"Working Man's Tribute Is One Last Ride in His Beloved Green Pickup"

Leonard Potter didn't need a big, fancy funeral home hearse to carry his casket to the cemetery.

Leonard was a working man who spent much of his life in the West Texas oil fields, and he loved the Chevy pickup he bought new in 1969.

Leonard died at age 74, after a long illness.

When his family got together to plan Leonard's funeral, they all agreed what he would have wanted: One last trip in his beloved green pickup.

Then they made it happen.

Thursday morning, after the service at Johnson's Funeral Home Chapel, Leonard's grandsons tugged the World War II veteran's flag-covered casket into the bed of his truck. Leonard's C/10 Chevy is a working man's truck: not fancy, no frills. Plain wheels and hubcaps, headache rack, toolbox, tiedowns along the bed, a sturdy trailer hitch. A simple and sturdy dependable and durable machine that can take you over 30 miles of bad caliche road without complaining. And, more importantly, can get you back.

Doris, Leonard's wife of 54 years, said the truck has "200 and some-odd miles on it. The speedometer was broke for several years, so we're not really sure."

Leonard loved the truck so much he had it restored several years ago. Doris said the restoration cost almost twice as much as Leonard paid for the truck in 1969.

Doris said Leonard worked at many jobs during his life. He was a man of many talents. He could weld metal or draw Western artwork with equal ease. He worked as a mechanic in Houston; he started his own delivery business; he signed on with Pool Co. in 1954, where he did everything from running rigs to teaching safety and taking photographs.

Doris is especially proud of Leonard's photograph. One picture

he shot on the Ballinger Highway shows a red and white drilling outfit overshadowed by a thundercloud. Copies of that photograph ended up in 16 of Pool's offices around the world and in World Oil Magazine.

Doris said one of the few talents Leonard didn't have was musical ability. Nonetheless, he enjoyed listening as his family full of musicians performed.

At the funeral, they played a tape of the family singing favorite hymns like "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder." The music, plus Brother Kenneth Hyatt's rousing sermon, made the funeral service one of the most meaningful I've ever attended. Those Potters can sing! And Brother Hyatt, that man can preach.

But the most touching moment of the morning came when the grandsons loaded Leonard's casket into the truck.

The old Chevy's faded paint gleamed under a fresh wash and wax. Someone had put red carpet in the truck's bed. The boys eased the casket onto the carpet. With the tailgate down, it just fit.

A funeral director made sure a heavy elastic band was in place to hold the flag in place. Then he fastened a red strap across the back of the truck to secure the coffin. I couldn't help but think Leonard would approve of the careful work. Oh, he might have laced a few ropes across the top, but the job looked solid and stout, even so.

A funeral director who has been at Johnson's for more than 20 years said it's the first time he can remember that someone's used a pickup as a hearse.

"We took a man to the cemetery a couple of years ago in a mule-drawn wagon," Bob Stout said, "but never in a pickup."

Leonard's older son, Gene, got behind the wheel of the truck. Dennis, the younger son, rode shotgun.

Gene turned the key and the old Chevy responded on the first spin. The engine sounded perfect: as well-tuned as the Potter family's harmonies.

In his sermon, Brother Wyatt said Leonard "liked to operate at his own pace, his own gear."

And so he did, as his good truck rolled slowly away from the funeral home gradually picking up speed, his boys up in the cab, Doris and his girls in the car ahead, the tautly draped flag above him, fluttering in the open air.

Texas Awarded \$24.3 Million High Performance Bonus from Health and Human Services For Welfare Reform Advances

AUSTIN-Texas' continued success in job placement for welfare recipients has garnered the state a \$24.3 million high performance bonus from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

HHS announced this week that Texas is among 28 states receiving performance bonuses for superior results in welfare reform. Texas' \$24,312,838 share of the \$200 million awarded by HHS is an almost \$8 million increase over Texas' 1999 bonus and the second largest amount awarded this year. This award was the maximum amount Texas was eligible to receive based on the state's portion of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant.

"For the second year in a row, this award from HHS validates the design of the workforce development system in Texas and the effectiveness of the cooperative partnership between TWC and the Texas Department of Human Services (DHS). Together, we continue to set a standard for other states to emulate," Texas Workforce Commission Chair Diane Rath said.

