BLAST ENDS STRATOSPHERE FLIGHT TODAY

RAPID CITY, S. C., July 12.—
Man's most ambitious attempt on
the stratosphere ended in disaster
today as an explosion blew up the
huge gas bag of Explorer II, the
U. S. Army-National Geographic
Society craft before ever it had
mounted from the earth.

None was injured as the huge
envelope, capable of holding 3-
700,000 cubic feet of gas, when
fully expanded, tore open near
the top and permitted vast blue-
gray clouds of helium gas to es-
cape.

Although some 20 men were
trapped by the falling fabric all
but four escaped unaided and
these four were uninjured though
half smothered.

It will be impossible to deter-
mine what caused the destruction
of the balloon until the dew has dried
off and the bag stretched out and
examined.

It was the general opinion too
much strain had been placed on
the top fabric of the balloon caus-
ing the bag to rip open.

Texas Has More Land In Cotton Than Last Year

AUSTIN, July 12.—Texas had
1,357,000 acres of cotton planted
July 1, the federal crop and live-
stock division estimated today.

The acreage is 10.3 greater than
last year's final crop and five per
cent more than the 10,816,000 un-
der cultivation July 10, 1934. All
sections shared in the increased
planting.

DEFENSE PLANS IT'S FIGHT IN KIDNAP CASE

TACOMA, Wash., July 12.—
The defense brought up its heav-
iest guns today in its fight to ob-
tain for Margaret Waley, accused
in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping, the
freedom she fears will end in her
death.

Despite her fears that William
Mahan, fugitive kidnaper, will kill
her if she is released, defense at-
torneys tried to gain her acquittal
by presenting both the girl and
her husband, Harmon Waley, as
their star witnesses.

Waley, who has been waiting
two days for the chance to vindi-
cate his bride, will follow her on
the witness stand.

He will co-ordinate her story as
was intimidated into the kidnap-
ing by the threats of Mahan,
named as the brains of the \$200,
000 plot and now hunted all over
the United States as a public
enemy.

WOMAN SAYS CONVICTS ARE OVERWORKED

HOUSTON, July 12.—Texas
prisoners are worked as much as
14 hours daily and are given hard
labor in the sun, perhaps when un-
fitted for such work, Mrs. C. A.
Teagle, newly appointed member
of the prison board said today.

Mrs. Teagle's statement came
after W. A. Faddock, chairman of
the board, said there would be no
investigation of the deaths of five
convicts from sunstroke this week.

"There should be a system of
selecting men for the labor they
are fitted for. Men from cities
are put to hard labor in the sun
when they have never done man-
ual labor," Mrs. Teagle said.

Mrs. Teagle said she had received
many telephone calls and letters
in the past several weeks regard-
ing the prison system and that
she spent 17 days inspecting the
camps.

"The prisoners are worked as
long as 14 hours per day when
only 10 hours is permitted by law
in cases of emergency," she said.

OUTLAWING OF GOLD SUITS TO BE VOTED ON

WASHINGTON, July 12.—The
house banking and currency com-
mittee today voted to report favor-
ably the administration bill outlaw-
ing suits for payment of govern-
ment obligations on their former
gold basis.

The resolution provides for re-
demption of gold bonds and notes
in cash on a dollar-for-dollar basis
until Jan. 1, 1936. The secretary
of treasury may, at his discretion,
however, order cessation of this
redemption after Sept. 1, 1935.

Speaker Joseph W. Byrnes ex-
pected the resolution would be
brought to the floor next week.
The bill is high on President
Roosevelt's list of "must" legisla-
tion for this session.

ferent rule.

