

TORNADOES BEAT OLTON; PLAY SNYDER FRIDAY

Lamesa Defeats Olton Gridders In Opening Game

Almost a thousand loyal fans braved misty, inclement weather last Friday night to see the Golden Tornadoes open the season against the Olton Gridders. And they saw a scrappy, hustling bunch of youngsters run roughshod over the Olton team with a versatile attack of plunging, running, passing and kicking to a 45 to 0 decision.

Of course Olton was not as formidable an opponent as the team will meet Friday night and in some of its later games, but fans were agreeably surprised at the progress Coach McCollum has made with a practically new team having only four first string men left from last year's squad. It looks like that Lamesa has some good football material in its team and a few more weeks of practice will develop it into a smooth running squad both in offense and defense.

Lamesa scored early in the game. After the kick off and an exchange of punts Lamesa made its first down on a pass and followed with a drive down the field for a touchdown. Steele kicked the extra point for a 7-0 score. On the second play following the next kickoff Allison intercepted a pass. Allison then made five yards through the line and on the next play got loose and ran 55 yards for the second touchdown. Lamesa failed to kick goal.

Olton received but was forced to punt. Easterwood made 50 yards in two plays and Allison received a pass to make the remaining yards necessary for the touchdown. Kicking goal. The Lamesa boys ran the score to 20-0 to the first quarter.

The second quarter opened with Lamesa in possession of the ball in mid-field. Two plays made it first down and then Jones found an opening and made the remaining 40 yards for the fourth touchdown, and kicked goal for the extra point. Score 27-0.

Olton had quit trying to gain through the Lamesa line. Receiving the kick-off they attempted to pass but failed. A second pass was good for 22 yards and their first first down. But a pass was then intercepted by Lamesa, and after Lamesa had lost the ball on downs another pass by Olton was intercepted and carried 30 yards for a touchdown. No goal, and the half ended 33-0 for Lamesa.

Lamesa added two more touchdowns in the second half. The first was soon after the half opened. Olton punting to Lamesa's 40 yard line and with a pass and line plunge Lamesa made the 60 yards necessary for the touchdown, kicking goal afterwards. The last score was in the third quarter and was the result of a series of line plunges. The place kick failed.

Several penalties were assessed during the game. Lamesa being offender in most of them.

Olton's safety man was the outstanding player of their squad. He never failed to make a substantial return of the kickoffs and punts. He was fast and a good broken field runner. It looked as if he were going to get loose several times but the Lamesa boys managed to cover him before he could do any damage.

The starting line-up of the Tornadoes was: Sandel, Adams, Lambeth, Easterwood, Boyd, Steele, Finley, Bridge man, Jones, Allen and Gordon.

E. R. Yates To Build Addition to Building

Contract was awarded this week by E. R. Yates, dealer in International Harvester Co. products, for the construction of an addition 50x40 at the rear of his present building occupied by his hardware and implement concern. The addition will be constructed of brick and reinforced concrete.

This building will be used as a repair shop for tractors and farm equipment and will be equipped with all the necessary tools and machines to do a thorough job of overhauling such machinery. The addition will also permit the enlargement of the tractor and farm machine display in the present building, as well as enabling Mr. Yates to practically double his stock of parts for repairs.

This enlargement program gives the Yates concern 13,000 feet of floor space and is quite a forward step from the 25x90 foot building on the west side of the square where Mr. Yates began this business about 14 years ago. It speaks well for the methods Mr. Yates has employed in his dealings with the implement and hardware buyers of this trade territory, forcing him first to build his present building and warehouse and now to enlarge them.

Mr. Yates is a firm believer in the future of West Texas, having first coming to this section from Kaufman county in the early nineties.

Judge McGuire Passes Sentence On Elmo Banks

Judge Gordon B. McGuire, accompanied by W. B. Bishop of Wilson, went to Tahoka Monday morning where Judge McGuire presided over a special session of district court, held for the sentencing of Elmo Banks, convicted killer of Deputy Sheriff Redwine in Tahoka last March.

Then sentence was passed at eleven o'clock Monday morning before the court room full of spectators. Execution date set by Judge McGuire was October 23, and if there is no interference, which is not expected, this will probably set a record for justice in the state of Texas. The negro was captured and tried and convicted in seven days from the date of the crime. He has been given all the legal protection the state affords, furnished with the best legal talent and his case appealed and motions heard. But with all this court procedure over, his execution is set for seven months and 17 days from the date of the crime for which he must pay the death penalty. The court officials are to be commended for this effort to speed up procedure.

