"FRAME-UP" CHARGED BY FALL-DOHENY

WITNESSES ARE
TAMPERED WITH
LAWYERS CLAIMSECRETARY WILBUR TOLD
NAVAL MEN HOW TO
TESTIFY, SAID(By the Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Declaring navy witnesses are being prompted from Secretary Wilbur's office regarding their testimony, defense counsel in the Fall-Doheny conspiracy trial today called on the secretary for an explanation.Is Called "Trump Card"
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The defense in the Fall-Doheny conspiracy trial put another of its trumps on the table today by calling as a witness Admiral J. K. Robison, who had led the navy's end of the 1922 oil leasing program.

By his testimony defense attorneys sought to show that the navy had so prominent a part in the transaction that Albert B. Fall, as secretary of the interior, was in no position to deliver the Elk Hills lease to his friend, Edward L. Doheny.

This line of counter attack struck directly at the cornerstone of the case built up by the prosecution, which contends that Doheny's \$100,000 advance to Fall was part of a conspiracy by which the Doheny interests got their lease.

Robison took the stand after several other navy officials had told of the navy's interest in having the reserve oil taken from the ground and put in storage.

New Tactics Seen
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—An entirely new line of counter attack was opened up today by defense attorneys in the Fall-Doheny oil trial.

They announced that they would ask Secretary Wilbur, on the witness stand, whether naval officers listed among the witnesses had received any new orders since they were summoned to testify.

What prompted the step was not hastily disclosed, but the defense counsel, after questioning one admiral, announced that Admiral J. K. Robison, one of their star witnesses, would not be placed on the stand until the jury had heard the testimony of

Court Upholds Man

AUSTIN, Dec. 3.—Judge George Calhoun of 53rd district court today rendered judgment for \$20,454.84 for J. P. Dexter of Dallas, sub-contractor for the Hoffman Construction company, and intervenor in the state's suit against the company for recovery of alleged excessive profits on highway contracts.

The state Thursday, through confessed judgment of the defendant, was awarded \$412,000 damages. Attorneys for the company gave notice of appeal on the Dexter case.

Munroe Fisher, 23, Held After Albert Bonds, Slayer Of Father, Is Wounded

DISCOVER BODY
OF SLAIN LASSFather's Dream, After Girl's
Disappearance, Found To
Be Correct In Detail(By Associated Press)
PRAIRIE DU CHIEN, Wis., Dec. 2.—The sinister dream of Chris Olson that his daughter Clara was dead has become reality.

"I've seen Clara," the tobacco planter has declared long before the body of the 22 year old girl was found in a shallow grave on Battle Ridge near Rising Sun, a quarter of a mile from the home of Erdman Olson, who has been charged with the slaying.

"I've seen her in a dream," Chris told neighbors. "I know she is dead. I saw her buried on her face on a hill near Rising Sun."

Dream Comes True
That dream of tragedy and death which came true to the letter, fortifying his suspicion of his daughter's fate, led Chris Olson to swear out a murder warrant for young Olson "upon information and belief" several days ago, although there was then no direct evidence that the girl, an expectant mother, was dead.

That evidence was supplied yesterday when a searching party, combing the Kickapoo valley, stumbled upon a barely filled grave in which the missing girl was lying—face downward.

Search Held For Youth
Meanwhile search was pushed for the girl's 18 year old sweetheart, Erdman Olson, Gale Olson, student, who disappeared September 27, seventeen days after Clara left her home in the evening "to get a breath of fresh air" and never returned. Sheriff Sherwood of Crawford county planned to go to Dwight, Ill. today to interview a youth held there answering the description of Erdman.

Erdman is a son of Albert Olson, unrelated to Chris.

One Suspect Freed
DWIGHT, Ill., Dec. 3.—Walter Christensen, of Portage, Minn., grimed happily today when it was definitely established that he was not Erdman Olson, the Wisconsin youth wanted on the charge of having murdered his sweetheart, Clara Olson. Sheriff Harry Sherwood of Crawford county, Wis., arrived here today and immediately said Christensen was not the young man sought.

Christensen held since Wednesday night, went back to his corn husking.

Duncan Issues Book
To Aid His Faculty

Superintendent M. H. Borger Gunman Is Jailed After Slaying
Carries The Gun That Killed Irl Rigney(By the Associated Press)
BORGER, Texas, Dec. 3.—Carrying the weapon that killed Police Captain Irl Rigney, Bill Moss, known as "Tangle Eyes" was arrested by police here last night in direct connection with the shooting Tuesday night when the captain was killed by M. F. McWilliams, who later died at a hospital from gun shot wounds.

