Texas Immigration Inspector Murdered By Alien Grand Jury Will Probe Levelland Slaying Wednesday

B. A. Foshee Held In Hockley Jail On Murder Charge

Judge Homer Pharr Orders Jurors To Reconvene To Investigate Shooting At Levelland Farm

No Bond Arranged

"Family Trouble" Blamed In Death Of Elmer Wright; Trial Expected To Begin Next Week

B. A. FOSHEE, 24, Hockley county farmer, was still in jail last night at Levelland following the fatal shooting early Saturday morning of Elmer Wright, 23, his neighbor, at the W. A. Kitchen farm, eight miles north of that city. No bond has been set.

Judge Homer L. Pharr, of the 72nd district court, Monday issued an order for the grand jury to reconvene Wednesday, at which time the case of Foshee will be taken up. The grand jury was convened on September 3 until the 18th. According to Judge Pharr, should the jury indict Foshee, his trial probably will begin next week.

Family Trouble Blamed

"Family trouble" was the undercurrent of explanation given by Foshee as he surrendered to Hockley county officers. Husband of a 19-year-old wife, Foshee declared in a lengthy statement to District Attorney Durwood Bradley in Levelland Saturday afternoon that he had killed Wright as "he was breaking up my home."

Wright was a single man.

Foshee moved to Levelland from Grandfield, Okla., and Wright came from Raza, Okla.

The body of the victim of the shooting was prepared Saturday night by Bynum Brothers, of this city and sent to Raza for burial.

Vare Senate Seat Fight Is Resumed

Three-Year-Old Dispute On Question of Pennsylvania Republican's Right To Post Brought Up Monday

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9. (AP)—The three-year old dispute over the right of William S. Vare to a seat in the senate was suddenly forced before the tariff-minded senate for determination today by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, with a resolution to bar the Pennsylvania republican.

(Cited as the debate on the tariff bill opened, the resolution was promised precedence over the tariff bill which the Nebraska senator is vigorously opposed. The surprised republican leadership forestalled debate on Norris' resolution for a day but Senator Robinson, Arkansas, the democratic leader, announced he thought the Vare case should be settled.

Senator Watson, republican leader, forced a day's delay by invoking the senate rule that all resolutions must be over for a day. Norris said he would call it up tomorrow.

"The Nebraska conferred with the tariff committee which conducted an inquiry into Vare's expenditures in the three-cornered republican senatorial primary campaign of 1926. He contended Vare was well enough to defend himself and the case should be settled."

Estimate Yield At 4,000,000 Bales

AUSTIN, Sept. 9. (AP)—The Texas cotton report, according to conditions as exist today, will be about 4,000,000 bales, Geo. B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, said today.

He said the government estimate "seemed to be about right."

"The estimate of 4,100,000 bales for the Texas crop is 247,000 bales below my estimate of August 15, but there has been very rapid deterioration since that time," he said. "If I were making the estimate now I would place it at 4,000,000 bales."

Five Jurors Are Selected Monday For Mrs. Rogers

Questioning Difficult For Counsel In Third Trial Of Mrs. Rebecca Rogers On Robbery Charges

NEW BRAUNFELS, Tex., Sept. 9. (AP)—A long list of hypothetical questions concerning insanity proved a stumbling block today in the selection of a jury to try Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers, charged with robbery with firearms of the Farmers' National Bank of Buda in 1926.

At the end of today's session only five men tentatively acceptable to the state and defense had been obtained out of the 22 examined.

The defense exercised six of its 15 peremptory challenges and the state three.

Mrs. Rogers, then known by her maiden name, Rebecca Bradley, a former University of Texas coed, held up the bank and escaped with \$1,000. The money was recovered and she was arrested in her home in Austin shortly after the robbery.

After an investigation she was indicted for robbery with firearms, and also for arson, the state alleging that she had burned a residence in Round Rock in an attempt to create excitement and a favorable opportunity to rob a bank there.

Her defense was temporary insanity and the jury failed to agree.

The defendant, now 24, was tried on the robbery with firearms charge and sentenced to 14 years in prison but the upper courts reversed the trial on errors.

Trust Of Cotton Seed Men Charged

Congressman Asks Action In Alleged Attempt To Cost Texas Farmers Over \$25,000,000 This Year

TEXARKANA, Sept. 9. (AP)—Congressman Wright Patman today called on Attorney General Claude B. Rusk to take action against a "cotton seed trust" conspiracy which he declared would cost Texas farmers \$25,000,000 this year if it exists over the entire state.

