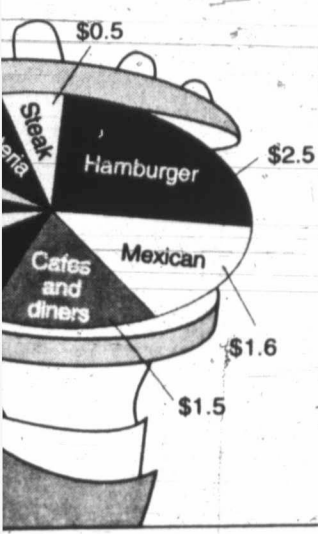

**City, county officials meet**

...to correct misunderstanding over bonds

The Mitchell County Commissioners met with representatives from the City of Colorado City Thursday morning to iron out a misunderstanding between the two entities.

According to County Judge Ray Mayo, the misunderstanding comes from a statement made by city officials at the December 28 meeting of the Commissioners' Court.

"We came out of that meeting thinking we were going to get six percent on the revenue bonds instead of the five percent that we're going to get," he said. "That's a shortfall of almost \$53 thousand."

The revenue bonds were part of an exchange for the county forgiving a \$200 thousand loan, in addition to in-kind work and services that would be provided by the city.

The in-kind work conducted by the city will encompass constructing water and sewer lines to the edge of the new state jail site.

According to David Montgomery, who is acting as assistant city manager, the original lease purchase agreement from the county to the city was for \$800 thousand over a 15 year period at five percent. "That was to put the Wallace Unit on line with the water and

sewer systems," he said. He added that the city felt it could repay the loan with the proposed increase in water and sewer revenue.

Originally, when the commissioners voted to forgive the city of \$200 thousand, the city agreed to grant the county free water and sewer service during the life of the bonds. However, state law prohibits utilities with bonded indebtedness to give away such services.

As a result of this discovery, City Manager Steve Shutt and Mayor Jim Baum met with the commissioners at the December meeting of the court.

During this meeting Shutt explained that if the county gets the bonds back with a six percent interest rate instead of five percent, \$50 thousand would be created.

During Thursday's meeting, however, Joe Smith, a representative of First Southwest Company Investment Bankers of Abilene, who is handling the bonds for the city, said he did not know anything about the six percent interest rate.

City Attorney Tom Rees said he felt that he may have contributed to the misinformation given by the city manager and mayor at the previous meeting.

"I told [the city manager] that because the bonds were negotiable that [the county] could dispose of them at a higher rate if they chose to do so," Rees said.

Smith explained that although five percent is the fixed rate for the bonds it is possible to sell them on the open market at six percent. However, depending on what the market value is, the bonds could also be sold at a four percent interest rate.

The commissioners voted to sign over the water line to the city in return for the bonds at a five percent interest rate. The exchange See BONDS, page 2

**Wellness Center will benefit community**

The Mitchell County Hospital District has been discussing plans for a proposed wellness center to be utilized by district employees and the community and at Tuesday night's meeting its board of directors took its first step toward making the center a reality.

Members voted to partially approve a budget for the project, which is still in its preliminary stages.

The district recently rented the entire First Western Savings Building on Hickory Street, where the Mitchell County Home Health Agency is housed.

The primary reason for renting the building in its entirety was to expand the office space for the Home Health Agency.

However, according to Terry McAdams, who is in charge of marketing for the hospital district,

the building has enough space to expand into classrooms and a fitness center.

In a previous meeting with the board of directors, McAdams explained that some of the rooms could be used as office space for organizations such as the Pink Ladies Auxiliary, to teach health related classes, host support group meetings, have a dietary clinic and hold aerobic fitness classes.

District employees have already been using the interior balcony of the facility to run and/or walk laps and the Mitchell County Auxiliary Pink Ladies organization has also moved into one of the offices.

McAdams said one of her goals is to set up a positive line of communication between the hospital district and the local community. See CENTER, page 2

**One case reported in Mitchell County Rabies quarantine approved**

In response to the increased number of rabies cases within Texas, the Texas Board of Health has recently approved a rabies quarantine for the entire state, effective immediately.

Although Mitchell County has had only one case of rabies confirmed in 1994, nearby Tom Green County has had 94 cases of rabies confirmed.

Mitchell County is part of TDH Public Health Regions 2 & 3. The total number of rabies-cases for this particular region is 79.

Of the 79 total, 28 cases of rabies have been found in skunks; 17 in foxes; 12 in bats; 11 in raccoons; five in cats; two in dogs; one horse; one cow; one sheep; and one ringtail. There have been no

confirmed cases of coyotes with the disease within this area.

According to James H. Wright, zoonosis veterinarian for TDH, there is a large concentration of rabies cases in the southwestern part of our region. The counties most affected are Runnels with 17 cases, Coleman with 14 cases and Brown with nine cases.

The area rabies quarantine prohibits the movement within or from Texas of possibly contaminated animals.

Animals listed by TDH include dogs and cats over three months old which have not been vaccinated against rabies in the last 12 months, all hybrids, including dog-wolf and dog-coyote crosses, foxes, coyotes, raccoons, bats and skunks.

According to Wright, there are several warning signs that an animal has become infected by the disease.

If you note a change in behavior, if it is a wild animal but seems to be friendly or tame, if it is an animal that normally comes out at night but is now coming out during daylight, if it appears excited or especially mean, if it bites or scratches at an old wound until it bleeds and/or it appears to be choking then the animal may more than likely be infected, he said.

