STATE OFFICIALS SUED BY OIL FIRM

OPEN HEARING ON LEASE SALE BAN

INJUNCTION LEGALITY IS MADE TARGET

CONSTITUTIONALITY OF RESTRAINING ORDER FIRST ATTACKED

AUSTIN, Jan. 17.—Constitutionality of one section of the act signed by Gov. Moody Jan. 11, repealing the law under which University oil lands were leased, was attacked in district court today at the opening of the injunction suit hearing against Land Commissioner J. T. Robinson.

Former Senator Lloyd Price of Fort Worth, representing oil men who bid on lands advertised for sale Jan. 12, argued that the act which his clients made on lease advertised for that sale was legal at that time and that no act of the legislature, passed subsequently could make a legal act illegal.

Rockefeller Wins Fight For Ouster

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (P)—The Herald Tribune says today that according to one of New York's outstanding petroleum authorities John D. Rockefeller, Jr. has won his fight to oust Col. Robert W. Stewart from his chairmanship of the Standard Oil company of Indiana.

YATES ROUTE ASKS PERMIT

L. C. C. PETITIONED FOR PERMISSION TO BUILD LINE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (P)—The Texas and West Texas Railroad, a corporation, asked permission of the Interstate Commerce Commission today to build 30 miles of new line to the Yates oil field in Texas.

"SILENT WOMAN" DIVORCE CAUSE

"The Silent Woman" figured in a divorce petition filed in district court here today by a husband who had been married since 1906—thirty-five years ago. The petition states that early in their married life the wife developed an uncontrollable temper, using vitriolic and almost unprintable language on the husband. This unpleasant vocabulary was soon exhausted, however, the petition continues, and the wife lapsed into a period of entire silence, and that for seven years she refused to speak or utter a word to her husband although she lived in the same house with him. This attitude became even worse than the former abuse, the husband contends.

In explaining the reason that the Lubbock county commissioners court took no action yesterday on the petition of more than 100 local citizens requesting that a separate road district be created excluding District 1 which contains Slaton County Judge Robert H. Bean said this morning that it was hoped to formulate some highway paving project whereby both Lubbock and Slaton would cooperate in its passage.

Texas Youths Face Louisiana Charge

LAKE CHARLES, La., Jan. 17 (P)—Pleading guilty to charges of breaking and entering in the night, of grand larceny, and of shooting with intent to murder, Edmond Parker, 17, and Philip Garlaska, 18, both of Beaumont, Texas, were sentenced by Judge Cline in district court today to a minimum term of two years in the state penitentiary at hard labor.

FAMOUS SCIENTIST DIES, VICTIM OF DISEASES HE GAVE LIFE IN FIGHTING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Stricken while engaged in a study of the effects thought to cause the disease of pellagra, Dr. Joseph Goldberger, a United States public health service scientist, died today at the naval hospital here following an illness of several months. He was 54 years old.

FIVE STATES SEEK BANDITS HELD IN EAST

NEW MEXICO ROBBERY LATEST CHARGE ON LIST ALLEGED

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 17.—New Mexico was added today to the list of states which claim custody of Clyde Roberts and Fred Nave, held here in connection with murders and robberies throughout the Southwest. Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Colorado already have asked local police to hold the men until their representatives arrive.

H. D. Harper, chief of police of Colorado Springs, Colo., will arrive here tomorrow to claim Roberts, who, he said, was the leader of a gang that killed the president and cashier of a bank at Lamar, Colo., last summer, and escaped with thousands of dollars, killing a teller and a physician in escaping. Harper wired he was positive of Roberts' identity.

R. C. Dale, deputy sheriff of Guadalupe, N. M., has wired that Roberts is wanted in his county for bank robbery.

Washington and Purcell, Okla., and Wellington, Texas, are said to have identified Nave as a participant in bank robberies in those towns. Murder was added to the charge in Wellington. Nave is said to have admitted being a member of the Ace Pendleton gang which has terrorized the Southwest.

KABUL, Afghanistan, Jan. 17 (P)—King Inayatullah, in whose favor Amanullah abdicated a few days ago, surrendered at 10 a. m., today, to the forces of the rebel, Bacha Saka, who was proclaimed Habibullah Khan and thus became Afghanistan's third monarch this week.

SECRETARY OF STATE NAMED IN CONSPIRACY

CHARGE EFFORT MADE TO DRIVE COMPANY OUT OF TEXAS

AUSTIN, Jan. 17.—Mrs. Jane Y. McCallum, secretary of state, and R. M. Tilley, assistant Attorney General, are named as defendants in a \$1,300,000 damage suit filed in federal court here today by the Golden Rod Oil Company, of Delaware.

