Look To The East

It is ironic that:

For a greater part of June, particularly from June 1 to mid-month, persons of this area were casting wary eyes to every promise, or threat, of moisture.

These were people who were engaged in, or interested in, agriculture from several "battlefronts". We were approaching the uniform planting date for cotton, the harvest time for wheat, potatoes, onions and cabbage, etc.

Early in the month, it seemed that the weather was setting the same pattern as last year, when destructive hail, flooding rain, devastating winds, and stuff, had wiped croplands clean after they had been planted. It was a bad time for farmers and every farm-related activity.

People of the Knox Prairie didn't want a return of that kind of activity. Every threat of moisture from above was looked upon with apprehension.

Luckily, and with thanks, the weather co-operated in a fairly good way during this period. We could deal with light rains, spotted rains, and rain threats, just so the "big deal" of last year wasn't repeated.

It wasn't - and most people were able to get their farming, planting and harvesting operations completed without any great disaster. For this they are thankful.

Yet, within a short distance of our locality, less than 200 miles in some instances, farmers (and ranchers particularly) were casting anxious eyes "toward the heavens" for another reason. They were (and still are) in the throes of one most devastating droughts in a number of years. Water holes were drying up, grass had wilted away, and cattle were dying of thirst and lack of food.

The drought hasn't lasted as long as what the area ranchers referred to as the "Big Drought" of 1940-56, worsened economic conditions are taking a high toll of ranches and farms in three years what the other drought took in seven. Farmers and ranchers in a 27-county area the size of Pennsylvania are in serious trouble.

Ranchers are selling off their herds and farmers are putting seeds in dry dirt. They say there are from 80,000 to 130,000 acres that there is no hope for.

As each scorching day passes, the hopes fade like the sun-bleached bones of animals that have succumbed to the drought. "There is no food, that's all," one rancher said with a shrug. "No rain produces no grass."

Ranchers have again resorted to the "pear burner" to help provide some food for cattle.

We were introduced to the pear burner back in the 1930s, when we lived in Eldorado country. This is a flame thrower fueled with kerosene that shoots a hot blaze for several feet. Ranchers fire this thing up and walk around large areas infested with prickly pear, burning off the thorns and thistles so the pear itself is made edible for cattle.

This is a delicacy, though a short-lived one, for cattle that are starving for food.

People are fearing a return of the terrible dust bowl of the 30s. Grass has dried up, and animals have grazed it so close that it is no longer protection for the soil. The slightest breeze produces a movement of dust that can be multiplied as the winds increase.

It was thought that, perhaps, the old saying that "it always rains sometime during July 4th" would bring relief - but it didn't to this area.

There was some semblance of relief at San Angelo, when flood waters of Sulphur Draw swept one man off his bike and into the flood. A "human chain" of two women and a teenager was formed to rescue the victim, who was about to go under for the last time. This was an isolated thunderstorm that brought only a limited amount of relief.

City Awards Bid For Airport Seal Coat

Several persons were in attendance at the bid opening for the Munday street seal coat and Texas Aeronautics Commission airport seal coat projects for 1983.

Mayor James W. Reid presided and Walter M. Hertel, City Secretary, was present. Attending from Texas Aeronautics Commission were John Wepryk, Jay Lyons, Michael McCullough, Julie Shepherd and Gillian Wahba. Also in attendance were L. O. Jackson, Sr., City Street Inspector; Alva M. Jackson of West Texas Construction Company and Jack Knieff of Zack Burkett Construction Co.

Mayor Reid opened bids and tabulated results were as follows:

1. Bontke Bros. Construction Company - TAC: \$27,252.79; CITY: Separate, \$17,903.40; if together, \$11,356.00.
2. Zack Burkett Construction Company - TAC: \$20,691.54; CITY: \$8,951.20.
3. Coltharp Construction Company - TAC: \$26,098.98; CITY: \$10,420.80.
4. West Texas Construction Company - TAC: \$19,346.93; CITY: \$8,550.40.
5. J. H. Strain & Sons Construction Company - TAC: \$52,220.50; CITY: \$12,024.50.
6. Timmons Anderson Construction Company - No bid.

