BREMEN IS REPORTED SUNK WITH TROOPS

SURVIVOR OF BRITISH SHIP GIVES STORY

"Same Old Swindle" Is Response of German Sources

LONDON, April 18 (AP).—The Exchange Telegraph news agency today quoted a Norwegian survivor of the torpedoed British steamer Stancliffe as saying the German liner Bremen had been sunk off Norway with 15,000 troops.

The seaman, named Rudigen, was saved after the Stancliffe was torpedoed off the north Scottish coast last Friday.

The agency quoted Rudigen as saying that a telegram announcing the safe arrival at a Norwegian port had been found in the Bremen captain's pocket and that it was sent to Germany by Norwegian authorities.

German sources said today they had no information on the liner, but the latest report sounds like "the same old swindle which has been frequently revived by the British."

Pryor Re-Called By Church of the Nazarene

The Rev. Luther Pryor, for 13 years pastor of the Church of the Nazarene in Cisco, last night was re-called for three more years of service by a vote of the church membership, which lacked only two or three being unanimous.

The Rev. Mr. Pryor came to Cisco from Wellington, and his pastorate has been marked with extraordinary success, including removal of the church from east to west Cisco, enlargement and reconstruction of the building as a rock-venered edifice, a several hundred per cent increase in membership and a great improvement in the spiritual life of the church.

OFFICERS OF ROTARY CLUB ARE ELECTED

Nance Named President to Succeed Sutton Crofts

Garland "Pete" Nance was elected president of the Cisco Rotary club by acclamation today, when Edward "Red" Lee, present vice president of the club, withdrew his name from nomination and asked that the club elect Nance unopposed. There was a considerable discussion among club members concerning the proper parliamentary method of accomplishing what Rotarian Lee proposed, but it was finally accomplished by a series of votes which apparently elected Rotarian Nance half a dozen times to the same office.

When A. C. "Deacon" Green proposed to withdraw his name from nomination as vice president and elect Lee Heltzel by acclamation, the club got itself involved in another parliamentary tangle, whereupon, E. L. "Doc" Graham took the floor and demanded to know why so much formality was necessary in such a small club, and why the wishes of the various candidates couldn't be followed without a congressional debate.

President Sutton Crofts, who has been chewing the corners of his mustaches in perplexity, took the dilemma by the horns and resolved it in the currently popular dictatorial fashion. He said: "I am going to accept Red's withdrawal, because he gave a good reason, but I am not going to accept Deacon's because he didn't. We will have to have at least one race out of this."

In the voting Lee won the race over "Deacon" by a narrow margin and was declared elected vice president.

The remainder of the officers presented no contests, H. H. Monk being re-elected secretary-treasurer unopposed, and R. N. Cluck, Gary L. Smith and Ernest Hittson being elected directors. President Crofts will become a director automatically upon retiring from the presidency.

The club directed that President-elect Nance be its delegate to the Sweetwater district conference.

Rotarian Heltzel presented Melvin Sandler in two piano numbers and Miss Mickey Howell, winner of high school declamation in the district league contest at Breckenridge, who read the poem with which she won first place.

