YOU DO SAY THEY REALLY SAY MARGARET'S GOT A REAL FELLER

LONDON, June 23 (UP)—Princess Margaret has picked the man she thinks she is going to marry. Friends said today he is the Earl of Dalkeith, 26, immensely rich, and the heir of the Scottish Duke of Buccleuch.

Court circles believe that if the Princess does not change her mind—she is only 19 and young even for a royal marriage—the engagement probably will be announced on or after her 20th birthday Aug. 21.

The Earl of Dalkeith is so eminently eligible for marriage into

the Royal Family that courtiers were wondering how they came to overlook him in their speculation over a possible mate for the Princess.

The tall, slender Earl who inherited the white red hair of his fighting family always has been somewhere close to the Princess.

They were childhood friends, dancing partners in youth and in the last few years always have been at the same parties. They have dined together in restaurants, gone to the theatre together and visited at each other's castles. They rode in the same carriage

at Ascot two weeks ago, and the Earl was one of the house party at Windsor Castle on that occasion.

Princess Margaret, who is third in line of succession to the British throne, often has visited the Earl and his parents at their six great mansion estates.

In fact the warmth and duration of their friendship led cynical courtiers to say they were too good friends ever to get married.

But lately there has been a subtle though noticeable change in the relationship of the tall Earl and the short Princess (she is only a mile over five feet tall). Court circles say it is romance in full flower.

Although technically Margaret can marry any white protestant regardless of his nationality, the nobility will be relieved if the Earl of Dalkeith is actually the final choice.

He has blood, breeding and wealth. In addition, he is Scottish. In the present raging campaign for more home rule for Scotland—with extremists speaking of breaking many ties with England—such a union might be a calming factor.

The Buccleuchs own huge areas on the outskirts of London and 500,000 acres scattered through the rest of England. They have six castles.

The Earl, whose full name is Walter Francis John Montagu Douglas-Scott, belongs to a family whose dukedom goes back to 1662, when Countess Anne of Buccleuch, greatest heiress of her time, married the Duke of Monmouth, illegitimate son of Charles II.

The present Duke, the eighth of the line, was so often mentioned as a possible husband for Princess Mary, sister of King George VI, that an official denial was issued by Buckingham Palace in 1919.

Today Buckingham Palace had "nothing to say" about the romance of Margaret and the Earl. It seldom does have anything to say of a royal romance until an engagement is announced.

Ralph A. Wagoner Elected President Of US Highway 80

Members Call Meeting For June 29 To Instruct Convention Delegate

Highway 80 Boosters elected Ralph Wagoner to head their organization for the coming year.

The local highway 80 association met last night. Bud Fuller was elected vice-president; Morris George, secretary treasurer.

The local group is affiliated with the National Highway 80 association which has scheduled its national convention, July 8 at El Paso.

Wagoner was also elected as official delegate to the convention. Morris George, C. S. Kerr and Roscoe Hopper indicated at the meeting that they would attend the convention.

Three or four others said that they were tentatively planning to attend. The membership indicated that it would be to the interests of Ranger if everyone that possibly could would go to the convention.

The membership voted to meet at 8 p. m. June 29 to instruct their delegate officially as to what specific action should be taken at the convention to boost the continental highway and Ranger.

It was pointed out that the highway not only benefits those who sell rooms and food to tourists, but everyone in town.

"Ranger would be in a bad condition if the highway did not come through here," one commented.

About 20 attended the meeting. The membership indicated that they hope that more will attend the June 29 meeting when the delegate will be instructed and plans will be made for the promotion of Ranger.

Judy Garland Kept In Bed As Protection

HOLLYWOOD, June 23 (UP)—Judy Garland is being kept under sedatives so she won't have a chance to repeat her suicide attempt, her agent said today.

"She apparently still doesn't know whether she wants to go on with life," Carleton Alsop explained. "So her hysteria has to be kept quiet."

"We don't know if she'll try again to kill herself. We hope not. But we can't take any chances."

The hollow-cheeked movie queen has been asleep, except for brief periods, since Monday night, when she scratched her throat with the jagged edge of a drinking glass after losing the starring role in "Royal Wedding" at MGM.

"She wakes up now and then and takes a little food," Alsop said. "But then she starts to cry and get excited again. So they put her back to sleep."

"Who knows what makes her cry? What made her do it in the first place? All we can do is protect her. A nurse is with her night and day."

Judy doesn't know the world has found out she tried to slash her throat, Alsop went on, and the family is doing everything to keep her from finding it out.

"It might send her back into hysteria again," he said. "Or it might make her mad enough to get up and fight. But it'll be several days before she'll be well enough to take the news."

"It's going to be a terrible shock to her."

Alsop said the scratch on the gifted Garland throat has disappeared.

"I've seen her twice," he said, "and it wasn't even bandaged. It's the hysteria inside her that's keeping her in bed. And you can't get at that with a bandage."

Congress Talks About Sex, Aid And Newsprint

Senators To Debate Lot Before Pass Aid Bill To Help Europe

WASHINGTON, June 23 (UP)—The senate was set to open debate today on a \$1,222,500,000 second-year installment, of military aid to free nations fighting Communism.

