TAYLOR FIGHTS TO MORE FAME

FOURTEEN DAYS OF TRAINING DEVELOPS POPULAR STAR INTO A PUG-POUNDING FAVORITE

From never having had on a pair of boxing gloves into a fighter who makes the professionals pause and consider before climbing through the ropes to mix it with him, is the story of Robert Taylor's actual accomplishments.

"The Crowd Roars" which will show at the Ellis Theatre Sunday and Monday, August 28-29, shows Taylor going through this intensive training period on a ranch in the San Fernando Valley, prior to the shooting of the film.

In that time he develops into a fighter who can whip seventy-five per cent of the best professional fighters in his weight in the country. Woven into the story are two women—a blond and a brunette—who use their best technique to lay claim to their "battler." Maureen O'Sullivan and Jane Wyman add their flashing charm to the lighter moments of this action-packed fight story.

Taylor, who was born on the wrong side of the tracks, fights his way up to a crack at the light-heavyweight championship. He not only looks the part to perfection, he gives every ounce of energy and acting ability in his 175 pounds, ring-side.

Frank Morgan, Edward Arnold, William Gargan and Nat Pendleton add to the cast with their personalities.

TITLE-HOLDERS ASTOUNDED AT TAYLOR'S RING TECHNIQUE

Robert Taylor has become an enthusiastic fight fan, demonstrated by his recent trip to New York from the West Coast, solely to witness the Louis-Schmeling affair. One reason for his new hobby is "The Crowd Roars." For as star of the fight film he, who never had a boxing lesson in his life, had to go through as severe a training as Jack Dempsey, Jimmy Braddock or the present heavy-weight champion, Joe Louis.

He came out of it with huzzahs trailing him. Jimmy McLarnin, Maxie Rosenbloom, Joe Glick and a dozen other ring title-holders who acted as trainers, claimed him as a personal "find," while Dan Tobey, fight announcer for the Los Angeles Olympic and Hollywood Legion stadiums, watching him in the gym one day was astounded.

"Why I used to know that boy ten years ago in Lincoln, Nebraska," he said, "at that time he was a social dancer. It doesn't seem possible he could have caught the fighter's technique he uses, in fourteen days!"

In the new picture, Taylor will be seen in three fights, first with William Gargan, second with Mickey McAvoy, and finally with Patay Perroni. The fights take place in a reproduction of Madison Square Garden, covering 20,000 square feet of floor space on one of M-G-M's

largest sound stages. More than 800 extras impersonate fight fans, and the only complaint Richard Thorpe made during his direction, was that they wouldn't yell loud enough.

They fooled him however, during one of the rounds between Taylor and Perroni, when in the excitement of the match the timekeeper forgot to ring the bell. During the extra two minutes the crowd roared so loud, they neither heard the bell when it did ring, nor Thorpe's frantic whistle for them to quiet down. It was spontaneous on the part of both participants and fans.

The training camp sequences were made in Raoul Walsh's San Fernando Valley ranch, which represented a Connecticut farm in the story. Another locale was Los Angeles' Beale Street, a Mexican colony, and also the Santo Nino Church on Goat Hill.

After the final day's shooting, Mr. Taylor announced his intention of retiring to his ranch for a week to relax. But Jimmy McLarnin declared it wouldn't be as easy as all that to forget he'd been a fighter. His trainers, it seems, didn't train him for just one picture, but for all time. So long as he keeps in condition, they claim he can step into a ring at any time, and take on seventy-five per cent of the professionals in the film colony, and win.

The supporting cast in "The Crowd Roars" includes Edward Arnold, Frank Morgan, Maureen O'Sullivan, William Gargan and Lionel Stander. George Bruce wrote the original story.

FAMOUS COWBOYS IN SCENE

CODED CHAMPS OF WORLD TO BE SEEN IN SPECTACULAR SCENES OF "COWBOY FROM BROOKLYN"

The cream of the country's rodeo champs worked at the Warn'r Bros. Studio in the spectacular scenes depicting a rodeo at Madison Square Garden which were filmed for "Cowboy from Brooklyn," which shows at the Ellis Theatre tonight and tomorrow.

