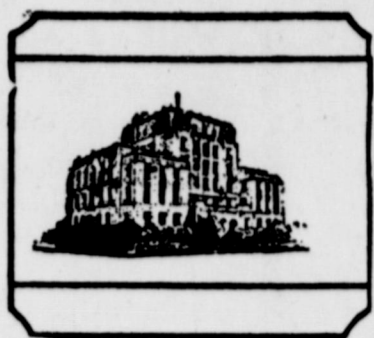

All peanut growers and others interested in peanut production are invited to attend a peanut tour in the Pioneer and Rising Star area, Tuesday, September 5th, at 1:30 p.m.

The tour will begin at the Pioneer Farmers' Coop. Visitors will see a peanut variety test plot. The variety test is being conducted by the Texas A&M - Tarleton Experiment Station and is sponsored by the Texas Peanut Producers Board and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

DeGordon, Eastland County Extension Agent, said the tour will also include several peanut farms in the area.

Three peanut Specialists will be on the tour to discuss production and answer questions on peanut problems. Dr. Charles Simpson, Experiment Station Plant Breeder will discuss the variety test plot. Dr. John Chapin, Extension Agronomist and Dr. Cliff Hoelscher, Extension Entomologist will be on the tour to answer questions.

Numerous implements and machines for the production of peanuts will be on display.

