## C-City Takes Brownfield

# Wolf Victory By 28-7!

Colorado High Wolves carted home a victory over Brownfield High Cubs, winning 28-7 in Cub territory Friday night.

It was the second win for the Wolves who now stand 2-1 in the season's district contest, relishing 2 victories under their belts.

Most of the action came in second half. First half ended 7-7 but second half saw the Wolves get on the ball. Brilliant defense held the Cubs scoreless through third and fourth quarters.

Outstanding on defense were the "front four" Wolves—Scott Hudson, Tommy J. Gueker, Wesley Smith, and Joe Kirschbaum who recovered one telling Cub fumble.

Carl Devorce, middle line-backer, was another stand-out on Wolf defense.

Randy Riley, Alfredo Guerrero, David Garcia, and Larry Holder intercepted Cub passes to add to the fun.

Holder, split end, grabbed a 20 yard pass tossed by Steve Vest, Wolf quarterback, to score the first Wolf touchdown with 10:29 to go in second quarter after a see-saw first quarter. Cary May kicked for the extra point.

David Garcia, halfback, picked up a Cub fumble to end a Cub drive to the Wolf 28 yard line. But the Cubs came back with 3 seconds left in the half with a 40 yard flashy run by Richard Lepard, quarterback, to score for the Cubs. Kick

was good and it was a stand-off 7-7, at locker room time.

First 10 minutes of third quarter was strictly a defensive battle. Then Vest drove over from the 2 yard line to score. May's kick for the extra point went wide to the left and third quarter ended 13-7 in favor of the Wolves.

Fourth quarter was the real pay-off for the Wolves. Garcia took a neat pitchout from Vest. What followed was good for a TV re-play in slow motion.

Garcia fumbled the ball in

a dead run, picked it up on the first bounce and galloped 36 yards for the TD. Two points were added when Vest clicked with a pass to Ricky Sorenson, tight end. Score was 21-7.

Only 15 seconds stood on the clock when Garcia scored again from the Cub 16 on a quick hit right up the middle. May's kick was good again to bring the final score to 28-7.

Statistics column tells the story of the District AAA contest and the second straight victory for the Wolves.

Wolves had 18 first downs to only 3 for the Cubs. Wolves completed 8 passes of 28 tries for a total of 131 yards. Cubs failed to connect with a pass. Wolves had 3 intercepted.

Colorado City made 156 yards rushing to a total of 131 for Brownfield.

On the debit side, Wolves lost 4 fumbles, while the Cubs lost 2 fumbles.

Wolves played the entire game with just one penalty for 15 yards. Cubs were set back a total of 61 yards on penalties. Colorado High punted 6 times for an average of 27.8 yards, with Brownfield punting 10 times to average 26.3.

Coach Truman Nix, his staff and the home team will spend this week gunning for Snyder Tigers Friday night, Oct. 3, when the wily Tigers invade Wolf Stadium.

Snyder stands 1 win, 1 loss, 1 tie. They beat Dunbar High of Lubbock Friday night 13-10 at Snyder. They lost to Lamesa Tornados and tied the highly-touted team from Estacado of Lubbock.

Kick-off time is 7:30 p.m. when Wolves face the Tigers in the crucial contest, here Friday.

The wreck occurred at 5:19 a.m. Thursday.