Sunshine Brings Smiles To Dawson County Residents

Rain is considered a news story in this country anytime, but this week the appearance of the sun from behind the clouds was the biggest scoop of the season. Tuesday afternoon, for the first time in twelve days there appeared to be some determination on the part of the sun to come from behind the clouds and stay out for a spell.

Continued rains, the first falling the eleventh of September, brought the total precipitation for September to 7.49 inches in Lamesa, according to Mrs. J. J. Paulk, who has charge of the government rain gauge here. The normal rainfall for September in Dawson county is around 2.50 inches. The rain fall in the twelve days from September 11 to 22 inclusive was 6-12 inches.

Floods Cause Great Damage In Texas

Austin, Sept. 23.—Although the flood waters of the Colorado, Concho and Guadalupe Rivers are still tumbling down to the sea, an immediate survey of the flood damage has been launched by the Texas Planning Board's water resources committee. The survey is under the direction of C. S. Clark, chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers and planning board member.

A hurried survey of the flooded regions discloses that property damage will run between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000. Thousands of head of livestock drowned as the raging waters of the three rivers tumbled over their banks and ran rampant over the lowlands. Hundreds of dwellings were torn from their foundations and hurled against the concrete bulkheads of highway and railroad bridges where they crumbled under the terrific pounding of the swirling waters.

It was estimated that approximately \$5,000,000 damages were done in San Angelo and vicinity alone, and that the loss would mount higher as the reconstruction work was begun.

WILSON COMMUNITY RESIDENT DIES IN ABILENE WEDNESDAY

Roy Myers, age about 51, passed away in a hospital in Abilene Wednesday morning, having been taken there last Saturday. Mr. Myers had been in ill health for some time but only last week took a turn for the worse and was removed to the hospital in Abilene.

Mr. Myers had been a resident of the Wilson community for the past 17 years and has been active in community upbuilding and a consistent and active member of the Baptist church. The many friends he has made will regret to learn of his untimely death.

Surviving Mr. Myers are his wife and three sons, Dalton, Dwayne, and Wesley.

Business Men Pass Resolution On Mail Service

At a meeting of a majority of the of the business men of the city Wednesday afternoon, the question of the Lamesa mail service from outside was discussed. The meeting was called by the local postal officials in an effort to get the opinion of the business men as to what the city needs in this service. The highway condition to Snyder has made this question one of vital importance to Lamesa, as it has recently been impossible to maintain the schedule over the present contracted route.

After quite a discussion by different business men, it was suggested by W. B. Collins that a resolution be drawn asking the postal department to change the present motor route from Snyder to Big Spring and with the provisions that the dispatching of the outgoing mail be made at the latest hour in the evening in order to make the necessary connection with the trains at Big Spring, returning in the morning as soon as mail has arrived in Big Spring. The meeting unanimously approved the resolution and it will be sent to postal officials as a resolution from the business men of Lamesa.

Tornadoes Facing Hard Game Here Friday Night

Although the game the Tornadoes have scheduled here for Friday night will not be a conference battle, it promises to be one of the hardest tilts the local eleven has to face this season. The rivalry between these two teams has been keen for several years and a glance over the scores of the past few years would not be amiss here.

In 1929 Lamesa won from the Snyder Tigers 12 to 0; the next contest was in 1932 and resulted in a 0-0 tie; in 1933 the Tornadoes lost 0-7; in 1934 Lamesa won by the narrow margin of one point, 7-6; last year an experienced team from Lamesa found Snyder with a new team of recruits and beat them 46-0. Although the wet weather has kept the boys from much outdoor practice they have been working hard on their plays and checking the weak points that were brought to light in their encounter with Olton last week. Strengthening of their blocking and tackling will be their main workout on the field this afternoon and tomorrow.

It is probable that the same team that started against Olton will be sent into the game Friday night. Although Allison was taken out of the game last week on account of injuries it is thought that he will be able to open the game Friday night.

Employers Seek Help Through NRS Office

The manager of the local National Recemployment Service reports gratifying response from the farmers of this territory in answer to the notice given publicity in the Courier last week. Already they have called for nearly five hundred cotton pickers in this immediate vicinity, all the farmers requesting local white labor if it is possible to secure them.

Available local labor is urged to register with this office, located the first stairway north of the First National Bank, and give the number of pickers in the family, the approximate ability of the crew and if transportation is needed to get them to the field. Most of the farmers needing hands have places to house them and water available.

Another unusual situation is the fact that most of the employers do not want too large a crew, but had rather have few enough to be able to give them steady employment the entire harvest season.

