Lynn County Sheriff Goes To Birmingham To Bring Suspect To Trial After Tahoka Drug Robbery

MRS. SANBORN TO BIRMINGHAM
TAMPA, Fla., July 22. (Special)—Sheriff Sam Sanford, of Lynn county, left here early this morning for Birmingham, Ala., where he will receive custody of Mrs. Delois Walker, wanted in connection with the robbery of the Tahoka drug company here on the night of May 1.

No announcement concerning the size of the loot taken in the robbery was made. Sheriff Sanford is contenting himself with saying, "I don't want to give that out now. It was a pretty good bit."

Alabama Troops Preserve Order

Governor Calls Militiamen To Guard Negro Charged With Murder And Rape; To Prevent Lynching

(By Associated Press)
MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 22.—Alabama National guard units were mobilized today to prevent mob violence to a negro charged with commission of a major crime.

Under orders from Governor Bibb to protect Lester Bouyer "at all hazards," two Birmingham National guard units were dispatched early today to receive the prisoner from the state prison authorities. They will take Bouyer to a point 90 miles southeast of here, where indictments charging him with the murder of Jack Hines, a Tulsa mechanic, and a statutory case against Miss Beatrice Clark, his companion, near Eufaula, are to be returned today by a grand jury. His trial is scheduled to open tomorrow.

The detachments were called out by Governor Graves at the request of Birmingham authorities, who stated that mob violence would be inevitable to cope with the threat of a lynching.

The state's chief executive declared "there will not be a lynching in Alabama if I can prevent it."

Two Fliers Risk Lives For Dog

COLLEGE STATION, July 22.—An airplane in which Lieut. C. F. Whitely of the Army Air Corps brought his dog to the veterinary hospital here from Fort Crockett was damaged in landing today. One wheel was jammed and the wings were damaged but Lieut. Whitely and his companion, Sergeant Major W. Farquhar, were not injured.

Ford Sued For Two Millions

TAMPA, Fla., July 22. (P)—Attorneys for Fred W. Furen, inventor, St. Petersburg, today filed a damage suit for \$2,000,000 royalties against the Ford Motor company of Detroit charging infringement of patent rights.

The suit contends that placing the gasoline tank within the body of the car, with an inlet on the outside, used on about 1,750,000 of the later models, infringed on a basic patent issued to Furen in December, 1924, although his plan was to place the tank under the seat with entrance through the side of the automobile.

Calles Is Given Rousing Welcome By Texas Cities

Dynamic Leader Of Mexico, Enroute To Europe, Gets Generous Applause From Lone Star Cities

SAN ANTONIO, July 22.—A dynamic figure in the recent campaign against revolution in his own country, Plutarco Elias Calles, former president of Mexico, tonight, with the applause of two American cities ringing in his ears, traveled across the United States to New York to embark for France in an effort to regain his health.

Entering this country at Laredo, where a district attorney once threatened to prosecute him for alleged connections with the slaying of two Mexican soldiers in 1923, Calles was given a tumultuous welcome by a crowd that gathered around his private car. A moment later a 21-gun salute boomed from nearby Fort McIntosh.

The former president was greeted at the international bridge by a delegation of Laredo business men, which extended an invitation to breakfast at the fort. Because of his health, he refused, adding he hoped to stay longer in Laredo upon his return trip.

A short time was spent in San Antonio, where again he was greeted by a large crowd and a delegation. He remained here 20 minutes, and left for St. Louis.

Two Marines Die As Plane Wrecks

WASHINGTON, July 22. (P)—Marine corps headquarters were advised late today that Captain Edward D. Howard and Private Robert K. Moody were killed this morning in an airplane crash south of Coahuila, Nicaragua.

Captain Howard's mother is Mrs. Maud D. Howard, of Oakland, Cal. Private Moody is the son of George E. Moody of Gallien, Ohio.

The airplane was reported to have fallen in the Coco river, but both bodies were recovered. Marine headquarters also were advised that Lieutenant Clarence M. Knight, a passenger in the plane, was seriously injured.

Two Civilians Killed In California Crash

Carlsbad Cavern Highway Body To Meet In Lubbock

November 11 Date Named For Next Session; Altus Meeting Results In The Passing Of Resolutions

To Ask Governors

Executives And Officials Of Highway Boards to be Invited Here From Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico

ALTUS, Okla., July 22.—Lubbock was selected, without opposition, as the next convention city in the closing session of the Carlsbad Cavern Highway association meeting held in this city today. The next gathering will be an annual affair and the election of officers will feature the program. Date for the meeting was set at November 11.

The Lubbock get-together will be an occasion for a sociability trip of representatives from towns along the route from Oklahoma City to Carlsbad, all delegations to go to the caverns on November 12.

Resolutions were passed to invite representation from such cities as St. Louis, Kansas City, Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Buffalo and Syracuse, N. Y., the latter place being the starting point for the federal highway, of which the Cavern Highway is hoped to be made a part leading from the northeastern part of the country to El Paso.

Governors and members of highway commissions of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico will be invited to the Lubbock meeting which is expected to be the best in the history of the association.

James C. Nance, former Lubbock newspaperman, has been acting governor of Oklahoma since last Friday, owing to the absence from the state of the governor and president of the senate. Nance is speaker of the House.

AIR SERVICE PLANNED

MEXICO CITY, July 22. (P)—A company has been formed to operate an airmail service from San Luis Potosi to Piedras Negras, Matamoros and Matamoros and expects to start service in October.

It is planned to carry passengers from Piedras Negras and Matamoros to San Luis Potosi in time to catch the night train from there for Mexico City, reaching the capital the following morning.

