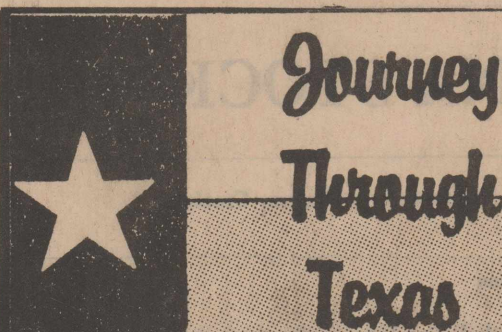

Ozona ranchers, cowboys and 4-H club members turned out 113 strong to leave Ozona Thursday morning at 9:30 to meet up with the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train in Barnhart Friday.

Trail ride participants head out 113 strong

Crockett County's Sesquicentennial Trail Ride got off as scheduled Thursday morning under bright but windy skies.

The trail ride formed at the rodeo park and wound around the elementary schools before heading up Hwy. 163 to Barnhart. A total of 113 residents left either on horseback or on one of the three wagons, with only one resident deciding to walk the trail to Barnhart. The walker was Ken Harrison, pastor of Ozona United Methodist Church. On Friday, he jogged into Barnhart ahead of the local group.

The trail ride traveled along the old O-B Trap Co. to Midway Lane where they set up camp for the night at the Larry and Troy Williams Ranch.

The Ozona Lions Club held a barbecue supper on the campgrounds.

By the time the townspeople arrived to partake in festivities, campfires had sprung up all over and there was a horse tied to every tree and wagon. Riders were sitting around swapping tales about the old west and the comradery was infectious.

Eleven goats were barbecued by the Lions Club. The cooking, under the leadership of Harvey Hill, was done at the VFW post, then transported to the campsite. Goats were furnished by Sonny Henderson and Tom Cameron. Supper consisted of goat, beans, biscuits, pickles and onions. Over 500 persons were served by Lions Club members, who had sold tickets in advance for \$3 per plate. The entire eleven goats were consumed along with the trimmings.

A program followed the meal, with Troy Williams giving an historical talk on the history of the O-B Trap Co. and the early days when Barnhart was a large livestock shipping point. Following his talk, local square dancers, "The Levi's and Lace Club", entertained the crowd with square dances and offered lessons.

Country and western music was presented by local musicians. They included Rod Chalmers, Sandy Stokes, Jim Wilson, Ollie Sudduth, Jean Sudduth and several others.

Following a cold night on the divide, church services were held Friday morning, conducted by Jim Furr and Rev. Ken Harrison.

After being joined by more riders from Barnhart and Big Lake, the train moved out Friday morning for the 15-mile journey to Barnhart. Arriving in Barnhart around 4 p.m., the local train met up with the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train.

Larry Williams was responsible for clearing the right-of-way to the Barnhart camping ground. Huey Ingram,

who took part on the trail ride with his pack mules, was also responsible for providing port-a-potties.

Tina Moran and Dr. Don Carlisle were along to provide medical service, and Sheriff Billy Mills was in charge of traffic control.

The local group camped some distance from the big wagon train, which camped at the Linthicum Ranch on the east side of Barnhart. However,

Primary objective of SCS is to maintain productivity

One of the primary objectives of the Soil Conservation Service is to help ranchers maintain or improve the productivity of their rangeland. Understanding what the water cycle is and how it influences the productivity of rangeland is very important for properly managing rangeland.

The water cycle is the never ending movement of water from clouds to soil, through plants, and to clouds again. The cycle begins when precipitation strikes the land and ends when the water leaves rangeland either through runoff or evapotranspiration. During this time, livestock producers should store as much water as possible within the soil for use in forage production.

Water is usually the limiting factor in rangeland productivity. The moisture in every raindrop, snowflake, or hailstone may be used productively on the site where it falls, or it may go downstream as clean water or it may carry parts of the soil on which it fell. When runoff water is dirty, it is taking a little of the potential of the land.

When falling raindrops strike bare soil, the impact causes both splash erosion and soil compaction. This results in faster runoff and increased erosion. A good plant cover breaks the force of the raindrops and allows the water to move into the soil. The soil affords a large reservoir for moisture storage, reducing flooding, enhancing water quality and promoting a greater and more consistent supply of forage.

