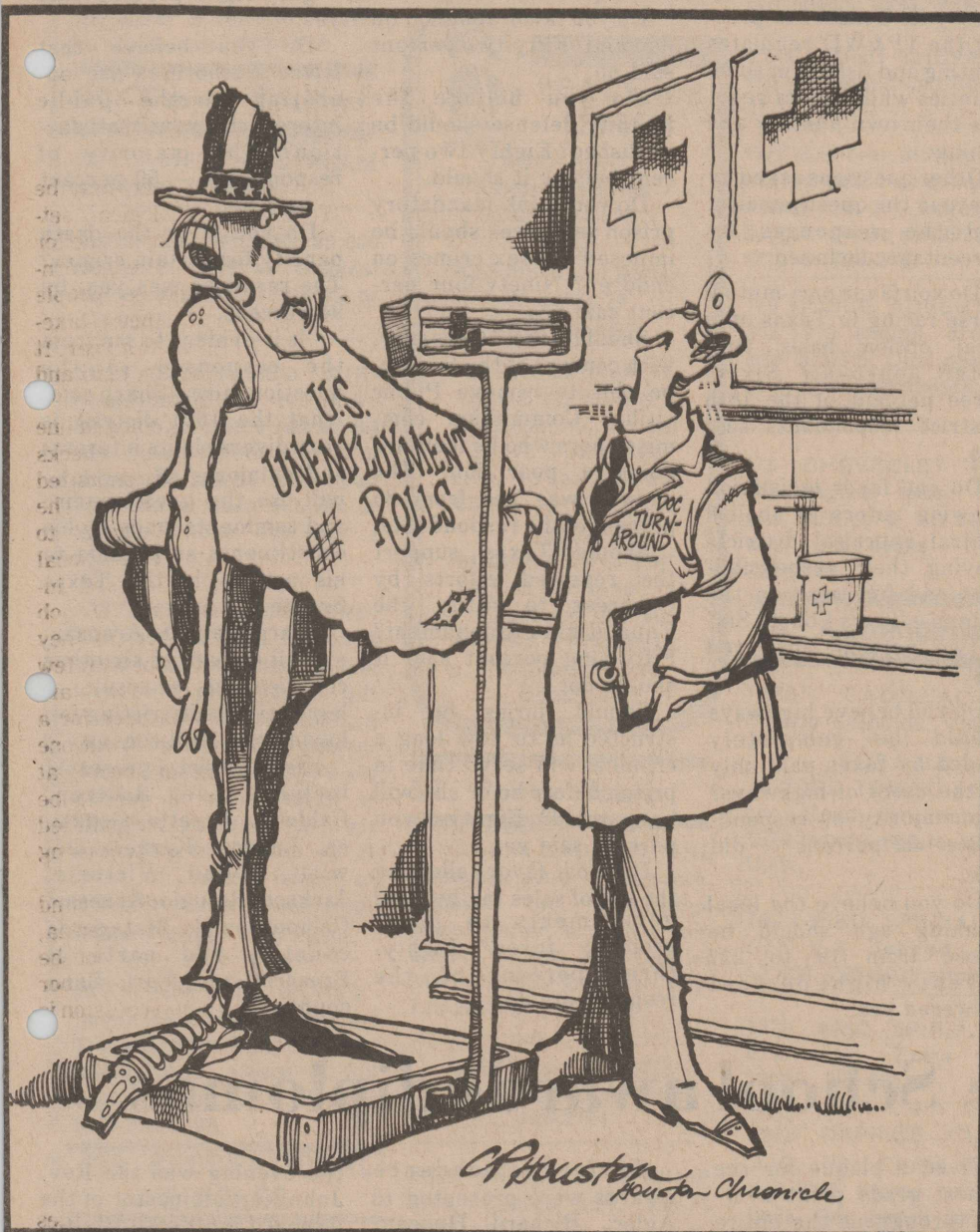
The odds, in other words, still favor up. And that's without considering the

impact of rising corporate earning power.

How much will earnings increase? According to the Blue Chip Consensus, a survey of economic forecasts compiled by R.J. Eggert, pretax corporate earnings are expected to rise by 19 percent this year. Some will rise more, some will rise less, and some won't rise at all.

Exactly what happens isn't the point, however. It's the odds: If interest rates fall, stock P-E multiples (and prices) will continue to rise. With a typical common stock now providing a current dividend yield of 3.6 percent, an investor will do as well as long-term bonds if interest rates are unchanged but per-share earnings rise by only 6.4 percent — one-third of the projected rise.

The bottom line? Never fight a rising market.

Emergency loan program for fishermen established

Low interest loans are being made available to commercial fishermen to assist them in payment of their current mortgages.

Congress recently appropriated \$9.7 million which will be available to government-guaranteed-financed fishermen as well as conventionally-financed commercial fishermen. Texas fishermen will compete with fishermen from our coast to North Carolina for \$1.14

million that will have an interest rate charge of 3 percent.

The Fisheries Loan Fund program applications are being processed by the National Marine Fisheries Service.

Those applying for these funds must be owner-operators of a vessel of at least five net tons and be in jeopardy of defaulting on their mortgage.

An open season of approximately 30 days will be provided to the general fishing public in order to complete applications for assistance. The date for starting the application procedure has not been established but may be during the first or second week of June.

Fishermen may obtain more information from the county maring agent, Rich Tillman, 749-5207.

Second quarter estimated payment due June 15

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to make estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Generally, if you have income, with no tax withheld, of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$300 on this year's return, you are liable for filing a declaration of estimated tax and for making payments.

Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says,

estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual return, Form 1040, due for the year.

Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments.

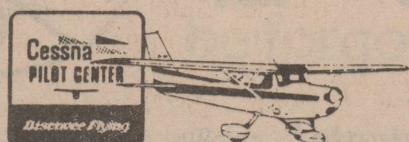
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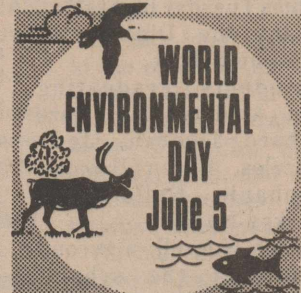
Home costs pay

As a general rule, the cost of a home improvement will be recovered on resale if it brings the property up to standards in the neighborhood.

On the other hand, if the improvement causes the property to become superior to other homes in the neighborhood, the owner may not recoup its cost, plus inflation, on resale.

Keep in mind that cost is not the same as value. Sometimes a low-cost improvement can make a home much more marketable. In other situations, however, an expensive improvement which is considered desirable by a homeowner, will have little or no value in the eyes of prospective purchasers.

When planning a capital improvement, consider how long you intend to own the home and how the improvement will be viewed in the resale market. Make the improvement only if you expect to recover the cost through a combination of enjoyment or resale price.



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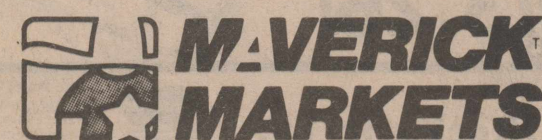

Inez Bracht

She's grateful for what she's had

 "We had nice times and hard times — I don't regret any of them," Inez Bracht says of the 59 years she shared with husband F.A. (Fred) Bracht. "I think it made us better people — the hard times make you appreciate the good."
 She's seen a lot of both in Rockport, a lot of years since she married F.A. — "Freddie" — in 1920.

"The first house we lived in was where they're building the furniture store (Monroe's)," she recalled in an interview this past week at her present home at the end of Bracht Lane in Rockport. "Freddie bought it in 1919 — just before the storm."
 The house survived the storm and Inez, who wasn't living in Rockport that year, came the following year to marry her Freddie. "I never cared about anyone else," she recalls now. "We were always interested in one another."

A native of Damon, in Brazoria County, Inez was the ninth of 10 children. She spent her early years in Damon, attending school there the first two years. "I walked to school three miles every day," she said, "and I was never tardy nor absent."
 When she was older, she went to live with a sister. "They (the sister and her husband) moved around," Inez recalls. "He was a music teacher — I never did graduate from high

school because they moved."
 For a time, though, Inez's sister and brother-in-law lived here in Rockport. This was where she attended Rockport High School — located then where Rockport Elementary is now — and where she met Freddie.
 "He had a store here — he was much older than I. The first time we got together," Inez remembered, "I was 16. He and his sister Mable came and got me and we went to the ice cream parlor and had a bowl of ice cream. I guess you could say that was our first date."
 An interruption came when Inez's sister and brother-in-law moved away — then Freddie went to war. "We always wrote to one another though," she says. "I kept up with him that way."
 Then one summer, Inez came back to Rockport to visit a girlfriend, and she and Freddie renewed their friendship . . .

After their marriage, Inez helped run the Bracht Grocery Store. "We owned a whole block where the Sundial and those buildings are," she said. "I guess the Brachts had that grocery store at least 50 years. When we sold out, we formed the Bracht Lumber Co., Mr. Bracht, Fred Jr., James and I . . ."

Fred Jr. and the Brachts' daughter, Mary Jo, still live with their mother. "Neither ever married," Inez said. James, the younger son, is married to Polly Bracht — currently a member of the Aransas County Independent School District board of trustees — and Inez has four grandchildren, two great-grandchildren. One of her granddaughters, Karen Bracht, works in the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock in Austin.
 "I've enjoyed the children — James' children and Allen's (Allen Bracht is another grandchild)," she said.
 She lives quietly. "I belong to the Catholic Church, but I'm not out in the public anymore. I used to belong to the woman's club, things like that. Not anymore."
 She does help keep her house and she crochets (including shawls which she periodically takes to the residents of the Aransas Pass Nursing Home), sews, "and I work in the yard some. I still drive my own car — I hope I can keep driving it." She comes, she notes, from a long-lived family. Two of her brothers live in California and at the age of 91 and 93 are still active.
 "My folks live in California," she adds. "The most extensive traveling we ever did was visiting my people in California."
 Asked about the changes she's seen in her years in

Rockport, she said, "Key Allegro was the first thing that took our breath. It was a big thing for Rockport. "The bank was changed," she observed after a pause. "Mr. Bracht was one of the bank's oldest stockholders — he had held stock in that bank 61 years when he died."
 Of the area where she now lives, just off Omohundro, she said, "There were no roads, nothing in here when we bought this land." Their first home in that area was the two-story house that is now home for Don Meek and his wife. That house, Inez said, was finished about 1942.
 "Then we sold out to Mr. Meek and lived in Little Bay Shores for a time." But she wasn't really happy in Little Bay Shores, so they came back to the part of Rockport where she was happy and moved into the house that has been home to Inez for the past 12 years.
 It's a large house — too large for three people, Inez observes, but she's happy there. She remembers the bridge parties she and her husband used to have . . .
 "I don't do much," she says. "I still have a big Christmas dinner every year — 16 of us."
 "I'm very grateful," she says, "and very thankful for all I've got, that the Lord has let me live this long, do the things I do."
 It is a quiet life. But it suits Inez just fine.