Among the outstanding cowboys who performed were Benny Corbett, bronco rider, champion relay rider and world's champion Roman standing rider, holding this latter championship for six consecutive years; Johnny Slater, world's champion bronco rider; Lloyd Saunders, champion bulldogger; George Williams, champion trick rider; Karas M'ehring, who won the title of world's champion cowboy at the Pendleton Roundup in 1929; Earl Dobbins, champion trick rider; Buster Wiles and Art Hudkins, singing cowboys, and Abie Ortega, famed Mexican Indian cowboy.

In 1923, Ortega and Benny Corbett made a tour of the Orient with Jack Burroughs and E. K. Fernandez in a carnival and wild west show. During the World War, Kansas Moehring and Ortega supplied the government with horses for a remount depot.

The cowboys provided the colorful background against which Dick Powell, in the title role, Pat O'Brien, Priscilla Lane, Dick Poran, Johnnie Davis and other players worked in the spectacular new musical.

EGOTISM MAKES MOVIE STARS, SAYS FIDLER

If you would be a great movie star, earning millions of dollars, having automobiles and yachts, being haunted by autograph seekers—don't try to be beautiful nor to develop personality. Just develop a healthy egotism. That, at least, is the advice of Jimmie Fidler, who knows Hollywood inside out.

In an article in the September Pictorial Review, Fidler states that if you have an invulnerable

modesty, "you don't have a ghost of a chance in the highly competitive acting profession." As inflated ego is as necessary a tool to the actor as a pipe wrench is to the plumber; and, unlike the plumber's wrench, the actor's ego is always with him.

"It is largely a matter of sales psychology," Fidler analyzes. "The career pet-sweeper salesman, in order to be a good salesman, must believe devoutly that his sweep is the best on the market; the actor, forced into salesmanship by the keen competition for every role, must believe just as implicitly in the superior merit of his commodity—which happens to be himself."

In the event that an actor should appear in Hollywood without an inflated ego, Fidler says that one or two things would promptly happen: either he would find himself out of a job or he would soon have an ego as big as a house.

"How can screen stars avoid egotism when the whole world conspires to infect them with the disease?" asks Jimmie Fidler. "In the studios, batteries of high-powered publicity scribes labor to sing their praises; and should star lack abilities or qualities worth praising, the fertile imaginations of those gentlemen create them."

Assuming that a star may be a "regular guy" but so mental or physical prodigy, the press agents can soon make a genius out of him, according to Fidler.

"If he played a game or two of football—on the bench—for his Alma Mater, the publicity lads make him an All-American. If he had a few puppy love affairs, his press agents can sensationalize them until he appears to be an irresistible Don Juan. If he reads murder mysteries and Wild West melodramas, they are duly converted, by his publicity, into philosophic and psychological profundities."

In addition to publicity men, fan magazine writers, fans themselves, autograph seekers, and fan mail are at work on a 24-hour a day schedule to inflate movie egos.

"Imagine yourself bounded," Fidler explains, "by fan magazine interviewers, who eagerly ask you questions about the technique of

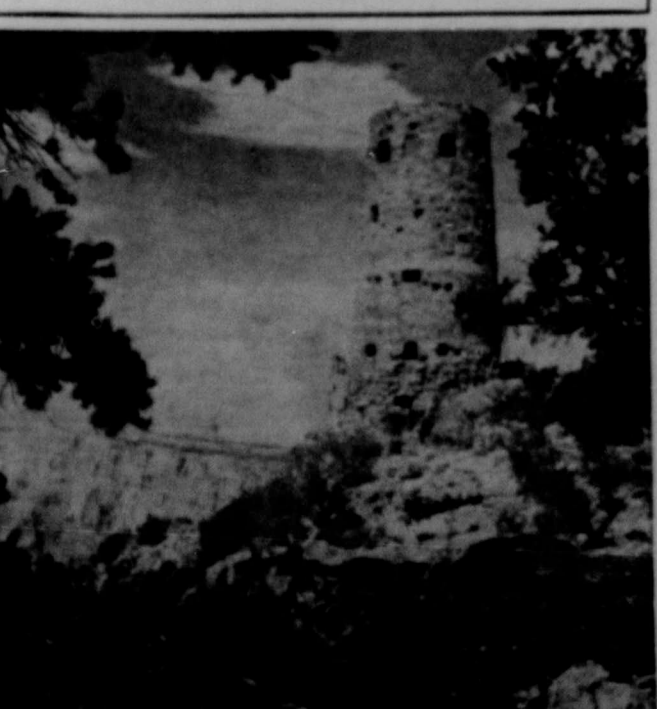

Tower Enhances View



From this tower, located at the end of the most beautiful drive on the south rim of the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, can be seen in all its glory, the Painted Desert, Coconino Plateau, Hopi and Navajo Indian country, and in the distance San Francisco peaks, highest mountains in Arizona.

