New Pre-School At St. Joseph's Church

With the assistance of two Catholic Church Lay Extension Volunteers, the first pre-school for Non-English speaking children was recently started at the Parish Hall of St. Joseph's Church in Rotan.

The two teachers are Miss Clara Mallek of Stevens Point, Wisconsin and Miss Betty Pendleton of Madison, Wisconsin. Miss Mallek is a graduate of Steven Point College and Miss Pendleton is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

Under the direction of the Pastor, Rev. Benedict Zientek, classes are held on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday, from 9 until 10:30 a. m. Thirty children have enrolled, ranging in age from 4 to 6 years old. The group is divided into two classes with 15 in each class.

The course followed in the classes is the program outlined by the Texas Educational System. It is the "Texas Educational Pre-School Program for Non-English speaking". Attendance at the class has shown a perfect attendance record thus far. The course is primarily intended for the Underprivileged children of this area.

One of the chief highlights of the evening was a talk by Dr. James Landes, president of Hardin-Simmons University, concerning the merits of adult workers in Scouting.

Farmers Lunch Protest Against Low Prices

The recent action by the Department of Agriculture lowering cotton support prices \$5.00 per bale on the 1965 crop has met with mounting protest by cotton producers and businessmen over the cotton producing areas of Texas.

"This second cut in price supports on cotton farmers and the communities that serve them by the end of this year," Jay Naman, state president of the Farmers Union told Governor John Connally in a recent meeting in the Governor's office.

Naman went on to say that this cut along with others in feed grain and wheat prices are apparently the result of pressure from the President's Director of the Budget to slash USDA expenditures and indicates little understanding of agriculture by the person advising the President on these matters.

"The Budget Director," said Naman, "has apparently forgotten that the theory that reducing price will cause farmers to restrict production and will reduce government expenditures was exploded during the years of Secretary of Agriculture Benson when commodity storage stocks went to all time highs while government costs mounted and farm prices went to historic lows.

"Such expenditures as the school lunch program, meat inspection, foreign distribution of surplus food, conservation of our soil and forests are all charged to farm programs. The truth is that farmers are currently only benefitting from about 1-3 of the expenditures of the Department of Agriculture.

"It might well be that this administration's efforts to rid the nation of poverty by siphoning funds out of agriculture, could well thwart the program by creating poverty where efficient, self-efficient farming and ranching now exists.

Bankers in the efficient south plains cotton producing areas report a high percentage of their farm accounts unable to retire their notes this season. This is true in spite of the fact that the area produced the sixth largest cotton crop in history. Merchants are reporting a general slump in business and very slow collections in the cotton farming areas.

"Farmers Union members and their county organizations over the state with the help of local businessmen, bankers and civic organizations are launching a Protest Action Now program (PAN) designed to report documented economic conditions in the farming and ranching areas of the state through letters and wires to President Johnson, Secretary Freeman, senators and congressmen. It is hoped that the deluge of mail, calling attention to the crises in agriculture, will influence a reappraisal of present policies."

Soil Conservation Is Essential To Life

Agriculture is the largest industry in our nation. The basis of the industry is the more than three million individual farms and ranches of which basic resources are soil, water and plants. The security of conservation of these resources is essential to the very existence of life. Therefore the development of conservation plans for each of the millions of farms and ranches that will provide for the security of conservation of the soil, plant and water resources, should be the concern of every landowner and operator and each individual citizen.

In a talk to the Lions Club in Rotan last week, Milburn Cook, Work Unit Conservationist of the local Soil Conservation Service Office, pointed out that the local office worked in an area consisting of about 413,454 acres, which is only a portion of the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District. He stated that major agricultural enterprises include 225,913 acres on 1170 operating units of dryland cash cropland and 23 units including 200,000 acres of rangeland. Of the approximately 1200 farms or ranches that the local office serves about 700 have some semblance of a conservation plan. In relating what the SCS does Cook stated that farm and ranch conservation plans are developed by land owners and operators in cooperation with their Soil Conservation District and with technical assistance from SCS technicians. The conservation plans are based on decisions of the landowner and operator as to the type of operation he desires to follow, such as row crop farming, livestock farming or other. The basic principals of the conservation of soil, water and plants must be incorporated into the plan for success to be obtained.

