County Coffers Empty

Even a decline in disbursements did not prevent the Red River County Commissioner's Court from overdrawing most of their bank accounts to the tune of \$50,125.70.

The 1979 semi-annual fiscal report presented to the commissioners at the July meeting reflected receipts down \$142,088 from the expected amount. On the other hand, the Commissioners had budgeted \$661,650 to spend during the six month period, and had spent only

\$599,322. Actual revenue totaled \$551,694.

The unbalanced fiscal report was backed up by figures in the county bank accounts, with most of the accounts in the red. Overdrafts include Baker Street Annex, \$5622.58; Criminal Investigator, \$4567.73; Ambulance service, \$69,268.59; Jury fund, \$8,876.33; Officer's Salary, \$10,417.46; General Fund, \$21,045.12; Road and Bridge Precinct No. 3, \$12,862.14; and Road and Bridge

Precinct No. 4, \$876.07.

Joe Runyan is the Commissioner of Precinct No. 3, and has the \$12,862.14 overdraft in his road and bridge fund. Darwin Floyd is Commissioner of Precinct No. 4, and is slightly overdrawn. Earl Humphries, on the other hand, has \$25,738.45 in his account for Precinct No. 1, and R. L. Edwards has \$11,230.89 in the road and bridge for Precinct No. 2.

In spite of the overdrafts, however, Commissioners approved a total of \$25,322.27

in new expenditures for the county at the July meeting.

From the Road and Bridge Fund of Precinct No. 1 were drawn claims amounting to \$8645.55. Edwards drew \$2699.67 for bills against Precinct No. 2, and Runyan added \$3744.68 to his overdraft. Darwin Floyd's Precinct No. 3 had claims amounting to \$4888.20. Runyan's overdraft at this time is within \$100 of the amount of his overdraft at the end of December, 1978.

Former Resident Improved Following Injuries

A former Bogata resident, Willie Gray of Winnsboro, is reported to be in improved condition following serious injuries received in a three car accident south of Mount Vernon last week.

The accident occurred at

the intersection of Highway 37 and the South Service Road of IH 30 at 7:20 p.m. Tuesday, July 17, during heavy rains.

Two cars, a 1975 Ford LTD driven by Charles Rex Davis of Mount Vernon and a 1977 Buick driven by Willie Lewis Gray of Winnsboro, were travelling north on Highway 37 and stopped at the intersection behind two other vehicles making a left turn. Billy Mearl Davis of Mount Vernon, driving a 1979 Chevrolet half-ton pickup, was also northbound on Highway 37 when he failed to stop behind the other vehicles, ramming into the trunk of Gray's Buick, which in turn struck the rear of Charles Davis' vehicle.

Gray suffered serious neck, back and arm injuries, and Davis received serious face and head injuries.

Heavy damage was incurred by Gray's vehicle, extensive damage to Billy Davis' pickup and Charles Davis' vehicle received light damage. No charges were filed in this accident.