In a letter to the attorney general, Patman asserted cotton seed mills of this part of the state have conspired to purchase seed from farmers at a price \$9 to \$15 below the market price and that a representative from the attorney general's office could, if sent to this congressional district, easily obtain sufficient evidence of violation of anti-trust laws.

Privilege Withdrawn.

He said the oil mills which previously permitted storage of seed in their warehouses, had suddenly withdrawn the privilege, forcing farmers to market their seed immediately. He also passed on a report that gins had been "divided up" among the various oil mills for cotton seed trading as well as a charge that gins were being paid commissions on sales originating in their territories.

"Most of the gins are either owned or controlled by oil mills and they can afford to gin cotton free and still make a profit if the seed is purchased at the present price," he said.

Brother Of Local Officer, Missing For Ten Years, Is Found In Dallas

UNHEARD of for ten years—given up for dead by his relatives—a long-distance call—and he's alive.

Hugh Conley, 24, brother of O. B. Conley, chief deputy sheriff of Lubbock county, ran away from home in 1919 when but a lad of 14. A desire to see the world prompted him to travel.

No Word Heard

The two brothers last shook hands a short time after the close of the World War and O. B. left the farm of his parents, a short distance from Muskogee, Oklahoma. Two weeks later the younger brother disappeared. No one knew where he had gone, he left no word.

One letter was written to

the mother stating that he was on his way home. This came three years after he had left. The mother waited—days passed, weeks lengthened into months and months into years. During this time the elder brother searched the country over but no trace could be found of the missing youth. He was given up for dead.

Last night a telephone call from Dallas and the wandering boy announced his arrival in Texas after years spent in travel the world over, working at almost every imaginable occupation.

The two brothers will meet Wednesday again in Dallas, together with a sister, Mrs. Frank Whitehead, of that city.

Naval Committee Will Investigate William Shearer

Big Navy Advocate Set To Appear In Probe Today Of Activities At Geneva Arms Limitations Meet

Hoover Asks Probe

Former Shipbuilding Head Claims Information He Gave Press Was Received In Confidential File

NEW YORK, Sept. 9. (AP)—William B. Shearer, big navy advocate, declared today that a confidential file of the intelligence service of the U. S. Navy, sent to him anonymously from Washington, was the source of information he gave the press at the Geneva arms limitation conferences in 1926 and 1927.

Shearer said he expected to go before the Senate Naval Affairs committee which meets tomorrow to consider Senator Borah's suggestion that it investigate Shearer's activities at Geneva. Senator Borah's suggestion was followed by President Hoover's request for an investigation by the attorney general.

To Show File

"And I shall take that file with me to show to the committee," he added.

Shearer also said his activities at Geneva, both in 1926 and 1927 were confined exclusively to the press, and that he had no dealings whatsoever with any participants in the conference.

Not Lobbyist

"I never met any of the participants as a lobbyist or tried to influence them," he declared. "I was not interested directly in what they did."

Seven Injured As Special Train Of Sousa Is Derailed

Famous Band Master Unhurt In Colorado Mishap On Way To Trinidad Concert; 90 Aboard Train

WALSHENBURG, Colo., Sept. 9. (AP)—Seven persons were injured when John Philip Sousa's special train was derailed near here today.

The injured: William J. Robinson, 46, Buffalo, N. Y., bruises and cuts on chest and back.

William Herb, 45, Allentown, Pa., contusions, abrasions, right arm and leg.

Noble Howard, 45, Indianapolis, Ind., bruises (thrown through window).

F. P. Mueller, 25, Bay City, Mich., abrasions, bruises right leg.

E. D. Johnson, 44, Pittsburgh, injured back.

S. Meagher, 27, Rochester, N. Y., contusions, chest.

Jesse Wellingham, 45, New York City, contusions and abrasions both legs.

There were 90 persons on the special train at the time of the derailment, five of them women. Capps, Colo., is a cattle camp.

Five Circuses Are Purchased by Jno. Ringling In Deal

NEW YORK, Sept. 9. (AP)—John Ringling, noted circus owner, tonight announced purchase of five circuses—Sells Floto, Hagenbeck-Wallace Animal show, Sparks, John Robinson's and the Al. G. Barnes wild animal show. The transaction was completed here last month, the announcement said.

The purchase price was not disclosed, but the transaction was said to involve millions. Ringling, the last of the three famous circus brothers, already owned the Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey shows and the Forepaugh Sells circus. The acquisitions give him control of the greatest group of tent shows in the world.

The purchase includes all the physical properties of the five shows, their winter quarters and trade names.