The suit alleges that the defendants, through threats and litigation, following a dispute over an allegedly unreasonable franchise tax assessed the Golden Rod company, made themselves parties to a conspiracy to harass the company and drive it out of Texas.

The company was given a permit to do business by Mrs. Emma Griggs by Meharg, former secretary of state and at the end of the first year of business, the suit alleges, the present secretary of state sought to collect a franchise tax on the whole capitalization of the Golden Rod company, instead of the capital employed in Texas. The plaintiffs said that approximately half of the company's capital was employed in Texas. On top of this, the Golden Rod company was assessed a penalty of 25 per cent according to papers in the suit when it refused to pay, under this system of computing the tax, was threatened with suit.

Seek to Recover Tax.
This suit was filed eventually by Assistant Attorney General R. M. Tilley. The suit sought to recover the tax, appoint a receiver for the company and oust the company from Texas.

ROBBERY OF FORT WORTH BANK CHARGED

PORT WORTH, Jan. 17 (AP)—William J. Walker, 28, alias "Whitey" Walker, one of the men held in Buffalo, New York, after identification in connection with the slaying of A. Berger, on April 1, 1927, of two deputy sheriffs, was charged here on October 9, 1927, with participation in the attempted robbery of the Stock Yards National Bank.

Three men were arrested and charged with the attempt on October 28. They were: C. T. Black, who is serving life in the Oklahoma state penitentiary on a bank robbery count conviction in that state; Walker and Asa O. Pendleton, alleged leader of the Pendleton gang.

Walker was arrested November 3, 1927, and was released a few days later on bond. Black was brought back to Fort Worth after he had been released on bond following the issuance of a warrant on an assault to rob charge.

Fred Nave, the second man held in Buffalo, has never been arrested in Fort Worth, although his photograph, description and finger prints are at the identification bureau of the police department here.

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Jan. 17 (AP)—A mass of smoldering ruins was all that remained today of the new sound proof "talkie" stage of the Paramount-Famous Players Lasky studios, built at a reported cost of \$1,500,000. It was destroyed last night by a spectacular blaze of undetermined origin.

and carried it on for several years.

"Breck" and C. M. Caldwell in
1911 formed a partnership that lat-
er became the ace in oil production.

When the boom came, they were
ready, owning thousands of acres of
the rocky land and holding leases
on thousands of others.

Pneumonia, after a paralytic
stroke, killed him. He removed
here several years ago but main-
tained in Breckenridge a home as
ample as that he owned here.

Funeral services will find the city
of Breckenridge represented prob-
ably by several hundred friends of
Walker. A large truck loaded with
floral tributes left Breckenridge
last night for Fort Worth.

Walker moved to Fort Worth sev-
eral years ago from Breckenridge,
but still retained his citizenship in
Stephens county. Although he

spent most of his time at his new
home, Walker was elected mayor
of his old home town and served
three years, retiring a year ago be-
cause of ill health.

Walker was a good business man
and firm in his belief that there
was much oil in the county. He in-
vested in leases, and in fee titles, a
good part of his surplus cash. When
the oil development began in 1917
he owned leases throughout the
county and owned 3,500 acres in fee
next to Breckenridge. Overnight he
became enormously wealthy.

Through the boom times Walker
guided the destinies of his business and
banking took most of his attention.
He was largely responsible for the
three rail lines that went to Breck-
enridge.

OIL NEWS NOTES

DALLAS, Jan. 17.—Casing is being set in the Texas company's No. 2 Branyon well near Luling at 2,340 feet after a good core was taken. The core was about two feet in the Edwards lime, and showed heavy oil saturation. The well is southeast of the first Branyon well, which caused much excitement when it blew in early in 1928, and which is still producing.

The Humble Oil company is swabbing a steady stream of oil from its No. 2 well on the Davis tract in the Bruner field, and indications are that it will be good for from 500 to 1,000 barrels a day. The company's No. 1 well is being swabbed, and will be drilled in within a week.

The Shell Oil Corporation has shut the water off in its No. 1 Ford Tiller in the northeast end of the Bruner field, and the well has been put back into the production class, making around 150 barrels a day. The well first came in flowing oil but later showed water.

TULSA, Jan. 17 (AP).—Oxyap Oil company is running tubing to apply the air lift to its number 2 Rosemond in 26-7-4, west side of the St. Louis Pool. This test produced 615 barrels on the swab yesterday and has Simpson and from 4,075 to 4,095 feet.

WICHITA, Kan., Jan. 17 (AP).—Besides seven wells in Sedgewick county now producing approximately 8,000 barrels daily, 85 operations are under way. Of these 21 wells are actually drilling, five have spudded, 30 are building rigs or moving materials, five are locations and five have rigs on the ground.

Cold weather and bad roads of the past three days have caused delays in drilling operations in both Sedgewick and Harvey counties.

