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Hickory St. paving project slated to begin June 15th

Starting Friday, June 15th, TxDOT contractors will begin a rehabilitation project in Mitchell County on Bus. 208, or Hickory Street, from I-20 to East 2nd Street in Colorado City.

This project will include removing existing pavement, repairing distressed areas and placing a new hot mix asphalt to improve the driving surface. Traffic on Hickory Street will be reduced to one lane with a pilot vehicle and flagging operations during daytime hours only.

The \$1.3 million project was awarded to Price Construction of Big Spring and is expected to be complete in mid-July. Knoal Jordan, Field Supervisor with Price, said barricades will start going up on June 15th and work is expected to begin as soon as the company's material gets approval from TxDOT.

Jordan said crews will start at 2nd Street downtown and work their way north all the way up Hickory Street to the north side of the interstate. Specifically, crews will mill off about two

inches of existing pavement in most areas, with subgrade failure areas being milled down another eight inches, which will be filled back in daily. Then, a seal coat will be put down, and crews will lay two inches of hot mix on top, much like the work on 2nd Street last summer.

TxDOT reminds motorists to be especially watchful when traveling through this and all roadway work zones, as workers and large, slow-moving equipment will be in the area.

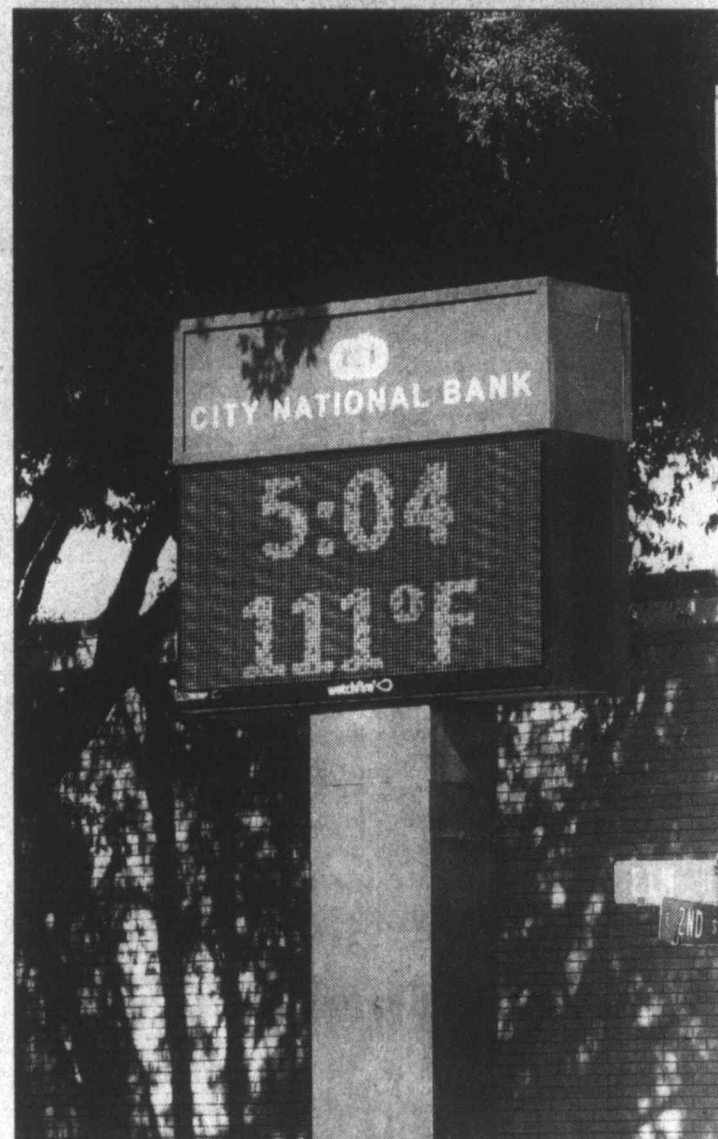
A Cruise Radio Show, featuring music from the 50s, 60s

"Fiddling around" making fiddles keeps Lewis busy

How to Make Your Own Violin... that's the book that started Robert Lewis on a road that would last a lifetime. While he doesn't play, Lewis is a fiddle-maker for sure. He's finished 24 of the stringed instruments, and he's already started number 25.