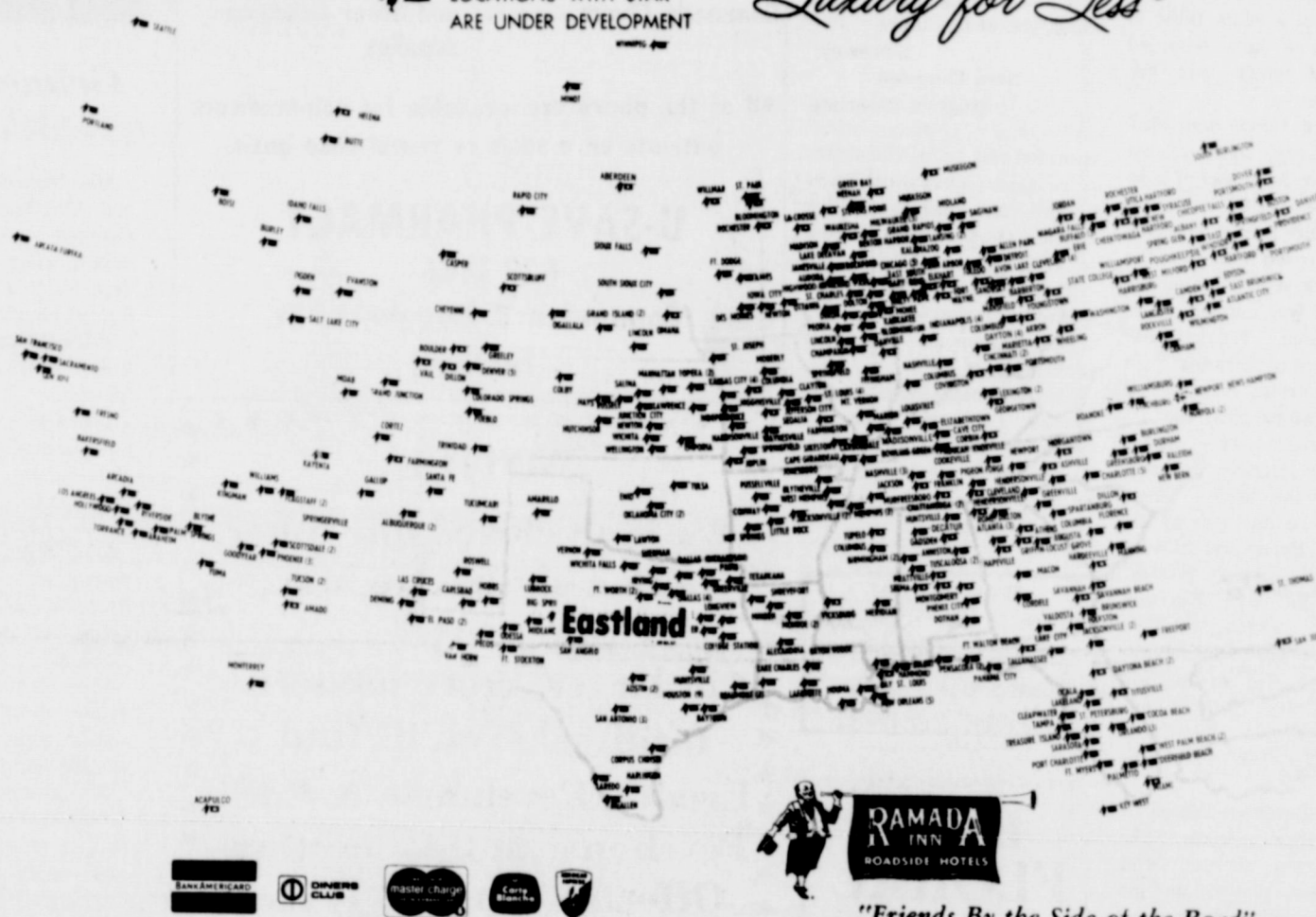

In keeping with its hospitable nature, Eastland is vastly expanding its visitor accommodations.

This word came this weekend with the announcement by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce of the establishment of a 72-unit Ramada Inn to be located immediately South of Int. 20 across from the Dairy Queen.

Chamber President Marcus O'Dell, Director Jeff Glazner and Land owner Winston Boles made the announcement.

An Arlington firm has the contract to build the facility and construction will begin with about 60 days and completion is expected in six to eight months.

The Ramada Inn, Eastland, will offer a swimming pool, restaurant to seat up to 100, and banquet rooms as well as small meeting rooms.

Mr. Boles handled the land negotiation for his mother, Mrs. Pebbles Boles, who reportedly made general cost concessions in order to assist this additional motel service for Eastland.

Cost of the new facility is expected to be some three-quarter million dollars, or about \$13,000 per unit, and will employ upwards of from 75 to 88 people it was announced.

The announcement followed many months of work by the Chamber of Commerce and others to achieve these needed additional facilities. Immediate Past President Jeff Glazner has made it almost a personal goal to see a major motel come here, and new President O'Dell continued in the effort. When inquiries were made recently about the town's need, Mr. O'Dell and others organized a survey reported, supported by the two local news media, and the people, in their usual cooperative fashion, responded wholeheartedly, and now the results are obvious.

Ramada Inn, Eastland, will be on 2.8 acre tract south of Int. 20, 175 feet west the Lake Leon Road. The Interstate off-ramp will go right into the Inn's parking lot. Area will be 275 by 450 feet.

Mr. Boles has been extremely active too in his attempt to bring this added service to Eastland. A successful restaurant man himself, Winston and Ima Boles opened their Dairy Queen the east end of Main St. back in June of 1967, even before the Interstate Highway was opened. Theirs was the first Dairy Queen on an Interstate Highway in the state, and their restaurant ranks among the very of the list of such restaurants in the state and nation. Through their efforts, their business and the entire location there has grown and expanded.

They have just recently built and opened a Premier Service

Station, which is operated by their son, Bill Boles.

And so it is significant of the Eastland spirit, that one restaurant man, seeing the needs of his city and the area, went to bat, and helped bring more motel and food service to this area.

The City Commission has been working hand in hand with the Chamber, and will provide sewer service to that area, and will in turn, see these and other locations brought into the city limits.

It has long been the hope of many administrations to take sewer service not only to the east, but also north. And now it can be done in one project. In their initial planning, the city will also secure necessary preliminary data on taking service south the Int. 20-Highway 6 interchange, in the event that it is requested there in the future. The East and North projects will be undertaken immediately.

It is estimated that the additional taxes from new city residents in that area can amortize the cost of sewer line. The line won't be taken primarily for the motel, but the motel is the additional impetus that helps make the whole project a reality.

Mr. O'Dell said in making the announcement.

"You can be sure that the chamber takes great pride in being able to announce this wonderful addition to our town. Further, you can be sure that it comes as the result of a lot of work by a lot of people. We think it's a perfect example of how people can work together through their chamber of commerce to see these things for their town. We invite others to join us in working for even a better Eastland now and in the future."

The Ramada Inn will complement the existing visitor accommodations offered which include the downtown Village Hotel, the El Morocco Hotel, the Lake View Motel (both in the Dairy Queen area), and the Pleasant Place, Vista and Eastland motels, on the west side of town.

Food service facilities include the Cattleman's Restaurant, the Old Rip Cafe, Bill England's Cafe, the Dairy Treat, AND THE Dairy Queen.