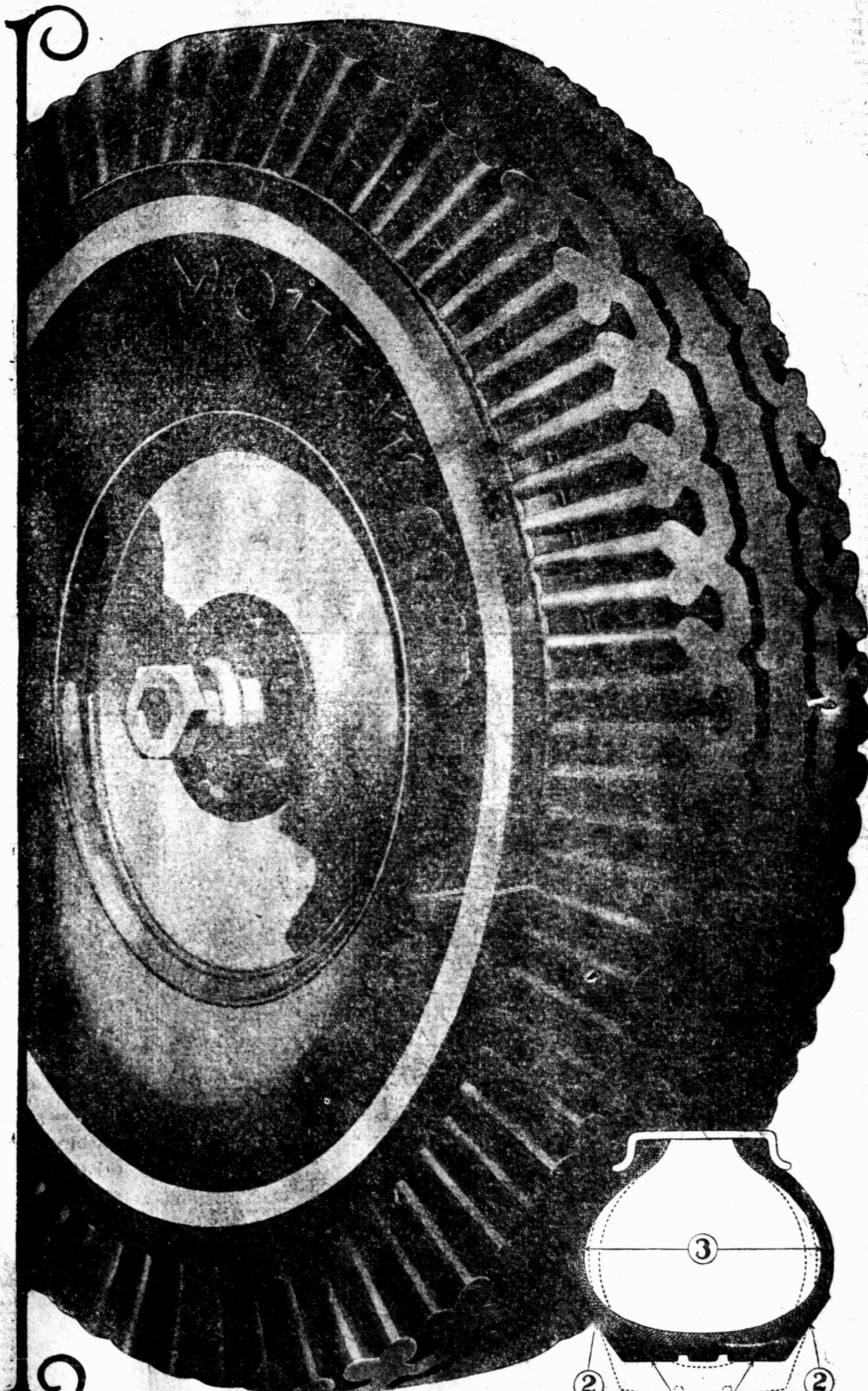

PRIZE-SEEKING GOLFERS NEXT TURN TO TEXAS TOURNAMENTS

ADDED PUNCH AT BAT NEED OF RED TEAM

ENTIRE NEW OUTFIELD FROM MINORS COMES TO CINCINNATI

(NOTE: This is the tenth of a series dealing with midwinter prospects of major league baseball clubs. Others will follow from day to day.)

CINCINNATI, Jan. 17.—Advent of 1929 marked the tenth year the Cincinnati Reds have labored without a pennant.

And speaking of the numeral "10" reminds Jack Hendricks, Red pilot, that if the proposed ten man team idea was a reality it might provide a batting punch his team lacked last year. Hendricks needs batters who can travel farther than 90 feet on their hits—and to the uninitiated 90 feet is the distance from the plate to first base. Hendricks needs sluggers who can propel doubles and triples.

