Cattle Registration Changes Noted

Attorney General Mark White has issued two Attorney General's opinions which affect and should interest everyone involved in the cattle, ranching, farming and dairy industries. Opinion MW-289 discusses certain changes in laws on the registration of livestock brands, and MW-358 further clarifies the statutes.

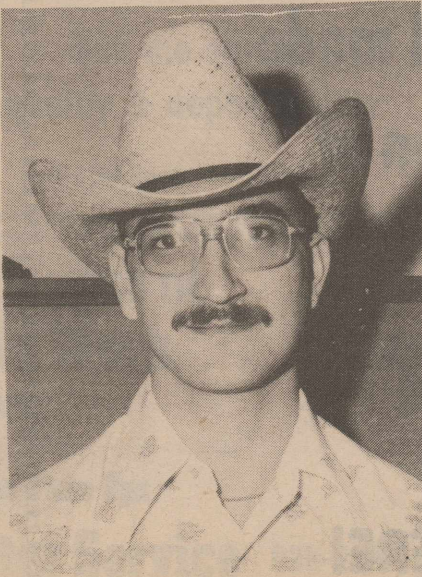
Article 6899j, V.T.C.S. was passed by the Legislature and became effective on August 30, 1971. Under this law and under Article 6890, V.T.C.S., all marks and brands registered after August 30, 1971 and before August 30, 1981 must be re-registered within six months of the latter date. Marks and brands must be re-registered at subsequent ten-year intervals by the owner. All marks and brands will then be recorded with the county clerk, regardless of when they originally were recorded, within six months of August 30, 1981, August 30, 1991, August 30, 2001, etc.

Attorney General Mark White is reminding every citizen who has registered a brand prior to August 30, 1981 that citizens must re-register each brand with the county clerk within six months in order to protect their right to it. If everyone follows the registration schedule set out by the law, county clerks will have a correct, revised set of records every ten years, and there should be no dispute about the correct ownership of livestock.

To register or re-register marks and brands, the livestock owner may obtain forms either by mail or in person from his or her county clerk's office. There will be blank spaces on the form in which to describe the mark or brand and the location on the animal where

the brand is recorded. The forms should then be mailed or delivered in person to the county clerk, who will keep the forms in an indexed bound volume or on microfilm for easy reference.

Opinion MW-358 answers questions concerning the recording of the marks and brands and the publication requirements to notify the public of changes in the law. Under Article 6899j, the county clerk is not required to notify individual owners of cattle brands of the ten-year expiration date of their registration. However, the county clerk must publish notice of the registration date in a newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days, paying for such notice out of the general county fund.

Finally, when the clerk records the brands or marks, the date of record must be noted.

Listings Sought

For a charge of \$5, a family can list their anniversary and the birthdays of each family member and receive a copy of the calendar. Calendars without listings may be purchased for \$3.50.

The birthday calendar promotes friendliness. It informs people of the birthdays and anniversaries of friends. Surprising someone on their special day is made easier with the birthday calendar.

Last year, the birthday calendar carried more than 850 listings of birthdays and anniversaries. Band Parents are seeking to obtain at least 1,000 listings for the 1982 calendar, making it the biggest and best ever.

Proceeds of the project will be used to support the Longhorn Band.

Registration Aug. 18-19

Registration schedules are announced for Hart schools with elementary and high school students registering Tuesday, Aug. 18 and junior high Wednesday, Aug. 19.

Elementary students will register from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Seniors will register from 8:30 to 10 a.m.; juniors, 10:30 to 12 noon; sophomores, 1 to 2:30 p.m. and freshmen, 2:30 to 4 p.m.

Junior high students will register Wednesday from 8:30 to 10 a.m. for eighth grade and 10:30 to 12 noon, seventh grade.

Classes will begin Thursday, Aug. 20.

Board Approves Band Budget

Louis Banister, band director, met with the school board Monday evening to present the band budget for 1981-82. The \$10,275 budget was approved.

Bus drivers employed for the coming year were Mrs. Johnnie Sullivan, David Knox, Dale Jahay, Harry Grensberg and Leonard Griswold. One bus route was deleted for the 1981-82 school year leaving five regular routes.

Salaries for substitute teachers was set at \$30 per day, substitutes for aides at \$22.50 per day and substitute for certified teacher, \$35.

Approval was given by the board for carpeting the school business office.

The 1981-82 budget was discussed with Aug. 31 as the date set to amend the 1980-81 budget.

Lunchroom program for 1981-82 was discussed.

Board members voted to change the spring break to April 12-16, 1982 because of a conflict with the UIL band concert and sight reading contest scheduled April 8, 1982 in Dimmitt.

New Guidelines Affect Lunches

New poverty guidelines for reduced and free lunch program were received here this week and appears elsewhere in this issue of this publication.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the scale may be eligible for either free meals or meals at a reduced price of 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

Those families who apply for reduced or free meals will note some changes in the application forms. It now requires the name and social security number of all adult family members. Adults without social security numbers must indicate that they do not have one. Schools may verify the source and amount of income as well as household composition.

Hart school board reminds families that they have reserved the right to verify the source and amount of income of those applying for reduced meals.

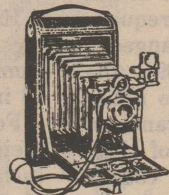

Cook Of The Week

Recipes are shared this week by Mrs. Jack Dyer. Friends who have sampled the recipes she shares have requested copies and give them seals of approval.

