TEXAS-OKLAHOMA RED RIVER SUIT

Litigation Enriches State To
Extent of \$2,000,000—Benefit
for Generations.

Austin, Tex.—Texas profited \$2,000,000 from its long litigation with Oklahoma in the Red river boundary suit, it was revealed at Austin following the entry of the final order in the noted case by the supreme court this week. Major A. A. Stiles, of Austin, one of the two commissioners appointed by the supreme court, was informed by a Texas official the seven-year suit, which once threatened armed conflict between Texas and Oklahoma, meant a benefit to Texas of \$2,000,000 in the recovery of title to contested property. In addition, the survey made to determine ownership is so valuable that its results will be of benefit for generations. So valuable were declared exhibits and part of the work of the survey, that at the request of the United States library of congress they were placed on public exhibition in the congressional library at Washington. Other portions of the exhibits will go to the University of Texas, and others to the attorney general's department. Possibly and types of soil, showing "age" of the land in the river bed are among exhibits. There will go on record at the university, following the surveys establishing the various banks of the river, a record of every oil well, past and present, drilled in the rich strip of land in controversy, of which Texas recovered the major part.

TEXAS GAME PRESERVES INCREASE TO FIFTY-FIVE

Austin, Tex.—Six game preserves located in four far Western Texas counties and aggregating approximately 300,000 acres just accepted by the State Game, Fish and Oyster Department has increased the number of game preserves in Texas to 55 and the number of acres to more than two and a half million. It was announced this week by Commissioner William J. Tucker. The first State game preserves were accepted on September 1, 1925, under the provisions of the law enacted by the Legislature that year providing for the conveyance by owners of land of easements to the State for a period of 10 years during which time no hunting of protected birds or animals is to be permitted. Informal census of the protected preserves already in existence amounting to considerably more than 2,000,000 acres, indicate that increase of game life, particularly of deer, turkey and quail, has proceeded rapidly during the breeding seasons of 1926 and 1927. The new preserves in Presidio, Brewster, Culberson and Val Verde are admirably located and should prove a fertile field for the propagation of existing species and any other that may be imported in the judgment of Chief Deputy Commissioner Beale Jester, who made a personal inspection before the easements were accepted.

Alaskan Cables Cut by Tremors.

Seattle—Earthquake shocks of considerable intensity shook Southeastern Alaska Monday, severing cables maintained by the United States army, signal corps between Ketchikan and Wrangell and between Juneau, Haines and Skagway, breaking dishes and windows and stopping clocks.

Bastrop Insurance Rate Reduced.

Bastrop, Tex.—Local fire insurance agencies have been notified by the state fire insurance commission of a 2 per cent reduction in the fire insurance key rate, which makes the present rate 65 cents on the \$100 valuation instead of 67 cents, as heretofore.

Loadings Increase.

Washington, D. C.—Freight loadings for the week ending October 15, as reported by the American Railway Association, totaled 1,119,872 cars, an increase of 19,329 cars over the previous week's figures, but a decrease of \$2,908 cars under the same period last year.

Goose Creek Bonds Approved

Austin, Tex.—The Attorney General's Department approved \$115,000 of waterworks bonds of Goose Creek, Harris County, also an issue of \$45,000 sewer bonds. They bear 5½ per cent interest.

Cream Sales Important.

Lampasas, Tex.—Cream sales in Lampasas County are becoming one of the important items among the many diversified industries of the county.

Shipping Board Buys Fuel Oil.

Washington, D. C.—Contracts for supplying approximately 12,000,000 barrels of fuel oil for the operation of shipping board vessels basing at Atlantic and Gulf ports next year were awarded Monday by the shipping board.

Hondo Will Vote to Incorporate.

San Antonio, Tex.—Hondo, Medina county, for more than 30 years as unincorporated town, shortly will vote on incorporation.

Great Need of Today Is the Elimination of Spirit of Selfishness

PROSPERITY, business, pleasure and social life keep modern man on the jump, and he has no time to think deeply, read wisely or consider intelligently the sorrows and bitterness of the world's other half.

Christianity will not win the world from modern doubt or from oriental paganism until it digs down to the bedrock of ethical and spiritual standards of Jesus. The Methodist church will not succeed in its missionary and evangelistic enterprises until it returns to the practical principles of its founder, John Wesley.

The maxim of early religion was "others," the practice of modern society is "self." Men today are not more selfish at heart—they are more forgetful. They are absorbed, busy, rushed off their feet. All their enthusiasm is for "our crowd, our nation, our city, my business, my family, my success." How to get a bigger motor car, more time for the links, handsomer gowns, better food, less responsibility and more fun are the absorbing problems of thousands in an age of luxury never known before.

It is, therefore, little wonder that the season's "best sellers" are books on the subject of "how to reduce" and that in many prosperous American homes there is nothing left for religion and charity but the little red cent.

