Garza brings color to church statues

Irene Garza, of Lockney, uses her talent to repair and paint religious statues for churches around the area. She recently repainted the statue of the Virgin Mary which stands in front of the Sacred Heart Mission Church at Petersburg.

"I have always painted," Mrs. Garza stated. "Every since I was a little girl I have painted, but there wasn't time while we were raising our family. Then in 1979 I lost four fingers in an accident at the Tye Company. I was so depressed that I started painting again. I got a lot of encouragement from the people at Tye's and from my family."

"The first thing I did was replace the arm that was missing from the baby Jesus. Then I repainted him and the Virgin Mary holding him. Then churches and people started calling and asking if I would paint statues for them. Since then I have done a lot of painting."

"When we were going to have our twenty-fifth anniversary at San Jose Church, Sister Mary Rose and Sister Margarita asked me to paint the statue of Jesus and the fourteen stations of the cross. The stations were all white with raised figures and I painted them

with soft colors so you could see them against the white wall."

"I do a lot of meditating and praying while I am painting. I pray for peace in the world, safety in our schools, but mostly I pray for the children. They need our prayers and our help," she said.

"When I finished the statue at Petersburg the Rev. Timothy Judd gave me an unpainted statue of the Virgin Mary to paint for the San Jose Church. I want to have it finished by Christmas so we can put it up outside the church."

Mrs. Garza stated that she appreciated all the churches she had painted statues for. "They make me feel so blessed."

In the accompanying photo Mrs. Garza is seen with a figure of Jesus hanging on the cross.

The symbol was used by Joe Garcia when he was named a deacon in the church and took his vows. The

cross was given to her by Garcia's wife, Beatrice, after he passed away. "I treasure the gift. She is a dear friend," she stated.

Irene and her husband Jesse are the parents of four children, Linda

Johnson of Nacona; Yolanda Hernandez of Odessa; Jesse Jr. and Phillip Garza both of Lockney. Their twelve grandchildren include Auroro Gonzales, Jr. whom they raised.

Detention Center surveys show approval of facility

One hundred and thirty-three surveys, concerning a Juvenile Detention Center in Floydada, have been returned to the Juvenile Probation Officer Bruce Ballou.

The possibility of converting the old Caprock Hospital Building into a Juvenile Detention Center has been presented to the public and surveys were printed in last week's newspaper.

The majority of those returning their surveys were in favor of the detention center being located at the hospital.

Some of those who were in favor of a detention center in Floyd County were not in favor of the facility being in the former Caprock Hospital. Concerns have been raised by residents living close to the hospital, about the facility being located in a neighborhood and the safety of the residents.

Commissioners Court appoints Michelle Araujo as new Justice of the Peace

Michelle Araujo, 25, of the Providence Community, has been appointed the new Justice of the Peace

of Pct. #2 & #3.

She was chosen by the Floyd County Commissioners after they interviewed 13 applicants Monday afternoon, October 11. Araujo was sworn in by County Judge Bill Hardin Tuesday.

Araujo is the daughter of Robert and Libby Delgado, of Lockney. She graduated Lockney High School in 1992, and attended Ranger Junior College for one year on a track scholarship.

She then transferred to South Plains College in Levelland and received her Associate of Arts degree in Criminal Justice. "After that I went to Texas Tech and received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science with a Minor in Spanish and Business Management," said Araujo.

She currently has one semester completed toward her MBA at Wayland Baptist University.

Michelle has been married to Romeo Araujo for 6 years. They have two children: Katalina, 5 1/2, and Ryann, 6 weeks. Romeo is a farmer. "I'm very happy with my appointment," said Araujo, "and I'll do the best I can."

Araujo was appointed by the Commissioners to fill the position recently vacated after the resignation of J.P. Carolyn Jackson. The appointment is good only until next year's general election.

Araujo has said she intends to file her intentions to seek the office in January. The general election will be in November, 2000.

"The commissioners court was very appreciative of the 13 highly qualified applicants," said County Judge Bill Hardin. "We gave personal and careful consideration to each one before making our appointment."

City of Lockney raises water rates

LOCKNEY--Members of the Lockney City Council met September 15 and voted to raise water rates.

During the regular monthly meeting held Thursday October 7 council members voted to purchase a new vehicle for the police department. Also discussed was investing the cities money at a higher rate than they are now receiving.

The decision to raise the water rates came after many meetings and discussions. A public hearing was held with members of the community voicing their opinions. The motion to raise the rates inside the city limits was made by Rodger Stapp, and the second by Bil Anderson. The motion setting the rates outside the city limits was made

by E.L. Brotherton, Jr. and the second was made by J.D. Copeland. All members of the council voted for both motions.

The water rates inside the city limits were set at \$18.00 for the first 2,000 gallons and \$2.75 per 1,000 gallons after. (The increase on the 2000 gallon minimum was \$6.00 and was 75 cents on each 1,000 gallons after.)

Water rates for those living outside the city limits was \$36.00 for the first 2000 gallons used and \$5.50 per thousand gallons after. (This was a \$12.00 increase on the minimum and \$1.50 increase per thousand.)

Before the increase the in town rates were \$12.00 for the first 2,000 gallons and the out of town rates were \$24.00

for the same amount.