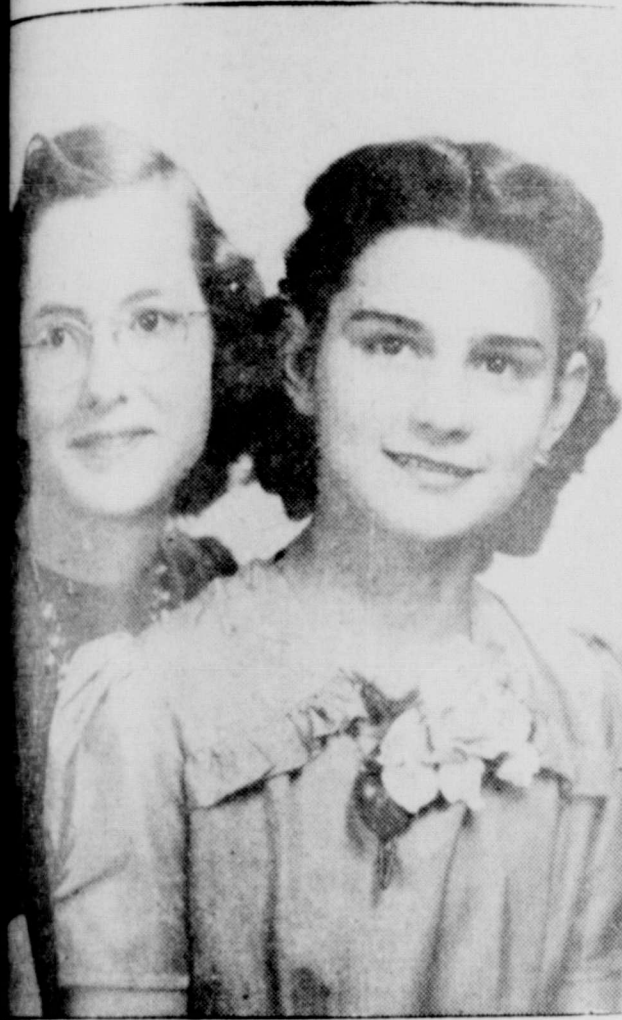
MUCH IMPROVED

Olaf Trygvason Fights Again

THERE was a great king once in Norway,
giant, red-bearded, Olaf Trygvason.
Down out of those legendary days of Vikings
and sea-corsairs, comes a story, told around
every Norse fireside, a story that is probably
remembered in the hills where the Norwe-
gian men of today are rallying to defend
their olden land.

Olaf was king of Norway by the right by
which men first became kings—he was the
strongest and ablest. He was so dextrous
and skillful that he could walk along the
oars outside his ship as the rowers worked

them; or he could juggle three sharp swords,
catching each in turn by the hilt. So rugged
was he that he climbed the Smalsor Horn,
and hung his shining shield atop the peak
no man had climbed before.

BORN of an exiled mother and a murdered
father, Olaf grew up in Russia, and at
19 became a sea-rover in the Baltic. All the
coasts of Scotland, England, Ireland, the
Hebrides and Wales knew the terror of his
forays. He even entered the Thames and at-
tacked London, but was fought and bought
off. In the Scilly Islands he was converted
to Christianity.

Returning to his own land he found it
in a state of rebellion, and quickly won elec-
tion as king. His first task was to Christian-
ize the country. His deeds as king formed
the subject for the skalds, or heroic poets,
whose works persist today.

There came war with Denmark, and
Olaf was tricked into a bad position with
only part of his fleet. He scorned to flee.
High on the quarterdeck of the Long Serpent,
with a gilt shield, golden helmet, and bright
red coat, he was a mark for all eyes, all wea-
pons. After a long and bloody day of battle,
the Serpent was finally surrounded and
boarded, and her defenders hewn down.

Olaf Trygvason leaped into the sea and
was never seen again in Norway. There
were legends that he escaped, that he would
return.

THE resolute defense of the utterly unpre-
pared Norwegians shows that the spirit,
at least, of their national hero Olaf Trygva-
son did not die.

As the English soldiers saw the angels
a. Mons, as the flaming spirit of Jeanne d'Arc
appeared in the clouds to Frenchmen stand-
ing in the shambles of Verdun, so it is likely
that to some of the Norse civilian-warriors,
rallying in the mountains to defend their an-
cient land, the spirit of red-bearded Olaf
with his defiant golden shield and helmet
may be as good as visible.

grown cattle, farm implements,
two Ford cars, household and
kitchen furniture and \$300 in cash.
The court was apprised that the
parties had agreed to a property
settlement of their community in-
terests in which the defendant
should be awarded custody of the
children, all of the 323 acres of
land for their support, \$200 of the
cash on hand, the 1937 Ford, 20
head of cattle and their calves,
three head of horses, all of the

household and kitchen furniture.
It was agreed that the plaintiff
should have the remainder of the
community property. The court
finds that there is 320 acres of
land, the separate property of
plaintiff, inherited from his fa-
ther. It was the decree of the
court that the agreement of parties
should be, and is hereby rat-
ified, confirmed and made a part
of this judgment.