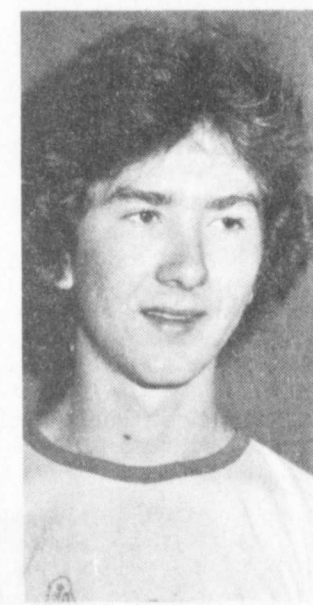

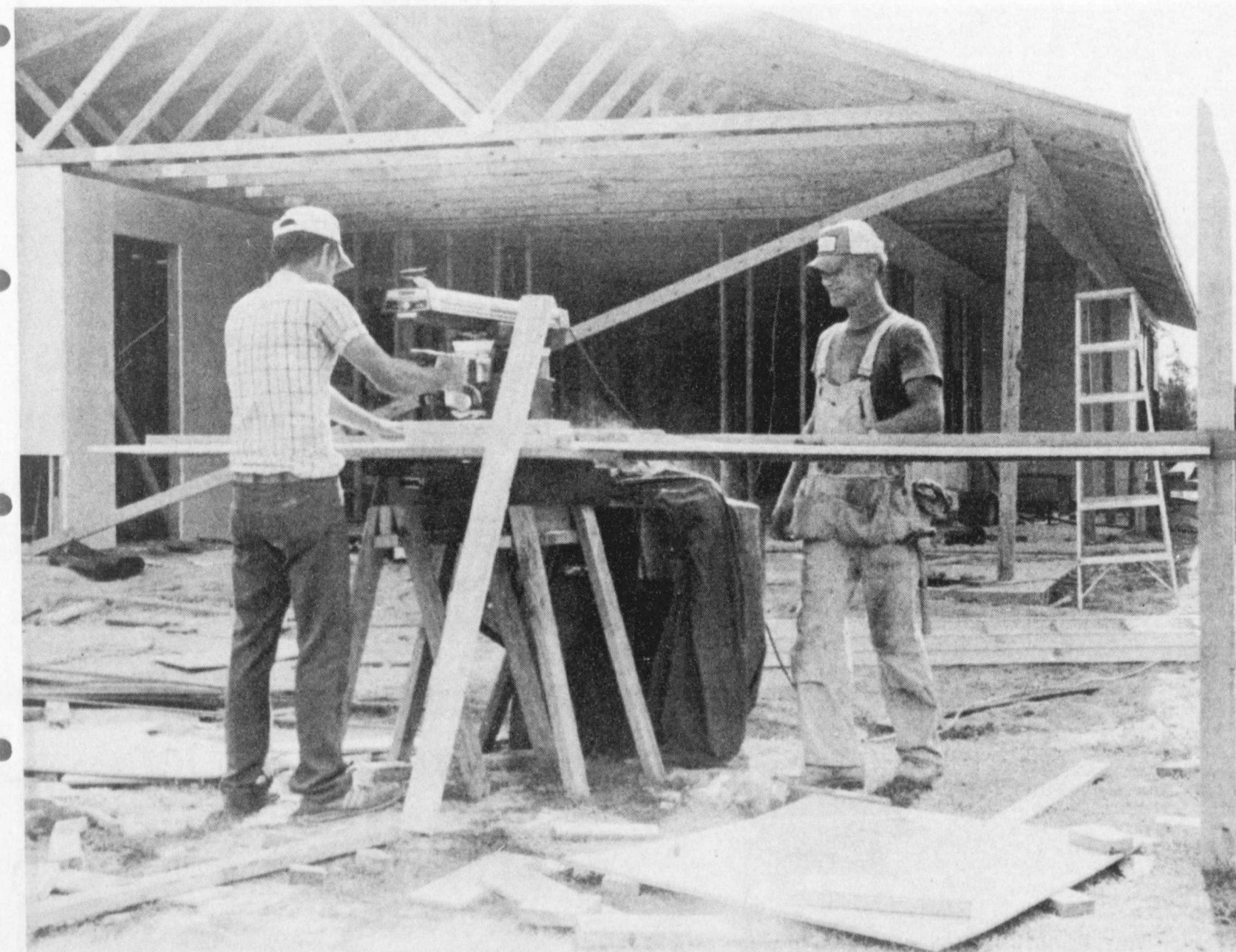

Texas has captured a first place award from the National Extension Homemakers Council for recruiting the most new members of any state to Extension Homemakers Clubs during 1979. Texas also took top place last year.

