

LUBBOCK INVADES AMARILLO

KAISER WILHELM RETAINS HIS MILLIONS

GERMAN REFERENDUM FAILS TO REGISTER ENOUGH VOTES TO TAKE HOHENZOLLERN PROPERTY AWAY

15,000,000 VOTE FOR EXPROPRIATION, WHILE 500,000
VOTE AGAINST IT; BUT 19,500,000 WERE
NEEDED FOR MAJORITY

BERLIN, June 20.—Germany has refused to deprive her royal families of the land, treasures and other possessions which they acquired before the German empire with its kingdoms and duchies became a republic.

The bill to expropriate \$500,000,000 worth of property belonging to former Kaiser Wilhelm and numerous kings and princes was defeated when a majority of the republic's qualified voters failed to go to the polls.

Many instances of terrorism and violence were reported.

At 11:30 Sunday night, official preliminary returns showed that 15,000,000 votes had been cast in the referendum, of which 15,000,000 favored confiscating the royal estates and 500,000 opposed it. The total vote was all that mattered, however, for the measure could not be carried unless a majority of the nation's qualified voters cast their ballots. With anything less than 19,500,000 voters the measure was automatically defeated.

Indications were that the vote in favor of confiscation without compensation would run between 16,500,000 and 17,000,000.

Nationalists and monarchists who had led the bitter fight against the attempts of radicals and socialists to expropriate the former ruler's property had urged the German people to defeat the bill by refraining from voting. This accounted for the measure poll in opposition to the measure.

Hundreds of thousands of ballots were invalidated and many thousands of these had been mutilated by voters forced to go to the polls by radical terrorists. Eighteen persons were injured, seven serious, in a revolver battle between fascists and communists at Halle.

It now appears that the same sentiment which elected Paul von Hindenburg to the presidency has also prevented seizure of castles, forests, jewels, art treasures and other magnificent holdings of the Hohenzollerns and other dynasties.

Von Hindenburg, who served his emperor as commander of the German armies during the great war had come out openly against expropriation and it was believed that he would have resigned almost instantly had the attempt to take away the royal property not been defeated. Violating his custom, Hindenburg stayed up late Sunday night to receive the returns.

Says Two Leagues of Nations Now

ROPE OF PEARLS WORTH THREE MILLION DOLLARS LEFT BY QUEEN OLGA OF GREECE TO CHILDREN

ROME, June 20.—Former dowager queen Olga of Greece who died recently, left a rope of pearls valued at \$3,000,000 to her children and heirs of the late king Constantine, the reading of her will has revealed.

Although the testament is essentially sentimental, most of the royal fortune having been lost because of the political vicissitudes of the Greek state, the dowager queen showed a profound love for her servants.

To Miss Baltazzi, her lady in waiting, she bequeathed her personal effects. Valuable objects of art are to be sold, the proceeds to be given to her servants.

In her will, the dowager queen expressed a desire to be buried beside her husband, King George I, at Castle Tatoi, near Athens.

King Victor Emmanuel has placed a royal train at the disposal of the former dowager queen's relatives. The Greek minister in Rome called Sunday to notify the family that President Pangalos of Greece would not oppose burial of the late queen in the country which she ruled as regent in 1920.

The minister said that Pangalos would send a war ship to carry the body back to Greece if it were desired. The offer probably will be declined, however.

ONLY ONE OF PARTY IS
SAVED IN TRAGEDY
IN MICHIGAN

SAULT ST. MARIE, Mich., June 20.—An exhibition of the Charleston in a crowded rowboat on the St. Marys river cost the lives of six young persons from the Canadian South late Sunday afternoon when their frail craft upset. Only one person in the boat was saved.

The dead are: Peggy McIntyre, 16; her sister, Anna, 14; Emeline Carey, 14; Art Tessier, 16; Clement Cornier, 13 and John Parsons, 13.

Isaac Jorjivier, 16, was the only survivor. He was barely able to make his way to shore.

Jorjivier said Art Tessier, who recently won a Charleston contest conducted at the Canadian Soo some weeks ago, stood up in the boat and endeavored to give an exhibition dance. The boat capsized and all the occupants were thrown into the water.

No one witnessed the accident and the young people were unable to save themselves. Jorjivier was exhausted when he reached shore and was forced to rest for a considerable length of time before he could summon help.

HOPE TO RAISE SUNKEN SUB

S-51, WITH BODIES OF SEAMEN
STILL IN, WILL BE BROUGHT
UP TO-DAY

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 20.—Human power and skill will unite Monday to wrest from the ocean, after eight months of futile attempt, the submarine S-51, sunk with the loss of 33 lives off Block Island last September when it was rammed by the steamship City of Rome.

With eight pontoons fastened to her rusty sides, pack-saddle fashion, the under sea boat will be raised engineers agree, unless the Atlantic again kicks up huge waves to defeat the salvagers.

Derricks, tugs and other appurtenances of the operations were ready Saturday for the final pull, but rough weather caused postponement and revelation of the sunken craft's grim secrets was withheld temporarily.

When the submersible is hoisted, it will be towed to the Brooklyn navy yard to be chiseled open in order to recover the bodies sealed within her battered hull.

Extraordinary heroism has marked the task of preparing the S-51 for the final upward pull.

Big pontoons had to be sunk with hawsers beneath the vessel resting on the ocean bottom, to hold them fast. Raymond C. Wilson, of Duquesne, Pa., navy torpedo-men, undertook the task. Their work was fraught with danger. They had to bore a tunnel beneath the submarine. Using heavy hose, they twice blasted their way only to be buried when the burrows caved in. Unperturbed, they calmly blasted the cave-ins.

ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY HUBBERS DECKED IN SCARLET AND BLACK TO BIG CONVENTION IN SPECIAL TRAIN

REINFORCEMENTS WILL FOLLOW TUESDAY BY AUTO TO
HELP STORM WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF
COMMERCE CONVENTION

The special train for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention rolled out for Amarillo this morning at 6 o'clock with one hundred and fifty Lubbock boosters aboard to present Lubbock's claims for the 1927 convention. The delegation left with the understanding that several hundred cars will follow bringing other Lubbock delegates up to help make a good showing for Lubbock. 250 are expected by Tuesday.

Other delegations filed through Lubbock in cars during the last few days, several coming through yesterday.

The Post City delegation headed by the 35 piece band stopped yesterday morning early to play a few selections for the crowd which gathered to hear the music. About one hundred and fifty were in the delegation which is to back Lubbock to the last ditch, according to Geo. Sampson, secretary of the Post Chamber of Commerce, with the delegation. "If Lubbock can use our hand or our delegation in any manner he sure to call on us," Sampson told representatives of the Lubbock delegation.

The O'Donnell Boy's Band under the direction of A. B. Taylor hit Lubbock yesterday morning and unloaded to march around the square in their scarlet and green uniforms. Members of the band range from the oldest boy, age 20 down to the youngest of 7 years of age. Dr. C. T. Kibbe, Mayor of O'Donnell and head of the delegation assured Lubbock of their support for the 1927 convention. About seventy-five O'Donnell delegates are in the delegation.

Several delegations are expected to pass through Lubbock today and tomorrow. The special trains are expected to begin whistling through today.

All the delegates going up in cars for one or two days of the convention are urged to attend on Tuesday, according to Spencer Wells, chairman of the delegation parade committee.

"Tuesday is the big day at the convention," Wells said last night. "Every town in West Texas will exert every effort to get their maximum attendance there on that day."

The delegation parade contest for which a loving cup is offered to the winning delegation is to serve as a check on the support the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is receiving from the various West Texas cities. The winner is to be judged on the following basis, miles traveled, 2 number in parade, 3, registered delegates in parade 5. At the Churches Sunday

First Methodist Church

Rev. E. E. White delivered a very timely sermon at the First Methodist church last night on "The Church and Politics." He chose his scripture Deuteronomy 17:14-20. He stated in opening his sermon that this was one of the greatest problems facing the church and one which often arises in the minds of many. The church is always asked what part it shall play in regard to the existing political situations.

In his sermon Rev. White treated the subject in effect as follows: "How shall the church deal with politics? Some say hands off others seem to desire to see the church deal the one dominating factor. My position is that the church should stand definitely through its ministers and its members for all constructive legislation and should support such men for office that are known to possess strict principles of integrity and further to support only those candidates whom they have reason to believe use their influence in carrying out the highest Christian principles. One function of the church is to preach a gospel of personal salvation that will win the individual men and women to Christ. There is, however, another responsibility which comes to every group that proclaims the principles of Jesus as its standard. The church must stand for a reconstructed order, a redeemed society, a transformed state. Our people need to be aroused to a sense of responsibility. Let us study the existing situation; investigate thoroughly the past records of the candidates; ascertain their position upon important legislation, and vote only for those individuals whom we feel will stand for the highest ideals in matters that pertain to human welfare.

"The church does have a right, in fact, it is the duty of it to speak upon questions which pertain to the common good of men. Throughout the whole world of God we find that his ambassadors were vitally interested in the affairs of the state. When Amos found immorality and injustice reigning in home, in business, in politics or in any phase of social life, he clearly denounced all such irregularities. When Micah found corrupt government, through its unfairity with, and oppressing the poor, he emphatically denounced such practices, and publicly stamped his disapproval upon such unfairness. We have record of John's denunciation of Herod and his ungodly reign. We hear Jesus pleading for righteousness in public and in private life. And the minister today who fails to take a stand on moral issues and who refuses to denounce irregularities in government, to plead for the support of officials who hold the highest standards and ideals, has not rendered his full service to the community in which he lives.

"I am not presuming to suggest to you the means of candidates for whom you should vote, but I am ready to say that there are some in local office and in state affairs whose records have disqualified them for office. There will be found on the ballots in July the names of candidates that will be scratched by the voters who cling to the principles of truth, honesty, impartiality, justice, and of righteousness. Measure the standards of these men and of the handful of this woman by the high standards found in the Bible and then cast your ballot."

"Before the people of Israel arrived in the land of Canaan they were given definite instructions as to the type of ruler whom they were to choose. 'He shall not multiply horses to himself neither shall he greatly multiply to himself silver and gold.' It is honesty in office for which the writer of Deuteronomy makes his appeal. There is another demand, 'And it shall be that when he sitteth upon the throne of his kingdom, that he shall write him a copy of this law in a book, and it shall be with him, and he shall read therein all the days of his life; that he may learn to fear the Lord his God, to keep all the words of this law and these statutes to do them.' And it is true that within the pages of this Book may be discovered the foundation of all true government, and the essence of the truth and righteousness that should become the guide of all those who are to have part in the administration of all government affairs."

"But let us now consider a few of the distant qualifications that are essential to all those who would enter public life. In the first place they must show marks of leadership. There are some good men who are not qualified for office because of the fact that they are not safe, competent and sane leaders. Aaron was a fluent speaker, but he was not a safe leader. In the absence of Moses, he yielded to the whim and fancies of the people, and permitted the moulding of a calf of gold before which they fell down and worshipped. Jonathan was the son of a king and heir to the throne, but recognizing that he did not possess the qualities necessary for the kingly leadership, he stepped aside and turned over the administration of affairs to the better qualified, David. We have never made marked progress in community, state or national affairs, when our office holders have lacked ability as leaders. Whether president, governor, constable or justice of peace in the smallest cross roads court, that one man who holds office should be enabled to command the highest respect and esteem of the citizenship because of his known ability. What we need in every office is a higher type of leadership. No one who caters to the whims and the fancies of the people is a safe leader during any crisis. We must have men who are unafraid to stand for the highest principles of honesty and justice. Men whose hands are not tied by the gifts and favors of those individuals who possess and follow sound judgment.

