31st annual Fly-In set July 3

The 31st annual Colorado City 4th of July Fly-In will be Saturday July 3 this year due to the fourth falling on Sunday.

And as usual, off the morning's activities will be the fly-in breakfast of bacon and eggs, toast and coffee served in the main building from 7 to 10 a.m. The breakfast will be free to fly-ins, with a charge of \$3 to all others. There is no admission charge to the airport. At 9:00 awards will be presented to the oldest pilot, youngest pilot, oldest airplane, most unusual airplane, and pilot coming the longest distance.

T-shirt and cap fans will again have the opportunity to buy souvenirs with the import "Colorado City July 4th Fly In."

The Air Force C-130 Hercules 4-engine propjet transport will arrive from Dyess AFB shortly after 7 a.m. and will be open for inspection by the public. The crew will give guided tours while the aircraft is on display, and on departure about noon the aircraft will demonstrate short field landing and takeoff, as well as its ability to taxi backwards.

The Confederate Air Force will also be represented by flying in its C46 based in Big Spring and two aircraft from Abilene.

Almost 100 planes fly in to this event in Colorado City each year and close to 500 breakfasts are served.

According to the Texas Aeronautics Commission in Austin, this is the oldest free fly-in breakfast in the state of Texas. This event is held by the Colorado City July 4th Fly In Association and the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce.

A construction crew from Caprock Electric was digging holes to erect the sign for the Chamber of Commerce when the cut took place. Special equipment had to be brought in by Southwestern Bell to repair the line and service was completely restored to Colorado City and Westbrook around 9 p.m. Thursday evening.

59-year-old cyclist touts riding as healthy exercise

If you are feeling a little older than you really are and still looking for that fountain of youth - you might consider following Joe Petroska around for a few months and a few miles.

"It keeps me young," said the 59-year old. "I'm in the third week of a three-month trip that will cover well over a 1,000 miles."

On a bicycle!

Petroska resides nine months of the year in Salton City, California where he works as a sign-painter and house painter. At the present time, he is staying at Scott's Acres - between Colorado City and Loraine - where he is using his painting talents "to earn my keep."

This trip is nothing new for the cyclist as this is his 44th cross-country trip - something he has done since 1950.

Petroska claims title to the "country's oldest cross-country rider."

Covering over 100 miles a day in the heat of the Southwest is not easy he says and it helps to have good equipment.

"I have an '86 Myatta (a professional racing bike)," said Petroska.

The bicycle sells for \$4600.

He carries a complete camp with him for times he is out on the road - tent, sleeping bag, cook stove and other essentials.

He carries about a total of seventy pounds of equipment all the time and keeps a good supply of water with him too. While travelling, his diet consists mainly of pasta, trail mix, fruit, candy bars and peanut butter.

He is a strong advocate of safety while bicycling and strongly recommends everyone wear a biker's helmet and padded, fingerless gloves.

"I try to promote bicycle safety for everyone - especially children," he said. "And I also promote See BICYCLIST, page 2

"Lucky" Merket hired as high school principal

A 1959 graduate of Colorado High School was formally selected as the new high school principal in a called meeting of the CISD trustees Thursday evening.

Russell "Lucky" Merket will be assuming his post as soon as he is released from his contract in Johnson City where he has been for one year. Prior to that, he served 13 years in the Hamlin school system.

He received a two-year contract with the CISD. After the meeting Thursday, Merket said he was excited about the opportunity here and "I am ready to get to work."

"I feel it is very important for the students, parents and entire community to work together for a successful program," said Merket.

He and his wife Penney (Williams), who is also a CHS graduate, will reside on their home place at China Grove.

In other personnel matters, the board accepted the resignation of high school drama teacher, Carl Moore, who has accepted a similar post with the Midland Greenwood school system.

They also accepted the resignation of Middle School coach and teacher Gary McNeil.

The board extended contracts to Monte Richburg who will coach and teach at CMS and Shona Abergg, Special Education instructor at the Middle School.

A budget workshop concluded after midnight with the trustees and administration ironing out details for the coming school year.

One area that has caused some concern with employees of the cafeteria system is the board exploring the possibility of a professional food service company taking over the cafeteria system.

