County Business Scene Is Booming

The Mitchell County business scene has been a busy one in the past few months and promises to continue that way for the remainder of the year as well as into next year.

In addition to the recently announced shopping center planned for 17th and Highway 208 near the new High School, there are a number of new businesses, some businesses have changed hands and a number of others have remodeled.

In Loraine, Green's Li'L Souper will be moving two doors down the street to newly remodeled quarters that will have 1,500 more square feet than the existing store.

A Loraine couple, Mr. and Mrs. George Mahoney, have sold Mahoney's Auto Parts in Colorado City to Bob and Bobby Nobles and Aaron Carpenter. Carpenter will operate the business which will be renamed The Parts House.

The City National Bank has purchased the land and building in which Mahoney's is lo-

ated and plan to tear the building down before the first of the year. Whenever this takes place, The Parts House is looking at building a new facility.

Grand opening ceremonies were held Thursday for Sterling Hardware at 2nd and Walnut downtown Colorado City. The store,

formerly Sparks Hardware, is owned by Tommy Sterling.

Friday and Saturday an open house was held for the newly expanded facilities of Costin Implement. The Ford tractor dealership now has a building of 13,760 square feet as compared to 5,500 feet for the dealership previously.

Another implement dealer, Key Brothers Implement, the John Deere dealership, has started a remodeling project as the result of a fire last Sunday that caused some \$80,000 in damage. Service Manager Loyd Finch said all of the parts will be replaced. The fire was thought to have been

caused by a faulty light fixture.

Golden Interiors has completed remodeling and moving two doors down Walnut to new facilities and had ribbon cutting ceremonies Wednesday.

Another new business just next door to Golden Interiors is H&T Supply. See SCENE, Page 11

Area Lakes Are Rising

Lake Champion has risen a foot since the beginning of rains Tuesday afternoon.

Champion was at 2051.0 feet above sea level Tuesday. Thursday's rains brought it to 2051.60 feet above sea level Friday's rains pushed it to 2052.0 feet above sea level.

That is a total of 541 acres of land covered with one foot of water or 176,139,321 gallons of water, according to Don Delaney at the Texas Electric power plant.

Delaney keeps official permanent records on lake conditions. His re-

ports show the lake last year about this time was at 2052.70 feet above sea level.

Rainfall last year at this time was 9.70 inches for the year. This year's figure is 16.16 inches for the year.

Lake Colorado City was at 2058.60 feet above sea level Tuesday. Thursday it had caught almost a half a foot and was at 2059.05 feet above sea level. Friday it was still catching water and had risen to 2060.0 feet above sea level.

This is a total of 1,592 acres of land covered by one foot of water or 497,813,349 gallons of water.

Around the county heavy rains fell until late Thursday evening keeping Morgan Creek; Wildhorse Creek, North Champion and South Champion Creeks steadily running.

Housing Units To Be Built

A contract to build 20 public housing units for the elderly here was signed Friday in Dallas between the Colorado City Housing Authority, a Houston contractor and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Representing the local Housing Authority was D. M. (Jake) Merritt, chairman of the Authority's Board, and Dennis Walding, executive director for the local Housing Authority.

Construction is to get underway within 30 days with completion to be within 270 calendar days, although it probably will be sooner than that, Walding said.

The housing will be

built in duplexes, much like other housing built here in the mid seventies. Each unit will be a one bedroom apartment.

Ten of the units will be located on Locust between 20th and 21st Streets; four will be located at 7th and Oak; two units will be built on Pine between West 5th and 6th Streets and four units will be built on West 5th and Pine beside existing Housing Authority offices and Community Center.

Work on converting the old Baker Hotel into Housing Authority Apartments is still underway, Walding said, with the government now reviewing cost figures.