Senator Advises Probe On Liquor

Thomas, Oklahoma, Thinks Stock Should Be Taken Of Supply Before Permits To Distill Are Granted

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Postponement of contracts for medicinal liquor until a Congressional investigation determines what kinds should be purchased and the amount now on hand, was advocated today by Senator Thomas, democrat, Oklahoma, after announcement by Prohibition Commissioner Doran that the government soon would issue permits for distillation.

Thomas declared the nation was "facing very serious possible effects if the supposed supply has been depleted." He suggested that an inquiry into the relative merits of Bourbon, rye and Scotch and synthetic whiskey was in order.

Two Planes Still Soaring Toward Endurance Record

Texas, Missourians, Still Aloft; Two Forced To Land

(By Associated Press)
ST. LOUIS, July 22.—Confident of establishing a new world's record for sustained flight tomorrow, Dale (Red) Jackson, and Forest O'Brien, flew smoothly high over Lambert-St. Louis field tonight in their trim monoplane "St. Louis Robin" at 7:17 p. m. (Central Standard Time); the fliers had been up 228 hours and were less than twenty hours short of their goal.

If they are still in the air at 3:01 p. m. tomorrow they will have exceeded by one hour the present record of 246 hours, 43 minutes and 33 seconds, set July 12 at Culver City, Calif., by Loren Mendell, and Reinhardt.

The "Missouri Robin," sister ship of the "St. Louis Robin," was forced down today after 117 hours in the air. A broken oil line was given as the cause.

Governor Vetoes Number Of Bills Costly To State

Official Blue Pencil Goes Into Action Just Before Bills Become Laws; None Are Important

Memorial Cut Out

Crockett Memorial and Sam Houston Ground Bills In List Unapproved As Dan Moves To Cut Expenses

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, July 22.—Governor Moody tonight vetoed the Crockett bill appropriating \$100,000 for construction of a memorial building in honor of David Crockett at Crockett, blue-pencilled \$29,861 from the educational and departmental emergency aid measure, and disapproved a salary raise for county commissioners of Liberty county.

He also filed with the Secretary of State, without his signature, a local bill creating a new road law for Llano county.

Having been passed at the second Special Legislative session, the measures would have become laws tomorrow had they not been acted on by the governor tonight.

The Crockett measure, left on the chief executive's desk at the same time all other appropriations were disapproved at the end of the second Special session and sent back to the two houses for readjustment, was vetoed because money bills passed by the forty-first legislature already total near \$35,000,000, governor Moody said.

"This amount appears to me to be more than a reasonable increase over the past most of administering government and supporting the state departments and institutions," the veto message said. "In 1921, the appropriations amounted to less than \$25,000. If all of the appropriations passed by the forty-first legislature had been approved, the increase in a period of eight years would have been more than 100 per cent."

Other Items Stricken

Items stricken from the emergency appropriation bill for state-supported schools and departments of government include: \$10,000 to rebuild a barn destroyed by fire on the Ramsey State Prison Farm, \$8,000 to complete unfinished work for preservation of the home of General Sam Houston at Huntsville; \$5,000 to pay the salaries of instructors at John Tarleton Agricultural college, Stephenville, during 1929-29.

Mixed Reception Is Accorded Plan

'Co-Operative Europe' Gets Cheers And Frowns After French Leader Offers Plan To Unite Nations

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, July 22.—Proposals for the organization of a "United States of Europe" or a "Co-Operative Europe" which are expected to be outlined at the League of Nations assembly in September by French Minister Aristide Briand of France have met with mixed reception in Continental countries.

Although M. Briand intimated that the broad outline of his plan did not embrace the formation of a new political institution with a parliament and a president, information received in League of Nations circles indicates some publicists in smaller countries fear the plan would be tantamount to a new domination by the great powers in European affairs.

WAXAHACHIE, July 22. (P)—After wandering many miles in the last two weeks, living on wild grapes and peaches, Jim Fowler, 73, Midlothian farmer surrendered here today on charges of assault to murder.

Fowler is accused of having shot Sam Duke in the neck. Duke was indicted for an alleged offense against Fowler's daughter. Duke recovered. Fowler fled after the shooting and has been a fugitive for two weeks. He came to his home today, half starved and worn out by his experience and called officers.

Three Die, Score Injured As 1,300 Prisoners Revolt

Pitched Battle Results As Convicts Serving Terms Of Life Imprisonment Go "Berserk" In New York

(By Associated Press)
DANVILLE, N. Y., July 22.—With no possibility of having their sentences increased if they failed, and with at least temporary freedom if successful, a group of convicts serving life sentences at Clinton prison today led 1,300 inmates in a futile attempt to gain the top of the prison walls and the open country beyond.

In the riot which ensued the convicts fired a prison shop, smashed the dynamo providing the prison with light and power, injured two guards and forced prison officials to summon assistance from outside forces.

Three Are Slain

When the smoke lifted the rioting convicts faced a reinforced heavily armed guard posted on the prison walls, and marched back to their cells, leaving three of their number dead in the prison yard. Twenty more limped their way to the prison hospital to undergo treatment for gunshot wounds.

In a statement issued after the riot was quelled, Warden Harry M. Kaiser said trouble had been in the air for weeks, and that the smoldering fires of discontent had been fanned by a group of "lifers" sent to Clinton prison from other state prisons for disciplinary reasons. The last part of the riot was written Monday afternoon and explained she intended waiting till the end of the week but couldn't bear the disappointments of having Jack

GIRL IS IMPROVING

Unconscious 14 Days, Lass Hurt In Mishap, To Live

SAN ANTONIO, July 22. (P)—Lois Boltz, 14 year old daughter of Fred Boltz and Mrs. G. A. Schmidt of this city, will enter her 14th day of unconsciousness Tuesday following injury to the base of her skull, received when she fell from an automobile in Brackenridge park on July 9.