Apparent low bidder on both projects is West Texas Construction Company. Mayor Reid stated that bids will be examined for proper bond, tabulated, and the bid will be awarded as soon as approved by the City Council and T.A.C., probably in the next four to five days. T.A.C. officials present agreed to the aforementioned procedure. Adjourned.

The City Council of the City of Munday met at 8 p.m. Tuesday, July 12, at the Munday City Hall in regular session.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen Jessie Tucker, Bob Therwhanger and Von Marr.

Members absent: Bobby D. Burnett and Doris Dickerson.

Mayor Reid called the meeting to order. Minutes of the June 7, 1983 regular meeting and the June 14, 1983 special

meeting were read. No alterations. Mayor Reid stated minutes were approved as written.

Leon Ivey and Steve Morath of Lone Star Gas Company met with the Council. Mr. Morath presented the Company request for a 6.52% rate increase to the City Council. The 120 day suspension by the Munday City Council is now expired and action by the City in some form is necessary, he said. Mr. Morath explained the Company need for each town to give a reasonable return. After a lengthy presentation, some alternates offered, etc., Mr. Morath and Mr. Ivey left the meeting. Therwhanger moved the City accept Alternate A proposal to yield approximately 85% of the gas company request. Marr seconded the motion. Members voting for were Therwhanger, Marr and Tucker. Noes, none. Carried.

Next presented to the Council was an annexation ordinance. This ordinance is to annex property as set out below and for which an annexation petition dated April 18, 1983 has been read and approved at the May 10th and June 7, 1983 regular meetings, with no one appearing in opposition. Property to be annexed is described as follows and is owned and petitioned by David Michael Lane and Deborah Ann Lane:

Beginning at the SE corner of a 10 acre tract out of said Section heretofore sold by T. A. Layne, et ux, to W. A. Baker by deed dated December 28, 1905, of record in Book 5, Page 636, Deed Records of Knox County, Texas; thence South 261 feet to a stake for corner; thence West 177 feet to stake for corner; thence North 261 feet; thence East 177 feet to the place of beginning, tract to be annexed being only the North 110 feet (110 Ft x 177 Ft.) of said approximately 1 acre tract.

Von Marr moved the ordinance be passed annexing the above described property to the City of Munday, Texas. Jessie Tucker seconded the motion. Voting for were Marr, Tucker and Therwhanger. Noes, none. Carried. (Full text of ordinance to be filed in City's Annexation Files and recorded at County

Bank Statement Shows Deposits On Increase

It might be a little early for agricultural operations in this area to show its full impact on the local economy, but deposits in the First National Bank of Munday have shown a decided increase for the second quarter of 1983.

A condensed statement of condition of the bank as of June 30, 1983, was released to The Courier this week. The bank's statement of condition is issued quarterly in response to a call made by

the Comptroller of the Currency in Washington, D. C.

The most recent statement showed an increase in deposits of \$325,714 over the first quarter of 1983. Deposits were shown at \$24,212,489.44 at the close of business on June 30, as compared with \$23,886,775.46 for the first quarter of the year.

The bank maintains a capital stock of \$200,000 and a surplus of \$300,000.

Haskell County Man Is Killed In Accident

A 71-year-old Haskell County man was killed about 8:30 a.m. Sunday when his pickup truck was struck in the rear by an 18-wheeler on U.S. Highway 277 about 1.5 miles south of Weinert, according to authorities.

Ted Kreger was pronounced dead at the scene by Geraldine Hise, justice of the peace at Haskell, it was reported by James Davis, Department of Public Safety trooper.

Monty Lynn Britt of Iowa Park, driver of the truck, was uninjured, Davis reported.

Both men were traveling north when the accident occurred. Kreger's pickup was propelled 364 feet forward and probably turned over twice, according to

Davis.

Funeral services for the accident victim were held at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday from the Church of Christ in Weinert with John Greeson, minister of the Church of Christ in Rule, and Rev. Roy Herricks of Weinert officiating. Burial was in Pleasant Valley Cemetery under direction of Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

Mr. Kreger was born on December 24, 1911, in Haskell County, and had lived in the area all of his life, having been engaged in farming.

