PEACE MOVE SPREADS OVER WORLD

NATIONS LARGE AND SMALL SEE AID OF TREATY

FORTY - EIGHT LESSER POWERS INVITED TO JOIN BY SIGNING

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—A simple, friendly gesture from an old world statesman to this country has grown into an instrument whereby the world may be brought nearer to universal peace.

From little, insignificant Albania down to Venezuela on the other end of the international alphabet, opportunity has been opened to join the great powers in renouncing war as set forth in the treaty signed at Paris Monday.

Credit for the wish of two countries agreeing to banish war between themselves as an instrument of national policy goes to Aristide Briand of France. Credit for expanding the idea into an international pact open to every country goes to Frank B. Kellogg.

Forty-eight invited. In keeping with the spirit of the negotiations which resulted in the treaty, invitations have been placed by American diplomatic representatives before forty-eight governments other than those powers which already have signed. Those invited include every sovereign of consequence except Russia which has been hidden by France to join.

The American invitation said: "The United States has been anxious from the beginning that no state should feel deprived of an opportunity to participate promptly in the new treaty and thus not only sign itself definitely and solemnly with this new manifestation of the popular demand for world peace but also avail itself of the identical benefits enjoyed by the original signatories."

"Accordingly in the draft treaty proposed by it, the United States made specific provision for participation in the treaty by any and every state."

LUBBOCK NOW HAS AIRPORT

TEMPORARY FIELD IS SECURED NORTH OF CITY LIMITS

Another forward stride toward the goal of a municipal airport for Lubbock was taken last night with the securing of a temporary landing field at the City Hall in which definite action was taken toward the proposed project.

A report of George E. Benson, chairman of the airport committee, showed that a temporary landing field had been secured north of the city and that arrangements had been made to condition it for a permanent airport. Mr. Benson is to leave for Dallas in the near future to confer with the inspector of the department of commerce, and other federal authorities concerning the aviation question here.

Discussion of highway matters also fell under the consideration of the board members last night. Preliminary plans for the No. 9 highway association which meets here in September were made, and a committee composed of J. A. Rix, S. A. Wells, O. P. Kuykendall, and W. S. Posey was appointed to promote a campaign for a good road bond issue.

It was voted to send a committee which with another from Seagraves will seek to have the road from Brownfield to Odessa by way of Seagraves designated as a state highway.

WAR ON WEEDS IS DECREED BY CITY OFFICERS

HEALTH OFFICIAL AND POLICE CHIEF JOIN HANDS IN MOVE

A "War on Weeds" has been declared by the city health authorities. In connection with a city wide movement for more sanitary conditions, Dr. J. W. Rolle today issued a warning for the citizens of Lubbock to keep their premises free of weeds.

Letters will be sent out tomorrow to property owners whose property is badly infested by weeds. An inspection trip of the entire city is to be taken soon. Complaints will be filed against anyone who fails to keep their premises free of weeds.

Chief of Police John Lemond is co-operating with Dr. Rolle in the movement. He said this morning it would be necessary to convict the offenders. Governed by city ordinance No. 77 which deals in general with sanitary conditions of the city places it possible to assess fine of not less than \$5 and not more than \$50 for failure to abide by the ordinance.

Five days will be allowed those to whose letters are sent. Thereafter, possibly five later, are the dangers causing city authorities to take these steps.

"The weeds must be cut, and I am going to enforce the ordinance if the sanitary condition of the city is not improved," Chief Lemond said.

VIEWS ON DRY ISSUE FORM MAIN TOPIC OF SPECULATION

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Aug. 29.—Vanguard of the thousands expected here to witness sight of a Southerner receiving notification of his selection for a place on the presidential ticket of one of the nation's major parties was streaming into this mountain city.

Majority of early arrivals came from homes south of the Mason-Dixon line, like that of the man they have come to honor—Senator Joe T. Robinson of Arkansas, who will be notified tomorrow that he is the democratic party's vice presidential nominee.

PORT DAVIS, Tex., Aug. 29 (AP)—Continuation of evidence by which prosecuting attorneys hope to link Paul Mitchell, 27, with the slaying last September of Pat Murphy at Iraan, Texas, marked the second day of Mitchell's trial here today.

Testimony was started yesterday after more than one day was consumed in obtaining a jury. State witnesses testified to an argument between Mitchell and Murphy over money shortly before the latter's body, weighted down with rocks was found at the bottom of the Peace River, Sept. 30.

The skull had been crushed with a blunt instrument, and Mitchell and his brother, Dave, were linked for the crime.

FLEET OF TWENTY AIRPLANES JOINS IN SCOURING UPPER NEW YORK STATE FOR TRACE OF MISSING TWO AIRMEN

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Twenty airplanes organized to fly in a giant fan formation, and supplemented by other aircraft throughout the state, were enlisted today in a search for two men missing in a flight from Buffalo to Curtiss Field.

M. M. Merrill, manager of Curtiss Field, and Edwin M. Rome, head of the Buffalo municipal airport, took off from Buffalo at 3 p. m. Monday in Colonel Lindbergh's Curtiss Falcon. Many hours later no word of their landing had been received, although half an hour after their takeoff a plane passed over Haskinsville and a short time later in the gathering dusk a plane was seen over Ithaca.

