## January crime suspect arrested

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department, this week, arrested a former Spearman resident for alleged theft of services and violation of probation.

Ray Moyer, 47, was taken in custody and arraigned on the two counts.

The theft of services supposedly occurred at Spearman back in January this year.

Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin observed this was the first criminal arrest in days in the midst of a flurry of department activities with d-

omestic disturbances and other minor difficulties.

"There just hasn't been any criminal activity of consequence to pursue," Sheriff McFarlin noted. "If the entire year goes like this we here in the department and the residents of Hansford County are going to be in 'TALL WHEAT.'"

# Spearman, Century 21, people help Easter Seals

Here on the High Plains and all across the nation, the men and women in the gold blazers have a heart beating under that "Century 21" emblem...

This was dramatically demonstrated on the Easter Seal Telethon last week when a lead representative of Century 21 real estate dealers including those in our area, presented Pat Boone and the Easter Seal Society with a check for \$1,015,000.00!

In television interviews a few weeks ahead of the scheduled Easter Seal Telethon, Pat Boone, now the permanent Master of Ceremonies of the telethon, expressed some anxiety because of the state of the economy but both individuals and business and industry -- typified by Century 21 -- outdid themselves and the week end of entertainment by some of the greatest talent today garnered more than \$20 million!

Spearman and area residents had a substantial part in raising this amount. All through the hours of the telethon, the Spearman Chamber of Commerce was open and manned to take gifts to the Easter Seal Society. In addition, workers stood ready to pick up donations phoned into the chamber office.

The office location, the phone number -- and a running score of monies raised at Spearman were shown from time to time on the Amarillo television screen participating in the nationwide telethon during broadcast area segments.

The Easter seal society was the first of six major groups known as far as method and scope are concerned. Others were tuberculosis, heart, cancer, March of Dimes (polio) and muscular dystrophy.

Others have come, some gone already and these have changed their scope according to services needed both have remained the lifelines

through which great numbers of Americans have shared the cost of these health problems.

In at least one instance - polio - a cure was perfected and that organization went on to help other birth defects in children. With "TB" practically eliminated, the Tuberculosis Association changed to the Lung Association and concerns itself with more intensity with things such as emphysema.

The Easter Seal Society did not change...it just grew...Its scope and effectiveness are the same today as the first year of its existence...that date lost to ready remembrance somewhere back in the aeons of time.

Through the years its work with children received the most publicity because the toughest of our society are "suckers" for the plight and the needs of little children. But the Easter Seal Society has never limited itself to specific areas of treatment or age brackets.

More than two decades ago, while spending some months at the family home in Palm Beach, Florida, Joseph Kennedy, -- then the father of the President of the United States was stricken. His doctor called consultation after consultation with the same results: Kennedy money was worthless against the paralysis.

Then a physician "up north" advised, when called, to take the elder Kennedy to the small but well-equipped and well-staffed Easter Seal Clinic in West Palm Beach. The result is history. Joseph Kennedy walked many, many steps in the years following before his death.

This reporter worked some fruitful years for the Tuberculosis Association in Florida but our preference has to be with the Easter Seal society for selfish reasons.

We were working for a very large ad agency on the Eastern

Seaboard at Jacksonville. Our employer asked us to fill in for him at an evening meeting of the board of the local Easter Seal Society because it was the first planning session of the annual fund-raising campaign. His participation was a surprise followed by another when we were instructed to "promise them anything they ask us to do." He was not known as a generous man.

We had lost almost all the dexterity of both hands to scar tissue and other burn damage and our pen grip and use was strange. A rather small, quiet mannered man watched us through the meeting and after the close asked if I had a moment. He explained he was one of the doctors on the Easter Seal advisory board but his medical activity -- other than emergencies -- was limited to administering the large, privately operated Riverside Hospital there.

He explained what the society's clinic there had that might help but it required a doctor's prescription -- which he wrote.

The treatment started with a daily series of dipping the hands in hot melted wax until they were generously coated then sitting until all the heat was gone. We went the entire route.

Today, 22 years later, we can touch-type comfortably with considerable accuracy at 80 words per minute because of that treatment.

When we left there a few years later, we asked for -- and got -- that prescription from the clinic files. You see, it was signed by: "Frank G. Slaughter."

