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TEACH TOT TO ENTERTAIN
SELF WITH SIMPLE TOYS
"WHAT CAN I DO?" is a question every parent hears over and over. After these children acquire good reading skills they may find many of their satisfactions there. The danger to some is that they will enjoy reading so much as to be tempted to withdraw from activities, particularly activities with other children.

Always the child must be taught to sit for several minutes at a time merely doing nothing is to him an unknown experience; nor do we find him spending periods of a few minutes at a time in relaxed conversation such as adults engage in.

Many little children just beginning to toddle keep a nurse, or older child or mother employed for hours and hours at a time amusing them. Riding on a Pullman from Chattanooga to Cincinnati I saw a patient young mother just about to wear herself out moving about from place to place and manipulating toys to amuse a restless young actor of nineteen months. I marvelled at her infinite patience. Apparently the child never had learned self-entertainment. No doubt at home the mother spent her days from morning till night doing likewise.

Most mothers who can afford help make themselves ceaseless servants to these toddlers. If the mother begins to read, the child tugs at her and whines until she ceases. If she tries to sew he commands her to give it up; if she attempts to play the piano, there he is again to interfere.

Her only hope to enjoy peace and to teach the child to amuse himself is to keep herself busy for several minutes at a time, so busy she cannot help him; then so make these intervals longer and longer. If the child has a few simple things he can manipulate, drag or haul about, he gradually will learn to do so and to entertain himself. The mother must do her own housework just finds it necessary to leave the child alone, and sometimes for hours at a stretch. How soon then he learns to adapt himself and to find enjoyment with things about him. As the child grows older and can develop more complicated structures, a skillful mother can suggest group activities which will afford him happy, useful entertainment for a long while, pausing only now and then to read him a story or two, or to advise him in his play.

When this child has playmates these are increased resourcefulness in finding new activities.

Thanks to the best modern kindergarten and lower elementary grades, many things things are done at school which suggest similar activities at home. I have seen my children finish making things at home begun at school, and take to school some unfinished structure begun at home. For hours, while half days, indeed, they have worked with other children in their own play room, basement, kitchen or living room at some project which not only kept them busy, but stimulated their creativeness, cooperation all the while accompanied by a good deal of cooperation.

Wise parents do not throw away magazines, wood, tin and cardboard containers. They keep all sorts of things for the children to convert into objects of creation. They provide paste, glue, fasteners, paint, colors, crayons, pencils, scissors, hammer, nails, saw and the like and encourage other children to come into the house, their studio and workshop.

They moreover, are resourceful with new suggestions always ready for the time when they hear the question, "What can I do?"

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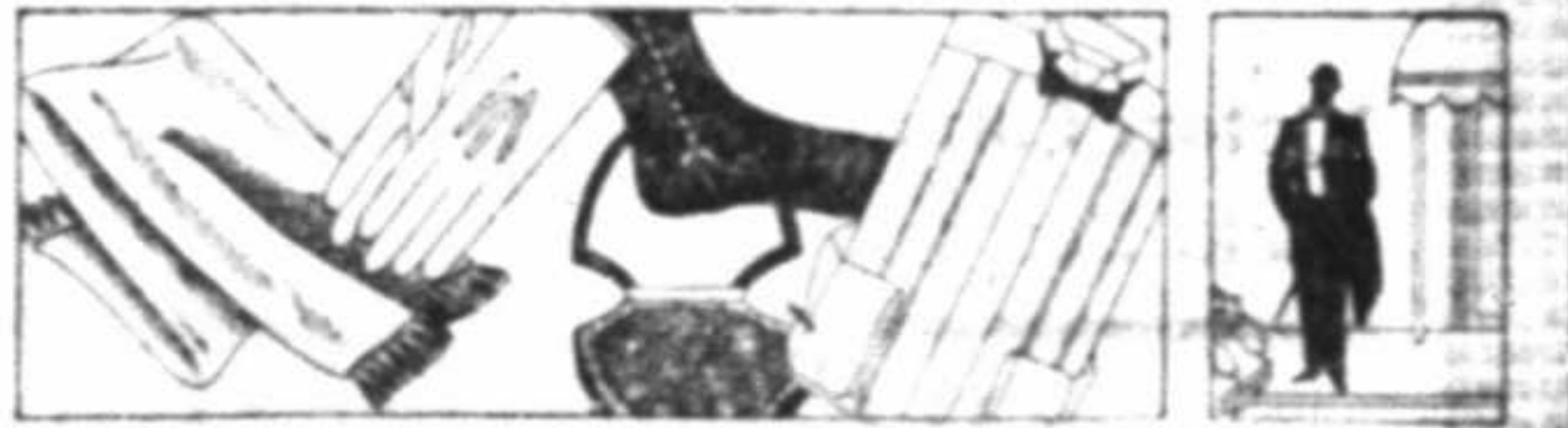