J. E. Pratt vs. Wichita Falls &
Southern Railway Co., damages.
The court granted until April 20
for filing statement of facts.

Mary Lou Lindley vs. John H.
Lindley, divorce. Judgment for
plaintiff for divorce and custody
of minor child.

Appeals Court Mandate Filed

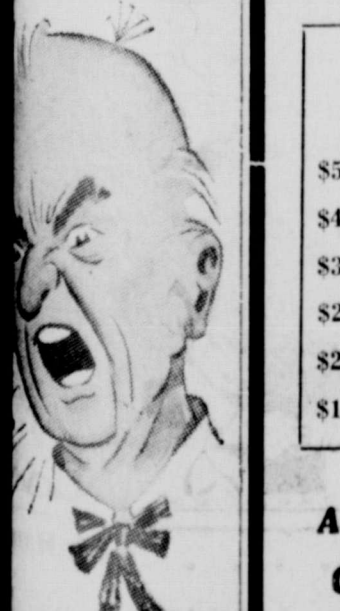

In announcing his candidacy for justice of the peace, Precinct 6, today, R. W. H. (Judge) Kennon made the following statement:

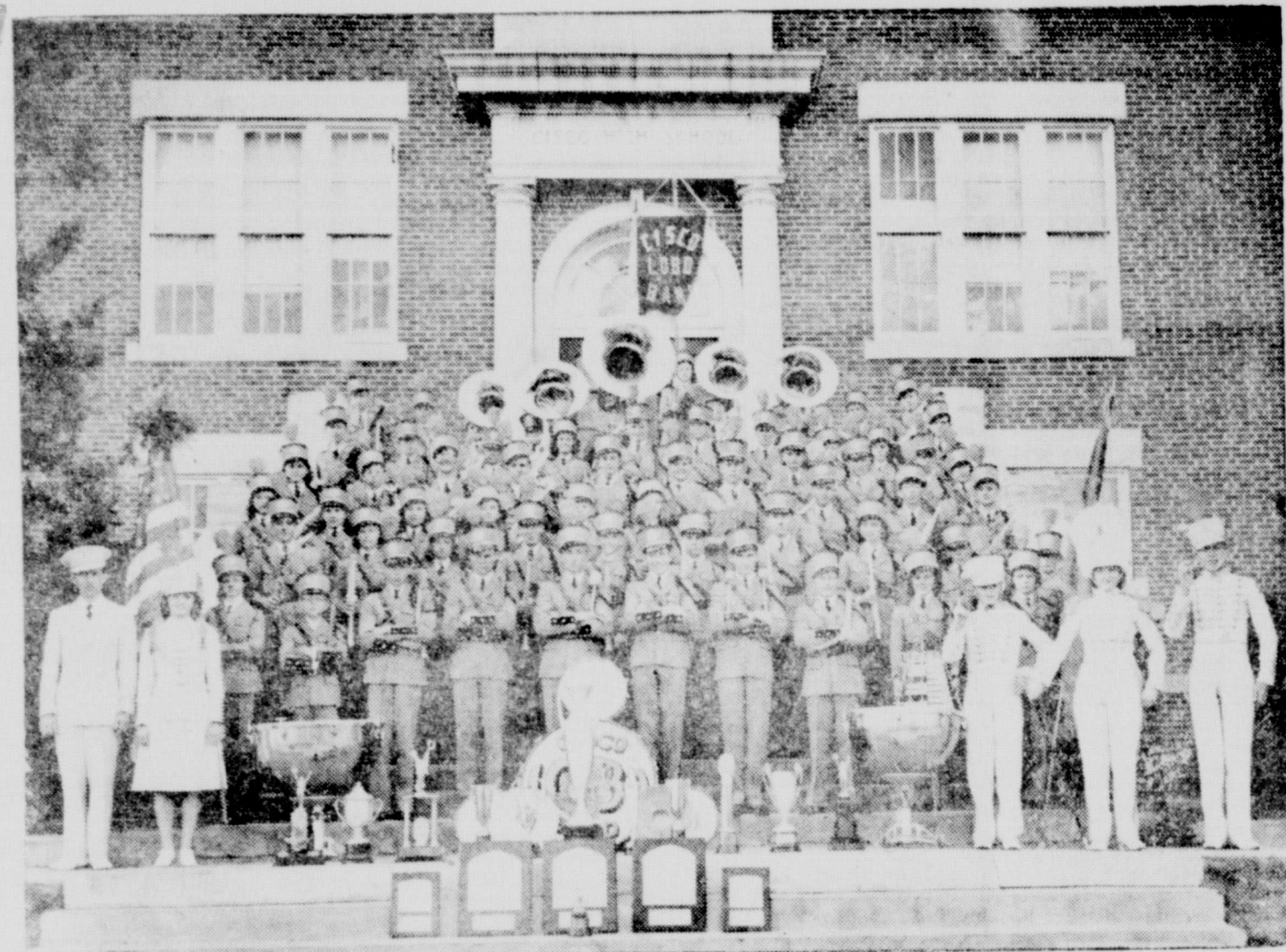

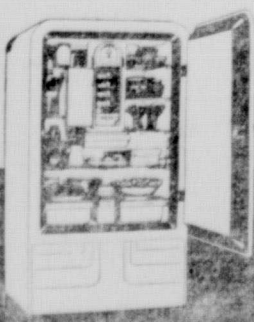

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Peanut Plant To Be Built at Gorman

GORMAN, April 18. — The
Southwestern Peanut Growers as-
sociation will start construction in
Gorman within the next two
weeks on \$25,000 worth of im-
provements, according to Dick
Weekes, manager of the associa-
tion. Office facilities will be con-
structed the first thing, stated Mr.
Weekes, and as soon as this is
completed, work on two ware-
houses and a building for the fer-
tilizer plant will be started. The
peanut mill will be erected fol-
lowing these.

Mr. Weekes and a number of
the board of directors of the or-
ganization returned from an in-
spection trip to Georgia and Ala-
bama, where they went in the in-
terest of the fertilizer plant and
they were highly pleased with the
results they found along this line.

It has been decided by the di-
rectors that the fertilizer plant
will be constructed first, due to
the fact that it will be necessary
for the association to buy chemi-
cals and other things necessary in
the manufacture of fertilizer, in
July of this year, and in order to
do that and be ready for the sale
of the products during the next
year, it was decided best to build
this mill first.