One of the doctors in charge of the case Monday declared physicians "have every hope for her," adding that she is recovering nicely. During the past week, he explained, she showed evidence of returning consciousness, and at times she knows what is said to her and will attempt to obey instructions.

Death Strikes At Dallas Couple In Hotel Argument

Mrs. J. J. Hourahan Shoots Husband To Death First, Then Turns Gun On Self To Complete Tragedy

Had Planned Act

Letters Left By Woman Are Mute Testimony Of Plans To Slay Husband And End Her Own Existence

SAN ANGELO, July 22.—Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Hourahan, of Dallas, were killed in a shooting in a local hotel here late today.

Police said Mrs. Hourahan shot her husband and turned the gun on herself. Hourahan was dead when bystanders reached him, and his wife died a few minutes later at a hospital.

The family came here from Dallas ten days ago. He was employed in the construction of a building here.

Justice of the Peace B. W. Smith, after an investigation announced that Mrs. Hourahan had shot her husband and then committed suicide. Letters found in the hotel room where the shooting took place indicated that she had been upbraiding her husband for "chasing around with other women."

Little is known of the couple here as they have had very little to say to other companions of the hotel. A pass book from a Detroit, Mich., bank was among their things.

Letters Tell Of Plan To Commit Suicide

SAN ANGELO, July 22.—Letters written by Mrs. Hourahan to her sister and mother in Enid, Oklahoma, indicated that she had planned the affair since July 11 and that she had been successful in buying cyanide "after having a device of a time and going to six drug stores."

Sanity Trial For Leahy Under Way

Four Jurors Selected When Court Closes First Day; Leahy Liable And Shows No Emotion In Court

GEORGETOWN, July 22.—Four jurors had been selected when court closed today in the sanity trial of H. J. Leahy, sentenced to death on a charge of murdering Dr. J. A. Ramsey, Mathis physician. If found sane by the jury, the sentence will be imposed. If insane he will be confined in an asylum.

The case is being tried before Judge J. D. Moore of Travis county. Judge Harry Dolan, being disqualified, the courtroom was packed with spectators. Warren E. H. Harrell and a number of representatives of the state and federal penitentiary guards, sheriffs and other officers attended the trial.

Bromley Not Yet Sure About Time For His Takeoff

Experts Test Plane He'll
Try To Fly From Tacoma
To Tokyo; Start May Be
Saturday Or Sunday

(By Associated Press)
TACOMA, Wash., July 22.—As soon as his monoplane "City of Tacoma" is in shipshape and the weather man tells him the route is clear, Lieutenant Harold Bromley said today he would take off on the longest non-stop ocean flight ever undertaken, Tacoma-to-Tokyo.

Just when the plane will be ready was uncertain. It may be ready by Wednesday morning but it might be Saturday or Sunday before the experts going over the engine condition for the long grind of more than 4,000 miles across the north Pacific.

Experts Test Plane
Three experts from a Los Angeles factory where the plane was built, went over it with Bromley today. The adjustments to be made all are minor but necessary, the experts said. The ship made the 1,000 miles from Los Angeles in a non-stop flight last Friday without serious damage.

One feature of the program was flown out today when word was received from Tokyo that permission to land had been granted to the flier by the Japanese government on request of the American embassy.

Bromley expected to start with 904 gallons of gasoline, enough to take him under normal conditions from 500 to 1,000 miles beyond Tokyo. He began today to study navigation instruments and weather charts. He will fly alone. A small radio will be taken, capable of broadcasting 500 to 700 miles.

Eaton Says More Moisture Needed

Part Of County Missed By
Saturday Night Rains, Is
Farm Agent's Report; He
Is Conservative On Crop

D. F. Eaton, farm agent for Lubbock county, Monday was somewhat conservative in expressing his outlook for the cotton crop provided rains continue. Business men of this city are optimistic over the outlook and express themselves as having faith in the ultimate yield.

"While the eastern half of Lubbock county was receiving precipitation Saturday night ranging from one-half to three-quarters of an inch, the western portion of the county received only spotted showers," said Mr. Eaton. "Shallowwater received no rain. Such a scattered rain indicates an uncertainty of the general condition."

He is thankful
"We have much to be thankful for," he continued, "but I do not believe in counting the chickens before they hatch. There is a good stand of cotton over the county, and with subsequent moisture to assure steady growth we should have a good yield throughout the county."

"I believe that the entire South Plains area is in a healthy agricultural condition, following bountiful wheat yields and excellent crop prospects."

Two hundred thousand acres have been planted in cotton in Lubbock county this year, representing a slight increase in acreage. The county yield last year was 35,000 bales.

Chinese Coolies Caught In Mine

SINGAPORE, STRAITS SETTLEMENTS, July 22 (AP).—Twenty-three Chinese coolies were entombed today in a tin mine at Papan, in Perak, when half the face of the Open East mine fell in. Efforts to dig out the entombed men were fruitless owing to the volume of debris. It was believed a subterranean river runs through the mine which is one of the oldest in the Malaya country.

Loss Of Lacoste May Hurt French In Quest Of Cup

George Lott Replaces Hunter On American Davis Cup Team; Tilden Only Veteran Left

NEW YORK, July 22.—Two significant developments today served to increase interest and prospects for a real battle when the United States plays France for the historic tennis trophy, the Davis Cup, starting Friday at the Roland Garros Stadium, Paris.

