## No Tax Increase

# City To Increase Prices For Services

The City Council of Colorado City will hold a public hearing at 7:30 Monday in City Hall on a record high budget for the city that will be financed without a tax increase.

Although there will not be a tax increase proposed for the 1974-1975 fiscal year, the council proposes to increase water, sewer and trash pick-up rates in order to finance higher expenditures during the coming fiscal year.

The fiscal year begins May 1. In the budget, the city plans to increase minimum water rates for the first 3,000 gallons of water from \$3.25 to \$5.25 a month. Sewer rates will be increased from \$1 to \$1.25 per month and home trash pick-up will be increased from \$1.75 to \$2 a month.

For trash pick-up at businesses, rates will be increased from between \$1.75 to \$10.25 now to between \$5 and \$30.

There are now some 2,120 water customers, 1,667 sewer connections and 1,900 trash pick-up points in the city.

The increase in trash pick-up rates will increase city revenues for that service from \$42,000 to \$49,000. The increase in water rates will increase city income for that service from \$160,000 to \$210,400 and the increase in sewer rates will increase city income for that service from \$26,000 to \$32,000.

Out of that income for those services, some \$34,000 will be transferred to the general fund to pay for certificates of obligation to finance the city's new civic center.

This avenue of financing the civic center was decided rather than a tax increase as through raising the rates for services, everyone helps foot the bill, City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. said.

The increase in rates will also help finance the increasing costs of providing these services, Sadler added.

It has been estimated that city income into the general fund for the coming fiscal year will be \$385,300 compared to \$339,500 during this fiscal year. This increase will consist of the transfer of \$34,000 in revenues brought in by increased rates for water and sewer service plus an estimated increase in sales tax receipts.

Expenditures for 1973-1974 out of the general fund amounted to \$382,332 compared with income of \$339,500. The difference was made up with federal revenue sharing monies and higher than expected sales tax receipts. Out of the 1973-1974 expenditures, \$36,000 was for capital improvements.

Estimated expenditures for 1974-1975 will amount to \$385,300 with most of the city departments having about the same budget as last year. However, during the coming year, the city will spend only \$8,250 on capital improvements and \$25,000 on certificates of obligation to finance the city's civic center.

The budget calls for a substantial increase in spending on the city's cemetery. Last year, only \$3,950 was spent at the cemetery and during the coming year, the city plans to spend \$9,850 on the cemetery.

The biggest portion of the budget is for the police department which was trimmed \$50,000.

Wolves Lose To Monahans

Monahans defeated Colorado City for the regional girls' volleyball championship in Lubbock Saturday 15-5, 7-15 and 15-4.

The Wolves defeated Graham Saturday morning to advance to the finals. The Wolves lost the first game to Graham 15-4 and dropped behind 9-0 in the second game before coming on strong to win the second game 17-15 and winning the third game 15-7.

Monahans was pre-season favorite to win the state championship.

Don Stewart, Mitchell County ASCS executive director, said that if farmers leased cotton acreage or overplanted allotment during 1971, 1972 or 1973, they will be eligible for disaster payments up to the normal harvested acreage if cotton allotments are leased this year.

May 1 is the final date to transfer, release or request reappropriation of acres for 1974. Also, Stewart pointed out, that if farmers have allotment they want to lease, they can list it with ASCS.

It was reported only a few weeks ago that the government would not make disaster payments on leased acreage. However, that ruling has been rescinded to a large extent.

If a natural disaster exists on a farm during the normal planting season for cotton, wheat or feed grains and the government determines that the producer on such a farm would not have planted such crops (or other nonconserving crop planned in lieu of feed grain or wheat) in the absence of disaster conditions, no disaster payment for prevented planting of the crop will be made on such a farm.

Stewart pointed out that if farmers are going to need wheat acreage for history acres, substitution of other crops or possibly disaster payment, they need to come to ASCS immediately and request acreage credit. Wheat acreage needs to be certified by May 1. Non-allotment wheat acres would also be reported.