Jack Willingham, SCD Supervisor, says that it is imperative that the business people in our small towns and urban areas become familiar with the problems of the rural areas and strive to work with these people and make conservation of our natural resources a joint venture as each depends upon the other for modern way of living.

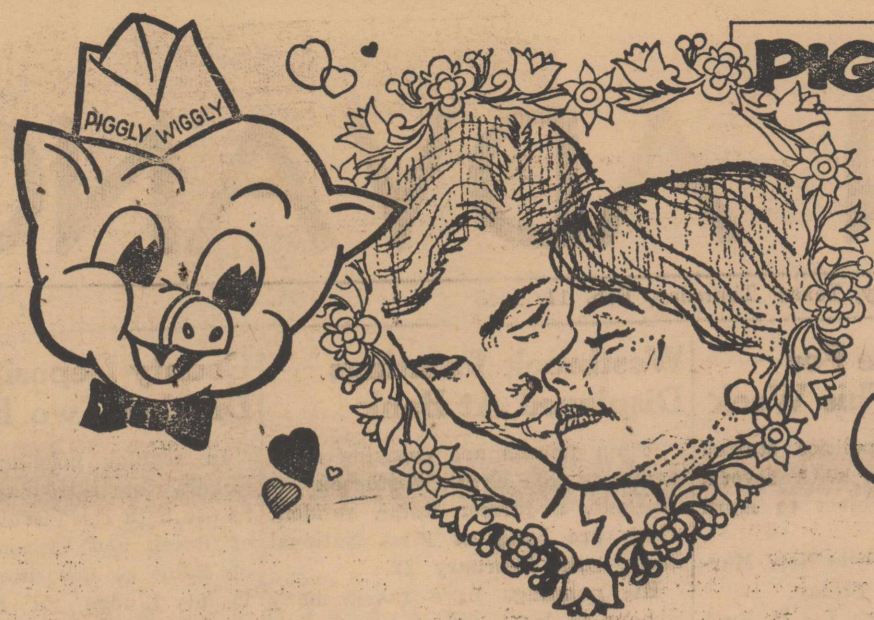
Lewis Berry Dies Of Extended Illness

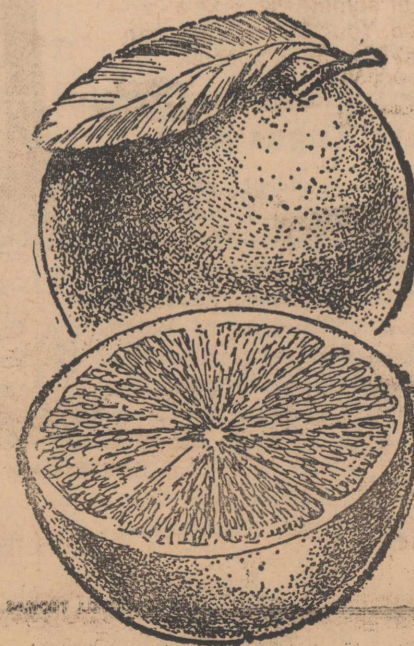

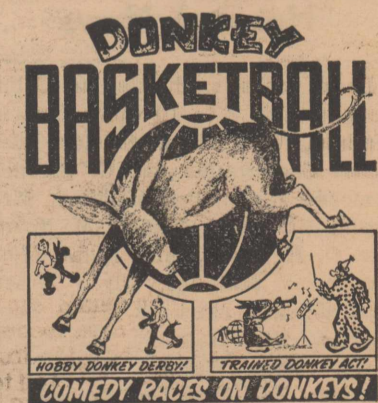

Mrs. Terrell prepared and broiled a one dish meal and served to Meses: Dora Wright, Wash Kersh, Barney Bigham, Dick Edwards, C. C. Roach, C. A. Ragan, J. W. Porter, Homer Aaron, and the hostess Mrs. Shell.

