Continuing Showers Slow Agriculture Over Sector

Thunder showers keep falling over the Cross Plains area, and have slowed the pace of the area's agricultural industry considerably.

Since the first of May 5.95 inches of rain has been gauged in Cross Plains. On election day, May 1, 1.15 inches fell, followed by 2.10 inches on May 5. A few light sprinkles fell before a thunder-filled early morning Thursday of last week yielded 1.50 inches. Another .39 of an inch was recorded in early morning showers Monday and Tuesday.

The 5.05 received to noon Tuesday almost equals the total measured through the first four months of 1982 when 5.85 inches were recorded.

Although still welcomed by most, the rains have slowed agricultural activity, and could pose a threat to wheat crop.

Ranchers and stockmen are happy with the moisture benefitting pasture grasses and yielding some runoff for stock water in earthen tanks. In some areas tanks are now full, while more rain is needed in others to fill the ponds.

For the most part gardeners are still welcoming the rains, although again weeds and grass are gaining a foothold in some vegetable patches and flower gardens.

Grain farmers say that the continued wet weather is causing rust in some of the later planted wheat, while other fields are nearing harvest stage. Combining could begin in two to three weeks, depending on the weather, one observer said Tuesday. Another grain producer and observer of the agricultural scene said wheat crop could be about average on a depressed market.

Some peanut producers are try-

ing to get the goobers in the ground in the next few days, but it was noted that the rain has delayed planting. To other producers who customarily plant later, it has prevented readying land. Still another observer estimated that peak planting is still two weeks away.

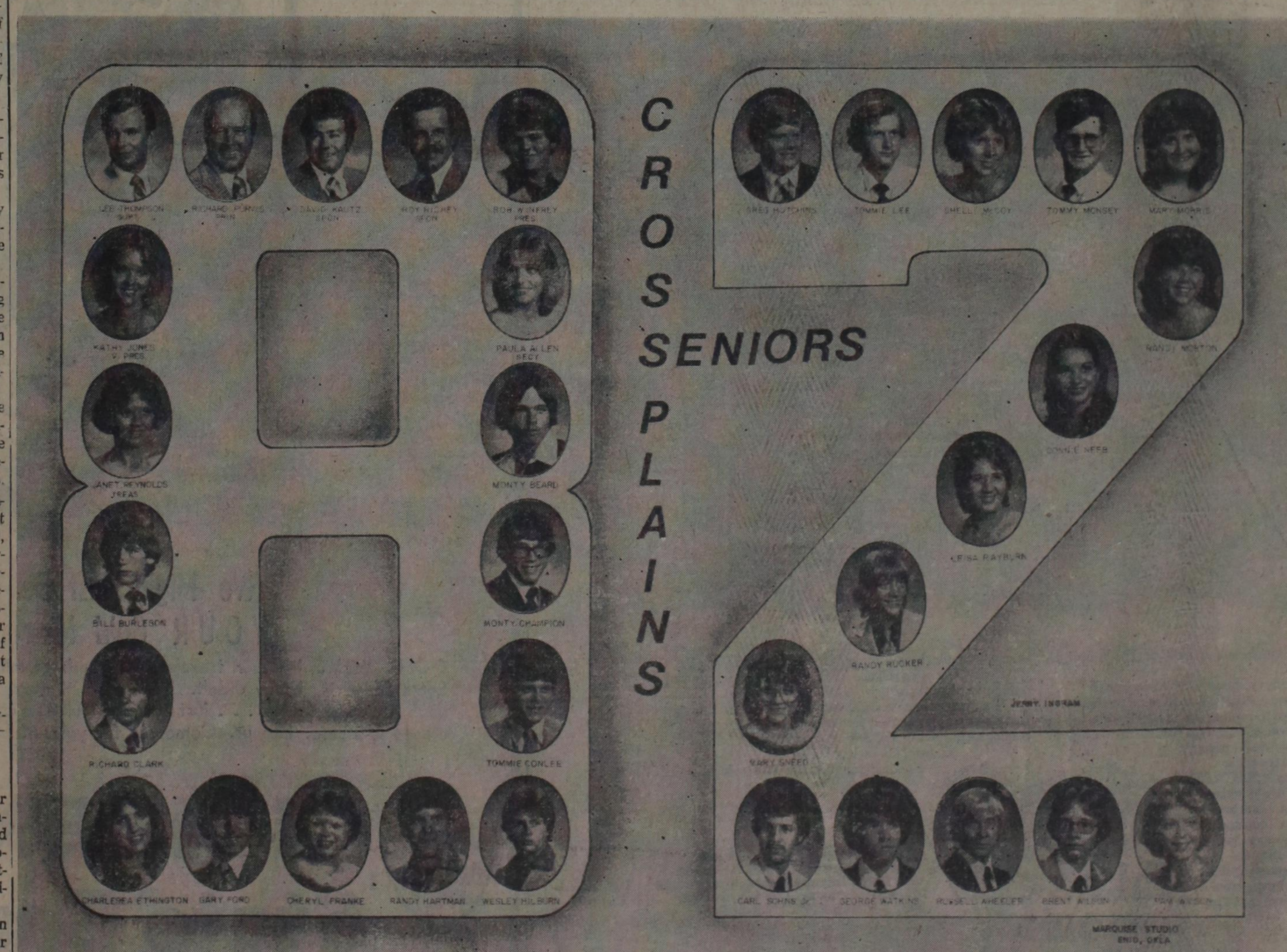
CLASS OF 1982 — Pictured above in a cleverly designed layout is the major portion of the

