CONTOUR FARM- ING PAID WELL

DALHART FARMER RAISED BIG
CROP BY CONTOUR LIST-
ING ON TERRACED
FARM ACRES

"Contour listing of my terraced
land before the May rains saved the
moisture and produced a crop of
grain sorghum for me this year,"
says A. R. Pollard, Dalhart county,
Texas, farmer.

The grain sorghum crop was pro-
duced with only 8.71 inches of rain
this year up to the first of October.
This is 56 percent of normal rain-
fall for those months.

In keeping with the terms of a
5-year Cooperative Agreement with
the Soil Conservation Service, Mr.
Pollard has formed his land on the
contour for the past two years.

Mr. Pollard says, "I would not
have produced anything if I had
farmed in straight rows and con-
tinue farming adds but little in time
and costs to cultivation." He has
made the handling of big farm
equipment much easier by drilling
all of the point row areas to sorgh-
um. Under this system he has elim-
inated all turning of cultivating ma-
chinery within the field.

Polhard will cut a portion of his
feed with binder and headed the re-
mainder. Sufficient stubble and
stalks will be left on the soil to
prevent damage by winds during
the blow season. He will do no graz-
ing since from his observations
grazing of stubble and stalk fields
may cause serious wind damage to
the soil.

are included in the gifts to women
who are registering at the Cooking
School.

Not only is Mrs. Burbank explain-
ing the advantages of modern ap-
pliances which may be used by
women living in town or city, but
she is also telling rural women, how
they too, may have conveniences
equally as satisfactory as their city
sisters.

Elsewhere in this issue will be
found the many recipes Mrs. Bur-
bank is using in the Herald's Cook-
ing School. Copies of these recipes
are also distributed at the school.

One feature of Wednesday's pro-
gram will be a cake baking contest
which is sponsored by the American
Legion Auxiliary. Fairy Queen Cake
flour, a product of the Light Grain
& Milling Co., will be used. A top
from one of the packages should
accompany each cake entered. Cash
prizes, also merchandise prizes will
be offered for the best cakes. Cakes
entered will become the property of
the American Legion Auxiliary, and
will be offered for sale.

The Herald, and the business men
of Perryton who have cooperated in
bringing Mrs. Burbank to Perryton
to conduct the Kitchen Chautauqua,
are extending an invitation to every
woman in this vicinity to attend the
final session of the school Wednes-
day.

CHICKEN PIE WITH PEANUT BUTTER CRUST, BAKED HAM, SPINACH NUT RING, WILTED LETTUCE, MINT PEAR SALAD, SPICE CAKE WITH MINCE MEAT FILLING, VIENNA SPECKLED CAKE, CREAM FILLING, APPLE PIE, CRUSHED WALNUT TORTE, ADMIRATION CAKE, LEMON FROSTING.

Chicken Pie With Peanut Butter Crust

Cut chicken as for frying, let stand covered with milk for 2 hours. Then roll in seasoned flour and fry a golden brown. Place in steamer with 1/2 cup celery cut fine, 1/4 cup green pepper, 1/4 cup minced onion, bit of bay leaf and few pepper corns then partly cover with boiling water. When tender take out, place in casserole with vegetables, small white onions, carrot balls, green peas. Cover with crust made of the following:

1 1/2 cup Light's Best flour; 4 tbsps peanut butter; 3 tbsps K C baking powder; 1/2 cup milk; 1 tsp salt; 4 strips breakfast bacon.

Sift and measure dry ingredients add peanut butter and milk to make soft dough. Turn into a floured board, toss lightly until outside looks smooth. Roll out to fit casserole. Cut slits to let steam escape. Place on top of crust bits of bacon, put in oven 425 degrees for 20 minutes until bacon is brown and crisp.

Baked Ham

Steam, leave to get cold, then cover with 2 cups dried apricot pulp, 2 tbsps vinegar and whole cloves. Bake in very slow oven 275 degrees for 1 hour.