State police headquarters at Harrisburg, Pa., were notified an airplane had fallen on a mountainide near Clark's Ferry last evening, and

a searching party was organized immediately in an effort to determine whether the plane was the missing Lindbergh craft.

The flight from Buffalo should have taken only two and one-half to three hours. When the airmen did not appear at Curtiss Field on schedule little fear was felt as both were expert pilots and it was supposed they had landed somewhere near the night.

Merrill and Rome were both army fliers during the war. After army service Merrill barnstormed for several years through the south-west. He came to New York several years ago and for sometime has been in charge of Curtiss Field. He has a wife and 5-year-old son.

DEMOCRATS TO CENTER DRIVE IN MID-WEST

TEXAS HOOVER CHIEF CLAIMS 600,000 VOTES THROUGH STATE

(By Associated Press)
ST. LOUIS, Aug. 29.—The Democratic party's national campaign budget will call for expenditure of \$1,000,000 in the Middle West, John J. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic National Committee announced today. The Middle West will receive one-fourth of the total budget to be raised by the party, he said.

Half of this sum, he said, would be spent in the six hundred rural districts of the ten Corn Belt states and the remainder in the industrial and metropolitan communities.

The national committee plans to spend \$500,000 in selling the democratic party's platform to the farmers of the middle west," Raskob said.

Majority To Hoover In State Claimed

DALLAS, Aug. 29 (AP)—Prediction that Herbert Hoover would receive 599,000 out of 1,000,000 votes cast in Texas, Nov. 5, was made today by B. D. Sartin, campaign manager for Hoover democrats of the state.

Sartin said he based his statement on the belief that 350,000 women in Texas would vote for the republican nominee as well as 250,000 men favoring prohibition.

Headquarters for Hoover democrats was opened Tuesday in Fort Worth with Judge J. W. Still and Mrs. J. W. Cooper in charge.

Rewire Death Chair For One-Legged Man

HUNTSVILLE, Tex., Aug. 29 (AP)—For the first time since 1924 when Texas adopted electrocution, the electric chair at the state penitentiary here was rewired today.

Juan Flores, 31, sentenced to death for the slaying of a 15-year-old boy at San Antonio in an attempted robbery, was to be executed after midnight. Flores, whose left leg is wooden, has been granted six stays since he was confined in "death row" here on February 2.

GETS OWN GOAT

MILLION AND QUARTER HIKE IS SEEN HERE

PHENOMENAL JUMP IN VALUATIONS SHOWN FOR TEN YEARS

Lubbock county's valuations for 1928 total \$22,092,101, an increase of more than six per cent or more than one and a quarter millions of dollars over last year's valuations, according to the records compiled in the offices of Tax Assessor R. C. Burns.

Growth of the city is attributed as the cause for the increase over the total valuations of 1927 as land valuations were considered the same as last year.

Valuations in this county have doubled three and a half times during the past ten years, tax assessor official records reveal, increasing from \$5,566,696 in 1918 to more than 22 million this year.

Consistent increase. During the past four years valuations here have increased about one million dollars each year. Records show the following valuations: 1925, \$14,235,770; 1926, \$18,706,517; and 1927, \$20,804,737.

Valuations this year are divided: banks, \$292,596; railroads, telephone companies and other institutions determined by mileage, \$1,527,860; and all other property including real estate, personal property, etc., \$20,471,535.

Property valuation was not increased this year, the erection of several important buildings in the city causing the increase in the total.

A total of \$141,390 was paid to the state in taxes from this county. The record of valuations showed 9,817 horses and mules in the county, 7,651 cattle; sheep 6,102; hogs 1,916, and vehicles approximately 5,000.

SIX HURT IN VALLEY BLAZE

\$50,000 DAMAGE DONE BY FIRE RAVAGING EDCOUGH, TEXAS

BROWNVILLE, Aug. 29.—Six men were injured and property estimated at \$50,000 was destroyed in a fire today which raged buildings of the Edough Lumber Co., at Edough, new Rio Grande Valley town.

Three volunteers frantically came by heat and smoke, narrowly escaped death. They were rescued from the blazing structure by companions. Two men were severely shocked and burned when an electric wire was knocked down by a stream of water. L. E. Widal, lumber yard manager, was burned seriously while attempting to remove a safe from the office.

Answering an emergency alarm, firemen from Widalco went to the aid of Edough fire fighters and assisted in preventing the fire from spreading.

ROMANCE OF IRON HORSE COMES TO CLIMAX WITH I. C. C. APPROVAL FOR ORIENT RAILROAD SALE TO SANTA FE

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 29.—Purchase of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad by the Atchafalaya, Topeka and Santa Fe railway ends a chapter of railroad history romantic and tragic.

First visioned thirty-five years ago in a dream by Arthur E. Stillwell, young insurance salesman who had come here from the East, his construction began a few years later finished by small fry investors living far from Wall Street where such projects usually are capitalized.

In the period of construction, Stillwell was confronted by many financial obstacles. But financing was his forte. Reluctant purses yawned at his magic voice. When he was faced by any problem he went into what he described as a trance and always came out pre-

In addition to organizing the railroad company, he established numerous subsidiaries such as construction companies and others. The construction company would build the line, taking in pay, stocks and bonds of the road.

