## Broomcorn Market Open Next Week. Farmers Warned of Dumping Corn

Frank Shaw, in discussing the broomcorn situation, stated that there was a tendency among the farmers to dump their corn on the market at the earliest possible moment.

"That this is a mistake, and that the market will open by the first of the coming week.

Lindsay, Oklahoma, has sold 185 cars of corn, and the prices on the Lindsay market are practically the same as last season.

Better gathering conditions and better broomcorn in Roosevelt county should receive a fair price this season.

Mr. Shaw urges the farmers to seed and bale their broomcorn well, as this affects the price which they will receive.

The following from the Broomcorn Review gives the present situation at Lindsay:

**Prices Generally Unchanged**

Prices for new crop broomcorn at field points were generally unchanged with last week's quotations. Choice corn was reported scarce and firm at \$90 to \$115 per ton. Good sold from \$80 to \$90 per ton; medium \$70 to \$80; common, \$50 to \$70, with some few lots lower according to quality. Bulk of sales on the Lindsay markets ranged between \$80 and \$85 per ton. Sales at Wichita ranged from \$60 to \$88 for bulk of sales, with extremes reported down to \$30 on crooks and clean-up stuff and up to \$100 for limited offerings, said to be partly new crop Lindsay. Texas markets were unchanged with last week.

**State Tax Rate Same as Last Year**

County Tax Rate to Be Five Cents Higher in 1931 Than Last Year

The total state and county tax will be \$3.02 per hundred this year, according to Assessor Floyd Kennedy. Last year it was \$2.97. This raise was made necessary due to the collections during the year.

The total amount to be raised for county purposes is \$208,981.90; for 1930 it was \$203,806.00.

The rate for the City of Portales is \$1.37, the same as last year, making a total rate for Portales property \$5.25 per hundred.

The city of Elida reduced their rate 4 cents from 38 cents in 1930 to 34 cents in 1931.

## County Schools Now Opening

The schools of Roosevelt county will be opening during these first weeks of September. Five of the rural schools opened last Monday week at the same time the Portales schools began. They were Milnesaid, Arch, Fairfield, Gussy and Mt. Vernon. Milnesaid is a two teacher school with J. A. Gilbert principal; Arch, two teachers with O. A. Shultz principal. There are three teachers at Fairfield where H. H. Willis is principal; four at Canyon, with Agrie Jones principal. Miss Zelma Lovett is teacher at Mt. Vernon.

On Monday of this week County Superintendent A. E. Hunt reports the opening of the schools at Elida, Pleasant Valley, Kentucky Valley, Kenna, Bluit, Longa, Rogers and Benson.

R. F. McKinley is superintendent of the school at Elida again. Mr. McKinley has been head of this school for several years and is considered one of the strongest school men of the county. He has a faculty of 14 teachers.

There are three teachers at Pleasant Valley, A. C. Woodburn, principal. Miss Fannie Paxton is principal at Kentucky Valley where there are two teachers.

Kenna is another two teacher school with Miss Dolly Jones principal.

Longa and Benson each employ one teacher. Mrs. Charles Nance is employed at the former place, Miss Ruth Zion at the latter.

Donald Gordon is superintendent of the Rogers school and they are having a faculty of nine teachers this year.

Mr. Jones is principal at Bluit which is a two teacher school. Miss Dora and the other schools of the county will open later in the month.

### Senator Moon Addresses Farmers

On Monday afternoon, Senator K. B. Moon, who passed through Portales on his way home to Arizona from the Methodist conference at Walsenburg, Colorado, stopped over for a few minutes and addressed the farmers on the proposed cotton legislation.

The senator made a splendid talk and gave much valuable information.

### Crop Exhibits to Be Better

Crop exhibits will be an important part of the Roosevelt County Dairy and Livestock Show this year and all farmers are invited to assist in making this department a success by bringing in exhibits of the various crops. The premium list, which includes practically all crops grown on both irrigated and dry farms, was published two weeks ago.

The Dairy and Livestock Show has been built up until it really is the "County Fair." During the past two years, lack of funds has made it impossible to include crop exhibits, but this difficulty has now been overcome.

Crops are generally fine in Roosevelt county this year. Some wonderful exhibits can be made. The farmers must be depended upon to bring them in and to cooperate with the Dairy Show officers in making the crop department a success.

