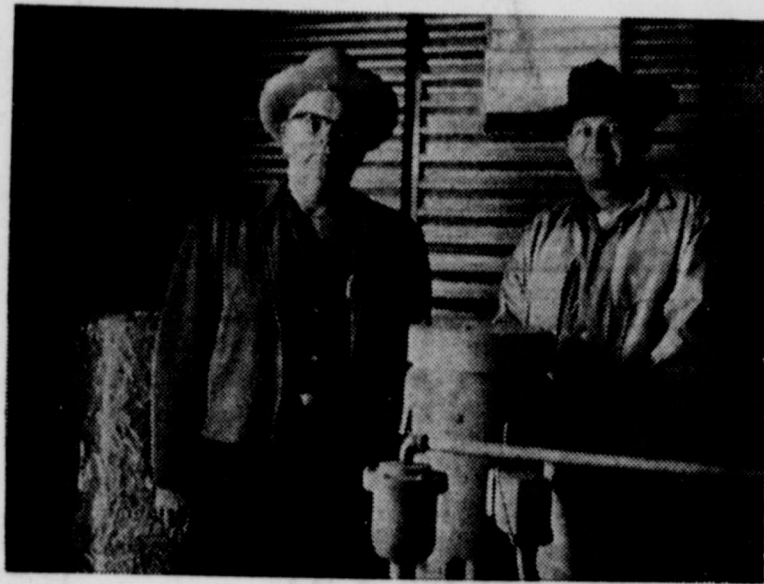

New Deal's New Water System Begins Service

The new water system at New Deal is ready for service, according to a report from the New Deal Water Committee, Billy Fortenberry, chairman. Initial activities in securing a water system for New Deal began in 1963, with the election of the Water Committee.

Construction, with Glenn Hemphill, Lubbock, as contractor, began in 1964.

Financing of the water system came through the Farm and Home Administration, which granted the New Deal Water System a \$108,000.00 loan.

Two wells, one east of the railroad, and another about a mile and one-half southwest of New Deal, will supply the water that will be stored in a 50,000-gallon capacity tank atop a tower east of the railroad.

New Deal's water system also includes some 20,000 feet of main lines, ranging in size from four inches to eight inches, and about 16 fire plugs. Plans are being discussed for a volunteer fire department, and for securing surplus firefighting equipment from a government agency.

The Water Committee expects the system to start serving about 85 customers, with an increase to 100 water meters by summer. Minimum rate is \$6.00 for the first 3,000 gallons, and scaled down to 50c per 1,000 gallons for volume users.

Everett Keeton, who operated the lumber yard in New Deal several years ago, will be water superintendent for New Deal's Water System. An office for the system has not been obtained.

The big main lines cross under the present U. S. Highway 87 in four different places. Also, large water mains were installed west of the proposed location of the new four-lane divided U. S. Highway 87, which will be constructed around the west side of New Deal. Also, the southwest well in the water system will be west of the new highway to be built. This will allow water service for future home or business development west of the new highway.

Junior High In Local Tourney

The Abernathy Junior High Intramural basketball Tournament will be held February 11, 12, and 13. There will be seventy-nine boys playing on ten teams and eighty-eight girls divided into 8 teams. Team names have been chosen and high school students have volunteered to act as coaches for these teams. There will be seven sessions with the first six being played in the Junior High gymnasium and the last session being held in the High School gymnasium. There will be an admission charge of 10c for students and 25c for adults for each session. Admission fees will be used to pay for the awards which will go to individual members of the first place, second place, and consolation team winners.

One of the primary purposes of our intramural tournament is to provide an opportunity for all seventh and eighth grade boys and girls, who so desire, to participate in a team sport.

Lubbock County Farm Bureau Is Seeking Members

Lubbock County Farm Bureau is staging a county-wide drive for members beginning Monday and continuing through February 13, according to Carter Caldwell, Slaton, membership chairman.

Lubbock County Farm Bureau now has 1,504 members and is out to increase this number to 2,000, to become "number one in the state," according to President B. B. Hobgood, Wolforth. The drive is a part of a statewide effort to enroll 100,000 members in the Texas Farm Bureau in 1965. The state organization ended 1964 with 92,552 members.