The weapon, a .45 calibre gun, containing five empty shells, and bore a notch on the butt which Police Chief Williams claims is for the man McWilliams killed at Mexico.

Says He Stole Gun
According to police, Moss has confessed to snatching the gun from the hands of McWilliams, as the slayer sank to the sidewalk, and made his way through the crowd.

BELTON STREETBell County Feud Breaks Out
Anew On Downtown Corner;
Ex-Sheriff May Die(By the Associated Press)
BELTON, Texas, Dec. 3.—Former Sheriff Albert Bonds, shot and dangerously wounded here last night just after he arrived in the downtown section to testify in a case on trial in the district court, was reported this morning to have a chance for recovery although his condition is critical.

Munroe Fisher, 23, son of Police Chief Wiley Fisher, of Temple, for whose death Bonds is under \$10,000 bail, was arrested early this morning in connection with the attack on Bonds and was placed under \$2,500 bond on an assault charge. Fisher was shot here on August 26 as the culmination of bitter political differences between him and Bonds and the latter disappeared from the county to return Sunday, November 14, in custody of Ranger Captain Frank Hsmer and two other rangers.

Fires At Short Range
The shooting occurred here last night about 9 o'clock just after Bonds and driven up in front of the Hughes-Opheus drug store, less than a block away from the scene where Fisher was slain last summer. Bonds had been

STATE HAS BUT
SLIGHT CHANCE

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Dec. 3.—The Hall-Mills case was given to a Somerset county jury at 1:44 o'clock this evening. The trial was started one month ago today when Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall and her brothers, Henry and William Stevens, were charged with the murder of Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills. Mrs. Mills was slain with the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall September 14, 1922.Simpson Is Last Speaker
SOMERVILLE, N. J., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Speaking for less than two hours Alexander Simpson, special prosecutor in the Hall-Mills case, summed up for the state today, assuring the jury that the "honest men among you will decide this case."

The prosecutor throughout left an impression that he felt the state's effort was a lost cause among some of the members of the jury, but that he hoped others would hold out for a conviction.

Simpson told the jury "the possibility of other trials in connection with the case, in the event of an acquittal, 'Don't you believe the administration of justice in New Jersey will stand by and see a miscarriage,' he said."

Five Other Trials Possible
The prosecutor pointed out that there are five other trials possible, one for each of the three defendants and two for Henry Carpenter, indicted but not tried on two charges of murder.

When Simpson finished speaking, a few minutes after noon, Justice Charles W. Parker announced that the jury would be charged after the luncheon recess.

As Simpson started to speak, he held photographs of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall.

THREE FIRE RUNS
MADE TODAY

Three fire alarms within four hours today were answered by the Lubbock fire department Friday morning, but very little damage was done in either blaze. Alarms came in from the city power plant, the Lubbock Hotel, and the Wilson building at 13th and Ave H.

A tank of approximately 200 gallons of distillate used at the city plant for fuel was discovered ablaze about 6 o'clock, but the flames were quickly extinguished with practically no damage being done.

One At Hotel
At about 9 o'clock, a call came in from the Lubbock Hotel when flames issuing from the furnace flue shot several feet into the air above the top cars parked near the building, damaging the tops slightly, but they were extinguished when firemen pushed the machines near the hydrants and extinguished the flames. The building did not catch, only the soot in the flue burning out.

Shortly after 10 o'clock, fire was discovered in the furnace room of the Wilson building after kindling stacked in the room caught fire. The blaze was quickly extinguished with practically no damage.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—The middleweight boxing crown is at stake tonight in a ten-round match to a referee's decision between Tiger Flowers, "The Georgia Deacon," who is champion of the 160 pounders, and Mickey Walker, former welterweight champion.

Flowers will win a larger purse if he loses than if he is victor, if Flowers speed and boxing skill gives him the victory on points, he will receive half the estimated gate receipts of \$90,000, less the boxing commission's ten per cent. If he loses by a knockout or a decision open to question, he will receive instead a \$65,000 purse put up to cover such a contingency by Jack Kearns, Walker's manager. In addition Flowers will get first call for a return match with Walker to try to recapture the honors which have been his since the champion dethroned Harry Greb last February.