Following announcement here of the selection of George M. Lott, Jr., 22-year-old Chicago star, to replace Francis T. Hunter of New York in the singles for the American team, definite elimination of the ailing French ace, Rene Lacoste, from the forthcoming competition was revealed in Paris.

Tilden Only Veteran

The American team as announced by the United States Lawn Tennis Association on behalf of Joseph W. Wear of Philadelphia, chairman of the Davis Cup committee, will be composed of William T. Tilden, H. George M. Lott, Jr., Wilmer Allison and John Van Ryn. This is the tenth Davis Cup campaign for Tilden but the trio of younger players named are all newcomers to challenge round competition.

The plans call for Tilden and Lott to play in the singles Friday and Sunday, with the doubles on Saturday entrusted to Van Ryn and Allison, Wimbledon champions.

The French team as announced in Paris by M. Pierre Gillou, the captain, consists of Henri Cochet, Jean Borotra, Jacques Brugnon and Christian Bussu. Replacing Lacoste, who will share the responsibility with Cochet, holder of the American and Wimbledon championships. They also are expected to pair in the doubles but this may depend on the outcome of the opening singles matches Friday.

The loss of Lacoste, comes a severe blow to the French. No change is possible in the line-ups, under Davis Cup regulations, except as to the actual assignments given to the four players selected by each nation.

PARIS, July 22.—(P)—Replacement of Frank Hunter by George Lott on the American Davis Cup team tonight caused more comment in French tennis circles than the definite news that Rene Lacoste would not be a member of the defending team.

Apparently surprised by the switch in the American lineup, Pierre Gillou, captain of the French team after announcing his own lineup, said he picked from Henri Cochet, Jean Borotra, Jacques Brugnon and Christian Bussu.

Hunter played better tennis in the French championships this year than I ever saw him exhibit before in Europe.

Tennis followers here understood Hunter had been beating Lott consistently in earlier Davis Cup trials and that his selection for the matches against Germany was a result of such tests.

Bill Tilden, after reaching here from Berlin with the rest of the American squad, said:

"Of course I can't comment. I never comment concerning my own personal selection, whether placed on the team or whether I am dropped, so I cannot say anything concerning poor Frank, regardless of how I feel about it. Nevertheless, he added that Hunter had been playing magnificently."

NEW YORK, July 22.—(P)—The new American Davis Cup team dominated by youth for the first time in many years, presents unusual contrast, with Bill Tilden, now 36 and enjoying his tenth year campaign, 13 years older than the average age of his three team mates. Wilmer Allison is 24, John Van Ryn 23, and George Lott 22.

France on the other hand is represented by three of its veteran mucksters: in Cochet, Borotra and Brugnon, with a youthful fourth member in Christian Bussu.

French Debt Plan Expected To Come Up In House Early

Ratification Of Agreement Should Be In September: French Approval Predicted For Plan

(The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 22.—French ratification of the Mellon-Berenger agreement, now confidently predicted, is expected to receive prompt attention in the house after it reassembled late in September.

Ratification of the agreement probably will be added to the special session program of congress if, as indicated, the French senate agrees with the action of the chamber of deputies. Both chambers of congress will have to act on it before it can be made finally effective, but meanwhile preparations are being made to postpone the maturity date of the \$400,000,000 war supplies debt, which falls due August 1 but is provided for in the general \$4,025,000,000 agreement.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 22 (AP).—Fate, with the aid of a strong wind and a cigarette carelessly thrown into a lime depot Friday completely wiped out the old unsavory quarter of Angora, capital of the new Turkey, known as the fish bazaar.

It accomplished in eight hours what officials have been struggling with for years.

About 800 ramshackle wooden houses, shops and ancient bazaar booths, one hotel, three khans and one mosque were leveled by the conflagration.

The most serious aspect aside from individual losses was the fact that this district housed all butcher shops and vegetable markets causing a temporary food shortage.

The catastrophe left nearly 2,000 persons homeless. One person was burned to death and search was under way tonight for other bodies.

OUR HIGHWAY TO CARLSBAD'S CAVES
TO SOME people the meeting of the Carlsbad Cavern Highway association at Altus yesterday means no more than a yawn.

And the fact that Lubbock sent a delegation to the session, hoping to devise ways and means of better advertising the route, may not be of interest to the public generally.

But, as The Morning Avalanche sees it, the mission which sent the local delegation to Altus yesterday is one of the most important which this city has confronted in many moons. The Morning Avalanche thought so much of the proposition that it sent a reporter along, not only to cover the event but to become acquainted with the organization of the Carlsbad Cavern highway so this newspaper might do its part and Lubbock's part in furthering the highway.

Aside from the Carlsbad Cavern highway, which traverses Lubbock, there are three other routes leading to the famous caves from the North and East. They are one which goes in from Dallas and Fort Worth over the Bankhead highway; another which passes through Amarillo and into Northern New Mexico; and a third which goes into New Mexico by way of Plainsville. The Dallas highway, leading to the caverns by way of Lamesa, is a fourth route but is from the North and East hence is not considered a rival route of the Carlsbad Cavern road.

One can easily see why Lubbock should be interested in this route to the caves. It is the only route which passes through this city—our only chance to "cash in" on the popularity of the great natural wonder which lies almost at our gates. It profits Lubbock not at all to see tourists going to the caverns by way of Dallas, Fort Worth, Amarillo or Plainsville and it is time we were doing something to entice them this way. The Carlsbad Cavern highway, having its inception at Oklahoma City and passing through Lubbock, is the shortest route to the caves from the North and Central section of the United States. The reason it has not received the patronage other roads have received is because it has not been given the organized publicity which it should be given. That is the reason for the meeting at Altus yesterday—the "why" which sent a delegation of Lubbock men to the confab.