DIP

1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
2 T milk
1 8 oz. carton sour cream
1 sm jar dried beef
2 T onion flakes
2 T chopped green onion tops
1/2 bell pepper, chopped
1/3 c walnuts, chopped (DON'T SUBSTITUTE)

Let cream cheese come to room temperature. Mix cheese and milk until smooth. Stir in sour cream. Cut dried beef with scissors or chop into very small pieces. Stir in remaining ingredients. Put in Pyrex pie plate and sprinkle with more chopped walnuts. Bake about 20 mins. in 350° oven. Serve hot with chips.

CHEESE BALL

2 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese
1 3 oz. pkg. Roquefort cheese
2 2 lb. box Velveeta
1 t Worcestershire sauce
2 T pimiento, finely chopped and drained
1/4 t garlic salt
1/4 c pecans, chopped fine
finely chopped pecans
2 T dried parsley flakes

Let cheese sit out all day. Blend all ingredients together except last two. Shape into 2 balls. Place on foil in refrigerator. Reshape every few hours. Next day roll in pecans and parsley. Best if made 2 weeks ahead.

BAR-B-Q CHOPS

6 pork chops
1/4 c sugar
1 1/2 t salt
1/4 t pepper
2 t paprika
1 T oleo
1/3 c catsup
1/4 c vinegar
1/2 c chopped onion

Brown chops, drain off grease. Pour sauce over chops and bake 45 mins. in 375° oven.

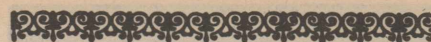

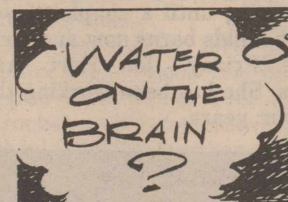

MALATHION SAFE--Despite the public uproar in California about the use of the insecticide malathion to control Mediterranean fruit flies, the material has a proven track record of being safe and free of health hazards, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Malathion has been used widely since the early 1950s by farmers, homeowners and gardeners. It is also used in many urban areas of Texas in mosquito control programs. Tests sponsored by the National Cancer Institute shown malathion to be both non-carcinogenic (not causing cancer) and non-mutagenic (not causing genetic changes.)

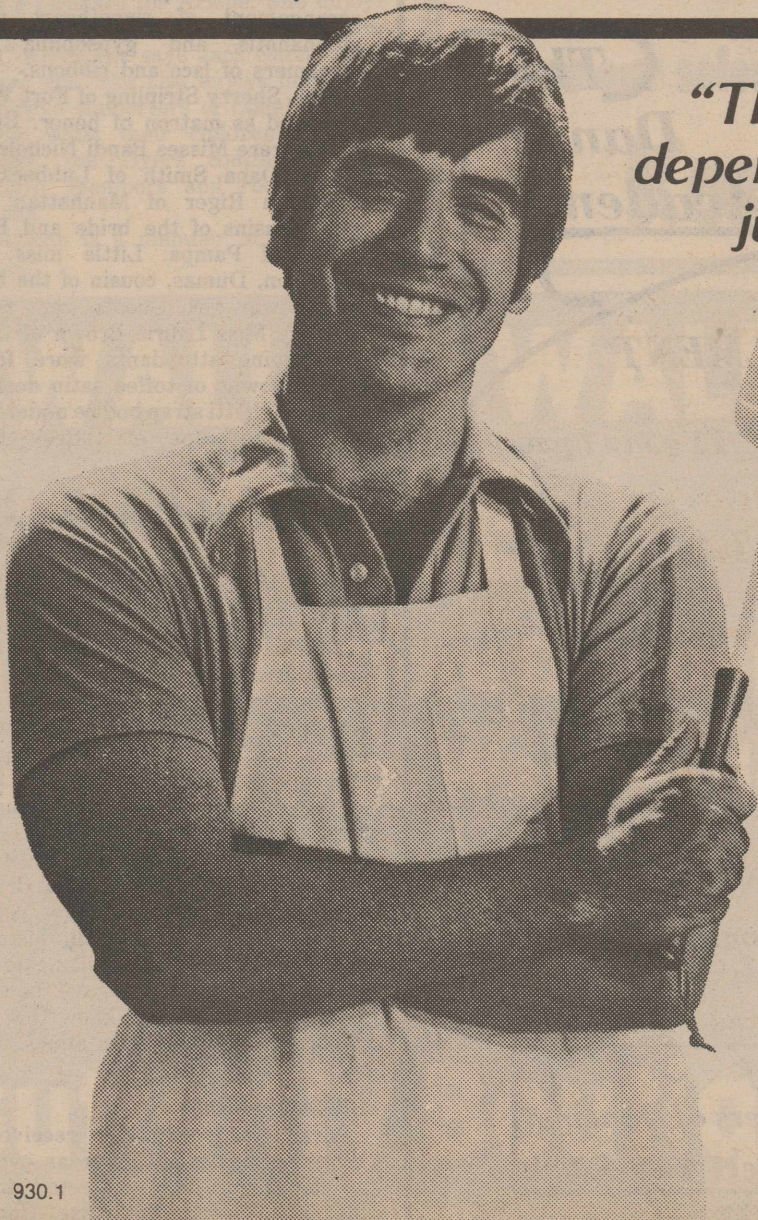

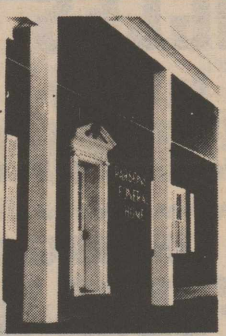