Those who desire to exhibit irrigated or dry farm products should study the premium list to see the amount required for each product. Dry farm products will not compete against irrigated products.

### Nautilus Back From Trip Under Arctic Ice Pack

ADVENT BAY, Spitzbergen, Sept. 8.—Sir Hubert Wilkins' polar submarine, the Nautilus, returned here this afternoon after an extended tour of the Arctic ice fields. The Nautilus was somewhat damaged in the ice and for several days anxiety was felt for its safety, because of failure to answer radio inquiries.

The submarine, when it finally appeared, to have been badly damaged by its adventures in the ice.

## Big Crowd Attends Labor Day Fiesta

Monday, Labor Day, witnessed the first celebration of this kind in Portales.

At 10:00 o'clock Monday morning the crowd had gathered, which was increased throughout the day.

A delegation of the Clivis organization was met at the city limits by the receiving committee composed of Mayor McCall, C. J. Howard, A. D. Tibbels, Bert Rawlins and J. G. Oraves.

At the union filling station they were met by the Portales Band and escorted to the court house square, where the ceremonies were opened by a band concert.

C. J. Cunningham, head of the Clivis Central Labor bodies, was introduced by C. Howard.

Judge C. M. Compton introduced Mayor McCall, who delivered the address of welcome, which was responded to by W. J. Keeney, head of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Judge Compton then introduced Judge James A. Hall, who was the speaker of the day.

Judge Hall prefaced his address by urging on the farmers the need of organization and cooperative marketing.

Judge Hall's address touched on the following subjects:

1. Introductory.
2. Benefits of organized labor: (a) Better wages, living conditions, happy, productive. Skilled and happy labor, better goods for consumption in the home; (b) Workmen's compensation; free text books; child labor; public health; safety appliances, etc.; mines, railroads; sanitary conditions in factories; employment agencies, state and national; old age pensions; mothers' hospitalization for members of the union; (c) Home ownership; (d) Home owned Oct. 1, 1928, at cost of \$2,200,000. Other homes similarly maintained by other unions.
3. Clovis last winter; voluntary employment agency for all unemployed whether union or not; in cooperation with business, but solely operated by central labor body.
4. Machinery age, men displaced by inventive genius, skilled labor demanded, needs of mass production must be met, trained and untrained now out of employment, do not know how to go back to farm, but should they? What inducement? Federal farm board says destroy wheat, destroy cotton, destroy the raw product brought into existence by the farmer. Surplus? Wheat can be sold, cotton can be sold, there is no scarcity, but is there a surplus?
5. Jake-leg. Business has this. National prohibition administration? No. Responsibility upon the shoulders of one former food administrator. The steward of national kitchen during war unable to cope with post-war conditions.
6. The chief may prepare excellent meal for the king, but this does not mean he can supplant the king as head of the government, nor that he would make a prescription druggist upon whom one may rely in serious illness.
7. Nationally ill, sick. Why?
8. Tariff wall, factories equipped for mass production and foreign competition. Now our industries built in foreign countries, employ foreign labor, and place foreign label upon products.
9. Result—unemployment at home!
10. Home factories trying to run near capacity as possible, must find consumption at home, no foreign market. If not operated, machinery rusts. High pressure salesmen developing market at home on the installment plan.
11. Present relief necessary this winter, wrong in principle, comes back to us in taxation. We are the government, and we pay the bills.
12. Law of supply and demand cannot be ignored; we have got to get back to economic principles and adjust those to machinery age.
13. Needs of the Country: Development of buying power rather than productive power.
14. Foreign friendships and foreign markets for our products.
15. National good will tours, and a home government conducted so as to encourage the friendships of foreign countries.

### Legislature of Texas Meeting to Curtail 1932 Cotton Output

ALBUQUERQUE, Texas, Sept. 8.—Texas lawmakers assembled here today for a special session called by Governor Ross Sterling to enact laws to curtail the state's 1932 cotton crop.

Southern planters looked upon Texas, which produces one-third of the nation's supply, as the lever in the movement for a reduction of acreage.

Governors of South Carolina, Georgia and Arkansas have indicated they may also convene state legislatures to seek a solution of the problems of overproduction and low prices.