Recipe for Broiler Meal, Yield, 6 servings:

- Meat Mixture
- 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon pepper
- Mix and shape into 6 patties
- Cheese Mixture
- Cream together
- 6 tablespoons sharp cheese, and
- 3 teaspoons worcestershire sauce
- 2, (No. 2 cans drained whole kernel corn, seasoned with salt and pepper
- 4 cups cooked diced potatoes, seasoned with salt and pepper.
- 6 thick slices of tomatoes
- 6 thin slices of onions
- 6 well drained peach halves
- 6 teaspoons brown sugar
- I. Place potatoes along one side of broiler pan, place corn along other side
- II. Place rack on pan, add hamburger patties, turn switch to broil, place pan so that top of meat will be 4 inches from broiler unit. Broil meat on one side until brown about 6 to 8 minutes. Turn patties and broil other side.
- III. Place tomatoes on top of patties, top with onion slices, brush with melted butter, season with salt and pepper
- IV. Add peach halves, rounded side down, add one teaspoon brown sugar to each peach cavity.
- 5 Spread a tablespoon of cheese mixture on each patty - continue broiling until cheese melts and drips freely on corn and potatoes in the pan below the rack.
- Arrange on hot platter and serve at once.
- This makes a very pretty and tasty one dish meal.

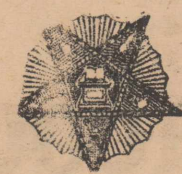

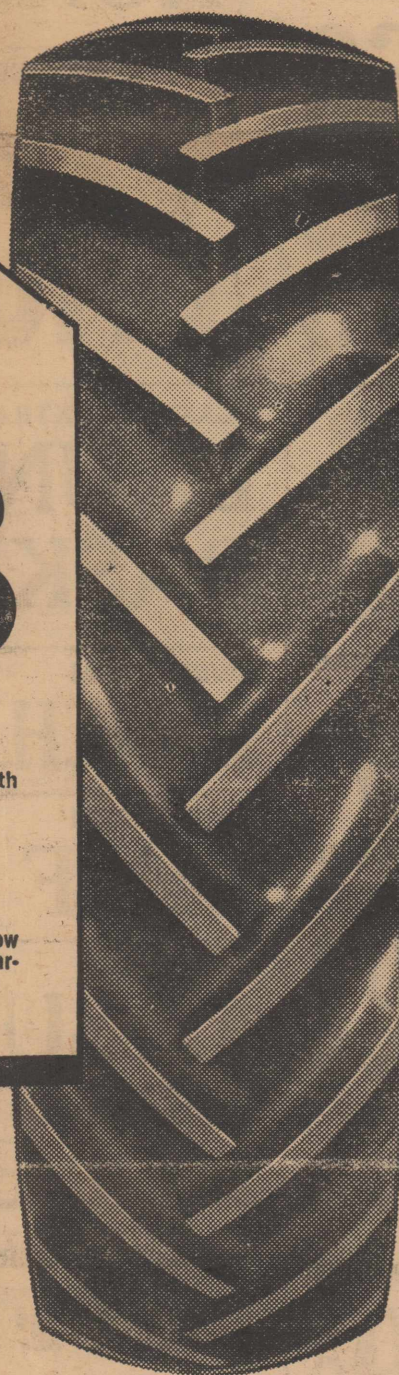

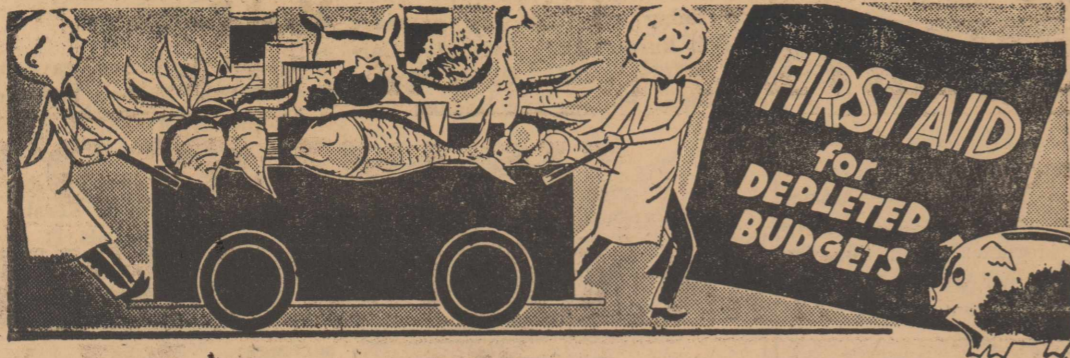

Early Inhabitants Of Our Region

If one had come through this region of Texas perhaps 80 or 100 years ago, it would not be a mere matter of physical discomfort and hardships--in a more literal sense, it would be a matter of survival. Any West Texan could probably come through the sandstorms, blue northers, eroded canyons, and schenery sand in flying color; the problem of survival would be imposed not by the elements, but by the local inhabitant.