Mrs. Charles Warminski of White Deer, Texas, president of the Texas Extension Homemakers Association, will accept the award during the national council's annual meeting, July 23-27, in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Texas Extension Homemakers Clubs enrollment increased 25.7 percent during 1979. Hawaii placed second with an eight-percent increase, and North Dakota placed third with a 3.8 percent increase.

Texas Club members have made a special effort to reach young homemakers this year, with local clubs playing a major role in this.

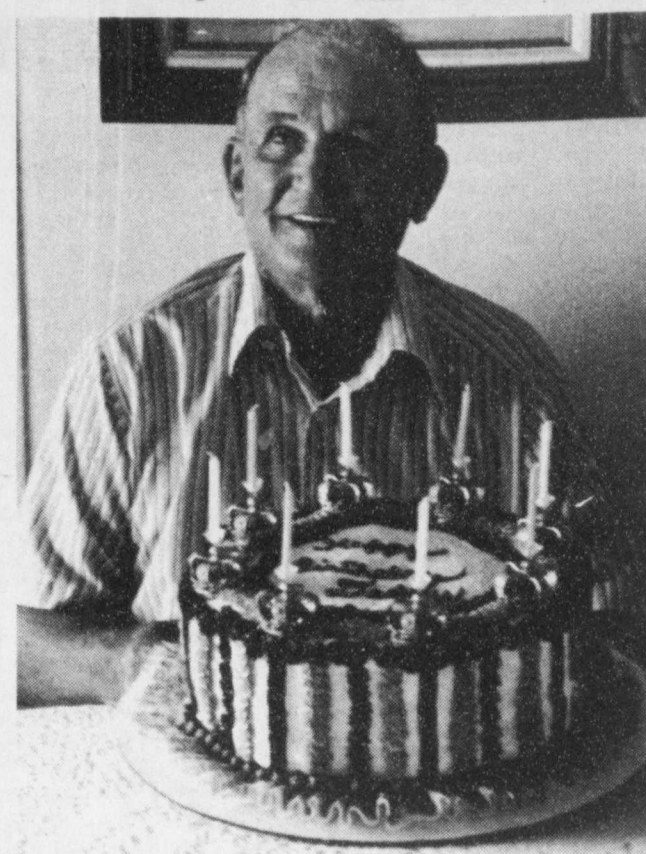

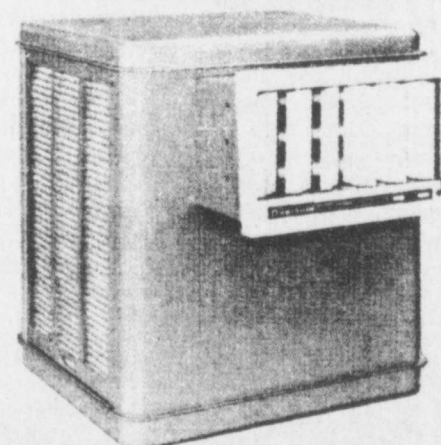

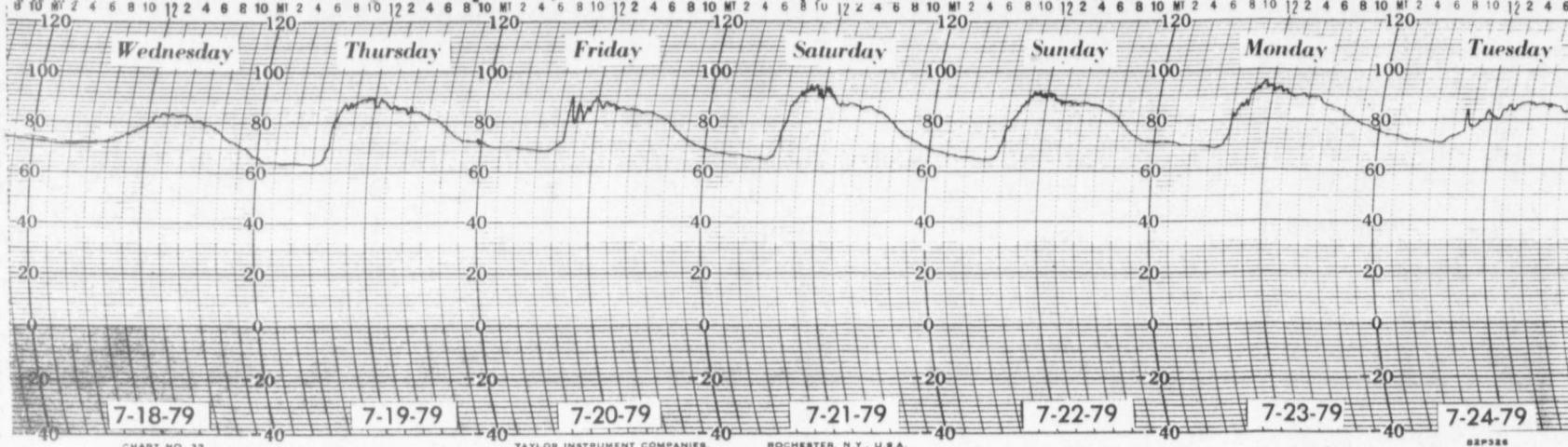

Fishing For Flathead Catfish Can Offer Sport

The largest freshwater sport fish in Texas, the flathead catfish, remains an unfamiliar species to many fishermen. The flathead is found statewide and is well established in most major streams and reservoirs.

The confusion regarding this species starts with the numerous common names applied to the flathead. In East Texas, for example, they are usually called Opelousas, Op or Ap, for short. The color pattern of the flathead varies greatly according to the turbidity of its habitat, which accounts for other colloquial names. In clear waters, the adult is dark olive brown with a mottled appearance, and fishermen refer to them as "bottom mollies." In muddy waters flatheads exhibit yellow tones and are commonly called yellow cats.

Successfully fishing for flatheads requires some knowledge of their feeding habits and habitat preferences, but primarily, it requires the correct type of tackle and bait. Occasionally a flathead will strike a bass fisherman's artificial lure. In fact, a 76-pound flathead was recently taken on Lake Murvaul by Jack Bishop with a blue Rebel lure and 20-pound testline. This fish will probably be certified as a new state record by the Parks & Wildlife Department records committee.