Surviving him are two brothers, M. H. Kreger of Haskell and Tom Kreger of Weinert; a sister, Lillie of Haskell; and several nieces and nephews.

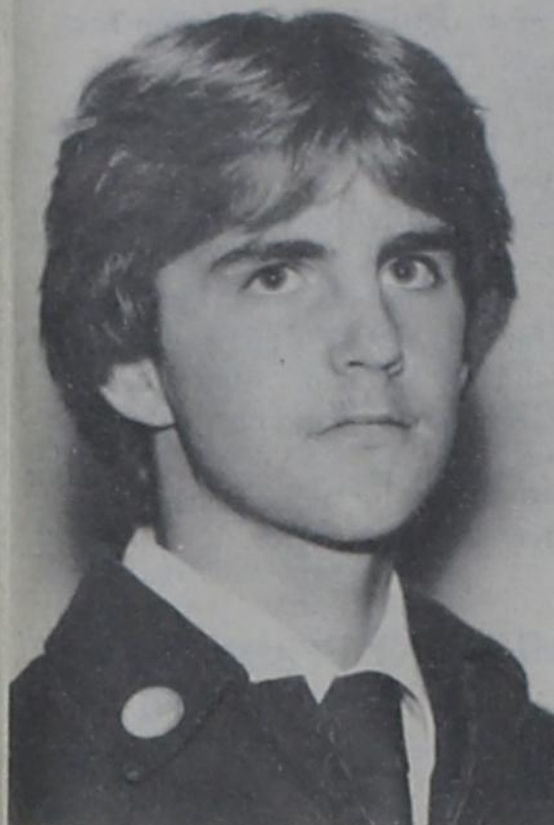
Board Hires New Teachers, Accepts Resignation

Munday FFA Member Wins \$8,000 Scholarship

James Claud Tidwell, an outstanding Munday FFA member, recently received a four-year, \$8,000 college scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

James, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe D. Tidwell of Munday, is a recent graduate of Munday High School, where he ranked in the top five of his graduating class. An outstanding FFA member, James has been elected to office both in his chapter and in his district. He also participated on land judging and parliamentary procedures teams. He has received the agricultural mechanics award, his Greenhand and Chapter Farmer degrees and has been a delegate to the state FFA convention. Currently, he holds the Lone Star Farmer Degree and is a recipient of the DeKalb Award.

While in high school, James was a class officer, a member of the National Honor Society, a member of the school newspaper staff and participated in University Interscholastic League debate competition. He is a member of the Society of Distinguished American High School Students, the Society of Distinguished American Science Students, the Society of Distinguished Agriculture Students and is listed in "Who's Who Among American High School Students."

James, who plans to major in agricultural economics at Texas Tech University, was one of 50 recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships presented at the Texas State FFA Convention.

The show, which also presented 50 four-year, \$8,000 scholarships to 4-H members during the State 4-H Round-Up in June, is the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the United States. During the coming school year, the show will have 499 students on scholarships in Texas colleges and universities, at a commitment of more than \$2.2 million.

The winners, carefully selected from hundreds of applicants, are the best in the state from the standpoints of academics and leadership. They must major in some form of agriculture at a Texas college or university in order to receive the scholarship.

The monies used to fund the scholarship program come directly from the proceeds generated by spectators at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, a civic, charitable organization whose efforts, actions and revenues are used

Sales Tax Rebate Checks Released To Area Cities

Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$35.1 million to 974 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one percent behind last year," Bullock said in sending the July checks to the cities. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher tax receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind."

Munday received \$2,280.53 for this payment period, as compared to \$2,439.38 last year. Our total rebate for this year has been \$25,452.47, which is 0.53% higher than in 1982.

Munday Residents Asked To Donate To Blood Supply

Red River Regional Red Cross Blood Services has scheduled a Bloodmobile visit here for Monday, August 8, at the Munday Community Center. Hours will be from 2:45 p.m. until 6:30 p.m.

The requirements for a safe and plentiful blood supply continue regardless of holidays or vacations. The Red River Red Cross, which supplies processed blood products for area hospitals, works closely with area volunteers to assure that daily needs are met.