'Whitey' Wants Truth Serum

BORGER, Sept. 9. (AP)—Whitey Walker, charged with the slaying of his brother Hugh, and Ed Bailey with the slaying of deputy sheriffs Pat Keayon and A. L. Terry, after a bank robbery, told reporters today he wanted to be given truth serum so that he could tell all he knows about the slayings and prove his innocence.

Bailey expected to testify for the state, was in jail here arranging a \$7,500 bond, after returning willingly from Lea, New Mexico.

Walker today protested his innocence, saying that he never killed a man and that he would be cleared. He said nothing Bailey might say could convict him.

Drilling At Test Well Is Hindered By Water Layer

Marland Company's Wildcat In Cochran County Meets Layer Of Sulphur Water; Oil Hopes Held

Drilling at the Marland Oil company's No. 1, Slaughter test, located in Cochran county, 67 miles west of Lubbock, late yesterday afternoon was being continued after the striking earlier in the day of a strata of sulphur water, according to reports received here.

At a late hour yesterday the well had reached a depth of 4,322 feet and at that time approximately 300 feet of sulphur water was standing in the well. Unofficial reports stated that the flow of oil, recently encountered, had been checked with the sulphur water formation.

The hope is that the water is not of sufficient volume to become uncontrollable.

Reports stated that the water had entered the lime formation which caused the check in oil flow. Bailing operations were in progress through a major portion of Monday and drilling was being continued in the hope of encountering another strata of oil.

Two thousand feet of oil remained standing in the hole at noon yesterday. Members of the oil fraternity and other interested parties express universal opinion that the well will prove a producer and open a new field of production in commercial quantities.

War Starts Along Border Of Russia And China Monday

Forces Clash In Section Of Manchuria After Both Armies Strengthened For More Than Month

Situation Serious

(By Associated Press)
WAR seems to have started along the Manchurian border between the Chinese province of Kirin and the Siberian maritime province in the sector where Russian and Chinese forces for a month have strengthened their positions.

The strategic railway center of Pogradichaya, eastern terminal of the Chinese Eastern railway, has been the scene of fierce fighting for three days. It has changed hands twice in the heaviest fighting yet to occur since the beginning of the Manchurian dispute two months ago.

Situation Serious

Dispatches from various points in the far east—Mukden, Shanghai, and Tientsin indicate the seriousness of the fighting. Artillery and airplanes were used by the Russians. There has been no report of any large number of casualties, which may indicate a suspension of the gravity of the situation.

For six weeks Russian troops have been moving into the Chert district. Reports have said there were 20,000 Soviet soldiers between Vladivostok and Khabarovsk.

Shanghai reported Chinese reinforcements hurrying northward, where fighting was reported along the entire Manchurian-Siberian

Eight Passengers Killed In Plane Crash Identified

Bodies Taken From Wreck Of Ill-Fated "City Of San Francisco" And Prepared For Burial

GALLUP, N. M., Sept. 9. (AP)—Identification of the bodies of the eight persons who met death in the crash of the transcontinental air transport ship City of San Francisco was completed tonight. Seven victims were absolutely identified and it followed that the eighth victim must have been William H. Beers of New York City.

Beers' body had no jewelry, dental work or other marks but he was listed as a passenger and the other bodies were identified definitely.

An examination of the bodies disclosed all the victims were probably killed before the crash. All had many broken bones, some of the legs being almost twisted from the rest of the body. In the back of the head of one identified as one of the pilots was a huge gash that could easily have caused death.

Those examining the bodies said there was little doubt that all were killed by the impact of the huge air liner.

The shattered remains of the \$65,000 ship still were lying scattered on the timber. Difficulty in removal of the bodies encountered yesterday raised some question whether the wreckage would ever be taken out.

Hail Takes Heavy Crop Damage Toll

Week-End Storms Blanket South Plains Section To Destroy Crops; Rainfall Totals 67 In Lubbock

Despite the fact that beneficial rains fell over the South Plains area Saturday, Sunday and Monday, farmers of the section have felt the devastating force of hail and wind in the destruction of already scarce crops, according to messages received by the Morning Avalanche late Monday.

Lubbock county, perhaps, suffered less than others in the drubbing of the week-end. Only a spotted section of the county was visited late Sunday. Rainfall in Lubbock vicinity over the week-end totaled 67 of an inch while a sharp drop in temperature was recorded Monday. The minimum temperature yesterday was 33 degrees while the maximum was 61.