Obviously it is rare to take such large fish on light tackle. However, some fishermen prefer heavy-duty saltwater tackle and live bait to fish for flatheads. This method provides great sport once a catfish is hooked, but often requires patience while waiting for a strike. Perhaps the most popular method of catching flatheads is on a trotline. Many trotline fishermen who venture out

each year with equipment and bait designed for channel catfish have visions of bringing home a large flathead. While there are always exceptions to the rule, flatheads are usually strong enough to break away from light lines and small hooks.

A properly designed trotline for large flatheads should consist of 6-0 to 8-0 O'Shaughnessy style hooks, coupled No. 15 nylon seine twine for drop lines and a strong braided or twisted nylon main line.

Swivels for the drop lines are not a necessity but are beneficial if used properly. If swivels are used, avoid the common snap swivel or the trotline clips commonly sold. A heavy duty 5-0 to 6-0 solid brass barrel swivel is best. The purpose of the swivel is not to prevent a hooked flathead from twisting the line (as is the case with channel catfish), but to prevent live sunfish or other bait fish from twisting the drop lines. A trotline constructed of these materials will normally hold the largest flatheads and yet, if the hooks are kept sharp, will consistently catch even three to five pound fish.

A few strokes with a flat file when re-baiting will keep these large hooks very sharp and even new hooks should be filed to assure a good point. To prevent rusting when not in use, stored hooks should be thoroughly dried and sprayed with a light oil or anti-rust compound. Stainless steel hooks do not require as much maintenance, but they are relatively expensive and may have less temper or strength.

Rather than tying a half-knot on each swivel, such a knot should be made on either side of the swivel, thus allowing the swivel eye to rotate around the main line.