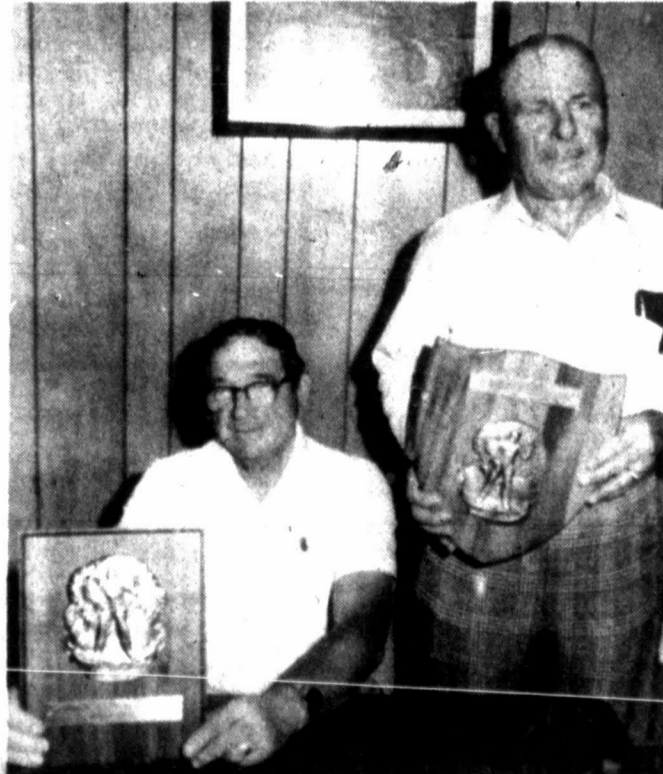
County Increase In Deposits Shown

Mitchell County's economic condition is good with deposits made in the five financial institutions totaling \$52,089,425.48 an increase of \$6,796,126.06 over the same period last year. City National Bank deposits for the quarter ending June 30, 1979 are \$24,224,286.49. This is an increase of \$1,430,595.65 from June 30, 1978 deposits of \$22,793,690.84. Deposits for the last quarter, ending March 31, were \$23,401,696.55. Loans made during this quarter were \$12,673,892.97. Loans made at this time last year were \$11,966,513.62, an increase of \$707,379.35.

Loans made for quarter ending March 31, 1979 were \$12,842,838. Financial indications from this statement show the economy up a little and taking inflation into consideration, it's holding its own, according to bank Vice President George Womack. Colorado City Savings and Loan Association deposits for the quarter ending June 30, 1979 are \$15,294,544. This shows an increase over last year during this period of \$1,142,151 when deposits were \$14,152,393. Deposits for the last quarter, ending March 31, were \$14,973,894.

The usury law, which stated any per cent of charge above 10 on mortgage loans would be illegal, has held lending back during the past quarter, President W.B. Crockett stated. He said the Texas Legislature has recently passed a two per cent increase allowing a 12 per cent charge to amortize loans. Crockett indicated this should help stimulate the economy. Loans made by the institution for the quarter ending June 30, 1979 were \$12,148,223. This is down \$449,137 from last year during the same

period when loans were \$12,597,360. Loans made during the period ending March 31, 1979 were \$12,391,497. First State Bank of Loraine had an increase of \$286,024.76 in deposits, for the period ending June 30, 1979, at \$4,716,305.55 This was over last year for this period at \$4,430,280.79. Deposits for the quarter ending March 31, 1979 were \$5,020,305.79. The decrease for this quarter is due, in part, to the deposit of cotton crop sales monies which were still being made during the March quarter. See LOANS, Page 3

Town Talk

The rains of this past week should almost prove to be crop makers.

Most farms and ranches were getting to be in dire need of moisture and the rains came just right without most plant life having to suffer for lack of moisture.

One of the things still needed by a lot of farms and ranchers is a hard run-off rain to fill stock tanks. Now that might sound a little odd considering that we've had two downpours in the last six weeks or so but those downpours fell only in town and in a few communities.

The rest of the country received only gentle rains. Although the rains put crops in good shape, still more moisture will be needed by late August to insure a bumper crop.

President Carter's recent series of speeches and the imminent changes in the White House staff has caused a lot of talk. One of Carter's problems, according to many people, is that he is ill advised.

Personally, I liked his emphatic manner of delivery in the speeches and his emphasis showed that he meant business. He addressed two of our greatest problems, a lack of confidence as a nation and a lack of sense of direction.

These two problems, to me, go straight to the government. But yet, Carter still believes that more government by creating two new agencies, will solve the situation. I just don't know about that.

Maybe the President doesn't know that every time private business has tried to develop new sources of energy, they have been stymied by government red tape. I did like what he had to say about cutting red tape to help the energy situation.