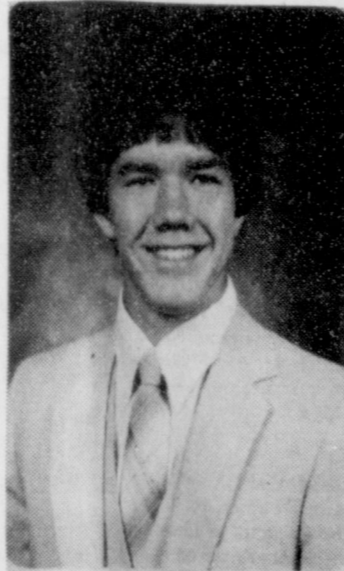

### '82 Ag receipts down \$1 billion in Texas

COLLEGE STATION—Total cash receipts from farm and ranch products in Texas were down about \$1 billion—or 9 percent—last year compared to 1981.

Cash receipts from agricultural production last year are estimated at almost \$9.6 billion based on figures compiled by Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"This total figure is based on input from county Extension agents and Extension economists from the various regions of the state," says Anderson. The total estimate does not include government payments.

"1982 was obviously a tough year for Texas farmers and ranchers due to the general downturn in economic conditions and poor farm prices that resulted from huge stockpiles of agricultural commodities," notes Anderson. "Weather losses also were heavy in some areas, particularly in the South Plains where hail destroyed more than half of the cotton crop."

Cotton led the decline in cash receipts from crops, which totaled almost \$3.8 billion compared to the previous year's \$4.6 billion. Cotton receipts dropped from \$1.4 billion in '81 to \$875 million last year.

Sales of food grain crops, mainly rice and wheat, were down almost \$300 million at

\$739 million. Feed crops—corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley, hay and ensilage—sold for just over \$1 billion, down only slightly from 1981 levels.

Oil crops—soybeans, peanuts, sunflowers, guar and flax—contributed \$228 million to last year's receipts—up moderately from the previous year.

Receipts from vegetables were at \$364 million while sales of fruits and nuts added another \$83 million; both of these categories of crops had reduced sales last year.

Sales of all other crops totaled \$412 million, up from \$339 million in 1981.

Sales of livestock products contributed most to the overall agricultural receipts in Texas last year—more than \$5.1 billion although the total was down \$300 million from '81. This included the sale of meat animals, dairy products, poultry and eggs, and various other livestock products, such as wool and mohair.

Cash receipts from cattle and calves alone totaled \$3.8 billion or 40 percent of the state's agricultural sales.

Hog sales totaled \$113 million while sheep and goats contributed another \$65 million.

Sales of dairy products amounted to some \$545 million while poultry and eggs kicked in another \$514 million.

The sharpest increase in cash receipts came from farm-based timber, horses, fish farming, hunting leases, farm pond leases and recreation. Receipts in these areas jumped from \$581 million in 1981 to \$724 million last year.

"Despite the economic woes in agriculture in 1982, Texas continues to rank third in the nation, behind California and Iowa, in total cash receipts," says Anderson. "The \$9.6 billion in agricultural receipts has a tremendous effect on the Texas economy to the tune of about \$35 billion in economic activity."

Looking to the future, the economist sees some encouraging signs for farmers and ranchers. "Farm prices and incomes will improve as supplies decrease and demand increases," says Anderson. "Hopefully, the PIK program will be successful in reducing the level of surplus commodities. In addition, production costs should be fairly stable through 1983, and reduced interest and inflation rates should also help the farm economy."

### C-Days A-Comin'

C-Days A-Comin'! What are "C-Days"? Here in Hansford County, these will be the special days when American Cancer Society volunteers will ring the doorbells of friends and neighbors as part of a month-long educational and fund-raising Cancer Crusade which begins April 5th and lasts through April 20th for our area, according to Mrs. Pat Hoyt, Gruver, Crusade Chairman for the Hansford Unit said today.

A special feature of C-Days will be the distribution of a new ACS pamphlet, "Check Your Health." This little red, white, and blue pamphlet might help save some lives right in our Hansford County area it was noted. "It offers a quiz on one's risk of developing cancer. The risk increases with age, and it depends on lifestyle, and one's medical history," she said. "The folder contains different questions for men than for women, and also lists safeguards that anyone can observe to improve the chance of not getting cancer." C-Days also will provide an opportunity for people to contribute toward the support of the Society's overall cancer control program, which include research, public and professional education and

