## Assessor States Rules Concerning Poll Tax

Miss Willie Belle Cleveland, county assessor and collector of taxes, received a telegram from the Attorney General's office January 2 stating that the department had repeatedly ruled that all persons over 60 years of age living outside of cities of ten thousand or more population do not need to obtain exemption receipts in order to vote.

Miss Cleveland states that on the other hand it is compulsory for all persons becoming 21 years of age before the July elections to obtain an exemption receipt from her office in order to vote. The certificates are issued free of charge. In regard to the question that is being asked the collector's office whether or not a person may pay his poll tax without paying his real or personal tax, the law plainly sets out that a person may pay his poll tax without paying the other tax but he cannot pay his real or personal tax without paying his poll tax. It is understood that all voting polls must be paid by midnight, January 31, 1936.

The present highway registration plates are good up until midnight April 1, 1936. The Collectors office is forbidden to issue the license plates for the year 1936 until February 1, 1936 and cannot issue them then unless the vehicle is properly registered for the year 1935.

All youths who are members of relief families and who have been certified as eligible for WPA work are urged to call at once at the National Re-employment Service office for these workers. At the NRS office they will be assigned identification numbers at the time of registration and the name and identification number will be mailed to the WPA District office at Big Spring, and they will in turn notify the youths as to when, and where to report for employment.

All possible speed will be appreciated in getting youths registered. No registrations will be taken after 2 o'clock on Saturday.

## 1936 TRUCK MODELS ARE ANNOUNCED BY CHEVROLET

The agent can show as many as 20 men how to run the lines in one day as well as to regulate the level in case some adjustments would have to be made. Following are the dates for the demonstrations:

O'Donnell, Wednesday, Jan. 22 on H. L. Hohn farm; Hancock, Thursday, January 23 on W. A. Bowles farm; Friday, January 23 on R. A. Vinzant farm at Woody; Tuesday, Jan. 28, F. L. Grisom farm at Shumake; Wednesday, Jan. 20, on Otto Reithmayer farm at Sparenburg.

Farmers and others who have business with the agent can expect him to be in the office only on Mondays and Saturdays beginning with Saturday, January 18. Since the reduction program is a thing of the past your agent will have time to get out in the country and do the regular work that a county agent is supposed to do. Please be governed by the above announcement as it is impossible to be in the office and the country at the same time.

Others who want terracing demonstrations should get in touch with the agent at your earliest convenience, as he will not have time to do individual terracing for any one, only on a community basis.

#### FORD MOTOR CO. TO EXHIBIT AT TEXAS CENTENNIAL

Dallas, Jan. 14.—The Ford Motor Co. will enter the Centennial Exposition when it opens here in June with a display of its latest investment of \$2,250,000. Announcement of the Ford exposition program was made from Dearborn, Michigan, after a conference between Henry Ford, Edsel Ford, Nathan Adams, chairman of the Exposition directorate, and Paul M. Massman, director of Exposition exhibits. Plans for a \$1,200,000 Ford building for the Exposition have been drawn by Albert Kahn, New York architect. Work is to start on or before February 15, with completion date set for May 1.

The structure will be of steel and concrete with wide patios and exhibition spaces. It will include an amphitheatre for a series of elaborate musical and entertainment programs which the Ford company will present during the progress of the Exposition.

A feature of the Ford plans will be a series of replicas of historic southwestern roads and trails which will be constructed around an ornamental lagoon near the Ford Building. Each section of historic road will be ap-

propriately landscaped and Ford cars will carry Exposition visitors across the trails with the compliments of the company.

The Ford exhibit will feature a display of raw materials used in the manufacture of their cars including cotton, mohair, wool, hides, soy beans, cotton and rice. The exhibit will be the largest on the grounds of the Texas Centennial Exposition, the building occupying 55,000 square feet.

#### INFLUENZA MOST PREVALENT AT THIS SEASON OF YEAR

Austin, January 13.—This is the season of the year when influenza or 'flu' is most prevalent, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. Colds, gripe, influenza, whatever we may call them are believed to be spread from person to person through discharges from the nose and throat. To protect yourself and others from such disease, here are some things to be remembered.

Influenza is highly infectious. Practically everybody is susceptible to it. No matter how many times you have had the disease you may contract it again. Therefore, keep away from people who are sneezing, coughing, or sniffing or who are actively ill with colds, influenza, or pneumonia. Keep away from crowded places. Have your hands washed and always wash your hands before eating, and sneeze or cough into your handkerchief.

Keep fit by drinking plenty of water, by eating simple nourishing food, by some exercise out of doors every day by dressing according to the weather, by having plenty of sleep in a well ventilated room, and by keeping the bowels regulated.

Don't neglect your 'cold'. If you have the slightest suspicion of fever go home, go to bed immediately and call your physician. Stay in bed until he tells you that you can get up, and follow his advice explicitly.

Disastrous results may ensue of influenza cases are allowed to get about too soon. Persons convalescing from influenza are particularly susceptible to other infections. If you are just getting over some illness, return to your normal routine of life gradually.