Instead of a continuous line, the road was built in patches. It never got farther east than Wichita, Kansas, although it carried Kansas City in its name and built an expensive terminal here. Purchase by the Santa Fe gives it the first Kansas City connection.

Eventually a line that stretched 727 miles from Wichita to Alpine, Texas, was completed and three widely separated stretches including one at Topolobampo, western terminal on the Gulf of Lower California.

FABLED SLUMP FAILS TO HIT DURING MONTH

\$25,700 IN BUILDING PERMITS YESTERDAY PUTS TOTAL HIGH

Building permits for the month of August showed above the \$20,000 mark with the granting of five permits yesterday afternoon and this morning for a total of \$25,700.

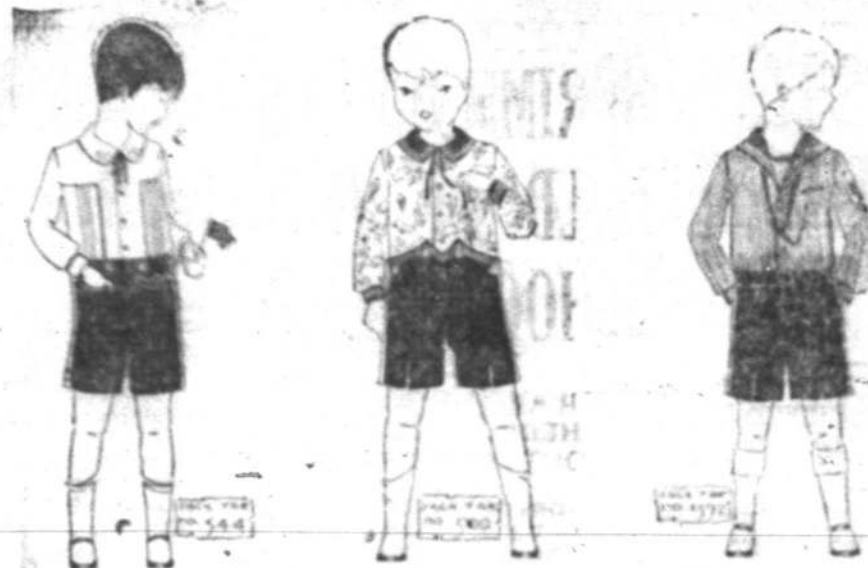

No little credit for the recent winning streak which Mack has had is due to the fine work of Foxx and Orwoll, a catcher and pitcher, filling the exacting roles at the near and far corners of the field.

Connie has been strong to the "shift" ever since he came to the American League. He apparently works on the theory that only an ordinary performer at one position may prove a star at another.

Perhaps one of Mack's most famous experiments, if such they can be called, was the making over of Jimmy McInnis. McInnis came to Connie as a shortstop. That was in 1909. The next year he played short, though not in a regular capacity.

Just about that time Harry Davis, veteran first sacker, and the Babe Ruth of his day, was beginning to slip. Mack, looking around for a capable replacement, decided to take out, and all golf clubs in those states which were affiliated with in the next year will be charter members.

IMPROVING OF SEWERS GOAL

CITY MANAGER TELLS OF MOVEMENT LENT BOOST IN STATE

Movement to improve sewerage systems throughout the state was inaugurated at Cleburne at a field conference under the direction of the State Health Department this week, according to City Manager Gus McCleary who was one of Lubbock's delegates at the meeting.

Other representatives from here included M. R. Smith, Jr., city engineer; H. N. Roberts, local engineer; and Y. J. Aiken, city chemist. They returned here yesterday after attending the meeting at the state capital.

Mr. McCleary and Mr. Smith were sent to the conference by the city. They reported a large attendance at the meeting, which was under the direction of Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer. Sanitation experts from all parts of the state aided in the general discussion of the sewer problem.

A new system of sewer disposal was shown at the conference. It is a highly improved method, Mr. McCleary said this morning. Lubbock needs improvements in the sewer system and disposal system here, but no definite step will be taken in the near future. By the time we are in position to make the step the system demonstrated at the conference will be perfected and improved, making it justifiable to wait.

PROBE STARTS IN BOOZE RING

INVESTIGATORS SEEK IDENTITY OF BIG BOOTLEGGERS

(By Associated Press)

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29.—Detectives working with District Attorney John Monaghan and the grand jury today sought to learn the identity of a dozen or more big bootleggers who are said to have deposited \$10,000,000 in Philadelphia banks in the last year.

Information furnished the grand jury by federal prohibition agents and others it was said, gave an insight into the financial side of bootlegging and sent investigators off on a new track in the effort to place before the jurors a complete story of gang activities, including information regarding fortunes made in the liquor traffic under the protection of sawed-off shotguns and pistols. The money is reported to have been deposited in nearly a score of institutions, many of them legitimate financial houses, but fictitious names and addresses were used by the depositors. Some of the addresses given were found to be vacant lots, old buildings, cemeteries.

Prohibition officials who have been before the grand jury also furnished the district attorney with information he considers important. He declined to comment today but intimated it would not be long before the public would be given an inkling of the many ramifications of underworld activities.