Farms Damaged

Scores of farms near Post, Stanton, Seaboard and Wilson were ripped by hail and wind. Eighty sections of land in north and east Garza county were literally wiped out while many chickens and livestock were killed and buildings were punctured late Saturday night. Illegal Entry To United States Is Blamed In Death

Miles J. Scannell Is Found Shot Twice and Stabbed Fifteen Times by Unidentified Assaultants

Scuffle Indicated

Officer's Throat Is Slit From Ear; Aliens Thought To Have Escaped Across River Into Mexico

MARFA, Texas, Sept. 9. (AP)—Miles J. Scannell, assistant chief United States immigration patrol inspector was murdered, presumably by an alien seeking illegal entry to this country, fifteen miles east of Presidio today. Scannell was shot twice and stabbed fifteen times.

Scannell's throat had been cut from ear to ear. A terrific struggle apparently took place, those who found the body on the banks of the Rio Grande said.

Scannell's gun and handcuffs were found leading fellow officers to believe that he had captured one of a group of aliens coming into this country and that the prisoner's friends had rescued him.

Scannell's assailants are believed to have gone back across the river into Mexico.

Paris Shoes Influence Styles On This Continent

When the average American woman visits Paris she sees shoes, shoes everywhere, and not a pair to wear. Most smart women visiting Paris from America, if they are in the know, provide themselves with the shoes they will require this side of the Atlantic. Of course, one can get the custom made shoes to fit, but who wants to wait for custom shoes on a hurried European trip? Still, just because the Parisian foot is different than the American foot, Paris shoes do have their influence in America. Just as do the Paris garments. We follow the style Paris sets in almost every instance.

So let us look to Paris for colors and materials, and to our own country for lasts. As to color, the fall showings in shoes are a study in autumnal tints. There is "havana," a brown that is almost black, "autumn," a dark golden brown, "marquise," a light sepia, and "burnt umber," a golden copper brown. There are also chestnut brown and the deep claret brown, and there is "grenade," a slightly warmer tone than the light sepia. There is the dark blue marine blue, and of course black, which ranks next in importance to the browns at the moment, and will probably

take first place as fall cools into winter.

In leathers there are some suedes and a few leathers and other reptiles, but the premier leather is still kid. Reptiles are still being used more for trim than for the entire shoe, and there are combinations of suede and kid which are attractive. There are other materials, just as there are other colors in the "high" styles, but these, with the brown, black and blue, are the staples.

Green, a dark red, something like the acaju, of last year, are among the high style colors. Green is becoming more and more popular for shoes, and like the dark blue, it, too, may some day become a staple.

Evening shoes are still fashioned from fabric and dyed to match gowns, though gold kid seems to be coming to the fore again, probably owing to the vogue for the capucine tones.

Beige Is Popular

Perigue is using considerable silver kid, hand embroidered or adorned with real tinsel, as is also Juliette. County Units Of Farm Bodies Are Urged by Bankers

Cooperative Associations Under Supervision Of Local Banks Recommended In Dallas Meeting

DALLAS, Sept. 9. (AP)—Organizations of county cooperative market associations under supervision of local banks to handle money secured from the \$500,000,000 federal agricultural relief fund was recommended in resolutions adopted at a meeting of the Texas State Bankers association here today.

At the same time Governor Dan Moody, who attended the meeting, led a conference of a committee of 30 bankers, named by the directors, to meet in Waco next Monday to discuss plans for final organization of county units.

Plans Considered
The full personnel of the directors of a dozen other leading bankers ended the closed conference to consider plans for handling federal relief funds in event money should be demanded or needed in Texas. A. A. Morris of Galveston, president of the association, explained the plan of county cooperative marketing associations receiving relief funds and distributing them among the producers was provided for in the congressional action which created the federal farm board and provided for the large relief fund.

That the banks of the state were in better financial condition than in several years to aid in financing the movement and disposition of the 1929 cotton crop was assured by those attending the meeting. It was pointed out also that there was no actual need for calling on the federal fund this year.

Big Spring Air Mail Heavy

Toll Of Property And Life Mounts

MANILA, Sept. 9. (AP)—Communication lines slowly being repaired after the passing of the typhoon which swept the island of Luzon last week, today brought reports of mounting death lists and tales of great damage.

More than 200 persons were reported killed on the island, thousands were homeless and hungry and great havoc had been wrought to crops. Starting in the southern

provinces a week ago Sunday, the typhoon swept to sea then turned descending on the northern provinces of Tausug, Rizal, Laguna and Bulacan with great fury, destroying homes and crops.