Last summer the Reds had a one base complex, the proof of which is in the figures—they ranked at the bottom of the league in total bases. In order to strengthen the club with sluggers who can run 180 and 270 feet on their hits, the Cincinnati management has secured several long distance sluggers from the minors and was favored with drawing hitting talent in the draft.

New Outfielders
In Earl Crabtree, Oklahoma City. Evar Swanson, Mission, Calif., and Walter Shaner, Chattanooga, formerly with the Red Sox, the Reds obtained a hard hitting minor league outfield. They will argue it out with Walker, Allen, Zimman, Purdy and Callahan, last summer's regulars.

Third base offers an unsolved problem. "Jersey" Joe Stripp, purchased from Columbus last year, is the only candidate who is a natural hitter. But Walter Lutske, formerly with Cleveland, obtained in the draft, is a more polished fielder. Chuck Dressen, last year's mainstay, must hustle to ward off the Stripp-Lutske threat. If Stripp is crowded out, Hendricks has indicated he may use him as an understudy of George Kelly at first because the team needs the advantage of Stripp's long distance hits. Wally Pipp also is available at first.

Ford headed the league fielders at short last year and is slated to retain his post, but is not looked upon to aid the offense behind the bat. Only 241. Clark Pittenger will be called upon if Ford continues the light stickwork.

Crits Fixture at Second
Hugh Crits—Second base. No worry there. Crits is a dependable batter and a great defensive player. The Reds lost strength behind the plate when "Bubbles" Hargrave was named to manager. St. Paul Pied-nich is the only veteran receiver on the roster. Three youngsters, Clyde Sukeforth, Reds, Ed McMullen, Minneapolis and Leo Dixon, Baltimore, seek the runner-up position to Piednich.

Numerous pitching additions in Ash and Meeker from Columbus. Gudat, Dayton; Johnson, Rock Island; Pile, McCook and Smith, North Platte, will be looked over by Hendricks at the Orlando, Fla., training camp in hopes the veteran mound corps of Louie, Rixey, Donohue, Kiop and Luque, can be bolstered.

Hypocrisy Rampant

It is quite possible that future
generations will look back on the
present period as the great age
of national hypocrisy.

Sham and pretense have become
two of our greatest national
characteristics during the decade
since the World War ended. No
one can tell how long it will be
before we manage to reduce them to
their normal proportions; certainly
both have some striking manifesta-
tions nowadays.

A day or so ago the Washington
correspondent sent out a rather
sensational story, predicting that
President-elect Hoover might take the
unprecedented step of demanding
that all government officials, from
high to low comply with the national
prohibition law.

This "wonder" correspondent
gravely "is something new. Advoca-
cy of some such executive pro-
nouncement has been occasionally
voiced in congress by two or three
members known as radical drags, but
it has never gone further than that.

Something new indeed—it surely
is. Yet, if we are not wholly
given over to hypocrisy and hum-
buggery, should there be anything
either new or startling in the spec-
tacle of the president of the nation
insisting that government officials
shall observe the nation's organic
law?

Nothing could be possibly more il-
luminating. Let yourself ponder
just for a moment on the extent of
the sham which the pending insis-
tence of such a request implies.

We have a dry government.
Neither the present congress nor the
one that will succeed it will modify
the prohibition law to the slightest
extent. In addition there are hun-
dreds upon hundreds of appointive
officials, each sworn to observe and
protect the law, many of them
charged directly with enforcing the
prohibition law itself. Yet for a
president to demand that all of these
individuals honor the law them-
selves is considered a radical, sur-
prising, breath-taking act further?

Could our hypocrisy be further?
It is an extremely unhealthy situa-
tion into which we have drifted.
We have come perilously close to
accepting the creed of the slyster
lawyer, that whatever you can get
away with is all right. No prob-
lem that faces us of greater im-
portance than this.

No government, and least of all a
democracy, can endure without a
high standard of integrity among
its officials. Unless we can rid our-
selves of our growing indifference to
sham, we are due for a rather rocky
time of it a little later. Regardless
of your attitude toward the prohibi-
tion law itself, you must agree that
this hypocrisy is a force that is men-
acing the very foundation of our
government.

Short Words

English is rapidly discarding its
long words and becoming a lan-
guage of monosyllables, according to
Prof. Otto Jespersen of Denmark.

British savants, following the na-
tional custom of blaming every new
development on America, say that
it's our fault. Maybe it is; if so,
we ought to be proud of it.

Short words make language a
flexible, easily mastered instrument.
Consider some of the jaw-wrenchers
that other languages contain. In
Finland, for instance, a paper pay-
er company has to advertise itself
as a "päästövelvoitevalvottava-
tied seoskappale" according to
the old Finnish law is "vares-
kelin digistrensangkontrollikar-
nainen." In Russian is "vyso-
koprohoditelstvo." The substance
movement in Poland is "wetrzemie-
glowec."

