The project will extend from 6.4 miles west of the Kimble-Sutton County line eastward a distance of approximately 7.0 miles.

The work will include construction of grading, structures and stage surfacing. Estimated cost of the work is \$9,480,000.

## Aldermen Pass Ordinance

An ordinance pertaining to unsuitable vehicles was passed by city aldermen when they met Monday in regular session. The ordinance states that it is unlawful and a nuisance to leave, park or stand, for a period longer than seven days in any front, side or rear yard of any lot or tract of land in the city, any motor vehicle or airplane which is in a condition such as to make it incapable of being driven or operated, including any motor vehicles which fail to display a current motor vehicle inspection sticker or current license plate or which may have one or more flat tires; providing for a penalty not to exceed the sum of two hundred dollars for each offense.

Aldermen also made plans to institute a test to be given those persons applying for an electrician's license in the City of Sonora.

## School Board Hires 2 Teachers

Leticia Galindo Reyes and Sherry Page were elected to the Sonora School faculty when board members met April 29. Mrs. Reyes, a graduate of Sonora High School, will graduate from Angelo State University in May and will teach in junior high. Mrs. Page, a January graduate of Sul Ross University, will teach in elementary. Both teachers have good academic preparations and have made the college dean's list. They were hired for the 1975-76 school year.

The board also approved the school calendar for 1975-76 which set the opening of school for August 20 and graduation for May 28.

In other action of the board, the district salary schedule was increased to \$500 above state minimum for beginning teachers and \$600 above the state schedule for teachers with three or more years service in the district. This local increase amounted to approximately \$100 per teacher.

### Our News Letter

A few nights ago, as I was looking for direction in these very troubled times, I went to the Lincoln Monument, where the famed Gettysburg address and second inaugural speeches were inscribed on the walls. Lincoln in his Gettysburg address spoke of being gathered "on the battlefield of a great war" and we, it seems are at the end of what has been a great war for this country, as we view the collapse of the Thieu government in South Vietnam. But in his second inaugural speech, Lincoln also spoke, as our great compassionate and unifying President always did, of the need to avoid divisiveness, and did not seek to point blame, but rather to have a country coalesce with central purpose.

It is important that we in this nation, while viewing the events that were beyond our control in Southeast Asia, avoid the temptation for recrimination. There are some events beyond our control, in our personal and our national lives. Government cannot control the economy--indeed it has tried too much to do so. And there are situations in which we seek to assist other

nations, but to leave the prime responsibility to them, in which we cannot control their fates either.

The U.S. gave generously: 2 million American men served there, 150 billion dollars was spent there, and 55,000 lives were given there. But the war was lost because it is clear that the hearts and minds of the South Vietnamese people were not one to support their government. Arms cannot win what hearts have lost, and neither the South Vietnamese nor the American people could remain committed to that war any longer.

In consequence, we saw the withdrawal of American troops. If we look to what lies ahead, we must expect that there will be humanitarian aid for South Vietnam, but we must also expect a reassessment of U.S. policy. The Arabs have shown, through their embargo, how economic power can be asserted. With strong military preparedness, as we must always have, and a strong economy, we stand in no danger of losing our position as world leaders. But, in my judgment, our greatest export will always be the exporting of democratic ideals, which this nation has sent out to the world for some 200 years. There are limits to what you can do with transfusions to help the sick; but if you plant the ideals of democracy in other countries, and let them grow, then the future will take care of itself. Lincoln spoke of a country "conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal." If we can help other nations become dedicated to that proposition, we will have given them the best that we have to offer.

## White's Message Center

Although when we grow small vegetables in the home garden we are primarily concerned with the fresh harvest it gives during the summer, there are times when we have surplus. It is easy to can or freeze the surplus so that we can enjoy the home-grown vegetables throughout the winter months.

### CANNING

1. Start with jar washing and rinsing them thoroughly.
2. Jars should be clean and hot when filled.
3. They need not be sterilized if they are to be processed in a water bath canner or steam pressure canner, otherwise boil the jar for 10 min. in water.

### TOMATOES

1. Canning Tomatoes starts with red-ripe fruits without blemishes.
2. Wash and drain just enough for one canner load.
3. Put tomatoes in a wire basket or cheese cloth and place in boiling water for about 30 sec. This will loosen skins. Dip into cold water and drain off excess water.
4. Remove skins from tomatoes and cut out cores.
5. Quarter tomatoes or leave whole for canning.
6. Pack tomatoes into hot Mason jar. Cover the tomatoes with hot tomato juice. Leave 1/2 inch head space, seal jars.
7. As each jar is filled stand it on rack in the canner of hot - not boiling - water. Water should cover jars an inch or two. When canner is filled cover it, boil water for 35 min.
8. Cool for 12 hours and remove from canner.
9. Remove rubber lid bands and test for seal by pressing center of lid. If it stays down it is sealed.