The Watchtower at Desert View, on the South Rim of the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, is a faithful recreation of the lookout stations or towers erected by the ancient inhabitants of the Southwest many centuries ago.

Constructed of native stones on the brink of the chasm, the Watchtower rises from a huge foundation of green-stained Canyon boulders. At its base is a low round kiva, a reproduction of the ancient ceremonial chambers or temples of the Pueblo Indians.

On the walls of the kiva and of each level on the ascent to the tower are a number of actual

specimens of Indian pictographs—drawings and carvings, many centuries old.

From the top of the Watchtower, the view embraces vast expanses of the Grand Canyon, the Painted Desert and the Kaibab National Forest.

Bright Angel and Kaibab trails built by government engineers permit a closer study of the Canyon walls and of the story of centuries of erosion which is recounted daily by Government geologists at the observatory near Yavapai Point. Sure-footed saddle mules carry one safely over the trails while motor coaches cruise leisurely along the rim drives.

Circus Fans' Organization Declares Show Must Go On



The caper-cutting clown... the pretty lady on the horse... are these passing from the American scene, to become something out of the past to future generations of wide-eyed kids?

IF the newly-formed Circus Fans' Association of America gets its way, President Roosevelt will soon be looking at a petition signed by 500,000 children and asking him to do something about the fast disappearing circuses.

With the "big tops" battling (many have already given up) what is probably the worst financial year in their history, the Circus Fans resolved in convention at Madison, Wis., to "keep the circus from going the way of the small town opera house."

There have been about a dozen major casualties in the business this summer and only one really big circus is now showing in the United States. Insiders blame the weather, and the fact that too many new shows hit the road in an attempt to cash in on what looked like a banner season. But whatever the reason, the fans are staying away from the tents in great droves.

The Circus Fans "say it ain't so" . . . that the circus is too vital a part of the American scene to fold its tents in just one season. They say that Circus Day will be the big day in the

small town as long as there is a small town left. Just the same, even the elephants can't remember when things have been as tough . . . when so many human skeletons, ferocious man-eaters, and pretty girl acrobats were out of work.

As the crusade goes forward the American Federation of Actors, A. F. of L. affiliate, has charged before the National Labor Relations Board that Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus deliberately faked its shutdown this summer to get from under a union contract with its 1200 employees.

The complaint states that up to the time the show closed in Scranton, Pa., following a strike, the management had cleared \$250,000, largely due to a profitable run in New York's Madison Square Garden.

So while one group asks the President to do something about the circus, another group asks the NLRB to do something quite different about the circus.

WOODWARD RO-DEO IN SEPT.

WOODWARD OFFERS MANY FEATURES AT THE TENTH ANNUAL RODEO HELD ON SEPTEMBER 9-11

WOODWARD, Okla., Aug. 23.—(Special)—Northwest Oklahoma is wearing cowboy regalia as time for the tenth annual rodeo at Woodward, September 9-10-11 draws close.

Woodward business men always don pioneer garb a month before the event, which is northwest Oklahoma's big attraction of the year. Even housewives put on cowboy regalia to keep in the spirit of things.

The rodeo this year will be bigger and better than ever, the sponsors claim. As proof, they point to the \$5,000 posted in prize money, and to the long list of entrants, including rodeo champions from all parts of the United States and Canada.

J. O. Selman, cattleman, the arena director, predicts no less than 50,000 visitors in Woodward for the three-day show.

During these three days Woodward will back in the limelight of national publicity. News reels, radio stations and news syndicates always are amply represented as the bucking bronchos and wild steers perform.

There are many special events on the program to vary the entertainment. There will be, for instance, a parade in which more than 75 floats will pass in review down the streets of Woodward on Friday September 9.

Phil Ferguson, congressman from the eighth district, and Rob Walker, Woodward rodeo booster, are directing plans for the parade.

In the parade there will be bands from Colorado, Texas, New Mexico, Kansas and Oklahoma. Later these bands, numbering 1,000 musicians, will play a mass concert in the rodeo arena.

There will be dances, vaudeville and motion picture previews but the big event will be the rodeo itself, in which there will be bulldogging, steer roping, calf roping, bronc riding, steeple riding, fancy trick roping, trick riding events, and the other contests of a rodeo.