The bulk rate was raised to \$5.25 for 1,050 gallons for those customers filling water tanks.

Council members voted to buy a pickup for the Lockney Police Department. It will replace the car currently being driven by Lockney Police Chief Jerry Edwards.

The lease/purchase agreement is for three years and at the end of that time the vehicle can be purchased for \$1.00. "This will give us a vehicle we can then turn over to the city employees and should give them a better vehicle than we have been able to buy," stated Marr.

"We also need donations of money and candy," said Lipham.

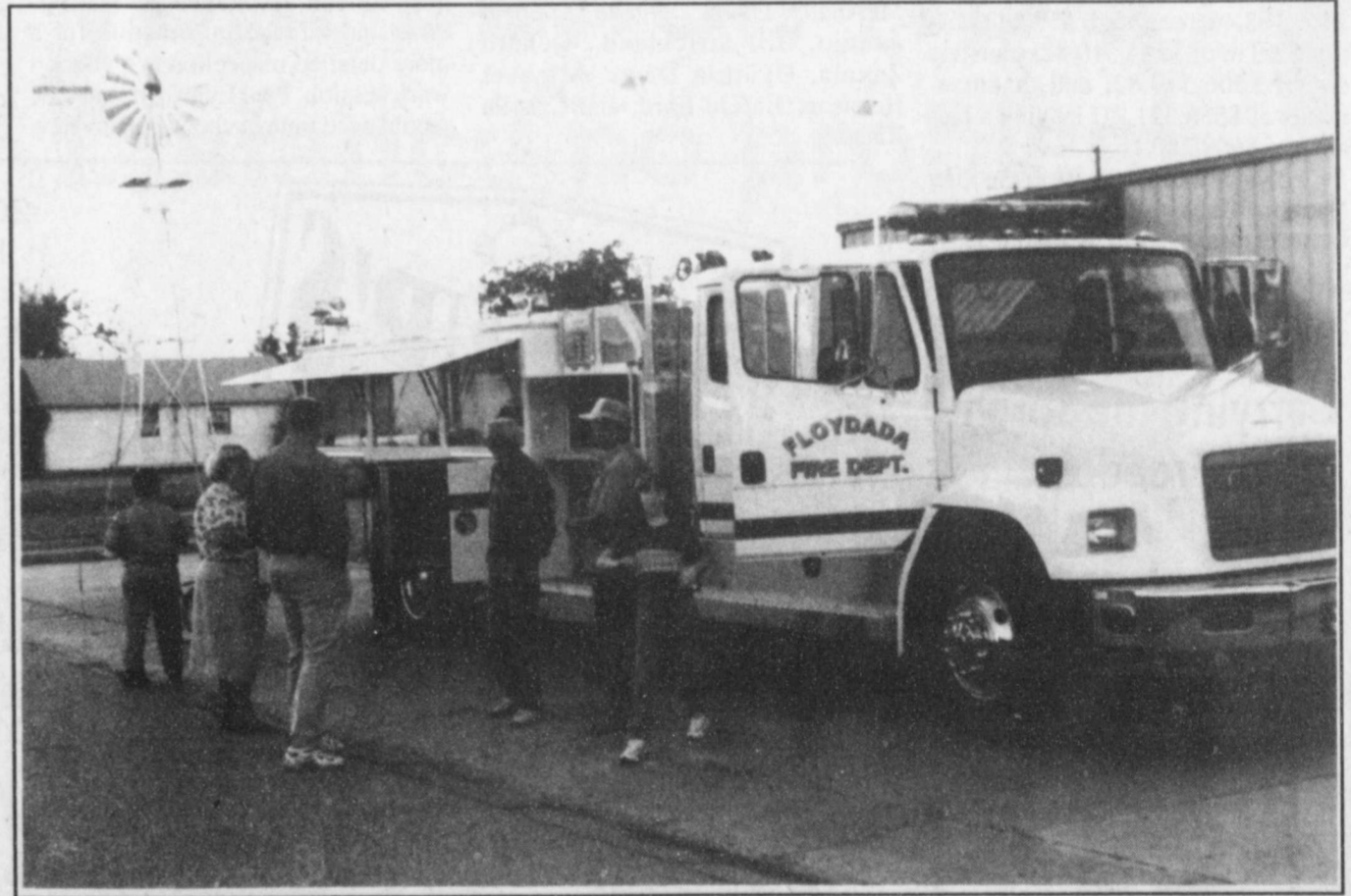
The Trunk or Treat will begin at 6:30 p.m., which will give youngsters time to compete in the costume contest at the High School Auditorium.

Trustees vote to tax personal property

FISD approves track renovations

In a regular meeting Tuesday night, FISD Trustees approved the repair of the track and approved a resolution to levy personal property tax on vehicles, boats, travel trailers, airplanes and motorcycles.

In bringing the taxation issue before the board, Superintendent Collins said, "The Central Appraisal District is the one who sets up the personal property taxation. We can approve taxing of personal property or deny it."

"In this school district 42 million is classified as personal property. Sixteen million of that is directly related to boats, travel trailers, airplanes and motorcycles, and the remainder would be considered business inventory."

Collins told the board they could

vote either way, but he wanted them to know how much money would be considered in the taxation.