Superintendent Don Nimmo emphasized Friday morning that they are just exploring the possibility in the interest of saving money for the district. "We are charged with getting the best benefit from the tax-payers dollars and this is one area we are looking at," said Nimmo. "Rest assured that anything we, the board and this office, do will have the best interests of the students and employees in mind."

Nimmo and the cafeteria staff met Thursday afternoon to discuss any changes if they do go to a private firm. He told them their jobs would still be intact with no cut in salaries.

The trustees are also looking into the privatization of the custodial d es also.

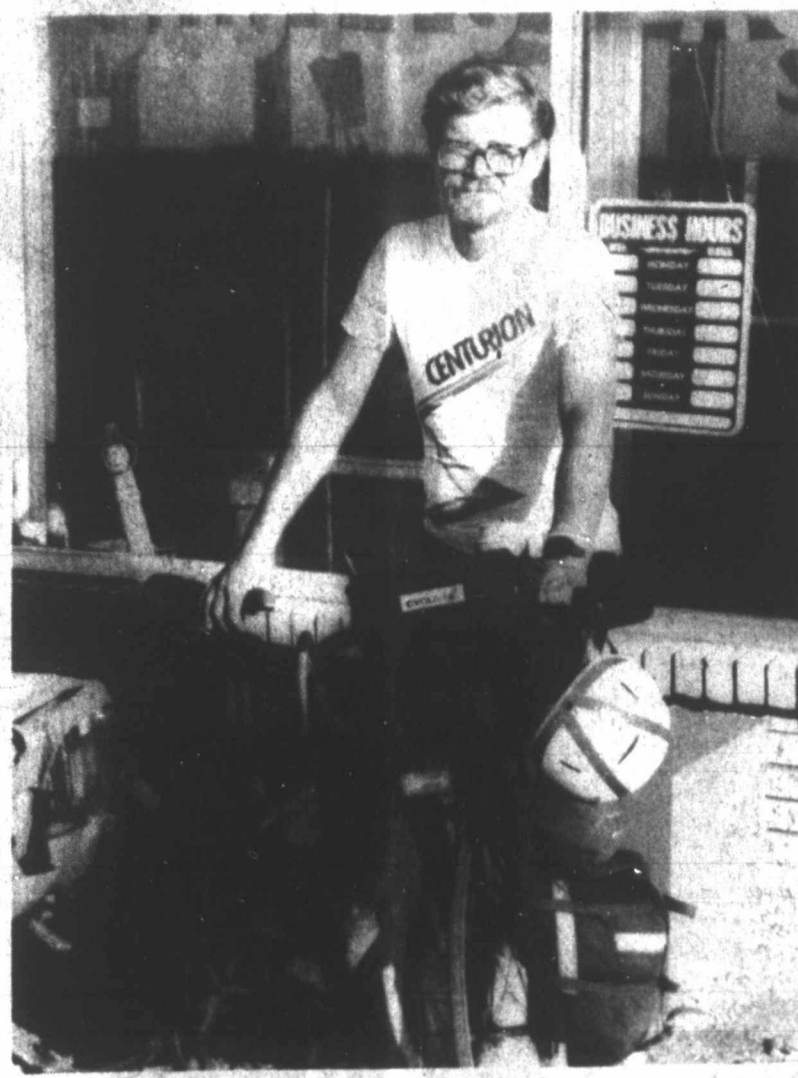

 It apparently works as he does not look the sixty-years old he will be in September.
 "Start your conditioning slowly...get a decent bike...then ride a mile or two a day," said the experienced biker. "Then increase your limits as you can."
 Petroska is a former competitor in bicycle racing and the last one he competed in was in 1986 which he won.
 It was the "California Pro-Cyclist Trek" that covered over 3400 miles from Southern California to New York.
 "It lasted for 37 1/2 days and I crossed the finish line just 60-seconds ahead of the pack," he said with pride.
 "I want to see the country and meet the people - bicycling is the way to go. You're not using up the national resources and polluting the environment as you travel."

Watlington honored on 90th birthday



Arma Sonora Brasuell Watlington

A 90th birthday party was hosted for Arma Sonora Brasuell Watlington by her sons and daughters-in-law, Raymond and Joan Watlington, and Bob and Marida Watlington, on Saturday, June 19th, in the 22nd and Austin Street Church of Christ, from 2 to 5 p.m.