In anticipation of a record-breaking crowd this year, the state highway patrol will ask members of its staff to handle traffic. Last year automobiles from 33 states, Mexico and Canada were noted in the parking grounds near the arena.

J. E. Osborne is public relations director for the rodeo, sponsored by the Elks club. It is held at Woodward Amusement City, a playground of 165 acres owned and operated by the city. It includes an airport, bathing beach, tennis courts, picnic grounds, race track, ball park and the rodeo arena.

Last year, for the first time, the \$75,000 grandstand was used and this year, in addition to the grandstand, hundreds of extra bleacher seats will be erected.

The rodeo arena is one of the best arranged in the country, sponsors say. The finest chutes and stock pens have been provided, and the bucking chutes are close enough to the grandstand to allow the crowd close-up views of the action.

The first rodeo 10 years ago was staged at the cost of about \$3,500. More than \$25,000 will be spent in presenting the 1938 show, John Diefenderfer, advertising chairman says.

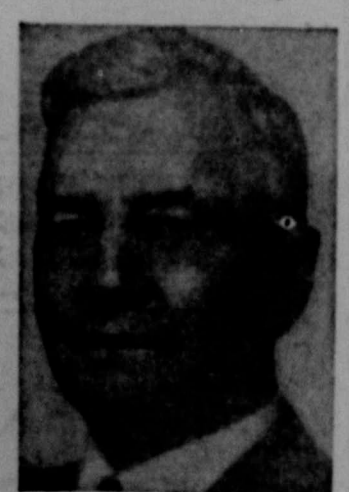

THE RIGHT OF FRANCHISE

Following are excerpts from a speech delivered by Senator M. Adoo. This speech was delivered several years ago, and although it was not a certain candidate in the recent campaign, at the time it was prepared it was considered beyond the realm of possibility that a man without a vote would ever seek the highest office in the state.

The right of franchise is the most sacred legacy bequeathed to us by our fathers. It was bought by their blood and consecrated by their prayers. The Christian citizen who follows in this respect throws away his sacred heritage. Voting in time of peace should be as binding as fighting in time of war. It is not only a political privilege, but a social duty. It matters not what position or place we take we cannot evade the responsibility of the ballot. The man who fails to vote is a traitor of a constitutional trust and the emblem of a blood-bought right. Our fathers deeded the land and placed in our hands the ballot, and on our shoulders the responsibility of every governmental act. Every man owes it to his country to exercise the right of suffrage on election day. He is not a citizen unless he would go to the polls with less courage or with less conviction than he would should he march against an invading foe. Frequently the man who votes the loudest and blubbers the most about the wrongs that be, is the fellow who knows the least about the polls. Generally the man who never reads a party platform, who knows least about election days, who never champions a cause until the verdict has been returned the one who whines the most about the unwise administration of public affairs.

It is a great thing to be a Governor of the State or a Senator of the Nation, but high above him is the private citizen with a white ballot in hand who chooses and unchooses governors and senators. Casting a ballot and guarding the ballot box, important as they may be, are not the only duties the Christian owes his country. He should be a politician to the extent of taking an active interest in every public or political question that touches the morals or the material prosperity of the people. He should be a man standing four square to all the winds that blow, and nothing that a human should be foreign to his heart. "He alone deserves to be elected, who either saves or serves his people." Jesus Christ was the world's greatest politician. His platform of peace and good will can be found in the glorious Gospels, and the rich record of His political statesmanship is chronicled in the immortal Scriptures. "The had citizenship of good will" is a fitting indictment against the Christian citizenship of our civilization. There are those among us who live spotless lives in home and church, and who are honest and pure in all their dealings with men, but who are dangerously deficient in all the duties of government and citizenship. No man should be a politician in the governmental beehive of our people. If this country shall not decline and decay, her doom will not be on account of the inaction of a foreign foe, but on account of the supine indifference of our own citizens. Some people are so good, so extremely good, and they think everything about them is so bad, and that the country in all its governmental affairs is so low and base and vulgar that they cannot afford to soil their hands by touching it. They sit down and folds his hands, wraps himself in his imaginary robe of righteousness and feels that he has no good to take part in the fundamental questions of the hour. There are too many political cowards who shrink and flee of otherwise of people. What right have they to sit with a sanctimonious air and the and whisper about bad officers and worthless laws. When so as their efforts are concerned the us of the slums might run for in their government. The felon citizen who can today sit out on the stormy ocean of our national life and see nothing but the bad, over it, or under it, the struggle of men for self, the and power has something to say with his brain. Why did our nation loonies and political cowards, whose fops and heedless of the destiny and fix the fate of our great commonwealth, in the great manhood of the state, like Achilles in his heel, refuse to fight or even lead? Withdraw from the affairs of the state the politician and the Christian's ballot and before many moons we shall have another Praetor. 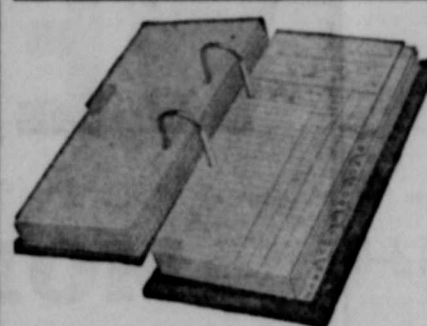

