Rev. Rohre Will Leave For Two Weeks Army Duty

Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre, First Presbyterian minister here, has been ordered by the War Department to report to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, for two weeks' active training, beginning June 11.

A former U. S. Army Chaplain with two years' overseas duty in the European Theater of Operation, Rev. Rohre holds a rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in the Reserves.

Crash Victim Is In Serious Condition

Karl Kyle, 39, independent water well driller, who received a brain concussion and a jaw bone fracture in an auto crash near Rising Star Monday evening, was reported today in a serious condition in a hospital there.

Information received here said Kyle, who was en route to Cisco from Pioneer, lost control of his car on a curve. He swerved to avoid hitting an approaching car and turned over.

Witnesses in the second car said the vehicle crashed into a tree near the road side, throwing Kyle away from the wreckage. The passing motorists, whose names were not available, summoned an ambulance from Rising Star and he was rushed to the hospital.

Hospital attendants said he was still in a semi-conscious condition at 11 p. m. Wednesday.

Kyle, who moved to Cisco with his family from Silver City, New Mexico, in June of last year, has been engaged in both oil and water well operations. They have two children, a girl, 2, and a boy, 13.

Guardsmen Set For Camp Barkley Trip Saturday

Fifty-five officers and guardsmen of the 648th Armored Field Artillery will leave here early Saturday morning for Camp Barkley, where the Cisco unit, along with other components of the group will be employed in a two-day rifle range drill.

A convoy of five trucks and two jeeps will make up the Cisco unit which is slated to meet a similar convoy from Ranger's Service Battery. Approximately 1000 guardsmen will take part in the maneuvers.

Sgt. Frank Schlaepfer, administrative assistant here, said Tuesday the battery headquarters, composed of Captain Olin Odom, Lt. Jack Lauderdale, Lt. C. J. Ritchey and Lt. Robert Donovan, will accompany the unit.

Truck and vehicles drivers were ordered to report at the College Hill armory at 6 a. m. Saturday morning, Schlaepfer said. The unit is slated to leave here an hour later.

Guardsmen, it was said, are to report in summer khaki uniforms and field combat boots. In addition, the Guardsmen will take the dungaree uniforms to be used on the training grounds, and field equipment, which includes ammunition belt, canteen, rifle, helmet and tent.

A large percentage of the guardsmen making up the Cisco unit are "raw recruits" with little or no experience in the field, according to Schlaepfer. However, the remaining portion are veterans of the past war.

Texas Jaycee Golf Tournament To Be Held On June 24

ABILENE, June 2, The Texas Jaycee Junior Amateur Golf Championship tournament will be held at the Municipal Golf Course, Austin, on June 24, 1949.

The Austin Junior Chamber of Commerce will serve as host to a field of 400 golfers from all over the State and will provide free housing and some of the meals during the tournament.

All male amateur golfers who have not attained their 19th birthday by July 15, 1949, are eligible to qualify in the local tournaments.

Local member organizations of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce will provide most of the entrants for the tournament.

Trophies will be given the winner and runner-up of the State Finals and in addition there will be gold medals presented to 5 (five) other winners. The 7 (seven) winners (Low-score) will be officially qualified to play in the National Junior Amateur Championship Tournament at Houston Country Club, August 2-7, 1949.

People Advised To "Be Your Age"

AUSTIN, June 2, There is an old slang expression that would make a good slogan for living a longer and more comfortable life, and that is "Be your age." According to the State Health Officer, Dr. George W. Cox, many persons injure their health and endanger their life through indulgence in exercises and vigorous sports unsuited for their age and physical condition.

"While a young man in prime condition may benefit from a fast game of tennis, older men and women have been known to collapse and suffer heart attacks following such a game. The same thing applies to golfing, swimming and other vigorous sports," Dr. Cox said.

During the hot summer months, it is of especial importance that you know your physical limitations, and indulge in only such activities as will benefit, and not harm your physical condition.

"Persons of middle age should never participate in activities requiring violent physical exertion, and should confine their physical exercise to such bounds as their doctor prescribes," Cox asserted.

The State Health Officer suggested that all persons of middle age be examined by their physician, before planning their summer vacation activities. A vacation can easily be more exhausting than refreshing, and in such event, more harm than benefit results from the time thus spent. Fishing, boating, hiking in moderation, and many other light recreations can be engaged in by the older people who must avoid heart strain, and it is a wise precaution to have your doctor advise you as to what sort of vacation you should plan.

Dairy Association Will Hold June Meeting Here

Independents Rout Scranton, 11-7, Here Tuesday Night; Errors Help

A push to the plate in the fifth inning, topped with errors galore, plus a home run banged by Homer Tompkins, scooped the Cisco Independents to a 11-7 triumph over the Scranton Plowboys last night at Chesley Field.

Maynard, Independent pitcher, whiffed eight batters and limited the Plowboys to nine hits in

their seven trips to the plate. In turn, Bill Boland, Plowboy hurler, pitched seven men out and gave up five hits. However, The Plowboys were nudged for 11 errors during the hour and half tilt.

The Independents started scoring in the opening inning when Posey, Matthews and Philpott, aboard with errors, scored with the aid of a base knock by King, catcher. After a scoreless second inning, the count remained 3-0.

Then, Maynard gave up his first base slam to Pope, who singled.

A fielders' choice and an error pushed Pope around to third and a muffed fly by Matthews, Independent short stop, sent him home and Pitman remained on first. Pitman scored the second run on a single by Fillans.

After a scoreless fourth, the Independents turned on the heat and roared home with five runs. Haynie singled, Maynard got on with an error and a base slam by Posey crowded the base. Erwin, with two men away, brought in Haynie and a circuit clout by Tompkins cleaned the bases. Now, the score was 8-2.

In the top of the sixth, the Plowboys brought their biggest guns forward. With two men away, Boland, Plowboy 1st man, started the scoring, hitting a base liner into right field. An error allowed Foster to get on a single by Pitman, and Pope, who sent a twister into deep center field, cleaned his mates from the bases. He stopped on third and a double by Boland sped him to the plate. A pass ball to Catcher King enabled Boland to register Scranton's sixth run.

A rally in the sixth saw the Independents soar to a 11-6 lead. Good hitting by Erwin and Haynie, plus a line drive by Tompkins splurged the counter-attack. But Plowboy fieldman-ship threw a wrench into the cogs and the rally failed to produce more runs.

Early in the seventh, Maynard of Cisco leveled his sights and whiffed two batters in order and then gave Pitman a home run smack. The game closed when Fillans popped out to second base. A capacity crowd saw the tilt.

Four Held In Burglary Attempt

Four youths, one from Cisco, were being held in an Eastland County jail this week pending an investigation by District Attorney Everett Grisham in connection with an alleged burglary of the Collin Car Garage in Ranger Monday.

Following a report to Ranger police, the youths were seized on Highway 80. After a stay in the Ranger city jail, sheriff's deputies took them to the county jail. The sheriff's office said "one youth lived here, one lived in Mineral Wells and the third in Ranger."

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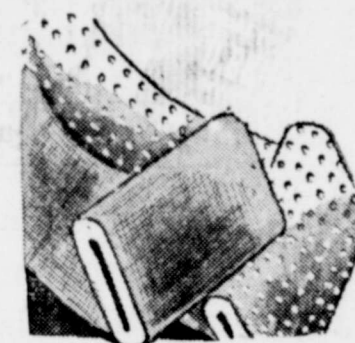
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