Voter Casts Ballot For "My Dog Fido"

WICHITA FALLS, Aug. 29.—By casting it out as "multituted," election officials of Wichita county have ruled that a ballot cast for "my dog Fido" is illegal. It happened in the run-off primary when one voter, who appeared to rate his dog as a better candidate than either of the two listed on the ballot for a local office, scratched both names and voted for his dog.

SMITH STEPS BACK INTO HIS ROLE AS N. Y. GOVERNOR

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—After a week of attention to his responsibilities as democratic presidential nominee, Alfred E. Smith today stepped back into his role as governor of New York, and will play the part, unless something unforeseen occurs in the meantime, until he decides which one of three rough sketches his speaking itinerary is acceptable.

With nothing but state business on his mind, the governor today packed up to go to Syracuse, where he had an engagement to attend to the annual "farm dinner" given by Jerome D. Barnum, publisher of the Syracuse Post-Standard. Tomorrow he will make his yearly visit to the New York State Fair at Syracuse, and if weather conditions are favorable he will appear there for a brief non-political talk in the open air.

He plans to say a few words at the Barnum dinner, but not along national political lines. In emphasizing his reason for this, the democratic presidential candidate likes to refer to last year's experience when, he says, there were only two democratic present and he was one of them.

Indications today were that Governor Smith would have something definite to say regarding his proposed stumping tour of the country by the end of next week at the latest, or probably by Labor Day. He has no plans for that holiday, nor has he made any arrangements between his Syracuse dates and next Monday. He expects to return to Albany Thursday night and spend a quiet week-end, but may go on for a little while, as he did here yesterday with his friend, William F. Kenna. Campaign duties are to be forgotten—as far as the public is concerned.

'Trudy' Losing Out In Swim Marathon

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 29.—Swimming a relentless crawl stroke that shot her through the water at a startling speed, Miss Ethel Little of New York led the field of 52 in the women's marathon at the end of the first 2 1/2 miles of the ten mile grind through the waters of Lake Ontario today.

A hundred yards behind, Olive Gerdman, of Seattle, Washington, guarded second place with a lead of 100 yards over Ruth Tower, of Denver. Miss Hertle swam at a rate of 45 strokes a minute. Her time for the 2 1/2 miles was one hour, 11 minutes and 34 1/2 seconds.

Gerdman, Edler of New York, was in fourth place, 30 yards behind.

Stock Market On Another Rampage

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The stock market went on another "bull" rampage today under the leadership of Radio Corporation common, which soared nearly \$13 a share to \$201. Nearly two score individual issues rallied \$1 to \$5 a share to new high records with the average of 20 leading industrial issues, compiled by the Associated Press, setting a new high record for all time.

The mysterious inflow of funds into the call loan market in which the expected "money pinch" failed to develop was the chief factor in the day's advance, although favorable trade and earnings reports also played a big part.

Mother Of Charles, Sid Chaplin Dies

GLENDAL, Calif., Aug. 29.—Death yesterday ended the life of Mrs. Hapah Chaplin, mother of two famous American screen comedians, Charles and Sid Chaplin. Mrs. Chaplin herself was once a popular star in light operas in England.

She was 61 years old, and died here the victim of an attack of gallstones. At her bedside was her son Charles, while Sid, her other son, is in France in connection with motion pictures. Her husband, Charles Spencer Chaplin, died in London almost 30 years ago. He was a well known figure on the English stage.

CROSS CURRENTS OF ADVICE BEAR DOWN ON HOOVER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—Cross currents of advice and opinion are bearing down upon Herbert Hoover as he busies himself with determining campaign policies and deciding matters of strategy of organization. These come largely from East and South, but some from the West, as the republican presidential candidate confers with his chief advisers from various sections and gets his grip upon the controls of the party machinery.

With the return of Hoover from the West, there has been an increasing pressure for greater activity in those sections. The setup of the eastern organization never has been precisely described and apparently there are several groups operating more or less independently.

Two Offices Boosted

One set of managers now advises a general headquarters for the East and New York City while others propose that the fight in New York and New Jersey be carried on under a directing force distinct from one to have charge of affairs in New England and especially in states like Massachusetts and Rhode Island, where the democrats are concentrating their efforts.

There also is an increasing demand from the South for more effective organization work there. In that section too, some advisers would have the effort concentrated largely in those states where local

leaders claim Hoover sentiment has been manifested.

These are some of the major problems Hoover must dispose of while he is working out plans for his personal participation in the campaign, which, it is becoming more evident, is likely to be upon a much more extensive scale than he contemplated even as late as ten days ago.

The republican nominee will carry on his conferences here in the future at general headquarters which are being set up in a building near his S street home. There his work will be facilitated as he can keep his office force around him and also receive large delegations than he could at his home.

California Concedes Johnson Nomination

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—Nomination of the veteran Senator William W. Johnson, conceded, in California's primary election centered today in contests in five congressional contests.

Senator Johnson, twice governor of the state and now seeking his third term in the United States Senate, was far ahead of former congressman Charles E. Farnall of Los Angeles. Returns from 5,074 of the state's 9,082 precincts gave Johnson 228,801 votes and Farnall 40,664.

