STORM SWEEPS OVER WEST NO FATALITIES ARE REPORTED

Great Damage to Crops and Groves.
West, July 2.—A storm of considerable velocity swept over the city about six o'clock yesterday evening, doing much damage to property and injuring at least three persons, one of them seriously.

The injured are Mrs. M. A. Allen, who was badly hurt by a falling house; Charles Adams and Mrs. Charles Adams, both more or less hurt, while others had minor injuries.

The storm blew up from the east and rushed down on the town, ripping off shutters, tearing small houses down, shattering chimneys and sweeping away everything movable. Three houses in West were completely wrecked.

A brakeman named Hunt was severely shocked by a live wire which fell across the Katy tracks. Damage is reported in the Bohemian colony in the neighborhood south of West. Heavy rain followed the high wind and continued for two hours.

Mr. Bryan's Home-Coming Planned.
New York: With plans already under way for a big welcome to William Jennings Bryan at his home in Lincoln, Neb., on his return, Col. F. C. Wetmore and Morton Jordan, leading Democrats of St. Louis, will sail Wednesday for Europe to lay their plans before Mr. Bryan and to confer with him regarding the reception planned by the Commercial Travelers' Anti-Trust League to be given in New York.

Charters are Popular.
Austin, July 3.—If the charter record in the State Department is a barometer of the commercial growth of the State, then Texas has increased nearly two fold during the past year, for during the twelve months ending June 30 there were 1,450 charters of all kinds filed, against 959 for the preceding twelve months. It is apparent that the increase approached fifty per cent, and does show a healthy activity in the commercial life.

Sultan Raises Embargo Against Jews.
Toronto, Ont.: At the opening of the seventh annual convention of the Federation of Zion societies in Canada here, President Desola of Montreal announced the Sultan of Turkey had revoked the laws forbidding the Jews to settle in Palestine. He did not wish it understood they had received a charter, but it is now possible for Jews to inhabit the country and enjoy the protection of its laws.

Canal Bonds on the Market.
Washington: Bonds of the Panama Canal loan authorized by a recent act of Congress in the sum of \$30,000,000 are offered to the public by Secretary Shaw. The bonds will be dated August 1, 1906, will bear interest at the rate of two per cent and will be payable quarterly. After ten years from date of issue they will be redeemable at the pleasure of the Government and will be payable after thirty years from date.

Hermann Strausberger, a German, who was working for Louis Maurer near Corn Hill, Williamson County, killed himself by shooting himself through the head with a pistol. He was about forty years old and unmarried.

Edward Kingsford, aged fourteen years, son of Luke Kingsford, while playing in the Brazos River near Mill-sap last evening was drowned.

W. Gill Shaw, assistant registrar at the State University, aged twenty-four, was drowned in the Colorado River at Austin Monday in an attempt to save the life of a young lady, who had gone over her depth in the river, and who was afterward rescued.

A. B. Washington, who was tried in the District Court at Bastrop for the killing of Jennie Moore at the emancipation picnic on Pine Oak Creek last month, was given the death penalty, the jury being out only a short time.

Just a few minutes before twelve o'clock Sunday, while Hollie Roan, of Waxahatchie, was talking and laughing with members of his family at his home, he fell to the floor and died suddenly. He has been slightly indisposed for several days, but otherwise he was regarded as being in apparent good health.

A movement is on foot among San Antonio Baptists to secure the meeting of the Baptist General Convention in that city this fall.

Upwards of 30,000 cotton mill operatives in New England are working now under an increase in wages which places them on a schedule like that which prevailed prior to July 1, 1903, when a general reduction of twelve and one-half per cent was imposed.

Rev. Abe Mulkey and wife are conducting a ten days' meeting at Ferris. It has been about ten years since Mr. Mulkey was in Ferris holding a meeting. All the Churches will participate.

The tax rolls of Fort Worth for the year 1906, both personal and real property, total \$26,869,962. For the year 1905 the total taxable property amounted to \$23,162,114, making a difference of \$3,707,848 in favor of this year.

