Max W. Chadwick Begins Navy Training At San Diego, Calif.

San Diego, Calif. (FHTNC) Oct. 29—Seaman Recruit Max W. Chadwick, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Chadwick of 715 E. College, Burk Burnett, has begun seven weeks of Navy basic training at the U. S. Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.

In the first weeks of his naval service he will study military subjects and live and work under conditions similar to those he will encounter on his first ship or at his first shore station.

In making the transition from civilian to sailor he will be taught and supervised by experienced Navy petty officers. They will teach him the basic skills of seamanship as well as survival techniques, military drill and other basic subjects.

On completion of his recruit training he will be assigned to a school, shore station or ship, according to the results of his Navy classification tests, his own desires and the needs of the Navy.

Local MU Student Honored By ROTC

J. D. Hart was one of eight cadets named as Distinguished Military Students and awarded a certificate and medal by the Midwestern University ROTC in Wichita Falls Tuesday.

The ceremony was held on the drill field of the MU campus. Dr. Travis A. White, President of the University, presented the certificates. Dr. N. W. Quick, vice-president and dean of Instruction, presented the Distinguished Military Student medals. Lt. Col. Stanley R. Mills, professor of military science, accompanied the two.

Students selected for this honor are chosen by the professor of military science and approved by the university president. The student must possess outstanding qualities of leadership and high moral character and must have shown initiative through his participation and achievements in campus and civic activities. He must have a good overall academic standing. He must also exhibit a definite aptitude and interest for the military service and must be in the upper third of an advanced military science course. Students selected for this honor and graduate as a Distinguished Military Science student may be offered a commission in the regular army.

Hart ranks as a major in the MU military science program. He is also the executive officer of the Cadet Corps. He is president of Scabbard and Blade, which is an honorary military science organization, and operations officer of the Praetorian Guard, which is a scholastic military science fraternity.

Hart is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Hart of 312 West Third Street in Burk Burnett. He is a senior math and physics major.

The Brownwood Lions convinced the Burk Burnett Bulldogs that they were indeed deserving of their high state ranking, as they bombed their visitors, 27-0, in Brownwood, Friday night.

The Lions hit for two touchdowns early in the game and two in the fourth quarter, to wrap up the 4-AAA victory and at least a co-championship. They must defeat the Vernon Lions (4-1), Friday, in order to secure a playoff berth. The loss left the Bulldogs conference record at 2-3.

The game left no doubt in the Bulldogs' minds that they had been beaten by a potential state champion. The bigger Lions passed and ran with good success against the game, but outmaneuvered visitors.

The break that started Brownwood on the way occurred early in the contest, when Dean Thompson was jarred loose from the pigskin on his own 25 yard line. On three plays, Jimmy Piper capped the drive with a one-yard plunge to paydirt. The key play in the drive was a 14-yard pass from Billy Brannum to Rollin Hunter. Walter Croft kicked the point that made it 7-0.

Brownwood hit again before the first quarter was over. Leroy Denda capped the drive by going the final yard. Once again, Mr. Croft was called in to boot the point and the score read 14-0.

The Bulldogs then began a drive that took them to the Brownwood 12 before it fizzled out. The drive was spurred by Charlie Herring, Dean Thompson and Dale Hoffman.

Just before the end of the half, Herring broke loose for 24 yards, almost all the way. The defense also put on a good show during the second quarter.

The second half was disastrous, offensively, for the Bulldogs. They came up with a minus two yards that half. The defense didn't really stumble until the fourth quarter, when the Lions put across two more touchdowns.

Billy Brannum threw for another touchdown with 8:47 to go. This time he connected with Roger Richey for 5 yards. Croft missed the extra point, and the score was 20-0.

Si Southall, little brother of Baylor's Terry Southall, took over as quarterback, and chalked up the next score. With 5:48 to go in the game, Southall passed to Mike Ratliff for 27 yards. Croft's kick was true to make the final score, 27-0.

Charlie Herring was the Bulldogs' leading ground gainer for the night with 84 yards in 19 carries. On defense, Larry Johnson, Butch Moore, Jerry Harsh, Vernon Goodell, Rod Turner, and John Gray all turned in good performances.

This week, the Bulldogs will wrap up their season, when they host the Breckenridge Buckaroos. It will be the Bulldogs' bid for a 500 season.