Minor Moore, Los Angeles attorney, supported for the democratic senatorial nomination will oppose Johnson in the November election.

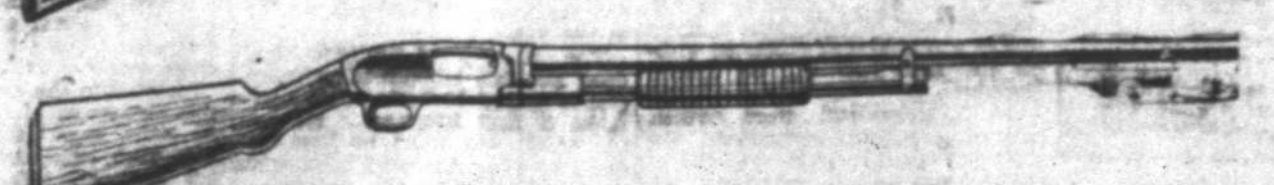
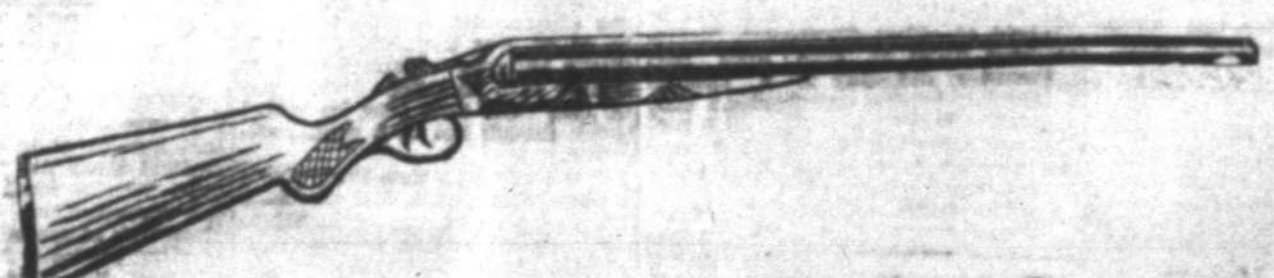