Changed Plans
The directors have also changed
plans in regard to the warehouse
facilities and instead of one ware-
house with 1,500 tons capacity,
they will erect two, with a total
capacity of 2,000 tons. These build-
ings will be of sheet iron and con-
crete.

The fertilizer plant will be con-
structed of native stone or brick
and will be two stories, one below
and one above the ground. Due
to the activity of certain chemicals
it will be necessary to house the
fertilizer plant in either a frame
or stone or brick structure, and
present plans call for a stone or
brick structure.

The office building will be a
one-story building, separate and
apart from the mills, and will be
of either stone or brick construc-
tion, with ample space for all of-
fices allowed for. Temporary of-
fices will be established in Gor-
man shortly, according to Mr.

Sesbania Plant Advocated as Aid to Quail

AUSTIN, April 18 (Spe).—Ses-
bania, a plant which as a nitro-
gen fixing growth builds up soil,
but which is not eaten by cattle
or horses, is being widely advo-
cated by the Texas Game, Fish
and Oyster commission as an ex-
cellent food producer for quail
and several other species of wild-
life. It also furnishes good cover.

Sesbania is being sown on most
of the nearly fifty quail demonstra-
tion projects set up recently in
many parts of the state by the
game department. Numerous land-
owners interested in having larger
supplies of bobwhites and other
species of wildlife are also plant-
ing sesbania seeds.

Sesbania, game department bi-
ologists have found, does well
broadcast or planted in strips. It
is especially valuable as a late
winter and early spring food,
when there is little vegetation
upon which wildlife can feed.