Guests attending were from Colorado City, Midland, Odessa, Loraine, Garland, Benbrook, Houston, Robert Lee, Ira, Snyder, Abilene, Roscoe, Graham, Grand Prairie, Westbrook, Lubbock, and Hilton Head, South Carolina.

On June 19, 1903, Arma Sonora Brasuell Watlington was born in Coyote Park, Archuleta County, Colorado, in a logging camp near Pagosa Springs. Her father, George Ira Brasuell, and her mother, Lou Ettie Walker Brasuell, had moved

there for Ira to work with a lumber company. The community had a logo of "where the wild roses bloom and coyotes howl."

In 1913, Ettie and the children moved back to live with her folks in Eastland County, so they could have better schooling and be able to attend church regularly. Ira stayed on in the logging camp about another year. Young Arma missed the mountains and yearned to go back to Colorado. However, it was 58 years before she ever got to go back and see her childhood surroundings.

Arma was the firstborn child. Other children born later to Ira and Ettie were Beaul, Gerald, Othelda, William "I. B." who died at age 2 1/2, Morris Ray, Mada, Maxine, and Nettie Jo. Three sisters surviving are Thelda Rienstra of Houston,

Maxine Shelley of Houston, and Jo Buchanan of Graham, Texas.

In October 1921, the Brasuells moved to Loraine. Ettie and the girls came in a new Maxwell touring car owned by her father. Ira and the boys came by wagons, driving their horses, etc. Their journey took 3 days.

After living in Loraine a few months, Armamet Onnie Watlington after church services at the old White Church of Christ. They dated several months and were married on December 20, 1922. They drove to the preacher's house, and he came out to the car and conducted the ceremony.

Onnie and Arma lived and farmed in Mitchell County all their married life, except for a brief time when they lived in Andrews, Midland, and Lamesa during 1923 to 1925.

Three sons were born to Arma and Onnie, Raymond Lane, born November 20, 1926; Weldon Watson, born May 7, 1929; and Robert Harold, born January 22, 1932. There was an epidemic of whooping cough and measles in early 1933 and all three sons were critically ill. On March 6, 1933, Weldon died. It was a time of great sadness for the couple.

Throughout the years, Arma cared for her parents, her in-laws and other family members and neighbors who were ill. She had an inner strength and faith that benefitted them in their final hours.

Charles Ray Watlington, her first grandchild, was born to Raymond and Joan in 1946, followed by their second son, Larry Don in 1953. Bob and Marida's children that followed were David, born in 1957, and Lori, born in 1961. Lori was the first girl in this family in the 39 years since Arma and Onnie married.

In the following years, all the great grandchildren have been boys, so the record holds... only one girl offspring since 1922.

In the summer of 1966, Onnie was stricken with cancer and died on December 13th of that year. Since that time, Arma has lived on their home place in the Buford Community on North Highway 208.

Up until the last few years, Arma kept busy with sewing, handwork, church activities and reading. After a broken hip in 1988, she has been somewhat limited. However, she still lives alone and cares for her own self. She is admired and respected by all who know her. She has an amazing ability to "take life as it comes" and "adjust without complaining." All the while, she counts her blessings instead of her adversities. And, she still attends worship services with her beloved Church of Christ family every service except when she is ill.

Proverbs 31:10 "A worthy woman who can find, for her price is far above rubies" could have been written for Arma Sonora Brasuell Watlington!