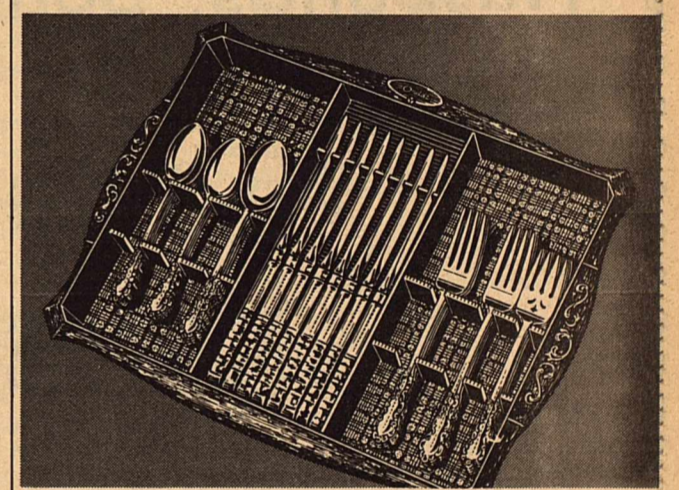

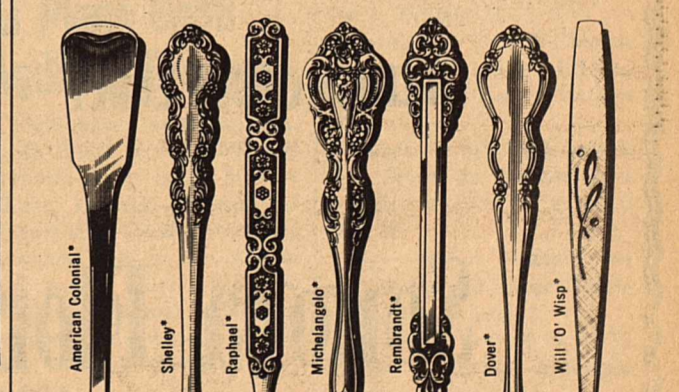

Among the churches in the district that are scheduling special Soil Stewardship services are First United Methodist Church, First Baptist and St. John's

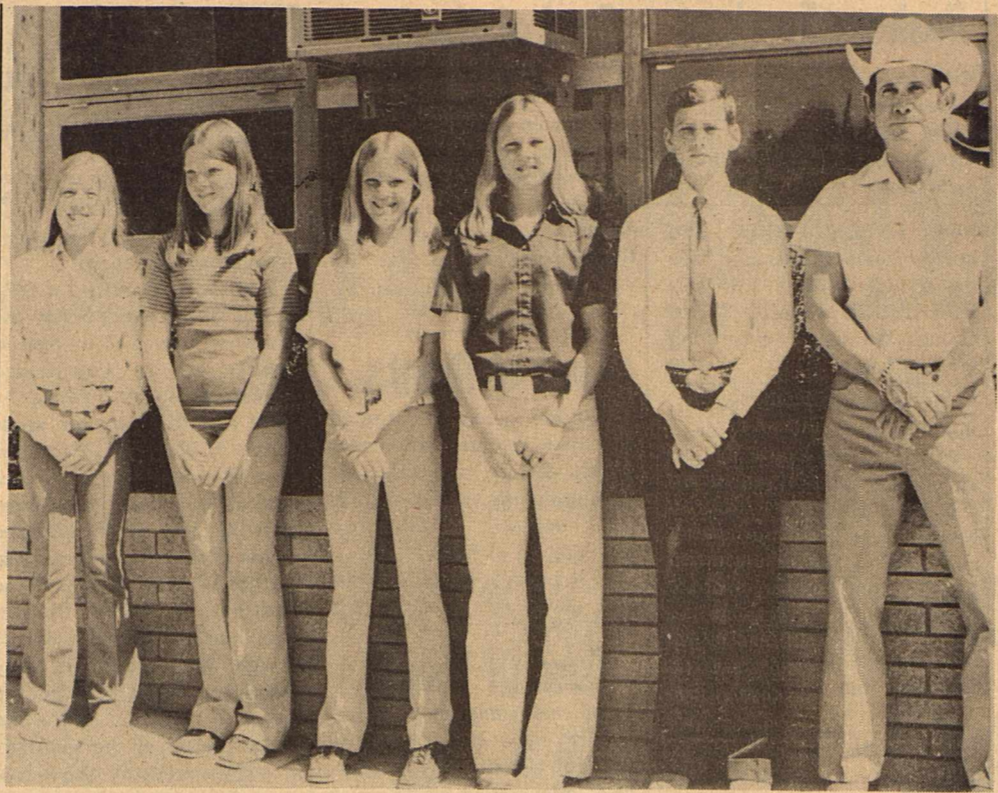
Episcopal Church.

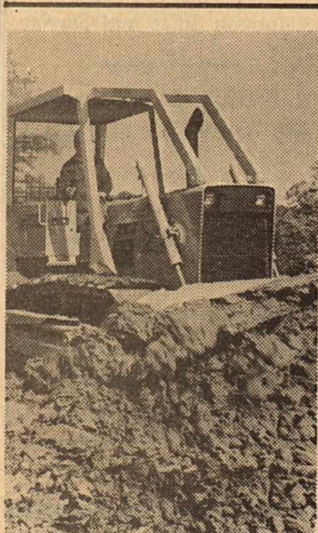