Evolution Solving Problems of Relations Between Capital and Labor

In the last few years much thought and study has been given, especially in large corporations, to the proper relations between the stockholders, management and labor. We hope we are much nearer a fair solution of this problem than ever before, though much still remains to be done.

Since human beings began to live together the question of proper relations between them has been slowly evolving, and this evolution is still continuing with many obvious imperfections in the state we have reached today.

In the evolution of government our thought and attention has been given to a democratic organization, and with all its inefficiencies and limitations as far as we have developed it, we still think, at all events in America, that it has the basis which is going to contribute largely to equality of opportunity, to justice and happiness for each individual human being.

If we can retain the philosophic concept underlying democracy, making it more effective and efficient in its operations, and more nearly conforming to the theory and ideal we have set up it is going to contribute very largely to the happiness of each one of us.

People Have Right to Protest and Defy Laws That Have Basis in Tyranny

By FLOYD T. THOMPSON, Justice Illinois Supreme Court.

Call me a nullificationist if you please, a rebel, if you please. It is time that strong men got up on their hind legs and howled. Those who would force tyranny on us want to make us subjects of the nation. We are not subjects. We are the sovereign rulers of this country.

Because a measure is adopted and put on the statute books by those who misrepresent us, does not mean that we must obey. If we do not like the law, we should not meekly and humbly bow in submission.

Because the people defy a law of which they do not approve, I am not alarmed into believing that the nation is crumbling and that we are headed for the scrap heap of nations. We are not lawless, rather I would be alarmed if they did not oppose the laws with which they do not agree.

We are told that if we do not want a law we should repeal it. Whoever heard of the repeal of a law which the people did not oppose? There cannot be any passive resistance to a law. We do not wage war feebly.

If we do not want a law, we should openly oppose it, we should defy it, ignore it.

United States at the Present Moment Weak in National Defense

In 1925 the national defense expenditures were but 0.10 per cent of our national wealth; extremely high insurance compared with 0.42 per cent in the British empire, 0.50 per cent in Japan, 0.33 per cent in France, and 0.58 per cent in Italy.

We have less than one soldier for each one thousand of our population, as compared to Japan's 3.69, England's 3.49, Italy's 8.7, and France's 11.35.

At but one time during 150 years have we been adequately prepared at a time when we were engaged in a diplomatic controversy with a foreign power.

From 1914 to 1917 our disinclination to back up our utterances rendered our diplomatic notes impotent, encouraged the disdain of the imperial German government, and gradually but firmly pushed us into the World war almost wholly unprepared. The cost of the war in casualties, in suffering, in dollars was increased immeasurably by this penny wise, pound foolish type of last-minute preparation.

"Wild Youth" Returning to Sanity After Its Orgy of Self-Indulgence

High school boys and girls are not seeking wild times, as they did a year or so ago. I don't know why this. I'm merely grateful. Youth doesn't seem to get the kick out of being wild that it formerly did. Fear of poisoned liquor, the difficulty of getting it and the increasing interest in the care of the body may help to account for this.

Then, too, the dancing frenzy of three years ago is waning. The students are not seeking to overdo dancing either in hours or in extremes of new steps. The increasing cost of dancing parties has made this recreation less popular with the boys and some of the boys' clubs have tabooed it for this reason.

The decline of the jazz age is farther reflected in the costumes of high school girls. Clothing instructors say the girl students are dressing more sanely and in better taste this year than ever before. Extreme short skirts, sleeveless party dresses, flashy jewelry and excess of powder and paint are considered declassé now in virtually all the high schools.

TEXAS NEWS IN PARAGRAPHS

The two gins in Wharton have ginned to date 5302 bales of the 1927 cotton crop.

In the past two weeks 22 cars of live stock have been shipped from Fredericksburg.

The Missouri Pacific Lines again this year will send out an exhibit car of Valley grown products.

The attorney general has approved \$15,000 of waterworks bonds of the city of Rio Hondo, Cameron County.

Heavy shipments of asphalt are being made from the mines near Cline in Uvalde County. Four of the mines are now in operation.

The state will collect about \$1,600,000 gasoline tax for September, or about \$100,000 less than for the previous month, Comptroller S. H. Terrell estimates.

Many of the Lampasas county farmers will go into winter quarters this year with their pantries well filled with canned meats, vegetables, fruits and preserves.

Approximately 2,500 acres of young Bermuda onions will be transplanted at Laredo soon. It is expected that more than 1,000,000,000 plants will be shipped out.

Six cement plants located in San Antonio, El Paso, Dallas, Houston and Fort Worth produced 5,607,374 barrels during 1926 and sold 5,024,359 barrels of the product.