Governor John Connally proclaimed February 8-13 as "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Texas, and Lubbock Mayor Max Tidmore designated a similar observance for Lubbock during the same period.

Castor Beans Approved For Layout Land

Castor beans may again be grown on certain diverted land in 1965, Congressman George Mahon has announced.

Importance of the crop in this area is attested by the two processing plants under construction or planned by Plains Cooperative Oil Mill and by Baker Castor Oil Company.

Mahon's wire follows: "Agriculture Department officials advise me that castor beans will again this year be permitted to be grown on wheat and grain diverted acres for the 1965 year crop.

"There will be a partial payment for the diversion of feed grain acreage at a rate of 30 percent of the average diversion rates earned by the farm on feed grain or wheat.

"The rate last year was 50 percent on the minimum rate earned by the farm.

"Perhaps the equivalent rate being announced this year would be approximately 40 percent. For those farmers with more than one feed grain, the effective rate will be approximately the same as last year."

City Election Is Set April 6

The City Council of Abernathy met in a regular monthly meeting Monday, February 8, at 7:30 in the City Hall. All aldermen were present along with Mayor Roy Jones and City Manager Charles Norwood.

The City Council voted unanimously to set the date for city officer elections on April 6 of this year. Two seats on the City Council and the Mayor's position will go up for election. The Council listed several names of possible nominees who will be contacted later.

The Council also voted to go under the railroad line with the water pipe from the airport section. The new well which was drilled there recently will soon be gravel-packed according to the Council.

The Council also voted to appoint aldermen Billy Skipper and W. T. Settle to serve as City Manager until a new one is secured. Norwood will be leaving at the end of this month for a position in Oklahoma.

Aldermen present at the meeting were W. T. Settle, Dan Ward, Billy Skipper, Royce Henson and Jim Bob Smith.

Funeral Is Held Friday For Elza Wayne Lambert

Funeral rites were held at 2 p. m. Friday in Abernathy Church of Christ for Elza W. Lambert, 35, who died unexpectedly at 1:45 p. m. Wednesday, Feb. 3.

Bobby Hoover, minister of the Vandelia Village Church of Christ, Lubbock, officiated. He was assisted by Ed Bryant, minister of the local Church of Christ.

Burial was in Abernathy Cemetery under direction of Chambers Funeral Home.

Palbearers were E. J. Pope, Jr., Bob Riley, Elton Settle, Vernon Pettit, W. C. Bryant and Fred Crenshaw.

Elza became ill early Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 3, at a place he farms northwest of Petersburg. He started to Abernathy. After driving about six miles, Elza encountered Joe Oswalt, who farms the Lennie Ragland place at the intersection of FM 54 and FM 400. Elza asked Joe to take him to Abernathy Medical Clinic, and Joe brought him from the Ragland place to Abernathy, a distance of about 12 miles. Elza died of heart attack shortly after he arrived at the clinic.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Gary, 8, and two daughters, Nancy, 11, and Patsy, 14, all of the home; his mother, Mrs. L. W. Lambert; a brother, Charles, and a sister, Mrs. Robert K. McAllister, all of Abernathy.

Elza Wayne Lambert was born August 16, 1929, in Ford County, Texas, on a farm between Vernon and Crowell.

His family resided there until 1943, when they moved to this area. Elza was preceded in death by his father, L. W. Lambert, who died here in 1957.

Elza was graduated from Abernathy High School in 1946, and he attended Texas Tech.

Elza Wayne Lambert and Miss Jo Ann Vaughn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Vaughn of Abernathy, were married in Abernathy in 1949. Elza farmed in this area, and recently was working about 1,000 acres.

A member of Abernathy Church of Christ, Elza was serving as Sunday school superintendent at the time of his death. He had served as a deacon of the church some years earlier.

In addition to his church work, Elza was active in civic affairs. He was serving as a trustee on Abernathy School Board at the time of his death.

Elza was a member of the board of directors of South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc., Lubbock. He was a stockholder in Hygrade Gin, Inc., Abernathy.