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Sharp announces poll results

State Sen. John Sharp, whose 18th district includes Aransas County, has announced he is "very pleased" with the response to a recent questionnaire mailed by his office to registered voters in his district.
 Sharp this week released results of his poll, mailed out in March. The number of respondents to the questionnaire was not given, but 71 percent of the voters who did respond described themselves as "conservative," according to Sharp. Forty-eight percent considered themselves moderate, according to the poll, and only 12 percent described themselves as liberals.
 Sixty-three percent of those who responded to Sharp's questionnaire said they favored continuation of the current ban prohibiting sale of redfish and speckled sea trout.
 An overwhelming 92 percent of Sharp's respondents declared themselves in favor of his legislation for strengthening DWI laws, and an equally wide margin — 91 percent — said they favor Texas right-to-work laws.
 A narrower margin — 60 percent — said they

believed the Texas Department of Parks & Wildlife should set all hunting and fishing regulations in every county in Texas. At present the TP&WD regulates hunting and fishing in some counties while others regulate their own hunting and fishing.
 Other questions asked by Sharp in the questionnaire, and the responses by percentage, included:
 Do you favor pari-mutual horse racing in Texas on a local option basis with voter approval? Sixty-three percent of the 18th District respondents said yes.
 Do you favor legislation allowing voters to abolish central appraisal districts moving their responsibilities and functions to the Commissioners Court? Sixty-two percent answered yes.
 Do you believe highways should be completely funded by taxes paid only by the users of highways? The majority of respondents — 52 percent — did not.
 Do you believe the legal drinking age should be raised from 19 to 21? Seventy-eight percent answered yes.

Do you favor additional monies being allocated to build new prisons? Fifty-seven percent said yes.
 Do you favor abortion on demand? Fifty-two percent said no.
 Do you believe the insanity defense should be abolished? Eighty-two percent believe it should.
 Do you think mandatory prison sentences should be imposed for sex crimes on children? Ninety-four percent said yes.
 Should the Governor, with consent of the Senate, be able to remove Public Utility Commission commissioners who he feels are doing a poor job? The answer was yes from 85 percent of the respondents.
 Should Texas support the renewed efforts by Congress to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment? Fifty-nine percent said it should not.
 Should juries be instructed as to how long a criminal will serve time in prison before he or she will be paroled? Eighty-seven percent said yes.
 Do you favor allowing the use of sales tax by local governments to lower property taxes? Eighty-three percent of the respondents do.

Do you favor allowing police to use wiretapping to detect illegal drug dealers? Eighty-eight percent said yes.
 Do you believe that River Authorities are operating in the public interest to your satisfaction? The majority of respondents — 59 percent — said no.
 Do you favor the death penalty for certain crimes? The response was yes, by 94 percent.
 "It is evident to me from the responses to the questionnaire," Sharp said, "that the 18th district is very diverse in its interests and opinions." He said he will use the questionnaire and comments made by his constituents as a guide to his actions in the Texas Senate.
 Sharp gained Aransas, and all or part of six other counties, as a result of legislative redistricting following the 1980 census.

His district presently includes Lee, Bastrop, Caldwell, Fayette, Gonzales, Lavaca, Karnes, Dewitt, Goliad, Victoria, Jackson, Refugio, Aransas, Calhoun and Matagorda counties and parts of Brazoria and Fort Bend counties.

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Saltwater fishing stamp bill passed by House

Senate Bill 1000, the controversial saltwater fishing stamp bill was passed by the House of Representatives late Wednesday afternoon and went to the Governor for final signature. Under the new law, saltwater sport fishermen will be required to purchase a \$5 stamp in addition to their regular fishing license. Funds generated by the stamp will go to the state Game, Fish and Water Safety Fund. Since its passage in the Senate on May 11 much controversy,

some due to misinformation about the cost of the stamp, has surrounded the bill which was authored by Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson.

According to Ann Lorentson, Community Liason for Brown, the Senator decided to author the bill due to requests from coastal fishermen "to beef up" the safety fund. The Game, Fish and Water Safety Fund covers the salaries of game wardens, their equipment and other operating expenses.

Said Lorentson, "There are a lot of fishermen fishing illegally all along the coast line, helping to deplete the fish supply and abusing the law." Brown felt that more patrols and equipment would help solve the problem. Said Lorentson, "The stamp will be paid for by saltwater fishermen and will be used to help them. We are interested in the coast area because that's where the problem was."

The liason explained that 50 cents of the \$5 fee covers

processing and paperwork generated by the issuance of the stamp and \$4.50 is channeled into the safety fund. Based on 1979 Texas Parks and Wildlife statistics, some \$5,132,000 will be generated by the stamp purchases. As to alternative methods of revenue, Lorentson said, "It would have been almost impossi-

ble to get anything appropriated this year. Everyone is cutting corners... with teacher pay raises and other needs, the chances that the fund would have gotten an appropriation for sports fishing needs were practically nil."

When the cost of the stamp was incorrectly reported as \$15 in an area

daily newspaper, Lorentson said hundreds of coastal residents contacted the Senator's offices. "I hope we clarified it — the stamp is \$5 and it will help legitimate fishermen."

Stamps will be purchased the same time as a fishing license and all exemptions applying to

fishing licenses will apply to the stamp. Fishermen under 17 or over 65 will not be required to purchase a license or stamp, nor will anyone who is fishing on their own property or their family's property.