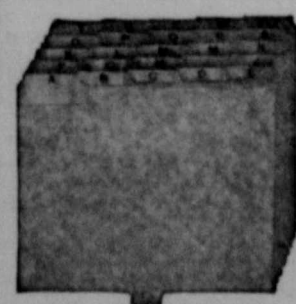

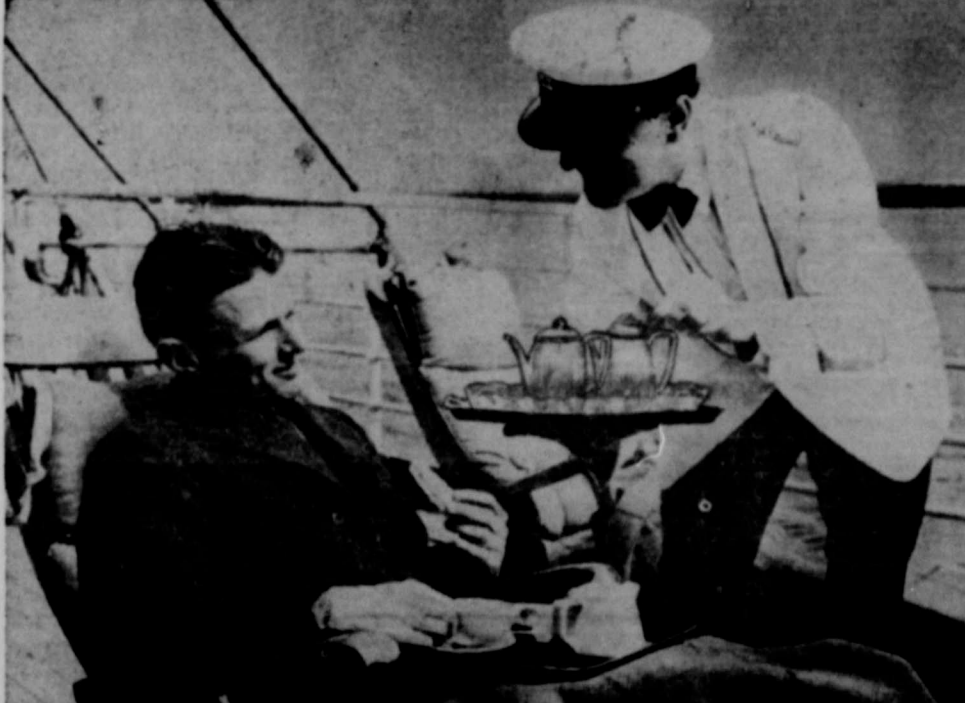

Protect Your Child

Diphtheria Often Fatal and Every Child Should be Immunized For His Protection

Austin, Texas—"Few conquests of science have been so spectacular and complete as those relating to diphtheria. Science has firmly established the value of serum treatment in both its preventive and curative phases. However, toxin-antitoxin or its successor toxoid for immunization and antitoxin for cure, are serums of which the general public is as yet not fully aware," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"As indicated, toxoid is the immunizing or preventive agent now usually employed. However, three or four months are required for the body to develop immunity. At that time the Schick test can be applied to determine the results of the preventive treatment.

"Children should receive diphtheria immunization as early as possible, preferably as soon as they are six months old. The necessity for this immunization is recognized when it is known that two-thirds of all deaths from diphtheria occur in the age group under six years.