To avoid being bitten or if you are bitten by a potentially rabid animal some suggestions are: do not approach a wild or unfamiliar animal; quickly and thoroughly See RABIES, page 2

**Banquet ticket deadline nears**

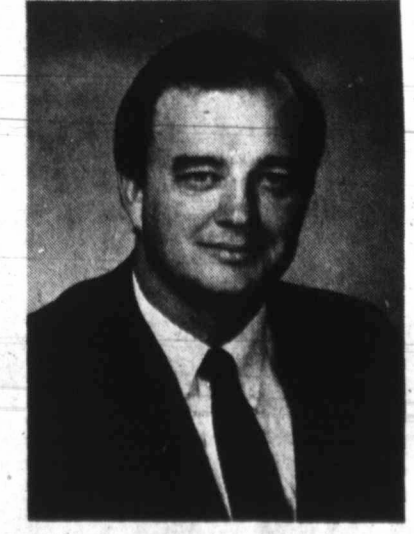
He is also working on a plan that offers another \$4.6 billion in

potential savings over the next five years. Additionally, he has also conducted reviews on the Texas school system that have turned up approximately \$115 million in suggested savings for public school districts.

Sharp is best known for the most successful state lottery start-up in world history. In December 1993 he turned the games over to the Texas Lottery Commission.

Sharp, 44, was born in Victoria, Texas and received his bachelors degree from Texas A&M. He later earned a Master of Public Administration Degree from Southwest Texas State in San Marcos.

**Court joins forces to reduce Board**

The Commissioners' Court of Mitchell County has joined with the courts of Nolan and Fisher counties in a request to reduce the number of board members on the three county Juvenile Board.

The recommended change will decrease board members from 16 to nine.

Mitchell County Judge Ray Mayo, who serves on the board,

said the reason behind the proposal is simple.

"Under the present law there are 16 members on the board and it makes it nearly impossible to get a quorum at the meetings," he said.

County would be submitting the proposal to the Legislature of the State of Texas.

The nine members of the proposed Juvenile Board in Fisher, Mitchell and Nolan counties would include: one county judge acting as chairman, rotating between three counties; a district judge or county court at law judge; Superintendent of Sweetwater ISD or a person designated by the Board of Trustees; City Manager of Sweetwater or person designated by city commission; one county attorney, rotating between the three counties; one citizen selected from each county by the respective commissioners'

court; and one person at large to be selected in a rotating manner by the three counties.

The request stipulates that no less than seven and no more than nine board members be allowed to serve.

Each board member would be limited to serving two terms unless reappointed by the proper agency and Sweetwater ISD and the City of Sweetwater would have representation only if they have contributed funding to the agency.

Mayo added that he felt these changes would be necessary to help the board work better as an agent of the state.

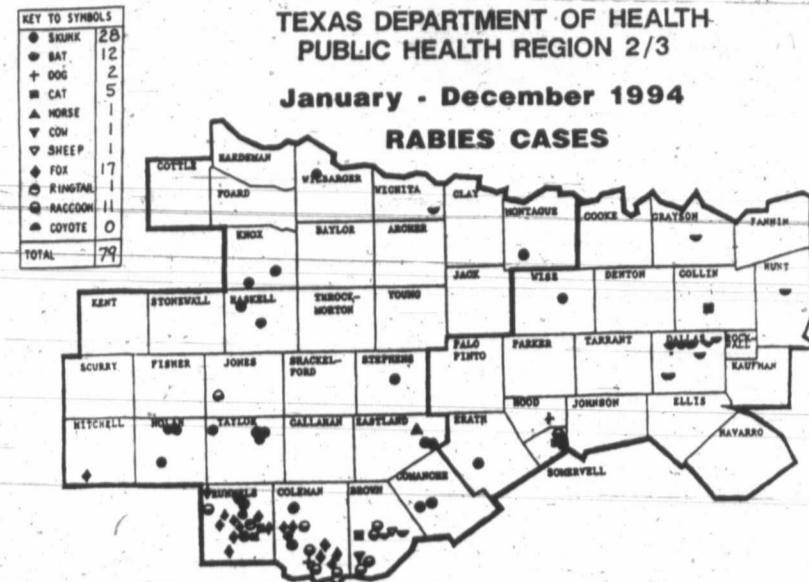

wash any bite wounds with soap and water; apply alcohol or iodine to kill germs; get a description of the animal including kind, size, color and location; report sightings of such animals to an animal control officer; and if possible, shoot the animal that has bitten,

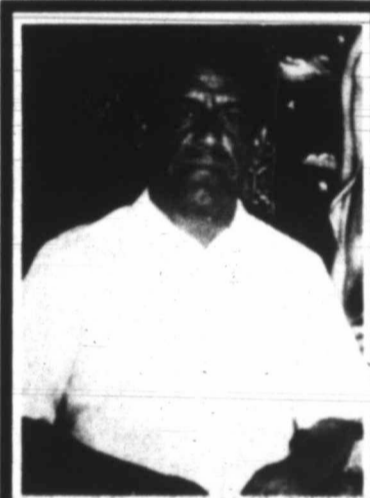

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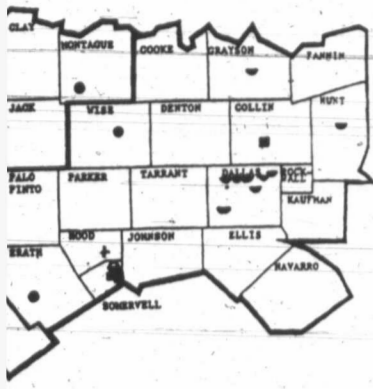