THE LAW OF THE JUNGLE

By Harry Brown

Politicians love to tell us about the order, harmony and tranquility brought about by their programs of control. We are told that we have graduated from the days when the "law of the jungle" prevailed. Now, we no longer see the ruthless, dog-eat-dog competition that once ruled the free market.

Does the State bring us order? Harmony? Cooperation?

Obviously not. The State is our protector. But no one was safe for a period of several days in Los Angeles, during the recent riots. After obtaining our property through relief laws, unemployment insurance, etc., the rioters followed the lead of the State and took more direct action.

The State is our educator. And yet our college entrants cannot read; the schools have become hovels of terror; and there are perpetual shortages of adequate facilities.

The State administers our monetary system. Our gold is practically gone. There is a tremendous coin shortage — brought about by fear of future State monetary policies. We are now told that a copper-nickel token worth two cents is really the equivalent of a silver coin worth 25 cents.

In New York City, the city-owned water company has created a critical water shortage. In foreign affairs, our property is confiscated and used to finance two sides of a war in the Dominican Republic. The State has usurped property rights and brought about physical strife in labor relations and inter-racial relations. And, as long as tariffs have been known to states, wars have been fought as a result of the hostility they create.

That is the order, the tran-

quility, the harmony the State has given us.

Contrast

Meanwhile, what's going on in the jungle?

Companies like General Motors satisfy the need and desires for transportation of millions of consumers yearly — at the same time that they provide paychecks for hundreds of thousands of employees, and business for thousands of suppliers. Cooperation is the essential ingredient; without it, these millions of separate and diverse profit motives could never be satisfied.

From the smallest vegetable stand to the largest corporation, cooperation is the keynote in the free economy. Why? Because no one HAS to buy. And anyone who wants to succeed can only do so by cooperating

with others to help them get what they want.

When in the "jungle of private enterprise" do you find huge, wasteful surpluses (like the State has created in agriculture)? Where in the "anarchy of the free market" do you find severe shortages of critically-needed services (like the State-created water and coin shortages)?

Where do you find companies engaging in physical warfare between themselves?

Reason Why

The difference between the total inefficiency of political programs and the smooth functioning of the freemarket is no accident. It can be traced directly to the State's basic ingredient: coercion.

Once a program enters the

realm of the State, it becomes a coercive program in which individuals are forced to participate. So dog-eat-dog competition becomes inevitable — as various pressure groups vie to gain the coercive control.

In the free market, you must provide a positive benefit to someone, to gain their voluntary acceptance — so none of the ruthless activities of politics ever enter the free market.

Where does your future lie? In the chaos created by the State? Or with the continual uplifting progress of private enterprise?

Have a certain key you need to find in the dark? Drill two holes in the top. Find it by feel.

1 package pie crust mix
4 cups canned apple sauce
1/2-3/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
Pinch salt

Prepare pie crust mix as directed on package. Roll out and press into 6 or 8 tart shells, or muffin cups. Flute edges and chill. Thoroughly mix remaining ingredients and divide evenly between shells. Bake in a hot oven, 425 degrees, 25 minutes or until pastry is gold brown. Cool. If desired, add any of the following toppings before freezing pies—whipped cream, flaked coconut, chocolate curls, crushed peppermint candy, chopped raisins or nuts. Wrap or bag tarts. Freeze until ready to use. Makes 6-8 individual tarts, depending on size preferred. Note: If cheese is used, freeze tarts as directed. Before placing in lunch box, unwrap and add cheese. Rewrap and place in box.