There are many illustrations of how this has happened. Talk to anyone involved with power companies and find out how much trouble it is to get a new power plant built and how many delays there are because of government regulations, requirements and inspections.

There's no telling how much more power generating capacity we could have as a nation, had not the government slowed down every single project.

It has taken as much as two to three times as long as necessary to get nuclear power plants built and in addition many gas and oil fired plants have attempted to convert to coal and have been stopped, particularly on the east coast.

Here in our own area, Texas Electric has purchased western coal to convert gas fired plants but efforts to go in that direction have been stymied by environmentalists, resulting in years of delay and preparation of countless documents on environment impact studies.

Some people have said that the big oil companies don't want to develop alternate sources of energy because they are making too much on oil. These same people have said this is the reason the government must step in and have a windfall profit tax to finance development of other power sources.

With our technology, it does seem we should be able to use more of our resources. However, the government doesn't have the track record to give me the confidence that they are the ones to develop these resources.

I do agree that something needs to be done. As a nation, we can't allow ourselves to be dependent on anyone for anything.

I had the opportunity to see the play "Texas," staged each summer in Palo Duro Canyon in Canyon just south of Amarillo, last weekend and would like to recommend it.

In a nutshell, the musical with tremendous lighting and sound effects, tells of how the panhandle area was settled and tamed, complete with human conflicts and emotion.

This is an international attraction. The night I was in attendance, there were more than 1,700 people there from 24 states and six foreign countries, with the person the furthest from home being from South Africa.

The canyon itself is worth seeing and lends a spectacular backdrop for the production. It is presented beginning at 8:30 p.m. nightly except Sunday. Try to make reservations as far in advance as possible.

Mitchell County Fame Spreading

Mitchell County fame is spreading across Texas. Television station KPRC in Houston, an NBC affiliate, contacted the Mitchell County Historical Commission recently to request the history of Mitchell County. Commission President Bobbie Steakely indicated, during Wednesday afternoon's meeting that the T. V. station had, at her suggestion, purchased a copy of "Lore and Legend" in order to have a complete background of the county.

Permian Historical Society also contacted the group with a request for a copy of "Lore and Legend" to place in the University of Texas at Permian Basin. Members are considering donating a copy.

During the meeting, a reply from the Texas Historical Landmark Committee was read.

Application had been previously made to honor the John C. Prude home, built in 1907 with a historical marker.

The plaque has been approved and should arrive in October.

Lee Jones has been in contact with the National Registry about the funds to be received for a grant on the Heritage House.

Changes have been made in government programs and funds have been delayed until fall of this year, according to a letter from the Registry.

Sudie Cogburn of Wilcox, Arizona contacted Steakley for assistance in locating photographs of a wagon train, which passed through Colorado City in 1888, in which her mother, Mrs. Dora Lowrey, traveled.

Mrs. Lowrey, 93, is presently living in Shady Oaks Lodge in Abilene.

Public library, Record office and museum archives were checked for pictures and none were located.

September 19 is set as the date for the next meeting. Lee Jones will be guest speaker on Indians of this area.

Members of the group made a tour of local historical sites including the courthouse, museum and playhouse. They will continue to tour sites and make slide pictures of the sites and members.

These slides will be made available for use by service organizations and schools.

Cookies and homemade ice cream were served at the Steakley home after the tour.

Conservation District Wins Goodyear Awards

Mitchell County Soil and Water Conservation District was chosen as one of three first place winners in Texas in the 32nd annual Goodyear Conservation Awards Program.

The contest is sponsored by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company in cooperation with the National Association of Conservation Districts.

Two representatives from each of the winning districts receive expenses paid, vacation-study trips to Wigwam Resort and Goodyear Farms, Litchfield Park, Arizona in December.

Fifty other first place districts throughout the United States also attend.

Mitchell County's SWCD's representatives will be Odell Fuller; outstanding cooperater, and Board Member Jimmy Harrison.

Plaques were presented to the winning districts and runner-up districts at a meeting of the Association of Texas SWCD.

Mitchell County District Conservationist Van Mills noted some of the reasons his district won.

The SWCD Board of Directors held 12 regular meetings and four special meetings.

Conservation essay material was distributed to the schools of Westbrook, Loraine and Colorado City. The top three winners were awarded cash prizes.