Arrangements Made

Flowers' manager, Walker Miller, effected this protective arrangement with Kearns because, he said, there has been talk that Rocky Kansas was stripped of his lightweight title here last spring by a poor decision of a referee. So Flowers stands to get about \$40,000 if he wins, and \$65,000 if he loses. Walker's share is ten percent of the gate.

The semi-finals on the program will bring together George Godfrey, negro heavyweight, who was one of Jack Dempsey's favorite sparring partners, and Cowboy Billy Owens of Dallas, in eight rounds.

FRIGID WAVE IS FATAL TO SHIPS

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—Fast-forming ice today gripped 40 lake boats, caught by gold and storm in the St. Mary's river channel at Sault Ste. Marie.

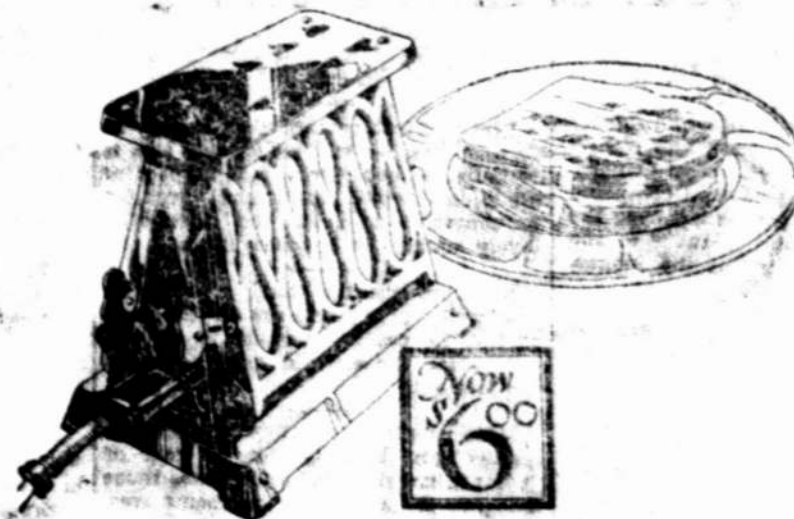

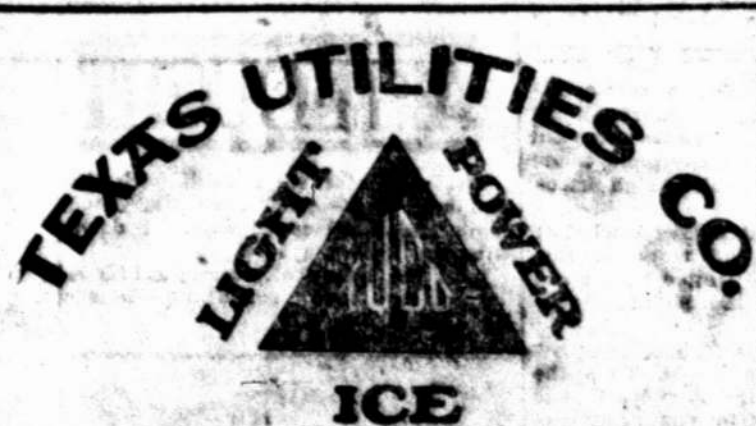

IT'S THE GIRLS' TIME NOW

On next Tuesday Lubbock will be
given an opportunity to help its girls.
A financial drive, to raise between
\$600 and \$700 for the carrying on of
the Campfire Girls organization will
be staged that day and everyone is
asked to stand by the girls of the city
as they have in the past in support-
ing the Boy Scout work.

There are six groups functioning in
the city at the present time, making
up the Campfire organization, which
already embraces more than 100 young
girls of the adolescent age. A bungal-
ow, of six rooms, has been rented for
a period of one year and plans are be-
ing laid by leaders of the Campfire
program to expand the work in Lub-
bock. To do this they must have money.

The Journal believes that the girls
of Lubbock are just as deserving of
community aid as the boys and feels
that we should pay them their just at-
tention. It feels that little girls with
something like the Campfire move-
ment to occupy their minds are bet-
ter off than without it and hopes that
the citizenship of Lubbock will seize
readily its first opportunity to be
of service to the girls.

A "FIT" FAMILY

The family of Alvin A. Gabriel of
Eudora, Kas., is a good one. Eudora,
Kas., had 577 population when the
1920 census was taken. The Gabriels
are distinguished folks in Kansas now.
They have just been awarded a medal
for being the fittest small family in
the entire state.