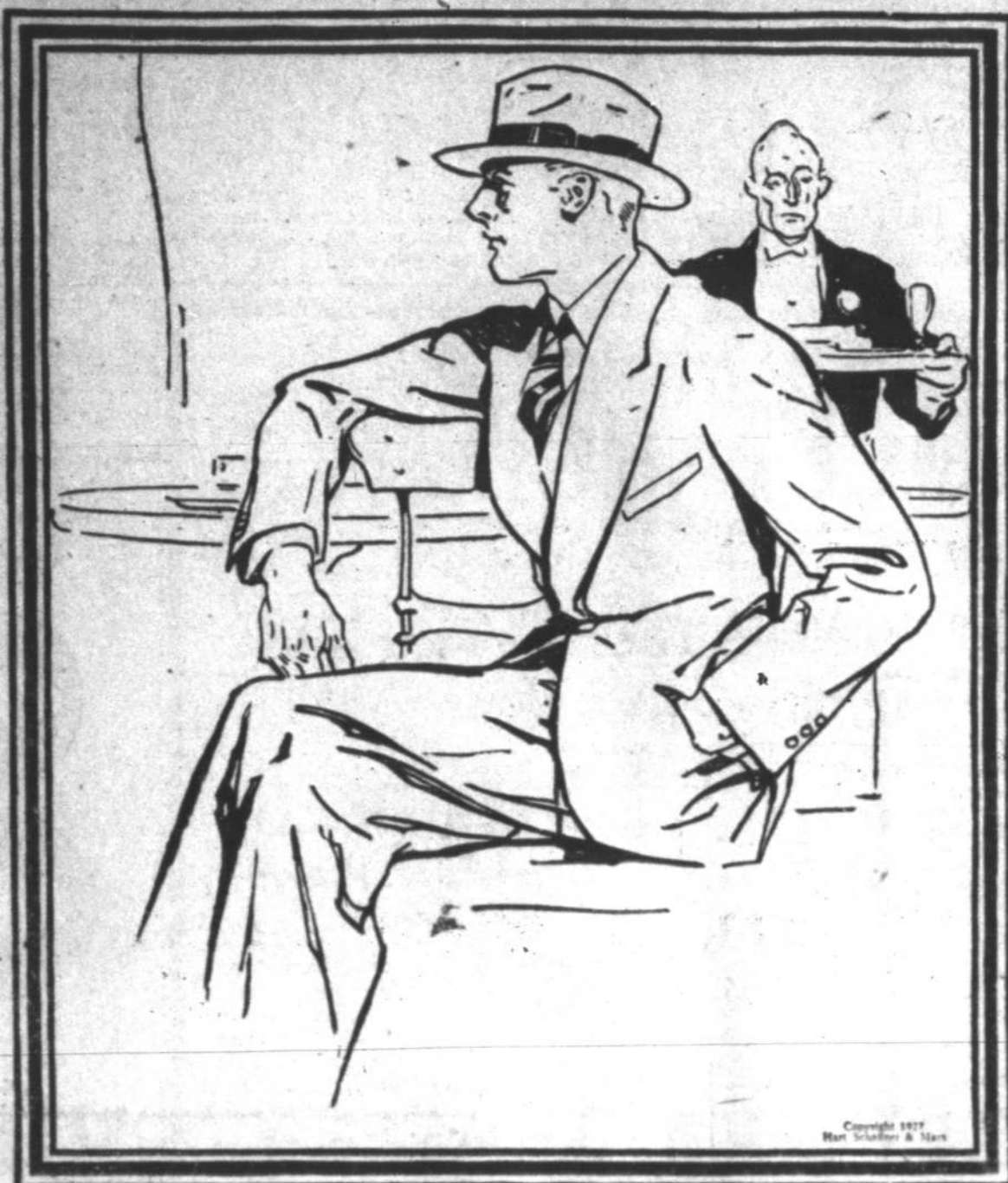

SHELBY TRAGEDY ENDED ROMANCE

COLLAPSE OF BUILDINGS BROUGHT END TO PROPOSED NUPTIALS FOR FARMER

(By Associated Press)

SHELBY, N. C., Aug. 28.—Like most tragedies, that in Shelby yesterday had its poignant touch. When tons of falling brick and timber of three buildings in the business section fell upon Carl Blanton, young farmer, they snuffed out a romance that had been watched with sympathy by those

who knew his prominent family. Blanton was to have been married within a few days.

The catastrophe, in which three buildings suddenly sank in during the morning business hours, also took the life of Blanton's father and four others. Twelve persons were injured. The Blantons had been negotiating some business at

the First National bank. As they were leaving, the bank and two adjoining structures caved in.

The other dead are: Miss Ora Eskridge, 35, employee of the bank; Guy Green, 23, bank clerk; Alex Hoyle, bank clerk; and Clyde Carpenter, 29, of Caesar, N. C.

Property loss was set today at about \$100,000.

The buildings were owned by John McKnight and O. Max Gardner, the latter democratic nominee for governor of North Carolina. Mike Austell, of Shelby, has been named by Governor C. C. Eskridge to conduct an official inquiry. Corner Eskridge's daughter was among those who lost their lives.

Jugo-Slavic First

While these invitations were being delivered, several countries in the old world and the new extended themselves to be among the first to add approval after that of the powers. Jugo-Slavic was first to follow the original fifteen, when Foreign Minister Marinkovitch signed the pact just fifteen minutes after receiving the official invitation.

From Havana came the word that Cuba intends to be the first Latin-American country to sign. The formal ceremony of adherence was set for today.

At the same hour the Bolivian legation in Washington announced Bolivia was one of the nations which had notified Secretary Kellogg of its intention to adhere to the pact. At Sofia, Premier Lapecheff stated that Bulgaria would sign.

A favorable reply is expected from Norway and Argentina shortly.

RASKOB HOPES BOOSTED WITH CONFERENCES

SAYS DEMOS TO SPEND LARGE SUMS IN USE OF BROADCASTING

(By Associated Press)

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 29.—Greatly encouraged, he said, by reports democratic leaders of eight middle western states had been him, John L. Raskob, chairman of the democratic national committee, today was to confer with Senator Harry B. Hawes, chairman of the democratic central regional committee, and a few others in the seclusion of a country club.

After hearing of the political situation in Illinois, Missouri, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Kentucky and Tennessee in a series of state conferences yesterday, Raskob said nothing he had heard had changed his conviction about the election of Gov. Smith in November.

Leaving for Hot Springs
Raskob and other democrats will depart late today for Hot Springs, Ark., to attend notification ceremonies for Senator Robinson, vice presidential nominee.

Frankly, the five score democrats told Raskob and Senator Peter C. Gerry of Rhode Island, chairman of the democratic advisory committee, of the barriers in their states which Gov. Smith surmounts to win electoral votes. With optimism the keynote, each of the report bearers singled out one or more of the obstacles confronting Smith's candidacy. Apathy, religious intolerance, prohibition, farm relief and several other campaign factors were brought out.

Hints Huge G. O. P. Fund
In his opening speech to visiting democratic chieftains, Raskob said he understood the republicans were seeking to raise a campaign fund of \$6,000,000 to \$8,000,000. He added they might not be able to get so large a fund "because of the drift of wealthy men toward Smith."

"The east has never understood the farm problem," Raskob continued. "I have never met a man, including myself, who understood the provisions of the McNary-Haugen bill. Gov. Smith has arranged for a survey by one of the greatest students of economics in the United States, Prof. Seligman of Columbia university. If the governor is elected he will be able to recommend an agricultural relief program which will meet the approval of the east and satisfy the west."

"The democratic party plans to expend \$500,000 in a drive for the electoral votes of the corn belt states," Raskob said.

Raskob added the democratic organization planned to spend \$600,000 over the radio.

forms were built, a total of 250 miles on that side of the border.

English Financiers Invested
Stillwell interested English financiers who invested heavily in the road. At about the same time, when aid in the amount of \$2,650,000 was forthcoming from the then President Diaz of Mexico, the revolution of 1910 halted the payments after Stillwell had received about half the amount.

Even with all the financial aid Stillwell mustered, the road never was adequately equipped and, as late as 1924, it cost \$100,000 for rental of box cars and \$250,000 freight on coal hauled for its engines.