Spinach Nut Ring

Chop 3 cups cooked spinach, add 3 beaten eggs, 1 cup pecans, 1/2 cup fresh bread crumbs, 1/2 tsp salt, 1/4 tsp white pepper, dash of paprika. Bake in a ring mold until firm. Turn out on platter, fill center with flowerets of cauliflower, sliced carrots, lemon juice added to cauliflower makes the vegetables beautifully white. On border of dish alternate with parsley and flowerlets. Serve with tartar sauce.

Wilted Lettuce

Shred 2 crisp heads of lettuce. Fry 1 slice ham or 4 slices bacon cut in small pieces. In 1 cup of cream, add 1 tsp salt, 2 tbsps sugar, 1 tsp dry mustard, 1/2 tsp pepper, dash of cayenne. Hard cook 4 eggs, take 3 yolks and sieve into the cup of sauce

add 3 tbsps vinegar. Take remaining eggs, chop fine, mince 1 small onion, 1 cup shredded cheese. Pour this hot sauce over lettuce just as ready to serve.

Mint Pear Salad

1 large can pears; 1 large orange; 1 head crisp lettuce; 1/2 pt. or 1 cup cottage cheese; Mint jelly or mint cherries; salad dressing.

Put pears on a thin slice of orange (unpeeled) place on hearts of lettuce. Fill pears with seasoned cheese decorate with mint jelly or cherries. Serve with cream dressing.

Spice Cake With Mince Meat Filling

1/2 cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening; 1 cup milk (scant); 2 cups Light's Best flour; 1 1/4 cups sugar; 2 eggs (beaten separately); 3 tbsps K C baking powder; 1 tsp cinnamon; 1/2 tsp each allspice, cloves and nutmeg; 1 cup pecans, chopped.

Filling: 1/2 cup sugar; 2 tbsps corn starch; 1 cup milk; 2 eggs slightly beaten; 1 tbsps butter; dash of salt. Cook over hot water until smooth, then add 1/2 cup mince meat. Spread on cake then sprinkle with fresh coconut.

Cream Filling

1/2 cup chopped pecans; 10 drained and chopped maraschino cherries; 1 cup heavy cream, whipped; 4 1/2 tbsps confectioner's sugar.

Fold the pecans and cherries into the cream and spread 1/2 the filling on lower half of cake. Replace top half of cake, pile on roughly the remaining half of the filling, and sprinkle with confectioner's sugar.

Vienna Speckled Cake

1/2 cup sifted Light's Best flour; 1/2 cup grated chocolate (2 1/2 sqs); 6 egg yolks, beaten; 1 cup sugar; 1/2 tsp vanilla; 1/4 tsp almond flavoring; 1/2 tsp salt; 7 egg whites, stiff beaten.

Sift flour 3 times after it has been measured, then mix with grated chocolate and divide into 2 parts. Beat the egg yolks until thick and lemon colored, add sugar and beat until fluffy. Add flavorings and 1/2

the flour mixture and beat until thoroughly mixed. Add the salt to egg whites and beat until stiff. Fold into this the remaining half of flour mixture. Fold the egg white mixture into the egg yolk mixture. Place in an ungreased spring form tube pan (8 inches in diameter). Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for about 45 minutes. When done invert, split and fill.

Apple Pie

1/2 cup butter creamed with 1 cup sugar, 2 tbsps lemon juice, 1/2 tsp mace, salt, 6 tart apples cut thin. Pour into shell, strip with pastry. Cook 30 to 40 minutes.

Crushed Walnut Torte

1 caramelized cup of sugar (caramelized by melting in skillet over low flame) add 1 cup of water, stirring constantly until all lumps are gone.

6 eggs, two-thirds cup sugar, two-thirds cup Light's Best flour, 1 tsp K C baking powder, 2 tbsps caramel syrup, two-thirds cup crushed nuts (roll on rolling board).