The medal was presented by Senator
Arthur Capper. A contest for this
medal is conducted at the Topeka fair
each year.
We don't know just how the judges
go about determining the "fittest fam-

reach their verdict. The judging was
directed, we are informed, by Dr.
Florence Sherborn of the faculty of the
University of Kansas.

Senator Capper in this connection

What we find particularly interest-

that's the secret of it," says Gabriel.

in this contest are grumbling over the
decision of the judges in favor of the
Eudoraites, no doubt. But the judges,

medals were awarded in the Topeka
contests, for families of larger size
than Gabriels.

One of them went to the Linsay V.
Kellars, of Delta, a town with a 1920
population of 45, and the other to
Marice Babbs of Paxico, a town so
small that few census reports ever
mention it.

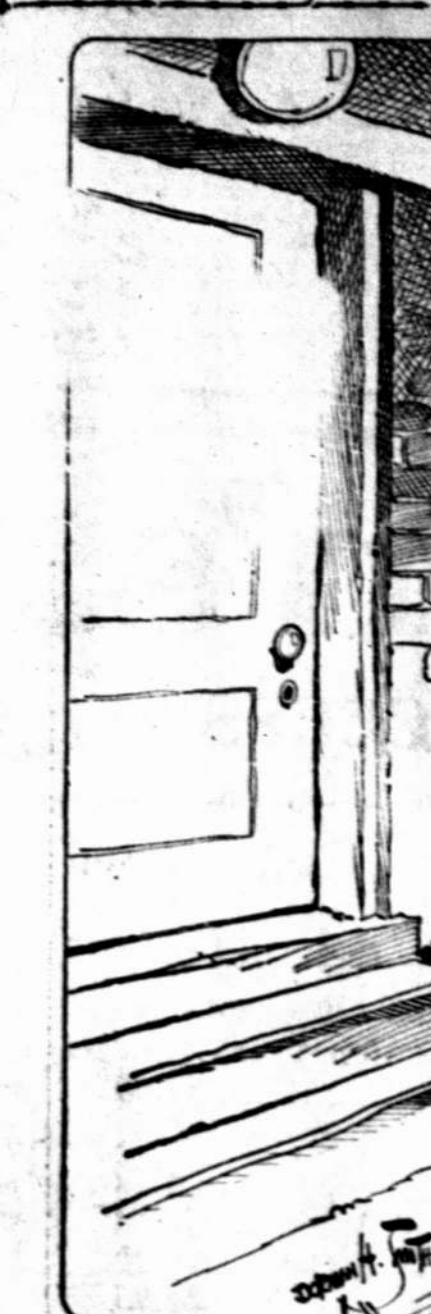

**DRY CHRISTMAS? DEPONENT
ANDREWS SAYETH NOTHING**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Brer An-
drews, he don't say nothin'. He just
lay low.
You may have missed the customary
ballyhoo this year about what the pro-
hibition enforcers were going to do to
make the holidays bone dry. It used to
be a good annual story for all the
newspapers.

The fact is that General Lincoln C.
Andrews and his subordinates will eat
their Christmas dinner serenely con-
fident that while there may be much
liquor available, hardly any of it is fit
to drink.

Here are their figures:
Not more than five or six rum ships
off the North Atlantic coast this year.
Probably 60 at this time last year.
More than 200 the year before.
About 355 three years ago.

Thus, smuggling has been cut to a
minimum in the New York sector, once
a great alcoholic sludge-way. The Flor-
ida coastline now is the principal ob-
jective of the rum-runner and it gener-
ally is achieved, as it is poorly
guarded. Any rum-runner who would
not prefer to operate off those sunny
shores, with the approach of winter,
rather than those of the North Atlan-
tic, doubtless is stupid enough to be
very easily caught, anyway.

For a time the assistant secretary
of the treasury in charge of prohibi-
tion was badly discouraged. He seemed
to be on the verge of resigning every
two or three weeks.

But lately those at the Treasury
have noticed that his seeming pes-
simism has changed to a pronounced
optimism.

The latest "dope" is that Andrews
will resign on April 1, after two years
in office. Afterward, he is expected to
write the story of his big job, and
his final judgment of prohibition after
two years of enforcing it will be await-
ed with considerable interest.

Few ever have thought that An-
drews was happy in his enforcing job.
Before he took it he never was any
bosom pal of Wayne B. Wheeler or
William H. Anderson. There is no
evidence that he believes in the law
he is trying to enforce any more than
to believe that all laws should be en-
forced.