The cost of a Texas fishing license is going up as well, to approximately \$8.75 and noting this,

Lorentson said, "People have said that with the cost of the stamp, poor people won't be able to fish. The fishing license currently reads anyone fishing with a trotline, pole or throwline is exempt from the license fee. Anyone able to afford a rod and reel is not going to hurt by a \$5 stamp."

Here are some "short and sweet" recipes collected many years ago at a tasting tea. I've tried the peanut butter cookies, but none of the others. I hope those of you who do try them will share the news or the results with all of our readers.

INSTANT PUDDING COOKIES

1 package instant pudding mix, any flavor
1 egg
1/4 cup salad oil
3/4 cup Bisquick
Combine all ingredients and drop with a spoon on ungreased cookie sheet. Flatten with the back of a spoon. Bake 5-8 minutes at 350 degrees F.

UNBELIEVABLE PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

1 cup peanut butter
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
Beat all ingredients together. Drop by teaspoonful on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 12-25 minutes at 350 degrees F.

ORANGE CANDY

1 1/2 cups sugar
2 1/2 cups pecans
1 6-ounce can frozen orange juice, thawed but undiluted

Combine sugar and orange juice and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture boils. Continue cooking until it reaches soft ball stage or 234 degrees F. Remove from heat and pour into bowl; cool to lukewarm. Add pecans and beat until thick and creamy. Drop by spoon onto waxed paper.

DINNER ROLLS

1 cake yeast
1 cup milk
Pinch of salt
2 tablespoons lard
4 cups flour
Heat lard, milk, sugar. Do not boil. Cool to lukewarm. Add yeast. Mix flour in slowly. Let rise 1 1/2 hours; knead down. Put in greased pans. Let rise again and bake in slow oven.

VELVEETA FUDGE

1 pound oleo
1 pound Velveeta cheese
4 pounds powdered sugar
1 cup cocoa
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups pecans, broken up

Melt oleo and cheese in top of double boiler. Add rest of ingredients and mix well. Turn into buttered dish, 9-inch by 13-inch. Cool. Cut into squares. Yields 6 1/2 pounds candy.

Renfros are a team

"We consider ourselves a team," says the Rev. Barrett Renfro of himself and his wife Marty. "We do a lot of church work together."

"We work very hard at working together," Marty put in during an interview this week at Rockport's First United Methodist Church where Rev. Renfro is pastor.

Pastor of the Rockport church since June 1980, Rev. Renfro will celebrate 30 years in the ministry this coming month. His first appointment, while he was still attending seminary, was to Forestburg - Ross-ton, "two little churches north of Denton in Cook County," he added.

Rev. Renfro is a native of Denton, a 1953 graduate of North Texas State University and the Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University. He has been appointed to churches throughout East Texas, served as minister to youth at West University Methodist Church in Houston for five years, minister of education in Harlingen, served as associate pastor at Laurel Heights Methodist Church in San Antonio and was pastor of St. Stephens United Methodist Church in San Antonio for five years before his appointment to the church in Rockport.

Marty — whom Rev. Renfro married in September 1980 and who is now expecting their first child — describes herself as "an Army brat." 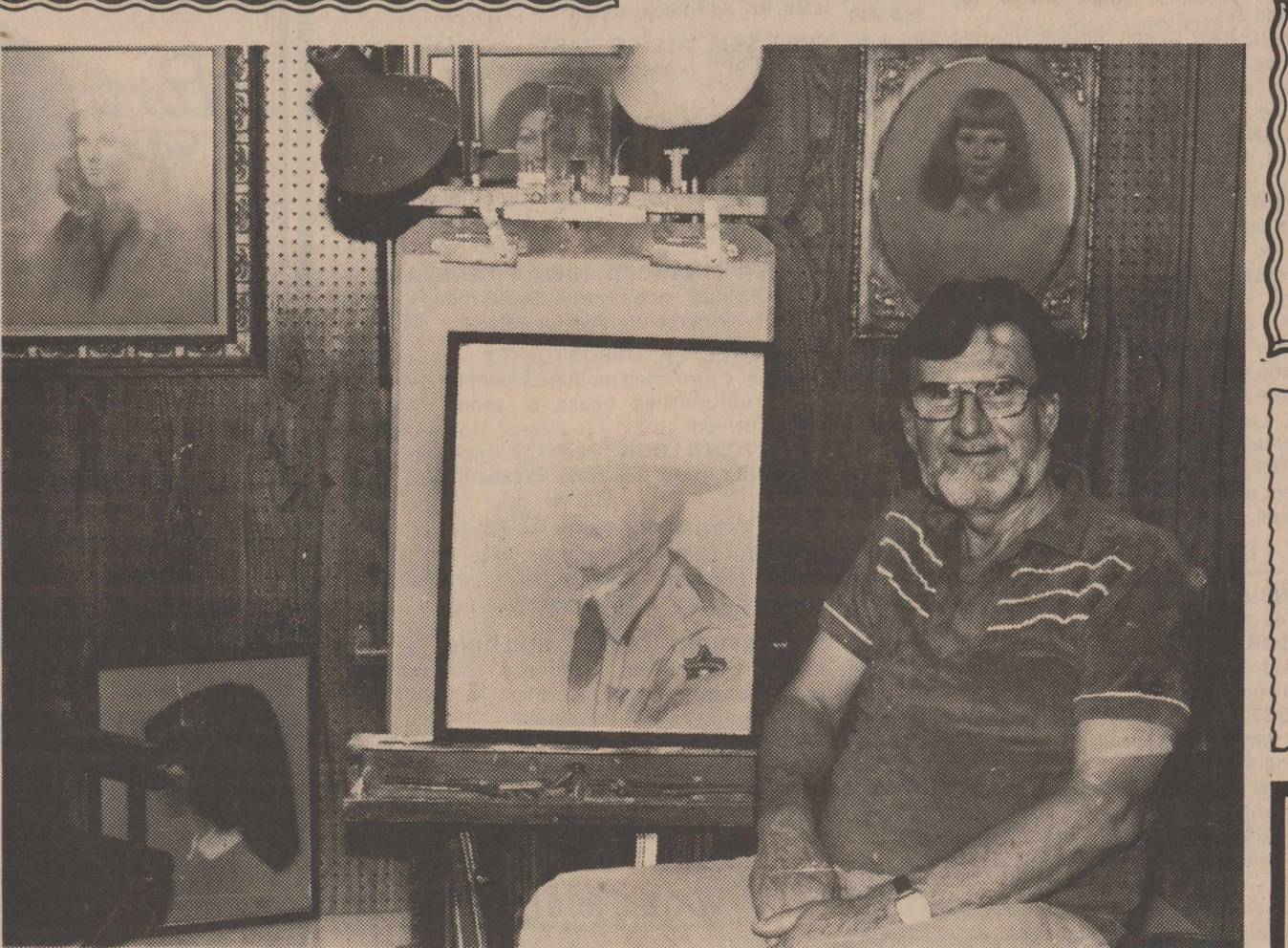