Quite a number of firms on the East Interchange have already indicated their willingness to come into the city limits to avail themselves of the sewerage and other services available.

Jerry Squires New Enco Station is located immediately due east of where the new Ramada Inn will be situated. A new Texaco Service Station, to be operated by Eddie Pevehouse is nearing completion due east of the El Morocco Motel.

The A-1 Pina Service Center, north of Highway 80, just across from the Dairy Queen, continues to expand and offer local as well as tourist services.

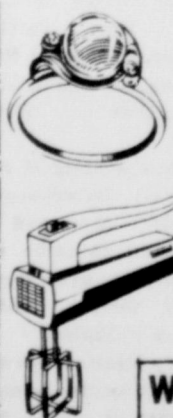

Dove Is Mighty Popular Species Right Now

The mourning dove - which did not become abundant until the passenger pigeon disappeared - is a very popular Game bird.

Let's talk about some of the habits and life styles of the dove. Since hunting season is near, most hunters are after little tidbits of information about their game.

With rare exceptions, dove feed on the ground. They have weak feet and can't scratch for food or cling to a vertical seed stalk. Seeds make up 99.5 percent of their food. They

prefer to feed in large open areas. Fields containing sunflowers, croton (or doveweed), pigweed, panicum grasses, and prickly poppy are choice food areas and should be good shooting areas.

Good shooting can be found around water during dryer parts of season. Dove prefer to water at ponds that have open areas around the waters edge. They like to light at a distance from water, then walk or fly to water. A few trees scattered around a pond make good places for the birds to land.

Dove are unlike other birds in that they do not drink getting a billfull of water and tipping

their head back to swallow. They drink their fill without removing their bill from the water.

The mourning dove will gain to an adult size in about 3 months, but will keep the juvenile plumage until about 5 months of age. A juvenile can be recognized from an adult very easily. A juvenile will have coverts (the small feathers along the top of the wing) and primary flight feathers (the larger flight feathers and the outer part of the wing) that have a buff margin. The adult birds do not have this margin. The sex of an adult bird can be recognized by looking at the coloring of the head. Males will have a blueish gray color on the top of their heads and necks, while the female is brown.

The oldest known dove to live in the wild was nine years old. Apopulation turnover is practically complete every four years.

Annual mortality is the primary factor in population control. Hunters take less than 10 percent of the birds by hunting. Annual mortality is about 80 percent for the first year of life and declines to 55 percent the next six years.

Dove have a 30-31 day nesting cycle and will nest several times during a season.

Anest is built in 2-4 days with the male finding materials and the female building the nest. Two eggs are laid beginning immediately after nest completion (laying takes 1-2 days) and hatched in 14-15 days. The young are fledged (feathered) and ready to leave the nest 12-15 days. Dove will usually lay at least three clutches per year. The male incubates the eggs by day, the female by night.

Both male and female feed the young a "milk" that increased as the birds become older. The "milk" is produced when the lining of crop thickens and sloughs off.

Doves may migrate up to 2,000-3,000 miles. Most of the migrations, however, come from the northern part of the birds range. During migrations, birds usually move only a few miles each day.

With a split dove season this year, a hunter can have two distinct seasons for hunting dove. This will be a unique experience and one which many hunters will enjoy. Happy Hunting.

To Be Worked Out

DETERIORATION

Every day I become more disturbed by continuing reports to my office that the quality of mail service in Texas is deteriorating rapidly. And the same thing seems to be true in other parts of the country.

Constituents report that many smaller post offices - facilities that are vital as community centers as well as for their intended function - are being closed.

Tremendous reductions in work force are reported. And as the number of these dedicated, conscientious workers decreases, there is a resulting curtailment of mail service which seems particularly acute in rural areas. For example, many post offices are no longer open on Saturdays.

And postal workers are caught in the middle; unhappy that they are not able to provide the service they have in the past. In Congressional testimony earlier this summer, James H. Rademacher, President of the National Association of Letter Carriers, listed several specific instances of reductions in postal services.

CUTBACKS IN MAIL COLLECTION

For example, he said that the Postal Service today devotes 13,000 hours less daily to mail collection than it did five years ago.

He also pointed out that many Americans are complaining about cutbacks in services offered at postal windows.