"And are upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone. In whom all the building is joined together, growing into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom ye also are built together for an habitation of God through the Spirit." (Eph. 2:20-22)

This was the text chosen by Rev. Walter P. Jennings in delivering his sermon on "Building or Saving the Individual" at the First Christian Church last night. At the morning services a returned missionary from India related his story of the mission fields and kept the congregation interested throughout with his stories of the conditions in India.

Mr. Jennings' sermon in part: "In a very large measure in these feverish days there is a tendency to sweep humanity into a mass, to encircle every thing into a corporate body; and therefore lost sight and interest in the human unit. Somehow we are so constituted that it is only the things that bulk large that make a dynamic appeal to us; in this twentieth century this characteristic of our nature is being abnormally developed. We are thinking of the redemption of the world, not the community, the transformation of society, not the individual in Jesus Christ. We are not thinking and looking upon the church of Christ as a rescue ship picking up isolated individuals tossed upon the angry billows of temptation, disappointment and sorrow; but we are thinking of it as a great ship of Zion gathering upon the interests and institutions of the entire race of men. It is capital and labor, rather than any one capitalist or laborer who presents a problem that appeals to the modern mind.

19th Street Methodist Church

Rev. Silas Dixon delivered a sermon on "Will ye go away?" at the Nineteenth Street Methodist Church yesterday morning. His sermon in part: "Jesus was here speaking to his disciples just after the controversy with the Jews concerning his life's work. The Jews could not believe the great doctrine which Jesus was teaching. He had stated to the company of people about him that he was the bread of life, that he had come to offer his life. Even the disciples could not accept this wonderful truth or statement of Jesus. They murmured and complained that it was a hard saying. Jesus perceiving that they were not satisfied turned to them and said, 'Will ye also go away,' talking to the disciples. His bosom friend whom he had chosen as his disciples were put to the test. Others had left him because of his doctrine and he wanted to know whether they would leave or not."

"If Jesus were living today, I wonder if he would have to turn to many of his church members and ask us this important question. Many times when the pastor stands in the pulpit speaking for his people concerning the gospel and the cross of Jesus, many of his church members go away. Their pew is vacant and he is forced then to turn to his officials, the deacons, the elders, the stewards and say to them, 'Will ye also go away?'"

"Jesus asked the disciples in the garden of Gethsemane if they could watch one hour. In that awful hour when the sins of the entire world were crushed to earth. The gospel of full salvation is very offensive to many today. They say the preacher has set the standard too high and they cannot live up to it. God's grace is sufficient for us all. He has provided a way of escape for us. We must live holy lives if our Christian religion is powerful."

A good crowd attended the services at both the morning and evening hour.

First Presbyterian Church

"Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy," was the text and subject of Rev. Jack M. Lewis' sermon at the First Presbyterian Church yesterday morning. He chose his text from Exodus, 20th chapter and eighth verse.

His sermon in part: "There are several important words in the text in which due stress should be given. The first word is 'remember', and this should be placed in the mind so that the day cannot be forgotten. The second word which is important is Sabbath Day and the most important word in the text is Holy. It is essential that these words must be connected up; Remember, Sabbath Day, and Holy. Holy should be studied by all men and the real meaning learned. The signs of the times point toward the fact that the Sabbath Day is being secularized and there is hardly anything holy about the modern observance.

"The question arises: How are we to observe the Sabbath Day in a holy manner? It cannot be observed in a holy manner by making a work day out of it. Of course there is some work which is essential but most of that which is done on the Sabbath is done to make the rich richer. It cannot be observed in a holy manner by making a holiday out of it. A large number of the secular pleasures of the day have tended to bring a Christian to the same level as that of the Continental Sunday of Europe."

"In order to make the Sabbath day holy it becomes necessary for the Christian people of America to set it aside as a day of service to God. On the Sabbath Day we must engage in sacred things. We are not calling back the Blue Sunday of America but to a sane, sensible Christian observance of the day as holy unto God."

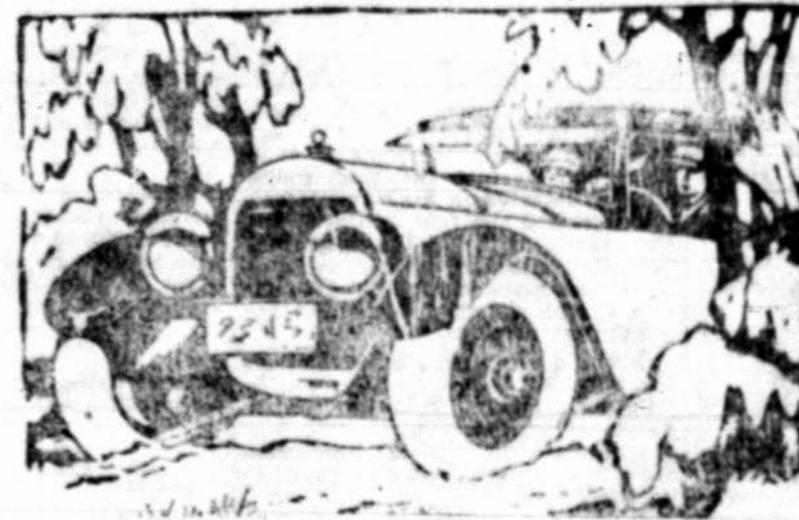

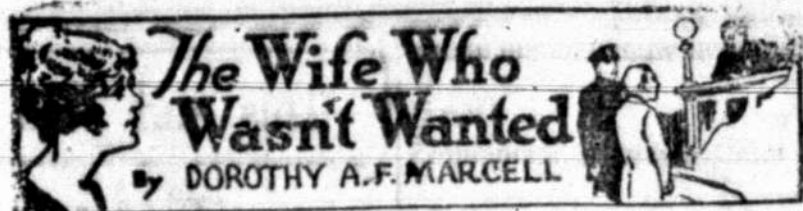

CIVILIZED NERVES

The east is more nervous than the west, says Dr. T. H. Weisenberg of Philadelphia. "That is because the east is more densely populated than any other portion of the country and because the east is the center of the nation's highest civilization."