Subchapter S corporation

Investors, developers and builders who invest in real estate could benefit from legislation passed in October which radically changed tax statutes regarding Subchapter S corporations.

A Subchapter S corporation normally is not subject to corporate taxes. Instead, its owners include income and loss on their individual tax returns. Until now, Subchapter S corporations were not feasible for most real estate investors.

The new law makes it possible for many of the tax advantages of a partnership to be blended with the nontax advantages of a corporation, through the use of a Subchapter S.

The new law increases the number of shareholders the Subchapter S corporation may have and allows differences in voting rights of common stock. The law also permits an indefinite carryover of unused losses or deductions.

A tax advisor can help clarify the complications of real estate investment.

New homes in Texas

Many consumers picture the newly built home as a multi-family unit with less square footage than they had in the past.

But, according to a recent survey of homebuyers in Texas conducted by the Texas Real Estate Research Center, respondents who bought new homes in Texas got more square footage than buyers of previously owned homes.

These respondents also were interested in the home's energy features. Buyers of both new and old homes got approximately the same number of bedrooms and bathrooms, and the older homes did not have larger lots.

A strong advantage for the older home was the lower median monthly payment — \$640 compared to \$900 per month for new homes. While many respondents who bought older homes assumed loans, either through a bank, savings and loan or the previous owner, two-thirds of the respondents arranged a loan from a mortgage company.

Inflation and real estate investment

To avoid losing purchasing power in inflationary times, many individuals hedge against inflation by purchasing some tangible object — such as gold or art — that will maintain its value. Real estate can provide this kind of hedge.

Homebuyers see the value of their homes increase rapidly and, when they sell, realize a tidy capital gain. Many homebuyers routinely expect inflation to make the home purchase profitable.

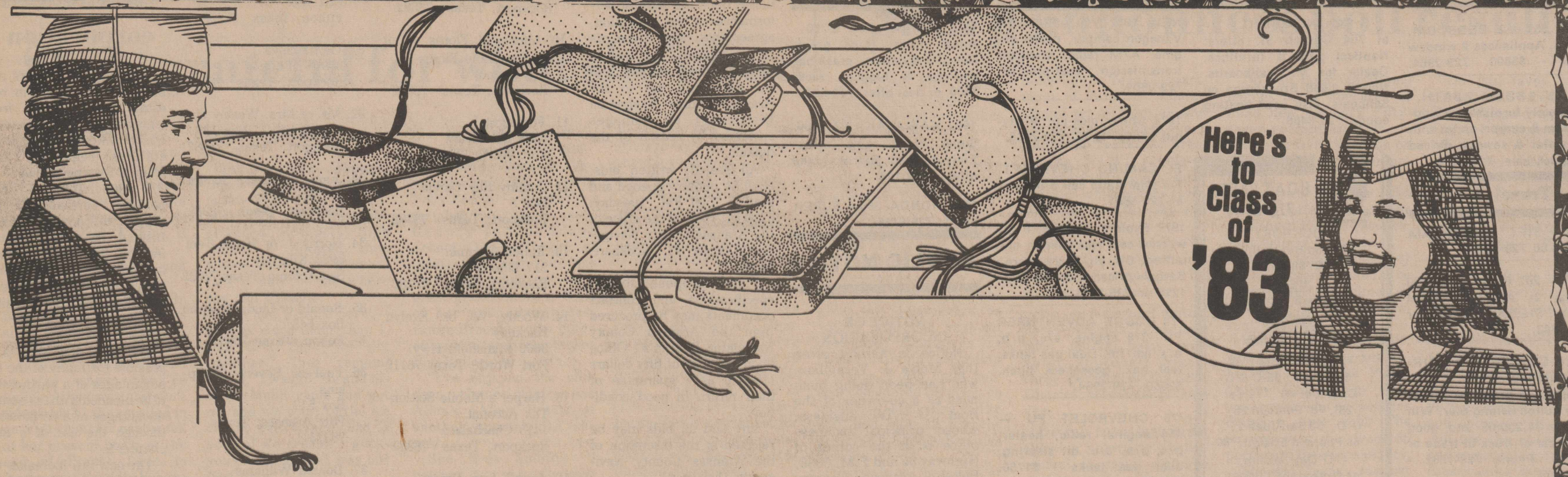
But reduction in the rate of inflation can cause these expected profits to vanish. When inflation slows, demand for tangible assets as hedges against inflation wanes. Values often do not increase as before and can even decline.