Trustee Steve Lloyd made the motion to tax personal property and Charlene Brown seconded it. All were in favor.

Assistant Superintendent Dick Van Hoose told the board they needed to consider repairing the track surface before the colder part of the year.

"There are many cracks on the track," said Van Hoose. "There is loose surface coming out and the inside lanes are worn down. We have asked for estimates from two companies but only one--Southwest Recreational Industries--has submitted a bid.

Their bid includes power wash and

cleaning the surface of the track and building up the worn down lanes. It includes 125 square yards of full depth resurfacing.

"The bid also calls for 2,200 linear feet of repair of cracks that are less than 1/2 inch wide. This includes cleaning out the cracks and filling them."

"Two hundred linear feet of over one-half inch wide cracks will be cut out and filled in.

"Three layers of seal flex surface will be put on and then the track will be repainted. There will be a one year guarantee."

The bid was placed at \$37,430.00. Van Hoose reminded the trustees that \$35,000 had been budgeted. Continued On Page 2

The community of Lockney was stunned this week with the news of the death of two of its young men.

Joey Adams and Jacob Jones, both 24 years old, were killed in a car accident Saturday night in Idalou.

My sympathies, and those of the citizens in Floyd County, go out to the parents and families of these boys.

You are not alone--although I'm sure you've seen that by now.

Just a note from the news that doesn't really have anything to do with what is going on in Floyd County, but it was a bit of interesting world news.

China and Russia warships took part in the first ever joint maneuvers Oct. 2-6, in Shanghai.

A Russian Navy spokesman said, "The maneuvers are another step towards strengthening cooperation and mutual understanding" between the two countries.

According to the news report, China has become the top client for Russia's military business, purchasing billions of dollars worth of jets, missiles and submarines.

But you shouldn't worry. I know you shouldn't worry, because our own Secretary of State Strobe Talbott said we shouldn't worry.

He said the United States welcomes

and encourages deeper Russian-Chinese relations.

But then again Talbott is hoping that Russia, China, and the United States won't exist in their current form in the 21st Century.

Talbott wrote "The Birth of the Global Nation", in a July 20, 1992 issue of Time magazine, before joining the Clinton administration. He said he was looking forward to government run by "one global authority".

"Here is one optimist's reason for believing unity will prevail...within the next hundred years...nationhood as we know it will be obsolete; all states will recognize a single, global authority," wrote Talbott.

"A phrase briefly fashionable in the mid-20th century--'citizen of the world', will have assumed real meaning by the end of the 21st."

He said all countries were basically "social arrangements", and they were all artificial and temporary.

I'm glad the men and women who have fought for the United States of America over the past 200 years didn't believe our country was artificial and temporary. It is also kind of scary knowing that our current Secretary of State believes that we aren't any better than Russia or China.

Commissioners handle routine agenda and interview J.P. applicants

In open meeting Monday, October 14, County Commissioners handled routine budget matters and fund transfers. In closed meeting the commissioners interviewed applicants for the position of Justice of the Peace, Pct. #2 & #3.

The commissioners meeting convened at 8:30 a.m. and adjourned by 10:45 a.m. The court reconvened at 1:30 p.m. for the interview process.

In open court the commissioners approved one farm work contract for W.R. Ware to grade feed roads in Pct. #3, and approved a coyote bounty agreement for Tim Burge.

County Treasurer Mary Shurbet presented the monthly and quarterly report on balances, receipts, and disbursements.

The quarterly report showed the county with a beginning balance of \$447,168.46; receipts of \$697,433.61; transfers in of \$506,510.82; transfers out of \$506,510.82; and disbursements of \$536,321.91; leaving a balance of \$608,280.16.

Certificates of Deposits at the First National Bank totaled \$300,000.00. That CD total divided by precincts is:

Pct. #1, \$10,000; Pct. #2, \$40,000;

Pct. #3, \$200,000; Pct. #4, \$50,000.

The interest earned on the CD's and checking accounts was \$46,796.34.

The commissioners approved the transfer of \$80,000 from road and bridge. It would be disbursed with each precinct getting \$20,000 to be placed in CD's.

Also approved was a budget amendment of \$200.00 to pay the county's share of a salary for the new emergency management coordinator. Floyd County, the City of Floydada, and the City of Lockney, will each pay \$200.00 for this position. Another \$100.00 will be paid for travel.

The court adjourned and reconvened at 1:30 p.m. to review the following applications for Justice of the Peace: Cheryl Edwards, Debbie Archer, Wilmer Archer, Danny McAnally, Libby Delgado, Michele Araujo, Bill Strickland, Richard Zavala, Cynthia Daws, Michael Harrison, Harold Ford, and Crisilla Raissez.

of Edd Henderson CPA, met with the council to discuss bank accounts and bookkeeping. "I would like to see each department have a separate banking account," stated Rodger Stapp.

Henderson and Chappell said that it could be done but it is much simpler to have one general account, as the city has now, and then open a separate account for the Equipment Contingency Fund. The new account will be funded by money collected by the increase in water rates.

The money in this contingency account will be used to purchase major items, such as police cars. "We are going to buy a police car today and it's in the budget to do it," stated Stapp. "But if we had this money in place we wouldn't have to worry about putting it in the budget and then hoping the money would be there when we need it."