University of Texas student and
his date elected to walk across
a crowded Austin street the other
evening when the traffic light said
they should wait at the curb. An
automobile, propelled by another
student, bore across the street in
intersection with the light in its
favor and the girl was killed.

The driver of the car, as a
matter of formality, has been
charged with negligent homicide.
Dispatches from the capital
are to the effect that the
grand jury will not indict him
for a mishap not of his fault.
But the girl is dead—and will
remain dead whether or not the
youthful motorist is exonerated.

Shortly after the accident a
preliminary hearing was held and a
University of Texas student testified
that "running red lights" was a
practice of university students.
Practice or not, it has proven in
the death of a co-ed to be a
mighty expensive practice.

THE PLAINSMAN is commenting
upon this case for two reasons.
In the first place, he points out
that "running red lights" and stop
signs, either by motorists or pedestrians, is a dangerous thing. In
the second place to call attention
to a similar danger to the student
own Tech students persist in
engaging in—that of strolling up
and down in the middle of the
street, sometimes three and four in
a row.

This much you may take for
certain. Students will not stay
on the sidewalks, where they
belong, until city and college
authorities force them to do so.
And sooner or later there'll be
a fatal accident in Lubbock
and when there is you're going
to hear the fanciest bunch of
silly you ever heard of on the
part of city and college authorities
which won't in the least
detract from the tragic side of
the story.

Several students have been struck
and slightly injured since the
practice began, but as luck would
have it none has been seriously
hurt. But someone is going to be
seriously hurt if the practice isn't
stopped—and then it will be too late
to do anything much about it.

A University of Texas co-ed has
paid dearly for the habit. Longhorn
students have indulged in the
habit of "running red lights" since
the dawn of time. Some day, if
someone in authority doesn't
act, some Tech student is going
to pay a similar price for the
absurd privilege of walking in
the path of motor cars. City and
college authorities had best act
now or figure out some airight
method of clearing their skirts
when some youngster is picked up
off Broadway or Main with a
spongy and a broken neck.

President's Committee On Unemployment Has Done Great Job Despite Handicaps, Correspondent Dutcher Reports

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The
president's emergency committee
on employment has been doing a
large amount of work. Fourteen
persons facing such a tremendous
problem without the power to
legislate, administer or distribute
money could hardly be expected
to make a hundred in the volume
of unemployment. But the members
of this committee have been actively
engaged in their work for relief
and have been effective.

The country is now practically
organized to deal with unemployment,
according to Colonel Arthur
Woods, the chairman. That is, the
governors and mayors in states,
counties and cities where there is
a real need for relief have faced
the situation and done such things
as they believed were adequate. In
many states there is a very real
need for relief and it is not badly
needed. The darkest spots have
been found in the manufacturing
states ranging from Minnesota east
through New York and down into
the border states, the drought-stricken
region in the Mississippi and Ohio
valleys and lumber and mining regions
of the west.

Six field agents of public experience
are moving around the country
now. Their reports, suggestions
and requests for information are
received at a committee clearing house
here which is in charge of Dr.
James C. Lawrence, dean of the
University of Minnesota, and Dr.
Lewis Meriam of the Brookings
Institution. Among the half dozen
regional winners are William Phillips,
former undersecretary of state,
assigned to New England; Fred C.
Croton, author of the "Ohio plan,"
in the Great Lakes region; and Joseph
H. Williams, head of the University
of Pennsylvania commerce school,
in Pennsylvania.

