JUNCTION HAS BIG CLEAN-UP DAY.

All Co-operate for Cleaner Town. Business Men Close and Join in the Work.

Wednesday was a great day for the cleanup movement in Junction. Many were busy Tuesday gathering together trash from streets and vacant lots. Early Wednesday morning people were seen in every direction with hoes and rakes making a raid on the trash, weeds and rubbish and things moved lively to the tune of "Everybody's Doing It Now." The business houses remained closed Wednesday morning and proprietors and clerks joined in the cleanup. The ladies were busy everywhere. Committees appointed for streets and vacant lots were on the job and working at it with a vengeance. Streets and vacant lots had special attention in this cleanup and we rise to remark that a very marked improvement was made; but there is much yet to be done the good work has just started. We fear no contradiction in saying that Junction was given Wednesday morning the best cleanup it has ever received. But when a town has places which have been neglected in this matter for some forty years, it's more than a half day's job to attend to it. On with the good work! We have all made a fine start. The streets have a cleaner appearance than they have had for years, but there are vacant and back lots here that still need attention. There are places in the business section that are a disgrace; back out of the way places which have years of accumulation of filth and litter. We hope every one of these will be searched out and cleaned up well.

Among other matters given attention Wednesday was the Schreiner Park, which has just been donated to our civic league. The Boy Scouts, under the management of Rev. J. C. Campbell, and the Camp Fire Girls, as well as the other boys and girls, under the management of Misses Austin Durst and Jessaye Smith were very busy at the park giving it a good going over and improving its appearance very much.

The Civic League is highly commended for their splendid work for a cleaner town. It is by their efforts that the great improvement in these matters has been made. We are glad in deed that these good ladies have succeeded thus far in awakening our citizenship to action. Such work not only adds much to the general appearance, but does away with many breeding places for disease germs. The work which was done here Wednesday may mean saving a number of our people from typhoid; it may even mean the saving of lives—perhaps in your own home. Then should we not one and all be sufficiently interested to give our best efforts for a cleaner town?

And that park! What prettier spot is there in Junction vicinity for a park.

Since Mr. Schreiner has been so generous as to donate this pretty spot to our people for a park, we certainly should keep it in the best of condition. Schreiner Park will ever be a monument to Mr. Schreiner's kindness. It will also be a monument to the laudable efforts of our Civic League and to the people of our town. It will be a park of which any town might well be proud. Speaking for Junction, we say we propose it shall ever be thus.

Governor's Proclamation Sets Time for Observance as May 14.

Austin, Tex., April 22—In a proclamation issued today, Governor Ferguson changed from May 7 to Sunday May 14 the day designated for observance as mother's day. The change was made to conform to the national observance as contained in President Wilson's proclamation designating the second Sunday in May as the one for observance. In his second proclamation the governor directs attention to the change and "request that the newspapers give due publicity to this proclamation."

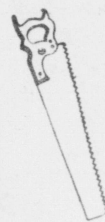

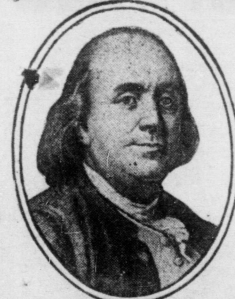

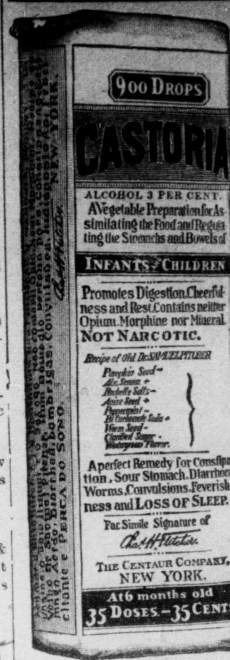