And he said one of the results, is that the U.S. Postal Service is losing out in competition for the parcel post business. Rademacher noted that, in 1967, the Post Office Department delivered twice the number of parcels that were delivered by its strongest

competitor, the privately owned United Parcel Service. Last year, though - for the first time in history - United Parcel delivered more parcels than the U.S. Postal Service. And it delivered them at a profit of more than \$30 million.

In addition to apparent reductions in service, I am also receiving disturbing reports about startling slowdowns in delivery time for first class mail.

Real County Judge W.B. Sansom of Leakey, Texas, informs my office that today it takes 10 hours longer for a letter mailed from Leakey to reach Uvalde than it did in 1884.

Judge Sansom explains the reason is that mail for Uvalde - 41 miles from Leakey - doesn't go direct. It is routed, instead, through San Antonio, a distance of more than 200 miles. And the situation in Leakey is likely to get worse, according to Judge Sansom. His town's post office lost all of its postal clerks in a cutback as of June 30, leaving only the postmaster to handle all the mail.

Another Texas constituent has described a situation in which a lady in his town mailed a check to pay her laundry bill. The check was mailed on a Friday, but didn't arrive at the laundry - a few blocks away - until the following Tuesday. The apparent reason for this is that the letter was sent to a regional processing center, in a city some distance away, then returned to her town for delivery.

MAIL DELIVERY NOT DEPENDABLE

Mail service in Texas also seems to have become very undependable, with letters arriving in a single day in some instances, but requiring three, four or more days at other times. A District Judge has told me that he resorts to the telephone to summon a jury panel unless he has as much as five days in which to act.

Most reports to my office indicate that most of the

deterioration of mail service has occurred during the past two years.

And this deterioration must be stopped.

Along with most Americans, I want our postal system to be operated as efficiently, with as little cost, as possible. But I don't believe that should be done at the expense of massive curtailment of mail services. That is false economy.

And the recent cutbacks in personnel and the reductions of service seem to be leading in that direction.

I am making a thorough inquiry into operation of the United States Postal Service. When it is completed, I will press for necessary action to bring the service up to par.

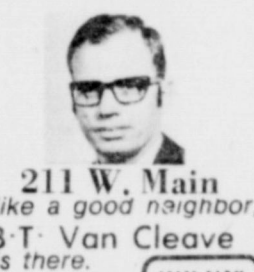

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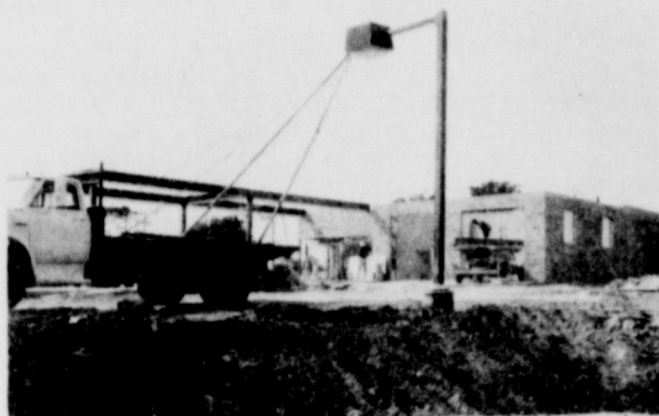

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Consumer's Report

Assume that you are a debtor who owes money on delinquent accounts to several different creditors who have been pressing you for prompt payment.

There are a number of possible solutions to clearing your credit record and seeing that your creditors are satisfied as they should be.

However, the legal arrangement known as debt pooling or debt consolidation, about which my office gets frequent inquiries, should be used only under limited circumstances.

Debt pooling is defined by law as a contract between a debtor and any other person whereby the debtor deposits a specific sum of money with that person for distribution among the debtor's creditors.

Of course, the agreement

usually includes the payment of a fee to the person doing the paying for his services rendered.

As a general rule, debt pooling is prohibited by Texas law. Those who unlawfully engage in this practice are guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 for each violation.

But the law provides for numerous instances where debt consolidation is allowed.

For example, banks, savings and loan associations, trust companies, and credit unions doing business under federal and state law are allowed to contract with a debtor for debt pooling where it occurs in the normal course of business activity.

Also exempted from the prohibitions against debt pooling are retail merchants associations and non-profit trade associations created for the purpose of collecting debts and credit data, any attorney at law, any government agency or subdivision, any judicial officer acting under court order, and non-profit debt counselling agencies.