City of Sinton street bond election, calling for \$113,000 to be expended on the streets, carried by a majority of 29 to 1, giving water, sewers, gas, lights and paved streets.

Approval is given by the attorney general to an issue of \$150,000 of road bonds for Road District No. 26 of Brazoria County, bearing 5½ per cent interest and maturing serially.

The commissioners' court of Goliad County has called an election for November 19 for the purpose of voting bonds in the sum of \$400,000 for building a system of roads in Goliad County.

The Hidalgo County commissioners' court has been petitioned to form a special road district taking in the territory in and around Mission. Authority to vote bonds for concrete roads is asked.

Plans for the fourth annual turkey trot, which is to be held at Brady, November 11, are nearing completion. It is planned to make the 1927 show the largest and most colorful in the history of the turkey industry.

By the end of 1927 there will have been completed in the West Texas oil fields steel storage tanks capable of holding 22,000,000 barrels of oil, and this does not take in the 24,000,000 barrels in the Panhandle field.

Flintonia has a force of workmen and trucks putting gravel on several blocks on Market street. The property owners on North Main street are contemplating having about 18 feet tarmacked from the O. S. T. Highway to the curb.

Truck growers have organized the Southwest Texas Growers' Protective Association of Asherton. The object of this association shall be to promote, protect and develop the agricultural and commercial interests of Southwest Texas.

Elaine Arnold, 16-year-old Houston (Texas) girl, has been awarded the Sembrich musical scholarship, after competition with the leading amateur singers of the country, the Juillard Musical Foundation announced Monday in New York.

The turkey production in the West market section will be unusually good this year as many poultrymen have increased their flocks and the wolves, which destroyed such large numbers last year have been killed to such an extent that little if any damage to the flocks has been reported.

Labor conditions in Texas are "normally healthy," C. W. Woodman, head of the United States employment bureau, says. By this term Woodman explained he meant there is some employment in the state, but not more than when the situation is at the best of recent years and not enough to make poor laboring conditions.

Philadelphia was given next year's convention of the American Bankers' Association at the executive council meeting at Houston last week.

"Texas, Our Texas," composed by William J. Marshall and Gladys Yakum Wright, Fort Worth, was selected by judges of the state song contest Saturday at Dallas as the state song of Texas. The contest was held for two days, each entry was numbered and the name of the winner was not disclosed until after the selection by the judges. The winning song was No. 9 and was presented Saturday.

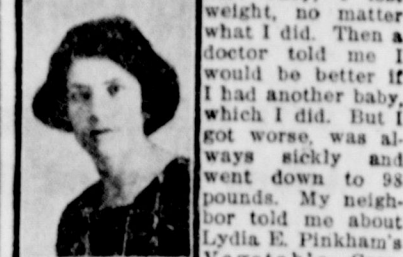
Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the plant of the Paris Candy Company at Paris, causing a loss estimated at \$65,000.

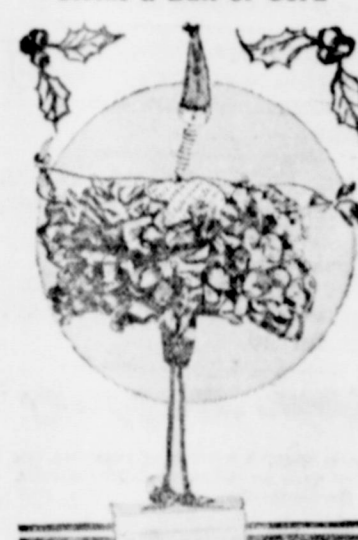
What to Give at Christmas Time

Holds a Ball of Cord



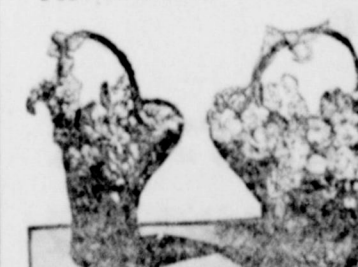

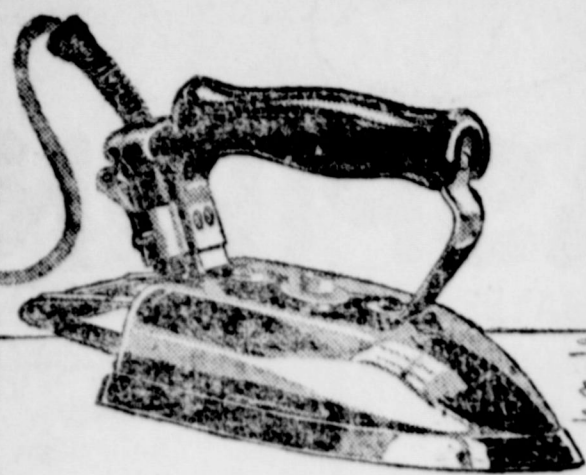