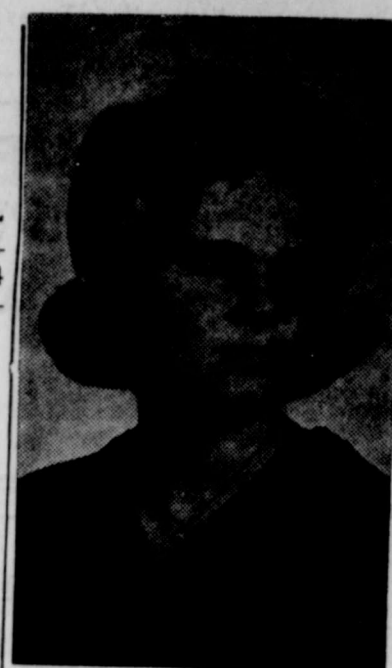

Antelope Teams In 4 Victories

The Abernathy Antelope cage teams chalked up four wins in district competition last week including two wins over the district hopeful Dimmitt Bobcats. The victories in these contests dropped the Dimmitt boys to a 6-2 record in district and knocked the Dimmitt girls out of a tie for the lead with Friona. Both local cagers put on one of the finest performances of the year in the victories.

The local fens scored an astonishing 74 points behind the hot shooting of three Senior forwards. Donna Webb had 28, Linda Miller, 24 and Denise Barker, 22. This scoring punch along with strong defenses led by Senior guard Cheryl Hall swamped the Dimmitt girls 74-52.

The Antelopes managed a 72-67 victory over the strong Dimmitt Bobcats for their fifth win against three losses in district play. The 'Lopes jumped to a 6-point first quarter lead, but were behind by two at the half. The score was 51-all going into the fourth quarter, but the 'Lopes managed to outscore the Bobcats 21-16. Boyce Paxton was the spearhead of the 'Lopes' second half comeback as he scored 19 of his 22 points that half. Lane Wade and Mike Tannehill both scored in double figures to boost the point total.

Both Antelope teams walked away with smashing victories over Lockney last Friday night. The girls were victors in a 71-48 contest that was an easy victory. All three starting forwards for the local fens scored in the twenties again to amass the 71-point total. Donna Webb had 26, Denise Barker, 24, and Linda Miller, 21. Donna took game honors as Myra Quebe of Lockney scored 20 points.

The boys' contest was even more of a slaughter as the 'Lopes won by a 30-point margin 72-42. Lane Wade was high scorer for the 'Lopes with 18 points. Bob Kropp was high for Lockney with 11 points so Wade took game honors.

In other action Friday night, Friona clinched the District 3-AA title in both the boys' and girls' division. With a 61-40 decision over Olton, the Chiefs chalked up their ninth victory against no losses in district play. The closest contender, Dimmitt was eliminated by Abernathy as it suffered its second defeat Tuesday night.

The Friona Squaws also clinched the league title Friday night with a win over Olton. The Dimmitt Bobbies would have had a chance for a tie with a win at Friona Feb. 9, but they were defeated by Floydada 45-41 in an overtime Friday night. Their third loss put them out of district competition.

HEMPHILL GET CONTRACT HERE

Glenn Hemphill, Lubbock, was awarded the contract to pipe water from the airport section into Abernathy. He also will construct the 500,000-gallon water reservoir on Ave. H south of 6th St., and the booster pump stations between the airport and town.

Hemphill was contractor on the new water system at New Deal and the water system at Cotton Center.

Hemphill's original bid on the Abernathy project was \$218,850. Revision on a pump further lowered the cost to 217,900.00.

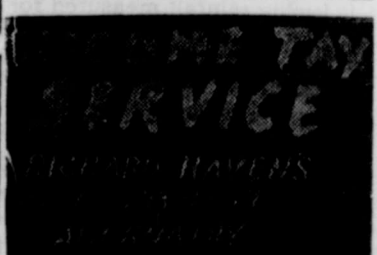

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AHS Juniors To Present Play February 26

The senior class of 1966 of Abernathy High School will present the annual Junior Play on Friday, February 26, in the school auditorium. The play, "The Mouse That Roared," was adapted by Christopher Sergel from the book of the same title written by Leonard Wibberley. Sergel wrote the play in two acts with four main settings. Hale Voting Strength Is Near 8,000

The pace of poll tax payments and exemptions issued in Hale County accelerated in the final days to bring the total to 7,290, exceeding that for the last off-election year, 1963, which saw a combined total of 7,156.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Bill Hollars reported a total of 5,530 polls issued and 1,360 exemptions.