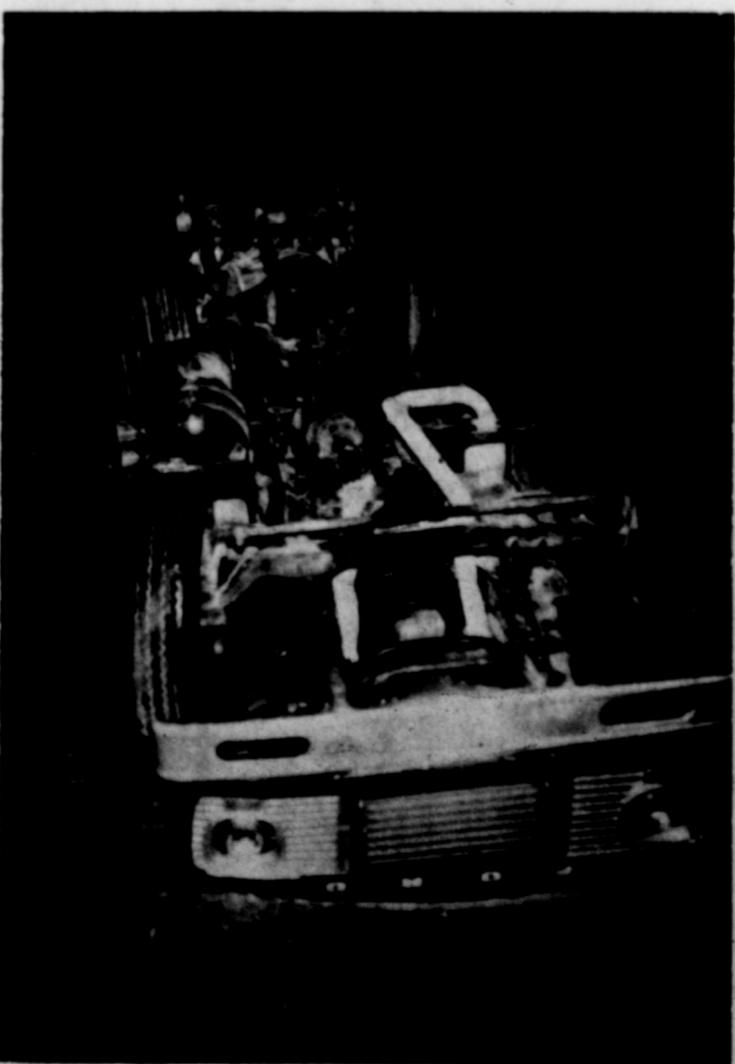
Corky Houston, 1436 Elm St., was driving a Dowell dump truck loaded with sand, and turned into Highway 208 from the Dowell private access road.

## Safety Training For West Texas

Second practical course on emergency care and transportation of the sick and injured to be held in this West Texas Area is scheduled October 7, 8, and 9, at the Angelo State University in the Student Academic Center, San Angelo.

Invited to attend the three-day course of lectures and demonstrations are ambulance attendants, policemen, firemen, safety engineers, rescue squads, nurses, public health, civil defense, and other officials or private citizens dealing with the handling of persons who are sick or injured due to accidents.

This course is given free of charge and is expected to attract attendance from a seventy-five

mile area around San Angelo. It is given by the Texas State Department of Health and the Tom Green Eight County Medical Society.

Death rate from accidental injuries can be reduced by improved training of emergency personnel, according to Dr. Robert Franken, a San Angelo doctor who is acting as program chairman for the training school.

On Monday of this week it was brought to Mr. Sadler's attention that we needed stop signs at the intersection of 4th and Cypress Streets.

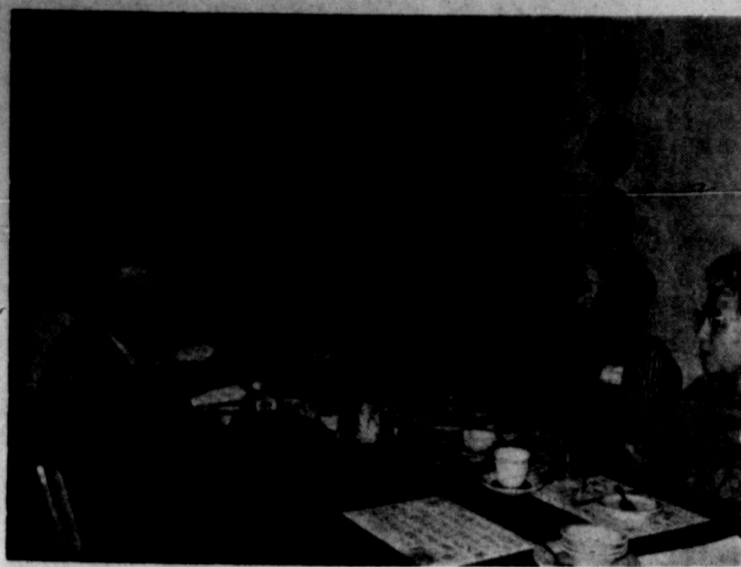
Within 24 hours the stop signs had been erected. It is certainly gratifying to know that our community has a city department that works with such promptness, courtesy, and efficiency.