This service is free to both the employer and the employees, being a government agency, and advantage of its efficiency should be taken by those needing help or employment. Let every available cotton picker register there, so it will not be necessary for them to get outside labor to relieve the situation.

Mail Service Is Temporarily Routed Through Big Spring

Due to the recent rains here and on the north, the roads between here and Snyder have become so bad that the motor mail route which carries the mail from Snyder has been delayed several hours each day and in some instances completely missed.

As this is our most important mail service, bringing the mail from the east and the daily papers from Dallas and Fort Worth, Postmaster Taylor has made temporary arrangements to route the mail through Big Spring until the roads become passable.

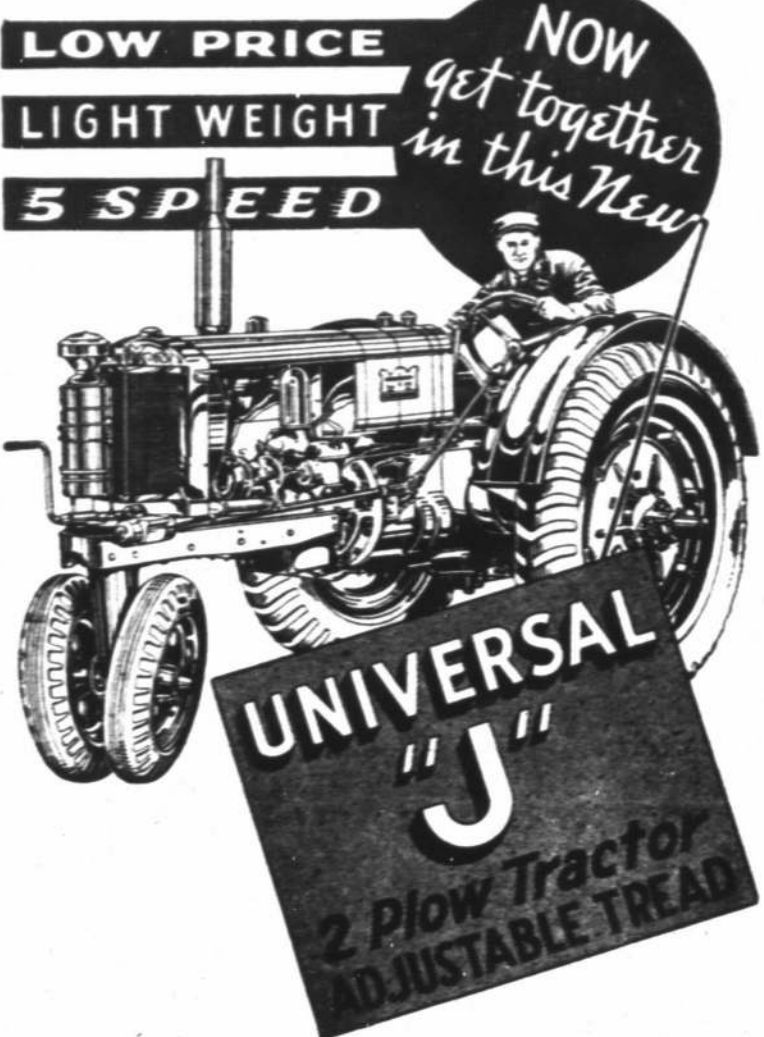

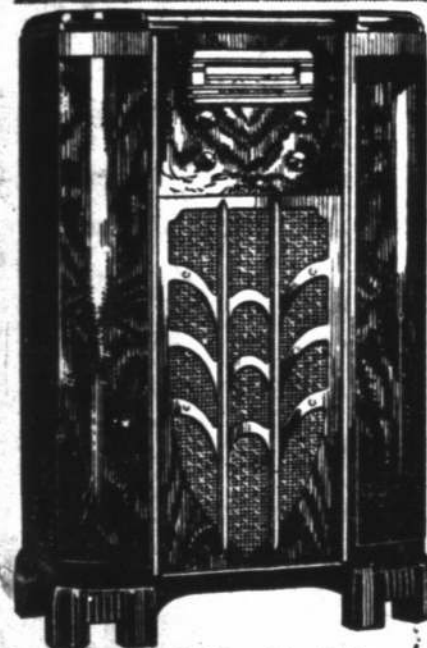

LEGAL NOTICES

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAMESA, TEXAS, Forbidding the sale, possession for the purpose of sale, firing, discharging, igniting, or exploding of fireworks, within the fire limits of the City of Lamesa, Texas, describing and defining such fire limits, defining terms and fixing penalties for violations of said ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAMESA, TEXAS

Section 1. The term "fireworks" shall include firecrackers, Roman candles, skyrockets, torpedoes, and all packages containing combustible or explosive material, save and except ammunition for firearms.