Hollars estimates, however, county voting strength to be close to 8,000. This is because persons over age 60 living outside the city limits of towns of 10,000 population or more are not required to secure an exemption.

Cotton Sign-Up Is Under Way

Cotton producers who wish to participate in the domestic allotment program for 1965 are given from February 8 through March 26 to make their intentions known to County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Services offices.

Lorene Mangum, Acting Office Manager of the Lubbock County ASCS, says: "This sign-up is a new development for cotton farmers, and for that reason a special effort is being made to get the word around." She adds that the sign-up this year is being conducted in the hope that it will make farmers more aware of the benefits available under the program. A domestic allotment program was also in effect last year, but no sign up was required, giving farmers the opportunity to gauge yield prospects before deciding whether or not to participate.

Farmers have the choice of planting within their domestic allotment—thereby qualifying for a payment of 4.35 cents per pound on the farm's established normal yield times the acreage planted for harvest in 1965 in addition to the price support of 29 cents per pound basis mid-dling one-inch at average location—or planting within their effective allotment. Effective allotment is total acreage allotted after any release and reapportionment, and farmers electing to plant their total effective allotment qualify for the 29 cent price support only, without the necessity for signing up.

Domestic allotment on most High Plains farms is 65 percent of the 1965 effective allotment, but on small farms for which 1965 allotments are not released to the County ASC Committee, domestic allotment is the smaller of 15 acres or the 1965 effective allotment. Farms on which the domestic and effective allotment are the same are not required to sign up for participation in the domestic allotment program, but all others must sign up prior to March 26 in order to participate.

Those who elect to plant within their domestic allotments may grow other cash crops on the remaining part of the effective allotment, but if the effective allotment is over 15 acres they cannot plant feed grains in excess of their feed grain base and still qualify for supplemental payments.