In essence, almost any organization except small loan companies and private individuals may engage in the practice of rendering debt pooling services.

Before entering into any contract or agreement to consolidate your debts or turn them over to another for payment, it is recommended that you consult your family attorney for advice as to whether the party contracted with may legally engage in such practice.

Beef Factory Increases... Egg Production Shows Gain... Cattle Sold At Auction Declines... Egg-type Chicks Decline... Screwworm Agreement...

THE BEEF FACTORY of Texas—the nation's largest—has increased almost 275,000 head during the first half of the year.

The number of beef cows, which determines the numbers of beef calves to be produced, total 5,725,000 in Texas as of July 1. This compares with 5,452,000 as of January 1.

The number of all cows in Texas has also shown an increase. Total cow numbers in the state as of July 1 totaled 6,080,000 head; this compared with 5,807,000 head as of January 1.

The Blacklands have the highest number of beef cows and all cows. As of July 1, there were 920,400 cows (854,000 of that being beef cows) in the Blacklands. The east Texas and south central Texas regions were next in total numbers of cows and beef cows.

The east and northeast Texas area had 775,000 beef cows and a total of 864,100 cows as of July 1. The south central area had 766,000 beef cows and a total of 810,500 cows as of July 1.

EGG production in Texas during July was up three percent from a year ago, but steady with last month. Total egg production during July totaled 222,000,000. Nationwide, egg production was down one percent from last year.

Total numbers of Texas layers as of July 1 were 11.7 million. Texas eggs laid daily per 100 hens averaged 61.2 during July; a year ago the average was 57.6. Nationwide, the average was 62.7.

The July hatch of egg-type chickens in the state was down 34 percent from a year ago and 23 percent below a month earlier. Broiler chicks showed an increase of three percent. The total turkey poult hatch for July was up 18 percent from a year ago, but 33 percent below a month ago.

A NINE percent decline in numbers of cattle and calves marketed through Texas auction markets inspected by the Texas Animal Health Commission is reported by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cattle and calves marketed totaled 619,000 head, or nine percent below a year ago. Sheep sales totaled 132,000, down 17 percent from a year ago and 39 percent under a month ago. Sales of goats at 27,000 were down 31 percent from a year ago.

Hog sales totaled 45,000 head; this is 29 percent below a year ago.

THE FINAL step toward eradication of the screwworm in Texas has been taken. An agreement between Mexico and the United States was signed recently which will result in a cooperative effort to eradicate the screwworm in Mexico.

It will involve building a sterile screwworm fly factory off the Isthmus of Tehuantepec in Mexico. Production from this plant and from the fly factory at Mission will be used to wipe out the pest in Mexico.

Livestock producers in Texas are urged to continue to check their livestock regularly, treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control, and continue to submit suspected samples to the fly laboratory at Mission.

Eradication officials say plans are being made now to combat the screwworm next year.

ASCS Data

1973 WHEAT ALLOTMENTS Notices of 1973 wheat allotments, required set aside and conserving base have been mailed to farm operators. The program is basically the same as in 1972 with a change in the amount of additional set aside. Producers who sign up for the additional set aside will be limited on the amount of wheat that they can plant. Sign up dates will be announced later.

SUBSTITUTION rules are the same as for 1972 with corn, grain sorghum, barley and soybeans counting for preservation of allotments. If you have any questions please come by the office.

SET ASIDE ACREAGE

No grazing of the acreage designated as set aside is permitted until OCTOBER 1, 1972. No harvesting of any crop on the set aside area is permitted during the entire year. Weeds must be controlled. Spot checks are now being made to determine compliance.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY Eligibility for participation in all programs is established under law without regard to race, color, creed, sex or natural origin.

1973 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

Details of the 1973 Feed Grain Program have not been announced at this time. Barley will be included as a feed grain.

FARM CHANGES If you have bought, sold or leased land or changed your address, please notify this office so that our records are kept current.

WOOL AND MOHAIR

You are urged to bring your sales documents on wool, unshorn lambs and mohair to the office as soon as sales are made. Marketing year ends December 31, 1972.

HOLIDAY - This office will be closed September 4, 1972 in observance of Labor Day.