This provides a two-way swivel system and also assures the position of each swivel on the line. The small aluminum or brass brads used on light weight trotlines to position swivels will usually slip with large fish. Hooks should be spaced at four-foot intervals on the main line on 18-inch drop lines.

The techniques used in setting trotlines vary with individuals just as in other types of fishing. This writer is a firm believer in a "tight" trotline.

A flathead actually "inhales" its prey by forcing water through the gills and creating a strong suction action. As the prey is sucked into the mouth with a sharp lateral jerking of the head, the hook will normally penetrate in the side of the mouth and exit somewhere in front of the eye as the catfish moves off. A slack line allows the fish too much maneuverability and the hook will not be set. This is especially true in waters with submerged logs or rocks, which is favorite habitat of flatheads.

Proper tension may be achieved on a line by using heavy weights. Old cast iron window weights are ideal, but any weight of eight to 12 pounds will suffice. If the optimum fishing depth is not known, a single heavy weight in the center of the line will place the hooks at a wider depth range. A weight near each end of the line will place the hooks between them at a uniform depth.

An easy method to determine line depth is to tie a piece of light rope knotted at one-foot intervals at the center of the weighted trotline and lower the line on the rope. Then measure the rope length as the line is pulled up. While the depth is not critical during fall or early spring, a certain degree of water stratification occurs during summer months. Very little dissolved oxygen is present below the middle layer of water known as the thermocline. Under these conditions, bait fish will die on a line set too deep. Because flatheads feed exclusively on live bait fish, it is important to keep the lines set at the proper depth.

Control Spider Mites In Garden

Spider mites, or red spiders, are probably the most difficult pests to control in vegetable gardens. With hot dry weather approaching, gardeners should be on the lookout for this pest by checking the underside of plant leaves, advises Bob Moody, County Agent.

Although spider mites will attack almost any plant, among their preferred hosts are beans, tomatoes, peas, eggplants and corn.

Actually, spider mites are not insects but are eight-legged relatives of ticks and spiders. Their small size, about 1-60 of an inch, makes them difficult to see without a magnifying lens. They range in color from red, green and yellow to white and brown. Spider mites deposit their eggs on the underside of leaves. These hatch in about five days. There may be 10 to 15 or more generations per year, notes Moody.

Mites can cause considerable plant damage by sticking their needle-like mouth-parts into leaf tissue and sucking out the juice while injecting a toxic substance into the leaf. Heavy infestations will cause leaves to appear blotched or spotted, turn pale or yellowish in color, curl up, turn brown and eventually drop off. A thin webbing may cover leaves and stems.

Flatheads generally feed on all fish species, taking whatever is most available. In most waters, sunfish of all species and bullhead catfish are prime bait choices for fishermen. Sunfish should be hooked immediately behind the dorsal (top) fin. Some fishermen prefer to bait bullheads by running the hook through the mouth.

Care should be taken when checking a trotline because large flatheads often remain motionless on a line until the boat is directly over it. Unless completely exhausted, a flathead will make several powerful runs as the boat approaches. A fisherman should be alert and ready to drop the line temporarily if the fish is fighting hard. A poorly hooked flathead can effectively use its weight to tear the hook out if the line is held too tight.

A heavy fish gaff is best for boating flatheads weighing 30 pounds or more. Smaller fish may be netted with a heavy duty landing net, although extra caution

should be used when boating them in small boats or at night. A strong but inexpensive gaff may be constructed from a hardwood hoe handle and a 14-0 salt-water hook. This device is also useful in picking up the main line when baiting or checking the trotline.

Bass fishermen know the value of submerged creek or river channels in a reservoir. Knowing the location of these inundated streams is also important to flathead fishermen because they serve as pathways for big catfish. Often a trotline set parallel and immediately adjacent to a deep channel will be most productive.