"One-hundred percent participation at all scheduled Bloodmobiles will provide the blood which is so vitally needed by hospital patients," stated Latreace Lane and Margaret Moore, area Red Cross Blood Services chairmen.

Last summer, there were nationwide blood shortages which were heavily attributed to economical stresses and industrial layoffs. In the Red River Region, positive attitudes toward a plentiful blood supply were the key to meeting the

demands of our area.

Collection goals for the upcoming fiscal year will be set for 24,500 units of blood. This figure is a large increase over the present goal and indicates projected changes in blood usage by regional hospitals. It is expected that the needed increase in productive units will be met willingly.

Residents of Munday, Goree and Rhineland can do their part by donating at the upcoming Bloodmobile.

Bill Williams, Fire Chief of Munday Fire Department, met with the Council. He requested funds for two men to go to fire school in College Station for one week. After discussion, Therwanger moved two firemen be funded to go with \$350 to be paid to each fireman with an additional \$100 to be paid to the one providing transportation. Marr seconded. All in favor.

Frank Jackson of West Texas Utilities Company met with the Council to discuss the application of West Texas Utilities Company for an approximate 11.4% rate increase. Primary reason, according to a Company letter, for this increase is the construction program being incorporated by West Texas Utilities Company. Mr. Jackson answered questions and offered any information he could give. After discussion, Therwanger moved the City of Munday suspend the request for 120 days; also that Munday join Abilene and other cities in employing Touche and Ross to represent us at the P.U.C. hearing on this request. Tucker seconded. Voting for were Therwanger, Tucker and Marr. Noes, none. Carried.

Knox County Appraisal District has requested the City position in regard to the Supreme Court ruling on bank capitol stock. Tucker moved that bank capitol stock be removed from the tax rolls if federal securities held reduce this tax to zero or less or unless a new method is used to compute the tax due. Therwanger seconded. All in favor. The Appraisal District submitted a report showing 93.487% of 1982 tax levy collected.

After discussion Marr moved that volunteers be paid \$2.00 per hour for ambulance calls while Bobby Hutchinson was ill. Tucker seconded. All in favor.

Keep Grass Clippings For Compost

Instead of throwing away grass clippings when you mow your lawn, put them to use in a compost pile, suggests a landscape horticulturist.

Dr. William C. Welch, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material.

Make the compost pile 4 to 6 feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available.

The simplest composting method is to alternate 4 to 6 inch layers of plant matter, such as leaves or grass, with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil, says Welch. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface should form a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer, advises the horticulturist.