The relief plane was sent out from Albuquerque yesterday and attempted to fly to Amarillo but was forced to return to Tucumcari because of a fog. Only one of the original passengers who started from Los Angeles was on the plane, the others having been put on a train at Tucumcari. The lone passenger was Dr. W. A. Walton of Pottsville, Pa. The disabled craft was the one that found the wrecked T. A. T. liner near Grant, N. M. The westbound plane which was held up for a day at Waynoka, Okla., also made port here today, having spent the night near Afton, 30 miles northwest of here, because of fog. The passengers spent the night in the plane and aside from a terrific rain storm said they experienced no discomfort.

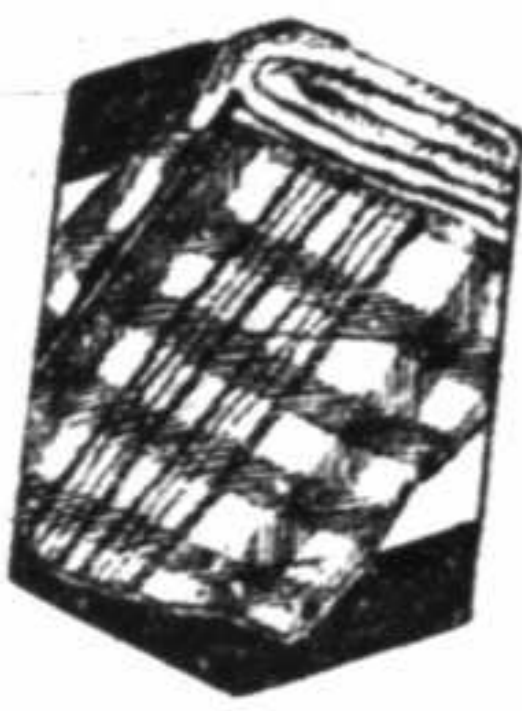
Month's Building Total Is Boosted To \$55,400

Hester, World Authority On Cotton, Plays With Figures, Not With Money

By RALPH WHEATLEY
(Associated Press Correspondent)
NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 9. (AP) — Behind a desk piled with reports and statistics, a florid, stocky man sat making rapid calculations on a pad. Being deeply concentrated and hard of hearing, he was not aware of his callers.

Presently looking up, he smiled kindly, greeted his visitors, sought chairs for them and made them feel as if they were in his drawing room rather than interrupting him at a busy task in his office.

Prepares Report
This man was Henry Garretson Hester, probably the greatest single human factor in the world's cotton trade, preparing his annual report on the movement and distribution of the cotton crop. The report had to be ready that day for transmission wherever the cotton bales are bought and sold. It was to be translated into the polyglot tongues of the world's traders so that they would know what "Hester says."

Many a man would have excused himself but not so this genial gentleman. He became the affable, good-looking and laughing like a youngster, but always directing his talk and his mind toward the present and future and never to the past.

Old When Out Of Date
Hester is old only when he gets out of date, he said, a twinkle in his grayish blue eyes. "Young man, you know that if I live 17 years more I will be 100 years old. But I don't feel any different than I ever did. The body may not be quite what it was but my mind is as clear as ever."

Born in New Orleans November 15, 1846, the son of a British subject, Mr. Hester was educated in the public schools and took up the study of law in an attorney's office. Soon he forsook the law for the lure of the press and became a regular reporter on a New Orleans newspaper and editor of the magazine "Price Current."

His start in the cotton world came 57 years ago after a small group of New Orleans business men had put up \$10,000 to start the New Orleans Cotton exchange, which he had advocated in his news columns. He was offered the superintendency of the exchange at \$2,500 a year. He declined the offer but a banker, impressed by the young man's keen knowledge of business, insisted and he took the job as a side-line with no salary.

Dominates Exchange
A few months later, he took over the combined job of superintendent and secretary of the exchange. From that day he has dominated the exchange and watched it grow from a feeble market to one of the greatest cotton trading centers on earth.

And in all these years, this man who knows more about the cotton market than any other mortal, has never bought nor sold a single bale of cotton in his life. Nor does he permit any of his help to trade. He has foregone opportunities to make millions on the market and all he has is what he accumulated from salary.

JOCKEY IS INJURED

Big Spring Man Hurt When Thrown From Horse

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 9. (AP) — Doris Fulcher, 35, of Big Spring, a jockey, was seriously injured Saturday afternoon in the second race at the Kendall county fair in Boerne and was brought to a San Antonio hospital for treatment. Injuries are believed to be a fractured skull and internal.

Fulcher was riding in the second race when his horse stumbled and fell, throwing him to the ground. The second horse in back of Fulcher also fell. It is not known whether he was injured by the fall on the ground or whether one of the two falling horses kicked him.