Plantings of sesbania need not
be fenced due to the fact that
it is not eaten by cattle, horses
or deer. In many areas it is not
necessary to disc the soil before
planting the seed. It can be plant-
ed in out-of-way corners, in strips
along the edge of cultivated fields
and along ditch banks. May and
June are the best months in which
to sow this valuable wildlife food-
producing plant. Strips fifteen
yards wide are considered exceed-
ingly valuable. Not only is the
plant beneficial to quail, but it
has been found that when plant-
ed on the banks of ponds that it
provides food for ducks, improves
the appearance of pond banks,
and provides some shade for fish.

Prairie chickens also make use
of the plants' seeds for food.
Sesbania seed is not expensive.
It can be purchased from the larg-

18-Year Age Rule Adopted by AA Schools

AUSTIN, April 18 (AP).—By a
vote of 70 to 21 superintendents
of high schools in the Class AA
division of the Interscholastic
league adopted a new 18-year age
limit for football players, effec-
tive next term.

Schools with 500 or more stu-
dents enrolled compete in the top
bracket of league classifications.
The superintendents voted in a
referendum in which Class A,
Class B and six-man football
schools retained, with revisions,
the 19-year limit which bases eli-
gibility on eight semesters of at-
tendance rather than age.

Class A schools rejected the 18-
year proposal by a vote of 137 to
113; Class B schools by a 150 to
54 vote and six-man football
schools by 64 to 30 count.

The poll grew out of the dis-
cussion which followed the pro-
posal for the 18-year rule by the
league's executive committee.

The new rule for Class AA fol-
lows:
"Effective for the school term
of 1940-41, the four-year rule and
semester rule shall be abolished
and the age rule shall read: No
one shall take part in any football
contest who, on the first day of
September preceding the contest
has reached or passed his eight-
eenth birthday."

The revised 19-year-old rule
reads: "No pupil who has been in
attendance in high school for eight
semesters or more shall be eligible
for participation, semesters to be
counted from the eighth grade in
11-grade schools semesters and
from the ninth grade in 12-grade
systems; and the age rule shall
read: "No one shall take part in
any football contest who, on the
first day of September preceding
the contest, has reached or passed
his nineteenth birthday."

The rules apply only to football
competition.

FOUR LETTERMEN

With adoption of the 18-year
age limit rule and abolition of the

semester rule in Class AA foot-
ball four lettermen from last
year's Lobo football team became
eligible for play with the Lobos
next fall. They are Coy Warren,
James Qualis, Jibby Donovan,
Alton Lomax and Frank Nor-
ris. The Lobo squad is said to
be the strongest in many years.

It faces one of the toughest sched-
ules in years, too, with games to
be played with Childress, Burk-
burnett, Sweetwater, San Angelo
and Eastland, Mineral Wells, Ran-
ger and Stephenville in confer-
ence play.

her war with Germany, a different situation was presented.

Relations Strained

American relations with Japan have been strained since her invasion of China. Widespread demands for an embargo on shipments, especially war supplies, to the island empire and a boycott upon her essential silk exports were raised. When it was found that the Japanese-American commercial treaty of 1911 would prevent any such action, the treaty was abrogated by the United States, after legal notice.

It expired in January. No embargo has been imposed, or other action taken. Since then, commercial relations with Japan have been upon a day-to-day basis.

The broad basis of Hull's statement was his confidence that no matter what happened to Holland, the East Indies, with their population of 60 millions, were capable of governing themselves. For some years, the islands have had virtually a dominion status.

Important to the American economy as are the imports of tin and rubber, Hull referred to the fact that other nations as well depend upon the East Indies for their supplies and these commodities.

"Any change in the status of the Netherlands Indies would directly affect the interests of many countries," he said. He also pointed out:

"The Netherlands Indies are very important in the international relationships of the whole Pacific ocean. The islands themselves extend for a distance of approximately 3,200 miles east and west astride of the equator, from the Indian ocean on the west far into the Pacific ocean on the east.

"They are also an important factor in the commerce of the whole world. They produce considerable portions of the world's supplies of important essential commodities, such as rubber, tin, quinine, copra, etc. Many countries, leading in camping, aquatics and sea scouting, assistant executive and finally in his present capacity on the national staff, Sea Scouts Conduct School.

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