Ronnie Hardin, President FNB, Lockney; Ricky Neal and Stephanie Stewart, representing West Texas Trust Co., a affiliate of City Bank in Lubbock, met with the council to present options on CD interest rates and money market account rates.

Mayor Gary Marr explained that the city would like to look into something with higher interest rates than is available at the FNB, Lockney. "We want something that is safe but will make more than we are getting now."

Neal agreed "It is prudent to get more interest for the money you have in CD's. At the current time we have Money Market accounts that are paying just a little over 5 percent. He, and Ms. Stewart, explained several options and left the information for a more detailed inspection at a council work session. Paul Lyle also stated he would need time to check out any new

laws on investments by cities. The item was continued until a called meeting on Tuesday, October 19th at 4:00 p.m.

Council members voted to close a T-Alley behind Roy Turley in Block 18 of the Lockney Original Addition. Neighbors whose property joins the alley signed the closing agreement.

Ramundo Silva made an application to place a new mobile home on N.E. 5th and Rudy Jiminez a new mobile

home on N.E. 8th. Both applications were approved. An agreement, as to the upkeep of the homes, was signed by Silva and Jiminez.

Bil Anderson reported that a new counter will be installed in the kitchen at the community center and he would appreciate the donation of appliances. "If anyone has a refrigerator or cookstove in good condition they would like to donate we would appreciate having them," he stated.

Floyd County names on unclaimed property list

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has released the annual Unclaimed Property list.

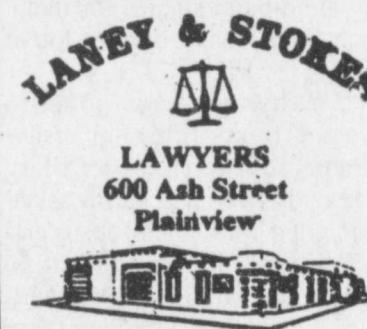
The trustees approved the sale of a taxing entity lot at 315-317 W. Houston for \$700.00 to Edward Alvarado.

Social Security mailing out statements

The largest customized direct mailing of information the U.S. government has ever sent to the public is about to begin. On October 1, the Social Security Administration will begin mailing Social Security Statements to approximately 125 million workers who are age 25 and older and who are not already receiving Social Security benefits. About 5000,000 Statements will be issued each business day.

You can expect to receive your Social Security Statement each year about three months before your birthday. Therefore, if you were born in February you can expect to receive your Statement each November. The four-page Social Security Statement will put "your future in your hands" by providing estimates of Social Security retirement, disability and survivors benefits you and your family could be eligible to receive now and in the future. The Statement will also provide you with an easy way to determine whether your earnings (i.e., wages and/or self-employment income) are accurately posted on your Social Security record. That's important because your future benefits will be based on your lifetime earnings record. The Statement also will tell you how to correct any inaccurately posted earnings.

Social Security encourages you to use your Statement to help you plan your financial future.

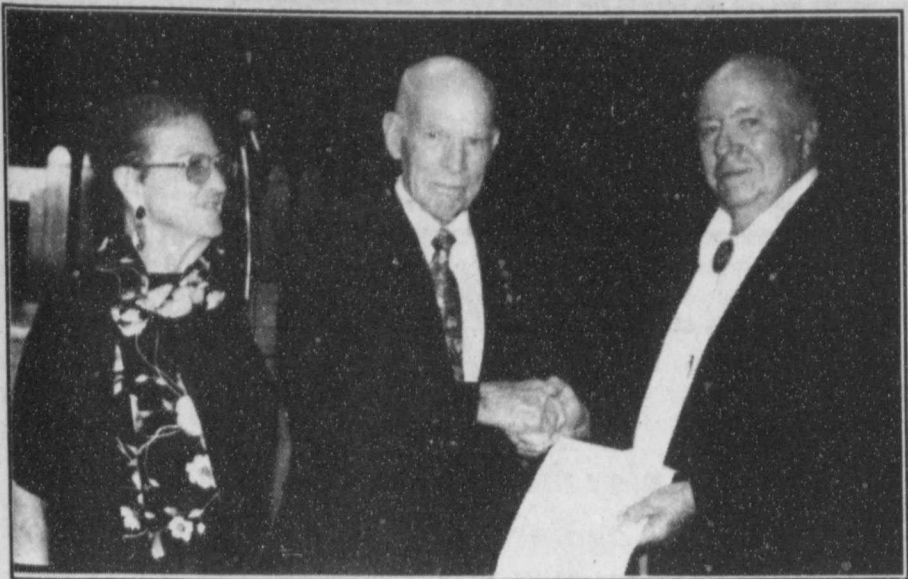

On October 7th, from 11:00 a.m. till 5:00 p.m., some of our staff will be doing "Depression Screenings" at the South Plains Health Provider Organization. That address is 715 Amarillo in Plainview. You can do this in private.

The screening form is one page and all you do is circle a "yes" or a "no" in reply to each questions. Some examples of the questions are:

- * Do you often feel left out or unwanted?
- * Are you frequently depressed because of personal problems?
- * Do you smile or laugh a great deal?
- * Are you troubled by a lack of self-confidence?
- * Do you have periods of depression without apparent reasons, which last several days or more?