Dallas Odd Fellows are arranging to invite the National meeting of that body to Dallas 1907.

A special train bearing delegates to the S. V. P. O. meeting at Palestine, left Dallas Monday night.

The President signed the thirty-six bill on Friday.

WON'T GO TO PANAMA

**SENATE COMMITTEE ON OCEANIC
CANALS SO DECIDES.**

**By Agreement, No Testimony Will Be
Taken Until Next Session—
Cromwell's Case.**

Washington—By a vote of 6 to 5 the senate committee on inter-oceanic canals decided not to go to the isthmus of Panama and take testimony in the final investigation.

By agreement no testimony will be taken in Washington until next session, and therefore the disposition of William Nelson Cromwell's refusal to testify concerning canal matters prior to governmental ownership of the property will be postponed until next December.

The action of the committee carries with it an adjournment until next December, which will postpone action on the nominations of canal commissioners. It is expected the commissioners will be reappointed during the recess of congress.

What Populists Did at St. Louis.
St. Louis—The national conference of the people's party clubs adjourned sine die, after adopting a platform which will be presented at the national convention in 1908, denouncing William J. Bryan; passing the Forrester resolution, which delegates say, gives heart virtual control of the populist party, and adopting a resolution outlining campaign plans for the coming fall election.

Tornado Strikes an Oklahoma Town.
Tittabaw, Okla.—This town was practically demolished by a tornado at night. Nearly every building was torn from its foundation, and in most instances carried a considerable distance. No one was seriously hurt; the people took to cyclone cellars. Heavy loss of live stock and crops is reported.

Turks Denounce Our Butte.
Constantinople—The upsur over food products in America has had an echo here. Several Turkish newspapers denounced the quality of imported American butter, and the government caused an inquiry to be made.

Senate Ratifies Treaty With Mexico.
Washington—The senate, in executive session, ratified the treaty with Mexico concerning the division of the waters of the Rio Grande river for irrigation purposes.

Aimed at Elevator Trust.
Washington—The senate passed Senator La Follette's joint resolution extending the scope of the inquiry now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission so as to include the transportation and storage of grains. The resolution is an effort to investigate what is known as the elevator trust.

Author of a National Hymn Dead.
Toronto, Ont.—Alexander Muir, author of Canada's national hymn, "The Maple Leaf," died suddenly.

An Important Item.
Washington—Among the important items in the general deficiency bill passed by the house was one ratifying and legalizing the duties collected during President McKinley's term from imports from the Philippines.

The Longworths in London.
London—Congressman and Mrs. Longworth were present at the ball given at the American embassy Wednesday evening and will be present at the drawing room at Buckingham palace on Thursday.

After an Ice Combine.
Toledo, O.—J. A. Miller, R. C. Lemmer, R. A. Beard, P. H. Watters, P. S. Breining, ice combine men, were sentenced to pay \$5,000 fine and one year in prison each.

SAFETY APPLIANCES ON RAILROADS

**ATTY-GEN. MOODY ANNOUNCES
PROSECUTIONS FOR VIOLA-
TIONS OF LAW**

On Recommendation of the Interstate Commerce Commission He Instructs District Attorneys to Enforce the Law—Delays Will Be No Longer Tolerated.

Washington—Atty-Gen. Moody announces that all United States district attorneys have been instructed to begin a series of prosecutions against the railroads for violations of the provisions of the act requiring safety appliances on all railroad equipment in use. The announcement of the attorney general is due to the recommendations of the interstate commerce commission, which has been struggling with the roads for the past eight years in an effort to have the law enforced.

As a matter of fact, the announcement marks no radical departure on the part of the government as to the attitude taken under the law, but only serves to give notice that the delays which have been tolerated thus far will not be permitted longer. The interstate commerce commission itself has successfully prosecuted no less than 600 cases against the railroads for failure to comply with the law. In every case the railroad was convicted in the courts, and under the law was fined \$100 for each offense proven.

WORSE THAN CARRIE NATION.