His salary is \$7500 a year. He
doubtless could earn \$50,000 a year
in civil life. Andrews set out in the
beginning to take prohibition out of
politics. But senators and congress-
men still want a path to his office,
seeking appointments and other fa-
vors for their men.

From the standpoint of the neces-
sary arms and money to wage a war,
this Greece-Bulgaria affair suggests

**DISEASE IS HANDMAID OF
CROWDED CONDITIONS**

BY DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN
Editor, Journal of the American
Medical Association and of Hygiene,

The accumulated studies of sociolo-
gists and hygienists indicate that liv-
ing conditions have an important
bearing on health.
The relationship of proper hous-
ing to the dissemination of disease is
undoubted. Crowding of people in
enements and slums, with improper
accommodations for sewage and water
must inevitably result in the carry-
ing of infection from one person to
another.

The Medical Research Council of
Great Britain has just issued a special
report as a part of its series of child
life investigations on the manner in
which the children live in the cities
and in the rural districts of Scot-
land.

Extensive measurements were made
of the height and weight of these
children and the type of clothing worn
and the methods of assessing their
nutrition and growth.

The study indicated that there was
one delay in the rate of growth of
the average town child between birth
and eighteen months, but that after
that date the growth proceeded as
rapidly in the town as in the country
child.

It also seemed likely that the
growth impulse represented by her-
dity carried the child on to the average
size of its parents, even though its
impulse to grow was delayed at birth.