The district sponsored a conservation booth at the Mitchell County Fair.

District wrote to Tower, Bentsen, Burleson, Mahon, Bellman and Burdick concerning agricultural appropriations for conservation work.

A \$130 scholarship was offered for any teacher who wanted to participate in environmental Workshop at Abilene Christian College or Angelo State.

The District won second place in the Goodyear Conservation Awards Program last year.

Mills noted there were many other activities the Mitchell County Producers participated in during the year.

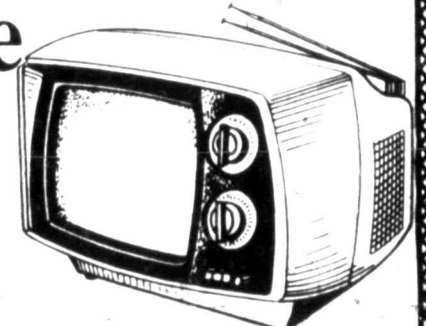

Colorado School Board Ponders Tax Decrease

The Colorado School Board in a special called session Friday morning voted their intent to set the school tax rate at \$1.71 per \$100 valuation for the 1979-1980 school year.

School Superintendent Charlie Uselton emphasized that this didn't necessarily mean that was what the rate would be for this next year. The rate won't be officially set until the

board adopts the 1979-80 budget at their regular monthly meeting on August 13. Before that time, two notices of the rate will be published in the Record and a public hearing will be held giving citizens of the school district the opportunity to state their opinion on it.

If the rate is adopted it will represent a 2 cent decrease from the 1978-1979 rate of \$1.73 and 5

cent decrease from the 1977-1978 rate of \$1.76.

For the school board to have levied the same amount of taxes in 1979-1980 that they did in 1978-1979, they would have had to set the tax rate at \$1.63 per \$100 valuation. This is explained by the fact that in 1978-1979 the school levied taxes of \$1,635,568. This figure was arrived at by taxing the property in the district which had an assessed value of \$94,540,860 at the rate of \$1.73 per \$100

valuation as stated above.

The property in the school district in 1979 has an assessed value of \$99,687,950. If this figure were taxed at the rate of \$1.63 per \$100 valuation, the school would come up with the same \$1,635,558 tax levy as in 1978.

The school board arrived at the \$1.71 figure to account for the increase in revenue which the school would need for the 1979-1980 school year over 1978-1979.

Tax Law Passed By Legislature

Article 724c became effective on January 1, 1979 and applied to all jurisdiction with the power to levy "ad valorem" taxes. This law was passed during the Second Called Session of the 65th Texas Legislature as House Bill 18.

In this bill, there is a complicated formula that tax assessors are required to use to figure the "effective" tax rate and also are required to publish in the local paper. In many cases this "effective" rate will be lower than the last year tax rate, and if this is the circumstance then a public hearing notice is required to be published. This notice is on page eight of this issue of the Colorado Record.

This notice states "Notice of Tax Increase"; however, if the

thinking of the Colorado City Independent School District Board of Trustees in figuring the budget and tax rate for 1979 is formulated as to present thinking then the tax rate for 1979 will be lower than in 1978.

The Board of Education has worked to keep taxes as low as possible and in the last three years they have lowered the tax rate and propose to lower the rate for 1979. Tax rates for those years follows:

1978.....\$1.73 per \$100
1977.....1.76 per \$100
1976.....1.81 per \$100
1975.....1.87 per \$100

This notice on page eight is required even though your tax rate will be lower for 1979 than 1978; thus, a lower tax per \$100 valuation will result in lower taxes for 1979.

Town Center Plans Progress

Seven firms who are not now located in Colorado City, five of which are national firms, are projected to open branch stores in the proposed new shopping center, City Manager Ray Mason stated.

Stating facts supplied by B. D. Click, the developer of the shopping center, Mason indicated negotiations with the seven firms are in various stages and feasibility analysis are being prepared.

It is the intent of the developer and a requirement in obtaining the initial financing that all shops and stores to be located in Phase I of the project be fully leased prior to construction.

Several local individuals and firms are interested in opening a new business or branch location of their present

business in the new center, Mason stated.