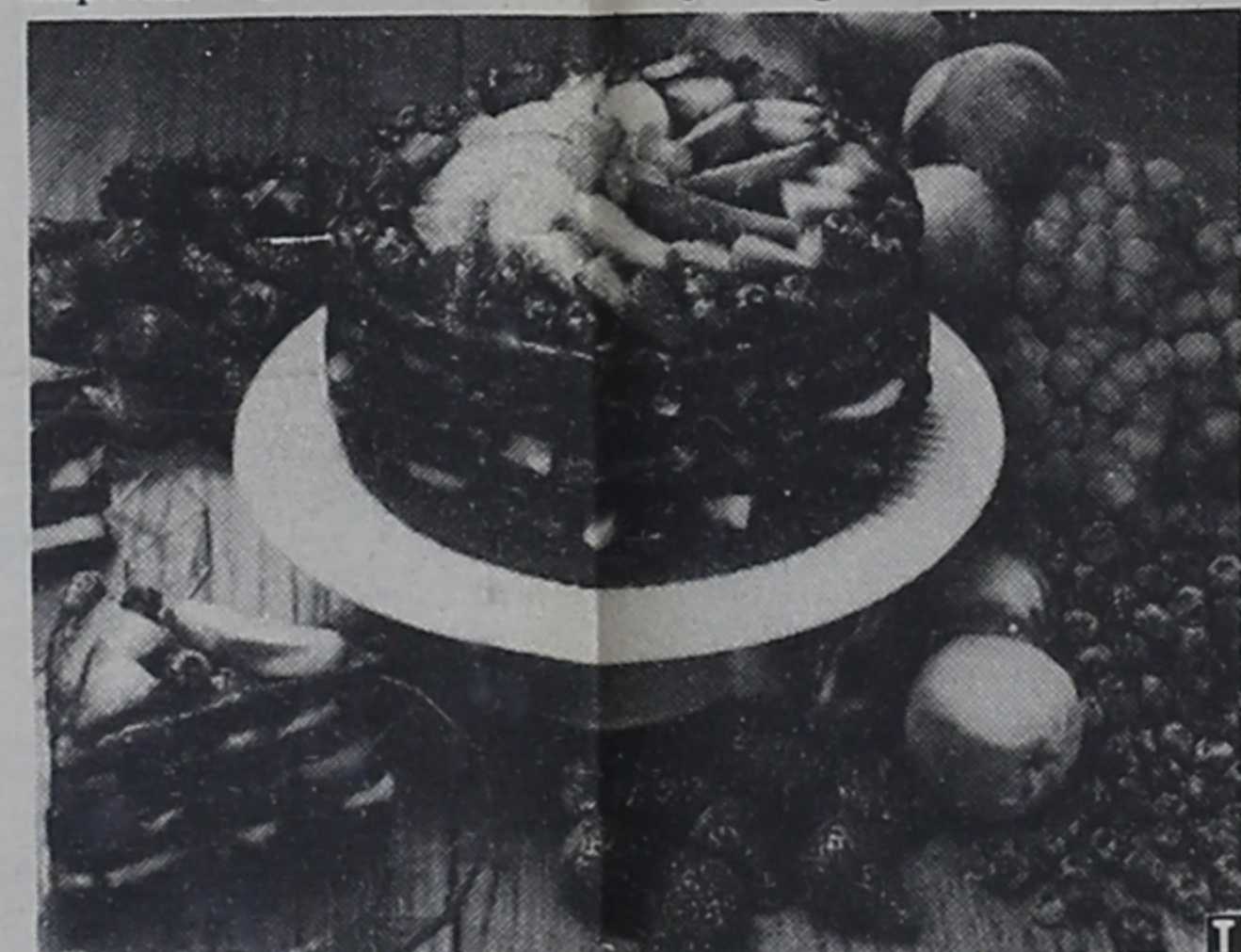

1-1/4 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 eggs
1-1/3 cups unsifted all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
2/3 cup milk
Citrus Filling (recipe below)
Sweetened fresh fruit:
1-1/4 cups each: strawberries, sliced peaches, blueberries or cherries
1/2 cup green grapes

Combine cocoa and 1/2 cup sugar in a saucepan; add water and shortening. Cook and stir constantly over low heat until shortening is melted and sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat; cool. Cream butter or margarine with 1-1/4 cups sugar and vanilla in large mixer bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. Blend in chocolate mixture. Combine flour, baking soda and salt; add alternately with milk to creamed mixture. Pour into two greased and floured 9-inch cake pans. Bake at 350° for 35 to 40 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pans. Cool completely. With serrated knife, carefully slice each cake layer in half horizontally to make four thin layers. Place 1 layer on serving plate; spoon about 1/3 cup citrus filling onto layer. Top with 1 cup sliced sweetened fruit. Reserve remaining for top layer. Top with second layer; repeat with filling and fruit until all layers are stacked. Arrange remaining 3/4 cup of fruit in decorative design on top layer. Top with any remaining glaze. Garnish with grapes.

Citrus Filling

1 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1 cup orange juice
1/4 cup lemon juice

1/4 cup water
1 tablespoon butter
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Combine first 5 ingredients and water in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture boils. Boil and stir 1 minute. Remove from heat; stir in remaining ingredients. Chill. About 2/3 cup filling.