Early in his married life, Lewis' father-in-law came for a visit. The man was doing some fiddle repair, and he had the top off with the insides exposed. The sight and work intrigued Lewis, and he decided he wanted to make a fiddle.

Lewis got some white pine and drew off the shape of the back of the instrument. He mail-ordered the book **How to Make Your Own Violin** for \$3, because a violin and fiddle are virtually the same. A fiddle is a bowed string musical instrument, most often a violin.

There are a few differences in fiddles, and one of them is shape. Lewis said he used his grandfather's fiddle as a pattern for the first one he made. It was a Stainer fiddle, which has a different shape than the Stradivarius.

Back in 1966, Lewis was working for the City of Colorado City when he made his first fiddle. He said he did a lot of the work at the fire station and used whatever tools or makeshift tools that were available to him, such as a piece of glass

to scrape the wood. He also used whatever wood he could find, including old coffee tables and the like.

"I had to use what I had," Lewis said, referring to the floor tiles he bent to use for the curvy body of the fiddle. "That's what I did until I learned to bend wood," he said.

Eventually, Lewis learned to use an old wagon hub to bend wood around for the "C" shapes on the sides. He said there's 52 pieces to a fiddle.

That first fiddle won a blue ribbon at the fair. Another Mitchell County native asked Lewis not to enter a fiddle in the fair one year, because he was carving a bulldozer from wood and wanted to win, a story Lewis tells with a laugh.

"They say you (fiddle makers) make a really top notch fiddle every ten years or so. I understand I made one in five years," Lewis said. When asked what makes one fiddle better than the other, the answer was simple: its sound.

"It mostly has to do with the calibration of it," Lewis explained. The wooden back of the fiddle goes from thicker to thinner at the edges, which determines the sound it will make. Lewis said fiddles usually have a maple or spruce back, but his top-notch fiddle, or #5 as he calls it, had a See FIDDLES, page 5

TxDOT holds car seat checkup

Jill Christie, TxDOT Traffic Safety Specialist, was in town last week with a group of TxDOT Child Passenger Safety Technicians to conduct a free car seat checkup for anyone wanting to participate. The event was held in the Christian Temple parking lot and had a good turnout.

Between the hours of 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., 25 vehicles with 43 kids came through the check-point, according to Christie. During the event, TxDOT employees provided 36 car seats and reclaimed eight that were not in working order.

The car seats were provided by the Texas Department of Transportation. The tech came from surrounding towns to help with the checkup.

"Thursday's event in Colorado City was fantastic," Christie said. "We appreciate Christian Temple Church for letting us use their parking lot."

Texas law requires all children under eight or shorter than 4'9" to ride in child safety seats. According to the National Center for Health Statistics, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children 14 or younger. The National Highway Safety Administration estimates that roughly three out of four child safety seats are not used correctly.

TxDOT is now offering free

safety seat check-ups in each of the 25 district offices throughout Texas year-round by appointment. Visit SaveMeWithaSeat.org to learn more about the guidelines for determining

which restraint system is best suited to protect children based on their age and size and where to find a child safety seat check in your area.

The website also features

video demonstrations on installing child safety seats and crash test simulations, where parents and caregivers can see firsthand the effects of improper child restraint.

Ricky Green 1964-2018

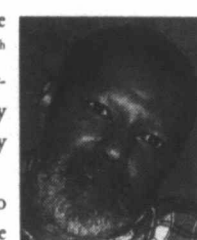

Though his love for art often got him into trouble as a kid, Albert Peña has continued to express creativity in various ways. He is May's featured artist of the West Texas Art Guild, and his artwork will be on display in the lobby of FirstBank & Trust throughout the month.