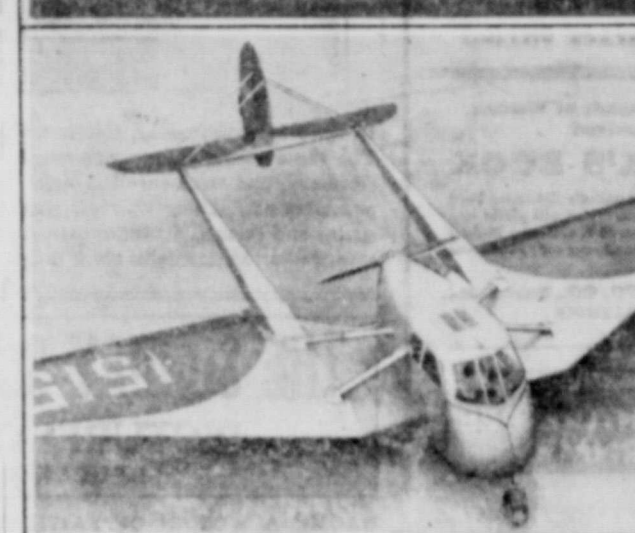
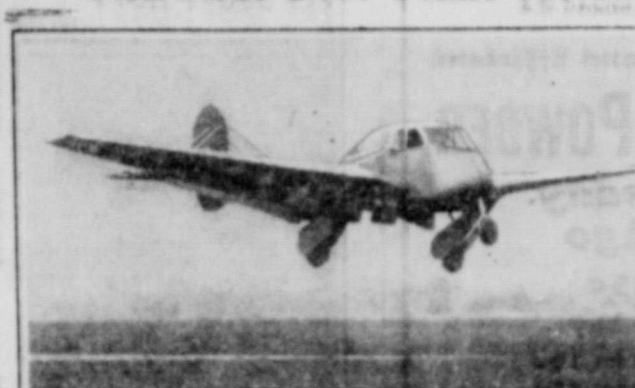
Whether the state would be any

signed by Dean Hammond, of Ypsilanti, Mich., 15 of these ships have
been built for the bureau of air commerce and given exhaustive tests.
The craft is of metal construction, with fabric-covered wings and tail
surface and will cruise at 100 miles an hour. The air-cooled engine is
mounted aft the two-place cabin and two of the three landing wheels
are behind the center of gravity.

WITNESSES IN PROBE TAKE STAND TODAY

Chairman of Public Utilities
Committee Is First
To Testify.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Pub-
lic utilities companies have spent
\$501,000 fighting the utility bill,
the senate lobby inquiry revealed
today as it started hearing with
breath-taking speed.

Chairman Hugo Black, Dem.,
Ala., summoned the newly ap-
pointed committee into executive
session to discuss methods of pro-
cedure and then suddenly opened
the doors and announced the in-
vestigation would start with the ap-
pearance of Philip Gadsden, Phila-
delphia, chairman of the com-
mittee of public utilities executives.

Gadsden testified his organiza-
tion was formed last February to
"protect our interests against the
bill."

He said 18 or 19 holding com-
pany groups had contributed about
\$300,000 to the committee and a
call had been sent out for \$50,000
additional.

"Is it true that letters were sent
out asking stockholders to con-
tribute 25 cents a share to defeat
this bill?" Black asked.

"Certainly not by my commit-
tee," Gadsden replied, adding that
if anything of that kind had been
done "I should think it might have
been the Federation of Utility In-
vestors of Chicago."

MELVIN PURVIS RESIGNS HIS G-MAN JOB

CHICAGO, July 12.—Melvin
Purvis, the man who got John Dil-
linger, resigned today as America's
No. 1 crime fighter.

Purvis laid aside the mantle of
office without ceremony, leaving a
record unapproached in modern
law enforcement. He gave up his
position as special agent in charge
of the Chicago office of the bu-
reau of investigation to "settle
down in Chicago."

"I'm going to get a pipe and sit
on someone's front porch," he said
in his formal announcement of
resignation which he said had been
accepted by J. Edgar Hoover to be
effective today. He will be suc-
ceeded in Chicago by Daniel Ladd,
who has run the bureau intermit-
tently.

Sylvian Club at Fort Worth Burns

NAOMI, A WOMAN OF FAITH AND COURAGE

Ruth 1:14-22, 4:15-17

In the land of Moab, in the year B. C. 1173, Naomi, the name meaning sweet one, with her heart crushed, started on her journey back to her former home in Bethlehem.

As Naomi, with her two heathen daughters-in-law walked along, no doubt she pondered over her past life and wondered why God had smitten her.

But there was no bitterness in her heart toward God as she dwelt upon the memories of whom she with her husband, Elimelech, name meaning "God is King," and two sons, Mahlon and Chilion, dwell in a happy Christian home in Bethlehem.

The famine had driven them to the land of Moab where they could earn their bread. But misfortune followed them even there.

No doubt that the tragic expression deepened in her eyes as she ascribed his misfortune to her sin of moving into a heathen land where her husband died; her two sons married heathen girls. Chilion married Orpah and Mahlon married Ruth, the name meaning friendship. Then both of the boys died and were buried beside their father, leaving three widows in one home.