Here other section may rise to object, not only because of the reference to "civilization," but because Dr. Weisenberg regards nervousness as a merit.

He doesn't mean by that word what we usually mean. He is thinking not especially of jumpy nerves but of quickness of thought and ready response to mental suggestion. This comes he says from a high degree of education and development.

"Lawyers, doctors, newspaper men and other highly trained people belong to the nervous class. They are the people who carry the world forward."

Physical nerves he admits go with this mental progress. The farmer is less nervous than the city man in this popular sense, because he does less work requiring mental activity.

Isn't it possible though while acquiring mental quickness to rise above this physical nervousness through training? Dr. Weisenberg speaks only of east and west in our own country. In the orient are millions of Hindus, Chinese and Japanese who are certainly as nimble minded as we, but who have carried their culture far enough beyond mere brain development to calm their spirits and master their nerves.

SWIMMING TIME

The New Orleans chapter of the Red Cross life saving service announced recently that 2,000 swimmers are rescued every year, 50 per cent of whom would undoubtedly have drowned if it had not been for the life savers.

It adds further that since 1920 1,578 children have been qualified as junior Red Cross life savers, and 579 men and women have been qualified as senior life savers.

In this same period not a life has been lost in any of the swimming places protected by the Red Cross life saving system.

These facts are of special interest at this time of year when deaths by drowning become a part of the news in almost every part of the country.

There is not a finer sport than swimming. But it must be safeguarded. In the first place everybody ought to be taught to swim. Swimming is best learned in childhood when it is easier to overcome the fear of the water and to master the technique. Even the older ones can learn, however, if they are a bit more careful of their hearts than the young ones need to be.

Knowing how to swim is not enough. Swimming places should be adequately protected. Swimmers should know how to rescue bathers in distress; they should know the first aid measures for drowning cases.

Deaths from drowning should decrease in number year by year, as more persons learn how to swim and practice common sense caution, and as more communities realize their responsibility in the matter of lifeguards and general life saving instruction.

BRAZIL AND THE LEAGUE

Brazil's notice of withdrawal from the League of Nations can not become effective for two years. A change of administration at Rio may reverse the decision.

At best it is a blow to the league. Yet in practical efforts it may prove to be a good thing all around.

It clears the way for German entrance into the league, which has been held up by the Brazilian threat to veto German membership unless Brazil was given an equal and permanent place with Germany on the council. Spain still holds the same attitude; but a way can probably be found to straighten that out. Germany will come in, as she should. Then with all the big powers of Europe except Russia sitting round the same council table there should be more chance of Europe getting along with itself. Russian entrance might follow.

Another wholesome effect may appear in South America. Brazil, being a Portuguese nation never represented the Spanish-American republics which make up the rest of Latin America. Her action may amount to yielding Latin American

leadership to Argentina, which is better adapted to representing the Latins of this hemisphere. Argentina herself has been sulking about the league but has not withdrawn from it. With Brazil walking out she is more likely to remain and speak definitely for the great group of Latin American peoples.

That looks desirable from an American standpoint because of our own lack of representation in the league. Neither Argentina nor any other country can speak for the United States; but with a genuine Spanish-American spokesman at Geneva the interests of America as a whole would be likely to receive more consideration.

A CHEERFUL LINCOLN

Of the making of books and statues of Abraham Lincoln there is no need. And most of them, however excellent, as works of art are a "weariness to the flesh" because of their sadness. This is especially true of the statues. Nobody can put a rib-shaking Lincoln story into a statue. And most of the statues portray the great president in his latter years with his spirit overwhelmed by the sorrow of a great civil war.

Lorado Taft is now making a new statue in his Illinois studio, near where Lincoln lived and moved before his days of greatness and tragedy. It is said to be appropriately a "cheerful Lincoln," beardless, friendly and humorous, lacking tragic airs and altogether human and likeable.

This Lincoln is as true as the other and will be welcomed in the memorial gallery of the most loved American.

Having finished that job the sculptor might well try to do the same thing with George Washington, most of whose pictures and statues represent a man too severe and aloof for easy human contact and affection.

NO SELLING OF PEOPLE

Premier Briand took his stand on high ground the other day when a bloc of parliament members wanted to turn over to the United States West Indian island for cancellation of the French war debt. "We have nothing sell," he said. "Frenchmen are not for sale and the natives of our foreign possessions and of our mandated territories are French subjects. The people of the French Antilles are French citizens by law and we could no more sell their land than we could auction off Paris to the highest bidder."

Statesmen have thought differently in the past. Napoleon for example, thought nothing of his obligations to the French subjects of Louisiana when he sold that great colony to the United States. Most powers still regard their colonies as subject to barter and sale. The colonists may remain individual owners of their land holdings; but they go with the land, under a new sovereignty. It was so with the Virgin Islands sold to this country by Denmark a few years ago.

If the big powers will hold to this high ideal it will elevate the status of their colonial citizens and subjects and safeguard the latter's rights and mark the beginning of a better era in the government of backward peoples. Americans can congratulate the French wholeheartedly on this policy because we don't want any of their colonies or mandates, or anybody else's.

BLACKSNAKE AGAINST RATTLESNAKE

Here is a sporting event that should arouse widespread interest. Two Missouri blacksnakes are going to sent to San Antonio to fight two Texas rattlesnakes. The backer of the blacksnakes insists that while they are harmless to human beings they are hostile to rattlesnakes and kill them by the constricting process. If his champions succeed in squeezing the life out of the San Antonio snakes he promises to send 10,000 blacksnakes to exterminate all the rattlesnakes in Texas. When that little chore has been attended to the Missouri St. Patrick might get after the moccasins of Florida and Louisiana and see whether his pets have a taste for the Gila monsters and Jersey skeeters. Formerly the mongoose was supposed to care of such duties as these. But maybe the 18th amendment has driven out the mongoose.