Woods sits in his office and keeps
in touch with the rest of the country
by telephone. Lately he has
been getting reports on specific
subjects from as many as 400 mayors
and county commissioners. One of these,
for instance, appeared to indicate that
there might easily have been 150,000
more men employed on public
works in the country during November
than there were a year previously.

His initial job was to get the
governors and mayors interested
and he thinks that has been done
effectively. More lately, he says,
the committee's trade mark has
been a "tangle of red tape" and a
pair of shears.

So legislation is being introduced
to create 12 such boards in various
sections so construction won't be
delayed simply because sites haven't
been viewed. Other legislation will
hasten completion of architectural
specifications by permitting outside
architects to make them. Leaders
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"We are trying to relieve distress," he says, "and we will take
any help we can get. If we can't
learn all we can in this winter of
distress which can be used to prevent
similar distress in the future."

Thus far, no member of the committee
has ventured to suggest that
there are any signs to justify the
thought of letting up on relief
measures before the winter is over.

Henry Ford's Car Damaged In Wreck

YOUNGTOWN, Ohio, Dec. 18
(AP)—Henry Ford, Detroit automobile
manufacturer escaped injury
in an automobile collision which
damaged the steering gear of the

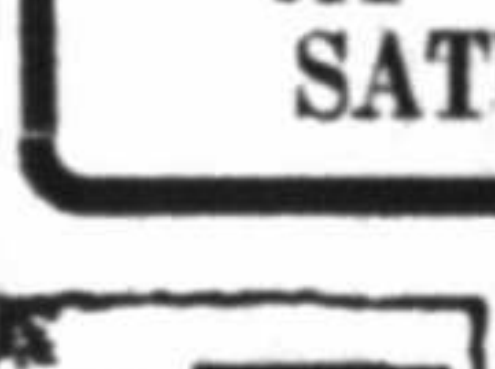

SIDELIGHTS ON THE HEARING

HE'S WELL KNOWN
W. F. Peter, general attorney for
the Rock Island and veteran counsel