A healthier, more productive water cycle is the result of proper grazing management that increases plant cover and vigor and reduces soil erosion. Plants and the litter they produce affect the water cycle in several ways. They break the impact of raindrops on the soil surface. Litter acts as a sponge and slows runoff, which gives moisture more time to move into soil. Plant roots increase soil porosity so water moves more readily into and through the soil. They also hold the soil particles in place and reduce erosion.

several participants expressed the opinion that the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train, which is making its way across Texas, had become more commercial than anything else and felt the local train was more authentic.

Saturday morning the Sesquicentennial train encamped to journey to Big Lake, where several activities were planned. Many Ozonans were in Big Lake for the weekend of events.

A vigorous plant cover is an important part of influencing the water cycle and making effective use of the precipitation falling on rangeland.

All range management practices will affect the water cycle to some degree. The local Soil Conservation Service office working through the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District can help ranchers increase the benefits of a healthy water cycle on their ranch.

Survivors include his wife, Marge Smith of Ozona; a sister, Mary Kerbow of Winnsboro; a niece and five nephews.

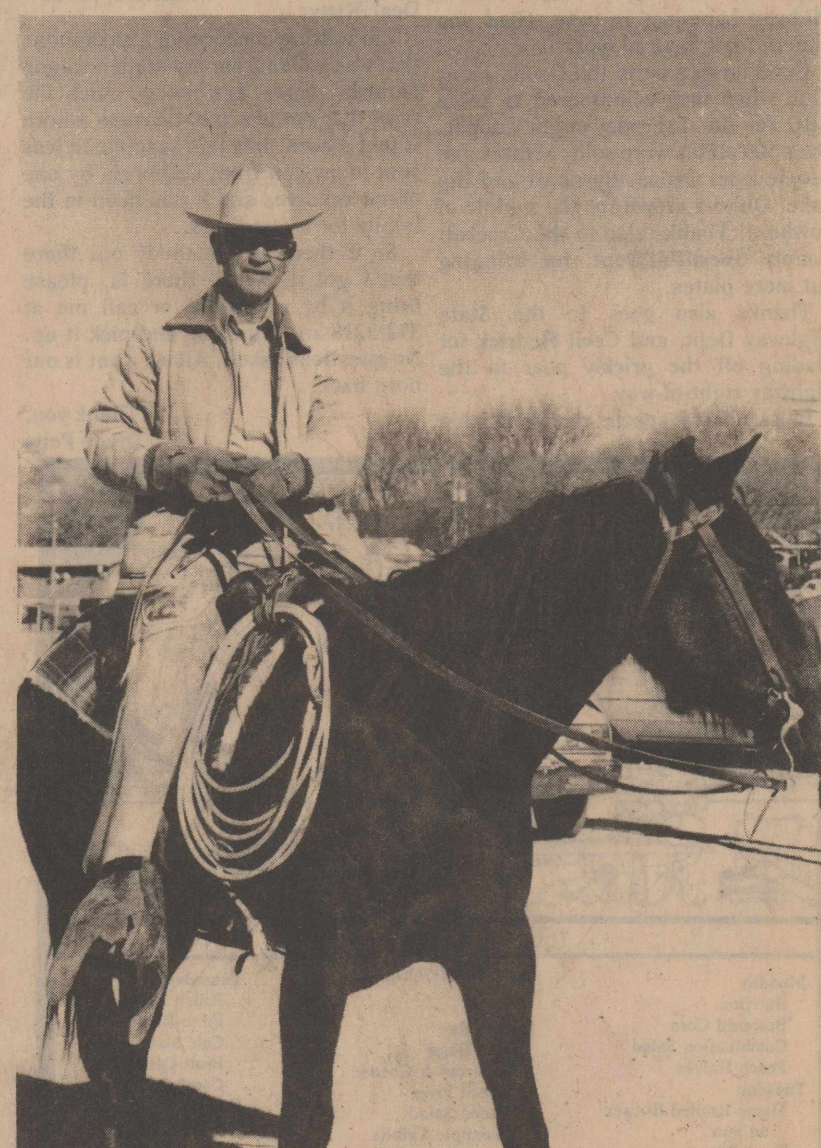
Mr. Schauer died Saturday evening at his home in Comstock.