Having a screening is not an admission to anything. You can do it just out of curiosity. If you want to talk to a professional about depression, one will be available for private consultation. This is all free. No charge to you.

The Floydada Whirlwinds scored twice in the opening period and added two more touchdowns in the final 66 seconds to blank Ralls 27-0 in the District 7-2A opener at "Doc" Mize Jackrabbit Field in Ralls last week. The first appearance in Ralls for Whirlwinds since the early 1970s proved to be an exciting night for Justin McGuire.

The Whirlwind senior scored three touchdowns, capping Floydada's first two possessions of the game with scores and then returning a 50-yard pass interception on the game's final play. McGuire also rushed 14 times for 144 yards.

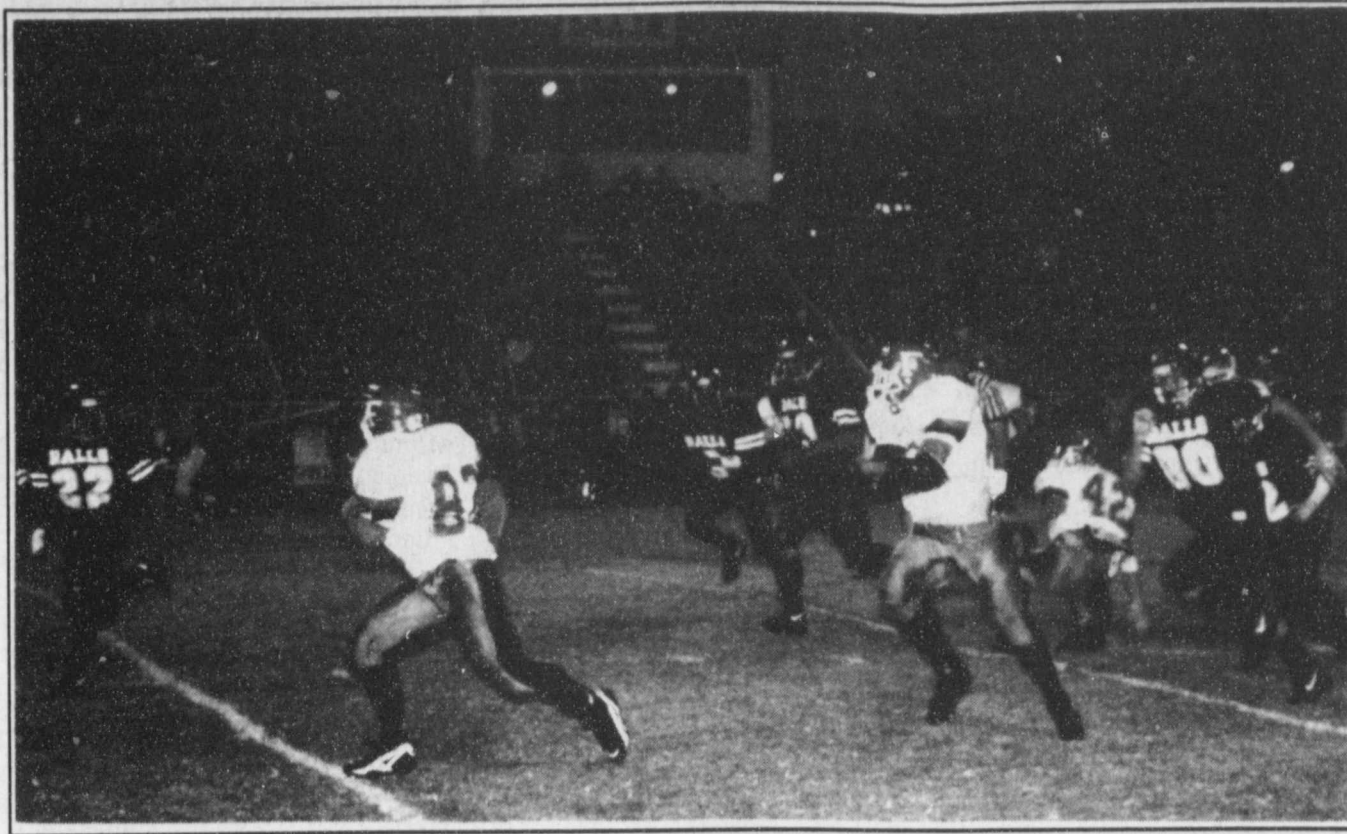
It was a disappointing district loss for the Jackrabbits, who will take its 2-4 overall record to Idalou this week, hoping to pick up its first district win since being re-aligned into District 7-2A in 1998. Idalou was blitzed 39-0 by New Deal last Friday, and may have a difficult time with the scrappy Jackrabbits.

Floydada had a little trouble with the Rabbits - at least during the second and third quarters. "Our defense bent but we didn't let them break the big play," Floydada head coach Tim Daughtrey said. When asked in a post-game interview if Ralls played a little better than the Whirlwinds expected, Daughtrey replied, "No, not better than what our coaches expected. I can tell you that Ralls is much improved over a year ago... they have played pretty well all year."

