War is an unpleasant memory.

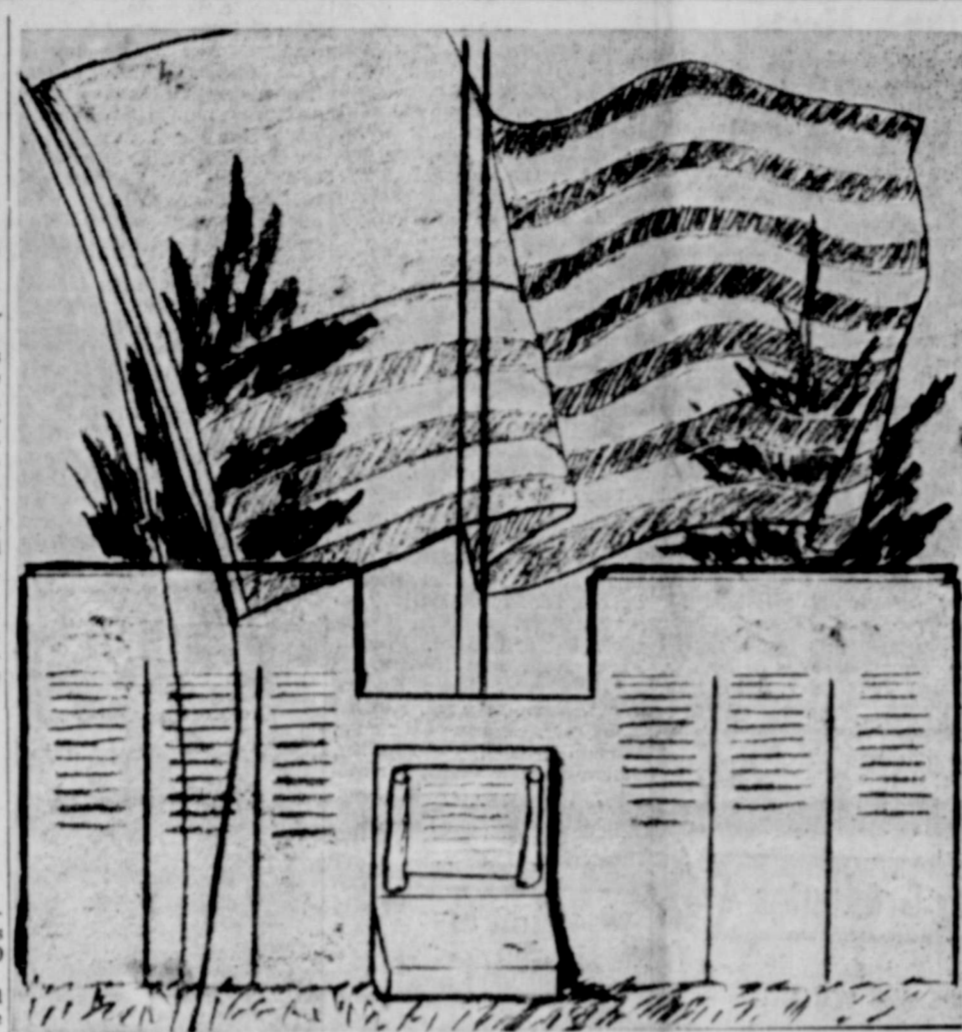

JUDGE BAILEY SPEAKER AT HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEET

County Judge Scott Bailey was the speaker on Wednesday, May 15, in the County Courthouse at a meeting of the Eastland County Historical Society, which was dedicated to the memory of Mrs. John E. Chesley, an early Eastland County resident and a founding member of the Society, who recently died at the age of 99.

Tribute was paid to Mrs. Chesley as a person who had lived and made some of the history of Eastland County, and who had contributed much to the heritage of the area.

In his talk to the group Judge Bailey gave reports on the statewide progress of the Statewide Historical Survey program, and the progress of bills in the state legislature which would benefit the preservation of historical sites papers.

He also spoke of the pride that the people of Texas should take in their heritage, telling of Theodore Roosevelt coming to Texas to get men for information of the Rough Riders, saying that "Cowards never started for Texas, and the weak died on the way, so that only the brave and the strong are here, and those are the kind of men I want."

In other business at the meeting the new membership cards were handed out to the members present, and it was decided to extend Founder Membership availability until organizational details were completed.

Following adjournment, there was informal discussion of county history and folklore, including the Woodson ghost, and a ghost that was seen by the father of Mrs. George Blackwell of Gorman. Everyone agreed that it was an interesting meeting.

The son of Mrs. Alberta Miller of Ranger, Frank is a 1962 graduate of Ranger High School where he was selected vice-president of the senior class and was named in-school favorite. He was also a member of the Spanish Club and the band.