Several production curtailment proposals were in readiness for presentation to the Texas legislature. In addition to the "No 1932 cotton" project of Governor Huey P. Long of Louisiana, a plan of J. E. McDonald, Texas commissioner of agriculture, advocating a 50 per cent reduction in cotton acreage in 1932 had many followers.

### Hawk Visions Fair as Among Nation's Best

Faith, Hard Work Gives Credit for Progress of Tri-State

AMARILLO, Sept. 1.—(Special.) Vision of its leaders, faith of the Panhandle-Plains pioneers, and hard work on the part of its backers today were given credit for the unprecedented strides made by the Tri-State Exposition since its birth less than ten years ago, by Wilbur C. Hawk, president of the Association of the Tri-State Exposition.

Mr. Hawk became the head of the fair board in 1927.

"A few years from now, citizens who have moved away and returned to the Plains—as they always do—will find the Tri-State Exposition occupying a position with and competing with the leading state fairs of the country," said Mr. Hawk.

Can't Be Whipped

"There is a certain determination, a civic pride and an unquenchable desire to accomplish things here in the Panhandle that is unmatched anywhere else in the United States," declared Mr. Hawk, in placing the credit for the progress of the Tri-State Fair where he believes it belongs.

"That same spirit that conquered the old West and made of it a modern civilization of progressive homes, schools, churches and industry is evident in the actions of the fair's workers, and only a catastrophe can call a halt."

Free Gate, as Usual

The Tri-State Fair this year will be held from September 21 to 26, inclusive, and its now famous free gate will be wide open.

More than \$15,000 in cash prizes is being offered, and early entries indicate that, despite economic conditions, the 1931 fair will surpass all of its predecessors.

Mr. Hawk believes the attractions this year will eclipse all previous attempts at entertainment, which together with competition between towns and bands for attendance and attention at the fair, will help to set up another attendance record.

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### Portales Rams Working Hard

Hard work and grueling training are what the forty boys who have started out for the Portales football team for the 1931 season are undergoing, under the care of their former coach, Brown, who carried the team to a state victory last year.

Many huskies are entered among the prospective candidates for the first team. Smith, Kerr and Kirksey, who were among the best string men last year of the backfield, are again in their same positions.

The first game scheduled this year is during the Dairy and Livestock Show, September 18, with Texico-Parwell.

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### Gas Rate Cut To Save Users 10-15 Per Cent

Next Bills Will Carry New Gas Rates, Samson Says

Reduction in gas rates which will mean a cut of 10 to 15 per cent in the bills of the average Roosevelt consumer was announced yesterday by the Southwestern Public Service company and presented at a regular meeting of the city council last night.

The reduced rates will go into effect with the bill for gas service from the middle of August to the middle of September.

Showing the situation at a glance here are examples of what the rate cut will mean to Roosevelt home-owners, grouped according to the amount of gas used per month:

Five thousand cubic feet, \$3.00 instead of \$3.75. Ten thousand cubic feet, the approximate amount consumed by the majority of residents, \$5.00 instead of \$7.50. Fifteen thousand cubic feet, \$8.75 instead of \$10.12. Twenty-five thousand cubic feet, \$14.25 instead of \$16.87.

The reduction applying to the first 25,000 cubic feet was announced by H. E. Samson, manager of the company, after several conferences with Mayor Robert L. Bradley.

Dual rear wheels of the truck

were said to have stopped on the man, who was dragged 20 feet after falling to gain a footing on the running board of the truck, which had slowed after Milam had waved a request for a ride. The truck was driven by J. R. Phillips of Amarillo. Officers who investigated the accident said Phillips was not blamable.