Al Smith cleaned up over a mil-

Says

Rushing to the fire every time
the alarm is sounded is a duty that

partment. There is no sense in the

the fire. These fellows often get to
the fire before the trucks carrying
the fire-fighting equipment can get
there, and they are usually in the
way if it is possible for them to get
there, which makes the work of the
firemen more hazardous than it
really would be under normal condi-
tions.

It is generally thought that
the real cause of the tragic
death of the gallant fireman
which occurred only a short time
ago was caused by this, and we
notice that the traffic depart-
ment of the police force will be
more strict in the enforcement of
the rules of the fire depart-
ment in regard to the traffic
when the fire is reported. If
you do not know your duty in
the matter you had better find
out, for you may find yourself
arrested and facing a charge of
violation of some of these rules
before you wake up to the fact
that you are possibly entirely out
of your place. Stay away from the
scene of the conflagration
and you will not be mixed up in it.

There is a concerted effort on the
part of the peace officers at this
time to put a stop to this bootleg-
ing business, and if they are given
the backing of the people of the
community, in this matter it will
not be long till the bootlegger will
be mighty scarce in this commu-
nity. Several raids have been made
during the past few weeks that have
brought down good returns, and if
the people who serve as jurors and
serve as witnesses will back up the
officers in presenting the evidence
there is going to be a better Lub-
bock.

Very few people enjoy serving
on a jury. It is one of the
duties of good citizens, and if it
is possible for you to serve
when you are summoned it will
be greatly to the betterment of
the community for you to render
service of this kind when called
upon. The next day the enforce-
ment can not always be had if
the matter of enforcement
is left entirely to that
group of people who are anxious
to serve, and make it conven-
ient. Several days later the
sheriff is summoning jurors in
special jury cases.

The substitute is of the opinion

best serve the greater number
of people and towns of the coun-
ties. Lubbock being the cen-
tral point in the county will
naturally get her share of the
highways, and it is the hope of
The Plainsman that every town
will get as many as practical,
but as it is a county proposition,
we are of the opinion that the
roads in all parts of the county
be given their proportion of
hardsurfacing which would be
nothing but right.

There will be more than likely be
much new legislation offered in re-
gard to highways, before the pres-
ent session of the legislature is
over, and there will be some good
legislation, no doubt, and some that
is very doubtful, but any of it, we
are sure, will be looking forward to
hardsurfaced roads, and Lubbock
county should get in on the road
building program at the earliest
possible date.

We are almost sure that the state
highway department is not going
to do much for the Lubbock county
highways, as in the opinion of the
people in the county can not agree
on a program themselves. The state de-
partment is very little concerned in
the local light, and Lubbock and the
other towns, and each individual
should get together and iron out all
of the rough places, and get to-
gether on a program that will mean
something for Lubbock county.

day of a famous veteran actor or
fight promoter or business chief-
tain.

Suddenly thousands of Manhat-
tanites receive word that "it would
be a mighty nice thing to surprise
So-and-so" by giving him a fine
dinner. It is signed by "the com-
mittee." Generally there appears a
list of names, mentioning everyone
from Mayor Walker to One-Eyed
Connelly. The notices are so writ-
ten that half of New York's Who's
Who appears to be on a committee
that never existed and never will.
It's all staged by the "weep racket-
eers," who follow up with tickets
at anywhere from \$10 to \$20 per
seat at the banquet boards.

The racketeers negotiate with a hotel
for a price of \$4 up per person and
make a nice profit of \$6 and up-
ward per plate. With a thousand
persons often in attendance, the
grat is good.

For many a season this sort of
thing has gone on, and the "suck-
ers" have done their suspecting in
private. Stars of Broadway have
appeared at the tables of honor and
have even donated their talents to
make the evening merry. Famous
men have agreed to appear as
speakers. And, of course, the "rack-
eteers" hid in the background
laughing up their sleeves and col-
lecting their fat profits.

The same stunt has been worked
an number of times in the
name of charity. During the Christ-
mas season a check-up was made
and an event which brought in
more than \$10,000 "at the gate" ac-
tually gave the charity something
like \$750.

A few months ago, the wise ones
who have been watching the op-
eration of the "weep racket," start-
ed a little investigation during a
dinner given to one of the oldest
musical comedy clowns of the stage.

Every frock-coated dignitary
whose name had appeared on the list
was approached, and not one could
tell who was behind the banquet.
Each had agreed to serve only be-
cause he thought the other fellow
wanted him to. Before the evening
was over it was learned that no
single person there could explain
how the "testimonial" started.