**Kansas Officials Destroy Liquor and
Bar Fixtures and On the Hunt
for More.**

Kansas City, Kas.—The anti-saloon crusade at Kansas City, Kas., has been renewed with increased vigor in addition to destroying stocks of liquor and bar fixtures, C. W. Trickett, the assistant attorney-general appointed by Gov. Hoch to enforce the prohibition law, threatened to demolish saloon buildings if the owners persisted in renting their places to joint-keepers.

Atty-Gen. Trickett has sent out warnings to property owners, which read:

"This is to notify you that if you permit said premises to be again used for the sale of intoxicating liquors, so as to make necessary the issuance of a second writ of abatement, I SHALL ORDER THE PREMISES SUFFICIENTLY DEMOLISHED SO THAT NO THIRD TRIP WILL BE NECESSARY, and in addition will cite you for contempt of court in aiding and assisting in violating the order of the court."

There are about one hundred saloons in Kansas City, Kas., about fifty of which have been closed. The officials continue to spill liquor and break up costly bars, tables and other furniture, and to search for more.

BREAKERS AHEAD FOR CZAR.

**His Cabinet is Unpopular, and the
Army Disloyal, From Officers
Down to Men.**

St. Petersburg—The campaign in parliament to compel the emperor to dismiss the Goremeykin cabinet, and accept the principle of a responsible ministry, promises to be successful. M. Pobledonozoff, the procurator general of the holy synod, is said to have advised the emperor to do this as the only means of preserving the throne.

News from the provinces shows that general anarchy is growing. The army is honeycombed with sedition. The Preobrazhensky regiment, the czar's own, has proved disloyal. Soldiers along the German and Austrian frontiers are disorderly. Very little reliance can be placed in the army, from officers to men, to uphold the present regime.

White Was Heavily in Debt.
New York—It is reported that Stanford White, killed by Harry K. Thaw, had been living beyond his income and was heavily in debt, owing \$300,000 to one young member of a prominent family and as much to other persons. In addition, it is reported that White had drawn so heavily from the firm of which he was a member that he had been notified he could draw no more.

Thaw Indicted by the Grand Jury.
New York—The coroner's inquest found that Stanford White came to his death at the hands of Harry Thaw. The grand jury has indicted Thaw for murder in the first degree.

Englishman to Inspect Meats.
New York—Lieut-Col. Percy Eyre Hobbs has arrived from England, coming to inspect meat intended for use in the British army.

Gov. Cobb of Maine Renominated.
Portland, Me.—The republicans renominated Gov. Wm. T. Cobb, of Rockland, for a second term as chief executive.

Rival of the Steel Combine.
Pittsburg, Pa.—It is stated that John W. Gates is at the head of a plan to formulate a rival to the United States Steel Corporation.

Yale Defeats Harvard.
New London, Conn.—Yale defeated Harvard in the big boat race. The sons of "Old Eli" were nearly a boat length to the good at the finish.

For Governor of Pennsylvania.
Harrisburg, Pa.—Lewis Emery, Jr., of Bradford, was nominated for governor on the first ballot by the democratic state convention here.

Ended by Killing Himself.
Philadelphia—Failing in his attempt to kill his wife, Charles Dougherty shot and seriously wounded Sabina Dougherty, his pretty 17-year-old daughter, when she interfered to save her mother, accidentally shot his sister-in-law, Alice Brennan, in the shoulder, and then deliberately blew out his own brains.

Gun Explodes on English Ship.
London—By the explosion of a gun on the battleship Essex, at Plymouth, one member of the crew was killed and eight injured.

BRAVE MEN PERISH

**TWO SACRIFICE LIVES IN EFFORT
TO SAVE ANOTHER.**

Heroic Deeds Performed by Workmen in a Factory in a Connecticut Town.

Waterbury, Conn.—Eugene Rowley, Frederick Scott and Dennis Sullivan were drowned here in 30 inches of crude petroleum which had settled at the bottom of one of the big pits in the yard of the Benedict & Burnham Manufacturing Co.

A huge fuel tank stood in the center of the pit. It was discovered that the tank was leaking. Rowley, the engineer in charge, came rushing to the scene, closely followed by Scott, his assistant, and Sullivan, a helper.