Peña said he had a fondness for displaying his art on walls, sidewalks and just about everywhere else as a child, which got him into trouble. But, it started him on a lifelong road to creative self-expression, and Peña's artistic side has helped him in his career as well.

A 7th grade art class was his first real foray into the art world, and he knew immediately he liked painting and creating. He didn't have time to do a lot of painting while he attended college to become a medical lab technician, but he found himself sketching what he was studying to help spark his memory.

While working as a phlebotomist, Peña saw a commercial for the Art Institute of Dallas and took the time to visit the school. He liked it and enrolled. His first subject of study was animation. Peña enjoyed the combination of technology and art, however, jobs for animators were few and far between in the 1990s, especially in Texas.

With a need to be able to support himself, Peña switched his major to visual communications. He graduated from the institute with a 4.0 gpa in 1997. With his degree in hand, the graphic artist took his first job with an advertising agency and then was hired on by the *Dallas Morning News*.

At the big newspaper, Peña said he was able to hone his skills. He worked with photographers and other graphic artists, and the interaction made him step up his skills.

"It's the same skillset as painting," Peña said. "I apply creativity to all I do."

Whether designing a vinyl

sign, business cards, ads or a painting, Peña said it's all about color, design, and lettering. When he paints, he likes using Mexican clay as a medium with acrylic paint. He waters it down almost to a thin liquid. It's a process he perfected after watching one of his paintings literally peel

up off the canvas as it dried.

"We all learn valuable lessons during our careers," Peña said.

The graphic artist said it's gratifying to see his work around town, whether it's a vehicle decal or an acrylic painting. Stop by FirstBank & Trust and see for yourself.

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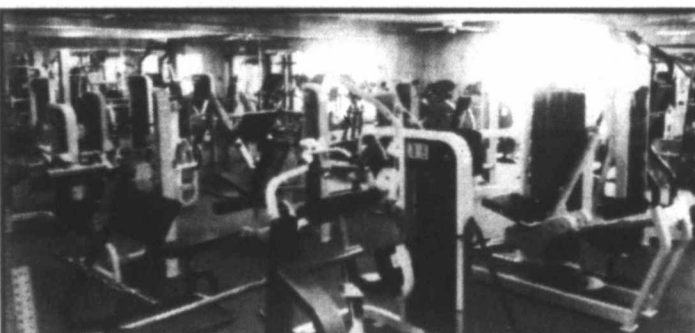

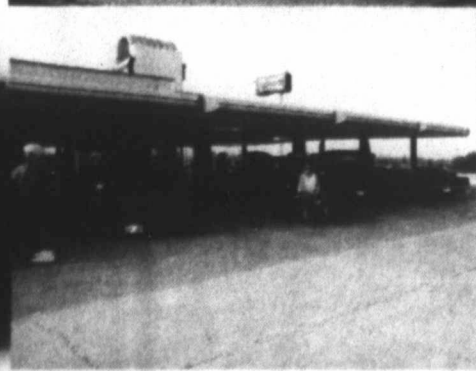

It takes about a year for Lewis to complete a fiddle from scratch. He said he doesn't rush it, because he has to be in the right frame of mind to do the delicate work.

"You have to be in the mood to do it. If not, you'll mess something up," Lewis said.

There's lots of delicate cuts and scroll work on a fiddle. "The F holes are the hardest part. You have to be careful doing those," he said.

Oh, and who got the famous #5? Lewis' granddaughter learned to play so he gave it to her.

Doyle Mitchell was the guest speaker at the weekly meeting of the Colorado City Lions Club Friday. He's done a little bit of everything, and now he's on to something new.

Mitchell informed club members that he and Bob Cooper of Cooper's Saddlery are going into business together. Cooper builds custom saddles and lots of other things, and Mitchell will put his carving and jewelry-making skills to work in the new endeavor.