STONE AGE STATESMANSHIP

"Our chemists and engineers," says Graham Wallace in his "Art of Thought," are now contriving by technical means whose subtlety would have been inconceivable to our grandfathers, plans for the destruction of Paris and London; but when French and British statesmen meet to prevent those plans from being put into operation they find it no easier than would the leaders of two stone age tribes to find a common purpose and they generally part with nothing better than a vague hope that war may be avoided by accident and inertia. The chemists and engineers let it be remembered are also contriving in other directions making this an amazing age of constructive achievement. They give man mastery of material forces of the world to use as he will. Then statesmen may turn that mastery to purposes of destruction. What the age needs is less cave man statesmanship and more political engineering.

A QUEEN'S HAIR

Queen Elizabeth of Belgium—through her official spokesman—denies that she has had her hair bobbed. The denial is entertaining: "If her majesty looks as though her hair were shingled," says the royal statement, "that is because of the skill of her hair dresser, who is able to make the queen's hair appear as if it were cut. But no shears have touched her hair." This is reassuring. Most of us have been able to sleep nights from fear that the queen of the Belgians had joined the flappers with a boots bob. But Elizabeth is plainly slipping. Any woman with enough regard for the prevailing style to disguise her hair in imitation of it isn't far from hirsute perdition. First thing she knows that queen will be thrusting a pair of shears into the hands of a maid of honor and shutting her eyes.

Her best opponents are Mrs. Godfree, who defeated Helen Wills twice in 1924 on the history courts, and the Californians Mary K. Browne and Miss Ryan. DAN SAYS JIM ALREADY WHIPPED

MOODY BELIEVES IF ELECTION HELD NOW, NO SECOND PRIMARY NECESSARY

AUSTIN, June 20.—After a strenuous week in the Panhandle and Plains country which he closed with an address at Lubbock on Saturday night, Dan Moody, Attorney General and candidate for governor will rest until Tuesday night, when he will begin the final month's campaign with a speech at Waco.

The past week has been his most active since the beginning of the campaign and between Monday and Saturday he made twenty-four speeches in as many different cities and towns. At the conclusion of his Panhandle tour he expressed great satisfaction over the outlook in that section, declaring his belief that he will have a clear majority of all votes cast between El Paso and Fort Worth.

"I have been particularly gratified at the size and enthusiasm of the crowds," said Moody. "In a number of places I have been assured by old-time citizens that the crowd was the largest political gathering ever held in those places, and several times during the week I was told by leaders in that section that I will receive 80 per cent. of the vote of the Panhandle. The people in that section are busy developing a great empire and they know the importance of stable and orderly government. They are determined to get rid of Fergusonism as quickly as possible, and at the same time, they are resolved not to launch upon untried and unquestionable experiments in government. A restoration of order in governmental affairs, with an honest and economical administration of the government, is what they most desire. And I believe that this is what the people of Texas as a whole desire."

"After this tour of the Panhandle and Plains country and the previous

week spent in South Texas I am convinced that Ferguson is already decisively beaten. I find this conviction among the people everywhere I have gone. There is an element of danger in this feeling, however, for it may cause apathy among the people and thus reduce the vote cast in the election. The votes that will redeem Texas from the present situation and restore orderly government are the votes that are deposited in the ballot box and counted.

"I would like to take this opportunity to urge my friends everywhere to be vigilant from now until election day. Ferguson is beaten, but he is resourceful, and when he realizes he is beaten, which he must, he will attempt to find some means to rob the people of their victory. From the information I have today I believe if the primary was held

now it would not be necessary to hold a second primary. But that very situation so long before election day is dangerous. Nothing must be left undone to make the victory secure. The restoration of orderly government, honestly and economically administered, is the great need in Texas today. If that can be brought about Texas will enter upon one of the greatest eras of prosperity and development in her history. But in order to bring it about it is necessary to repudiate Fergusonism first and is a manner that will send the message to every section of the United States that Texas has put its house in order. There must be no compromise with Fergusonism in any fashion, no matter in what attractive guise it is presented to the people."

In spite of the strenuous campaign he has been making, Moody is in splendid physical condition and is good voice. The rest he is taking now will insure a continuance of his fitness for the remainder of the campaign.