Real estate investments can still prosper without inflation, but buyers should seek properties in growth areas. Growth increases demand and values may increase even without inflation.

Offshore waters are closed to shrimping

The fishery conservation zone off the coast of Texas has been closed through July 15, officials of the National Marine Fisheries Service have announced.

The Zone closed 30 minutes after sunset Friday, May 27, and will remain closed until 30 minutes after sunset on July 15.

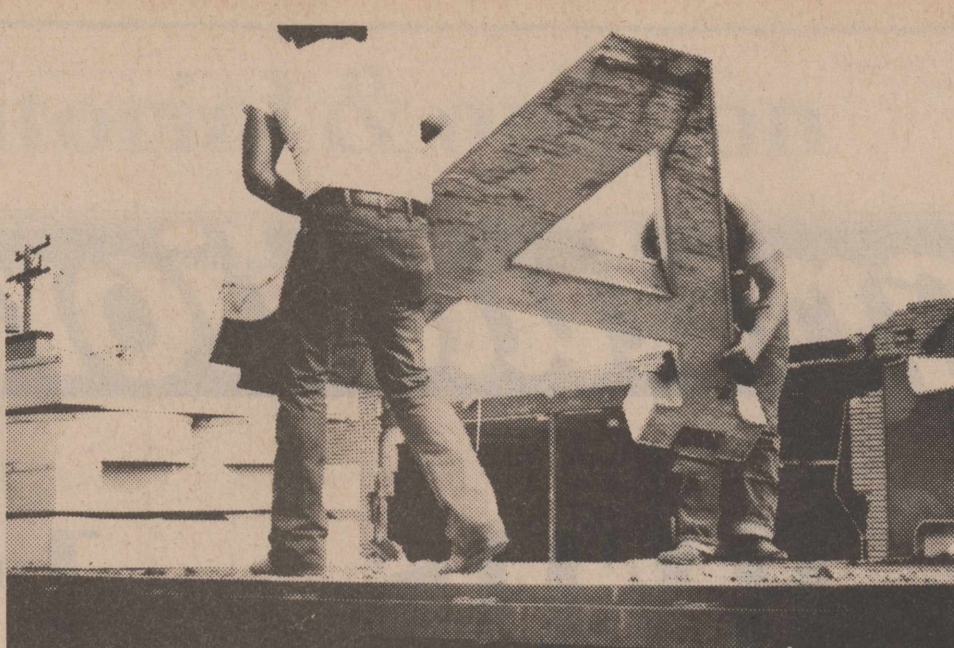
The state of Texas has closed its territorial sea to trawling during the same period.

First-time violators of the closure may be fined up to \$15,000 and their entire catch be seized, according to NMFS officials. If aggravating circumstances exist, the vessels

may also be seized for a first violation. Vessel owners and captains will be held responsible for the penalties.

Purpose of the closure is to protect brown shrimp during their major period of migration from the bays to the Gulf of Mexico and allow them to reach a larger, more valuable size.

Fishing vessel owners and captains are advised to be on the alert for signals from the Coast Guard or other authorized enforcement vessels or aircraft and to stop when directed and comply with enforcement instructions.

to the list of those asking Mattox for a ruling on the issue.

Another ACTA member, Harold Pinchin, wrote Representative Bill Patman about the case. Patman in turn sent a letter to the head of the Army Corps of Engineers in this area, who came down to view the area in question. Riordan said that it is possible there will be a public hearing on the matter since H.E. Butt has not yet received a Corps of Engineers permit for the posts. "Right now, it's just a waiting game," Riordan said.

ACTA member Mitch Ammons told members of an idea which had been brought up before the organization's executive committee. He said that the committee had discussed the possibility of sending a letter of congratulations to each graduating Rockport-Fulton High School senior along with a complimentary one-year membership in ACTA and a voter registration card. "It's sort of an invitation to come on down and be a part of this thing," said Ammons. However, the membership decided to put it off one more year since there is not enough time to organize it and raise the needed

funds this year. He estimated it would cost an additional \$600 per year to implement the idea.

Pfeifer read members three organization statements regarding the upcoming Aransas County Navigation District elections in August. The statements urged all interested and qualified candidates to file for one of four precinct positions and/or one at-large position. In addition, Pfeifer told members that all candidates in the election would be invited to address the July 26 meeting. An Ammons-Pinchin motion to pursue this program to turn out all eligible candidates and voters for the election was approved.

'Hi-tech' MBA degree is offered at Incarnate Word

SAN ANTONIO — A master's degree in business administration, designed to anticipate the management demands of the Southwest's growing "hi-tech" business world, is being introduced by Incarnate Word College this summer.

The two-year program, which begins in June, offers all the required elective courses in the evening, allowing students to maintain their regular daytime schedule.

Dr. Richard Szecsy, director of the MBA program, says the new degree program will "stress practicality in meeting the needs of the greater Southwest for its business leaders."

"The use of computers has been incorporated into the MPA program to help provide the background essential to the development of greater San Antonio, as stressed by Mayor Henry Cisneros."