Last and most important, I thank the Good Lord for looking after us. We had two beautiful days with a rather cool night, no rain, no grass fires, and no serious accidents.

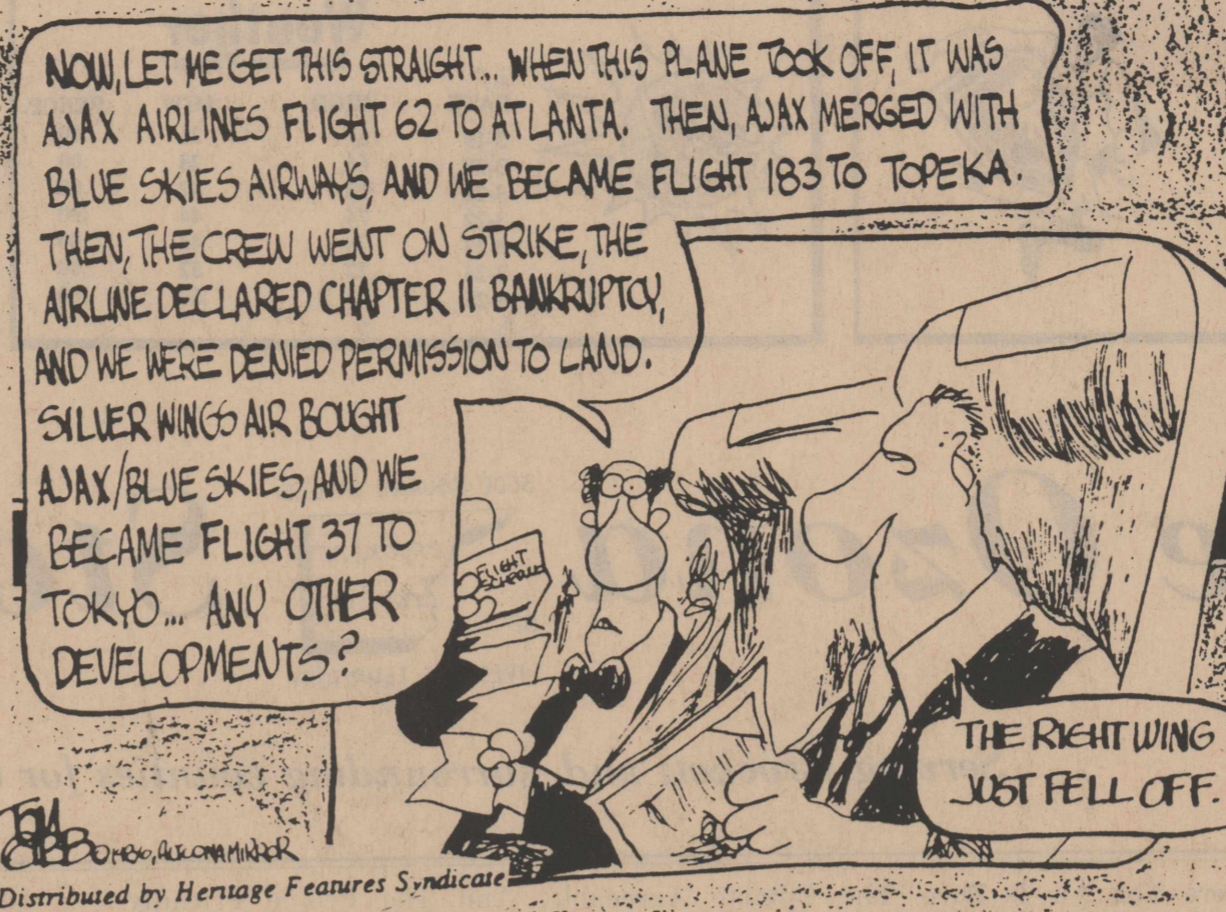

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—The Texas economy took two hits last week, one when the Lone Star Steel mill in Northeast Texas confirmed its layoff of 2,000 workers, and the second, when the feds took control of two state lending institutions and another six were put on watch.

Governor Mark White took the campaign trail in earnest, touring the steel mill and blaming President Reagan for allowing a "foreign invasion" of Japanese imported steel, and adding his staff is putting together a \$324,000 grant program to retrain the laid-off steel workers.