"It cannot be too strongly emphasized that to deprive children of this protection science has made possible is to subject them to unwarranted and unnecessary hazards that can easily turn into a tragedy. Parental interest in immunization must be more widespread. If the Texas death rate from this disease is to be decreased from the 1937 total of 257.

"When a child has been taken ill with diphtheria, antitoxin is the only treatment that will save its life. Also, to be effective, it must be given early in the illness and in large doses. Delay is usually caused by parents failing to realize that any sore throat may actually be diphtheria."

The dedication of the Grotto at St. Peter's Catholic Church in Guymon, Oklahoma, Wednesday evening, August 24, is of interest to many in Texas and Oklahoma. Thirty Priests from Oklahoma and adjoining states were in attendance.

Bishop Kelly, Oklahoma City, who was scheduled to take part on the program, is in New York City, and will be represented by Monsignor Depriete, Oklahoma City. The following program will be given:

"The Star Spangled Banner," Guymon band; procession from House during which the band will play a march; "As the Dewey Shades of Evening," Guymon Choir; Blessing of Grotto, Monsignor Depriete; The Image of our Queen, Guymon Choir; Sermon, Rev. Joseph LaBante, Hydro, Okla.; procession of blessed sacrament from church followed by benediction; Holy God, we praise Thy name, Choir; Recession; American, Guymon band.

The Grotto was started in June 1937 when Father Pierce laid the plans for the cross-shaped fish pond in front of the building. All work was done by Father Pierce and church members, taking them thirteen months to complete the structure which contains rocks from thirty-two states, Canada, Jericho and Jerusalem. Four feet above the floor of the building, in a half moon alcove lined with pink stones from South Dakota, stands a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary carved of white stone. Outlining the arch are black and sand colored stones and the ceiling is built of lava rock from Mount Capulin. The two large stones below the cross on the front of the grotto were sent from the two biblical cities, Jericho and Jerusalem. The grotto is lighted by indirect lights, shaded by sea shells from California and southern Texas.

Build 800 Miles of Paved State Highways in Nineteen Panhandle Counties in Past 8-Year Period

With the announcement of the transfer of W. J. Van London, for the past eight years chief engineer of the Amarillo division of the Texas State Highway Department, a review of the construction during this 8-year period shows that approximately 800 miles of paved highways have been built in the 19-county area included in the Amarillo division.

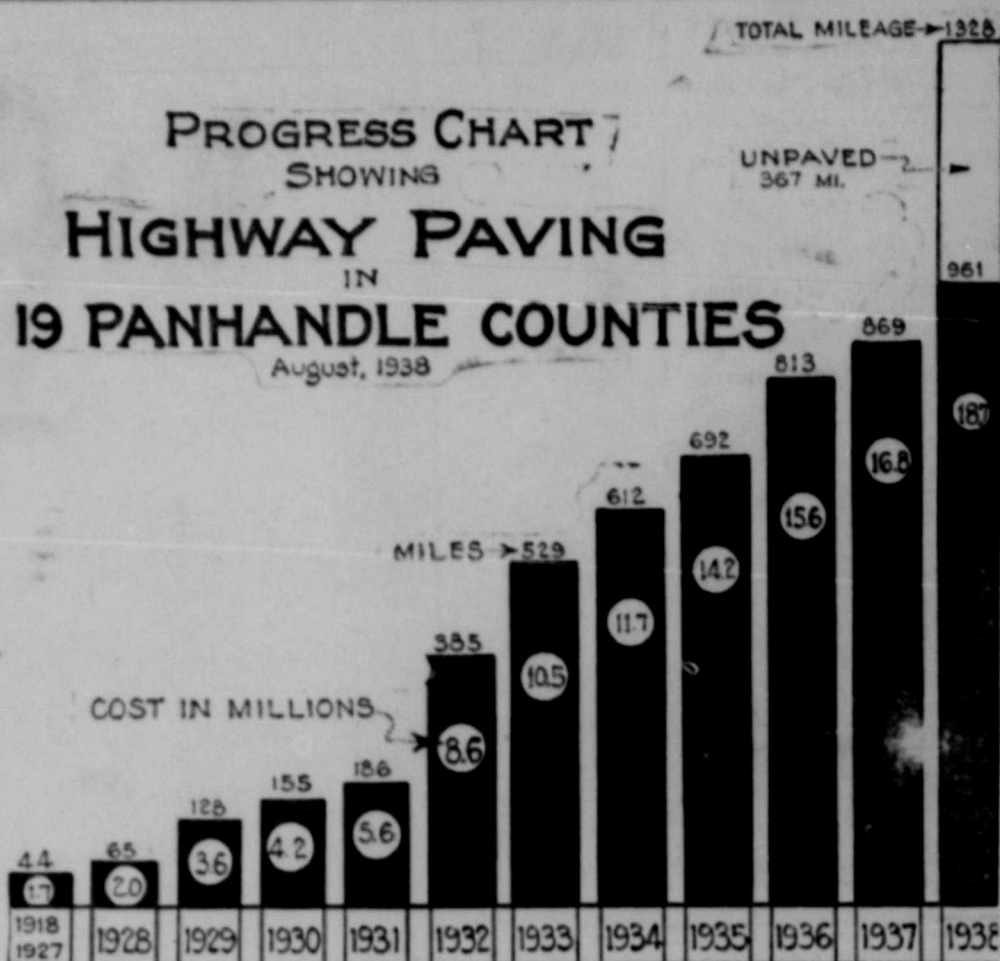
Mr. Van London goes from the Amarillo division to the Houston office, exchanging places with Jim Douglas, chief engineer of the Houston division.