The coach added, "Starting with Abernathy this week, all the rest of our four games will be 'nail-biters' every week. We cannot afford to have any more bad practices, because what we do during the week has a lot to do with how we perform on Fridays." Abernathy comes calling to Wester Field tomorrow night, following a narrow 27-26 loss to Lockney. The Longhorns led at halftime in that one, 27-0, but the Antelopes came close to catching them in the final two periods.

Coach Daughtrey had high praise for his defensive unit against Ralls. The coach commented, "Lonny (Nelson) and Scot (Holster) kind of spearheaded our defense when we needed to shut down the Jackrabbits. Scot has been doing a good job since becoming a starter last week on defense, and Lonny is such a great competitor who never quits. The defense is what wins big ones, but the offense has to come through. We're getting a good combination of both right now, and that's a plus going into the next few weeks of district play."

Following a pass interception by Dusty Anderson (his first of two picks for the evening), fullback David Lightfoot ran 30 yards on first down

to pave the way for a 7-play, 54 yard scoring drive. McGuire carried the final 7 yards, Isabelo Irlas kicked the first of three conversions and the 'Winds were up 7-0 less than six minutes into the opening period. The Jackrabbits made their initial first down during the ensuing series, but were forced to punt after moving out to their own 40-yard line.

The Whirlwinds maintained good field position and scored three plays later on a 50-yarder by McGuire. Excellent line blocking and several key down-field blocks enabled McGuire to score from long range. Irlas tacked on the extra point, and a runaway seemed to be in the making. However, most of the second period was spent in Floydada territory due to an impressive stand by the Jackrabbit defense.

Floydada opened the third quarter with a drive as deep as the Ralls' 36-yard line, but the 'Winds were turned back by a costly penalty and a fumble recovery by Ralls' Rodrigo Mata. The Rabbits mounted one of their longest drives of the games following the turnover, but Lonny Nelson's interception of a Marvin Newton pass, gave the 'Winds possession near mid-field in the closing minutes of the period.

Capitalizing on the Ralls' miscue, the Whirlwinds move deep into Ralls' territory, only to have the ball stripped and recovered by Andy Diaz on the first play of the fourth play. The Rabbits were forced to a three and out situation deep in their own territory in the final stanza's first two minutes.

Following an exchange of punts, the Whirlwinds totally dominated the remaining five minutes of the fourth quarter. The 'Winds overcame two costly penalties as McGuire and Edward Porter helped along a 9-play, 67-yard drive. With 1:06 remaining on the clock, Dusty Anderson found Edward Porter all alone in the back of the south end zone, and connected on a 5-yard TD toss.

The Jackrabbits fought back gamely following the ensuing kickoff, but just as the Floydada partisans started gathering items from their seats to stand for the school song after time expired, McGuire intercepted a Newton pass at midfield on the game's final play. Quick reactions to his pass theft alerted the Whirlwind defenders to become down-field blockers, enabling McGuire to breeze to the end zone 50-yards away for the exciting finish.

Bill's Notes

From the game statistics, both offense and defense, it was almost "The Justin McGuire" show at Ralls. With two rushing TDs, 144 rushing yards and the 50-yard TD on the interception, Justin would have to be named the offensive player of the game. I'll also name him my co-defensive player of the outing, sharing that honor with Scot Holster (who had his second consecutive solid defensive effort). McGuire's pitch sweep for the 50-yard TD late in the first quarter is my offensive play of the game. A pancake block by Shane Lloyd (which sprung McGuire for an 11-yard gain on the third play after intermission) gets my nod for the "Headhunter" pop of the night.

Nixon reelected to Soil and Water Conservation Board

Leslie R. Nixon, Jr of Floydada was re-elected to the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation district board on October 12, 1999. Nixon represents Zone 3 of the district.

The purpose of the Floyd County SWCD, with headquarters in Floydada is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district. In addition, the district serves as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The five members serving on the district board of directors are responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district pro-

gram within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas there are 216 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

Hale County cotton producers and landlords discuss boll weevil eradication

In a meeting of Hale county cotton producers and landlords held at Hale Center Thursday evening the question was posed "Do producers in Hale County want to pursue a Boll Weevil Control Program?"

The meeting chaired by Weldon Melton, a Hale county farmer, heard from IPM Agent Greg Cronholm and several crop consultants each with a long working history in the county. Each expressed that the boll weevil had become a problem to cotton farmers over the past few years. One said that he had seen overwintered weevils in 1997. The consultants generally felt that even a hard winter would not eliminate the pest.