In doing so, White missed his usual weekly press conference, but he may regard that a blessing. Now that the statewide televised debate looks hopeless, White's Democratic opponents are vowing to show up at his own press conferences in an effort to get Mark White to debate the issues.

One, Andy Briscoe, drove a tractor up the Capitol steps last week and, from the drivers seat, explained his farm platform. Briscoe, from Dallas, claims growing rural support.

Changing the Reforms

The second major contender to dump White, Don Crowder, told the Capitol press he welcomes a political fight with Dallas tycoon H. Ross Perot, who chaired the panel which created the "no-pass, no-play" school reforms.

Crowder wants to alter the reforms, and Perot vowed to beat any candidate who tried

to tinker with them. So far, Crowder hasn't backed away from anyone this campaign, but Perot isn't exactly faint-hearted himself.

Tests, Taxes

For the first time since the education reforms were enacted, Mark White last showed signs of retreating from his hard-line stance. Speaking to a high school honors class, he expressed his fear that the recent teacher competency test would cause the loss of good teachers.

Whether that was an off-the-cuff remark or not, some Capitol watchers feel that White's only chance to stay in the Governors Mansion is to make peace next month with public schoolteachers.

So far, teachers haven't endorsed a candidate and while teacher groups protest when Mark White appears, theoretically the door is still open for a reconciliation.

Last week, Texas Education Commissioner William Kirby, a White appointee, asked parent-teacher organizations to tell the Legislature to prefer higher taxes to cuts in education.

Meanwhile, the American Federation of Teachers said a letter on their stationery endorsing White's reelection was "a fraud."

Party Chairmen

Texas GOP state chairman George Strake has all but endorsed state Sen. Buster Brown to replace him this summer and is trying to get him the votes on the party's execu-

tive committee. Brown was prevented from running for attorney general by Strake and Texas courts on a constitutional point of order. The only announced candidate is party vice chair Diana Denman of San Antonio.

Texas Democratic chairman Bob Slagle was recently appointed by White to the Red River Compact to handle occasional problems with other states. The job brings a \$23,000 salary plus expenses.

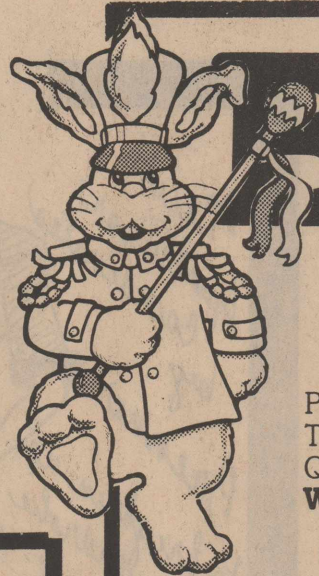

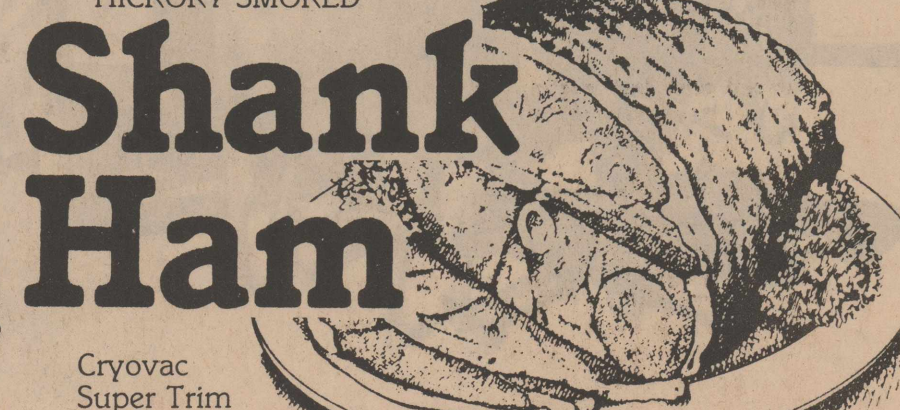

Sheraton is selected for site of Hamanake Mohair competition

The Sheraton Hotel, San Angelo, has been selected as the site for the sixth Hamanake Mohair Trophy competition. This year's competition, again sponsored by the Hamanake Co., Ltd. of Kyoto, Japan, will be hosted by Wool Growers Central Storage-San Angelo, Sanderson Wool

Commission Co.-Sanderson, Wool Growers Central Storage Co.-Ozona. The competition will be held on May 22nd with judging starting at 8:30 a.m.