The Loraine fireman said he and Cooper plan to open a shop to sell the items they make. It will be located at Fort Wood, near Wood's Boots along I-20. Mitchell said they rented the place about six months ago and are building inventory, so they'll be ready when they open.

Mitchell and Cooper have skills that compliment each other. Cooper would call on Mitchell anytime he needed special conchos for saddles. In his spare time, Mitchell got into making southwestern-type jewelry from old silverware and other things.

Much to the dismay of his wife Debbie, Doyle has branched out into Lichtenberg fractal wood burning lately. He takes the transformer out of a microwave and uses baking soda and water to make what is practically lightning to burn images into wood. While describing the process, Mitchell admitted, if not done correctly, the process can be deadly.

As he talked about his handiwork, Debbie passed around pieces of jewelry and wood to display some of Doyle's creations. He is currently working on a gun stock, carving an intricate, detailed scene on the wood. Mitchell also uses epoxy, paint and lighting to take

the creativity a step further. His training has mostly been trial and error, but he said he did take a wax casting class from Western Texas College in Snyder once.

Though he's hung up his bee suit, Mitchell will always be a champion of honey bees. He met a man who delivered cases of honey right after the club meeting. He told a story about they came from the continent, and he also told a story about a man who had been stung 2,000 times and was in a coma.

Mitchell warned club members to check every small, hidden place for bees before doing yard work or using power tools that might disturb a hive. He also reminded those attending that bees are a necessity because they pollinate about a third of all the food humans eat.

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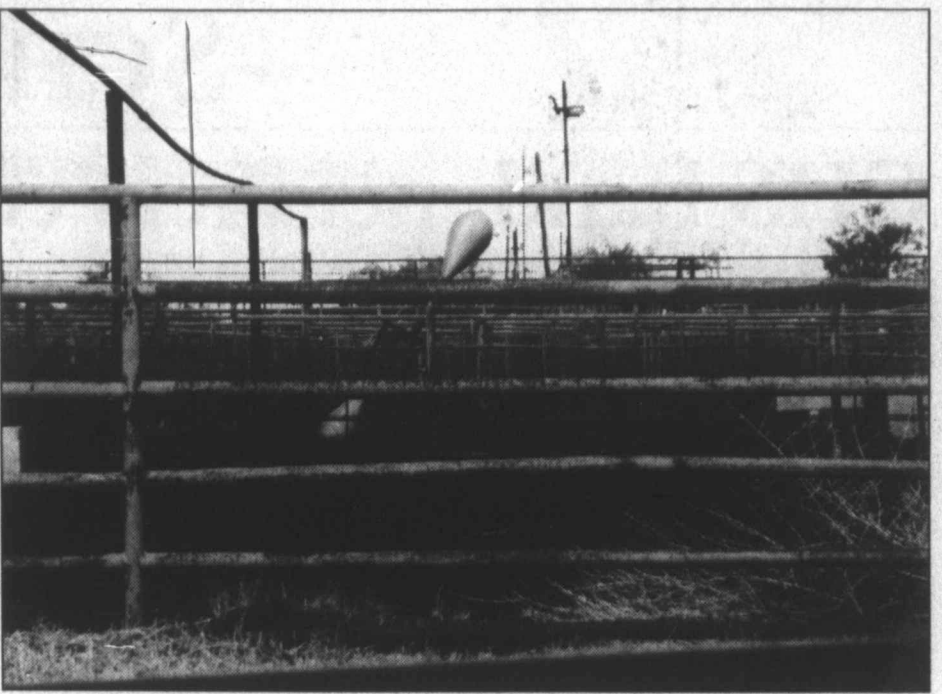

Firefighters worked for hours to put out the blaze that sparked just before 10 p.m. Sunday evening. The fire was contained to the auction yards area and stopped by CCVFD crews before reaching the Colorado City Cemetery to the north.