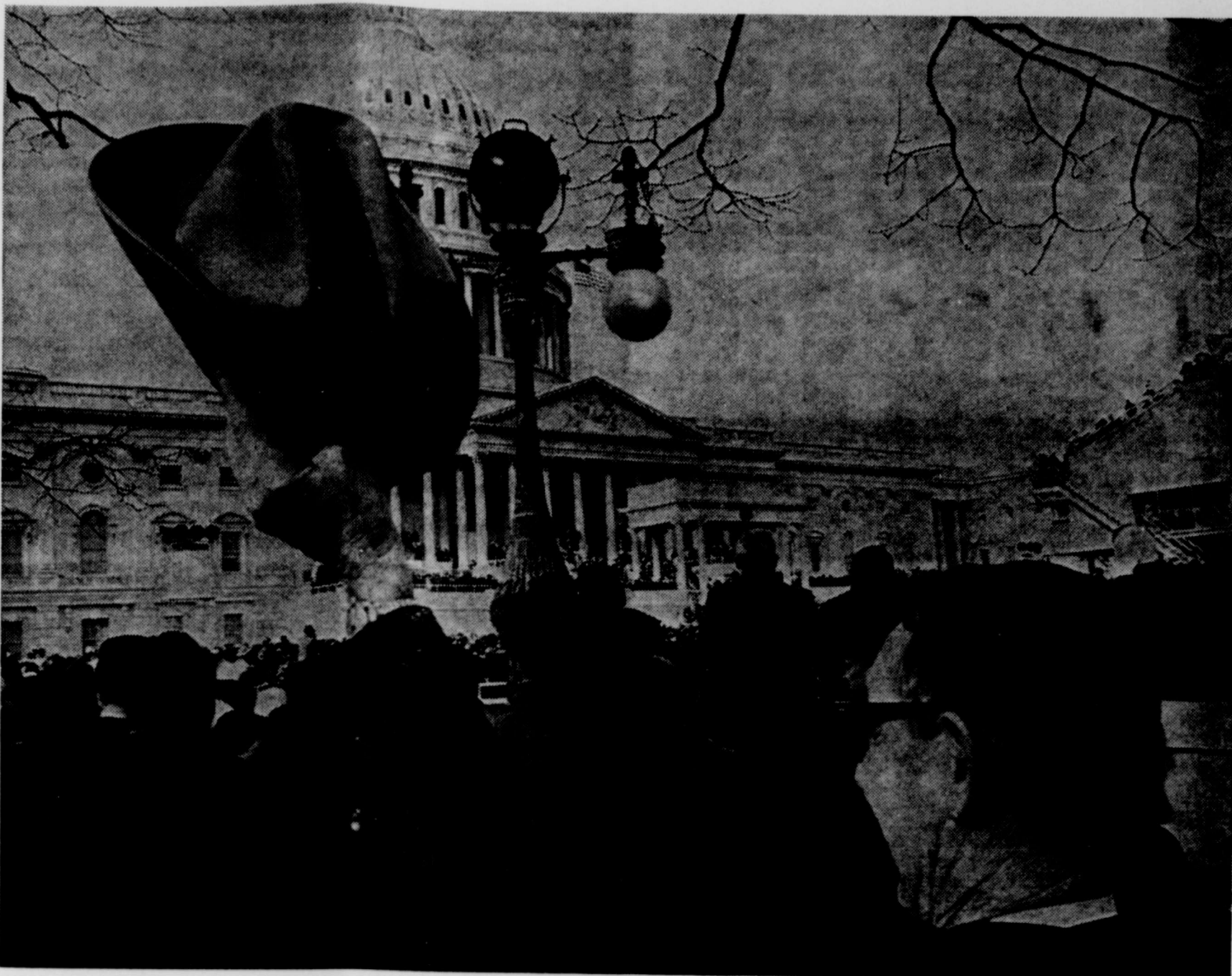

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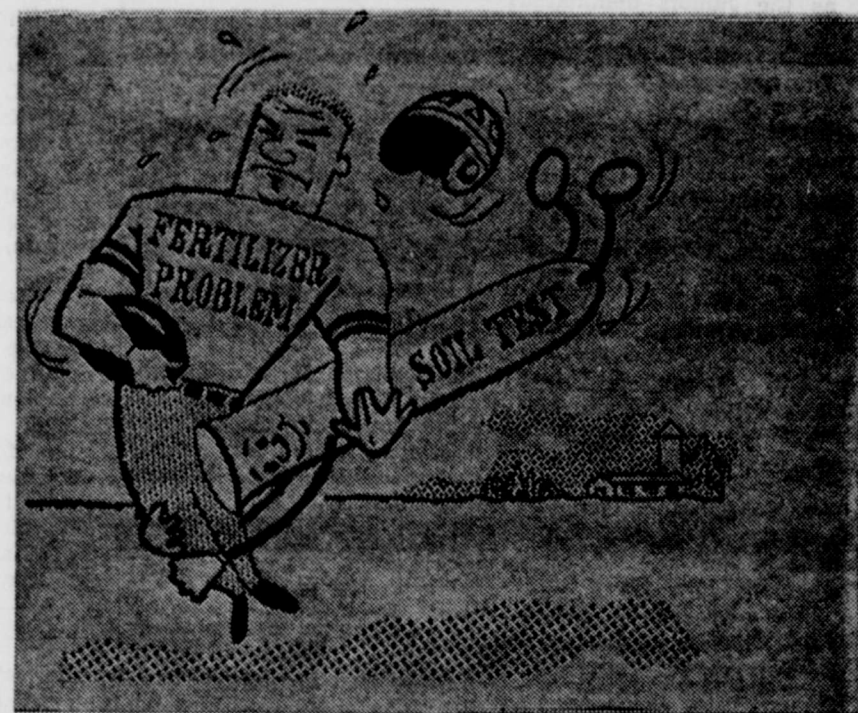
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PROGRESSIVE BUSINESS AND CIVIC - MINDED PEOPLE OF PLAINVIEW AND VICINITY