Entries in the competition must be delivered to any of the three above named warehouses by April 1st and are subject to the General Rules of the

Competition. Eligibility of entries: Entries will be accepted from any U.S. producer of mohair in either or both of the following two classes:

1. Adult: Exhibitors will be allowed to enter one bag, which must be spring adult mohair with an average diameter between 33 and 38 microns (26-22s). Lots finer than 33 microns will be allowed to compete but will receive penalties for excessive fineness. Length must be from four to six inches. Stain must be removed and the mohair must be free or virtually free from burr or seed or other contamination. Bags must contain a minimum of 100 kilograms (220 pounds).

2. Kid: Exhibitors may enter one bag of spring kid (second shearing) mohair with an average diameter of from four to six inches. Stain must be removed and entries must be free or virtually free of burr or seed or other contamination. Bags must contain a minimum of 50 kilograms (110 pounds).

Special competition bags are available from member warehouses of the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association, the host warehouses and the San Angelo office of the Mohair Council of America.

Entries may be transferred to competition bags upon delivery to the host warehouses at no charge to the contestant.

All entries must be good quality mohair, well prepared with no evidence of crossbred mohair. Entries shall contain no capes, tops or 12 months fleeces. Any entries considered not worthy of the competition may be disqualified by the judges.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club
by Mrs. Bailey Post

It seems I missed guessing we would have the welcome shower last Monday night, so maybe we will have more to follow. Now we are hoping a late freeze or frost will miss us, for the fruit and other trees all over our city are in bloom or bud.

Prune suckers on grafted fruit trees. The graft union usually appears as a small bulge at the base of the stem, a few inches above ground level. During the growing season, it is important to remove suckers arising below the graft union. They contribute nothing to fruit production and saps energy from the growth of fruit-producing limbs.

If your Liriope border plant was damaged by the freeze, cut it back to just above the ground. About the only way to cut the blades satisfactorily is by hand with a pair of stout scissors. Usually within several weeks after cutting, new blades will sprout and the appearance of the plants will be remarkably improved. It also improves the quality and number of blooms later.

Clumping perennials, such as shasta daisies, chrysanthemums, and day lilies, should be divided into smaller

clumps every four or five years, since over-crowding often results in weakened plant vigor and unsatisfactory bloom. The best times to do this is spring or fall. By dividing them now, your plants can become re-established in plenty of time to put on a good show this summer and fall.

Day lilies are most spectacular in mass plantings and are particularly useful for controlling erosion on banks. Fertilize them about one month after resetting the plants with 5-10-10 or similar complete fertilizer at the rate of 1 tablespoon per plant or 1/2 cup per square yard of bed area.

A popular foliage plant for use in flowerbeds is the copper leaf. It is a useful background for low-growing annuals. The orange-froze color of the leaves is especially pleasing in the fall when this plant is used as a companion for mums. Set out after danger of frost is past. After plants have been in the ground about a month, begin pinching out the tips of the stems to encourage branching. Compact, bushy plants produce more flowers.

Time to green up your lawn for the summer heat

About this time of the year home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the spring season just around the corner.

Billy Reagor, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, suggests three operations that can get a lawn off to a good start—scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer.

Scalping a lawn in early spring serves to revitalize it and promote early spring green-up, points out the agent.

Begin the operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower 1/2 to 1 inch below the normal setting. Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing.

Reagor also recommends keeping the lawnmower blade lowered until mid-summer.

After scalping the lawn, apply a complete fertilizer (one containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium) to promote leaf and root growth. Use 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square

feet of lawn area. This is equal to 12 pounds of an 8-8-8 fertilizer or 8 pounds of a 12-4-8 fertilizer. Repeat the application in the early summer and fall.

For a dark green lawn, the agent suggests applying nitrogen every 50 days at the rate of one pound to 1,000 square feet. Monthly applications of iron chelate or iron sulfate during the spring and summer promote a healthy color in St. Augustine lawns.