Beat egg yolks until lemon colored and thick, beat in 1/2 the sugar, then beat egg whites stiff but not dry, add remaining sugar to whites. Fold whites in yolks. Sift flour and fold into egg mixture with as few strokes as possible. Add caramel syrup and crushed nuts. Pour into layer pans. Bake 325 degrees for 40 minutes. Turn on rack to cool. Put on chilled filling. Put in refrigerator. When ready to serve pour caramel syrup over top made as follows: 1 1/2 cups heavy cream 3 tbsps sugar, 2 tbsps gelatine, 3 tbsps water, 4 tbsps caramel syrup.

Admiration Cake

3 cups Light's Best flour, 3 tbsps K C baking powder, 1/2 tsp salt, two thirds cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 3 egg yolks, well beaten, 1 cup milk, 3 egg whites, beaten stiffly.

Sift flour, measure, add baking powder, salt and sift 3 times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually until very light, add egg yolks, well

beaten, add flour with milk, fold in stiffly beaten whites. Fill 1 9-inch pan, then to remaining mixture add 1 1/2 tbsps cinnamon, 1/2 tsp cloves, 1/2 tsp mace, 1/2 tsp nutmeg, 2 tbsps black coffee. Bake the two dark layers with white ayer in middle of bake. Between layers, put this filling:

1 cup each cut raisins, figs, 1/2 cup cut dates, 1 cup water, 2 tbsps butter, dash of salt. Cook until thick.

Lemon Frosting

1 tspn lemon rind grated, 4 tbsps butter, 3 cups confectioner's sugar 3 tbsps lemon juice.

MAKES THE IMPOSSIBLE

What Gov. Alf M. Landon's proposals would mean to the people of the state was explained by Secretary Wallace in a radio address recently. According to the calculations, the Landon program would mean certain bankruptcy for the farmer and an unending strain on the Treasury. Pointing out the governor's policy, how he had favored a few months ago which he had called a dole. This grows out of the income of farmers, and that with ordinary weathers income of export producers is being piled up of surplus which there is now no

Secretary Wallace referred to his of September 25 in which he stated that the Landon plan would cost a total of 265 million dollars a year in raising domestic prices.

What we see how his proposal would work if applied to corn and the indications now are that the soil conservation or programs in effect in '37, but a subsidy to stimulate production acreage would rise from 98 million acres to at 100 million acres. With average yields per acre as they were in the Twenties, the crop would be about 2,900,000,000 bushels about what it was in 1932. At that time, the price of corn was 35 cents a bushel at 20 or 25 cents on many belt farms.

Only way farmers could take advantage of this cheap feed would be to raise more hogs, fatten more hogs, and feed more grain to their cows. By the winter of 1932, hog prices would be 100c, with \$5 hogs again in possibility as production. Of course, fat cattle prices, butter, and cheese prices also be falling. By December 1932, if the Landon program were in effect, corn supplies might be sufficient to send the price of 25 cents a bushel at Chicago, and on many Iowa farms, 1932 corn would again be used for fuel and it would not be before hog prices would rise than the costs of shipping.

A subsidy equivalent to the one paid to corn and hog raisers on the share of their output, consumed, or 25¢ a bushel on corn and \$2 a head-weight on hogs, the total would amount to 937 million a year on corn and hogs. If the plan were ever put into operation, payments to producers of wheat, cotton, tobacco and exportable surpluses would total to a figure way over a billion dollars a year.

The plan would break the corn farmer just as surely as it would break the wheat farmer. The farm prices and farm income would come just as surely and for the same reasons that it did in 1932.

What agriculture has been through since 1920, it is amazing to have a candidate for President stand up and say that he would have no foreign market for their products, he therefore would by means of a subsidy stimulate them to produce for a market which doesn't exist.

There could be no compensation for the price of price and income about by another accumulation of three or four hundred bushels of wheat, ten or million bales of cotton, and pounds of lard. The American consumer and the income tax would soon see the impossibility of moving our growing surplus into a resistant foreign market. When the end came, the price would spread disaster throughout agriculture and industry.