Even the toastmaster was in ig-
norance of the inception. He ex-
plained that he had agreed to take
the seat of honor out of friend-
ship for the old comedian. And
the comedian himself had no idea
who had started the ball rolling.
He considered it a huge joke and
made witty remarks concerning
this headless and tailless feast.

Of course the "wise ones" knew
that the "weep racket" was work-
ing again, playing on the symph-
ony of the notoriously sentimental New
Yorkers.

TOO MUCH STARCH AT A SINGLE MEAL ADDS TO WEIGHT

You know how many times I have
told you that there is a lot of bal-
derdash written about food combi-
nations. Now I have unwittingly
given the impression that I hold
with some of these fads.

A short time ago an Italian
woman wrote that she weighed
around 250 and wanted to reduce
but she was having difficulty be-
cause she was fond of bread and
spaghetti. In my "Diet and Health" I
said that she should never eat
spaghetti and bread together.

bread or other starchy food at the
same meal.
Today I have a letter from one of
the readers, Mrs. W., who clipped
this article from the column, un-
derlined that sentence and asked
"Why?" She had thought that tak-
ing two or more starches at the
same meal might bring the quantity
up too high, but that a person who
longed to eat bread and butter with
any other starchy foods could do so,
provided he ate less of each food.

My answer, coupled with that of an-
other doctor to the effect that a
common error in diet was the com-
bination of different starches, has
made her believe that possibly there
is some chemical reason for not
combining two starches at the same
meal. Is there?

No, Mrs. W., there is no chemical
reason why two starches should not
be eaten together. The reason I
gave our Italian friend instructions
not to eat bread and spaghetti at
the same meal was the quantity
apportioned to each, not the com-
bination of the two.

I cannot repeat too often that any
food which agrees when taken alone
will agree when taken with another
food that also agrees when taken

alone. The starch of potatoes is
chemically the same as the starch
in bread, and all fruits and vegeta-
bles contain some starch. If you
want to take your starchy foods
from different sources, you needn't
be afraid, provided you don't over-
eat of them. The same statement
applies to the proteins, for chemi-
cally, all proteins are the same. Dis-
gestion of each substance takes
place just the same if alone or
mixed with others.

It occasionally happens that some
food will disagree and certain com-
binations will disagree, but these
are exceptions and should not be
laid down with some absurd reason-
ing attached for others to follow.

We have an article on Balanced
Diet which you may have, if you are
interested.

Small Lumps and Blochy Skin
"I wish to ask you about a growth
I have on the inner side of my
thumb, under the skin. It seems to
be getting harder and I feel some-
thing ought to be done about it.
It is round, white and hard, but it
does not pain me at all. What is it,
and is it serious? What should I
do about it? I would also like to
know what makes a red, blochy
skin?"

Yes, something should be done
about any abnormal lump on the
skin or elsewhere, and that is to
have it investigated. If you may
have it investigated, you may never
mean anything except a little
annoyance, but you should have it
attended to if it does not vanish in
a reasonable time.

A blochy skin may indicate that
there is something wrong with the
general hygienic program accom-
panying the diet, or it may be some
poisoning from some source. At any
rate, have a check-up by a physician.