Early Treatment Can Prevent Blindness From Glaucoma

One out of every eight blind persons in the U.S. lost his vision from glaucoma, an eye disease occurring most often among the population age 35 and older, with a tendency to run in families. The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness points out that this statistic is needlessly high, for although glaucoma cannot be cured it can be controlled -- and sight saved -- if diagnosed and treated in its early stages.

The primary difficulty surrounding early detection is due to glaucoma's insidious nature: the sufferer is frequently unaware he has the disease until it is well advanced and vision severely impaired. While treatment can arrest glaucoma's progress, vision already lost cannot be restored; thus the longer treatment is delayed, the greater the loss of sight. Only a medical eye examination will reveal early glaucoma, and since early diagnosis and treatment are so essential to the prevention of blindness from glaucoma the Society recommends a regular professional eye examination every two years after age 35 as a preventive measure.

There are two types of glaucoma, neither of which is infectious nor a form of cancer. The acute variety is accompanied by immediately recognizable symptoms, including clouded vision and severe pain in and around the eye. Chronic glaucoma, which makes up 99 percent of all glaucoma cases, progresses slowly and painlessly, producing symptoms which either go completely unnoticed or are so vague that the victim pays them little attention. Some of these symptoms, which may or may not indicate the presence of glaucoma, are occasional blurred or "foggy" vision; decreased peripheral (side) vision; difficulty in visual adjustment to darkened rooms; the need for frequent change in eyeglasses prescription (with unsatisfactory results); and the envisioning of colored rings around points of light.

The cause of glaucoma is as yet unknown. Its target is the retina, that part of the eye which receives the light rays and sends them to the brain where they are interpreted as images. In glaucoma's early stages, the pressure of the fluid in the front of the eyeball increases, causing the fluid in the rear of the eyeball to push against the retina which lines the eye's back wall. This pressure gradually destroys the retinal cells and fibers by cutting off the blood supply which nourishes them, usually

beginning with the cells involving peripheral vision. The visual field narrows as the disease progresses until, in the final stages, the nerves involving central vision are destroyed and blindness is complete.

The medical examination for glaucoma includes monitoring the fluid pressure within the eye. Once a positive diagnosis is made, treatment may include medication, or surgery, or both. Successful treatment depends to a large extent on strict adherence to the prescribed medical regimen.

In an effort to provide the public with the facts about glaucoma, the Society distributes educational materials free of charge to individuals requesting them, as well as to physicians, public health and visiting nurses, and others. In addition, the Society sponsors periodic glaucoma screenings in various locations at which ophthalmologists act as volunteers, conducting preliminary testing of each participant and making referrals for complete medical eye examinations when necessary.

The Texas Society is an affiliate of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

Founded in 1908, the National Society is the oldest voluntary health agency nationally engaged in the prevention of blindness through a comprehensive program of community services, public and professional education and research.

CITY PARK DATA

CITY CHARACTERISTICS

Named in honor of Captain William Mosby Eastland, Texas Revolutionary hero, Eastland, Texas, began in 1875 as a small community near the center of Eastland County. Jacamiah S. Daugherty, Charles U. Connelley and several other settlers constructed a rock courthouse and declared the community to be the county seat. Population of Eastland was reported to be 3,178 in the 1970 United States Federal Census Report. During the construction of the fourth courthouse in 1897, a cornerstone containing a live Texas horned frog (horned lizard) and other items was laid.

The City is situated in a portion of the North Central plains of Texas known as the West Cross Timbers. This physical region extends from the Red River south through Clay, Montague, Jack, Wise, Parker, Palo Pinto, Hood, Erath, Eastland, Comanche, Brown and Mills counties to the Colorado River and the Edwards Plateau. The soils are well adapted to the production of fruit and vegetable crops, as well as pasture and forage production. Native grasses consist primarily of big bluestem, little bluestem, hooded windmillgrass, sand lovegrass, Indian grass and switchgrass with many varieties of legumes present. Woody vegetation includes blackjack, post, shinnery and live oaks, mesquite and juniper species.

Industry is primarily agricultural with large production of peaches, vegetables, small grains, beef, poultry and dairy products. Other industry includes the manufacturing of steel gates, petroleum products, clothing, pottery and artware.

EXISTING MAJOR PUBLIC RECREATION OPPORTUNITIES IN THE EASTLAND AREA

The latest inventory of existing public recreational opportunities which may influence other than local visitation to Eastland City Park are indicated below. The zone established for this inventory is a twenty mile radius from Eastland.