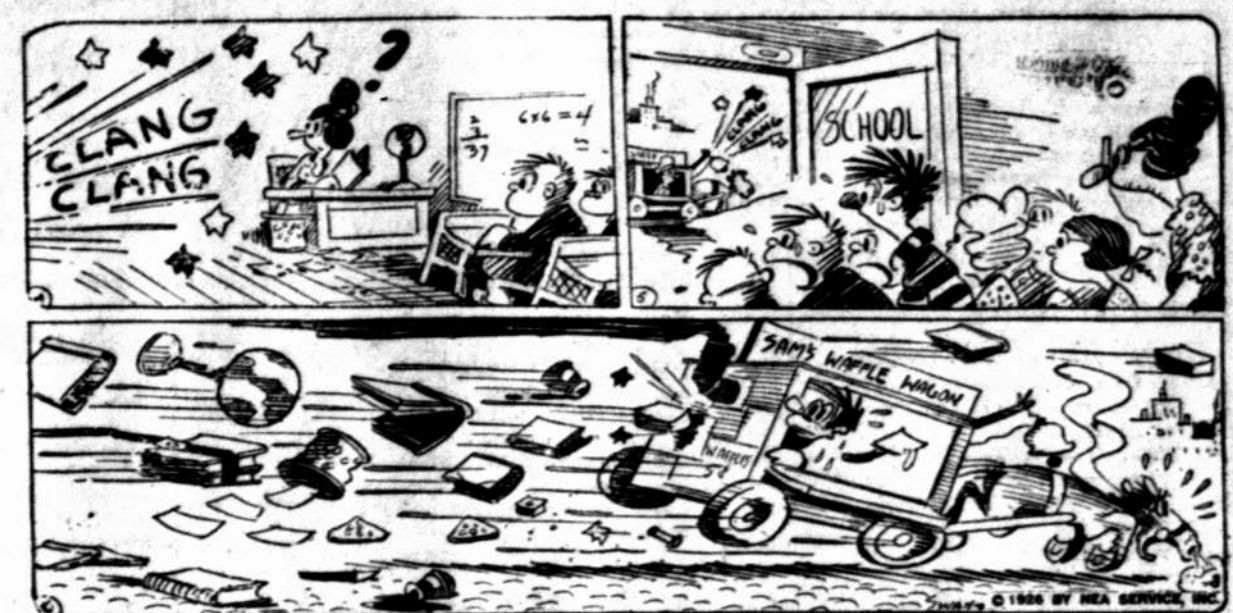

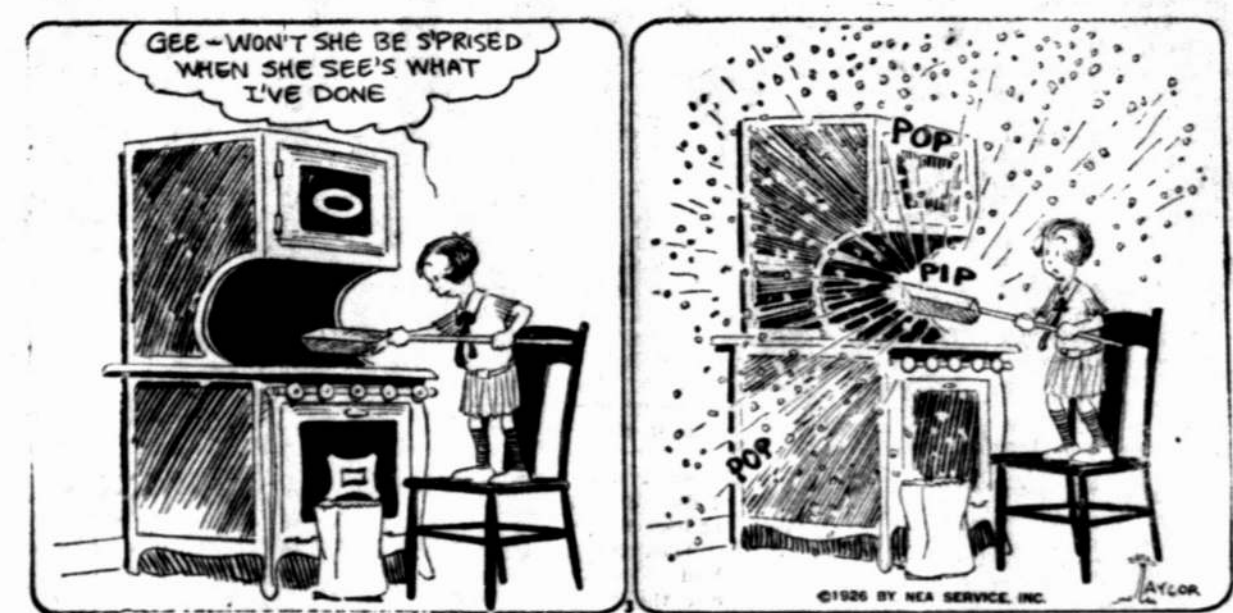

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (AP)—Renewal of the recent selling movement featured the opening of the cotton market today, and prices were barely steady at a decline of four to nine points.

All months made new low records for the season, January selling off to 12.87 under further liquidation of old long accounts, continued hedging and local selling.
The demand attracted by the initial decline steadied the market momentarily but liquidation and hedging continued, with prices later selling off to 11.82 for January and 12.50 for July or about 13 to 17 points net lower. A better demand was encountered at the 15 cent level for July, but it was not sufficient volume to rally prices. Trading was quiet later in the day, but market held within a point or two of the lowest at mid-day.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 3. (AP)—Cotton opened easy with Liverpool more favorable than due and weather in the belt reported good. These influences of December long cotton caused selling and first trades showed losses of 5 to 15 points. Prices fluctuated narrowly after the start and showed little change except for December which dropped to 11.82.
The market continued downward during the morning under liquidation of long interests and short selling until December traded to 11.75, January 11.82 and March 11.92. Later the market showed an indication to rally on news of predictions of bullish weekly statistics. Around noon prices were 3 to 4 points the low.

The market after rallying moderately on the large mill-takings of 558,000 bales turned easier again during the afternoon on the large private crop estimate of 19,115,000 bales. All months made new new lows with December at 11.71, January 11.78 and March 11.92, or 24 to 29 points below the previous close. The market at the beginning of the final hour was barely steady at the low.

Stocks And Money

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (AP)—Stock prices resumed their march to higher ground at the opening of today's market. Goodrich Rubber opened 2 points higher and Mack Trucks and Crucible Steel showed initial gains of a point each. Railroad shares improved slightly despite announcement of a \$15,000,000 yearly wage increase to eastern teamsters. Dupont fell back 1-4 on the first sale.

With no credit stringency in sight, speculators for the advance started to bid up stocks in all sections of the list, but the motors, rubbers and copper gave the best demonstrations of group strength. Rubbers rallied sharply in further reflection of the \$40,000,000 pool formed by tire and motor car manufacturers in an effort to stabilize the price of crude rubber. New peak prices for the year or longer were registered in the first few minutes of trading by International Harvester, Procter, Texas, Texas Company and St. Louis San Francisco preferred. Establishment of a new high level for the year by French francs at 237 cents featured the foreign exchange market. Demand sterling ruled unchanged around \$4.34 1-2.