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Niggerdly Salaries Are Paid To The Texas State Officials

ONLY THREE STATES IN UNION
PAY SALARIES AS LOW AS
THOSE PAID OFFICIALS
OF THIS BIG STATE

In 1876 Texas wrote into its Constitution a salary of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars for the Governor, Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars for the Attorney General, and Twenty-five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars each for the Land Commissioner, Comptroller, Treasurer and Secretary of State. In those days this might have been an adequate salary, but today those holding these high offices are not paid as well as they were in '76, and no man can carry the burden of the office and justly care for his family during his incumbency. Being Constitutional provisions these salaries have remained the same and I am sure that if the thinking people have the matter called to their attention they will vote for one proposed Constitutional Amendment is the November election of this year raising the salary of the Governor to \$12,000 a year, the Attorney General to \$10,000, and the other four Constitutional officers to \$6,000 each. This will only cost Mr. John Citizen less than a half cent each to do justice by these leading officials of our great State Government.

Texas is the fastest growing State in the Union, the largest State and fifth in population and wealth. The demands on State officials are many and we ought to pay our public servants a reasonable living wage while they transact the business of the State.

Take the Governor for instance. No Governor can live up to the requirements of the office and raise his family, excepting that he have private means, without having to spend one-half of the month wondering about where he will borrow money at the end of the month to pay the bills for the month. We all admit that this is not good business. The same is true of the other officials. The Attorney General ought to be, and always is an outstanding lawyer, and in the great number of cases in which he appears many lawyers on the other side of the docket from him are often paid more in the one case than the Attorney General earns in two years.

To think of the State Comptroller, responsible for several hundred employees and having to make a State campaign every two years, rearing a family in Austin on the pitiful sum of \$2,500.00 is a crime and ought to be corrected. This is true

even if we don't think of the millions of dollars' responsibility he carries for the State.

Although fifth in rank in the United States, there are only three other States in the Union, to-wit: North Dakota, South Dakota and Tennessee of the forty-eight States that pay their Governor as little as we do in Texas. Even Rhode Island, Montana, Idaho and all of these other States recognize the importance of the office and pay in excess of what we do in Texas. Texans, when they think of it, are not adverse to paying a living salary. Take the salaries we pay the Mayors of the larger cities; the \$14,000 and \$16,000 paid City Managers in some of our larger cities. We pay the Superintendent of Schools in Houston \$10,000 a year and that after the depression cut. The

Federal Judges in Texas get \$10,000 a year and a job for life. Members of Congress are paid \$10,000 a year plus allowances. Washington sent a capable engineer to supervise the work on the Colorado River project at a salary of \$20,000 a year and the engineer on the Port Arthur bridge construction is to receive \$12,000 a year.

In private business the smart business institutions like our banks, railroads and other large institutions pay much better salaries than are proposed here, but these are for public service. There is no executive of a private institution in Texas that has the responsibilities or duties calling for ability such as do these offices.

We are sure that the thinking men and women in Texas, after the matter is put up to them, will see the justice of the proposed amendment and will talk to their neighbors and will talk it at Sunday School, their lodges and at social gatherings and say a good word to the end that the pro-

posed Constitutional amendment will be overwhelmingly carried at the November election, and in this great Centennial year we can right a wrong that has long existed, and do it to the glory of Texas. If every good Texan will speak his mind upon this worthy Amendment between now and the November election, we have no fears of the final outcome.