Texas' award was based upon its second consecutive top 10 performance in job placement with 84,115 adult Texas welfare recipients entering employment for the first time during the reporting period. This number represents a significantly larger proportion of the total number of welfare recipients moving into the workplace than in Texas' previous top 10 job placement performance. Texas' continued success in this category is a direct result of the state's landmark welfare reform laws that facilitate employment for those who are ready, willing and prepared to move off the welfare rolls.

For the last two years, HHS has awarded the high performance bonuses to states with the greatest

success in helping parents on welfare find and maintain jobs and increase earnings. Reports were submitted by 48 states and the District of Columbia this year indicating that more than 1.2 million parents went to work in the period between October 1, 1998 and September 30, 1999. Overall, 43 percent of welfare recipients entered the workforce, an increase of 4 percent over 1998. Of those who did find jobs, 77 percent were still working in the next quarter and the states also reported an average increase of 31 percent between the first and third quarters of the reporting period. As of June 2000, there were 5.8 million recipients on welfare nationwide including 343,464 Texas recipients, a decrease of 59 percent and 56 percent respectively since 1993 and the lowest proportion of the total U.S. population (2.1 percent) since 1963.

"Helping Texas parents on welfare move into self-sufficiency is one of the cornerstones of our mission. This award confirms that we are succeeding in that mission," said T.P. O'Mahoney, TWC commissioner representing labor.

"Texas' repeat top 10 performance in job placement is a testimony not only to the success of TWC's partnership with DHS, but also to the hard work and determination of all 28 of our local workforce boards and employers throughout the state," said Ron Lehman, TWC commissioner representing employers.

Texas 100 Stock Index Declines in November

(Austin)-- Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander's Texas 100 Stock Index fell 10.3 points, or 8.1 percent in November, to 116.8. Technology stocks suffered the biggest drop, but all sectors of the index saw declines, except entertainment and travel. In comparison, the Standard and Poor's 500 lost 8 percent and the Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 5.1 percent.

The entertainment and travel sector rose 6.4 percent, with both restaurant and airline stocks gaining value. Tricon Restaurants (Pizza Hut, Taco Bell, KFC) saw the biggest gain (up 20 percent), after announcing plans to sell 300 company-owned restaurants to franchisees in 2001 and add 1,350 locations worldwide.

The greatest November losses occurred in the volatile high-tech sector, which fell 18.1 percent. Only defense contractors saw modest increases in their stock values. Computer and telecommunications companies took a beating, including Lucent Technologies Inc. (down 33.2 percent), Motorola Inc. (down 19.5 percent), Dell Computer Corp. (down 34.7 percent) and Compaq Computer Corp. (down 29.3 percent). Chip maker Texas Instruments Inc. also fell 23.9 percent. Worldwide retail sales of personal computers are down 12-15 percent compared to a year ago.

Stock values in the "other" (non-high tech) manufacturing sector fell one-half percent. Two companies have announced consolidation plans. Pepsico Inc. is bidding to acquire Quaker Oats, which owns Gatorade in addition to Quaker cereals. Tyson Foods, which has more than 25 percent of the poultry market, is bidding for IBP (Iowa Beef), the nation's largest beef packer and second-largest hog processor.

The continuing high price of crude oil means higher profits for oil companies, however energy stock prices dipped 3.8 percent in November.

Retail stock prices fell 11.5 percent. Worst hit was Best Buy Co., which lost 48.7 percent of its value. Finance and service company stock prices dropped by 4.4 percent. Bank stocks suffered after Bank of America (down 16.9 percent) disclosed \$1 billion in bad loans. Xerox Corp. stock fell 17.8 percent in November, bringing its total decline this year to more than 75 percent.

The monthly Texas 100 Stock Index tracks the stock prices of the 100 largest Texas employers whose stock is publicly traded. The index reflects the current value of one dollar invested in each of its component companies in December 1997. That investment would now be worth \$116.82.

200,000 TEXAS CHILDREN NOW ENROLLED IN CHIP

(AUSTIN) 7 Year-old Zachary Lopez and his 16 Year-old sister Talia of Austin both suffered severe headaches last summer. For the first time in their lives their mother, Ida Lopez didn't hesitate to call a doctor because now that she and her husband enrolled their children in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in Texas, she can afford the expense.