"If anything happens," cried Rowley, as he started down the ladder, "don't you boys come after me."

Half way down, Howley, overcome by the fumes, reeled, lost his hold and pitched into the escaping petroleum.

"I can't stand this," said Scott. "I'm going after him."

"Get a rope," warned Sullivan. "No time," answered Scott. Scott dropped unconscious almost at the first round. Then Sullivan shut his teeth.

"They're both got wives," he muttered, "and I'm Dennis Sullivan—that is, no good to anybody; here goes."

And, shaking off the men who tried to restrain him, he went over the side. In a moment he had joined the dead men soaking in the oozing fluid below.

Through the crowd came Wilber Babcock, superintendent of the Waterbury Brass Goods corporation. He was stripping off his coat as he ran.

"No use, Mr. Babcock," pleaded a fireman. "You're a dead man the minute you hit that ladder."

"Go to the devil!" yelled Babcock, and he started down. He collapsed almost at the pit's rim, but William Kearney caught him as he fell and dragged him back.

When the factory officials reached the scene they drove away the men and sought frantically to stop the flow of oil. The three bodies were recovered.

Babcock lies at his home in a critical condition.

THAW KILLED AN ARCHITECT.

**Man Who Married Artist Model and
Flora—A Girl Does Some
Shooting.**

New York—Stanford White, an eminent architect, was shot and instantly killed by Harry Thaw, a member of a wealthy Pittsburg family, on the roof of the Madison Square Garden.

Thaw was arrested immediately, and White's body was taken away in an ambulance.

The tragedy occurred in the presence of a large and fashionable audience, during the performance of a musical extravaganza.

Those near by say that Thaw walked up to White, who was sitting at a table with a woman, and said: "You ruined my wife. You ought to die, and you are going to."

Then he fired. The first bullet went wild, burying in the wall. Two more shots followed in quick succession. White's body sagged, his arm flung out on the table, and his head sank on the arm. He was dead.

Looking down on the body of his victim, Thaw said: "You deserved this; you ruined my wife."

When Thaw was taken from the roof garden his wife was with him, clinging to him and shrieking wildly: "Oh, Harry," she cried, "Why did you do it, Harry?"

"It's all right, dear," he answered, kissing her. "He ruined you, and I fixed him. It's all right."

Thaw's friends say that he is hopelessly insane.

Plead "Not Guilty."
New York—Harry K. Thaw pleaded "not guilty" to the indictment of murder in the first degree before Judge Canby in the court of general sessions.

Populace Thought San Francisco Calamity Was About to Be Repeated.

Cardiff, Wales—Violent earthquakes were experienced throughout South Wales. Houses rocked, and many of the cheaper ones were damaged. Hundreds of chimneys fell, pictures were shaken from walls, occupants of dwellings were thrown to the ground and people fled from their houses, shrieking that the San Francisco disaster was to be repeated. Though there were many narrow escapes there were no casualties so far as known.

Earthquake shocks, accompanied by loud rumblings, were also felt at Bristol, Liffcombe and elsewhere.

Permitted to Carry Their Own Oil.
Washington—The conference on the rate bill have agreed. Oil pipe lines will be permitted to carry their own oil.

**Agitation of the Fort Worth-Midland

At Bonham, Lane Douglas, twelve years old, son of Salie Douglas, colored, was run over by an electric street car and instantly killed. The body was almost severed in twain.

Brigadier General Gordon Boone, of Navasota, has filed application with the Adjutant General to be placed on the retired list. The next in line is Col. Townsend of the Third regiment.

King Stevenson, of Fulp, Fannin County, killed himself with a pistol last Thursday. It is not known whether the shot was accidental or with suicidal intent.

The Government is to contribute silk worms in large quantities to further the experiment in silk worm culture in the El Paso section, which is being made by G. Hazakawa, a Japanese.

An effort, which is meeting with success, is being made by the leading business men at Amarillo and throughout the entire Panhandle country to launch a Panhandle Fair at that place.