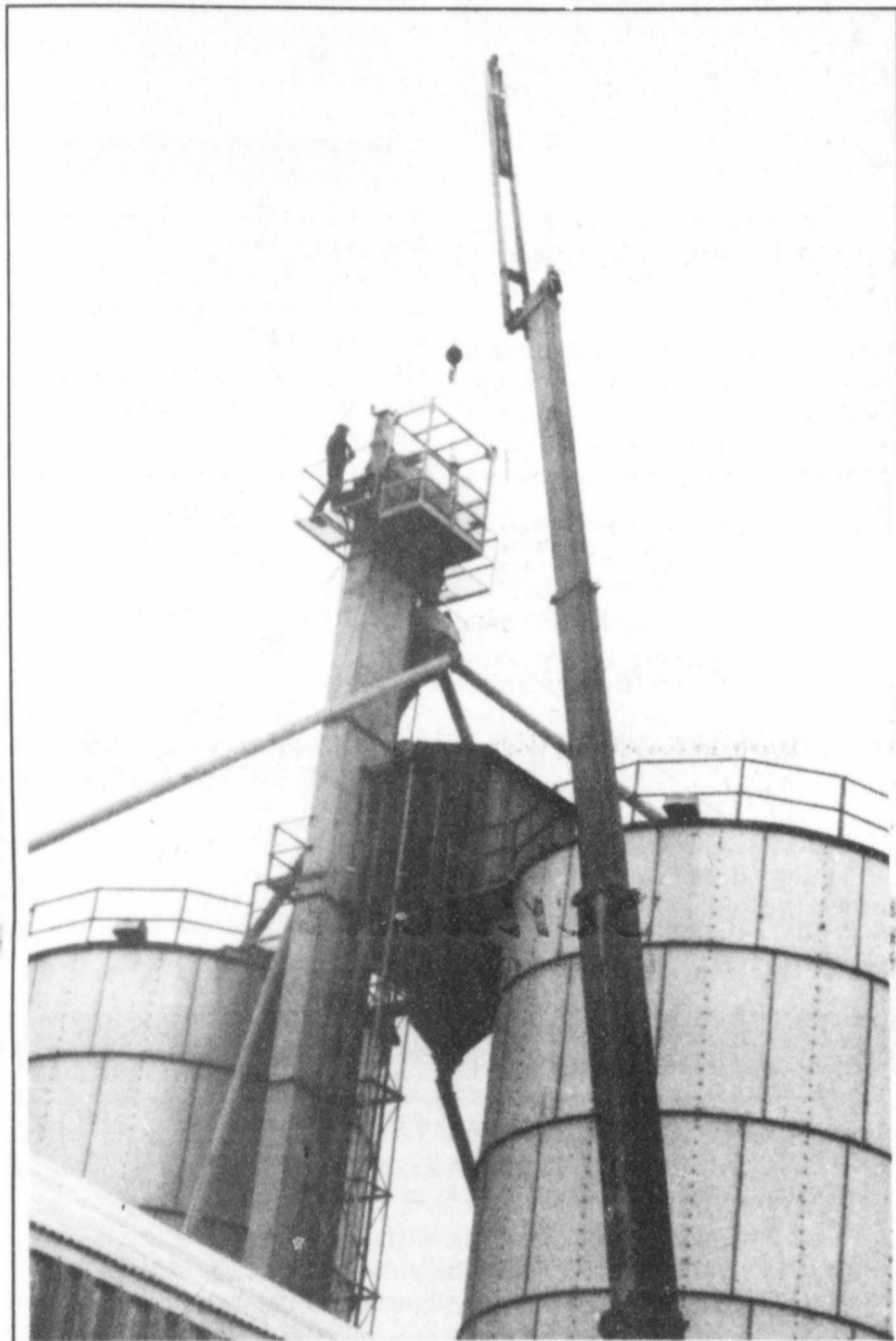
A small group which had previously opposed organized boll weevil control was afforded an opportunity to speak against the issue but the leader of that group declined to present any argument on advice of his attorney.

Melton commented, "The meeting was held in a cooperative atmosphere, there was no bickering as in the past and there was much meaningful discussion." He concluded those present agreed that elimination of the pest will take an organized zone-wide effort, it cannot be done individually and dis-

cussions with growers in the rest of Northern High Plains zone should continue.

A vote on pursuing development of a boll weevil control program for the NHP zone was taken by the 46-48 Hale County producers and landlords present. A total of 42 voted in favor, I was opposed with the remainder abstaining.

A meeting of representatives from each of the 32 gins in the Northern High Plains zone, which includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Randall and Swisher counties, to discuss the next steps is planned for later in October or early November.

The delay means consideration of the FY2000 Agriculture appropriations Bill and attached ag assistance package will not occur until October 13 or 14.

The overall Conference Report still maintains a strong level of support within the Senate. It will be important, however to continue contacts with Senate offices to reaffirm agriculture's support for the Bill as it currently stands.

The message that needs to be delivered to all Senators is to support and vote for a cloture motion limiting debate when it is considered October 12 and to then support and vote to approve the Conference Report.

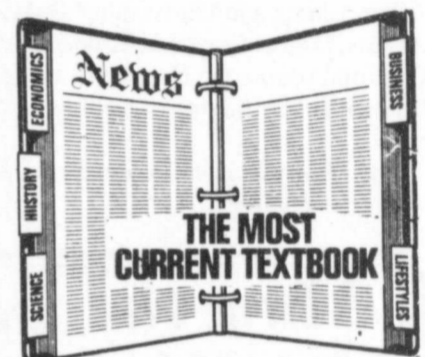

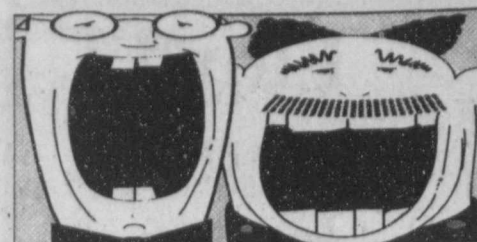

Kids shouldn't underestimate seriousness of HIV

Teens who think HIV is no longer a serious health threat are in for a rude awakening.