1. Gorman Community Swimming Pool, 1 acre, City of Gorman jurisdiction; approximately 12 miles N.W. of DeLeon; swimming pool, playground.

2. Frank Gray Memorial Park, 10 acres, City of Gorman jurisdiction; approximately 12 miles N.W. of DeLeon; 11 picnic tables.

3. Pic Nic Park, 10 acres; County of Eastland jurisdiction; North Shore of Lake Leon; approximately 8 miles S. of Eastland; 13 picnic tables, boat ramp.

4. Lake Ringling, 40 acres; City of Eastland jurisdiction; approximately 2 miles N. of Eastland on Highway 6; 20 picnic tables.

5. Eastland City Park, 1 acre, City of Eastland jurisdiction; St. Charles and Seaman Street; 5 picnic tables.

6. K. Park, 8 acres; private jurisdiction; S. shore of Lake Cisco, approximately 12 miles W. of Eastland; 41 picnic tables, 5,000 sq. yd. swimming pool.

7. Fisharama, 2 acres; private jurisdiction; Shore of Lake Cisco, approximately 12 miles W. of Eastland; fishing pier.

8. Cisco Country Club, 70 acres; private jurisdiction; S. shore of Lake Cisco, approximately 12 miles W. of Eastland; 9 hole golf course.

9. Lake Leon Boat Tel, 5 acres; private jurisdiction; N. shore of Lake Leon, approximately 12 miles S. of Eastland; 5 camp sites, 8 trailer sites, fishing pier.

10. Lakeside Country Club, 70 acres; private jurisdiction; 1/2 mile N. of Eastland; 9 hole golf course.

11. Lone Cedar Country Club, 150 acres; private jurisdiction; 8 miles S.E. of Eastland; 9 hole golf course.

PARK SITE CHARACTERISTICS

Location

Eastland City Park is located in the western portion of the City in a residential neighborhood. The park was designed in 1925 by W.E. Dakan and H.E. Lawrence. It is accessible by traveling west from the center of the City on Plummer Street and south one block on Neblett Street.

Existing Facilities

Facilities existing within the park include a large swimming pool, wading pool, a wood frame bathhouse, Firemen's hall, two asphalt tennis courts, a small rock concession building, two city water storage towers, two croquet courts, one croquet court, a group picnic site, two small rock restrooms, several stone and concrete picnic tables and benches, and a small amount of playground equipment.

Soil Characteristics

Soil characteristics were furnished by the Soil Conservation Service and are provided as Appendix Item A.

Existing Utilities

Existing utilities include water, electricity, natural gas and sewage, all available within the park.

Existing Vegetation

Vegetation in the park consists primarily of various species of oak trees, bermuda grass, and other short grass varieties. Vegetation on the wooded hillside is primarily oak, elm, hackberry and mesquite trees with native grasses in unmowed areas.

Flood Data

Flooding does not constitute a problem.

Adjacent Area Land Use

Land use of areas surrounding the park is primarily residential.

PARK SITE DEVELOPMENT CONCEPT

The development proposed for Eastland City Park is intended to provide the residents of Eastland and the surrounding rural area with recreational opportunities not currently available to them, and includes the improvement of existing facilities as well as the addition of new recreational facilities.

It is not intended that all of the indicated improvements be contemplated for development during a single construction program. This analysis is intended to identify and describe all facilities delineated on the accompanying development scheme for total development and is based on present knowledge of park development needs. As recreational needs change with succeeding years, it may become necessary to alter the proposed development analysis and development scheme so as to provide activities of current popularity.

Consideration should be given to the initiation of a summer recreational program for the City which would provide supervised recreational programs for children and adults. Programs offered should be tailored to meet the current needs of the City and could include instruction in swimming, life saving, canoeing, tennis, archery, square dancing, crafts and hobbies, etc. These programs would provide recreational opportunities for all age groups as well as coordination for the scheduled use of the community center, group picnic shelter, and other facilities. The director of the summer recreational programs could be the school coach, a teacher, or some other individual with an interest and time to devote to the project.

All development indicated in this analysis should be usable by physically handicapped and disabled citizens and conform to standards and specifications for construction of public buildings and facilities as required by Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of Texas, Article 678q. (See Appendix Item B.)

Methodist To Install Bishop Stowe

United Methodists in the Dallas Fort Worth Area will initiate a new style of receiving the resident bishop with formal installation ceremonies for Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe October 1.