Charges Filed In Rustling

Mitchell County Sheriff's Department has been busy since last August tracing down chases which broke the cattle rustling cases near Outhbert.

Manuel Del Real, 52, was arrested March 23 and charged with two counts of cattle theft, eight head from Harold Hester's place and twelve from Waddell Strain's.

Del Real was arrested by Mitchell County Sheriff Bill McGuire, Chief Deputy Simon Barrera and TSCRA Inspector Hatton Moore. He is currently free on \$20,000 bond.

McGuire said that officers are in the process of locating and tracing down the stolen cattle. They are slowed in the investigation because many of the cattle have been sold as many as four or five times since August, he added.

McGuire and Deputy Troy Walls returned Friday afternoon from a ranch in southeastern New Mexico with two of Strain's steers, branded with the Strain brand.

Investigation began in August when ranchers in the Outhbert community reported livestock stolen or missing. Strain was sure that some of his had been stolen and other ranchers in the area were suspecting theirs had been stolen although some had strayed. At the time, McGuire requested that ranchers who had cattle missing, whether they were sure they were missing or thought they might have strayed, to report it to his office so that deputies might have a better chance to find chases.

McGuire thanked the ranchers and farmers for their help and support during the long time period before the case was broken.

by some \$2,000 to \$86,242. The fire department budget for the coming year was trimmed from \$40,061 to \$28,611; the street department budget was increased from \$10,980 to \$15,992, and the law department was increased from \$1,900 to \$3,800.

A complete summary of the proposed budget can be found on Page 4 of today's Record.

In a cover letter accompanying the budget, Sadler told council members that much has been accomplished during the past year including the purchase of many items of equipment such as a new fire truck, a front end loader, winch truck, tilt trailer, new tractor with broom attachment, renovation of the city's sewage plant, a new traffic light system, plus paving overlay of some eight blocks and paving of four blocks on Walnut Street and three blocks around Hutchinson School.

In addition, Sadler pointed out that the city is working with the county and hospital district to provide ambulance service to the county and has renovated the police station to house the new ambulances; plus the city has made numerous extensions of water lines to serve new areas and give better service to others.

In addition, Sadler points out in the letter that a contract has been let and work is underway on a new civic center for Colorado City "and is an undertaking of which, when completed, will be a source of pride for all of the council and will for many years to come, be remembered as one of Colorado City's greater achievements."

"Due to the sound financial condition of the city, it is recommended...that the ad-valorem tax rate for the City of Colorado City remain at the present rate of \$1.55 per hundred valuation based on 45% of market value," Sadler wrote in the letter.

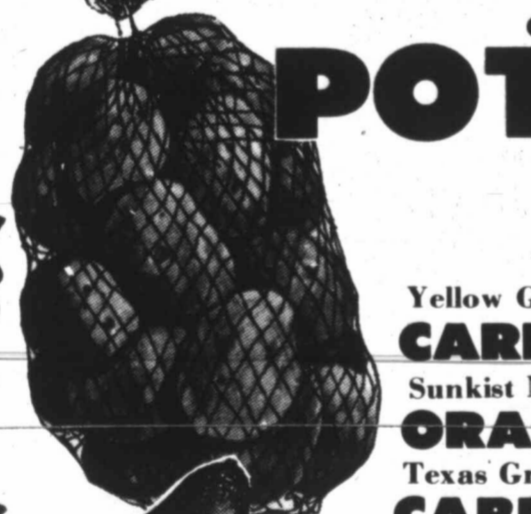
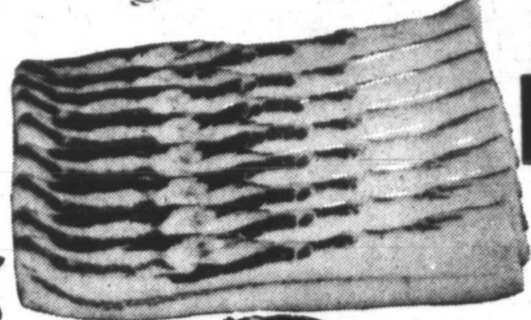