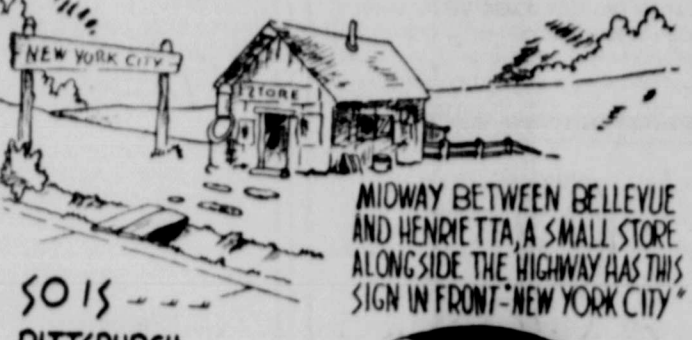

BROILED STEAK, ROAST OF PORK, RING OF FRUIT SALAD, MOCHA MARSHMALLOW CAKE, MOCHA FILLING, PRUNE CHIFFON PIE, BOUQUETS OF VEGETABLES, CHOCOLATE ICE BOX CAKE, ORANGE CAKE, FROSTING, SOUTHERN SUGAR PIE, BANANAS BAKED IN ORANGE SAUCE, SAUCE FOR EACH 2 BANANAS.

BROILED STEAK

1 sirloin steak—1½ inches thick. Heat broiler to 450 degrees for 20 minutes then brush over with a little of Mrs. Tucker's shortening. Place steak on broiler leave door open, let brown slightly then turn. About 12 minutes for medium rare. Have a very hot platter ready (rub with bit of garlic). Pour over steak. Worcestershire Sauce, lemon juice, chopped parsley, 1 tblspn onion juice 1 tblspn minced green pepper. Pour over steak. Serve at once.

ROAST OF PORK

Wipe roast, dredge with salt, pepper and Light's Best flour. Put on rack and roast in an oven at 375 degrees. When tender and well done, serve with baked red apples filled with crushed pineapple, sweet potato croquettes and creamed turnips.

RING OF FRUIT SALAD

1 pkg. prepared lemon gelatin dissolved in 1 cup hot pineapple juice, 2 tblspns tarragon vinegar 1 No. 2½ can mixed fruit one-third cup celery cut fine.

MOCHA MARSHMALLOW CAKE

2 eggs, beaten until stiff adding ¼ cup sugar gradually. Beat 4 egg yolks with one-third cup strong coffee and 2 tblspns vinegar until very light add to this ½ cup sugar, sift with 1 one-third cup K C baking powder, ¼ tspns salt. Fold in egg whites beaten stiff but not dry. Turn into a pan and bake 350 degrees 20 to 25 minutes.

MOCHA FILLING

1 two-thirds cups sugar, one-third cup corn syrup one-third cup strong coffee, cook to 242 degrees pour on 2 egg whites 10 marshmallows, one-third cup broken nuts.

PRUNE CHIFFON PIE

Soak ½ lb. prunes overnight. Simmer in water they were soaked in. Let cool. Remove pits, cut prunes in small pieces. Measure 1 cup of cut prunes, ¼ cup of prune liquid, mash until smooth. Put in top of double boiler with 4 egg yolks, ½ cup sugar, ¼ tspn salt, 1 tblspn lemon juice. Cook over hot water until thoroughly heated then add 1 tblspn gelatin which has been soaked in ¼ cup cold water. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Then pour into pre-baked pie shell. Serve with whipped cream decorations.

BOUQUETS OF VEGETABLES

Separate flowerets of cauliflower wash thoroughly, sprinkle with salt and steam until tender. Drain and add butter, sprinkle with lemon juice. Drain can of string beans (cook in butter), 1 cup diced carrots, can of peas. Combine all with butter. Drain whole mushrooms brown in butter. Drain tiny beets, cover with vinegar for 1 hour. Arrange vegetables on plate. Fringe the edge of plate with parsley and cauliflower. All vegetables very hot, buttered. Beets very cold.

CHOCOLATE ICE BOX CAKE

(A Real Masterpiece)
3 doz. lady fingers, 40 marshmallows, 2 squares of bitter chocolate, 2 cups milk, ¼ tspn salt, 1 pt. heavy cream. Line spring form pan with halves of lady fingers rounded sides out. Cover bottom of pan with fingers. In top of boiler, put marshmallows, chocolate and milk. When mixture is smooth, remove from stove and cool. When cold, beat ¼ cup of cream and fold into mixture. Pour half of mixture over lady fingers, cover with remaining fingers then chocolate mixture. Put in refrigerator overnight. When ready to serve remove sides of pan, after placing on dish. Cover center of cake with whipped cream. Shave sweet chocolate over all.