About 300 years ago, an off-shoot of the northern Shoshoni Indians migrated southward. They drove the Lipan Apaches out of the area and settled in this region. These fierce, nomadic Indians played the leading role in the conflict between red and white men in this region. They were called Comanches and sustained a barbaric culture and yielded slowly to civilization. Due to their numbers and great courage, no one questioned their superiority. By stealing Spanish horses, they became "the Lords of the plains" and were in complete control of their domain. The Battle of Adobe Walls in June of 1874 did much to loosen the Comanche's strength in northwest Texas. They were constantly pressed by General R. S. Mackenzie and the Texas Rangers.

As early as 1852 the Comanches had been placed on a reservation on the Clear Fork of the Brazos but returned to the Plains to be free and hunt the migrating buffalo. They were finally forced to conform to the white man's ways, due to the onslaught of railroads and buffalo hunters, and the Comanches left Texas forever to the reservations of Oklahoma.

The name "Comanche" was one given the Indians by the Spanish. The Comanche word for themselves means simply "people." By this they don't imply that anyone is less human than they, but simply that anyone else just wasn't fortunate enough to be born a Comanche.

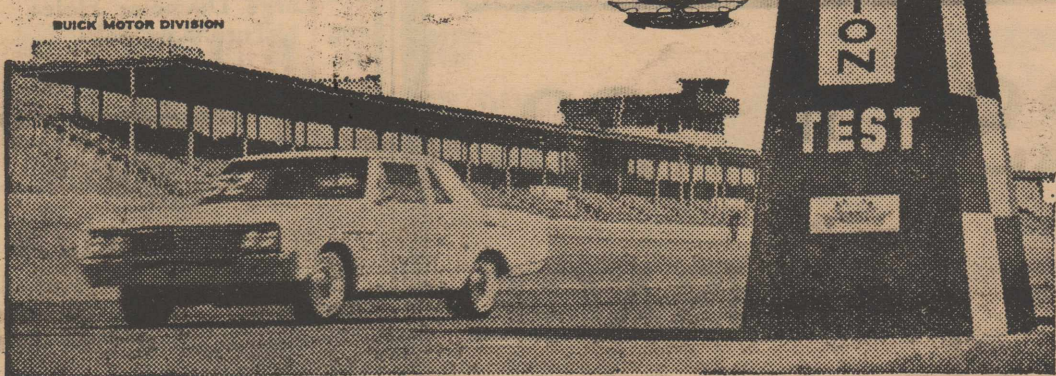

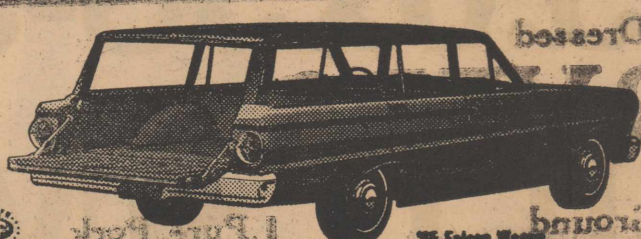
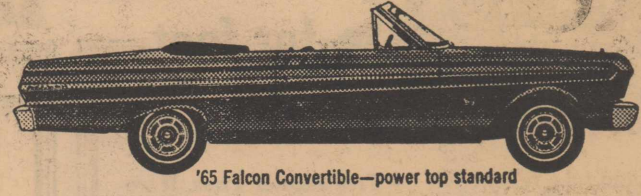

It costs money to feed cattle lice. These parasites are among the most damaging to beef cattle.