The fact that the line was the only railroad serving more than a hundred communities in Western Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, caused the government to keep it going with loans.

Stillwell Left Out
In 1912 it was thrown into receivership and in the reorganization that followed, Stillwell was left out entirely. The original stock was thrown in the waste basket when \$6,000,000 in gold notes secured by the Orient's properties were issued. Former investors took some of the notes and new investors, including Henry Ford and Senator C. S. McNary of Michigan, became interested. All went well until the road defaulted interest payments and its construction companies went into bankruptcy.

The road was refinanced in 1916 by a noteholders deposit committee. English note holders also formed a committee but the two never worked in harmony.

Difficulties continued in 1917 and then William T. Kemper, was named receiver and authorized to issue \$2,500,000 in receivers certificates to rehabilitate the line.

The Kemper receivership was a stormy period, including the years of government operations. On two occasions the road was on the point of being sold for junk. But Kemper and a few others put their own money into the line, obtained government loans and effected economies that made continued operation possible.

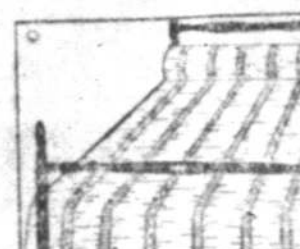

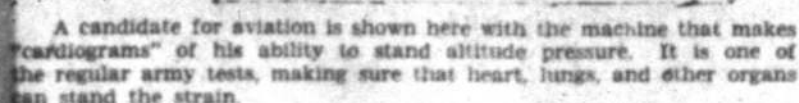

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fifth of a series of articles in which Captain Malcolm J. Buchanan, writer for the Journal and NEA Service, explains the use of the airplane and how to operate it. Buchanan was a pilot with the U. S. army air corps on the western front during the world war and is now on the editorial staff of the Fort Worth Press.

The Stick Responds

He pushes the stick to one side; then the other. He waggles it forward and back. The response to the movements give him something of a thrill and he has a longing to try a few stunts. Then—on the other hand—maybe he had better not. There might yet be something that he did not know.

RE CAPT. MALCOLM BUCHANAN

The plane is on the runway ready for the take-off. The student pilot sits in the rear cockpit.

His instruments and controls are exact duplicates of those in the instructor's cockpit. Any movement of a control in one cockpit moves the corresponding control in the other.

The plane gains speed and the student feels the tail lift off the ground. Then the plane moves ever faster because the drag of the tail skid has been eliminated.

Leaving the Ground

The embryo pilot's hand rests lightly on the stick and he feels it being pulled backward, slowly. The instructor is getting ready to take

off. The student sees the plane's nose lift in front of him and, glancing over the side, finds that the plane is several feet off the ground and still climbing.

He looks down again and finds that the ground has fallen away

that the ground has fallen away a hundred feet. Now the plane tilts a little to the left and the student leans to the right, noticing as he does so that movable wing surfaces

in the wing tips are set at an angle. These tips (or ailerons) are brought into play by the pilot pushing the stick from side to side.

The plane leans a bit more and at the same time the rudder bar forces the student's right foot back, the left going forward. The instruc-

tor is at work. Then, slowly, the ship turns to the left until the controls are brought back to neutral, putting the craft on an even course.

After three or four easy turns the instructor decides to give the student a rapid turn. He banks the airplane, then it more sudden-

ship steeply, gives it more rudder. All this time the pupa has his hands on the control stick and his feet on the rudder bar. He notices

that every time the stick is moved to the right the plane leans to the right. The rudder bar and sidemovement of the stick work in con-

Ready for a Landing
When the instructor sees that his

pupil is beginning to feel at home. He cuts the motor down to idling speed, putting the ship into a normal gliding angle earthward. All the student hears is the singing of the wind in the wires and struts.

He knows that the forward speed at such times could not be surpassed even if the motor was on. The altimeter drops from 2,000 to 1,000 feet and then the instructor signals for landing and asks his pupil to follow him, after which with the motor

This procedure of following through is gradual until the day arrives when the instructor may safely turn over the machine to the pupil. The practice is kept up until the pilot is certain that the stud-

The Solo Flight
There is a big thrill coming for the aspiring flier when he is told for the first time that the ship is his to fly; when he is told to "take

The student has been shown all that the plane will do, both under ordinary and unusual circumstances, and in learning this he has followed the instructor at the dupli-

ready has assured himself that his pupil is competent to get himself out of any difficulty which he might find himself in; he knows, too, that the beginner has been

As the instructor steps out of the ship and says, "Take 'er off!" the student finds a queer little feeling of doubt and uncertainty skidding

RUSSIA WON'T COOPERATE IN ARMS CONTROL

SOVIET REFUSES TO BE ENTHUSIASTIC OVER PROPOSED PLAN

(By Associated Press)
 GENEVA, Aug. 29.—Russia has refused to collaborate with present efforts of the League of Nations to obtain control of the manufacture of arms.

Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet vice minister of foreign affairs, in telegraphing this decision to Sir Eric Drummond, secretary of the league, pointed out his government's conviction that the league has done nothing toward solution of the problem of real disarmament.

He insisted urgent steps should be taken to obtain definite results and avoid the risk of future wars. An attempt to supervise production of armaments is calculated merely to mislead public opinion by holding forth false hopes of real disarmament, he asserted.