This is a day of advertising. In order to draw patronage for anything the public must be informed concerning it. Thousands of tourists are flocking to the Carlsbad Caverns as these great scenic wonders become more and more known throughout the nation. With a highway leading to these caverns by way of Lubbock we must advertise the fact to realize the maximum benefit from it.

For these reasons aforementioned The Morning Avalanche believes the Altus meeting was an important one to business interests of Lubbock. Further than that, it hopes Lubbock people will see fit to support the highway at every conceivable opportunity.

THE GROWTH OF LINDBERGH

That probably was just a casual off-hand remark of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh recently that he had not decided where to make his home and for the present his address would have to be just the United States of America. And yet there was a peculiar significance in it.

There have been a few men in history whom the world refused to localize and the probability is strong that history will claim Col. Lindbergh as one of these. He may eventually fix his residence in St. Louis or some other place but that won't much change the thought of the world concerning him.

Two years ago, just after his spectacular ocean flight, Lindbergh had an excellent opportunity to make his home address mean something. If he had followed advice freely offered him, his place would have been fixed. He would have done some high-priced movie, made the rounds of the vaudeville circuits, achieved a little rocket-like sputtering fame that would have netted him some cash and his address would have been learned from some local directory.

But he chose a course that gave him more latitude. Seven Greek cities claimed Homer, but none got him. The United States of America probably will remain the generally accepted address for Col. Lindbergh, no matter where he chooses to claim residence.

SPEED IS RELATIVE

There was a time in the history of motoring when speeding in the public's opinion was synonymous with reckless driving. It was natural, when one saw the remains of a traffic accident, to remark "Someone driving too fast" as it is to speak about the weather whether it is good, bad or indifferent.

As roads improved, automobiles became safer at higher speeds, drivers became more expert and everybody became "speed broke" through frequent motoring, legislators and the public awoke to the fact that accidents are not the result so much of speeding as of speeding in the wrong place. It is the consensus of opinion now that slow driving in the wrong place causes more accidents than fast driving in the right place.

Everywhere legislators are raising the legal maximum rate of speed, and even where the limits are operative the police do not enforce them except at times and places where fast driving amounts to reckless driving.

A mile a minute is no longer considered a tremendous speed, even for motor cars, but under certain conditions a speed of twenty miles an hour may be dangerous. By common consent it is criminal carelessness for one to pass another car on a blind curve or at the top of a hill. Fast driving at blind road intersections is another breach of the rules of caution.

Fourth of July maniacs are still with us. But they are not alone in gauging patriotism by volume of sound.

ENTOMOLOGIST DOESN'T THINK INSECT WILL EVER RUN MANKIND OFF EARTH

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Some scientists predict that insect pests ultimately will run mankind clear off the earth.

Associate Chief A. L. Quintance, of the agriculture department's entomology bureau, thinks not. "Warfare between the rival kingdoms will never end," he agrees, "but human intelligence always will be equal to keeping it going, on more or less even terms."

Yes, but how about insect intelligence? Just because we consider ourselves mighty smart, as human beings, are we safe in assuming that insects, in their way, are not pretty smart?

Dr. Austin H. Clark, the Smithsonian Institution's great authority on biology, speaks very respectfully of the insect mentality.

"In the animal world," he remarked to me the other day, "monkeys generally are classed next to man, but the highest type of monkey has not risen to an understanding of the use of tools."

Insects have. The mother wasp, of one species, when she buries her eggs in a hole in the ground, with a caterpillar she has stung, for her children to feed on, pats down the earth over her cache with a tiny pebble. Another species sweeps off the place with a small twig.

"Tools!"

"True enough," nods Dr. Quintance. "The bees and wasps—the hymenoptera—are at the top of the insect scale."

Their facility with the tamper and broom is not their only remarkable characteristic. They show considerable solicitude in their care for their young, and their community life is wonderfully developed.

However, insects, I call it, not intelligence.

"Of course," conceded the entomologist. "It is a little difficult to draw the line between the two—something a matter of definitions."

At any rate, on close study, do insects manifest superior mental situations by power of sheer reasoning? Some of the lower animals—dogs, maybe, make a dash show signs of it—almost human occasionally.

But not insects. In my opinion. With them, I take it, to be purely an instinct of race survival.

At any rate, on close study, do insects manifest interesting and even likable qualities—like animals?

"Interesting, very," replied Dr. Quintance. "Hardly likable. I think most people feel a repulsion for them—except, probably, for butterflies. The repulsion disappears with familiarity, but no particular liking takes its place. I myself would not care for a pet insect—well, as I am acquainted with them."

"Still," continued the doctor, "they are entertaining, as well as instructive to watch."

"For instance, if one likes lights, they stage some magnificent ones—altogether, according to the kind of insect. No quarter given or asked. What about the entire triangle?"

"There are a good deal addicted to cannibalism. 'Not lovable creatures, you see.'"

Then hostility is nature's law between bugs and men.

"Not exactly hostility," rejoined Dr. Quintance. "So far as we and the bugs are personally concerned, I believe we might lead our separate lives without interfering with one another—but our interests clash."

"We of the human family realize it, and without ill feeling because we must kill all the noxious bugs poisonous to us. I mean, we can't."

"The bug in my judgment, goes his way serenely, unaware we are here."

FAULTY DIET MAY BE THE CAUSE OF SERIOUS BODILY ILLNESS

The most frequent cause of America's most common disturbance is bad diet. The best advice toward correction of this disturbance is the use of correct diet.