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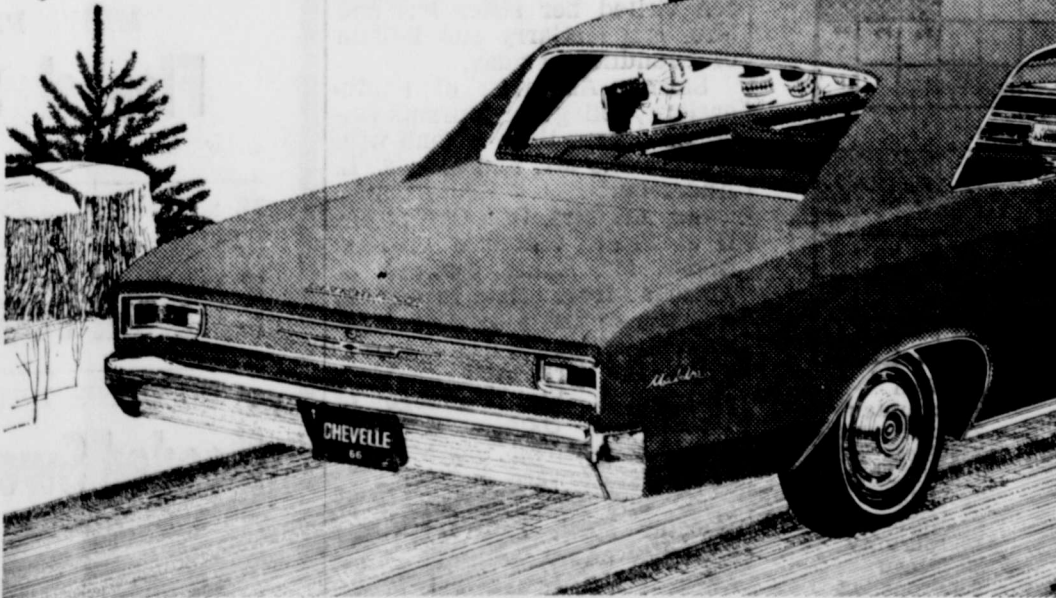
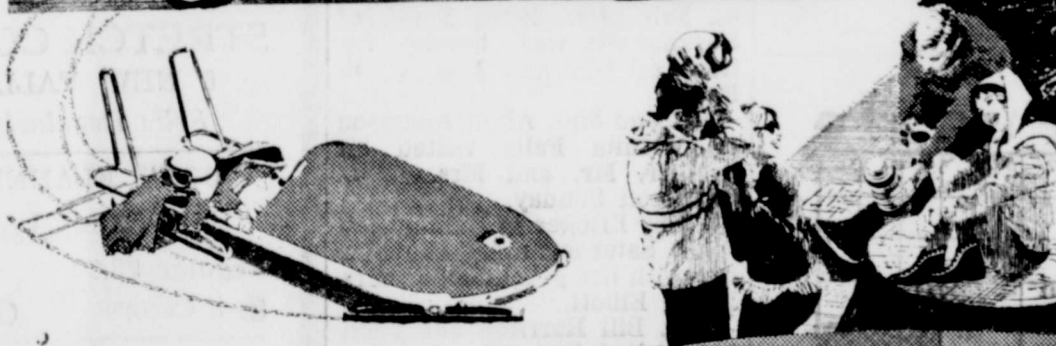

44th NATIONAL 4-H CLUB CONGRESS Showcase of America's Youth

THE National 4-H Club Congress opens for the 44th straight year in Chicago, on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 28, but the young delegates start checking into the Conrad Hilton Hotel headquarters on Friday and Saturday. Activities begin at once, and never stop until the final banquet on Thursday night, Dec. 2.

The Congress theme is "Young America and World Affairs," announced Norman C. Mindrum, director of the National 4-H Service Committee which arranges the annual event in cooperation with the Extension Service of the land-grant universities, and more than 55 business firms which support the 4-H program.

The 1,500 delegates—all winners—will represent 50 states, Puerto Rico, and for the first time an "official" delegation of 10 Canadian 4-H members, one from each province. The 4-H'ers will devote the better part of two days to forums on world problems.

During the action-packed week more than 200 youths selected for superior achievement will be designated national winners of educational scholarships.

Three boys and three girls will be named to receive the highest honor bestowed during the Congress: The Presidential Silver Tray award. These champions are the top pair in achievement, citizenship and leadership programs.

Donors of funds for the trips and scholarships are business firms and foundations. They contribute more than a million dollars each year to aid 4-H, said Mr. Mindrum.

The award winners are all selected by extension personnel heading the state 4-H program. Among the award donors are:

Few Rules Help You Get Most Out of Food Freezing

There's more to freezing food than keeping it safe for consumption.

In a modern refrigerator-freezer, properly frozen food should be as appetizing, flavorful and high in nutritive value when it leaves the freezer as when it was stored away. And it will be if a few simple rules are followed.

To safeguard the original quality and freshness of food, freeze it as soon as possible. Special directions, such as blanching vegetables or trimming meat and poultry, should be followed carefully.