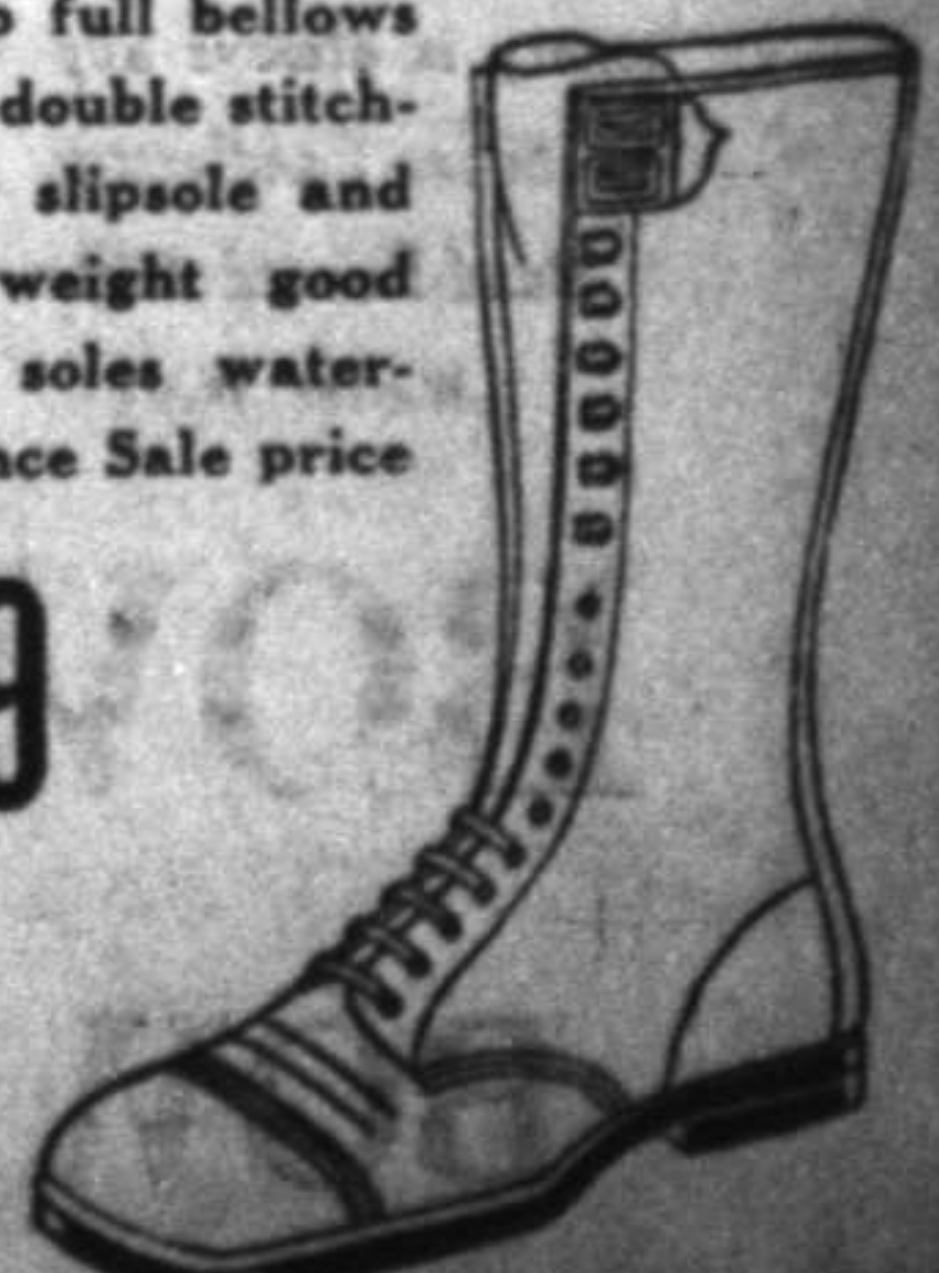

EX-WESTENERS DRUB SPUR

NEW YORK IS LIKELY TO LOSE BOUT
BIBLE HAS TWENTY-TWO GRID STARS, CREAM OF THE WEST, FOR HIS SQUAD IN CHARITY CLASH WITH EASTERNERS

CHAMPIONSHIP MAY BE FOUGHT IN CHICAGO NEXT JUNE

BY HUGH S. FULLERTON, JR., Associated Press Sports Writer
NEW YORK, Dec. 18. (AP)—A situation similar to the one which sent the first Dempsey-Tunney heavyweight championship fight to Philadelphia arose today as new complications were tossed in upon the edict of the New York State Athletic commission that Max Schmelling must agree within 15 days to defend his title against Jack Sharkey.

Following hard on the ultimatum, which apparently eliminated Young William Stribling from consideration came an offer which brought the Georgian right back into the heavyweight picture. Nate Lewis, matchmaker of the Chicago stadium, offered Schmelling \$300,000 to defend his crown against Stribling in Chicago next spring.

Likely To Go West
With promoters in general fighting shy of the proposed Sharkey-Schmelling bout just as they avoided the Dempsey-Wills battle demanded by New York's boxing solons five years ago, it seemed likely that the next heavyweight championship scrap would go west, again eliminating New York from consideration unless numerous compromises could be effected.

Lewis's offer was backed by Sidney N. Strotz, president of the Chicago Stadium corporation and its success seemed more probable than any other plan proposed so far. Lewis plans to stage the fight in Soldier Field, Chicago, in June. He believes the gate receipts at a top price of \$12, would run over \$1,000,000. It was in Soldier Field, where the seating capacity is over 100,000, that Dempsey and Tunney drew a \$3,000,000 gate for their second battle.

Has Many Problems
Joe Jacobs, Schmelling's manager and recipient of the offer had a good many problems to consider before he could reply to the first half-million bid since the days of Tex Rickard. Schmelling is bound by contract to the H. A. Milk Fund committee here in June and this must be taken into consideration. If the commission edict stands, this battle must be against Sharkey but neither the committee nor the Madison Square garden corporation appears interested in such a fight unless there is a preliminary tournament to stir up public interest.

Lewis offered to share 50 per cent of the proceeds with the milk fund and some Chicago charity, but the promoters of the charity show were inclined to turn a cold shoulder to the proposal yesterday. They preferred to do their own matchmaking, they said, and not share the proceeds.