WORK ON ROADS IS GOING AHEAD

Now That Wet Season Is Over Field Turns Attention To Public Highways

With settled weather prevailing, and the heavy fall rains apparently over, the work of reconditioning state designated highways in this part of the state is again under way, and the roads will be back to normal, or as near this as possible, in a short time. It was said in highway circles here Friday.

The highway to Lubbock, which during the recent inclement weather and heavy deluge, became all but impassable at places, will draw the bulk of attention in this county for the present. A light grade will be thrown up on the old location that will serve motorists while construction work is contemplated as carried on on the project, and when the new route is finished, the present location will be given over to the county as a local road. Geo. A. Fields, Division Engineer, said.

Decision Not Yet Made
No definite decision has yet been reached on the route that will be followed by the new road, but opposing factions are in the field seeking to establish the route. One would have the highway lead out of the city past the experiment station, where it would angle off to the northeast as far as the Crosby branch of the Santa Fe, thence almost east into Idaho. This route, it is understood, will parallel the line of the Denver railroad as planned.

The other route would lead north out of the city over the present Plainview road, and turn east at the trestle over the railroad.
Highways in all directions from here will be reconditioned as fast as possible, it was said.

Slaton Negro Faces Pro Law Charge Here

A Lubbock county negro was lodged in the county jail here last night after his arrest at Slaton late in the day, in a charge of violation of the prohibition law. Some liquor was taken from the scene of operations of the black, to be held as evidence against him, and as he has not asked for bond, he probably will be held in the bastille until the January term of district court.

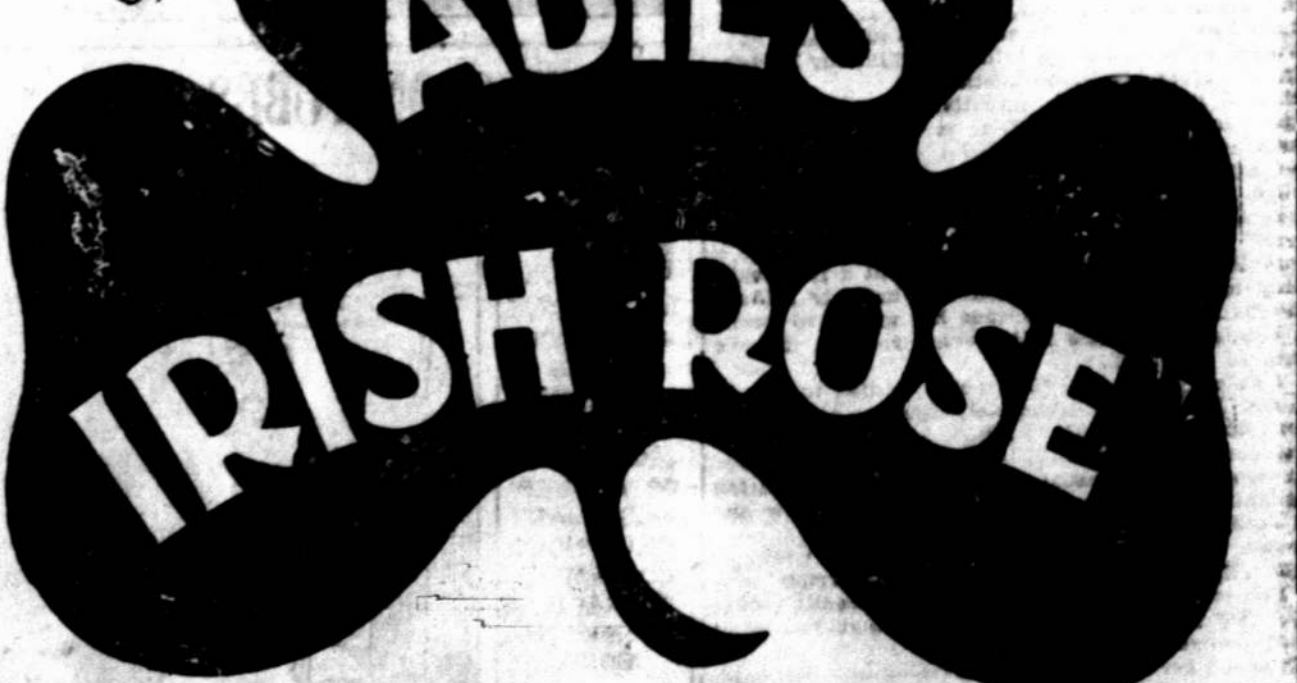

Galveston Is Busy Port, Report Shows

(By Associated Press)
GALVESTON, Dec. 3.—Galveston's financial contribution toward the marketing of the cotton crop and in aiding growers to hold for higher prices was estimated at \$5,000,000 today by local bankers. In addition to monies advanced cotton merchants and farmers approximately \$1,500,000 is now in process of expenditure for the expansion of cotton warehousing facilities.