patient services and rehabilitation. 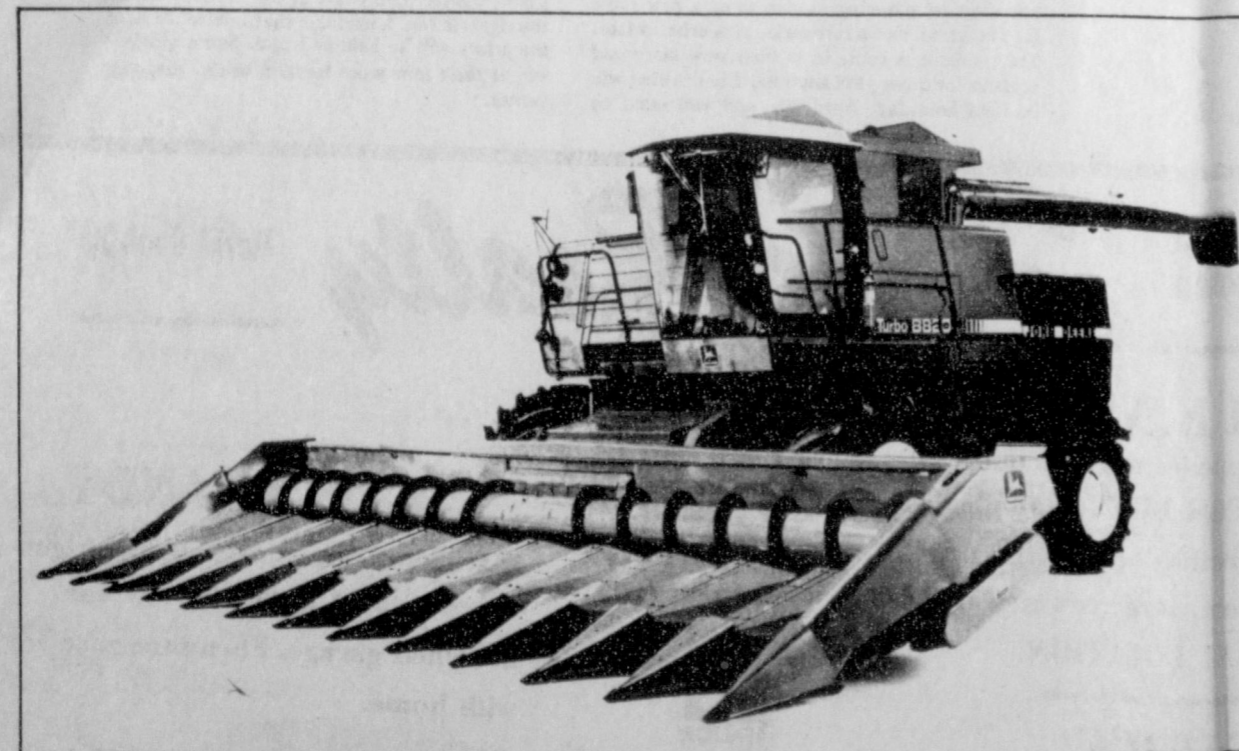

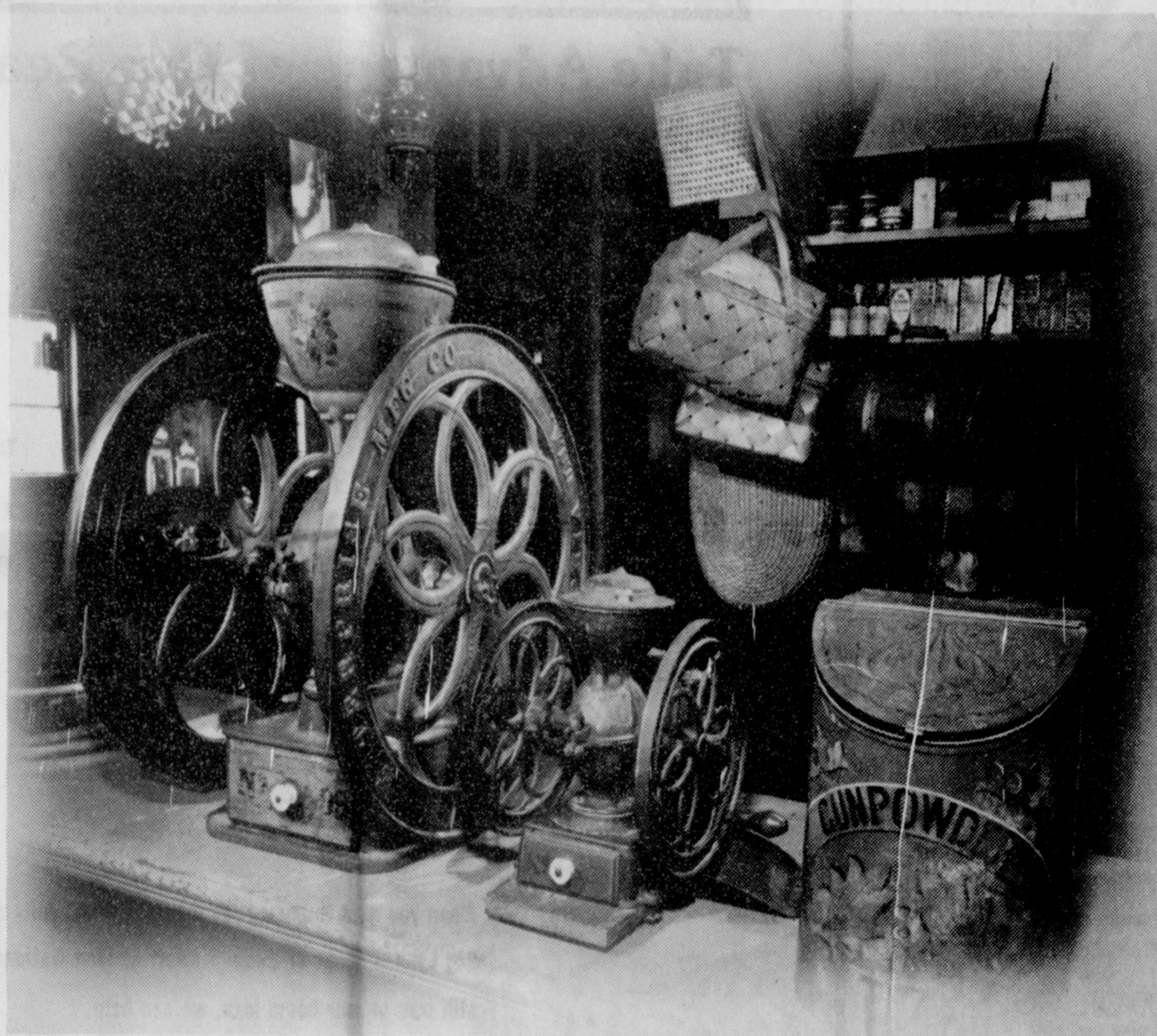

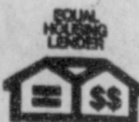

# High PIK sign-up should help farmers

COLLEGE STATION--Now that the wraps have been pulled off the PIK (Payment-In-Kind) sign-up, it's clear that farmers "went for" this latest government farm program.

Consequently, the high level of participation in the program, as announced by USDA officials yesterday (March 22), should bolster farm prices by getting rid of surplus stocks of commodities that have plagued the marketplace for the past several years.

"We have the potential for a substantial drawdown in surplus stocks of farm commodities due to the large number of farmers signing up for PIK," said Dr. Ron Knutson, an economist in marketing and policy with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The PIK program revolves around paying farmers with surplus commodities if they sign up to take a portion of their cropland out of production. So it reduces current stocks plus should reduce 1983 production.

"The potential effects of PIK have already caused positive reactions in some commodity markets," Knutson pointed out. "Whether this trend continues will depend largely on weather conditions this crop year and the level of export demand." Knutson noted two keys to future market trends. The first is the yield that can be anticipated from land remaining in production, since this is the highest quality cropland. Weather conditions will have a big impact.

The second key to future price prospects, said the economist, is the export picture. While the strong PIK participation may make it more difficult for U.S. farmers to sell in the export market, the potential for shorter supplies of farm products next fall may prompt some importing countries to buy now rather than wait and face possible

higher prices.

If PIK works as planned, what kind of farm program can farmers expect in the future?

"If highly successful, PIK will likely not be used again next year," said Knutson. "At the same time, PIK's effectiveness in reducing production this year could mean that we'll see it again when surpluses become a problem."

"Assuming that PIK will get us through the 1983-84 crop year without major policy changes, lawmakers are already looking ahead to 1985," said the economist. "The choice for 1985 becomes one of a continuing drift toward production controls or a policy reversal--moving back in the direction of a freer market in which farmers would have to accept lower levels of price and income support."

One strategy for moving toward the freer market concept involves "self-help" programs in which farmers would automatically share a portion of the costs of government programs when surpluses arise, said Knutson.