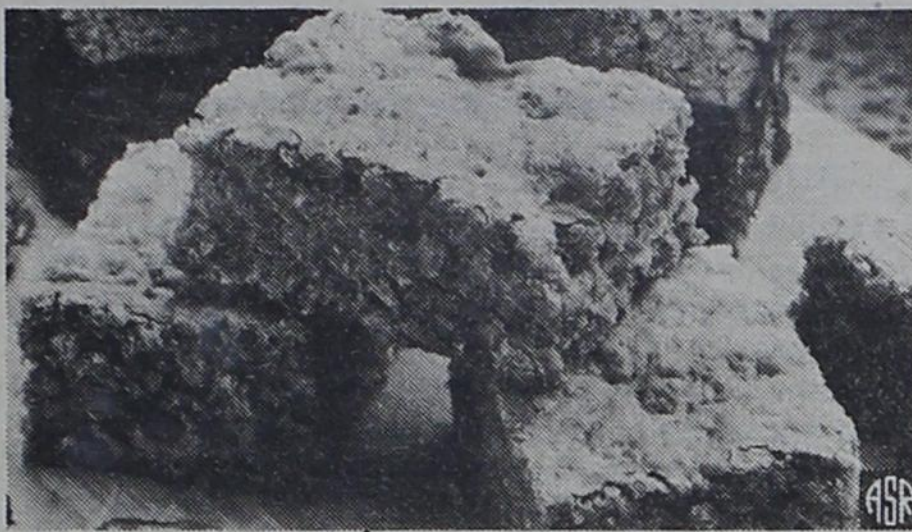

Microwaves Don't Always Save Energy

Microwave ovens have the advantage of speed, but are not always the most effective means of saving energy, says home economist Bonnie Piernot.

Microwave ovens are about 40 percent efficient in converting electrical energy into heat in food, while wasting little of that energy in heating the air around the food. Standard electric ovens are 14 percent efficient and gas ovens are 7 percent efficient in this same task.

"Since the microwave absorption of foods depend on their water and salt content, microwave cooking is not equally energy saving for all foods," states Piernot, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

According to the specialist, research shows the greatest energy savings when cooking small to medium quantities of concentrated foods such as meats, potatoes, desserts and TV dinners.

Foods such as corn, broccoli and similar vegetables require more energy to cook with microwave than with conventional electric surface units.

"For any normal saucepan operation, the cooktop of an electric range is as energy efficient, or more so, than the microwave oven," she adds.

Since the biggest advantage the microwave holds over the conventional cooking is time, the choice of which appliance to use may be largely a matter of whether energy or time is more valuable to the consumer, Piernot says.

Use Safe Playground Equipment

Backyard slides and swings can help children fill long, boring summer days with fun. They can also cause needless injuries.

"Last year thousands of children, mostly under 10 years of age, were injured on or around outdoor play equipment," cautions Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist. "Many of these accidents could have been prevented."

According to Shirer, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the first step in safety is to properly install the equipment.

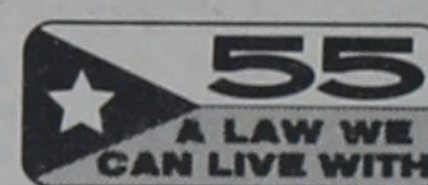
Swing sets should be installed a minimum of six feet away from fences, walls, walkways and other play areas such as sandboxes. The equipment should not be placed over hard surfaces such as concrete, brick, blacktop or cinders. Grass or sand is best.

For stability, the legs of the equipment can be set in concrete, but all types of anchoring should be placed below ground level to avoid a tripping hazard.

"Parents should also remember to check on the equipment at least every two weeks," says Shirer. A maintenance check should include:

- tightening any loose nuts, bolts and clamps.
- inspecting hangers, hooks, frames, connections, suspensions and equipment supports for wear and strength.
- applying tape over protruding bolts and screws.
- regularly oiling metal parts and repainting them as necessary.
- checking wooden equipment for splinters.
- refilling landing pits if needed.

Most important, Shirer says repairs should be made immediately. Broken, rusted or worn equipment should not be used until it is repaired.

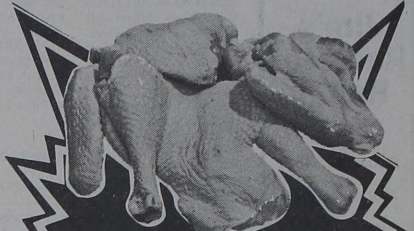