School Ending Exam Slate Is Revealed

Classes for the 1981-82 school year at Cross Plains Schools are in last days.

A schedule released by school officials showed last day for seniors to be Thursday, May 20, with graduation Friday night.

Monday and Tuesday, May 24 and 25, will be final exam days for seventh grade through high school. Those dates will be normal school days for kindergarten through sixth grade. All classes will be dismissed at 2:45 p.m. on Tuesday and buses will run at that time.

Students taking finals are advised they should have a green book card prior to starting the test.

Monday's test schedule follows: 8:20 to 10:15 a.m. first period; 10:20 to 12:15 p.m. third period; 12:45 to 2:15 p.m. fifth period, and 2:20 to 3:45 p.m. seventh period.

Tuesday's slate is 8:20 to 10:15 a.m. second period; 10:20 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. fourth period, and 12:45 to 2:45 p.m. sixth period.

Mixed Drink Tax Yields City \$227

City of Cross Plains' share of the 15 per cent of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within the township confines during the first calendar quarter of 1982 totaled \$227.69.

That was rebated from a 10 per cent tax on mixed drinks collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission which totaled \$1,517.93 in Cross Plains during January, February and March.

Callahan County got \$253.65 as its 15 per cent rebate of mixed drink sale total in the county. That figure was higher than that of Cross Plains, because 10 per cent tax collected in Baird during the same period amounted to \$173.08. Baird got \$25.96 as its share.