Dr. Szecsy added that San Antonio and the Southwest were already experiencing the effects of major shifts and changes that futurist John Naisbitt discusses in his current best selling book, "Megatrends," especially the North-South population shift, the technological revolution and decentralization away from Washington. The

recent opening of the \$40 million Advanced Micro Devices plant on the city's West Side was just one example of the way these trends are benefiting San Antonio. The Southwest is being looked at as a reasonable and viable alternative to California's "Silicone Valley."

"All of these changes have significance for San Antonio, the Southwest and those who will be involved in the participation and implementation of these trends," says Dr. Szecsy, "and this means a high demand for fully qualified administrators and executives who can deal with the new management of technology, solve problems that arise and know not only how to do this but why they are doing it. The MBA program at Incarnate Word College will provide the means for students to deal with today's — and tomorrow's — world, and to find answers to its business and commerce problems in relation to the new technologies."

The 12-course, 36-semester hour MBA program offers elective courses in one of two concentrations — accounting-finance and marketing-management, with allowance for specialization.

An important feature of the program will be its con-

sideration of life experience of students. "We will review job and other experience in relation to undergraduate prerequisites," explains Dr. Szecsy. "I would also emphasize that graduation is assured in two years if two courses are taken each semester."

"We have designed the program with practicality and flexibility in mind, and courses will emphasize real-world case situations, taught by our full-time faculty, all of whom have at least 10 years actual business experience." Prior to joining the Incarnate Word College faculty, Dr. Szecsy was an executive with Chromalloy, the San Antonio metals company, and has worked with other major U.S. companies. He has also taught MBA programs at the University of Dayton.

Barrier

islands

protected

Some unique undeveloped real estate in Texas is protected by the Coastal Barrier Resources Act signed into law October 18. One hundred fifty linear miles of barrier islands along the Texas coast are affected.

The new law does not restrict private landowners from developing their property, but now they do so at their own risk — without federal support. Texas barrier islands are not only habitats for diverse plant and animal life and a shelter for wildlife — rich marshes and estuaries — but they also protect the mainland from the impacts of hurricanes and other storms.

Development of the barrier islands created increasing demands on federal, state and local governments. The new law eliminates any federal assistance with flood insurance after Oct. 1. It also prohibits federal aid for work on bridges, highways and VA or FHA home loans on the island.

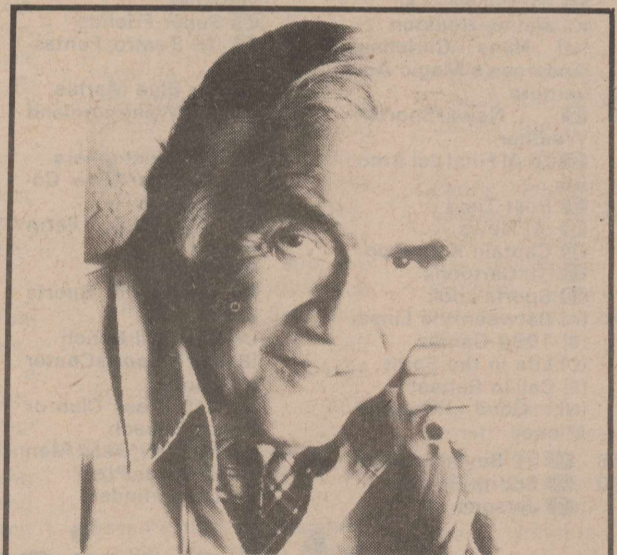

Summer is just around the corner and so are a number of films designed to make you leave your cares and worries behind. What you should bring with you is a pair of earplugs, as these films will bring plenty of smash and crash adventures your way — all in eardrum-assaulting Dolby stereo, of course.

Although originally scheduled for a Christmas release, one of the first of these films is appropriately titled "Blue Thunder." It's everything you always wanted in a summer movie and less.

The thunder comes in the form of an advanced helicopter design capable of flying at great speeds with great precision. On board the mighty metallic mosquito is every manner of sophisticated electronic device used to detect crime in the streets below.

Roy Scheider, having already saved the world twice from a killer shark in summers previous, is the Vietnam Vet/police helicopter pilot chosen to test the new machine. He and his rookie

partner (nicely played by "Diner's" Daniel Stern) take on a group of right-wing extremists.

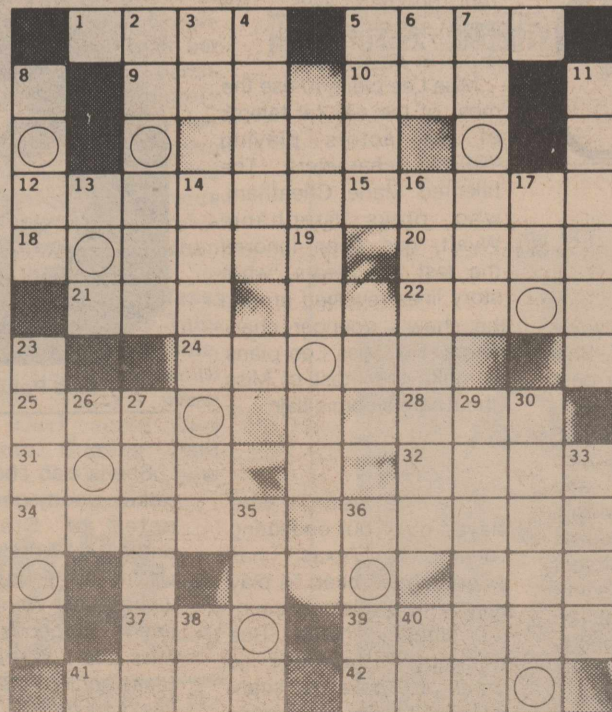
One of the primary things an escapist movie should be is escapist. Like a "Superman" or a "Star Wars" or a "Raiders of the Lost Ark," the film should not take itself too seriously.