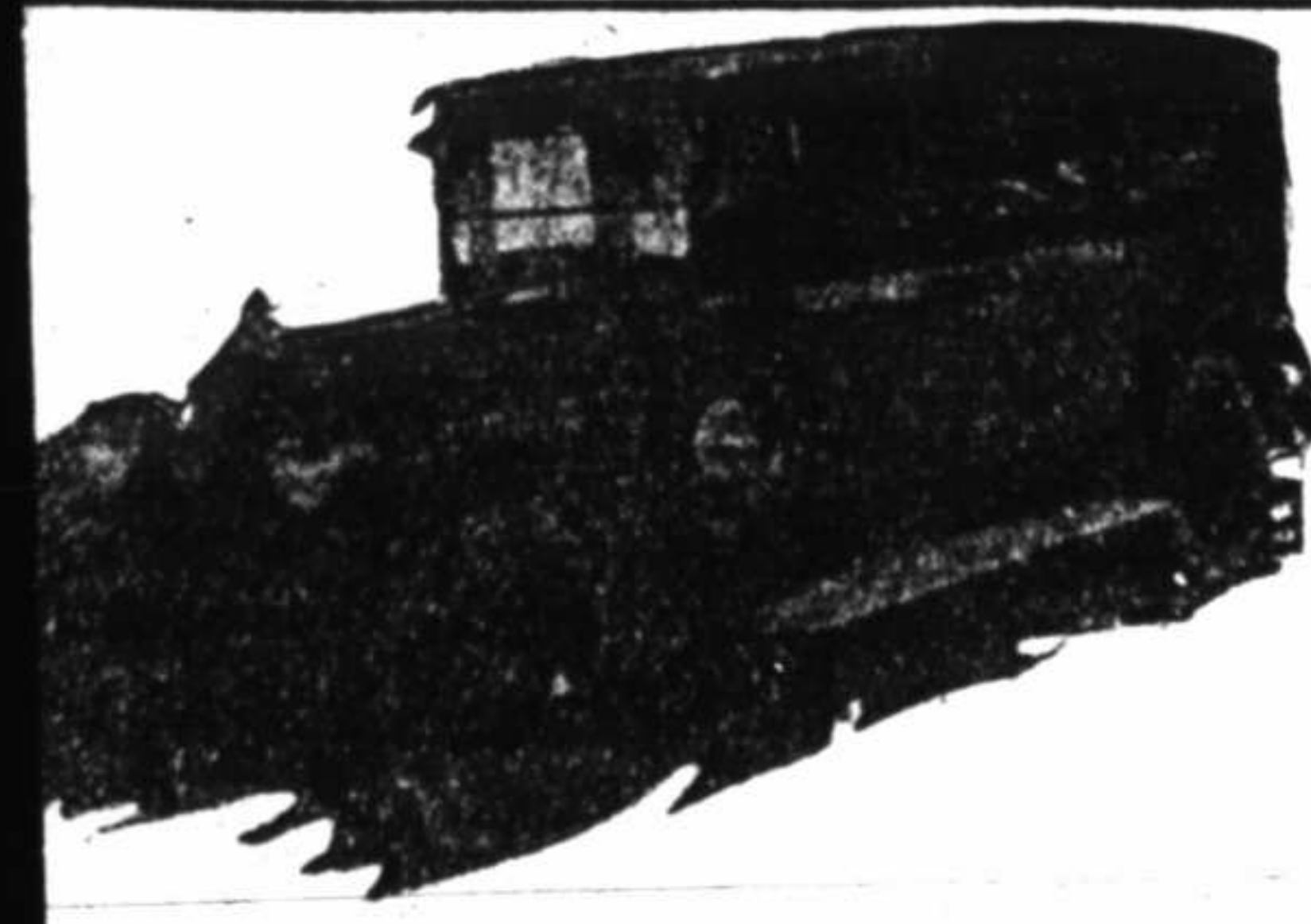

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Cotton Price Boosted \$3.50 Per Bale

Increase Is Not Fully Maintained Due To Realizing

Government Crop Forecast Smaller Than Expected To Cause Prices To Be Sent Upward

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 9. (AP)—Advances of from \$2 to \$3.50 a bale were not fully maintained in cotton today due to realizing and some professional selling on the advance. A heavy demand carried December contracts up from 12.50 to 13.50 but subsequent selling forced the option back to 13.41 where it closed for a net advance of 20 points. The general market closed steady at net gains of 20 to 30 points.