Section 2. For the purpose of this act the "fire limits" are and shall be bounded on the North by the North boundary line of North Second Street on the South by the South boundary line of South Second Street, on the East by the East Boundary line of Dallas Street, and on the West by the West Boundary line of Houston Street, and shall include all blocks, lots, streets, alleys and territory within such boundaries.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person to sell or to possess, for the purpose of sale, within such firelimits, any fireworks.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person to shoot, fire, discharge, ignite or explode any fireworks as herein defined, within, on or upon the fire limits of the City of Lamesa, Texas, whether the same be done by means of fire, flame, spark, or impact or contact with another object, or otherwise.

Section 5. Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than Five Dollars nor more than two hundred dollars, and each shooting, firing, discharging, igniting or exploding any fireworks shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. In the event any section, term, provision or part hereof shall be adjudged or deemed invalid or unconstitutional, this ordinance and all other terms, sections, provisions and parts thereof, shall nevertheless be held and deemed to be in full force and effect and valid in all other respects.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect on and after its due publication as prescribed by law.

Passed and approved this 28th day of August, A. D. 1936.

CABBAGE IN GLASS JARS BECOMES "SOUP CABBAGE"

"Many people who are making kraut need to be enlightened," said Mrs. Joe Peterson, member of the McCarty home demonstration club, to the members of that club in a club meeting last Tuesday.

The lactic acid bacteria which brings about fermentation and the curing of the cabbage are killed when exposed to light. Therefore, when one places cabbage in glass jars, adds salt and water, "sour cabbage," and not sauer kraut is the resulting product. Stone jars or kegs are most suitable in making kraut.

One pound of salt to 40 pounds of cabbage are the correct proportions to be used in making sauer kraut. The cabbages should be shredded and mixed with the salt and allowed to stand a few minutes then packed in the container firmly. One should avoid "pounding" as this bruises the cabbage and a soft product will be the result. About ten days to two weeks are required for making kraut.

PROCESSED CHEESE GOOD FOR SCHOOL LUNCHES

"We find that new processed cheese is so good in preparing school lunches that we use about four pounds of it a week," Mrs. L. A. Duff, member of the Klondike home demonstration club told the county home demonstration agent, Miss Mattie Phenix.

New processed cheese is very high in food value and takes only a short time to make it. Whereas, several weeks are required to make American cheese. The following is the method for making processed cheese:

Take 3 gallons of separated milk when it is curdled. Heat to temperature of 100 degrees F. stirring most of the time. This makes the ordinary cottage cheese. Hold at this temperature for 30 minutes and continue stirring. Squeeze drier than customary for cottage cheese.

Take 1-2 cup of butter
Salt to taste (about 1-2 t.)
1 T. soda.

Mix the butter, salt, and soda thoroughly into the cottage cheese. Let stand 2 hours. Add 1 cup sweet cream and put all into double boiler and heat while cooking until a smooth consistency has been formed. Remove from the fire and add one-half cup of sweet or sour cream to which has been added cheese coloring as desired (about 1-4 to 1-2 teaspoonful). Beat until smooth and turn into buttered dish to mold.

This complete process must be finished within one day. The cheese should season about five days. It may be covered with paraffin wax if to be kept. This cheese is mild cheese with very little flavor and for that reason needs an added flavor. Pimentoes, caraway seed or a small amount of strong flavored cheese melted and added, add a good flavor.

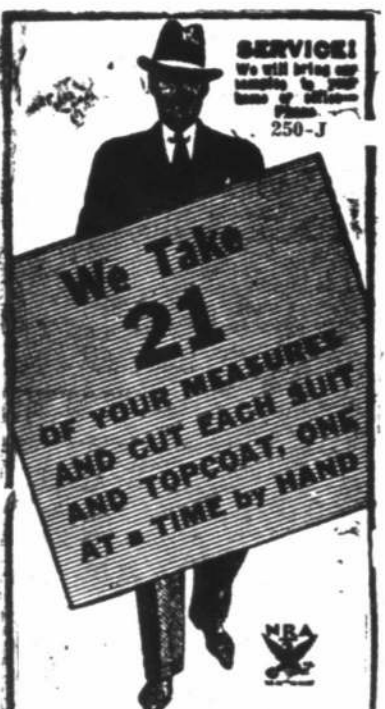

Texas Farm Debt Lower

A smaller number of American farms are under mortgage today than before the depression, and in Texas the total farm mortgage debt is slightly smaller, according to figures released today by the Farm Credit Administration.