Perhaps she glanced in pity at them, remembering how they had suffered together in grief and loneliness until their lives were knitted in love and companionship. She probably dwelt upon how she would miss them when they turned back to their own homes in their own land.

It was here that she turned to the two young women following so dutifully and reminded them that it was time for them to turn back to the homes of their mothers.

She gave them her blessing and spoke of their kindness but told them that she was now old and penniless, and that they were young and would marry again. As

they remonstrated she answered, "It grieveth me much for your sake that the hand of the Lord is gone out against me."

Her courage is emphasized again in the beautiful picture where Orpah turned back and Ruth in beautiful words declared her allegiance to Naomi and her God. She recognized the fact that Ruth was not obstinate but had made her decision to follow Naomi's God, who could sustain her through such fiery trials.

It was a long, hard journey of 60 miles over hills and plains with the river Arnon to ford and also the Jordan, which was deep and rapid. Naomi's endurance must have been taxed but helped by the strength of Ruth.

Their entrance into Bethlehem caused people to comment and ask if this were Naomi. Sorrow had aged her. Naomi asked that her name be called Mara, meaning "bitter one."

But her courage born of faith and knowledge in God never waned. Her dealings with Ruth until she is married to Boaz makes a beautiful story. But her reward came when Ruth's child, a boy, Obed, was born and she became its nurse. This child became the father of Jesse, who became the father of the great king, David, "who was the most famous earthly ancestor of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Naomi's strength came through her knowledge and faith in God's dealing with people and herself. She was true to God in a heathen land where Christians today would say, "It is so hard to live for God." Sorrow did not turn her away from God but drew her nearer until she had great vision and lived understandingly, realizing that "Favor is deceitful, and beauty is vain: but a woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be praised" (Proverbs 31:30).

In this land of ours today where our every day necessities far outshine the luxuries of kings in olden

times, it is well for our women to study Naomi who could suffer the hardships of grief, loss and long journeys on foot for her Lord without grumbling, growing from "strength to strength" in courage and faith.

All women cultivate a beautiful appearance in their conception of what is beauty. But how pitiful is beauty that is not lighted by that inner radiant glow that deepens with the years, in the knowledge and love of Christ.

I shuddered once to hear a young woman give as her excuse for not attending a revival that it was "just simply too hard for her to climb the hill a block, to the church."

My mind's eye jumped to the hill of Golgotha where a young man, divine in nature, a descendant of this Obed, toiled under a cross that was so heavy that he could not bear it alone, to a death of shame that became the most glorious death in the annals of time wherein even all nature made great manifestation.

Through Him was all woman-kind lifted to newer and higher levels of living, who should honor him in a life of service wherein is found faith, courage, and joy in a strength that keeps unto the end with a sure reward.

Golden Text: A woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be praised.—Proverbs 31:30.