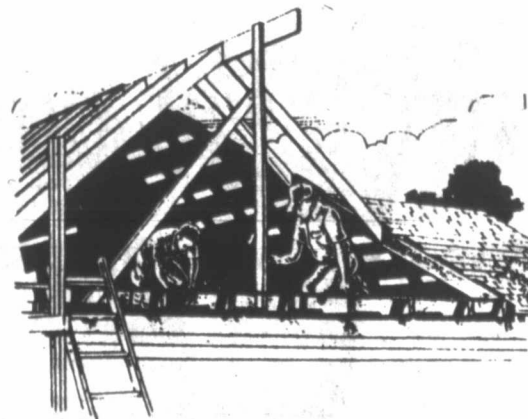

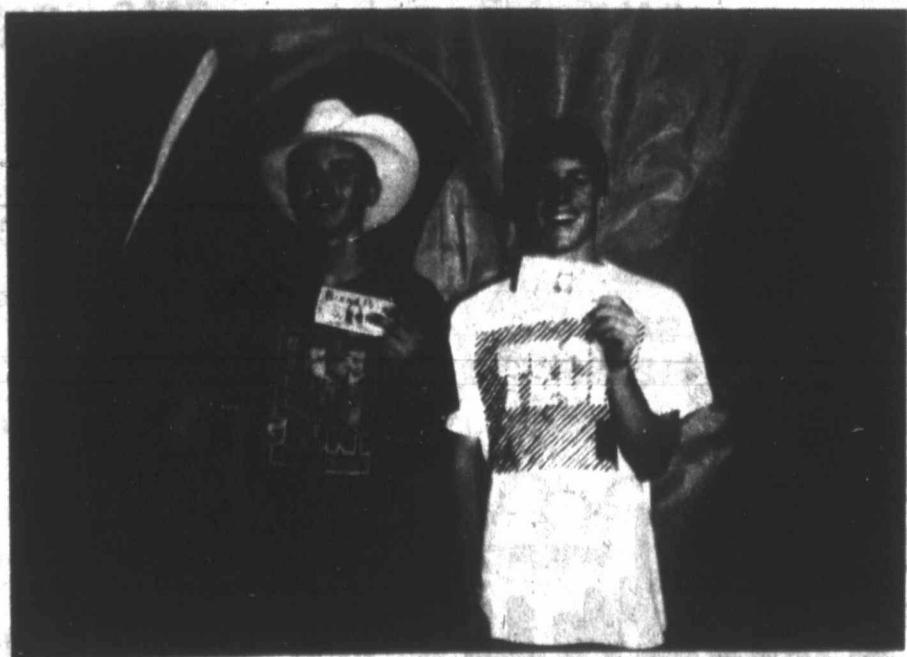

July 4th means grill time

The Fourth of July is definitely the most popular time to fly the red-white and blue, to set off fire works, to spend time with family and friends, and to start up the backyard grill.

"Today, beef is lower in fat, lower in calories and lower in cholesterol than ever before," Perry said. "With the cattle industry producing leaner beef and the meat processor trimming more external fat from individual cuts, beef has a new streamlined image that shows beef lovers that they can still enjoy their favorite meal without feeling guilty."

As the largest meat animal, beef cattle can provide a variety of cuts. The tenderness of a beef cut determines the method of cooking

to insure eating satisfaction. Tender cuts, such as the tenderloin and the sirloin, are best when cooked by dry heat methods, such as barbecuing or grilling.

Texans tend to favor ribs and brisket for their Fourth of July cook-outs. When grilling these cuts it's best to brush the meat with melted butter, a sauce or a marinade before cooking.

If your taste leans more toward hamburgers, the Texas Beef Industry Council offers a few tips for proper handling of ground beef. Place in cooler or freezer immediately upon delivery and chill at 40 degrees F. Keep raw ground beef away from ready-to-eat foods. Cooking kills harmful bacteria, so cook patties well done; the center of patties should not be pink and the juices should run clear. Ground beef patties are safe when they reach 155 degrees F in the center.

"Serving beef on the Fourth - especially Texas beef - is a fail-safe way to make sure that your celebration is a star-spangled one," Perry said.

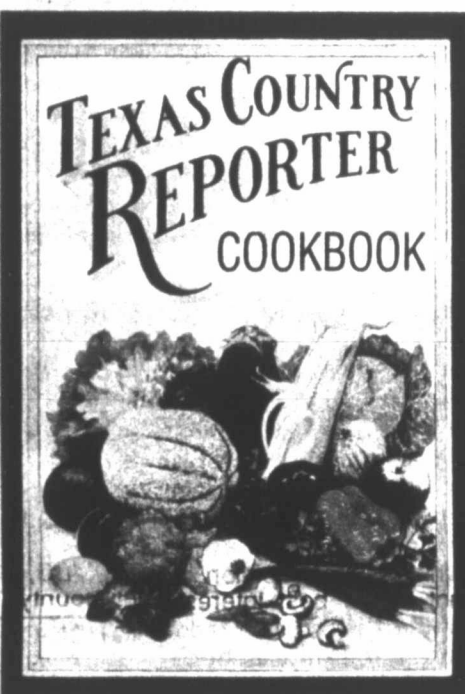