The graph to the right shows the pavement constructed by years with accumulative mileages and costs. It will be noted that the greater part of the pavement has been built since 1930, in which period approximately 800 miles of pavement has been built, an average of over 100 miles per year, and at a cost approaching two million dollars a year.

Within the past seven years the more important highway arteries paved or which are advertised for immediate construction are as follows: U. S. 87 and 370, Terlingua to Memphis, 200 miles; U. S. 80 across the Panhandle, 109 miles; U. S. 69 across the Panhandle 137 miles; U. S. 83, Oklahoma line to Shamrock, 103 miles; U. S. 87, Canyon to Happy, 17 miles; U. S. 54, across Dallam county, 25 miles; State 117, between Claude and Oklahoma line, 30 miles; State 152, from east of Wheeler to Borger, 67 miles.

A mileage summary of the state highways in the Amarillo division shows 1238 miles, 961 being paved and 91 miles with grading and drainage structures completed.

In this division there has been

TRAFFIC DEATH TOLL IS HIGH

RECKLESS DRIVING TAKES LIFE OF 909 PEOPLE IN TEXAS SINCE JANUARY 1 AND MANY INJURED

Austin, Aug. 24.—A traffic casualty picture remains dismal in spite of regular monthly decreases in death tolls, state police said today, as they watched the July records rise to 129 dead.

While there has been a saving of 245 lives in the first seven months of this year compared with 1937 figures, traffic experts of the safety department declared that ruthlessness and recklessness have snuffed out the lives of 909 people on Texas streets and highways since January 1.

Because of holiday and vacation travelers causing crowded conditions and additional traffic hazards during the month of July, there was a predicted increase in deaths and injuries, but the 1938 toll fell short of the July 1937 death rate by 13. Still, the officials pointed out, 99 per cent of these fatal crashes were unnecessary and could have been avoided had drivers followed simple rules of safety.

Cities are showing improved accident records as only 38 deaths occurred on city streets last month. There were 92 laid to open highway traffic. Intensified enforcement, educational campaigns and publicity programs were given by state officers as the reason for lower traffic losses in cities. Similar activities are adopted for decreasing open highway crashes. However higher speed limits bring about more serious collisions, police said.

State traffic recorders said that 60 of the 129 dead lost their lives in accidents involving two or more vehicles. Two were killed riding bicycles. One lost his life in a horse-drawn conveyance and another died after his car struck livestock on a highway. Six were killed in railroad crossing crashes.

Heavy financial losses and suffering were seen by police in the reports showing that 1,454 persons were injured in July accidents, many slated to die from their hurts.

Supervisors may receive these applications. The announcement was made August 9, by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, which administers this service.

Earl Waide, the Crop Insurance Supervisor for our county, in giving the foregoing information to this paper, tells us that he will keep open, until midnight, Wednesday, August 31, if necessary, his office at courthouse. His telephone number is 20. Mr. Waide tells us that up to August 11, "about 75,000 applications had reached the County Supervisors in the Winter Wheat states. How fast applications have come in since then, I do not know," he says, "but the gain in rate has been quite rapid."