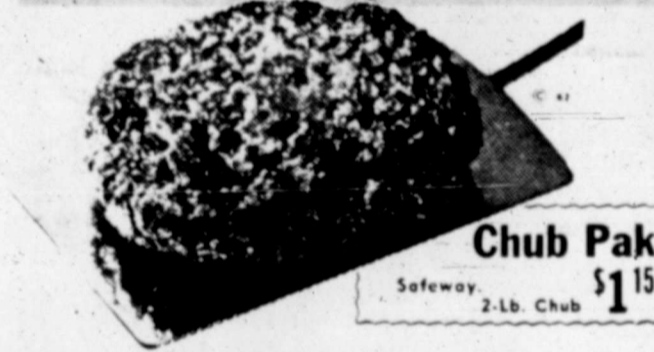

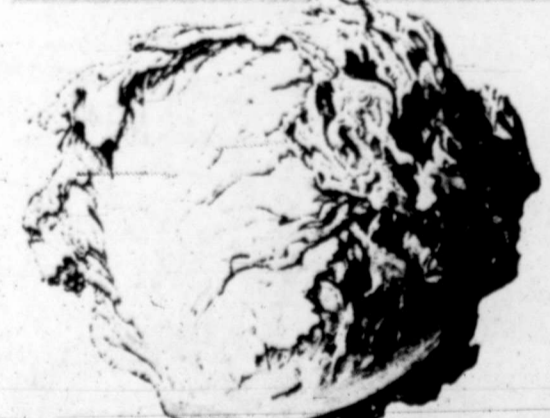

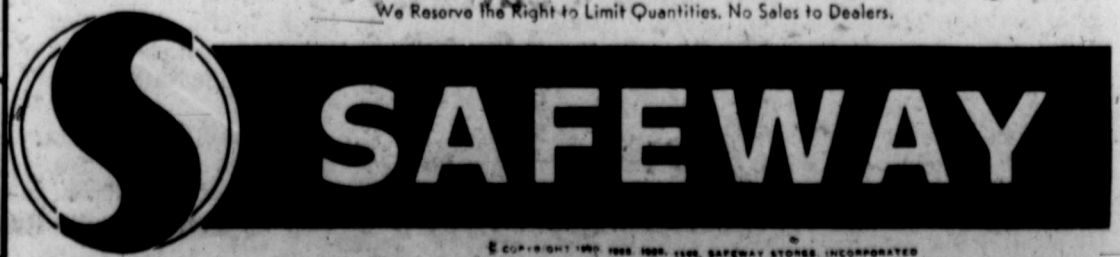

GIVING advice is one of the consolation prizes for getting older.

Advice is one of the easiest things in the world to offer... and one of the hardest things there is to accept and act upon.

Advice can be an awful waste of time, nearly always, because it is natural for the normal human being to insist on making his own brand of mistakes.

Course, after one makes all or most of the mistakes which come along to tempt, it then becomes time to give good advice about what not to do.

Advice is a kind of one-way street, traveled mostly by advice givers while the advice takers decide on a detour.

CAME across a whole page of quotations concerning advice. That was responsible for the above paragraph of observations on advice as Conversation feels about it.

Josh Billings, famous wit, put it in other ways. "Advice is like castor oil, easy enough to give but dreadfully hard to take," he said.

Billings also opined that "Advice is a drug on the market; the supply always exceeds the demand."

Frank McKinney Hubbard is quoted as advising "If you want to get rid of somebody, just tell 'em something for their own good."

President Harry S. Truman once vowed "I have found the best way to give advice to children is to find out what they want and then advise them to do it."

OSCAR WILDE, English author whose humor was usually a bit on the caustic side, took another view.