In most counties, trotlines must be tagged with the owner's name, address and date it was set. All trotlines which remain in public waters must be redated at the expiration of each 90-day period. Also, trotlines may not be set in the vicinity of any public boat dock, bathing pier or swimming beach.

Siphoning Gasoline Is Potentially Deadly

Gasoline poisoning has increased "tenfold" recently, according to Mike Ellis, director of the Texas State Poison Center, and Ellis says the upsurge seems to be directly related to the gasoline shortage in the area.

Ellis says his department is receiving an average of ten calls a day about gasoline poisoning. "This time last year," he admits, "we were only getting about one call a day for the same thing."

The increased practice of siphoning, Ellis thinks, is a major connection between the rising number of gasoline poisoning cases and the gasoline shortage. He says adults, because of the shortage, are siphoning gas from car to lawn mower, from car to can to other car, and he calls this practice "dumb at the very least."

Gasoline siphoning can cause a person at least two major problems, he says. Ellis says a person can swallow gas while transferring it, and the effects can be serious, even deadly. "Gasoline can go into the stomach," he says, "if the epiglottis slams shut and does not allow it to go into the lungs." In the stomach it may be nauseating and may cause vomiting, he says.

"Once it is in the stomach," Ellis says, "it is absorbed, the aromatic hydrocarbons can sensitize the heart to any catecholamine, such as

adrenaline. "What this means," he continues, "is with gasoline in the stomach and the heart sensitized, if a person becomes startled or afraid or experiences any sudden emotion that causes adrenaline release, that adrenaline can potentially cause the heart to go into ventricular fibrillation. That person can be dead in four minutes, unless remedial methods, such as counter-shock, are performed."

Upon entering the trachea and lungs, the gasoline is quite irritating. "The lung tries to take care of the irritating liquid by diluting it. The most severe effect of gas aspiration, however, is that the oil-based product physically spreads out and coats the lungs. "Depending on how extensive the coating is," Ellis says, "will determine how much lung tissue is spared. It will determine if life can be maintained." In simple terms, aspiration can mean death.

"Children," Ellis says, "are more likely to aspirate petroleum products than adults." Ellis recently watched two 15-month-old girls, in unrelated cases, die of petroleum distillate aspiration. "We put them on respirators," he recalls, "but only about one-third of their normal body oxygen was getting through."

"Once a child ingests a petroleum product," Ellis says, "they're not out of the woods for 18 hours. We don't know whether they're absolutely clean for 18 hours."

Ellis says if gasoline ingestion does occur in the home, the first thing to do is call the Poison Center at 713-765-1420. "If there is a lot of coughing or choking, we'll send the person in for an X-ray to see what the baseline looks like. If there's no coughing or choking, we'll put the person on an 18-hour watch for fever, coughing, chest congestion or any signs that we may have an aspiration problem."

"Sometimes it may be that we tend to overtreat," Ellis says, "but we would much rather be safe than sorry."

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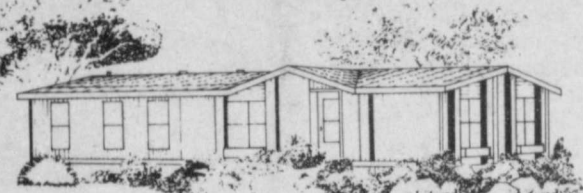

About Barbecues

The most difficult aspect
of barbecue cookery is tim-
ing. Success with the grill
depends on temperature of
your fire and the food.
Foods from the refrigerator
take more time than room
temperature. Stick to a
brand of charcoal that
you're familiar with -- for
heat intensity and length of
time it takes for the fire to
be right. All charcoals are
not the same.

The simplest way to start
the fire is with charcoal
lighter -- don't ever pour
lighter fluid on an already
burning fire.

Invest in some simple
long-handled tools, forks,
tongs, turners and brushes
for basting. A good spray
bottle with clean water is a
must to douse the fires that
pop up. Fat from the meat
or an oily baste will cause
the coals to flame. Trim
excess fat and build the fire
around a drip pan to catch
the grease.