A second hearing will be held at city hall on Tuesday at 4 p.m. for the purpose of hearing views of citizens in regard to use of a government grant, which the city council proposes to use to extend water and sewer lines into the shopping center area.

The shopping center will be built by private funds. The projected value of the center and land will be 2 to 2.5 million dollars.

It will be constructed in three phases. Phase one will be a shopping center area of a minimum of 60,000 square feet of floor space containing a super market, drug store, restaurant, book store, clothing stores, department and miscellaneous type stores.

Phase two will be a fast food service. This

location is easily accessible to the city and travelers on I-20. The fast food service will have about 3,000 square feet of floor space, Mason noted.

Phase three will be a group of small shops and services with about 9,000 square feet of floor space.

Phase I of the shopping center will provide employment to about 20 to 30 local people for a duration of about four to six months. Local material, suppliers and subcontractors will be used where available.

A permanent work force of about 82 persons is estimated with the super market employing 12, drug store 1, restaurant 10, department stores 24, bookstore 1, dress shop 2, miscellaneous shops 24 and clothing store 8.

Total projected job openings created by the construction of shopping center, titled Town Center by Click, is 104 with an average wage of \$3.30 per hour based on six days per week will bring \$856,627.

20 into local economy per year.

The Town Center will be a taxpayer to both city and county, Mason stated.

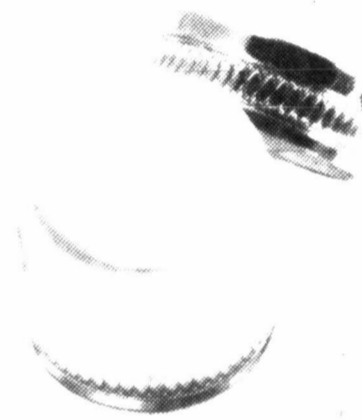

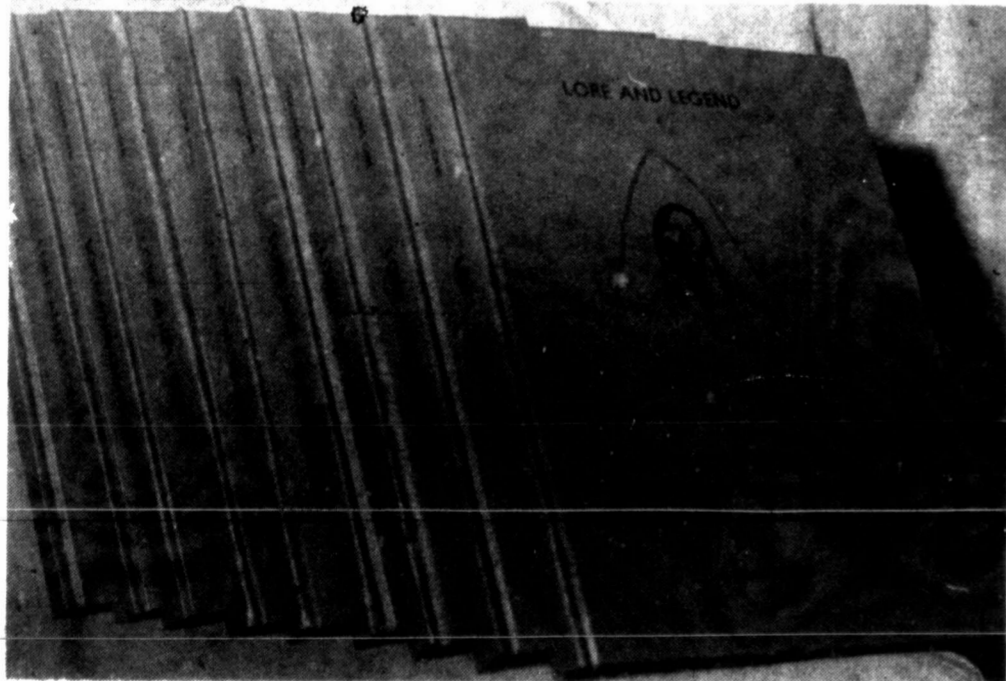

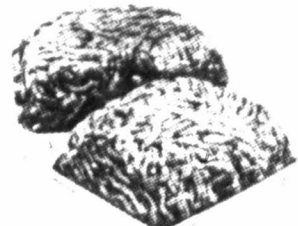