The zero-degree temperature maintained in the freezer compartments in most of today's refrigerator-freezers is important for proper freezing. It is this extreme coldness which freezes food rapidly and keeps its quality, color and flavor intact.

Frozen food must also be protected from exposure to air which can cause drying out and flavor loss. Package food

tightly in foil, plastic wrap, freezer paper or containers and seal with freezer tape. The tape also makes a handy label for marking the contents, amount and storage date of each parcel.

Foods freeze best when the walls and shelves of the freezer compartment are free of frost. No-frost models maintain evenly cold temperatures, keep the freezer section clear, and prevent food packages from sticking together. Ice will not form around the packages and labels will stay easy to read.

Although almost all food will stay safely and tastefully frozen for substantial periods of time, it is a good idea to know the recommended length of storage for different items. By using frozen food during the suggested period, quality and freshness will be at their peak. A good rule is to plan on seasonal turnover, and to use foods first which have been in the freezer longest.

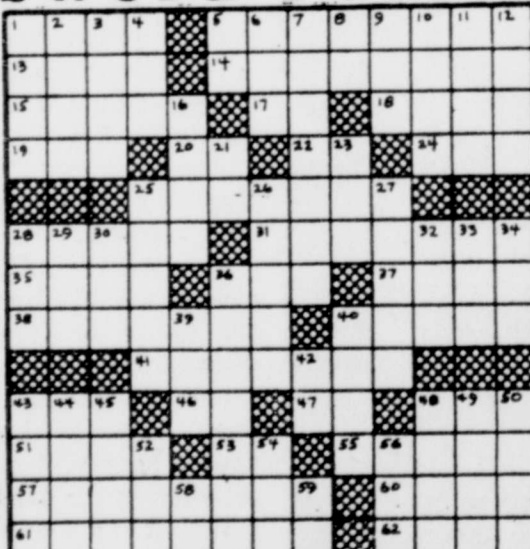

Baby-sitting scheduled tonight? Teen-age sitters are a national institution. More than a million of them work from coast to coast.

So important are their skills that a handbook has been issued by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare covering do's and don'ts. It has hints on safety, feeding, first aid and other topics.

How to play with children is a chapter by itself, with an important reminder: "Because all children want to play, they quickly come to like people who understand play and how to make it interesting."

For example, the 2-year-old enjoys singing and picture books and crayon drawing. The 3-to-4-year-old likes stories and "pretend" games. The 5-to-6-year-old is ready to cut and paste. The smart sitters comes prepared.

"The baby sitter's kit is your own private collection of toys, surprises and emergency needs," says the booklet, and it urges sitters to carry crayons and colored paper, notebook, flashlight and other handy supplies.

Other experts in the field of child play agree. "Parents can help," points out Alice Hanson of Whitman Publishing Company, Racine, Wisconsin, world's largest publisher of children's books. "They can tell the sitter where favorite playthings are. At bedtime the sitter might read a child's favorite book. Or she can bring her own. A typical low-cost juvenile book is called '365 Bedtime Stories'—so she can be sure she won't run out of material."

Storybooks from the local variety store can be used over and over—for reading, tracing, copying, or even putting on plays. The sitter who invests in these often reaps dividends. Chances are that her popularity rating and earnings will rise, and she'll be sitting pretty.



Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance 277 Park Ave., N.Y., N.Y., 10017

Q. How do "package" life insurance policies work?

A. Many types of "package" plans are available from different life insurance companies. Probably the two most popular types are "family plan" and "family income" policies, designed mainly to meet the insurance needs of younger families by providing extra protection while the children are growing up.

The "family plan" usually combines whole life insurance on the husband with smaller amounts of term insurance on the wife and children. As the children reach adulthood (usually age 21 or 25), they are no longer covered, but can then buy individual policies equal to five times their insurance under the family plan, regardless of their insurability.



The "family income" policy usually covers only the husband, but combines whole life insurance with additional decreasing term protection on him. Under a typical \$10,000 family income policy, if the father should die within 20 years after the policy is purchased, the family would receive an income of \$100 a month for the remainder of the 20-year period, plus \$10,000.

Premiums for combination plans run considerably lower than if the same overall protection were purchased under several different policies.

