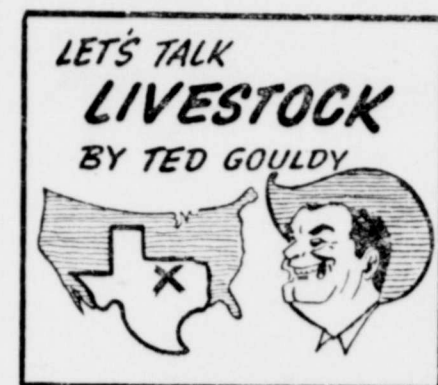
Bailey Bros. Burglarized Thursday Night

NUMBERS OF LIVESTOCK SMALLER LAST MONDAY

Fort Worth-The Monday morning line on salable receipts of livestock around the major market circle this week showed about 21,000 fewer cattle and calves, about 10,000 fewer hogs and 9,000 fewer sheep and lambs.

Since this followed a definite tapering off of receipts in the closing days of last week, it clearly indicated that the farmers had taken a hand in righting the upset caused by near record amounts of meat being marketed this season.

There was an uneven sort of stability in the cattle and calf trade reported at most points. At Fort Worth sales men tried hard to recover some of last week's losses but did little better than get steady prices on most kinds.

Comparative prices showed: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$17.50-21.50; common and medium grades \$10.00-16.50. Fat cows 9.00-9.50; bulls 9.00-12.50, odd head 13.00; good and choice slaughter calves 15.00-16.50 few fancy heavies 17.00-17.50 and above; common and medium 11.00-14.50; culls 8.00-10.00. Stocker steer calves 19.50 down; steer yearlings 18.00 down; replacement cows 8.00-12.00.

INCENTIVE PAYMENTS TO BE VERY IMPORTANT

Current low offers for wool, which reflect the world-wide decline of around 25 to 30 percent in fine wools and 15 to 20 percent on cross bred wools (USDA Wool Situation Oct. 20, 1955), make the certificates the sheepmen needs to present to his local ASC office for payment doubly important.

To save time and trouble the producer should get certification at the time he sells. At a recent meeting in Fort Worth approved forms for use in establishing the claims of the seller to get these incentive payments were worked out and are in use at Fort Worth. Unless the information needed is shown the producer might be unable to qualify for his incentive payment.

HOGS SELL BETTER AS MARKETINGS LIGHTER

Butcher hogs opened 50 cents higher at Fort Worth as receipts here and in the Cornbelt were lighter Monday. The advance was not maintained all the way, some late sales being steady to 25 cents lower, and top hogs sold from \$14.50 to \$15.25, late sales \$14.75 down. Sows were steady at \$13.50 down.

Both of these classes were selling 50 to 75 cents above the low time last week when hogs reached the lowest point since 1942 at the market.

LAMBS UNDER PRESSURE: EWES SELL HIGHER

Fat lambs topped at \$17.50 in the wool and \$17 for shorn lambs at Fort Worth Monday. This represented a 50c lower market than last week's close. Prices were around \$1 to \$1.50 under prices a week or so earlier, despite continued small receipts here and all around the market loop. Old ewes sold better, most ewes at \$5 to \$6, some fresh shorn cull ewes down to \$4. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12. Yearling muttons sold from \$10 to \$15.

The \$250,000 bond issue for water system and sewer system bonds failed here Monday by 13 votes.

The proposition calling for the issuance of \$75,000 water revenue bonds failed by 14 votes, with 98 voting for and 112 against. On the water tax bonds for \$75,000, 100 votes were counted for and 113 against.

On the sewer revenue bonds 99 voted for with 113 against. On the sewer tax bonds for \$50,000 100 voted for to 113 against.

Opponents of the issues pointed to the high rate of interest for the bonds if and when issued, with the bonds going to one house on a contract at "not more than 4 3/4% interest." Advocates for the issues pointed out good water, cheaper fire insurance rates and a chance for the city to grow.

It is presumed that another vote on the water and sewer bonds will come soon, perhaps January.

The City Council of Sterling City called the bond election soon after taking office.

The city council here is composed of John Walraven, mayor, R. T. Caperton, Cecil Long, Horace Donaldson, Fred Hodges and J. I. Cope.

Strawberry Ambrosia

2 cups cold milk; 1 package strawberry instant pudding mix; dash of salt; 2 small bananas, sliced; ½ cup shredded coconut.

Pour milk into mixing bowl. Add pudding mix and salt. Beat slowly with egg beater just until well mixed, about 1 minute. Do not overbeat; mixture will be thin. Layer alternately with banana slices in sherbet glasses. Top with coconut and let stand to set—takes 5 minutes. Chill, if desired. Makes 4 servings.

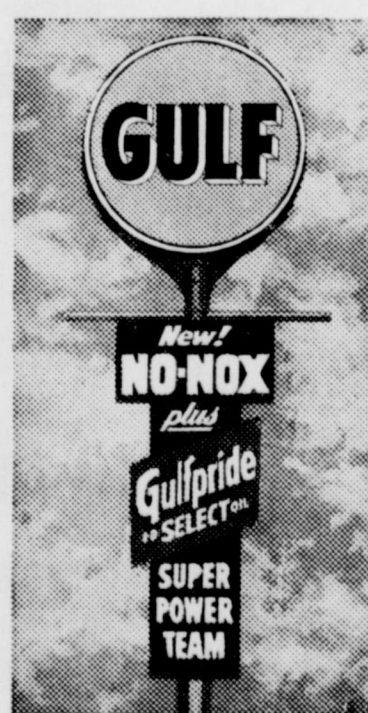

Pack 'Em In Your Knapsack

HIKING time in the bright autumnal weather means cookie toting time, for every happy hiker likes to nibble

... as he wanders o'er hill and dale. Raising Bran Marmalade Cookies make a good packing choice being on the soft and chewy side. And of course they taste real zippy-smooth, too!