"Blue Thunder's" major flaw is that it wraps itself in a half-hearted, self-serving social message. "All the equipment seen in this film is currently available for use by police officers in the United States," states the film's opening credits. But by the time one of the heat-seeking missiles misses Roy Scheider and blows up a barbecued chicken joint instead, the motivations of the filmmakers are clear.

"Blue Thunder" is adventure and thrills and chase sequences and car crashes, all well-paced and photographed, especially the helicopter aerial duel. But skip the message here. In "Blue Thunder" the medium truly is the message.

Retinoids — the term used for both natural and synthetic forms of vitamin A — are currently being studied to determine their usefulness in preventing and treating a wide variety of malignancies such as breast, cervical and bladder cancer, melanoma and other skin cancers and tumors of the head, neck and lung.

Why are diuretics not usually prescribed to reduce edema caused by pregnancy? — F.M.

Current evidence indicates they are less than effective. According to the FDA Bulletin, "Edema during pregnancy is very common and usually needs no treatment — the routine use of diuretics exposes mother and fetus to unnecessary risks."

Does thiopental sodium [truth serum] really work? — L.D.

This drug, like alcohol, weakens a person's reflective judgment and weakens inhibitions. Under its influence, some people may reveal truths they would ordinarily conceal, but strong reliance should not be placed on such revelations.

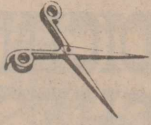

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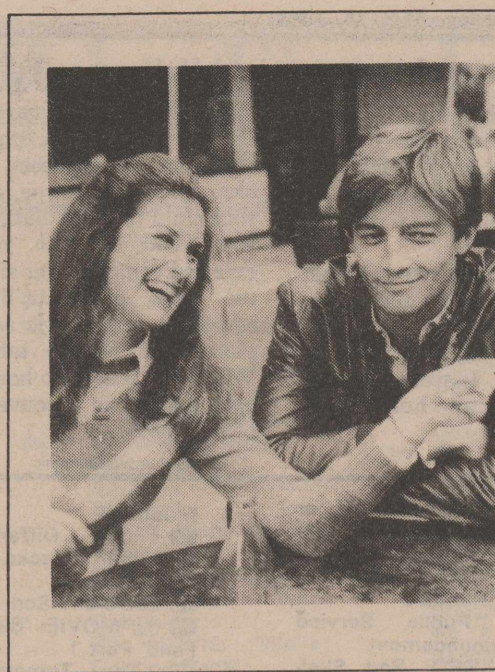

Dear Debbie

DEAR DEBBIE:
After reading your column these past two years, I've decided to write you in the hope you can help me and my family.
I am 30 years of age; my husband is 36. We have been married a little more than seven years and have three children who are 6, 5 and 22 months. I love my husband as I did when I married him, but things aren't the same. I have done a terrible thing and I am very sorry for it. I withdrew money from our joint bank account without my husband's knowledge. He found out and became upset. I am

sorry for it and am willing to pay back this money in time. I don't work and have no income of my own. So when I needed the money, I borrowed it. Since January, I have been receiving calls telling me my husband is cheating on me, doesn't love me and is staying with me because of the children. I have brought this up to him, but he denies it.
He works at a local bar and comes home very late in the morning. The bars close here at 3 a.m. He comes in around 6 or 7 a.m. He drinks very heavily at times. When I ask him where he was, he

gets very angry and hostile. He also has a full-time job which he leaves at 12:30 p.m. He usually comes home around 2:30 p.m. or 3:00 p.m. from that. He will not allow me to ask him where he was, claiming I don't trust him. When he is at home, he sleeps and spends no time with me or the children. He hasn't touched me since January. When I ask him for a kiss or a hug, he says, "if you want."
He claims he's a broken man and is all burned out. He loves me, but doesn't know if he can rekindle his feelings for me. I don't know if our marriage will

continue. I did ask him to leave until he gets himself straightened out. He refuses, saying he has no place to go. He will not see a priest or anyone else. I am a Catholic and believe in the sacrament of marriage. I want and love my husband, but he doesn't seem to want or love me. He says he needs time. What can I do to save our marriage and our life together?
SICK AT HEART DEAR HEARTSICK:
While I agree taking money out of your joint account without your husband knowing of it was wrong, I find it hard to believe this is the root of

your problem. It appears your husband's problems go deeper than that.
Quite honestly, I feel your husband's problem is alcohol. He is exhibiting all the typical signs: withdrawal, unexplained late hours, etc. As for the phone calls, ignore them. They sound like the work of a vicious person. Hang up whenever you hear this person's voice.
Since your husband will not see a priest or a marriage counselor, I suggest you contact your local chapter of Al-Anon. This fine organization helps family members to cope with alcoholism in their spouses, children,

parents, etc. I think you will find the sessions very eye-opening and worthwhile. Please go immediately. It will be very helpful.
As far as saving your marriage is concerned, after attending Al-Anon for a while, I feel you will be in a better position to rationally evaluate your next step. Don't look for an immediate answer. Take this a step at a time.
Please write and let me know how you are doing and remember, you are not alone in this. You will meet others at Al-Anon who are as desperate and confused as you. Good luck.