A child, member of a Bohemian family, named Pamank, fell out of a window into a barrel of water, at the home near Seaton, Bell County, and before it was discovered, was drowned.

Prof. F. M. Martin, of Huntsville, has been elected president of the John Tarlton College at Stephenville. Up to the time of his election Prof. Martin was superintendent of the city schools of Huntsville.

Eight cases of sausage of fifty pounds each were condemned by the health authorities at Houston. Kerosene was poured over the sausage and it was hauled to the country and dumped.

Dr. J. S. Turner, superintendent of the State Insane Asylum at Terrell, announces that the new addition is open to 250 more men, and will be opened to as many women within thirty days.

Antone Koch, aged 78 years, a native of Ulm, Germany, and an old resident of Boerne, blew his head to fragments with a shotgun just east of a culvert of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass Railroad.

The Texas Irrigation Association will meet in annual session at College Station, with the Farmers' Congress, July 10, 11 and 12. An interesting program has been prepared by President F. F. Collins, of San Antonio.

United States Senator-Elect Bob Taylor of Tennessee has appointed George M. Hodge of Fort Worth as his secretary. Mr. Hodge is a native of Columbia, Tenn. He came to Fort Worth from Nashville six months ago.

A. E. Harvey, night engineer at the electric plant at Temple, met a horrible death in an accident at the plant. In attempting to cross through a big belt revolving at a rapid speed, he lost his footing, and falling on the belt was whirled to death, being battered beyond recognition. He leaves a wife and three small children.

The Wichita Valley Railroad Company has amended its charter, changing the number of directors from thirteen to nine. This is the road now in operation between Wichita Falls and Seymour and is building south to Stamford.

Col. W. A. Shaw has been appointed by Mayor Smith to fill the vacancy from the ninth ward in Dallas, made vacant by the death of the late Chas. Steinman.

J. W. Denton, aged 68 years, fell dead while plowing in a field six miles from Tyler. Heart trouble is assigned as the cause of his sudden death.

M. P. Bewley, proprietor of the Bewley mills, and the pioneer flour manufacturer of North Texas, is dead in Fort Worth, after a lingering illness.

Five hundred enthusiastic citizens witnessed the laying of the cornerstone of Port Arthur's magnificent \$80,000 manual training school building now in process of erection.

The Frisco Railroad has taken active steps looking toward the beginning of work on its terminal in Beaumont.

An incoming northbound train struck and killed an unknown white man about nine miles from Houston Wednesday night.

It is believed that Charles W. Ogden of San Antonio, general attorney for the Texas Midland railroad, will be nominated by the Republican State convention for Governor of Texas.

The Denver Road has let the contract for the erection of several buildings for the increased terminals at Fort Worth. Among the improvements to be built is a twelve-story roundhouse and a machine shop 524,100 feet. The total cost will approximate \$30,000.

Members of the Texas Car Service association for the past three weeks have been voting on a proposition to remove the general offices to Dallas. The offices are now in Houston. Both cities have many supporters.

Saturday evening a negro named Adam Nelson went into the store of J. V. Roopman in the Brasos bottom, near Caldwell. He got into an altercation with Mr. Roopman. The darky was shot through the body and may die.

FIFTY-NINTH SESSION ENDS AT END OF FISCAL YEAR.

Washington, July 2.—Promptly at 10 o'clock Saturday night Vice-President Fairbanks and Speaker Cannon in the House declared the final adjournment of the first session of the Fifty-Ninth Congress.

For the first time in the history of the Government, Congress adjourned on the day which closed the fiscal year. Other sessions had adjourned before and some after June 30, but the Fifty-Ninth Congress ended its first session on the day when the Government strikes its balances and closes its books.

There were some interesting features to mark the end which finally came, when there was less than a quorum in either House, as many Senators and Representatives, relying on the belief that the adjournment would come early in the day, made their arrangements to leave in the afternoon, and they did not remain for the closing scenes. An error in the enrollment of the sundry civil appropriation bill caused quite a flurry about the capitol. It was found by Secretary Root, in looking over the bill after it had been signed by the President, that it contained an appropriation of \$3,000,000 for site for a public building in Washington, a provision which had been eliminated from two different bills. After some perplexity, the error was corrected by a joint resolution.

