Santa Arrives Friday

Entering City Via Fire Truck

Santa Claus is scheduled to make his first visit to Floydada tomorrow (December 3). The jolly old fellow will arrive in the city via fire truck (the City's new white one) at 1 p.m., and he'll visit with children on the court house square until 3 o'clock. Santa has promised to have plenty of free candy to pass out to his young friends.

He'll be back Saturday afternoon, from 2 until 4 p.m., and again the next two Saturdays (December 11 and 18) at the same time.

Many local merchants are featuring Christmas items and reduced holiday prices in a special "Christmas Opening" section in this week's Hesperian.

Lighted Christmas scrolls were put up earlier this week by employees of the City of Floydada and Lighthouse Electric. Southwestern Public Service employees added lights to the scrolls, which were rebuilt from last year's across-the-street type decorations, with the help of Floydada High School Agriculture students. Russell's Equipment and Supply furnished some of the materials for the rebuilding. The Floydada Chamber of Commerce co-ordinated the effort and helped to finance the project.

Christmas Seal Appeal Underway

Christmas Seal mail appeals for contributions to the West Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association are computerized for the first time this year, and all contributions will be returned to the state office in Austin. Each county will be credited with the amount contributed, however, according to Mrs. Jack Jordan of Floydada and George Sparkman of Lockney, Floyd County board members.

Benefits from Floyd County contributions remain in the area, Mrs. Jordan said. An example of the services financed by Christmas Seals contributions is the Floydada Chest Clinic, held quarterly at Caprock Hospital. The next clinic is scheduled for January.

Cotton Harvest Stalled By Wet Weather

The South Plains cotton harvest was interrupted by damp, foggy weather the past week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock.

The harvest was resumed on Friday and sample receipts at the four offices are expected to increase daily as the harvest gains momentum.

The four U.S.D.A. Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland classed only 24,700 samples during the week ending Friday, November 26. A large part of the current crop is two to three weeks later than normal due to unfavorable weather conditions during the spring and summer months.

Low Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 32 per cent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted made up 31 per cent, Strict Low Middling 10 per cent and Low Middling 16 per cent. Staples were predominantly 30 to 33. Nineteen per cent had a staple length of 30, 31 per cent stapled 31, 25 per cent was 32 and 12 per cent was 33.

Thirteen per cent of the cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 11 per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 36 per cent 3.0 through 3.2, 29 per cent was 2.7 through 2.9 and 11 per cent was 2.6 and below.

ly stroke the needles. If they fall off the tree it is not fresh. Another test for freshness is to take the tree and lift the base about a foot off the ground. Firmly hit the butt of the tree against the ground, if too many needles shed, the tree probably isn't fresh. Christmas trees respond quickly to moisture given them if the tree is properly prepared before it is put in the water holding stand. Saw off at least an inch of the butt of the trunk at a slight angle before placing the tree in its stand. The cut is said to remove possible clotted resins that could prevent the tree from absorbing the water. Keep the stand filled with water by adding daily. A tree may absorb a pint to a gallon of water each day depending on its size and condition. The moisture helps to maintain the natural Christmas tree aroma throughout the entire holiday season and helps to keep the tree needles moist and pliable. Its usefulness isn't over at the end of the season. The boughs may be chopped off and used as mulch around flower beds or if you have a fireplace there isn't a better aroma than the burning of pine wood.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

I've been intending to make a letter write-up in the Hesperian for a month about a trip and visit to Farmington, N.M., with our daughter Verna and family, but have been busy and just put it off. We had a wonderful time and a 3 weeks stay with them.

Our son Albert and wife from Los Angeles, Calif., and her mother met us there.

Albert had a mind to run around and that suited me exactly. We went to see the Indian Ruins at Mesa Verde. It is in the top of a 9,000 foot mountain. They have a museum there telling and showing all about how the Indians lived and did. It's so wonderful, will take a half day or more to go through it and read about and see how they lived and did. There is a canyon 100 feet deep close by where the Indians lived. They built living rooms 16 stories high under the rock cliff where they buried their dead down by living quarters.

They lived and stored their crops that they raised on the level land on top of the mountains. They stored it to keep other tribes from stealing what they raised. We went down in this Canyon 7 years ago when we were there, but this time we went about 2 miles to another 100 ft. deep canyon with living quarters similar to this one by the museum. It had steps down and up for 100 ft. I almost gave out climbing the steps. A guide was with us and made talks along about what happened in the days gone and asked for questions. They were so nice to us. The queen of the Navajos rode a horse in the parade, a beautiful woman. We sure did have a great trip and visit, and we visited with Mr. and Mrs. Walter Night and Mrs. Guffie who used to be our neighbor in the Campbell Community, also her daughter.

A New York firm built a \$100,000 candy factory 7 or 8 miles west of Farmington and Mrs. Guffies' daughter is manager of it. We went over and she showed us through it and gave us some candy just made.

Also we got some about 5 bushels of fine apples, 75c for culls and \$2.00 per bushel for the best ones.

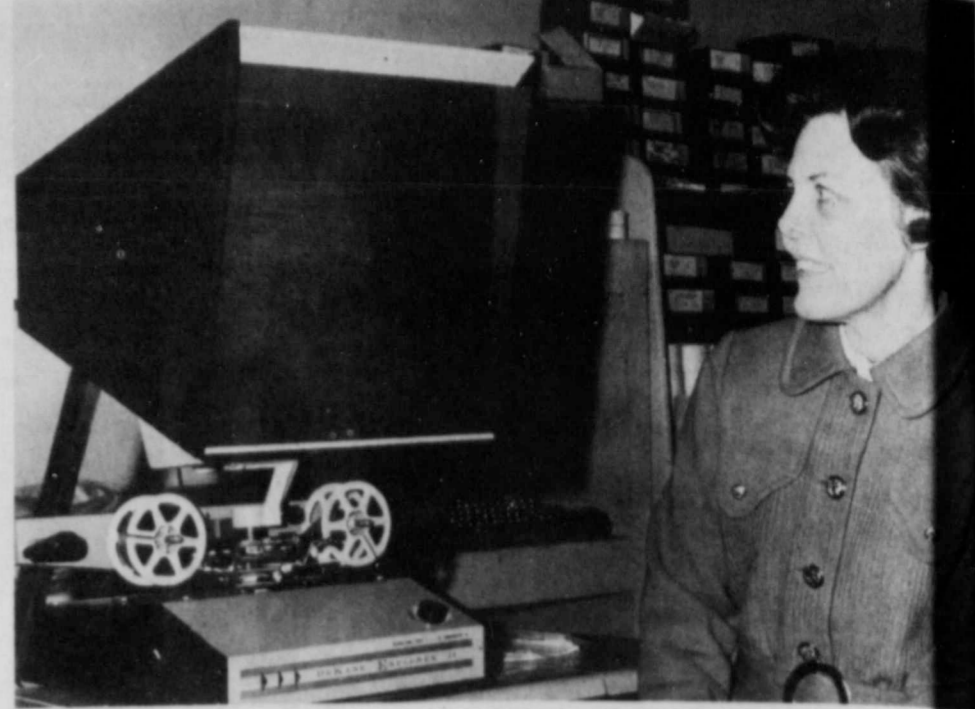

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Low Middling 31 - 26.80, Low Middling 32 - 26.90, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31 - 27.00, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 32 - 27.20, Low Middling Light Spotted 31 - 26.65 and Low Middling Light Spotted 32 - 26.70. Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$44 to \$70 per ton with most prices in the \$48 to \$53 range.