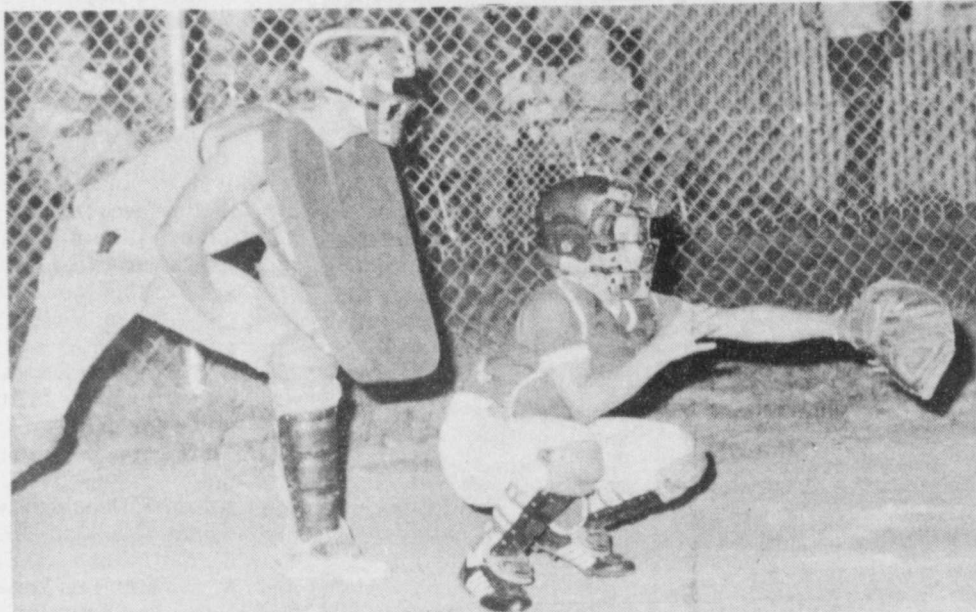

Be sure you have the right size and color, and make sure there are no defects in the merchandise, cautions Ms. Dannheim.

Use the "sale guide" below to plan your shopping, since each month usually marks special sales on various items:

July--marks sales on women's shoes, appliances, air conditioners, floor coverings.

August--marks sales on children's play clothes, white sales, furniture, back-to-school specials.

September--marks sales

on housewares, "Labor Day" specials, flower and vegetable seeds.

October--sales on lingerie, fabrics, fur-trimmed winter clothing and toys (pre-Christmas rush).

November--ladies coats and dresses, table linens, blankets, nursery plants.

December--toys, winter clothing.

Seaplane Landing Proposed

The New Orleans District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is proposing to lift the prohibition of recreational seaplane use on Lake O' the Pines and Wright Patman Lake in Texas.

According to Colonel Thomas A. Sands, New Orleans District Engineer, the proposed seaplane operations will not be permitted in the proximity of recreational areas, swimming beaches, small coves, shallow waters with stumps and trees and uncleared areas of the lakes, or in areas within 500 feet of the dams, outlet structures, and related facilities.