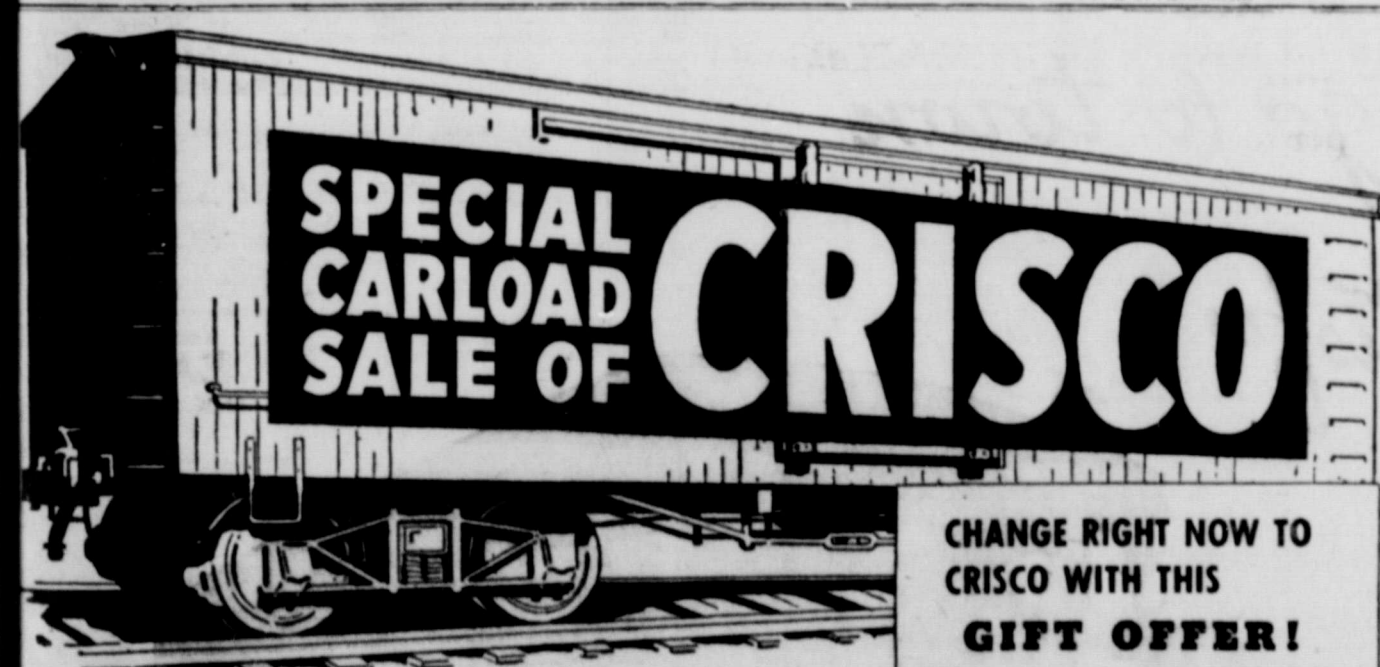

Way to Budget Cure

Out of all the squabbling about the "soak the rich" tax projected for congressional consideration, here should at least come forth an excellent educational program on the general subject of government finances.

On the one hand we have Michigan's Senator Vandenberg declaring that the program as the president has outlined it is "inadequate, incomplete, and pathetically superficial."

It is his idea that Congress should take a few months off to think things over and then come back with a plan that would not only boost the taxes on the very wealthy, but would increase the takings from citizens of more modest means.

On the other hand, we have the well-to-do Mr. Charles H. Sabin, Jr., appearing as the mouthpiece for a group of wealthy men who feel that the administration should simultaneously reduce income taxes and balance the budget; and before anyone can remark that this would be a good trick if you could do it, they hasten to suggest an all-inclusive federal sales tax.

Just what will eventually be done with the program, subjected as it will be to strong pressures from diametrically opposite directions, is something for the seventh son of a seventh son to worry about. But it should at least set people thinking about some of the fundamentals of government finance problems.

To begin, we might reach the point of understanding that in any scheme of tax reform we can't have it both ways. A reduction of income taxes would be a blessing, and so would a completely balanced federal budget; but some of our publicists and statesmen have been agitating for both things at the same time, and this educational program might convince them that this just naturally can't be done.

Beyond that, however, the discussion should focus attention on the fact that one of the greatest needs of the hour is the restoration of order to government finances.

A budget which goes unbalanced for a year or two, in a country as potentially rich as the United States, need not worry anyone. A budget which is permitted to stay unbalanced for year after year, while high officials evade the subject of tax revision by relying hopefully on a business revival, is about as ominous a portent as a government can face.

We seem at last to be coming to grips with this problem. If the coming row over the advisability or otherwise of soaking the rich arouses us to the importance of a balanced budget, it will be one of the most useful developments of the year.

Democracy Loses Its
Fear of King's Rule

The World War, as we all fondly hoped, was fought to make the world safe for democracy. Since the existence of a king is usually an obstacle in democracy's path, one of our greatest objectives was to see Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs chased away from their thrones forever.

We got our wish. Or, at any rate, we thought we did. The central powers lost their royal families, and in the dark days that followed we felt that this, at least, was one definite and positive benefit gained by the war. And now Austria prepares to invite the Hapsburgs back to their ancient throne—and almost nobody seems to be especially worried about it.

It would be an ironic thing if, 17 years after the war, young Archduke Otto should return to Austria at the invitation of the people who disowned him; yet the tide of history can pull in some strange directions, at times, and the confusion of the post-war years may resolve itself in an altogether unexpected manner.

But the significant point about this particular development is not that Austria wants the Hapsburgs back but that nobody else seems inclined to object very much.