It has been a strenuous session from start to finish. The measure which caused the greatest debate is the railroad rate bill. Regulation with the session, its consideration continued.

TWENTY-SEVEN KILLED

Trainload of Americans Meet Fatal Disaster Near London While Running at Fearful Speed.

London, July 2.—The American Line Special from Plymouth, carrying forty-five passengers who had departed Saturday night from the steamer New York June 23, was wrecked at Salisbury, thirty miles from London, at 2 o'clock Sunday morning. Twenty-seven persons were killed and a dozen or more injured.

The train had passed the Salisbury station at very high speed. At a sharp curve just outside the station the locomotive jumped the track and plowing up the rails crashed into a westbound freight train. The engine mounted the girders of the railroad bridge over the Avon and turned turtle. There were three passenger coaches in the train. The first shot past the locomotive and smashed into splinters.

The second and third passenger

cars were toppled over on the line and completely destroyed. The van containing a cook's kitchen was saved by the conductor who promptly applied the brakes.

Rescue parties set at work instantly, but to little purpose, and the injured were forced to remain buried in the debris a long time. As the bodies of the dead were extricated they were laid in rows on the station platform to await identification.

All the physicians in Salisbury were summoned and devoted themselves to attendance upon the wounded. It was necessary to saw open parts of the coaches in order to relieve survivors and to secure the bodies of the dead.

The injured were later removed to the Salisbury infirmary where the entire staff, assisted by local volunteer surgeons, attended them.

The Consular Service was given a complete new legal status which will permit of an entire reorganization.

When the appropriations for the session are totaled it will be found that their aggregate has reached nearly \$900,000,000. This is a greater sum than has been made available since the war Congress of 1898.

Of this amount \$25,000,000 will go into new public buildings in various sections of the country.

Rape Fiend Meets Rope and Fire

Chickasha, I. T., July 2.—The negro who committed a criminal assault upon the 16-year-old daughter of Ira Robertson, near Womack, was captured Saturday night and, after being taken to the scene of the crime, was hanged a quarter of a mile from the spot. He confessed his crime and offered no resistance to the mob. To one person the negro gave his name as Cliff Mays of Marshall, Texas, and he told another that it was Will Newbright, San Antonio. By the time the negro was overtaken near Bradley last night fully four hundred men had joined in the chase, and soon after the capture the amroch to Womack began.

It was nearly 3 o'clock Sunday morning when the Robertson home was reached and the negro brought before the girl. That's the one," said she at once and the negro replied, "Yes, lady, I'm the one. Gentlemen I admit the crime."

The mob then proceeded with him a quarter of a mile east, past the spot where he had committed his crime, and then a quarter of a mile south to a large tree in the road on the bank of Walnut Creek, where a rope was thrown over a limb about eighteen feet high and one end knotted about the man's neck.

Two Boys Met Death on the Track.

Galveston: Two young men from Galveston, met death Sunday morning near Webster on the Galveston, Houston and Henderson Railroad. Dr. L. S. Downs reported that they had been identified as Jaena Downs, of Arcadia, and Edwin Dahl, of Galveston, the former being the son of E. L. Downs of Arcadia and a nephew of Dr. Downs of this city, and the latter the son of Mrs. George Dahl of this city.

Live Orient Town to Celebrate.

Knox City: Knox City will give a big barbecue on July 19 and 20. Among the attractions will be public speaking by men of State and National reputation, races open to all comers for all classes and ages; foot races and all kinds of athletic sports; baseball games by first class teams on both days; good band music and pavilion for dancing; abundance of ice water and shade on the ground.

Sulphur is an avowed candidate as a location for the capital of the new State when Guthrie's congressional lease expires. The Commercial Club has set the capital boom on foot and declares that Sulphur will be a candidate for the location seven years hence.

The grading of the Wichita Valley railroad is within a few miles of Stamford and will be completed within a very short time, after which the laying of steel will be pushed.