Prince Of Wales To Go Hunting Again
LONDON, Dec. 18. (AP)—The Daily Express says the Prince of Wales, who last year sold all of his hunting horses and absented himself from fox hunting, is taking up his favorite sport again and will follow the hounds in Leicestershire tomorrow. 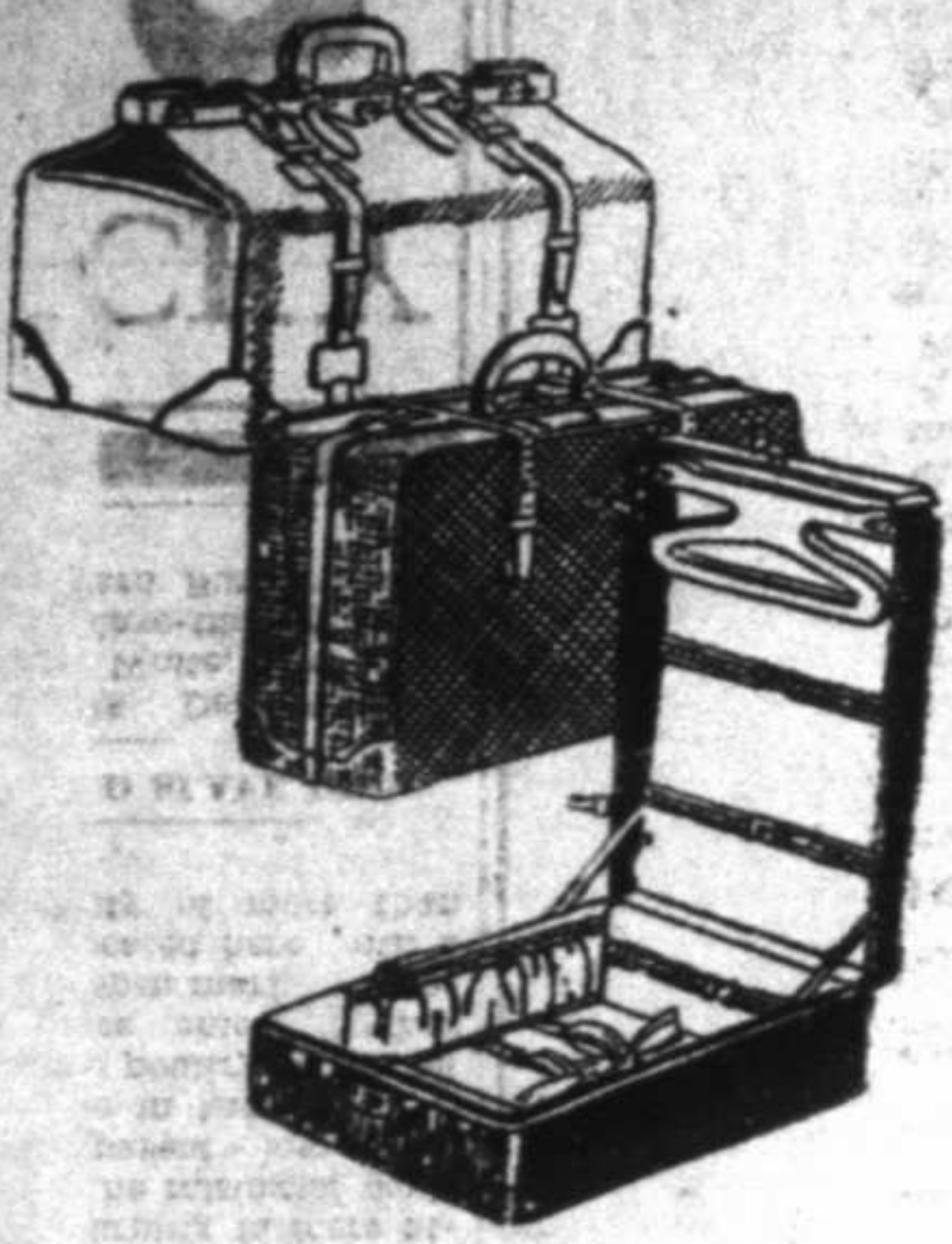