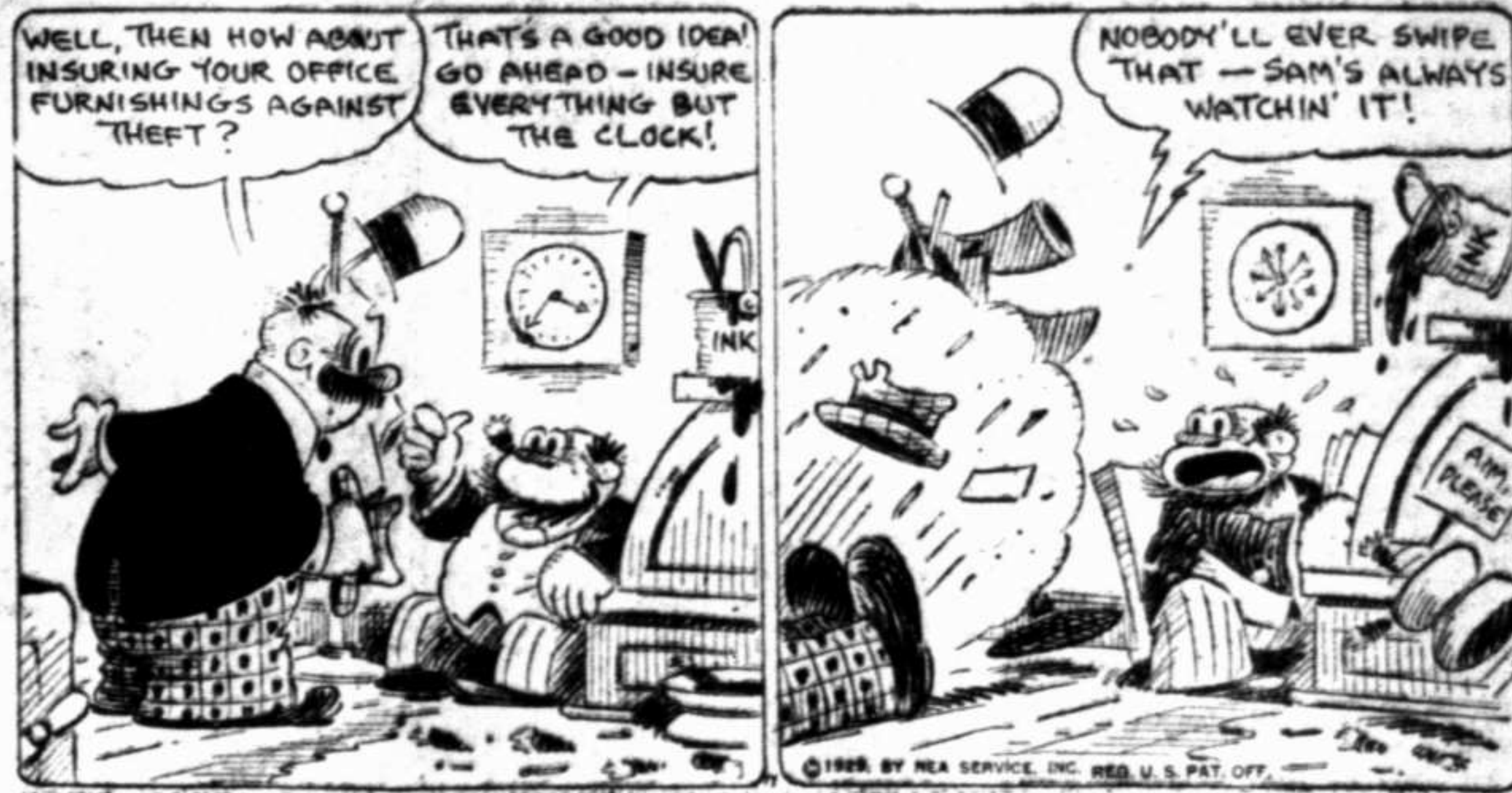

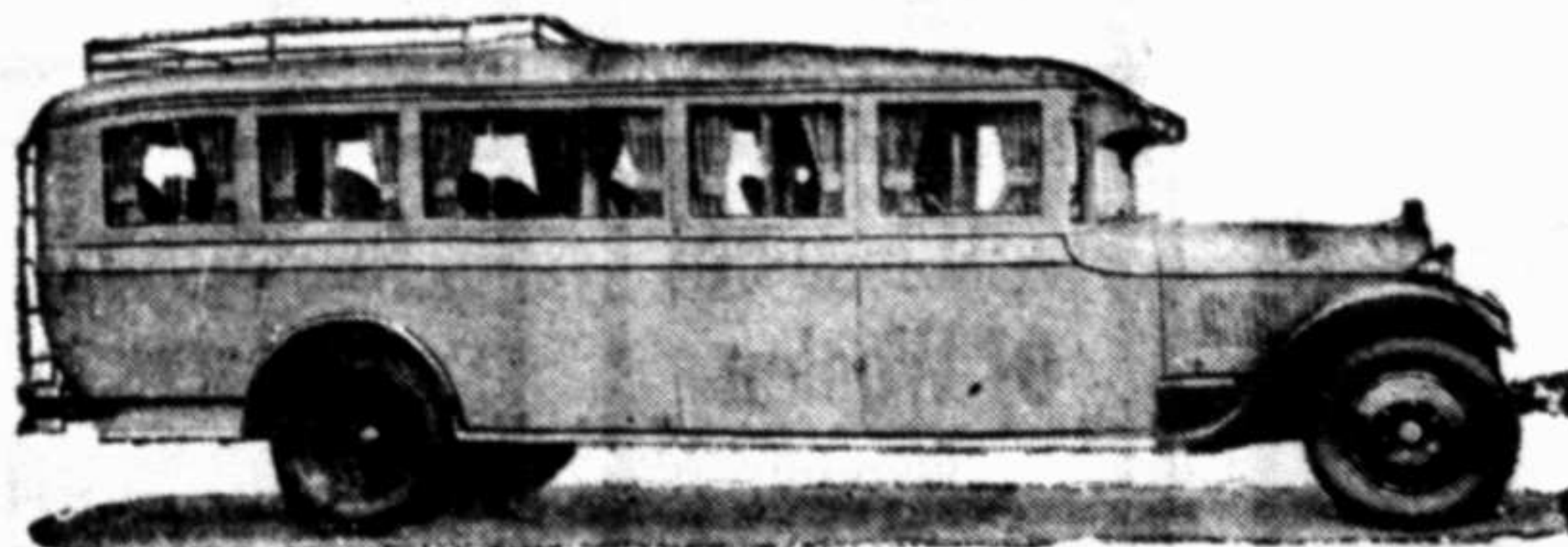

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 17 (AP)—Dismissal from membership in the American Bar Association of Carlos S. Hardy, one of the two judges of criminal court of Los Angeles county, California, brought to an unexpected conclusion the meeting of the association's executive committee here yesterday.