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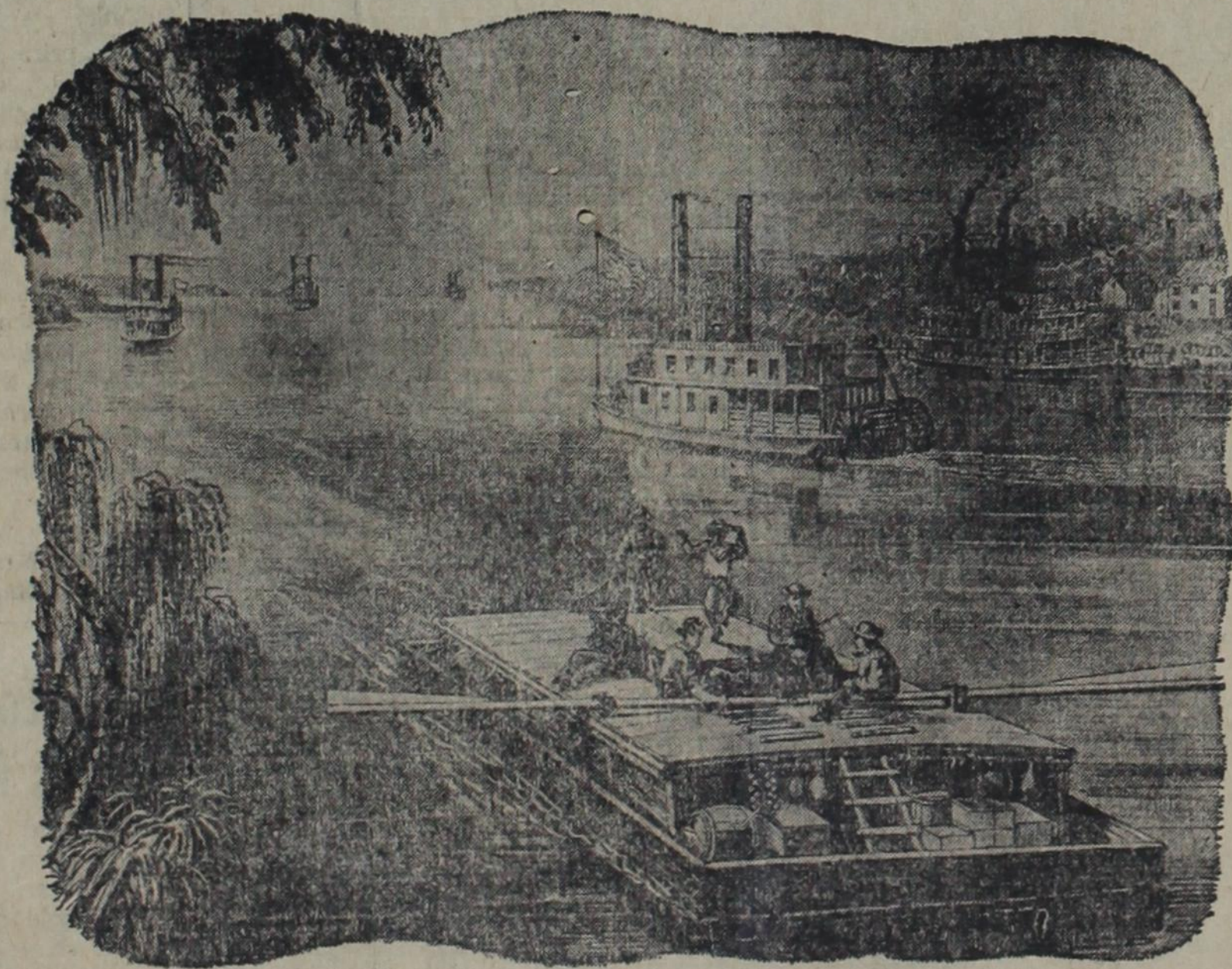