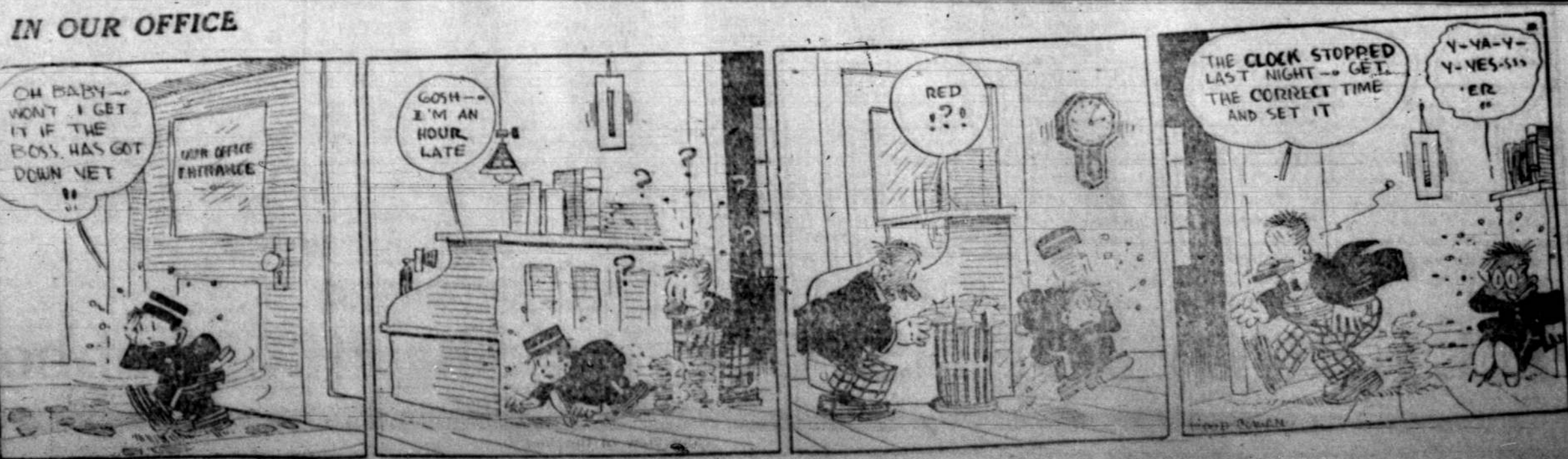
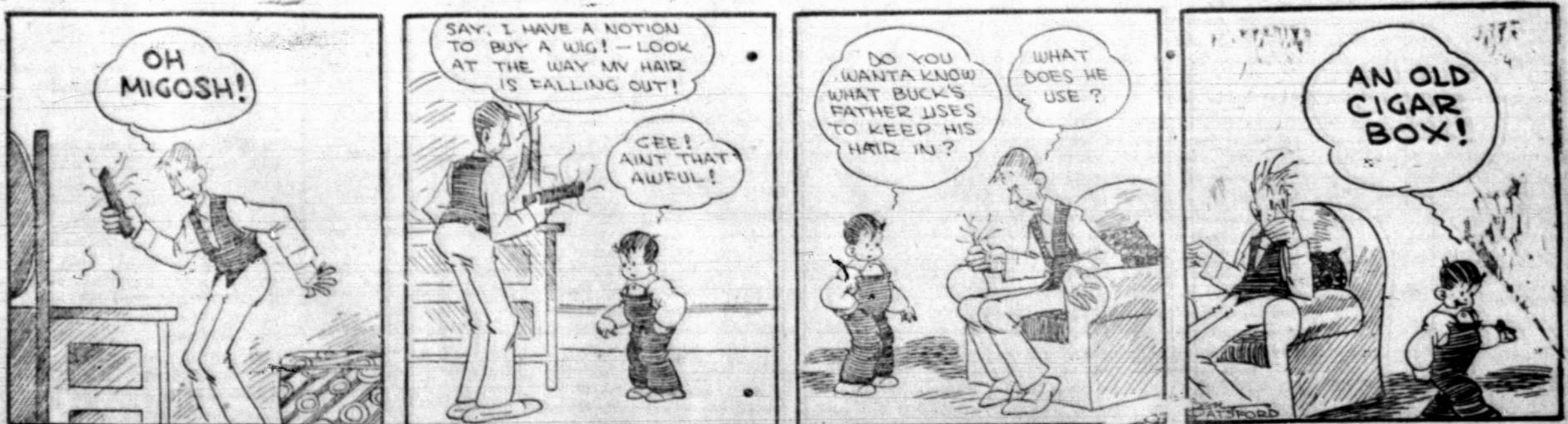

Sheriff (BUD) JOHNSTON

Answers Mr. Witcher

Reply to allegations set forth in paper distributed by W. C. Witcher, candidate for Attorney of the 72nd Judicial District Court and now serving in the office by appointment by Governor Miriam Ferguson.

"This 'Scandal sheet' has developed a political fight between the Law and the Outlaw."—Johnston.

I ADMIT:

That during the four and a half years I have served the people of Lubbock county as their sheriff I have been hard on the criminal element. My action has not been to justify or appease a desire to be harsh in the handling of men criminally inclined, but stern treatment has been necessary to protect the good people of Lubbock county against some of the most dangerous criminals that have ever passed this way.

You know them, they are your neighbors and your friends. You will likewise find a list of the jury commissioners whose duty it was to select the men who have served on these various grand juries since the April term, 1925. You are requested to draw your own conclusions as to whether those gentlemen are the kind of men who would "hand pick" a grand jury for a political purpose or an unpatriotic reason. Therefore, I repeat if the "Honorable" W. C. Witcher had the information that he claims to have had as to my shortcomings and abuses, the law not only made it possible but the law made it his duty to take these matters up before the grand jury and to prosecute me for misconduct of my office.

In answering the allegations that Mr. Witcher has made against me, I want to state, first, that there have passed through my hands during my present administration right at 1700 prisoners who have been confined in the County Jail. Second; the law makes me the custodian of the jail and its inmates and I am responsible for them and responsible to the citizens of this county for their conduct and safekeeping. Third; Witcher himself knows that where the law is silent upon any matter, it is the duty of one charged with a public responsibility to use his own common sense and his best judgment in handling the given situation. Therefore, as custodian of the jail and its inmates and as a guardian of the law and insurer of common decency among those in my charge, where the conduct of these inmates became such as to threaten the total destruction of the property of the jail, and the violation of every rule of common decency and order, and there being no law governing such situations, it became my duty as sheriff of this county to exercise by own common sense and best judgment, and that is the very thing I did, and no man, not even the "Honorable" District Attorney himself is qualified to pass upon my motive or to judge whether my intent was criminal or for the best interest of the public. It is not my purpose herein to answer in detail all of the inflammatory charges that Mr. Witcher has set out against me. It is enough for me to say that some of the prisoners who have passed through the jail of this county are of the very lowest type of humanity. They have cut and sawed the cells of the jail to pieces, they have literally torn up their beds and cut their bedding to shreds, they have deposited their filth on the cell floors, they have stood at the windows of the second floor of the jail and made indecent proposals and remarks to women and girls who passed upon the sidewalk or around the exterior of the jail, of such nature and character as to be absolutely unprintable. These conditions cannot be handled with gloves nor stepped by the use of soft soap. An animal of this breed and character cannot be treated as a Sunday school boy. Under such circumstances I have felt it my unqualified duty to administer punishment or to take any steps that might become necessary to stop such conduct upon the part of the prisoners. When it became necessary to punish they were placed in a dark cell and denied the privileges of the other prisoners. Not all the prisoners I have had have been guilty of such conduct. I have never even threatened physical chastisement to a prisoner in my jail. Nor have any of them reported any misconduct on the part of my deputies to me. Mr. Witcher seems to be the only person who is possessed with such information. If he will take the affidavits of the hundreds and hundreds of others who have been in there, he will find that my treatment of prisoners has been fair and just and impartial, and that at no time has any punishment been administered unless it was justly deserved. I deny these allegations as set out by Mr. Witcher. I brand them as false, and I do not believe that the public wants a sheriff who will sit down and learn to knit and crochet while a bunch of confirmed criminals are wrecking the jail and insulting the womanhood of the county. There has not been one jail delivery during my terms. In every instance cited by Mr. Witcher in his scandal sheet, the person making the affidavit has either had his case dismissed by Mr. Witcher or else his case has been indefinitely continued.