Judge Hardy's membership was forfeited by the executive committee because of alleged violation of canons of the association which prohibit pecuniary or other obligations which might interfere with the discharge of legal duties and the alleged acceptance of presents or favors from litigants or from those whose interests were likely to be submitted for judgment.

HIT-RUN DRIVER CLAIMS A VICTIM

FORT WORTH, Jan. 17 (AP)—Hit and run driver claimed another victim last night when Jack J. King, 27, of San Angelo, was injured fatally on the Weatherford road when hit by an automobile. He died in a Fort Worth hospital at 9:30 a. m. today.

King and F. L. Keller, also of San Angelo, were changing a tire on their car ten miles west of Fort Worth. According to a report to police, the driver of the passing car did not stop to render aid. Keller could give only a vague description of the automobile.

King, an independent oil operator, received a fractured skull, internal injuries and crushed hips. Keller was only cut on the face and body.

MILK MENACED

Striking Dairymen Make Illinois Case Acute

CHICAGO, Jan. 17 (AP)—The milk supply of America's second largest city was endangered today by striking dairymen of Illinois and Wisconsin, demanding \$2.45 a hundredweight for milk in place of the \$2.30 the distributors have offered to continue paying.

Some distributors are storing thousands of pounds of condensed milk to meet an emergency, although none was of the opinion the milk shortage would become acute. There were reports that producers in several sections had been stopped en route to distributing plants, and their milk dumped.

Picketing at several receiving stations was continued today by strikers and plans were being made to picket other stations of the Borden and Bowman Dairy Companies, which distribute about two-thirds of the city's milk.

SMITH PLEADS FOR LOYALTY

POPULAR COLLECTION ASKED TO WIPE OUT DEFICIT

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—Alfred E. Smith has asked popular contributions to liquidate the \$1,500,000 deficit incurred by the Democratic party in his unsuccessful campaign for president.

In a radio address last night Mr. Smith deplored the practice of having a few rich men meet party deficits and also urged the need for continued activity of the party throughout the four years between national elections.

He said he had agreed to turn over royalty rights to a book of his campaign speeches to the national committee as his contribution to the party war chest. Copies of the book will be sent to each contributor who sends in two dollars or more toward meeting the deficit.

An important function of a minority party, Mr. Smith said, was to keep the people informed on what progress was being made toward the solution of national problems as unbiased information could not be had from the party in power.

For this purpose he emphasized the need for year-around headquarters for the Democratic national committee "where Democrats throughout the nation may keep in touch with members of congress and the affairs of the nation."

Mr. Smith omitted any reference to his own political future.

Resignation Not Taken By Governor

BATON ROUGE, La., Jan. 17 (AP)—Resignation of Representative J. A. McClanahan of Caldwell parish, caused by the special session of the state legislature refusing to favorably consider his efforts to cut expenses of legislative employees, has been rejected by Governor Long. In a letter to Mr. McClanahan yesterday, Governor Long stated he believed acceptance of the resignation "would be contrary to the wishes of the people of your section."

'ARMY' TO PICK NEW CHIEFTAIN

COUNCIL WILL MEET TOMORROW TO NAME ITS SUCCESSOR

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Jan. 17 (AP)—It was assumed today that the high council of the Salvation Army would choose tomorrow a successor to General Bramwell Booth, who has been voted unfit to command.

Foremost among those suggested in army circles for the generalship was Commander Evangeline Booth, his sister, who heads the army in the United States and led the victorious reform element, and Commissioner Edward J. Higgins of

London, the army's chief of staff.

The general's next move was eagerly awaited, there being indications it would be to carry the fight to the courts. The Daily Mail today quoted him as saying:

"I haven't much money but I will spend what I have in defending my position."

"Nothing will induce me to retire from the position I occupy. It was and is sacred trust imposed on me by my father and it is not for me to lay it down. I should be a coward—worse than a coward, a skunk—if I do so because there is a bit of Rumpus, and I won't."

"I will resist by every means in my power every attempt to deprive me of my trust."

Should the matter reach the courts it was assumed that legality of the council's action would turn on what constituted unfitness.