Much of the trouble with the action of the bowels of the people of America is sophisticated foods which provide little or nothing to encourage bowel action. Another frequent cause is the choice of foods poor in important food factors. All too frequently the daily water intake of many people is below the average of six glasses a day which should be the minimum, and quite below the eight glasses a day recommended by the physiologists.

Finally, the speeding up of life and the demands of the machines for and by which human beings live have destroyed the regular habits of bowel action which prevent constipation in less mechanized nations. In some instances obstruction once noted is overcome by use of laxatives and then of cathartics until the tissues lose all initiative and must be whipped every time into action.

In order to overcome obstruction and lack of action of the type that has been described the reverse procedures are necessary. A regular time of action must be established through encouragement of habit. The person should drink invariably six to eight glasses of water each day. The use of drugs and regular injections of fluid must be deprecated in order that automatic bowel action be encouraged.

A diet must be taken which is rich in fruits and bulky vegetables so that the musculature of the intestines will have something to act upon.

If such a diet is taken it will have in it sufficient amounts of vitamins B and C to take care of the needs of the body for these substances.

All too frequently the attempt to correct slowness of bowel action by diet begins with the use of bran or grass which remains green when others wither in hot weather. How pleasant to watch the cows of North Carolina, contentedly chewing their kudzu.

GRANT'S DEATH

On July 23, 1885 General Grant, sixteenth president and at Mount McGregor, near Saratoga, N. Y., from a cancerous affection of the throat.

Grant son of an Ohio farmer graduated from West Point in 1843 and served with distinction in the Mexican War. He resigned, however, from the army in 1854 and was working for his father at \$800 a year when the Civil War started.

Commissioned a general and ordered to a command in the west he rendered important service there and won the first major victory for the federal in that sector when he captured Fort Henry and Fort Donelson. His success was so great that on March 17, 1864 he was appointed commander-in-chief of the federal armies. Grant, though unsuccessful in man design so crippled the Confederates that they paved the way for ultimate victory and the end of the war.

Grant entered politics as secretary of war under President Johnson. He was re-elected as presidential adviser to both parties and each sought to name him as its candidate. He was, however, never a Republican in nature. He accepted their nomination in 1868 and was elected by a overwhelming majority.

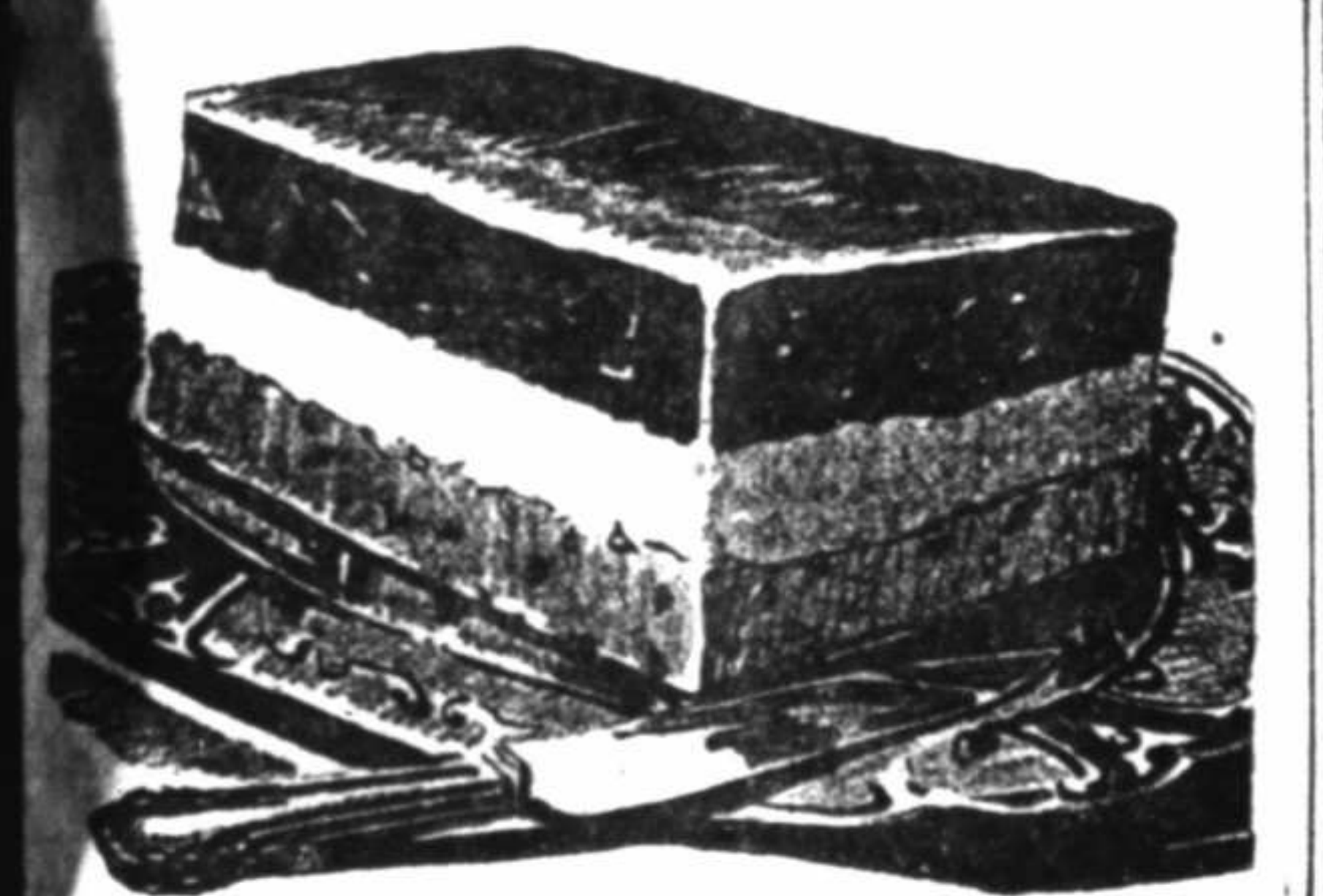

Cotton Reactionary; Wheat Up Again

Grain Prices Go Whirling Upward At Furious Rate

Dollar-fifty Mark Passed As New Conflagration Is Noted In Wheat; Oats, Rye, Corn Move Up Also