Q. What is the difference between the "reserves" and "cash value" of a whole life insurance policy?

A. They are in effect the same thing, although there are some technical differences. As the policyholder grows older, the life insurance company must build up an increasing reserve fund each year to offset the increasing risk and eventual certainty of his death. Part of these reserves come from the policyholder's annual premiums and part comes from investment earnings. If the policyholder voluntarily drops his policy during his lifetime, he gets back most or all of the reserve fund in the form of "cash value."

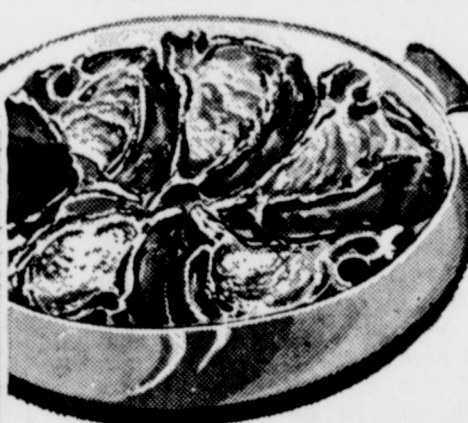

Any proposal they make, regardless of its effects on employers, is given consideration and usually passed. Antitrust laws have been ruled, in most cases, as not applying to them. Even the union leaders themselves are beginning to realize that some of their demands are becoming excessive. Unless Congress wakes up and recognizes that both sides of a labor issue need protection, the economic future of our country may be in danger."

Speaking in the House of Representatives, Congressman Curtis of Missouri pointed out that in 1964 the wholesale price index for ethical pharmaceuticals declined for the 6th straight year, reaching an all-time low.

The petroleum requirements of U. S. armed forces in Viet Nam have increased by 300 per cent since March, 1965, Oil Facts reports. Yet, says the commander of the Defense Fuel Supply Center, the forces are filling all their petroleum needs through commercial facilities. No action has been hampered by shortages. Illustrating the importance of oil products to military operations, one aircraft carrier of the Forrestal class, together with its planes, consumes more than 200,000 gallons of fuel a day. A B-52 making a bombing run from Guam to Viet Nam uses 2,500 gallons of jet fuel per hour.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover says: "We seem to be witnessing a moral deterioration in our population. It is seen in those who are willing to compromise their ideals if an easy dollar can be made, and it can be seen at work in everyday life where a citizen will obey the law himself, but will also passively tolerate immorality and disrespect for authority within his own community. . . . People have got to realize that if they deal with illegal gamblers, smut peddlers, and other merchants of the underworld, they are helping to support the organized crime complex."

The Mark of Bravery

WHAT MORE GALLANT way to honor your country than to give your life for it? Major Charles J. Loring Jr. of the U.S. Air Force did just that in Korea in 1952, and received the Medal of Honor for his conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity. He was leading a flight of four aircraft at the time, and had been briefed to dive-bomb enemy gun positions.



THE MAJOR rolled into his dive-bomb run, pressing the attack until his aircraft was hit. At 4000 feet he deliberately elected to sacrifice his life by diving his aircraft directly into the midst of the enemy gun emplacements. His selfless and heroic action completely destroyed the enemy gun emplacement and eliminated a dangerous threat to U.N. ground forces.

As SYMBOLS of such inspiring bravery, no wonder model soldiers are perennial favorites. The "G.I. first class mail service. Accord-
ing to the reports, there would
only be one class of mail, all
mail traveling over 400 miles
would be sent airmail — and,
best of all, overnight delivery
anywhere in the U.S.

Sounds beautiful, doesn't it?
But we're forgetting some-
thing. This is not General Mo-
tors revealing plans for its new
model year. It is not General
Electric announcing a new dis-

covery. Neither is it American
Telephone & Telegraph setting
plans for a new long distance
service.

We're talking about the fed-
eral government. And the def-
inition of an optimist is: "one
who takes governmental prom-
ises seriously."

Remember the Zip Code? Re-
member how we were told a
couple of years ago how much
speedier mail would travel with
zip codes? And have you read
recently of the controlled ex-
periments in which non-zip mail
was generally delivered faster
than zip mail?

We have been promised over
and over again that mail would
be delivered faster because of
some new improvement. The ac-
tual results have been higher
postal rates, slower service, and
reduction from two to one de-
livery per day.

The government is an agency
of coercion. It does not com-
pete in the marketplace for its
customers. It has no compe-
tency in such things as running
a post office or administering
insurance programs or running
relief agencies or banking or
mortgaging or transportation or
any of the hundreds of other
commercial endeavors it jumps
into.