"The CHIP program has given me great peace of mind," said Ida Lopez, a receptionist at an Austin based cable manufacturer. "Both my husband and I work, but our employers can't afford to offer health insurance to our children, but for just \$18 dollars a month CHIP covered the cost of my children's doctor's visits - even to the eye doctor. Now they have eye glasses, their headaches are gone, they can see clearly and they are studying hard in school."

Ida Lopez and her family represent one of the thousands of Texas families who have gained "peace of mind" since they enrolled in CHIP. Program officials are extremely pleased with the rate of enrollment and report that 200,000 Texas children have enrolled since the program began last May. These numbers mean Texas has outpaced other comparable states in the initial months.

Today program leaders are announcing new initiatives to reach even more Texas families who may not be aware that they qualify for the

program. These initiatives include a new multi-million dollar statewide advertising campaign, local community-based marketing initiatives and increased outreach involving business and community leaders.

CHIP was launched nine months ago with federal funds and money from the tobacco lawsuit settlement as part of the TexCare Partnership, Texas' umbrella children's health insurance initiative that also includes Medicaid and the Texas Healthy Kids Corporation. CHIP offers low-cost insurance to low-to-moderate income families.

Premiums are \$18 a month or less, depending on a family's size and income. For example, a family of four can make up to \$34,000- or more (possibly up to \$38,000) if they have child-care or other qualified expenses and still qualify for CHIP.

"In less than a year, CHIP has made it possible for 200,000 children to visit the doctor when they're sick without their parents worrying about what it's going to cost," said Don Gilbert, Texas Health and Human Service Commissioner. "Still, there are thousands more families in Texas who are eligible to take advantage of this opportunity and may not know it. That's why we're taking some new steps."

Over the next three months, TexCare Partnership is launching:

Representative Jim Keffer Recently Announced Grant Award For Eastland County Position

Eastland-Community leaders in Eastland County have, for several years, discussed the merits of hiring a professional who would facilitate a county-wide partnership effort to coordinate with area educational institutions for increased training opportunities and to work with economic development professionals to insure a quality workforce for business and industry in the county. Through recent efforts of State Representative Jim Keffer and other community leaders in partnership with the West Central Texas Workforce Development Board, a person will soon be hired to do just that. Notification has been received that Eastland County will receive approximately \$43,000 from the Texas Workforce Commission through the TANF Rural Expansion Grant Program to expand workforce services. According to Rep. Keffer, "I am glad to finally see the products of our efforts. The grant is exactly what our community needs in order to build a partnership between education and industry. This is a victory for our workforce and economy."

In addition to the creation of a workforce specialist position, it is projected that funds will also be utilized to 1) develop a county-wide economic development plan, 2) conduct and independent evaluation of employer skill requirements and identify potential industries to complement existing industry and entrepreneurial opportunities, 3) explore the establishment of leadership training programs for youth and adults, 4) expand child care training, and 5) increase access to adult education/GED preparation opportunities. Funding will be available through this grant program through September 1, 2001. Eastland County Judge Brad Stephenson, who assisted in the development of

the grant proposal, stated that "the grant provides one more piece of the puzzle that will inevitably improve the standard of living for the people of Eastland County. I sincerely

thank Rep. Jim Keffer, and Mary Ross with the workforce Development Board, and the members of the Eastland County Economic Development Focus Group who were invaluable in this award process."

A press conference will be held on Thursday, January 4, at 3:00p.m. in the Eastland County Courthouse for formal presentation of the grant award. In addition to local community leaders and Workforce Board officials, Rep. Keffer will also be on hand for the presentation.

New Address Reported For Jerry Strickland

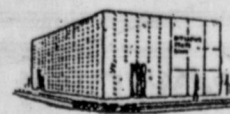
Jerry Strickland is currently receiving cancer treatment, but has been moved to St. Paul Medical Center in Dallas.

* An intensive, statewide TV and radio campaign
Approximately \$3 million will buy TV and radio advertisements to start in mid-January and run every other week through the end of August. TV and radio scripts are available upon request.

* Locally produced and directed community-based marketing initiatives

\$1 million dollars is being allocated statewide to approximately 10 community-based organizations (CBOs) such as the United Way of San Antonio, Catholic Charities and country health departments. The state currently contracts with over 50 non-profit groups that have the grassroots networks in place to help get the word out to families who may qualify for CHIP.