The measure was assured certain to pass but some lengthy arguments were expected before the final vote comes.

One proposal by Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., R., Mass., would permit use of ECA counterpart funds—currencies participating nations put up to match U.S. money—to redeem foreign currencies. Lodge claim this would cut the cost of the arms aid program to U. S. taxpayers.

The measure would provide \$1,000,000,000 for North Atlantic pact nations, \$13,500,000 for Greece, Turkey and Iran, \$16,000,000 for South Korea and the Philippines and \$75,000,000 for the general area of Southeast Asia.

Elsewhere in Congress: Draft—House members gave a chilly reception to the senate's standby draft bill which would let the president authorize inductions when Congress is not in session. Rep. Dewey Short, R., Mo., ranking GOP member of the house armed services committee said, "We will insist on the house version, under which nobody but Congress could order the start of inductions."

Sex—Rep. Harry J. Davenport, D., Pa., said the government should put the finger on sex criminals who are "potential killers." He urged speedy house approval of his plan to set up a congressional committee to investigate the rising wave of sex crimes.

Service—Career diplomat John S. Service was recalled by the Senate foreign relations subcommittee for secret questioning on what—if any—wartime military information he gave to America's Editor Philip Jaffe, Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R., Wis., claims an FBI report shows. Service slipped the data to Jaffe five years ago.

Newsprint—A house judiciary subcommittee on monopolies set out to trace U. S. financial connections with the giant Canadian newsprint industry. It hoped to learn details of the industry's finances from Donald C. Cook of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

H-Bomb—The Congressional Atomic energy committee has met with officials of General Electric Co. to discuss aspects of the hydrogen bomb. In a carefully worded statement, Chairman Brian McMahon, D., Conn., disclosed that the committee also talked over the atomic submarine engine project underway at Knolls Atomic Power Laboratory near Schenectady, N. Y.

DOG'S BEST FRIEND MOURNS; DOCTOR FEARS FOR HER LIFE

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 23 (UP)—A baby doctor said today that one-year-old Karen Voegelé may die of mourning for her lost collie dog.

Karen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Voegelé, appealed for help in their search for "Rusty," a sable-and-white dog that has been missing for a week.

Mrs. Voegelé said the dog had slept by the child's crib and had always stayed within reach of the baby.

The Voegelés moved to Mission, Kans., just across the Missouri river from Kansas City, three weeks ago. It was believed the dog may have returned to their old home at Lawrence, Kans.

"I can't make Karen understand what has happened," Mrs. Voegelé said. "She has eaten next to nothing and cries almost constantly."

"When I try to feed her, she takes maybe one spoonful and then says 'Rusty' and pushes the dish away."

Mrs. Voegelé said the dog's name was one of the first words Karen learned.

A pediatrician examined the baby and found no signs of physical illness but said she was suffering from a "severe emotional illness induced by the dog's absence."

Yesterday, a display advertisement in the Kansas City Star carried the missing dog's picture and advertisements also were run in a newspaper at Lawrence.

The dog disappeared June 14 from a home where the Voegelés were visiting.

Immanuel Wittrup Dies In Marshall Missouri At 74

He was in the floral business 52 years in the United States in St. Louis and Marshall.

Funeral arrangements were not complete, but burial will be in Marshall.

Wittrup is survived by three sons, Edwin L. of Eastland, and Raymond and Oscar of Detroit. All three are florists.

In the absence of Wittrup, Maurine Johnson is in charge of the Wittrup shop.

TOKYO, June 23 (UP)—Defense Secretary Louis Johnson told the troubled nations of the Far East tonight that in their part of the world the United States would do everything necessary for "American security and the peace of the world."

Johnson's hint that America would maintain her present bases in the Far East came as he and Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the U. S. joint chiefs of staff, ended a momentous mission to the Orient.

After high level talks on U. S. policy, Johnson and Bradley took off by plane for the United States.

In its report, the Board declared this demand unjustified by all the evidence presented. It also pointed out that it would give the switchmen an unfair pay advantage over other groups of railroad employees, and would add too great a burden to railroad costs.

Here is another case of a railroad union flouting the findings of an Emergency Board—another case of calling a crippling strike in an outrageous and reckless attempt to force demands which the Board clearly labels as unjustified!

Leaders of the Switchmen's Union are calling this strike in defiance of the Board—in defiance of the facts—and at the expense of the public!

In its report on this case, the Board made this statement:

"The railroad industry, the Board believes, needs above all else a period of relative stability to adjust and adapt itself to present competitive post-war conditions."

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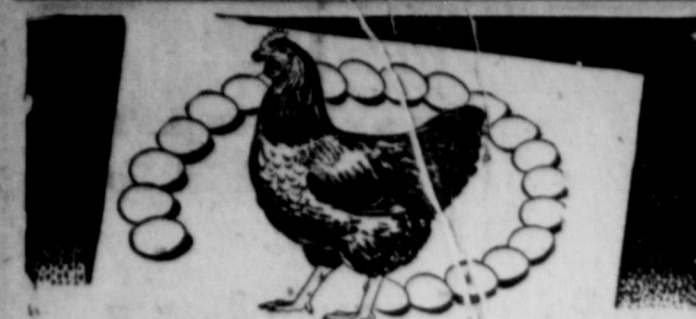

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Mt. Ararat Explorer Now Ready To Seek Trace Of Lost Atlantis

LONDON, (UP)—Egerton Sykes, 55-year-old explorer and former British diplomat, hopes to start soon on his long-cherished expedition to the Azores in search of the lost continent of Atlantis.