U. S. Seeks Control

Meanwhile, the United States and Canada are co-operating in an effort to bring about the widest kind of publicity concerning manufacture of armaments. Their representatives, Ambassador Hugh Wilson for the United States and Dr. W. A. Riddell for Canada, voiced disapproval of a draft project reported to the commission which is trying to frame a convention for the control and manufacture of arms on the ground that it did not go far enough.

Riddell and Wilson favored giving the same publicity to arms manufacture by governments as to arms made in private factories. Dr. Riddell contended countries depending largely on private manufacture should not be expected to furnish statistics if countries depending on governmental manufacture were permitted to withhold such figures.

The draft provision with reservations attached will be sent to the league council which with the league assembly will be empowered to decide whether, taking into account the difference of opinion in regard to the project, it would be wise to convene an international conference for its discussion.

MAKES FARM PAY

Hale Farmer Is Booster For Plains Land

(Special to The Journal)
 PLAINVIEW, Aug. 29.—Typical of what a quarter section of land in the Plainview territory will do under irrigation is the experience of H. W. Wilks, farmer of Plainview.

Wilks has a quarter section of irrigated land north of Plainview and practices diversification in every respect. One month recently he sold \$35 worth of produce: eggs, cream and chickens. He has fifty Poland China and Duroc Jersey hogs, pure bred; 250 White Leghorn hens and five Jersey cows. Five acres of oats yielded sixty bushels per acre this year, and his wheat made twenty bushels. His cotton crop is among the earliest in the country, and he has some corn that is very early as a result of proper irrigation.

Wilks has a splendid farm, home with every convenience, including electrically operated machines, electric lights, running water, and the like.

He is strong for the best in livestock. A Poland China sow from his farm brought from C. L. Franks took first prize last year at the fair at Amarillo, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Dallas and Beaumont, and was sold at Amarillo to Lillard and Sons of Arlington, outstanding breeders of Texas. He has fifteen pigs which are now being fitted for the fall fairs. Incidentally a boar from his herd has been bought by the Texas Technological college to head its herd.

Alfalfa Meal Being Made At Plainview

PLAINVIEW, Aug. 29 (Special)—Alfalfa meal is now being manufactured in Plainview. For many years a country producing the finest of alfalfa in large quantities, not until E. H. Bawden and son, H. E. Bawden, enlarged their feed business to include a mill for making alfalfa meal was the product marketed in Plainview in any other form than as baled hay.

The new plant has a capacity of between two and a half and three tons per hour. Alfalfa meals is used as the base for poultry and dairy feeds.

Faculty of the city schools will meet at 9 o'clock Saturday morning at the Senior High in the first meeting of the year. General policies, plans and system of the school will be outlined by Superintendent Duncan.

Classes will begin Wednesday morning following the teachers' institute the first three days of the week.

Plainview Valuation Shows Good Increase

PLAINVIEW, Aug. 29 (Special)—Plainview's tax rate for this year was set at \$1.75 by the city council Monday. The report of the board of equalization showed that the total valuations for the year are \$7,040,000 which is an increase of practically six hundred thousand dollars over 1927 when they were \$6,442,061 when the tax rate was \$1.75. The valuations this year do not cover the Fort Worth and Denver construction within the city this year, and several major building improvements that next year will boost the valuations to an even higher figure. The increase of five cents in the tax rate was occasioned by the levy made for bond issues recently voted for public improvements, and the purchase of a street sweeper.

The Plainview Board of City Development was given an increased appropriation for its work. The commercial organization work at Plainview is supported from a city tax rate of approximately two mills.

17,000 Acre Tract Will Be Opened To Settlers

E. R. Shields, secretary of the Crackerjack company of Chicago, and one of the owners of the land, was in this territory recently and made the announcement. F. Z. Bishop, well known real estate man of Texas, will have charge of the sale assisted by R. L. Brown and R. B. Canfield of Muleshoe.

Prosecution Calls Further Witnesses

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 29 (AP)—Subpoenas were issued today for five new prosecution witnesses in trial of Leo F. Kelley for the murder of his society matron sweetheart, Mrs. Frank Melius. The witnesses, whose names were not revealed were three women and two men whose first names were given in three love letters the accused butcher boy had written Mrs. Melius.

The love letters, which testified to Kelley's ardent passion for the 40-year-old wife of Frank Melius, wealthy sportsman, were brought from their secret hiding place by Kelley himself.

State's attorneys indicated the new witnesses were friends of Kelley and Mrs. Melius, and that testimony would be sought from them concerning parties they attended with the couple.

MERRYMAKING LAID BEHIND

LEGIONNAIRES NAME OFFICERS; CHOOSE SESSION CITY

(By Associated Press)

TEXARKANA, Tex., Aug. 29.—Legionnaires of Texas and Arkansas, two days of merry-making behind them, engaged today in electing state commanders and naming next year's meeting places.

At the Texas department meeting, representatives of four cities met in a spirited contest for the next convention. They were Dallas, Waco, Port Arthur and Abilene. J. Frank Parrish of Honey Grove was conceded to have the inside track in the race for Texas state commander. He has waged an active campaign since the convention opened.