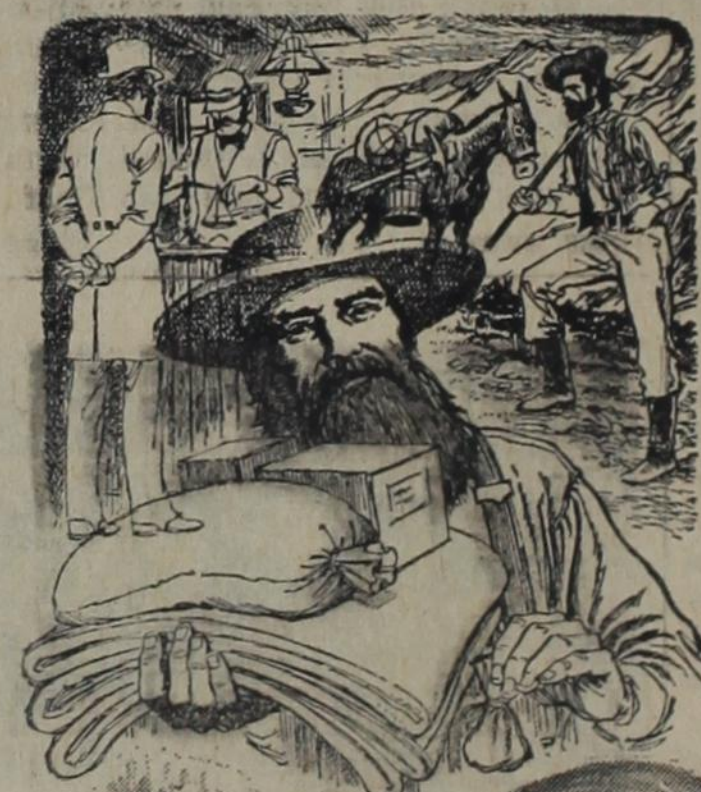

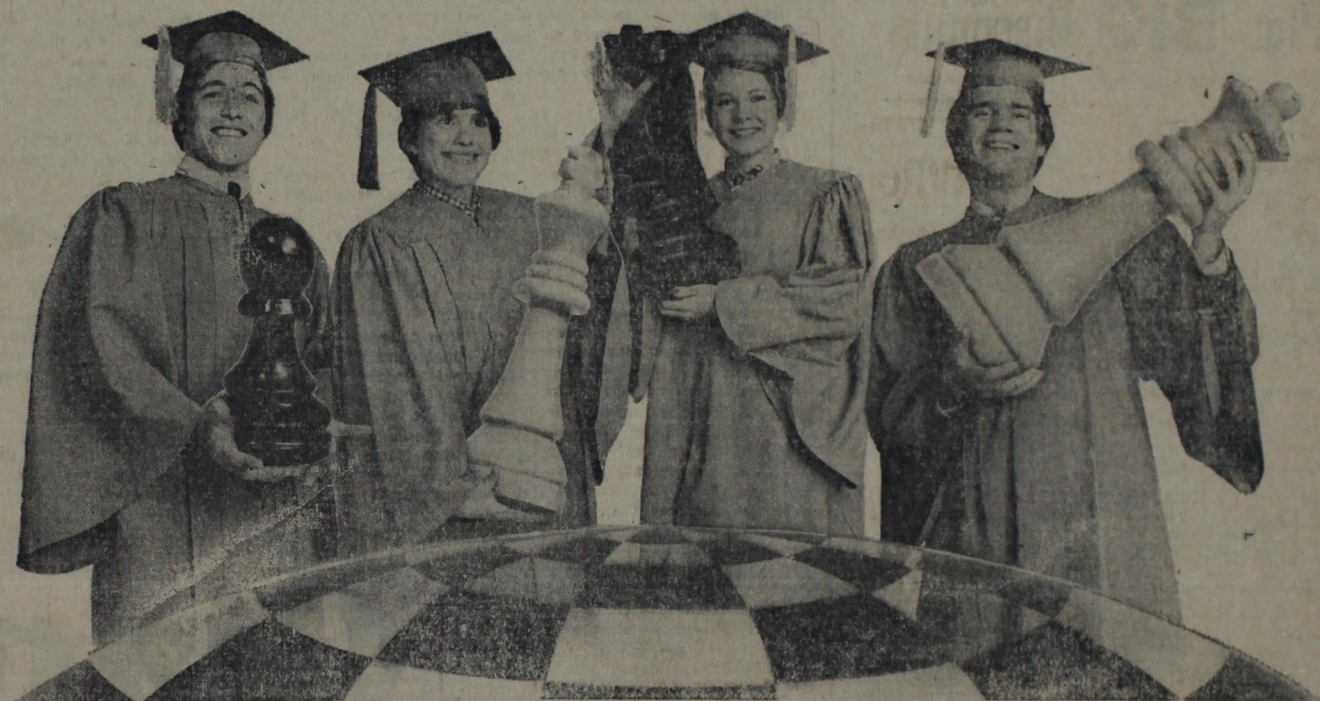

Garden Club Member Says Orchid's Bloom Durable

Long life is an outstanding aspect of this bloom, says the Society of American Florists.

Orchids in corsages have a life expectancy of 10 days, and on a potted plant up to a month. To preserve in your corsage overnight after wearing it, return to box or bag and place in refrigerator. It can be "recycled" into a miniature "flower arrangement."

Using a tall, small vase, use florist foam and tape. A short wire piercing the stem may be retained to help support the orchid. Then add greenery snipped from your plant collection.

Many hybrid orchids make good house plants now that we are turning the thermostats down in winter and up in summer. Our vanilla flavoring comes from the seed pod.

In the 18th century the explorers in Europe mis-labeled the location and condition of temperature and

humidity, causing the hot houses to believe the orchid as difficult to grow. Happily the situation has changed.