Sykes, who is chairman of the Atlantean Research Center, has been seeking to finance his search for Atlantis since last June, when he was disappointed in his endeavors to lead an expedition to Mount Ararat in Turkey to find the original Noah's Ark.

The Ararat expedition, he believes, was blocked partially by international diplomacy because the Soviet press charged that his avowed mission of seeking the Ark was a cover for espionage activities.

He hopes, however, that no such difficulties will prevent his going to the Azores some time this year to try to photograph evidence of the submerged continent of Atlantis from a bathysphere.

Sykes had planned the expedition earlier but was delayed by security considerations which placed on the top secret list some of the underwater apparatus he intended to use. The apparatus included underwater radar and echo sounding devices which Sykes said could have been used to determine a contour of any submerged architectural structure.

Sykes now hopes to get pictures of the relics of the vanished civilization of Atlantis by using submarine cameras from a bathysphere.

"I have a fairly good idea where to look," he said "Obviously we cannot hope to find very much because the area in the Azores I plan to investigate would have been high on a mountainside in Atlantis."

"It will be much the same as an explorer of the future relying on relics of the upper slopes of Mount Blanc in the Alps to prove the existence of civilization in Europe."

He thinks, however, there should be traces, perhaps even a temple which will give photographic proof of a civilization which vanished about 10,000 years before Christ.

From a mass of scientific data he has amassed on the subject Sykes is convinced the Atlanteans built pyramids like the Egyptians and carved elephant figures like Indians, he said.

"It may be possible for me to dredge something of this kind to the surface. I simply want to obtain evidence to prove that it would be worthwhile to arrange a large expedition to make a complete survey."

WAC Reserves Will Report To Training Camps

FORT SAM HOUSTON, Texas—WAC "citizen soldiers"—all members of Organized Reserve members of companies, will report to camp with their hometown units this summer as the army's new program of joint field training for men and women reservists gets under way.

The first Women's Army Corps reservists to report with their units in the Fourth Army area are now on duty at Fort Hood, Texas, with adjutant general and quartermaster organizations. Others are scheduled to train with medical, adjutant general and finance units of Fort Sam Houston, Texas, with transportation units at Camp LeRoy Johnson, New Orleans, La.

The women reservists will undergo the same field training as other members of their units, except for rifle practice on the firing range. Classes in administration, personnel, and supply will be substituted for the target practice given other unit members.

More than 4,000 WAC veterans in the ORC are now training with their units throughout the nation. There are no ORC companies made up entirely of Wacs.

Women without prior military service are now being accepted for enlistment in the WAC Reserve Section of the ORC. In opening up the reserve ranks to women without previous training, the Army has specified that applicants must be enlisted for vacancies in units now on a full training status.

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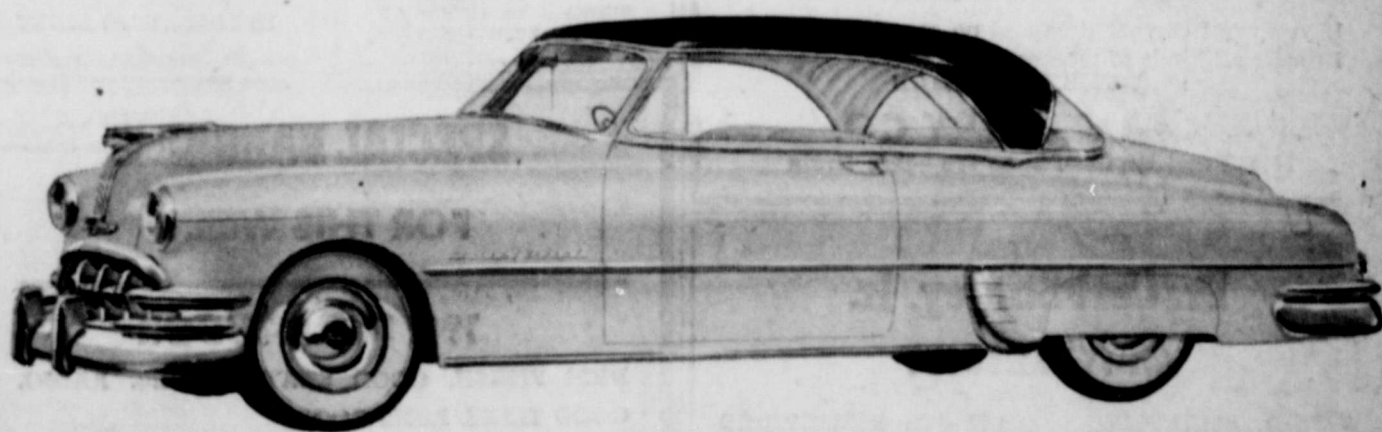