* An Aggressive campaign to involve more businesses in promoting community awareness about the TexCare Partnership
TexCare Partnership has begun a corporate development effort which has already secured agreements from Eller Media and Reagan National Advertising for free billboard space around the state and is working to expand the collaboration with the state's outdoor advertising industry. In addition, the Aenta Foundation has agreed to purchase needed items such as portable copiers for outreach workers and push cards with program information for distribution by community organizations

* Statewide print advertising campaign in community papers. This initiative is focusing on African-American, Spanish language and Asian community papers statewide. It will start in January, with a total of six insertions (one ad a month for six months.)

* A Statewide billboard campaign

This campaign is a result of the corporate development effort above. It relies on donated space. The state will pay for printing and posting fees. It will last 4-8 weeks.

Chip offers a full range of health insurance coverage, including regular checkups, immunizations, prescription drugs, eyeglasses lab tests, X-rays, hospital visits, dental care and mental health care, from a broad choice of doctors.

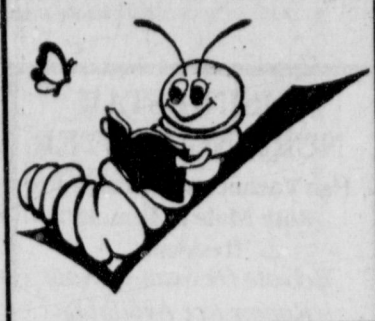

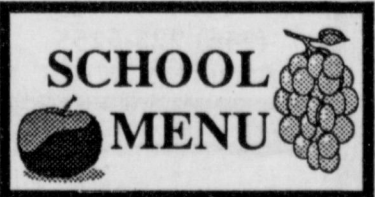

Arlington, Va.--The Selective Service System has added a change of address page to its web site that will allow young men to update their registration information on-line. Federal law requires that young men, ages 18 through 25, notify Selective Service within 10 days of an address change. The addition of the new web page will make fulfillment of this legal requirement easier and more convenient.

"This initiative corresponds to the Agency's vision of increased customer service," said the Honorable Gil Coronado, Director of Selective Service, who first initiated on-line registration on Dec. 2, 1998. "For two decades, men could only go to the post office to obtain a Selective Service Change of Address Form; this new web page will make the process more convenient for men who have Internet access." It is also expected to reduce the Agency's printing and processing costs, while saving young men the cost of first class postage to mail the change of address form.

Any man who is registered and was born after 1959 can update his address information by connecting to the Selective Service web site at www.sss.gov. He clicks on a link to the "change of address" page, types his new information, clicks the Submit button, and he is done. He can also check a box if he wants to receive an updated acknowledgment card by conventional mail.

Federal law requires virtually all men to register with Selective Service within 30 days of turning 18. Each year, about 1.8 million men turn 18. All U.S. male citizens, no matter where they reside, as well as male non-citizens residing in the U.S., are required to register. Although late registrations are accepted, a man cannot register once he reaches age 26. Failure to register is a felony. Moreover, Selective Service registration is linked to many benefits such as eligibility for federal student loans and grants, training programs under the Workforce Investment Act (WIA), federal jobs in the Executive Branch of the U.S. Government, and jobs with the U.S. Postal Service. More than half of the states have enacted legislation that links benefits such as state tuition assistance and eligibility for state jobs to registration. Also, Delaware and Oklahoma have legislation which connects Selective Service registration with a man's application for a driver's license. Additionally, male immigrants who are in the U.S. when they are 18 through 25 years old may be denied U.S. citizenship if they fail to register.

Although the U.S. relies on an all-volunteer military today, the Selective Service System and the registration program help America remain prepared to reinstate a timely and fair draft in a future crisis, should a draft become necessary.

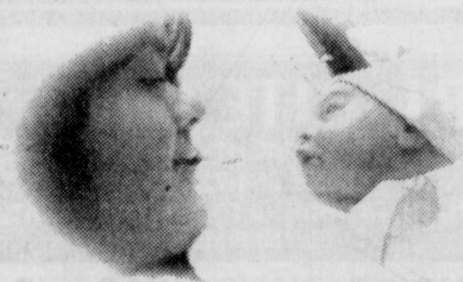