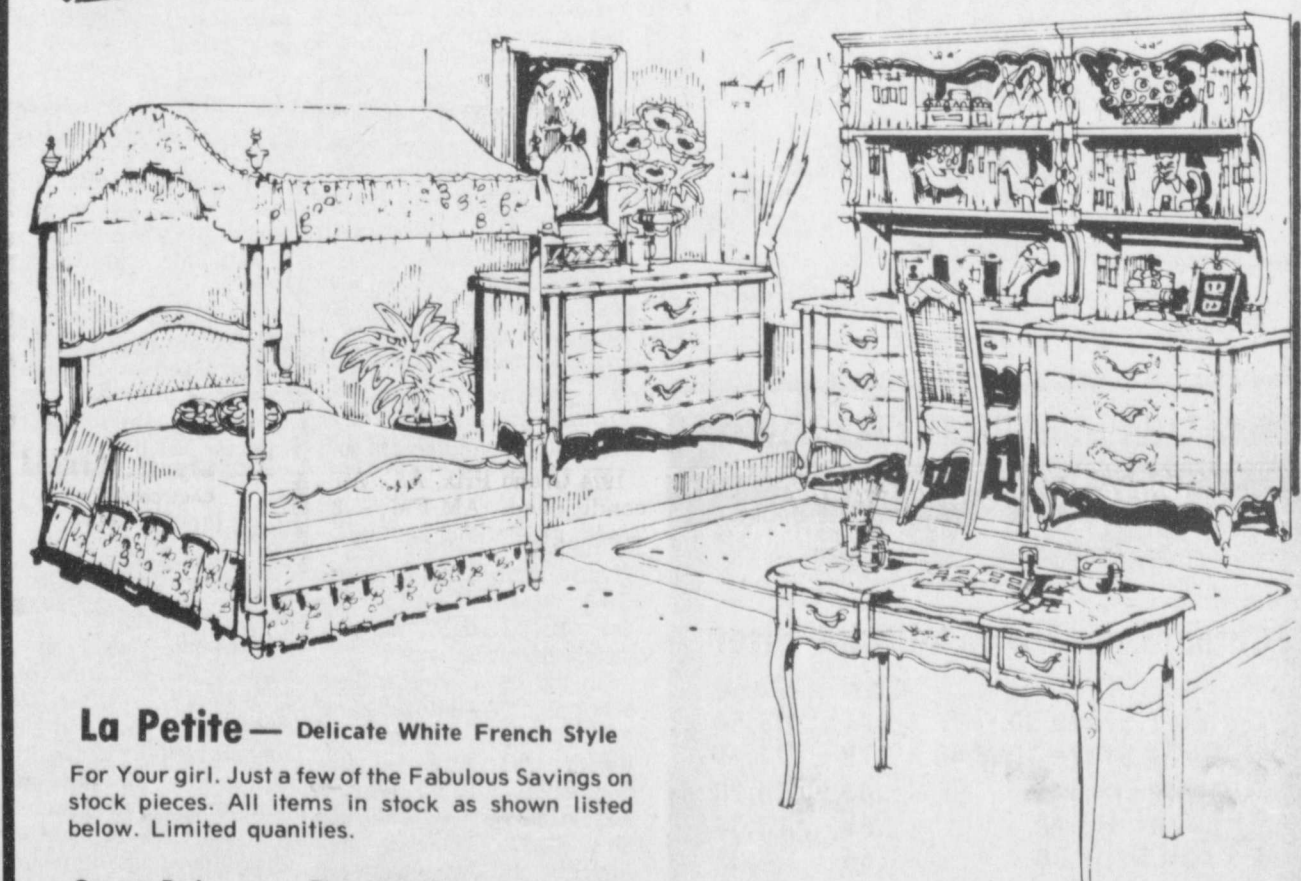
Recreational use of the lakes by seaplanes will be allowed, in general, in areas of deep, open water where recreation use conflicts and public safety hazards are minimized.

All comments received will be considered in the determination of the final policy on seaplane operation at the respective projects.

Additional information such as an environmental assessment and statement on the impact of recreational seaplane operation, as well as a map showing the proposed operating area, is available at Lake O' the Pines, Wright Patman Lake, and at the New Orleans District Office, P.O. Box 60267, New Orleans, LA 70160. However, public comments should be sent to the district office in New Orleans.

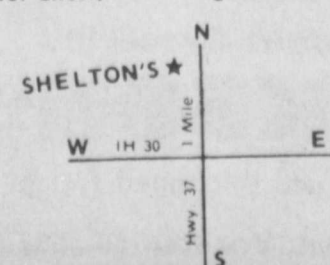