There has never been any trouble, friction or ill feeling in this court house until Mr. Witcher came here. There has never been any compromising with crime in this county until Jim Ferguson appointed Walter Witcher as District Attorney and sent him to Lubbock. Where did he come from? Who knows anything about him? What is his past record? Who are his associates? These are questions that I do not care to discuss in this article. He boasts of his public record and that he has had 15 convictions for crime in this county alone since he has been in office. He does not tell you that (eleven) of these convictions were on pleas of guilty without the slightest contest of defense. He does not tell you that out of the four cases fought and won that in the only two major cases he has had special prosecution to assist him and to take the leading part in the case. He does not tell you of the two cases of hung juries. He does not tell you of the number of indictments that he has drawn that have been fatally defective and caused the dismissal of cases. He does not tell you that an attorney of the Cattle Raisers' Association had to come out here from Fort Worth and prepare bills of indictment in cattle theft cases because he, Mr. Witcher, was unable to draw those bills of indictment so they would stand up in the courthouse. These things his scandal sheet is silent upon, while he leads you to believe that the number of men convicted in this county were convicted because of his skill as a prosecutor. And more than this, he has not yet told you that since he has occupied the office of District Attorney in this county that he has dismissed from the dockets of this court a total of 96 cases that were worked up by my office and indictments secured during the administration of Judge Gordon B. McGuire and the late Honorable Park Dalton, both of whom were real gentlemen and lawyers. That of the 96 bills returned by grand juries only 14 have been tried—what would the docket be in two more years? He does not tell you that two of his Jack Walton henchmen who stayed in his office during their visit in Lubbock came here and told me how they wanted to kill Joe Iman, a prisoner in my custody, and proposed to me to turn Iman over to them and permit them to murder him saying that it could be handled in a way that I would be safe from prosecution and upon my positive refusal these same men tried to take him by force. New York Finance

By E. WALTER MOCKLER

NEW YORK, June 20.—With lit-
tle appreciable change in fundamen-
tal conditions, the stock market has
just closed a listless week of
strength and activity which compares
with some of the best weeks in the
bull market. Steel common snapped
back from the March drive, touch-
ing a new high record for all time,
and stocks of the calibre of General
Motors reached to new highs for the
year. The March break shattered
all market lines and necessitated a
no working basis for many groups
of stocks but the same thing was
also true to only a slightly lesser
extent in March 1925. At that time
it was held that the market was
through and more than one bear took
a terrific drubbing in June of last
year before admitting that the re-
covery was anything better than a
technical rally.

One factor which must be consid-
ered in the present situation is the fact
that any of the dire predictions made
just before and during the March
smash have never quite materialized.
The motor industry is moving even
higher, despite belief and heavy sell-
ing of the principal motor stocks,
that motors had touched a peak in
1925 which would not be touched
again for a long time.

Oils are in a strong statistical po-
sition. Equipments are picking up;
railroads have been turning in mil-
lion car loads, a record of loadings
rare in the early summer months;
general employment is heavy, al-
though some indices appear to be
holding even on this point by virtue
of the high rate of operations in the
motor industry.

Coupled with the run of gloomy
forecasts made in the late winter
were—open institutions concerning
the immediate future of the Florida
land boom. There seems little ques-
tion but that the Florida situation
has been nothing in the nature of a
real break in the situation and bar-
ring the two or three developments
which have been over extended when
the break came, a few people seem
to have been hurt.

The coming week will answer
many questions of pressing impor-
tance in stocks and the exchanges.
The tremendous burst of buying in
steel common, coming as it has in
hundreds of thousands of shares, has
confirmed the street in the belief
that a development of some un-
usual importance is pending for stock-
holders. However, it is not believed
likely that this will come before the
October meeting.

In foreign exchanges, interest will
center largely on the French franc
situation. Briand came on the whole
situation as a bad job. Herriot failed
to form a cabinet and once again
Briand has been asked to head the
helm.

There seems little question but
that the French will have to devise
some method of taxation which will
meet the country's debts, but it will
have to be a workable form. A
capital levy will ship force another
flight from the franc and the net
result will be no addition to income
and French balances safely established
in foreign centers.

Miss Mary Edna Gearing, head of the department, is in charge of the cottage. The work the girls do there is graded just as for any other course, and University credit is given. The girls staying there for the first session are Miss Dorothy Racey of San Antonio, Miss Laurie Brown of Cleburne and Misses Maggie Gillespie, Mary Louise Boerne, Allene Burns, and Nell Jourdan of Austin.

Ice Man Goes In for Politics

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., June 20.—Harold "Red" Grange's route to fame as an ice man has a rival. L. W. Harrah, candidate for United States senator from Oklahoma and until three days ago, an unheard-of ice man, today was filmed for the movies, interviewed five times, and photographed ten times, in addition to receiving many monetary contributions to his campaign fund. "Politics is the easiest road to fame," Harrah avowed. "If I can get the state election board to put my name on the ballots now I think I'll be elected. The people need a poor man for a senator once in a while." On charges of representatives of Senator John W. Harrell, who is a candidate for re-election, Harrah's senatorial filing was thrown out by the election board, which contending the filing had been made to confuse voters by the similarity of names.