Cattle infested with lice spend a lot of time rubbing against fences, posts or other objects due to the annoyance caused by the insects. Cattle on feed do not gain as they should and require more feed for a pound of gain when infested.

Infested cows lose weight and their calves become prime targets for the pests. Reduced weaning weights of calves is one spot that really hits the pocketbook hard.

Cattle lice are common over the entire state and their populations build up rapidly after cool weather arrives in the fall, and include both biting and sucking types.

Sucking lice, short and long-nosed, pierce the animals skin and feed by sucking blood. They are usually found, on the sides of the animal's neck, on the brisket, back, inner surface of the thighs, tail and around the nose, eyes and ears. Chewing lice are smaller and are usually found on the top of the shoulders and around the root of the tail but may also infest other parts of the body.

Many chemicals are available for controlling lice as well as other external parasites of farm livestock. Because of restrictions and safety suggestions which apply to the use of the control measures, stockmen are invited to come by the extension office for a copy of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

Fisher County has a wonderful group of dedicated volunteer 4-H Club adult leaders who contribute their time, effort and money to promote and assist the 4-H Club program. And they serve without pay.

To assist them in reducing their 1964 income taxes, the local extension agents have information which lists a number of items they may claim as charitable deductions provided the leaders itemize their de-

ductions.

Among the items are out-of-pocket transportation expenses, including the cost for use of cars or trucks to and from 4-H sponsored events, necessarily incurred in rendering donated service to 4-H.

Actual unreimbursed expenses incurred by 4-H adult leaders in attending contests, training courses and other 4-H sponsored events. This includes meals, lodging and transportation expenses while away from home.

Also expenses for the cost and maintenance of uniforms and emblems required to be worn in performing the volunteer service and cash contributions and contributions of any kind, such as equipment, paints and other supplies. The amount to deduct is the fair market value at the time the gift was made. No deduction is allowable for the time contributed.

Leaders who claim deductions by itemizing their accounts are encouraged by the agents to keep accurate records throughout the year.

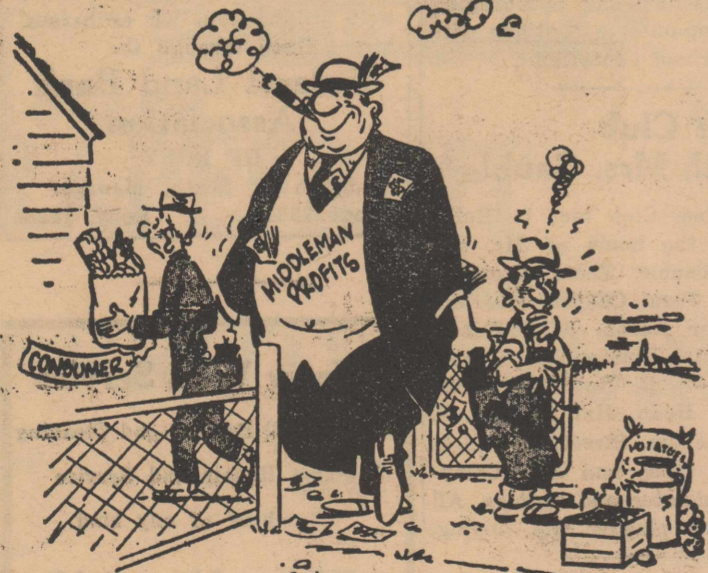
Cut Livestock Shipping Losses by Careful Handling --- Approximately 80 percent of the bruises which show up on beef, lamb and pork carcasses at the packing plant can be eliminated if the basic rules for handling livestock are observed. Frank Orts, Extension meats specialist at A&M, says elimination of these losses can add materially to the income of livestock producers through higher selling prices. It's simple, he says, just don't let anything happen to animals that could cause a bruise. And many are man made.