To keep crabgrass or other unsightly weeds from becoming a problem, apply a preemergence herbicide (weed killer) containing benefin, dacthal or bensulfide in early spring, after the grass has recovered from winter, says the agent. Applying a preemergence herbicide too early this year could further weaken turfgrasses injured by winter conditions. Combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use but, as with all herbicides, should only be used according to instructions on the label.

Proper maintenance is essential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn.

Rosewood to re-enter two wildcat wells

Rosewood Resources Inc., Dallas, will re-enter and clean out to old total depth of 6,630 feet for wildcat tests on the Wolfcamp at its No. 2 James T. Padgett, dual Connell gas and lower Strawn oil opener in the Padgett field of Crockett County, on the southeast edge of the Clara Couch multipay field and eight miles northeast of Sheffield.

It was dually completed June 17, 1984. From the Connell, it made a calculated, absolute open flow of 850,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 324,585-1, through perforations at 6,434-44 feet. From the lower Strawn (now depleted), it flowed 83.53 barrels of 35.1 gravity oil, plus 5.56 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 2,550-1, through an 18-64 inch choke and perforations at 6,434-44 feet.

Location is 467 feet from the northeast and southeast lines of 17-AZ-S.C. White Survey.

The Clara Couch field currently has two Wolfcamp oil wells producing at 5,670 feet.

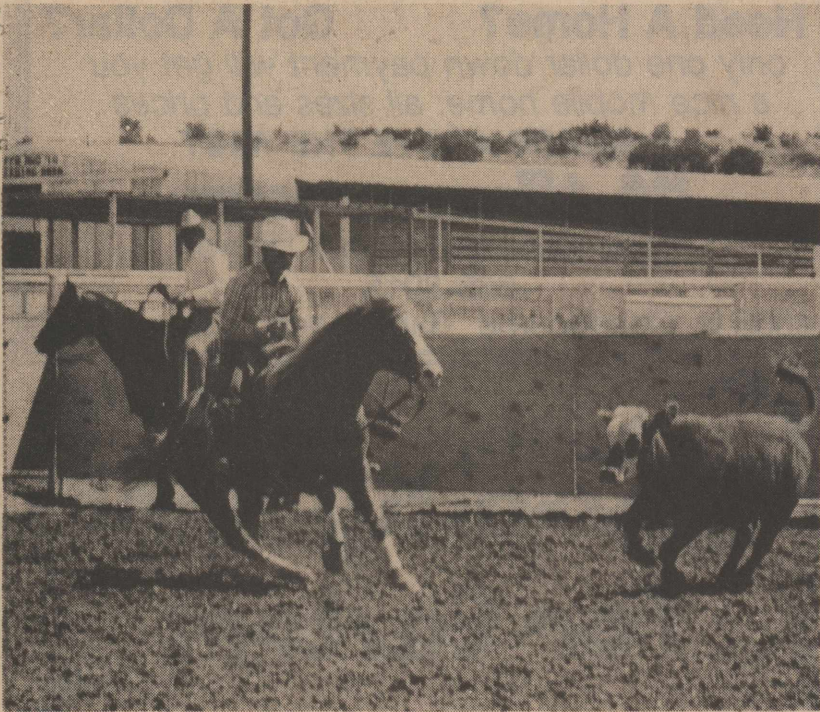

Easter time usually requires some type of egg, especially when children are present. Hard cooked eggs commonly suffer from several problems. They don't peel easily or cleanly. The yolk is not centered and there is a black line or division between the yolk and the white. Overcooking toughens the yolk and causes the hard surface between the yolk and the white. A thin layer of mineral oil preserves egg freshness, but causes eggs to not peel easily. Storing eggs with the small end up generally centers the yolks better. Humidity and egg handling prior to the consumer's purchase are critical. These conditions are so important that an egg one week old, held under refrigerated conditions (35-55 degrees) can be fresher than an egg left at room temperature for one day. Easter pageant is March 29 in Junction

Each year on the slopes of Lover's Leap, a craggy bluff a mile south-east of Junction, a few scenes from the Bible are played out among the boulders and the cedar. For the past 35 years on the evening before Easter a cast of Junction amateur performers have presented a pageant in the natural amphitheatre depicting the last week of Jesus Christ's life on earth. This year the pageant will be presented on March 29. Spectators are not charged admission to view the pageant from their cars in the parking lot below the 14 natural, hillside stages. The performance begins at 8 p.m. and ends with the ascension of Christ shortly after 10:30.