Liverpool cables were irregular and the market here opened 6 to 9 points down. Just before trading was suspended for the reading of the government figures, October traded at 12.62 and January 12.62 or 21 points down on all months below Saturday's close.

The forecast with a condition average of 55.4 per cent of normal and an indicated yield of 14,620,000 bales was smaller than expected and immediately after trading was resumed October shot up to 13.32 and January 13.32, or 60 to 72 points above the pre-bureau level. Demand slackened on the higher prices and considerable profit-taking developed. October closed at 13.12 and January 13.12, 15 points down from the high but 39 to 50 points over the previous close.

Receipts, 54,205, for week, 90,500; for year, 762,032; last year, 548,122. Exports, 16,021; for week, 31,435; for year, 397,045; last year, 434,044. Stocks, 774,318; last year, 563,771. Cotton on shipboard, 38,587; last year, 52,817. Spot sales, 38,502; last year, 37,778.

Sharp Advance Follows Government Report

NEW YORK, Sept. 9. (AP)—A sharp advance followed the publication of the government report in cotton today but it encountered resistance and Southern selling. After selling up from 1928 the price of the morning, to 1930, immediately after the report, December contracts closed at 13.02 compared with 12.25 at the close of Saturday. The general market closed barely steady at net declines of 21 to 26 points.

The opening was steady at a decline of 4 to 7 points. The initial offerings were easily absorbed and selling continued and became more active later in the morning. Net Losses Shown
Before business was suspended to receive the figures, active months showed net losses of 17 to 20 points with October closing down to 12.50 and March to 12.25. The government report making the condition 55.4 and the indicated crop 14,620,000 bales was about 52,000 bales below the average of recent months' reports and evidently lower than expected. Active months showed net losses of 45 to 72 points from the low of the morning. December sold up to 12.45 and March to 12.60, or making advances of about 42 to 35 points from the closing quotations of Saturday.

Aggregate receipts 115,400 an increase of 46,000 over last Monday but 19,800 short of the corresponding day a year ago.

Hogs at the exception of a few markets where supplies were light. A general decline of 10 to 30c was put into effect. The top of \$11.80 was paid in Chicago. Total receipts 36,500 as compared with 41,307 a week ago and \$6.00 the same day last year.

It skidded almost until the last hour, when it regained some poise, as bull forces rallied and drove shorts to cover by a sharp rally in a few issues. Losses of 5 to 12 points in several leading stocks were practically cut in half, but closing quotations generally were lower.

There was practically nothing in the news of the day or of the week end to account for the dumping or rebound of stocks.

The day's turnover exceeded 4,800,000 shares.

 LONDON, Sept. 9.—While the whole world is demanding the early restoration of order in the Holy Land, the English Labor government has turned for aid to four prominent British Jews who are members of the opposition parties.

Lord Reading and Sir Herbert Samuel are Liberals; Lord Melchett and Sir Philip Sassoon are Tories. But all of them are experts whose advice is proving invaluable to the government.

First called was Sir Philip Sassoon, who in the late Tory government was Undersecretary of State for Air. As such he made a trip in a government seaplane to India last year. On the way, he inspected

British air posts in Egypt, Palestine, Transjordan, Iraq and India. He therefore not only has an intimate knowledge of the planes ready for service in all these countries, but also knows the character of the men who are the officers in command and who best can be relied for the serious work in Palestine.

Most Eligible Bachelor
 As the multi-millionaire heir of the Sassoons and the Rothchilds and as the intimate friend of the Prince of Wales, Sir Philip long has been known as the most eligible bachelor in Britain. He was for some years the youngest member of Parliament. During the war he was private secretary to Lord Haig when the latter was Commander-in-Chief of the British armies in the World War.

Sir Herbert Samuel, who was in Prague when the outbreaks occurred, was consulted by telegraph and telephone by the government. He

dustries. As Sir Alfred Mond, he held several cabinet posts in the Liberal government of Lloyd George. He is head of probably the biggest business in Great Britain—the Imperial Chemicals, whose world-wide activities are indicated in part by its capitalization of over a quarter billion dollars.

Sounding Moslem Feeling
 Lord Reading was consulted on Moslem feeling. Every time British troops have to suppress an Arab mob, the repercussions are felt throughout the Moslem world. And India happens to have over 70,000,000 Moslems. As a former and very successful Viceroy of India, Lord Reading was in a position to advise the government as to the effect on Moslems of the present crisis in Palestine and the way to allay any possible bitterness that might arise among the Moslems of India.