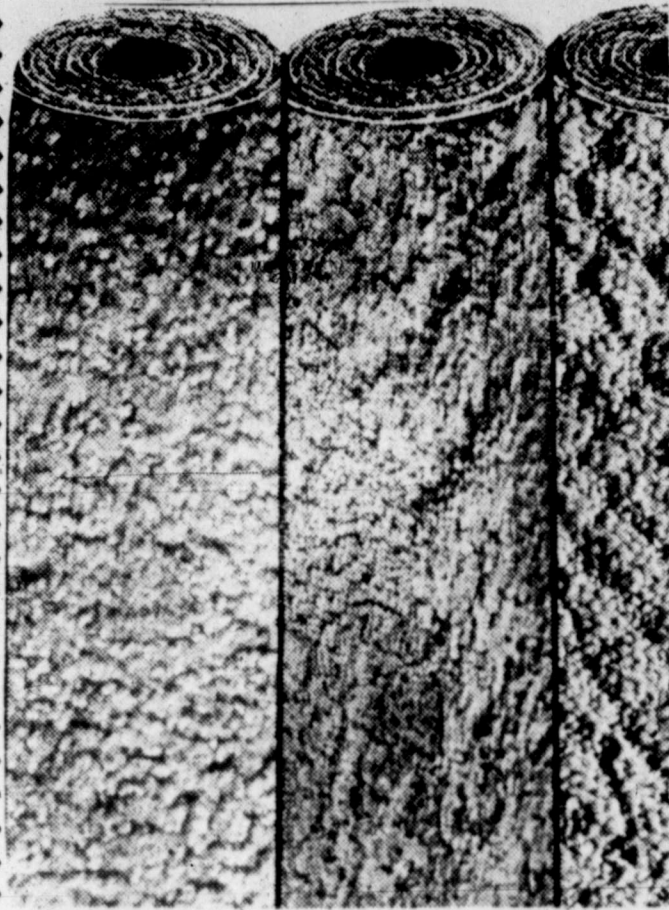

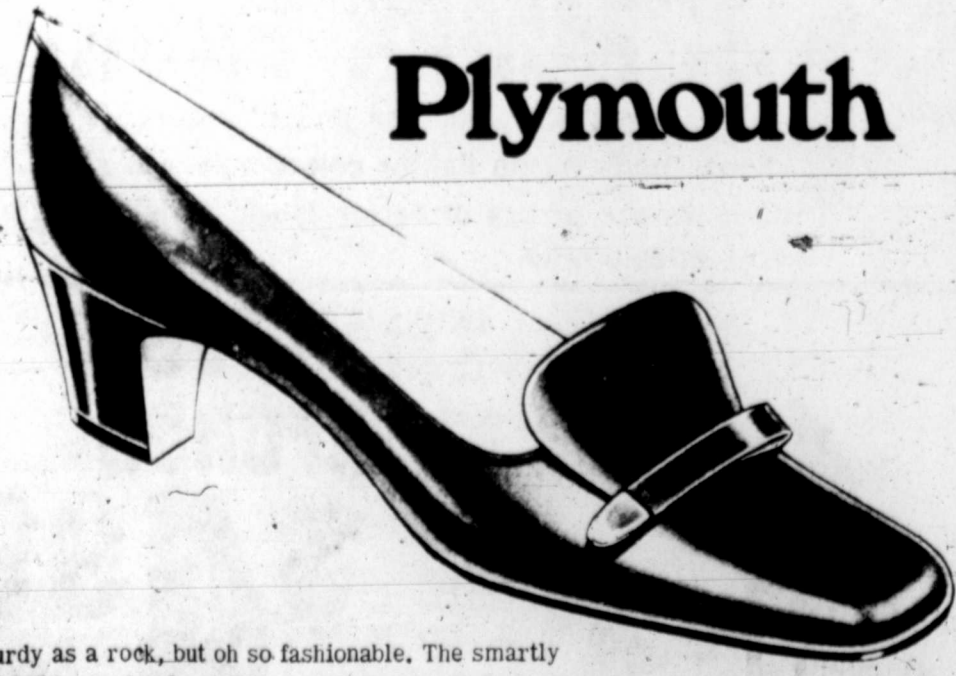

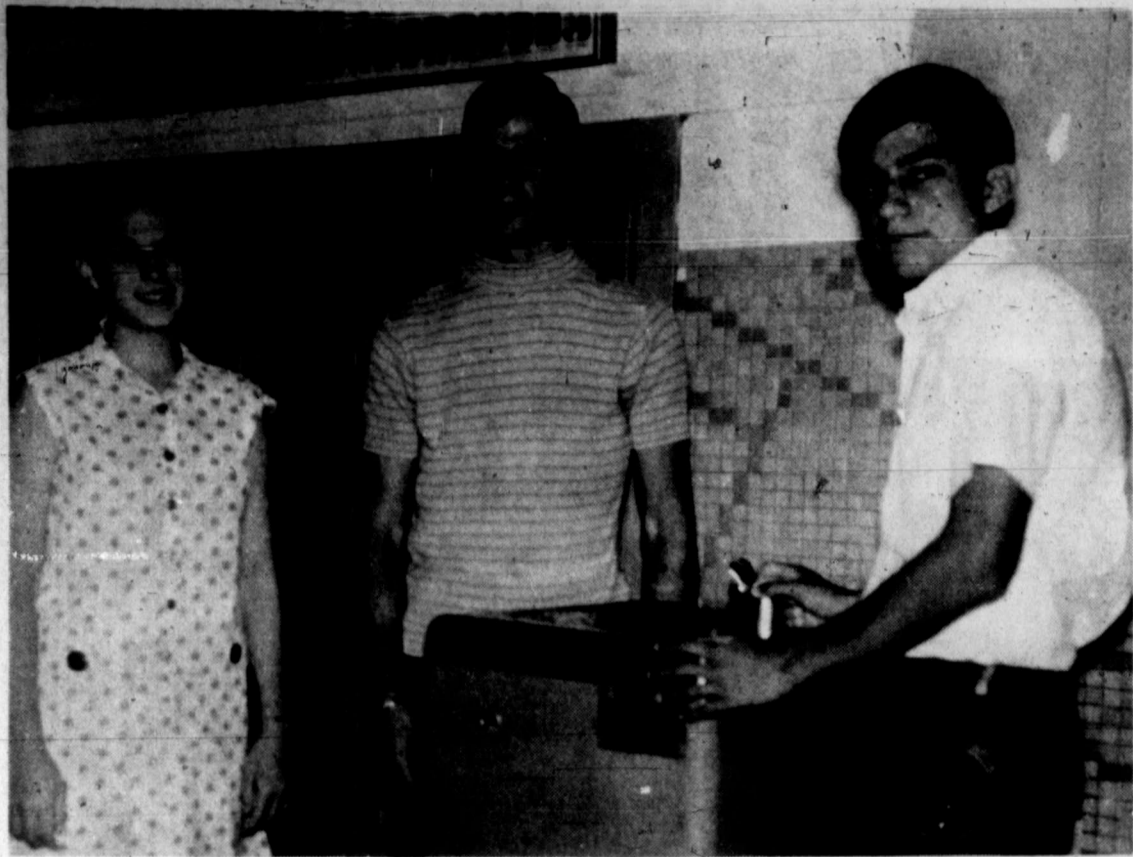

## City, County Officials Speak At Women's Federation Meet

Comments from five city and county officials Tuesday afternoon highlighted a panel discussion for Mitchell County Federation of Women's Club in Hesperian Room of Mitchell County Public Library.

Panel moderator was Mrs. Dennis Wright.

The five panel members were J. A. Sadler, Jr., city manager; Mrs. Bob Shamburger, coordinator of Community Action Program; Dr. Bill Bridgford, chairman of Operation Pride activities; County Judge Elmer Martin and Chamber of Commerce manager Sefton Pickens.

Mrs. Shamburger reported

that CAP deals with social programs in which unwanted conditions affecting local people can be eliminated by community efforts.

She said CAP helps persons to gain skills, have better homes, to help themselves.

Among projects of the local CAP discussed by Mrs. Shamburger were job placement, register jobs wanted, adult basic education, consumer education, possibilities of day care center and tutoring programs.

Sadler talked about the recently acquired 55 acres to be added to the city park at

Lake Colorado City effective Jan. 1, 1970, and plans for improving the acreage.

He also spoke of the needed support of town's people in improving city, the sanitary landfill in operation now, water quality board and the master plan for the city's parks, schools, buildings, and city maintenance.

Judge Martin emphasized the county government cooperates with city and other groups and that the county operates on a "pay as you go" basis.

"The county has 500 miles of roads and highways to maintain," the judge reported, "and the county government is now in the process of purchasing for mental health facilities, Circuit Riders and additional county branches.

In concluding his remarks Judge Martin encouraged Federation Club women to be concerned, be involved and work together.

Chamber manager Pickens reported that the local chamber of commerce is made up of volunteer workers except from the manager and secretary positions and there "is now more cooperation in Colorado City than ever before."

"Successes of the chamber is due to response of the people," he emphasized.

Dr. Bridgford said that enthusiasm is waning in Operation Pride activities.

"It takes time and money to tear down or fix old run-down buildings."

He paid tribute to local persons saying, "So far Operation Pride has not been turned down once by residents asked to assist in the project."

Master plan of the committee will be to up-date codes and ordinances of the city.

Bridgford emphasized that Pride's goal is to make downtown look like a shopping center with off-street parking, etc. He said other committees have been contacted about how they solved the same problems.