**NEW MEXICO'S TRAFFIC LAWS**

Drive carefully and prudently under all conditions.  
Speed limit on the open road—45 miles per hour.  
Speed limit in the residence districts of cities and towns—25 miles per hour.  
Speed limit in business districts—20 miles per hour.  
Speed limit in school zones—15 miles per hour.  
Speed limit approaching railroad crossings—approaching highway intersections—around blind curves—ascending grades where view is obstructed—15 miles per hour.  
STOP at railroad crossings.  
SIGNAL with horn before passing an overtaken vehicle.  
SIGNAL with the left hand when slowing, stopping, or turning to left or right.  
DO NOT PASS a vehicle on a hill crest or blind curve.  
DO NOT PASS a vehicle at a road crossing or highway intersection.  
DO NOT OVERTAKE in neutral down grade. Control your car with gears at all times.  
In case of accident STOP and render assistance to a wrecked car or injured persons.  
Have your BRAKES properly tested and in perfect working condition as required by law.  
Your HORN or SIREN must be in good working order and used when necessary but not promiscuously.  
LIGHTS must be used between the hours of a half hour after sunset and a half hour before sunrise. Two—and two only—head lamps are required, so constructed as to enable a driver to see a person clearly 200 feet ahead, but they shall not project a dazzling ray into the eyes of approaching motorists. Dimming of lights is permitted. One red or yellow tail lamp in perfect working order is required. Not to exceed two spotlights is permitted.  
No motor vehicle is permitted to carry a load or luggage extending more than 3 feet beyond the front; or extending beyond the line of fenders on the left side; or extending more than 6 inches beyond the line of fenders on the right side.  
At all times use road courtesy and consideration and do not willfully maintain your right of way at another's expense or harm.  
Prevent an accident and save a life or an injury.—New Mexico Magazine.

**DRY VEGETABLES YOU CANNOT CAN**

Now at a time when vegetables and fruits are plentiful and low in price, it is advisable for everyone to look ahead and plan and paste the family meals this coming winter, says Miss Veda Strong of the New Mexico Agricultural College.  
Many vegetables can be successfully stored fresh so that it is not necessary to preserve them. However, there are some vegetables, such as green peas, green beans and corn, which it is necessary to either can or dry in order to have during the winter. When all the cans and jars on hand have been filled and there is still so much of both fruit and vegetables that will go to waste and be so much needed next winter, the solution is to dry them. A good slogan might be, "Can all you can, and what you can't can, dry." Dried products take up little storage space and may be placed in odd sized jars and tightly closing tin and paste-board boxes. Dried products are nearly equal in health value to the canned ones. They are palatable and flavorful, the flavors being preferred by many to that of the fresh or canned products.  
The drying process is a comparatively simple one in our sunny dry climate. Screening of wire or cloth should be provided to keep insects from the product during the drying. The dried product should then be heated in the oven to destroy insect eggs and bacteria before storing.  
The use of artificial heat in drying has the advantage that the work is independent of weather conditions. It must have closer supervision, however, so that overheating may be avoided. This method is more expensive as it requires a supply of fuel. Some types of evaporators may be used in connection with the cook stove or range, or the open oven may be utilized.

In selecting products for drying, the same rules apply as when canning is to be done. Use only fresh, firm products and make the time from the garden to the drier as short as possible.

Anyone desiring information on drying of foodstuffs, communicate with your County Agent, or the Extension Service, State College, New Mexico.

**STATE POULTRY ASSN HAS MANY ACTIVITIES**

The protection and improvement of the poultry industry of New Mexico in all of its phases are the purposes of the New Mexico State Poultry Association, according to W. M. Ginn, Extension Poultryman of the New Mexico Agricultural College, who is also secretary-treasurer of the association. Its main work lies in the improvement of the poultry breeding stock by the accrediting of hatchery flocks. Before a flock is accredited, it must come up to certain standards in beauty, healthfulness, productivity, sanitation and other management phases. The progress of this work is indicated by the fact that during the 1931 hatching season about 90% of the chicks distributed by New Mexico hatcherymen were from accredited flocks.  
Other activities of the association include the influence it has in state and national law. It has taken steps which may have been influential in such matters as an adequate tariff on dried eggs. The membership at the present time is not large enough to exert any great influence on state laws, but the continued increase in membership gives hope that some day \$50 worth of hens will have as much protection against thieves as \$50 worth of cattle.  
The association has contributed considerably toward advertising the poultry industry, both locally and nationally. Through group action the members have aided in eliminating some publicity which was harmful to the poultry industry. The association is also a valuable instrument in poultry education. It is supported and fostered

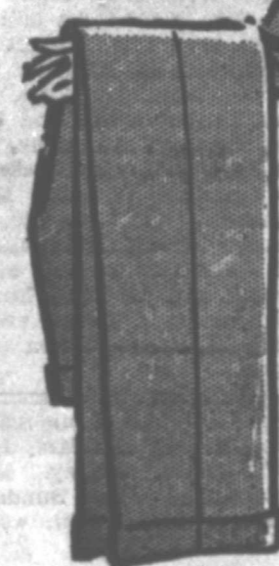