By JOHN P. BOUGHAN, Associated Press Market Editor

CHICAGO, July 22. (AP)—Ablazing into a new conflagration today, the wheat market went whirling upward again at a furious rate, and left \$1.50-a-bushel prices far outdone. Speculative buying took on break-neck speed, and raced values up to 5c above Saturday's closing level. Meanwhile, spring wheat crop conditions were reported as fast becoming more and more wretched with an authoritative estimate of yields in the Canadian prairie provinces putting the total at 219,000,000 bushels, showing last year's figures reduced already much in excess of one half.

Close Is Executed

Wheat closed excited, 7c to 7 3/4c higher than Saturday's finish. With rye showing 5 3/4c to 5 3/8c gain. Corn closed 2 1/4c to 3 1/8c up, oats 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c advance.

Surprise over sudden advances in price at Liverpool, where setbacks had been expected, did much today to let the wheat trade afire in Chicago.

Dispatches from Winnipeg interpreted the Canadian grower's pool report as forecasting only 34,000,000 bushel yield this season in Manitoba. 133,000,000 bushel in Saskatchewan, and 62,000,000 bushel in Alberta. Faced by such a showing, huge profit-taking sales here were rapidly absorbed.

Corn, oats and rye moved up with wheat.

Illinois, Indiana, Missouri and Kansas crop reports told of unusual backward conditions of court growth.

Provisions sagged owing to a dip in hog values.

Slump In Stocks Feature Of Wall Street Tradings

Despite Hike Of Grain And Good Earning Records, No Life Shown In Activities Of Gotham Exchange

By CLAUDE A. JAGGER, Associated Press Financial Writer

NEW YORK, July 22. (AP)—Despite a sharp upturn in grain prices, and a series of highly satisfactory earnings reports, the stock market fell into the most decisive slump today that has been witnessed since May.

The decline was orderly with 3,674,480 shares changing hands. Most losses were limited to a few points, although a few high priced issues closed from 10 to 50 points lower.

Although the day's news was predominantly bullish, the market appeared to have discounted the favorable condition of industry for the time being and to have reached an oversight condition.

Call Money Up

Call money renewed at 7 percent for the first time in two weeks, and held at that figure all day. About \$20,000,000 in loans were called.

Money brokers said the plentiful supply was due rather to lack of demand than to influx of new funds. Time money held at 7 3/4 to 8 percent in all maturities.

Prominent in the day's news were the earnings statements for the first half of the year of General Electric and Westinghouse Manufacturing, although the former was not disclosed until after the close of the market. General Electric

earnings \$4.26 per share, as compared to \$3.32 in the like period of last year. Westinghouse net was equal to \$4.82, compared to \$3.31 in the first half of 1928.

Trust Group Affected

Reports of favorable earnings and pending important developments, and a 10 point jump in national investors to a new high at 125 1/2 half of which was lost on realizing, featured the investment trust group.

New peak prices were registered by Aluminum Limited, American Pneumatic Service, Blaw & Knox, Guardian Fire Assurance, and Penn-rail.

Consolidated instrument, which has sold as high as 35 this year broke 10 points to a new low at 11.

Gulf Oil of Pennsylvania broke more than 3 points and several others yielded a point or more. Standard of Indis broke in a small fraction of a point.

Allied Chemical Drops

A break of 10 points in allied chemical, later reduced by a point, was rather surprising to Wall Street as big things have been looked for from its atmospheric nitrogen plant.

Chemicals generally were under pressure. Motors were again heavy. Although Chrysler's earnings statement was expected to be fairly satisfactory, the stock sagged 1 point to within less than 2 points of its 1928 low.

General Motors dropped more than a point to a new 1928 low at 66 5/8.

Steel Is Hit

U. S. Steel lost more than 3 points. Bethlehem reached a new peak, but closed off a point, net.

Wheat futures shot up 7c a bushel and more as a result of the lack of rains in Canada and corn advanced about 3c a bushel.

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Liverpool Comes In Weak So Drop Follows In U. S.

Good Weather Reports Also Aid To Decline; Rush Of Other Markets Leaves Little Mark On Cotton

NEW ORLEANS, July 22.—Cotton developed a reactionary trend today. Weak Liverpool cables, favorable weather over the week-end, a weaker technical position and hedge selling combined to induce selling by recent buyers.

After declining 15 to 16 points in the early trading there was a rally of 8 to 9 points but that was soon followed by a further decline which carried prices in the late trading down to levels 28 points under the preceding close. October which closed at 19.22 Saturday declined to 18.94 down 28 points, and closed at 18.97 or 28 points net lower for the day. The general market closed 25 to 30 points down.

Liverpool Worse Than Due

Liverpool came in 8 to 11 points worse than due. Prices eased in early trading on favorable weather in the belt until October dropped to 19.06 and December to 19.27 or 15 to 16 points under Saturday's close.

There was a moderate rally of 8 to 10 points at the end of the first hour but the market soon turned easier again owing to the forecast for continued good weather and hedge selling which eventually carried December to 19.14 or 28 points below Saturday's close.