Serve 8. Coffee will be delightful with this dessert.

ORANGE CAKE

½ cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening, two thirds cup sugar, 2 cups Light's Best flour, 3 tblspns K C baking powder, ½ tspn salt.

Cream shortening with sugar, alternate with ½ cup orange juice, 2 tblspns lemon juice and flour after sifting 3 tspns K C baking powder. Lastly, beat 4 egg whites, slowly add to them one-third cup sugar. Fold in the mixture. Pour into pan and bake at 375 degrees 30 minutes.

FROSTING

2 tblspns butter, 1½ cups orange juice, grated rind 1 orange ¼ cup whipped cream. Spread on cake.

SOUTHERN SUGAR PIE

3 cups brown sugar, 3 eggs ½ cup cream, ½ cup melted butter. Mix all this to a smooth custard, dash of lemon extract, a sprinkle of nutmeg. Pour into an unbaked shell. Place in 450 degree oven for 10 min-

utes then reduce to 325 degrees. Cook 40 minutes. When cold serve.

BANANAS BAKED IN ORANGE SAUCE

1 banana per person, juice of 1 lemon, dash of cayenne, orange sauce. Peel and cut lengthwise, 1 banana per person. Arrange in lightly buttered casserole and marinate in lemon juice and pepper 1 hour. Cover with sauce and bake 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

SAUCE FOR EACH 2 BANANAS

1 egg yolk, 2 tblspns sugar 2 tblspns orange juice 1 tspn orange rind (grated), 1 egg white stiffly beaten, ½ cup whipped cream grated rind of 1 lemon. Add sugar to egg yolk, blend well, add orange, mix and add the stiffly beaten egg whites, whipped cream and lemon rind.

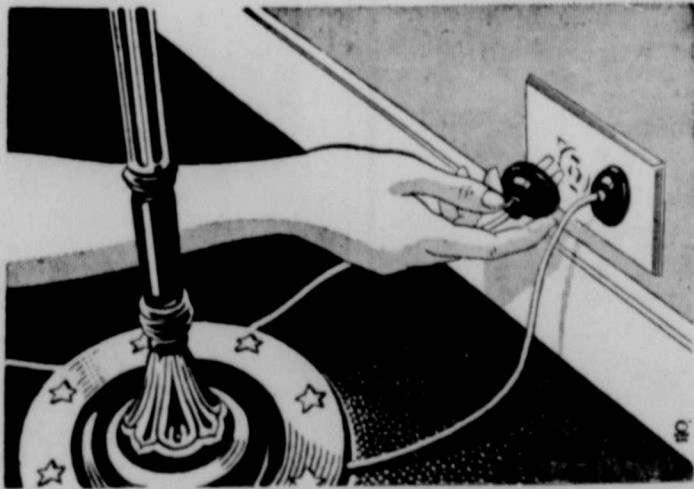

COFFEE RECIPES

COFFEE PIE

One-third cup flour, two-thirds cup sugar, 3 egg yolks, 1/2 cup milk, 1 1/2 cups left over coffee, 1/2 tspn salt.

Cook until thick then let cool and add 2 teaspoons vanilla and fold in the stiffly beaten whites of 3 eggs. Put into previously baked pastry shell and let stand 3 hours.

PASTRY FOR COFFEE PIE

1/2 cup shortening, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 tspn salt, 2 tspns sugar, 1/4 cup coffee.

COFFEE GRAVY

Add 1 tablespoon of coffee to brown gravy.

COFFEE FROSTING

1/2 cup butter, 2 cups confectioner's sugar, 1 tblspn strong black coffee, 1 tspn vanilla.

Cream butter. Add sugar and mix until well blended. Add coffee and vanilla. Mix smooth. Use for filling or icing.