Plans have been revealed for installation services that include 1,200 local church representatives in a robed procession, a youth combo with flying banners, a 1,000 voice choir, and dignitaries from across the state massed at Moody Coliseum on the campus of Southern Methodist University.

Bishop Stowe assumed his duties Aug. 1, following his appointment as resident Bishop

of the Dallas Fort Worth Area of the United Methodist Church at the July meeting of the South Central Jurisdictional Conference in Houston. He is a native of Tennessee and formerly served the Kansas Area of the church.

The formal Sunday evening Installation Service has been described as "a covenant service between the new bishop and his one - quarter million church members."

Dr. Walter Underwood, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Fort Worth, is chairman of a committee of clergy and laymen in charge of the installation.

"We hope to have 9,000 to 10,000 people at the installation, including all the judicatory heads," Dr. Underwood said.

"Presidents of all Methodist colleges in the two conferences, all ministers from each of the churches in the two conferences and church lay leaders, men, women and youth, have been invited to march in a procession from Ownby Stadium to the coliseum," Dr. Underwood said.

He said invitations also would be extended to ministers of other denominations, to Governor Preston Smith, to lawmakers from the areas of the two conferences and to public officials to attend the installation.

Invitations are going to member churches of the Dallas and Fort Worth Area Council of Churches and the Texas Conference of Churches.

Speaker will be Bishop O. Eugene Slater of San Antonio, president of the Council of Bishops.

Dr. Austin C. Lovelace, minister of music at the Lovers Lane United Methodist Church in Dallas, will direct the massed choir which includes the Texas Wesleyan College Choir.

Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, immediate past bishop of the area, will pass the symbols of the Office of Bishop of the United Methodist Church to Bishop Stowe during the ceremonies.

Dr. Underwood has cited this event as a first time effort by United Methodists in this region of the nation to highlight the appointment and arrival of a new bishop with a formal installation service.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR THE ABATEMENT AND REMOVAL OF JUNKED VEHICLES OR PARTS THEREOF, AS PUBLIC



NUISANCES, FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY OR PUBLIC PROPERTY; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO THE OWNER OR OCCUPANT OF THE PREMISES; PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC HEARING; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT, DESIGNATING EMPLOYEES ENTITLED TO ADMINISTER ORDINANCE; DESIGNATING VEHICLES TO WHICH ORDINANCE SHALL NOT APPLY; AND PROVIDING THAT VEHICLES SHALL NOT BE RECONSTRUCTED.

WHEREAS, the State of Texas has in House Bill 1181 declared certain junked vehicles to be a public nuisance, and

WHEREAS, the City of Eastland, Texas, in accordance with the provisions set out in Section 10 of such Bill desires to enact an ordinance establishing procedures for the abatement and removal of junked vehicles or parts thereof, as public nuisances, from private property or public property;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. Notice. That notice stating the nature of the public nuisance shall be given by certified or registered mail with a 5 day return requested to the owner or the occupant of the premises whereupon such public nuisance exists. That

such notice shall also state that such public nuisance must be removed and abated within 10 days of receipt of such notice and that any request for a public hearing thereon must be made before the expiration of such 10 day period. That if the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than 10 days from the date of such return.

Section 2. Public Hearing. That when a public hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located within 10 days after the service of notice to abate said nuisance a public hearing shall be held before the City Commission or any other board, commission or official of the City, as designated by the City Commission prior to the removal of the vehicle or part thereof as a public nuisance. That any order created requiring the removal of the vehicle or part thereof shall include a description of the vehicle, and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if available at the site.

Section 3. Notice to Texas Highway Department. That notice shall be given to the Texas Highway Department within 5 days after the date of removal of the vehicle or part thereof identifying the vehicle or part thereof in order that said Department can cancel the

certificate of title to such vehicle.

Section 4. Employees Entitled to Administer Ordinance. That this ordinance may be administered by any regularly salaried, full time employees of the City of Eastland, except that the removal of the vehicle or parts thereof from property may be by any other duly authorized person.

Section 5. Nonapplicability of Ordinance. That this ordinance shall not apply to (1) a vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property or (2) a vehicle or part thereof which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or a junkyard.

Section 6. Vehicle Not To Be Reconstructed. That after a vehicle has been removed it shall not be reconstructed or made operable.