The close was a shade above the low with October at 18.97 and December at 19.17 or 23 points net lower for the day.

raphers, General Calles refused to discuss internal affairs of his country. Neither would he comment on the alleged slaying charge at the border city. He said his return from abroad would be governed by advice from his physician.

A number of friends, his half brother, Arturo Elias and his physician, Dr. Rascas Margo, accompanied him.

As the train including General Calles' private car pulled into San Antonio, 300 Mexicans shouted "viva Calles!" and as the train came to a stop, Mayor C. M. Chambers, Commissioner Paul E. Steffler, Commissioner Phil Wright, William B. Purlong of the Chamber of Commerce and Enrique Sanibañez, Mexican consul-general here, stepped forward to greet the former Mexican president. Calles appeared on the rear platform of the car and the cries of "viva Calles!" drowned out individual speech until Calles had bowed and smiled his greetings.

Not Wanted In Laredo

Shown before the arrival of the train Sheriff Jerry Condon at Laredo that if the Laredo sheriff would care to be relieved of the embarrassment of arresting Calles there that Newton would be glad to oblige him if Condon would wire the charge against the Mexican. Condon replied that Calles "is not wanted" in Webb county where Laredo is situated.

Russian-Chinese Trouble Fades Into Mere Fuss

Reports Telling Of New Note Are Heard At Peiping

War-Like Moves Regarded Unfounded When Given By Jap News Sources; Washington Relaxes

(By Associated Press.)
The Russian-Chinese trouble over Manchuria seemed to have entered a quiet phase with reports from Peiping that the Nationalist government had dispatched a new note to Moscow reiterating China's desire to settle disputes by peaceful negotiations.

The Moscow government declared that it could not be expected to accept the Chinese refusal to restore the status quo on the Chinese Eastern railway as a preliminary to negotiations.

Neutral observers in Peiping who assembled a wide range of information reached the conclusion that they had been no clashes between Chinese and Russian troops on the frontier.

The feeling of tension in Washington, diplomatic circles, was greatly relaxed by visits from Chinese Minister Wu and French Ambassador Claudel to Secretary of State Stimson.

The Chinese Minister informed the Secretary that the Nationalist government intended to abide by the Kellogg pact. Ambassador Claudel repeated the same assurance after the latter's interview with Ambassador Dargatsky in Paris.

Most rumors about fighting came from Harbin, source of innumerable unverified reports on the situation, and were accepted there to the extent

that Russian Consul-General Meinikoff was detained by the Chinese authorities. The Chinese said Russians had fired on Chinese forces and refused to visa his passport until, presumably, they had investigated the reports.

Meinikoff has been freed and expected to leave Harbin at once for Russia.

Concentration of Russian and Chinese troops was unchanged along the frontier, but the nearest incident to a warlike act reported was an unconfirmed Japanese news agency message that a Chinese gunboat had been seized by Russians at the confluence of the Amur and Argun Rivers.

Man Is Burned In Fire At His Home

John Kilian was burned about the face and hands Sunday morning about two o'clock following attempts to extinguish a fire that destroyed his home at the corner of 23rd street and Avenue L. He was taken to the Lubbock sanitarium where, Monday, he was said to be resting easily.

The blaze was observed in the ceiling of the kitchen when Mr. Kilian started to make a fire for some coffee. He and Mrs. Kilian had planned a trip to Tulsa Saturday night but were delayed and were making last minute preparations when the fire started.

"Three Nuts" Return From Journey To County Seats Of Texas; Crops Of South Plains Have Best Outlook

LEVELAND, July 22.—The self-styled "three nuts" that have just completed a non-stop automobile tour of Texas, visiting every county seat town in the state arrived back home at Leveland last night.

"We've seen lots of good country but we are glad to get back home to a country that we think is the best," Walter Wright stated upon the return.

Gene Over Month
The party left Leveland June 20 and was gone a little over a month, ending the trip at Dallas, July 20, and returning here last night.

"Crops on the South Plains are looking better than any other section of Texas with the exception of two or three places we visited," W. C. Breedlove stated upon returning.

Burned 551 Gallons
Members of the party are, Walter Wright, W. C. Breedlove and H. C. Gore. They burned 551 gallons of gasoline and did not stop the motor of their car on the entire trip. Oil was changed eleven times, a hose

connection was made and each of the four spark plugs were changed without stopping the motor. The car is running as smoothly as it was when the party left Leveland.

Mexican's Family Asks Damages For Herdsman's Death

Suit Filed Against Local Ranchman Follows Death Of Carrasco; \$50,000 Is Asked In Two Actions

Following the fatal shooting of Francisco Carrasco, Mexican, Thursday on a Cochran county ranch, action was instituted Monday in the Cochran county division of the 72nd District court, for \$25,000 actual damages and \$25,000 exemplary damages against W. T. Strickel, Lubbock rancher. The petition was filed by Lockhart and Garrard, attorneys for the plaintiff, the mother, widow and three children of the deceased.

Strickel is charged with murder in connection with the shooting of Carrasco at Strickel's ranch Thursday. Habeas corpus proceedings followed in this city after refusal of Justice of Peace J. P. Taylor to bail the prisoner after preliminary hearing at Morton.

Plaintiffs in the damage suit, represented by Lockhart and Garrard of this city, are Senora Carrasco, mother of the deceased, Felesora Carrasco, widow, and Petro, Juanito and Josepina, children.

In their suit the plaintiffs charge that Strickel with malice aforethought, unlawfully shot and killed Francisco Carrasco. Strickel claims he shot in self-defense.