COFFEE SPONGE SALAD

Use 1 cup of strong left-over coffee. Pour 1/2 cup cold water in bowl and sprinkle 1 tblspn gelatin on top of water. Let stand 5 minutes. Add coffee and stir until dissolved. Add 1/2 tspn salt, one-third cup sugar, 2

tblspns lemon juice. When it begins to thicken, whip and add 1 stiffly beaten egg white. Turn in ring mold. Turn out on bed of lettuce and fill center with fruit.

COFFEE CAKE

1/2 cup shortening, 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, 2 squares melted chocolate, 2 egg yolks, 1 tspn vanilla, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 tspn baking powder, 1/2 tspn

soda, 1 cup sour cream, mixed with 1/2 cup cold strong coffee.

Cream butter and sugar, add chocolate and egg yolks. Mix thoroughly. Mix flour, baking powder and soda. Add to chocolate mixture, alternating with sour cream and coffee. Add vanilla. Fold in one stiffly beaten egg white. Mix well. Bake in square greased and flour dusted pan. Bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

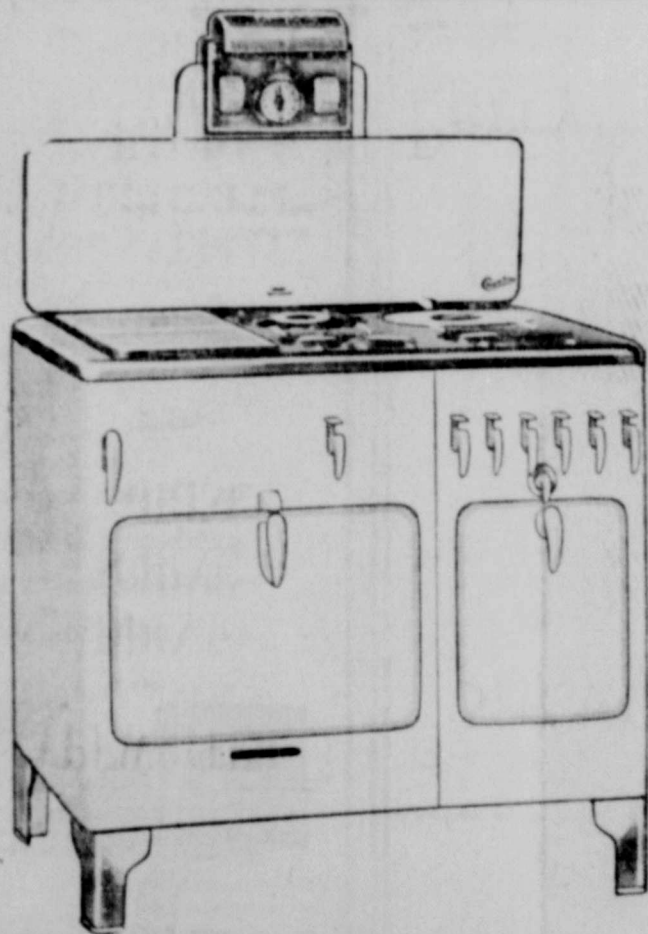

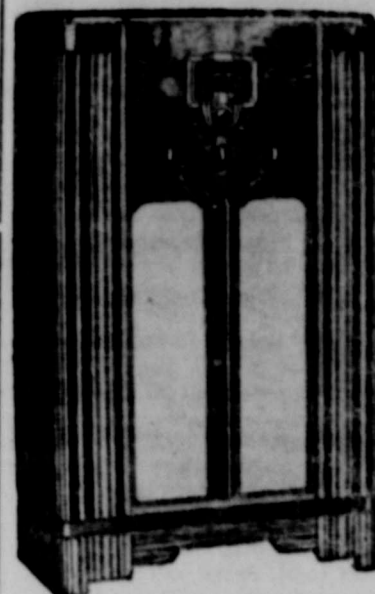