Family Wiped Out

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Bryant, who were in the boat, also were rescued by Frank Guetter of Austin and Bob Campbell of Hillsboro, who went to their aid in a boat. The Bryants were brothers.

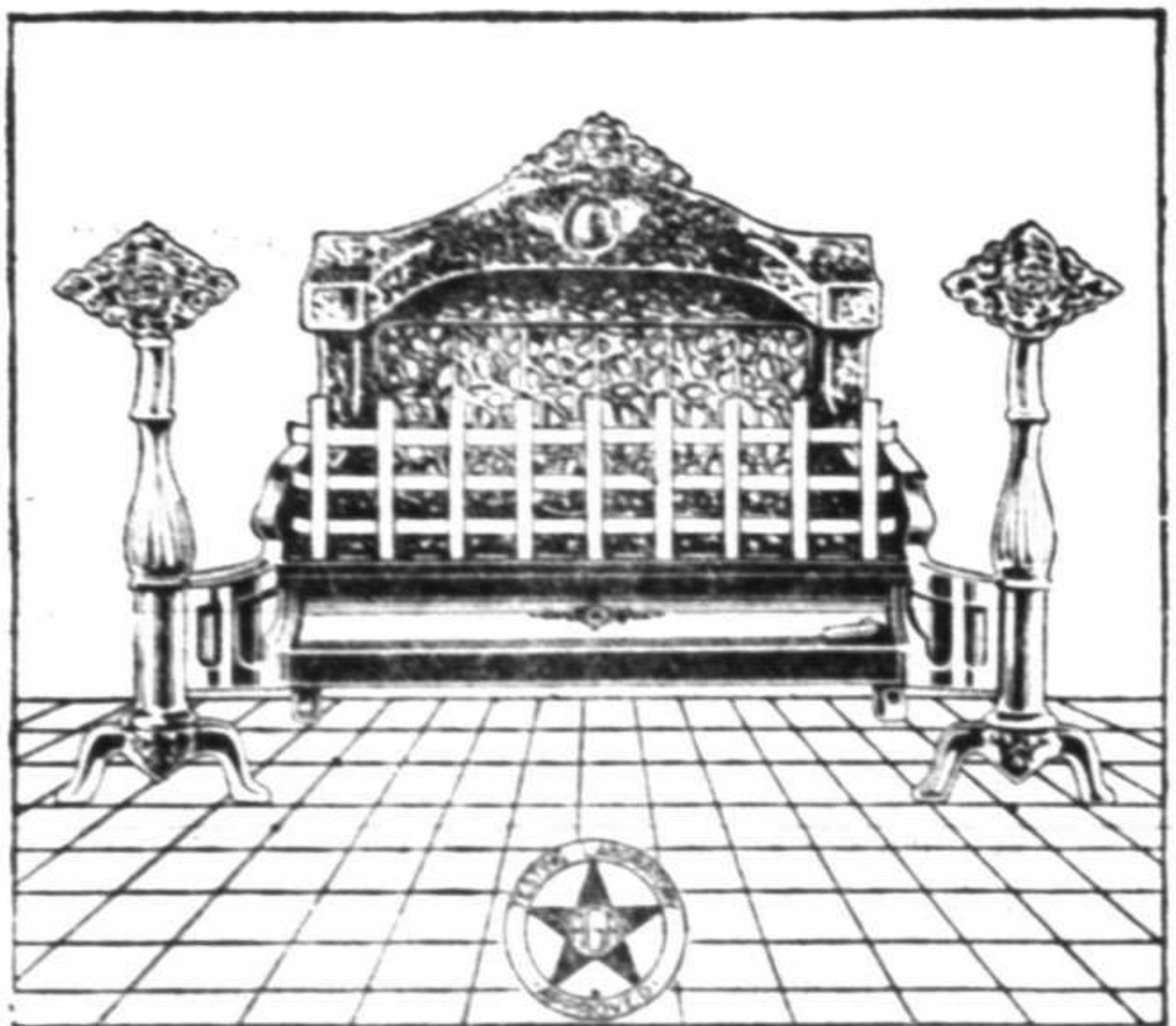
The party had gone five miles up the river Saturday for an outing. The waters of the river had gradually risen on account of rains above here and when they began the trip home the current was very swift and the surface was covered with driftwood. Then an attempt was made to turn the boat from the current opposite the Austin boat club landing, it capsized.

Thomas Bryant was a good swimmer and managed to keep his wife afloat until the rescue boat reached them, but the F. J. Bryants had gone down. Mrs. Thomas Bryant said the last time she saw F. J. Bryant he had his little son clasped in his arms.