"The availability of new drugs to treat AIDS and HIV like manageable chronic diseases can create a false sense of security among some adolescents," said Dr. William T. Shearer, professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston and medical director of the AIDS Center at Texas Children's Hospital.

"AIDS is still a dreadful disease, and telling a patient that they are HIV-positive is almost as difficult as telling someone they have cancer," he said.

Although better medications have reduced the number of AIDS related deaths, most patients infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) will have to endure lifelong treatment.

"Before kids put themselves at risk of getting HIV, they need to know the long-term consequences," Shearer said.

A typical teenager with HIV will have to take up to 70 pills a week just to keep the virus under control. Some of these drugs, known as reverse transcriptase (RT) inhibitors, interrupt reproduction of the virus. Another type of drug, called protease inhibitors, keeps infectious parts of the virus from spreading. A combination of drugs has proven to be most effective.

Some of the medications have to be taken with food, while others require an empty stomach. The patient has to structure his or her activities around the times for medication.

Potential side effects of medications for HIV include cosmetic changes, such as shrinkage of the facial skin, and deposits of subcutaneous tissue that create a pouch on the stomach or a hump on the neck. Some patients also develop diabetes or high levels of triglycerides, a type of fat.

Because the AIDS virus weakens the immune system, patients with HIV can become more vulnerable to other

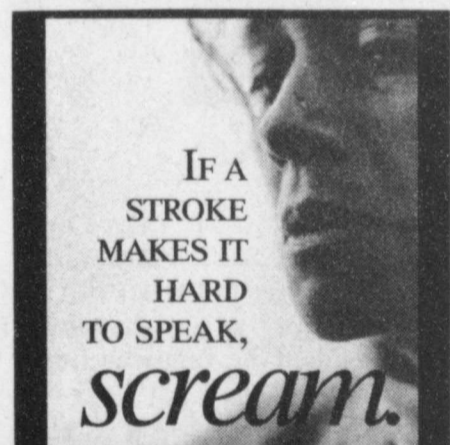
infections and develop pneumonia, herpes simplex (cold sores), swollen glands in the armpits or groin, meningitis, thrush (a white coating on the tongue), ulcers, bladder problems, and other illnesses.

"These complications require additional treatments over and above the medications the patient is already taking," Shearer said. "If the patient develops ulcers in the throat and mouth, they can become so sick that they can't even drink the water needed to wash down their pills."

Shearer is concerned that adolescents who didn't witness the thousands of slow, painful deaths during the AIDS epidemic in the 1980's don't realize how destructive HIV is.

During the past several years, the incidence of HIV has increased from 11 to 17 percent in adolescent and young adult women, especially minorities. The virus is spread mainly through unprotected sexual intercourse and intravenous drug use.

"The United States has been very successful at reducing the number of babies born with HIV from mothers who carry the virus, Shearer said. "But there is a second wave of pediatric AIDS coming. We need to educate kids about the danger of HIV so they will be smart enough to avoid behaviors that put them at risk for a very serious disease that will affect them the rest of their lives."

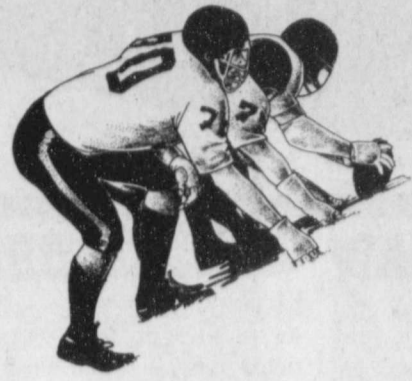

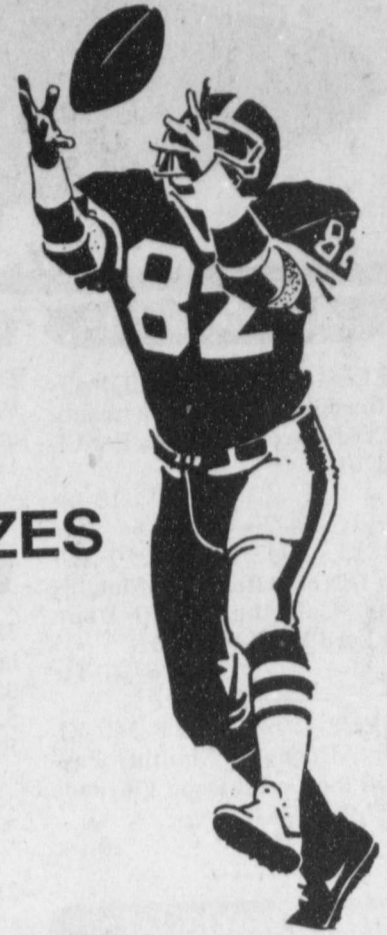

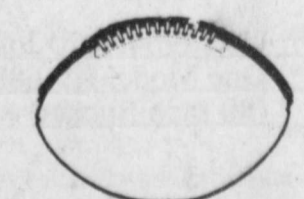