"The first policy was issued July 13. For the two weeks following July 13, the rate at which applications reached the Kansas City branch, that serves this territory, was over two and one-half times as fast as for the week ending July 13. For the third week, it was almost four times as fast, and for the 4th week, ending August 12, it was 7.8 times as fast. At that time Ohio was far in the lead in number of applications, with Nebraska, Michigan and Kansas following in that order. For number of acres of the 1939 wheat crop insured, the Texas wheat region (which obtained the first FCIC policy issued and farms in a big way) was close to the top."

"While this new, all-risk crop insurance is in a way, part of the general program in which the farmers of this county are cooperating through the services of our ACP Committee of farmers. This is not, in any sense, mutual insurance. The full cost of a policy is definitely figured beforehand and there can be no additional charges or assessments. When an applicant gets his premium notice, it tells the exact amount of Ordinary No. 2 Hard Winter Wheat necessary to pay for his policy. It also gives the equivalent in two other grades and in cash, so that he has four options—can pay in cash, or in his choice of three grades of wheat. He can even pay now, in wheat, his premium for insurance on the 1940 crop."

"This is the only crop insurance," our Supervisor explains, "the cost of which is based on actual production and loss information compiled by counties and by farms. Thus, through a period of better seasons, better farming and use of better seed, it is possible for a community to lower

its risk rate. By a nation-wide system of handling the wheat, which represents premiums paid, and constitutes its reserve, from which indemnity payments will be made, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation effects economies in the cost to the grower of this insurance, prevents much local business hardship in communities subject to crop failures and exerts a stabilizing influence on prices."

"A number of large insurance companies, to which the plan of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation was submitted, approved it as sound and an improvement over other services. These companies own many farms and are financially able to carry their own insurance, but several of them are buying Federal Crop Insurance Corporation policies on their 1939 wheat and are urging their tenants to do the same."

So the next time you hear somebody say that this board is behind the proposed municipal plant, just tell them that they don't know what they're talking about, that the board has no say so regarding any PWA projects.

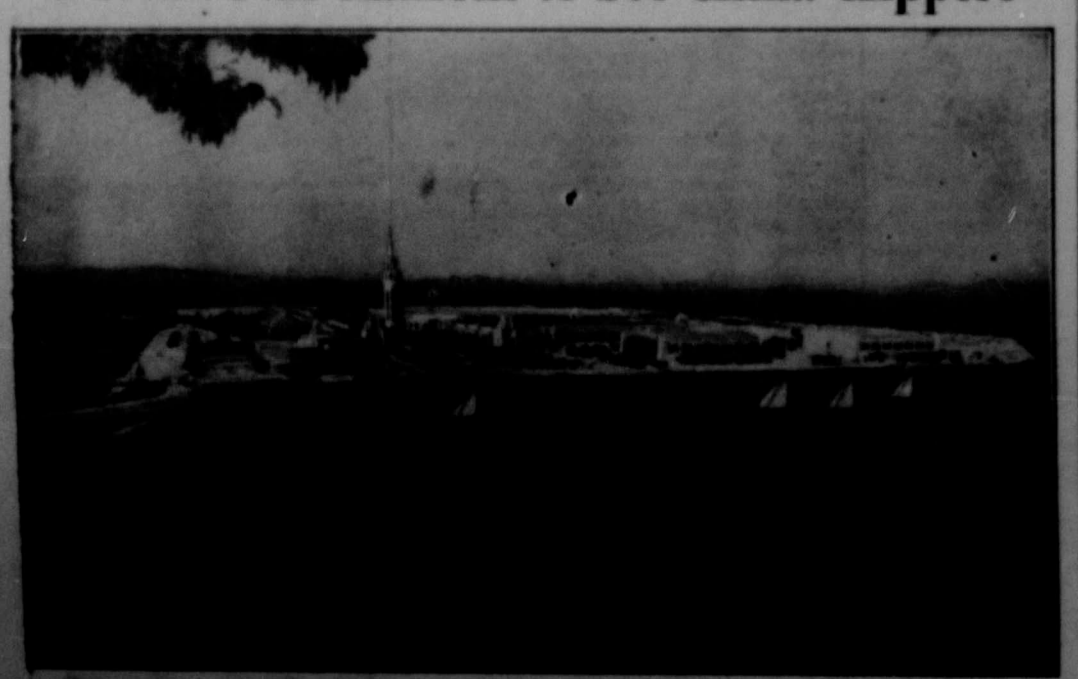