It reflects a widespread public disillusionment with the avowed objects for which the war was fought. More than that, it reveals our recognition of the fact that democracy can be effectively and thoroughly stifled even when there is no king within a thousand miles.

Russia lost its czar and Germany lost its kaiser—yet there is actually less democracy in those two countries than there was before the war. Italy has kept its king, deprived him of power—and, simultaneously, has knocked democracy on the head. Austria and Hungary discarded the Hapsburgs, and got less freedom instead of more.

All of this has grown out of an intense human weariness, mingled with fear, suspicion and a growing lack of confidence in the ability of people in the mass to solve their problems. The trend has been toward strong authoritarian governments. Democracy is no longer in danger from kings; but from a widespread feeling that democracy itself is played out.

This being the case, why should not Austria recall the Hapsburgs if she pleases? We who still cling to the democratic ideal need not worry about that. It is our task to prove that democracy can, after all, prove an effective means of government in a world that lives in a continual state of crisis.

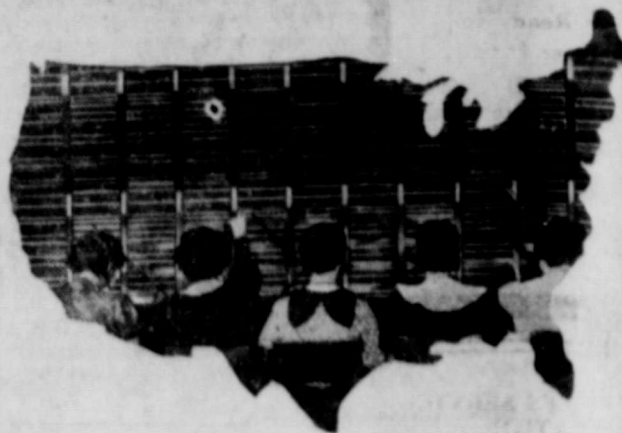

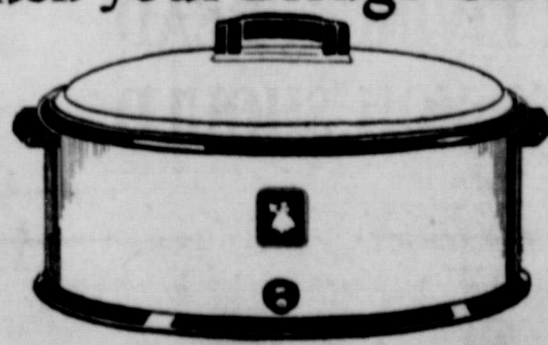

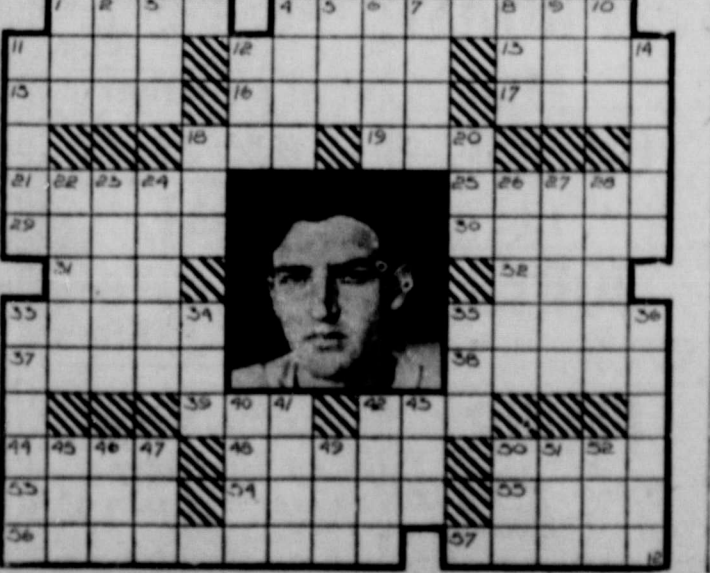

Business Failures

Low During June

AUSTIN.—There was an average of four failures a week during June against six the previous month and six during June last year, according to a report of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Total liabilities of the bankrupt firms for the month were \$250,000, an increase of 8 per cent over the previous month and 22 per cent above the similar month last year. Assets of the bankrupt firms totaled \$133,000, an increase of 40 per cent over the month before and 129 per cent above June last year. Average liability per failure, \$14,706, was 40 per cent above the previous month and 29 per cent greater than in the similar month last year.