LONDON, June 20.—Ten thousand foot-weary women tonight departed for homes throughout the United Kingdom after participating in a great peace pilgrimage which thronged Hyde Park with women protesting against war. Buses, trams and trains carried the women home, but they had fulfilled their intention of walking to London as an evidence of sincerity, and a few could boast that they had walked nearly 200 miles. Some of the pilgrims started home afoot, but most of these lived in nearby communities. From 22 platforms 80 speakers addressed the women this afternoon. When the final speech had been uttered the entire assembly approved a resolution calling upon Great Britain to lead the way toward permanent peace.

LONGHORNS GET BUILDINGS AGAIN

AUSTIN, Texas, June 20.—When the evacuation of the S. M. A. barracks by the senile insane is completed on August 1, the buildings will be returned to the University of Texas. The inmates of the asylum will be moved to Wichita Falls, and thereafter the University will have three titles to the buildings. While it is not yet known how the University will make use of the buildings, it is probable that some of the smaller departments or some non-teaching division will be housed there, according to J. W. Calhoun, comptroller.

ORDERS FLAGS FOR LONGHORN STADIUM

AUSTIN, Texas, June 20.—L. T. Bellman, director of athletics at the University of Texas, has placed an order for 25 flags to be used in decorating the Texas Memorial Stadium. It is planned to have a flag placed above every section of the stadium. It is expected that the flags will be ready for display on July 4.

DONIPHAN, Mo., June 20.—Ripley county authorities tonight sought further clues to unravel what is termed the most baffling and gruesome crime in the annals of this community with the deaths of Ernest and Frank Van Patten, reclusive farmers, murdered near their farm home.

The brothers, 74 and 71 respectively, were found dead Friday, believed to have been victims of robbers seeking their reported hidden wealth.

Fasting Hiker Is Now Half Way

JOINTOWN, Pa., June 20.—Foot sore but otherwise in good physical condition, George H. Johnston, 29, is walking from Chicago to New York without partaking of food, arrived at Jointown, Pa., 12 miles east of here tonight.

Johnston said he was feeling fine and would continue his hunger hiking over the Lincoln highway Sunday morning. Johnston covered 20 miles today, keeping up with his scurdlow which will bring him in New York on June 30.

The fasting marathon walker has covered about 550 miles of his 1000 mile trip. Since leaving Chicago on June 1, he has reduced his weight 32 pounds and his feet have shrunk three sizes.

Johnston is only drinking mineral waters for nourishment.

GRADUATE SCHOOL AT TEXAS IS GROWING

AUSTIN, Texas, June 20.—With an enrollment of 431 students in the Graduate School of the University of Texas as compared with 383 last summer, and a total registration for the present session of 2,604 students, the officials of the institution feel particularly gratified, according to Dr. Frederick Eby, director of the summer session.

OKMULKEE, Okla., June 20.—Management of a million dollar Indian estate will be the stake when a small army of lawyers appear in district court here Monday.

Even Katie Fixico Daniels, Creek Indian woman and possessor of the estate, has expressed curiosity about the manner in which V. V. Morgan, her former guardian and A. E. Graham, Morgan's attorney have disbursed large sums of money of her estate.

According to a petition filed by Katie she wants an accounting from Morgan and Graham. She also alleges that the two men conspired to loot her estate and divert the huge income from her rich oil lands into their own pockets.

"ROMPER PARTIES" NOW OVER; HALL IS CLOSED

NEW YORK, June 20.—Wide open dance halls such as still exist in some of the wilder spots of the west have been operating in the heart of New York, it appears from an investigation which has been conducted by newspapers and the police.

The Cabin, classed as one of the city's worst dance halls, closed, and now many persons are learning for the first time about what has been going on in their midst.

"Romper parties" were a great favorite at the Cabin. There were 150 hostesses and in frequent cases these ladies would take off their clothes, don rompers provided by the management and dance with the guests. Thus scantily clad, according to reports of investigators, they would combine indecent dancing with indecent conversation. The place became a great favorite.

Shame to Take His Money, Says Former Kaiser

Copyright 1926 by United Press. BERLIN, June 20.—Former Kaiser Wilhelm would consider adoption of the plan to expropriate his property without compensation as an act of "shameful ingratitude".

It is understood that the replies to questions submitted by the United Press were authorized from Doorn. The issue in tomorrow's referendum, does not involve taking some of the question of the former royalists thing, from the state, instead, it is retaining their private property merely to the extent of assuring them adequate livelihoods.

"In case the referendum were successful," the statement continued, "an unbridgeable chasm would divide the German people because middle class Germans, and especially the South German people, never would consent to compensation-less expropriation of the former royal families."

The United Press asked what for of the Kaiser and of the Hohenzollern would remain in the possession of the family in case the referendum.

"According to the text of the so-called successful, socialist-communist bill," was the reply, "confiscated."

"No fortune whatever. All belongings including houses and furniture would be confiscated. They would be sold in Holland."

"Would the Hohenzollerns then be compelled to earn their own living?" was the next question.

"The Kaiser's sons are officers and they were robbed of their possession when the old army was disbanded. The Kaiser's grandsons are attending schools and universities for the purpose of acquiring vocations."

In reply to a question as to whether or not the former Kaiser and the former crown prince consider the referendum to give them fair play, the spokesman said:

"There really is no question of fair play. The issues concern a revolutionary performance launched

unconstitutionally. It is an act of vengeance inspired by Bolshevism. The Hohenzollerns already have abandoned claims to 83 per cent of their property in favor of the state. They now demand a guaranty of

their livelihood through retention of fortunes equaling the wealth which many thousands of families in America possess."