Raisin Bran Marmalade Cookies

1½ cups sifted flour; 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder; ¾ teaspoon salt; ½ cup shortening; ½ cup firmly packed brown sugar; 1 egg; ¾ cup orange marmalade; 1 cup raisin bran.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat well; then add marmalade. Add flour and cereal and blend. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 15 minutes, or until done. Makes 3½ dozen cookies.

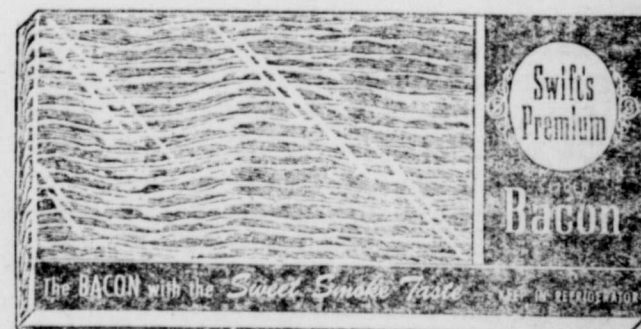

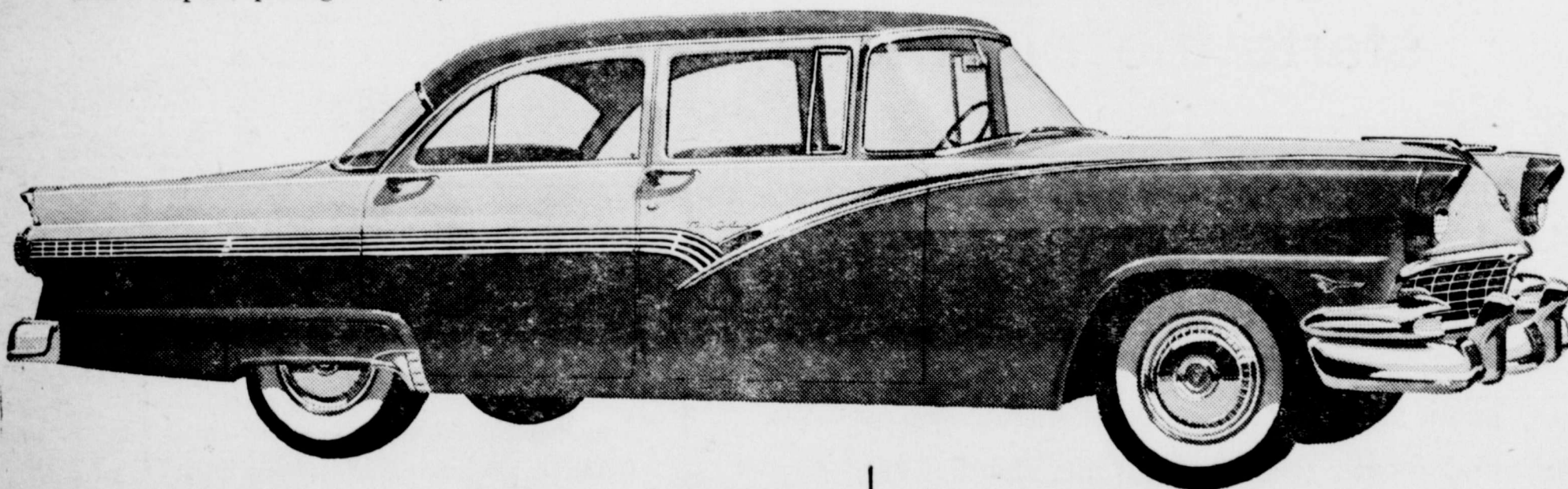
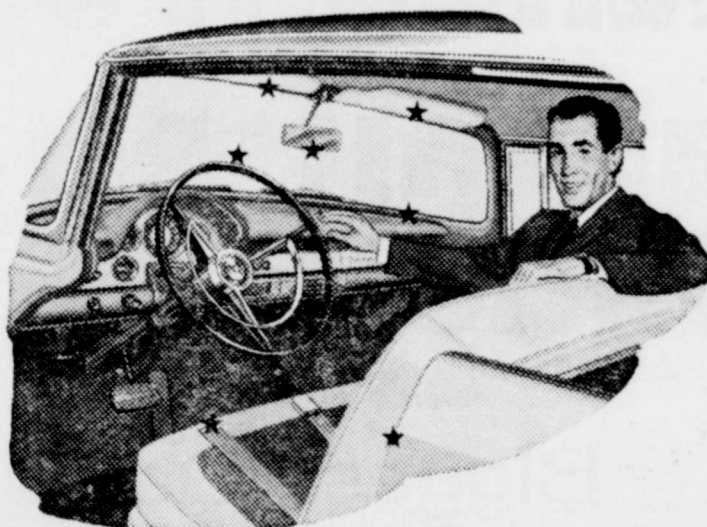

Then add flour mixture and stir enough to dampen flour. Turn into 11x5x3-inch loaf pan, lined on bottom with paper. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) hour, or until done. Wrap in waxed paper and store several hours or overnight before slicing.