A year or two from today we
shall be surprised, for instance,
to find that the annual cost of
"Medicare" is several times the
estimated figure—the estimate
upon which it was "sold" to the
public. Why will the cost be
greater? Because the use of the
program was based upon the
use by the participants when
they were required to pay free
market prices.

Once the government lowers
the price considerably by sub-
sidy, the use of the program
will skyrocket. If the govern-
ment were to subsidize auto-
mobiles so that new ones only
cost \$500, the annual sales
would be 20 or 30 million.

In the same way, "Medicare"
will be used many more times
more extensively than anyone
could guess.

Don't we see this continually
in the government school sys-
tems? Every bond issue is the
one that will finally bring fa-
cilities up to the need. And yet
every year the schools fall
shorter of providing a true edu-
cation for our children.

And so, a year or two after
the new "speedier" mail ser-

vice is inaugurated, we will be
amazed to find that it now takes
a day longer to get mail across
the country. And we'll wonder
why.

All because we've never
learned that government is not
capable of carrying the mail
and it never will be.

It was outclassed by private
enterprise in the letter-carrying
business until the federal gov-
ernment OUTLAWED all pri-
vate mail services. Today, no
one who's aware of the facts
would think of using Parcel
Post when United Parcel, REA
Express or Greyhound facilities
are available.

Let us be thankful there are
still private companies around
to bail us out of the problems
the government creates.

tions.

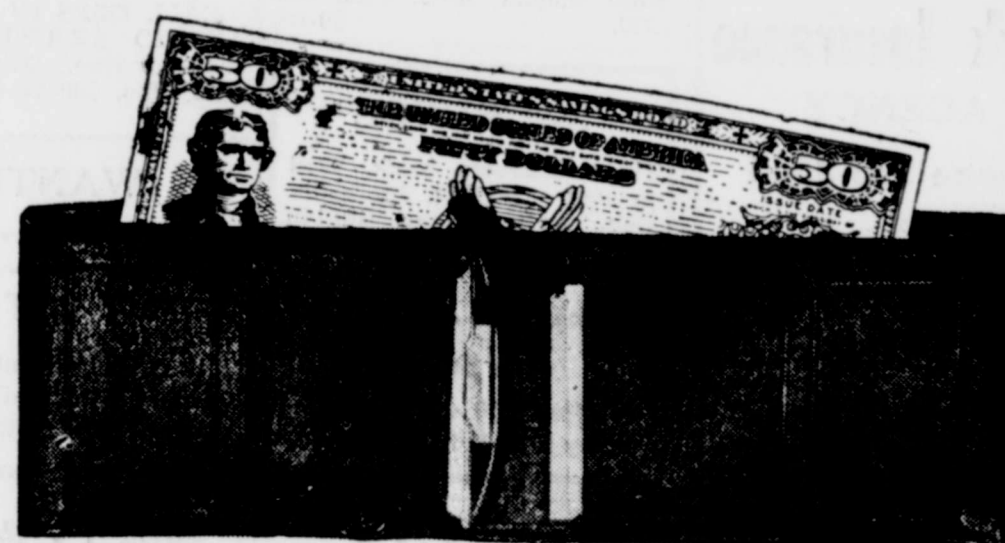

To prepare spareribs place in shallow open pan. Roast in hot oven (425°F.) 30 to 40 mins. Pour off fat. Sprinkle generously with seasoned salt. Reduce heat to 350°F. and roast uncovered 45 to 60 mins. or until fork tender. Serve hot with baked potatoes. If desired, ribs may be spread lightly with orange marmalade during last 5 mins. of baking time.

Select Washington State Russets of nearly uniform size. Wash, dry and oil. Arrange on baking sheet or oven rack. Bake from 350°F. to 450°F. depending on other oven needs. Bake 45 to 60 mins. or till fork tender. Remove from oven and press gently to let out steam. Cut 1 1/2 inch cross in top of each potato and press gently from bottom until snowy white potato bursts thru. Break up lightly with fork. Top with salt, pepper, butter and a tablespoon of commercial sour cream. Serve at once with help-yourself toppings of crumbled, crisp bacon bits, chopped green onions or chives, grated American or crumbled blue cheese.