Originally the pageant began at 3 a.m. with the ascension scene timed with the sunrise. The time was subsequently moved back to midnight, then 10 and finally 8. "Of course the symbolism is lost but the rise in attendance has been worthwhile," said Paul Henry, chairman of the pageant committee for its sponsoring organization, the Men's Bible Class. The class, a local non-denominational group was founded in 1948 by a Methodist minister Rev. James Jordan. He was the first director in 1950. Current director is Jo Ella Whitworth.

According to the files of the Junction Eagle the first performance's attendance was 2,500. Henry said 3500 to 4,000 would be a realistic attendance figure now. Approximately 250 cars can be parked in the pageant grounds' lot and an equal number accommodated on the fairway of the local golf course. Around 100 performers pantomime the 13 scenes of the pageant supported by script readers whose words are broadcast to the crowd over a loudspeaker system.

from the supermarket, again refrigeration is necessary to preserve freshness. Storing eggs in the special tray in refrigerator compartments is not recommended. Frequent opening and closing exposes the eggs to air. This hastens the loss of carbon dioxide, which increases the air cells that flatten egg yolks and thin whites and decrease flavor. Hard-cooked yolks can be frozen to use for toppings or garnishes, while hard-cooked whites become tough and watery if frozen. Fresh egg whites can be frozen without any added ingredients, while fresh egg yolks require special treatment to retard gelation. Gelation can be retarded by adding one-eighth teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 teaspoon sugar, or 1 1/2 teaspoon corn syrup per 4 egg yolks or 2 whole eggs. **PEANUT BUTTER PUDDING TREAT**
1/2 C. quick-cooking rolled oats
1/2 C. plus 1/2 C. packed brown sugar, divided
1/2 C. chopped peanuts
3 T. melted butter or margarine
1/2 C. all-purpose flour
3 C. milk
3 beaten egg yolks
1/2 C. creamy peanut butter
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Stir together oats, 1/2 cup brown sugar, peanuts and butter or margarine. Spread mixture in bottom of 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees F. for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool; crumble. In saucepan, combine the remaining 1/2 cup brown sugar and the flour. Blend in milk and egg yolks. Cook and stir until bubbly. Cook and stir 1 minute more. Remove from heat. Stir in peanut butter and vanilla. Cover surface with waxed paper or plastic wrap to prevent skin from forming. Chill. In parfait glasses, alternate layers of pudding and oatmeal crunch mixture.

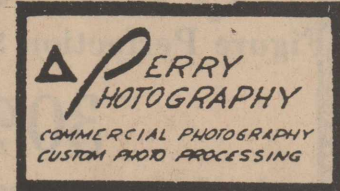

Money matters often confuse citizens of new republic

As this decade of the 1830s is coming to a close, money has taken on a very special meaning for the citizens here in this young Texas Republic, mostly because currency is so scarce. Since business conditions in the United States determine the financial condition of Texas, our financial system has many limitations. In addition, it is a time of increasing inflation.

Metallic money is scarce, and what little exists is hoarded. In addition, our imports exceed our exports, and the severe trade imbalance has drained out the gold and silver upon which our economy had initially been based. The result is that our pay claims have to be converted into merchandise because goods for personal uses were more important than gold or silver.

The main form of revenue for Texas now is farming, with cotton being the best cash crop. Planters turn their cotton or vegetable produce over to a general mercantile firm to be given credit in the firm's accounting ledger. Farmers then use their credit to buy supplies and merchants get paid when they sell the crops at major trade centers like New Orleans.

There is not one incorporated bank, private bank or banker to be found in Texas, so merchandisers in Galveston, Houston, San Antonio and Nacogdoches often provide many of the same services.

In private transactions most of us just resort to bartering. Handwritten warrants for specific amounts are issued between individuals in return for goods or services performed. You can also endorse and sign a warrant over to another person to clear a private debt. A warrant is drafted on colored paper and when it is paid, "cancelled" is written on it and a triangle cut into it.

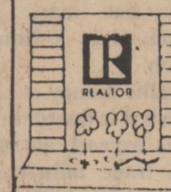