He plans to attend the law school at the University of Texas after he completes his work at Ranger Junior College, and then enter the career of law.

Most people have a hobby; some have several hobbies, but not many have hobbies as different and as fascinating as Steve Orsak. His hobbies are sky diving and skin diving, which take him high up into the air and down below the surface of the water.

A business administration major from Yoakum, Steve became interested in sky diving, at 19 because his buddies in the army were doing sky diving. On his longest fall, which took 23 seconds, he fell 7,000 feet.

He says that sky diving never gets dull because the same thing never happens twice. Smallness is the most suitable size for the person

who sky dives, and one who weighs from 130 pounds to 160 pounds can control himself more easily than one who is heavier or lighter. To dive, one should pull the rip cord, which is not a great shock as some people think, at approximately 2,000 feet above the ground. It is not necessary according to Steve, to carry a supply of oxygen unless the diver is going extremely high.

Steve believes that every one should try sky diving at least once because it is fun, because participating keeps non-participants from rocking others for doing sky diving, and because it is good to conquer fear.

His other hobby, skin-diving, he became interested in while a junior in high school. He and other boys would dive into tanks behind his house.

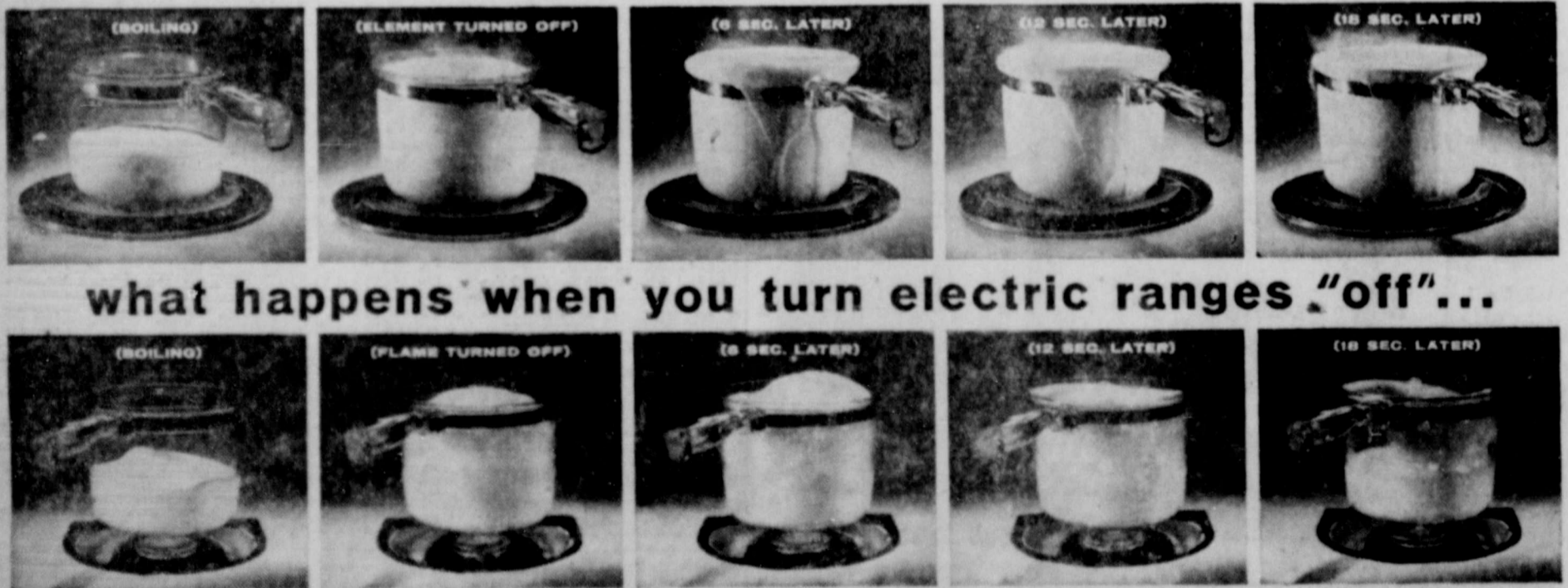
Steve goes skin diving at Powder Horn Lake and in Victoria. The deepest that he has dived is 80 feet, but generally 40 feet down.

The most frightening experience he ever had skin diving occurred when he and another boy were looking at caves in Lake Austin. One of the caves began collapsing, and the boys had to hurry to get out of the cave.

He has found many other things on the surface under the water, some of which are compasses, a tug boat, steering wheels, and barometers.

Steve says that of the two hobbies he prefers skin diving because sky diving is more dangerous.