Although the Farm Credit Administration has loaned over \$148,200,000 on farm mortgages in Texas since May 1933, approximately 96 per cent of the money was used to refinance old debts so that very little new indebtedness was incurred.

The farm mortgage debt in the State which increased from \$172,240,000 in 1910 to \$543,950,000 in 1930, dropped to \$538,810,000 on January 1, 1935. Figures for the earlier years are from the United States Department of Agriculture while the 1935 figures is the estimate of the Farm Credit Administration.

Strip Crops on Contour Eliminate Point Rows

Contour farming is a fine way to reduce run-off and erosion on sloping fields, but strip cropping is even better, according to reports to the Soil Conservation Service.

Strip crops on the contour not only retard run-off but in most fields the close-planted crops take up the short "point" rows that result from variations in the contour. Very few fields have the same angles of contour from one side to the other.

An experiment in the south showed that land planted on the contour to cotton alone lost 10 times as much soil as a similar field strip cropped with cotton and oats.

Land in cotton alone with rows up and down hill lost soil at the rate of 17 tons an acre and more than half its rainfall. The strip cropped land averaged only half a ton per acre soil loss and lost only a little of its rainfall.

Strip cropping is alternating strips of close-growing, many-rooted crops, such as grasses, legumes or small grains with rows of clean tilled crops like corn and cotton. Strip crops spread out and soak up the water that runs off the row crops and act as barriers to any small gullies that may form in the freshly tilled soil.

Strip cropping in the wind eroded area consists of the planting in strips of either close-growing crops or of the regular planting widths of sorghum which are wind erosion resistant. Crops of this section which should be planted in strips with erosion resistant crops are corn, cotton and beans. Strip cropping of this kind furnishes protection against wind damage.

Langford, Boy Scout Fair Committee Chairman, is asking that each troop get its exhibit in Sunday as early as possible. A committee composed of Tom Everheart, Lubbock, Chairman; A. B. Sanders Littlefield; and M. L. Baze of Brownfield; has been appointed to judge the exhibits. Cash prizes are to be given winners of troop exhibits and ribbon awards will be given all other first second and third place winners.

A total of 44,361 distressed home owners in Texas were extended aid in the sum of \$103,208,774. Of this money it is estimated that \$6,343,000 went toward the payment of taxes and assessments, the estimated average of tax and assessment loans in Texas being \$143.

FARM NOTES

Trench Silos

Since the rains have caused the feed crops that have matured to sprout in the field, it seems according to some of the farmers that the better way to get the most value from the crops would be to put it in the trench silo. The silo filled with the feed that has sprouted should be a good quality feed for livestock during the coming winter and early spring while there is not any green feed available.

County Fair

Several have made inquiry about who would be permitted to exhibit livestock. Only Club boys will be permitted to exhibit livestock and poultry during the fair for competition for premium money. Those who want to display livestock as a commercial enterprise will need to make application with Mr. Matthews at commercial advertising rates.

Agricultural Exhibits

Any producer may exhibit any crop that he may choose to place on exhibition for which there will be no charge in any manner. For those who desire to exhibit farm crops a catalog may be had from the county agent's office in which is listed premiums and the sizes or amount of any product to be placed in the exhibit tent.

4-H Club Work

Reports from the boys who are feeding the calves show that practically all of the calves are fattening out nicely and doing as well as can be expected. Ted Turner reports that his calf gained 20 pounds the first 26 days that he had him at home and the calf shrunk quite a lot the first few days in that it would not eat the ground feed. All the calves were several days in starting to eat the ground feed that the boys are feeding them composed of ground corn, milo, or hegari with cotton seed meal, as well as sudan, cut green.

There will be at least fifteen calves go from this county to the calf show at Midland, the 7th of October, the week before the 4-H Club Fair at Lamesa.

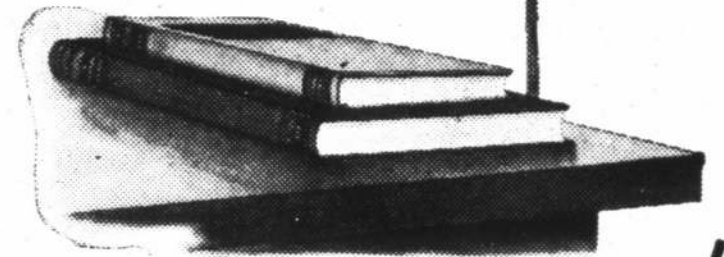