This information was forthcoming in answer to a statement at Dallas yesterday by J. A. Pondrom, head of the Cotton Finance corporation that Galveston was among the three major cities of Texas which have failed to subscribe to the stock of the corporation. The other cities mentioned were Waco and Fort Worth.

Large advances were made each year by Galveston banking interests to cotton merchants and farmers through out the state, both for purpose of immediate marketing and for holding cotton.

These commercial relations have been in existence for many years, and the advances this year have been larger than customary, in an effort to alleviate insofar as possible the distress caused among the farming community of the state of the depression in the cotton market.

Granberry, of the Tech, presenting the opposing view to those held by the teacher. Doctor Granberry, a modernist, wished his classes to have the benefit of a fundamentalist's views, he stated.

This morning the superintendent talked on "Some Limitations of Human Knowledge." Monday he is to speak on "Some Facts Against the Theory of Organic Evolution" and Wednesday he is to lecture on "Why I Believe in Divine Revelation."

summoned as a witness in the trial of John Lewellen, who is facing a jury for the fourth time for the killing of John Zurovec in Temple six years ago. He engaged in conversation with friends and sent one to the court house to ascertain when he was wanted as a witness. Just as the friend left an automobile passed by, from which a man is said to have leaped and fired on Bonds at close range—the latter suffering powder burns from the discharge. The assailant is then said to have jumped back into the car, driven by a companion, and sped away.

Officers left immediately for Temple in search of Munroe Fisher but did not find him at that time. Shortly after mid-night Fisher informed the officers he understood they were looking for him and said through his attorney, W. W. Hair, that he was ready to surrender. Bond was arranged in local justice court.

One Eye Shot Away

Bonds' right eye was shot out, the superior orbital crest was destroyed and the roof of the orbital was fractured. Officers said he had been shot with buck shot. The charge tore three holes in the plate glass window of the drug store and Robert Warren and C. A. Wilbanks, standing inside the store, were slightly injured by flying glass. Neither Fisher nor his attorney, W. W. Hair, would make a statement relative to the shooting, but it is understood that Fisher got in touch with Hair soon after the shooting and the latter informed officers that Fisher was ready to make bond on an charge that might be filed.

Wilbur Up Tomorrow
Mr. Wilbur will be placed on the witness stand tomorrow and will also be asked why certain navy department files subpoenaed by the defense have not been produced.

Frank J. Hogan, chief of the defense attorneys, said during a recess of the trial today that Admiral J. K. Robinson, one of the prospective star witnesses for the defense, had been summoned to the secretary's office and cautioned "not to reveal matters of a confidential nature which had come to his attention in the department."

This summons, Hogan said, had come to Admiral Robinson after he already was under subpoena to testify for the defense.

Testimony Is Important
It was Robinson who handled the navy's part in the oil leasing program of 1922 and his testimony has been relied upon by the defendants to show that both the navy and interior departments had a say in the award of the Elk Hills lease to the Doheny oil interests. This lease is declared by the government to have been awarded through the influence of Albert B. Fall, while he was interior secretary and after he had been advanced \$100,000 by Doheny.

W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills before the jury.
Early in his address he said that one juror, Mr. Young did not like him, and another, Mr. Hope, "is under obligation to Senator Case," defense counsel.

"Justice was lynched four years ago and may be again," he said.
Simpson rapidly sketched the state's theory that Mrs. Hall and her brothers went to confront Mr. Hall with his love letters and in an ensuing struggle, killed the minister and then killed Mrs. Mills to dispose of her as a witness.

"She Bought Husband"
"Mrs. Hall bought and paid for her husband," he said, "and then lost him to a younger woman."

"There's the motive," he declared; "Hell hath no fury like a woman scorned."

He attacked Mrs. Hall for what he termed "her failure" to show emotion during the trial and praised Mrs. Jane Gibson, the state's star witness, as "a very fine character," who has tried to do "a public service."

"If you feel like acquitting these defendants," he concluded, "why don't you put on a rider to your verdict, saying Mrs. Gibson, or Jenny, her mule, committed the murders."
