TO HOLD PRIMARY ELECTION SATURDAY

Rains Amounting To More Than Three Inches Fall During Past Three Days

Most Of Territory Is Covered With Moisture

Since Monday of this week and up until Wednesday night, rains have covered this entire area, as far as the Courier has been able to ascertain. The total for the week up until Wednesday morning in Lamesa totaled .52 inches, while the fall Wednesday amounted to 1.80 inches, bringing the weeks total to 3.32 inches.

Reports from all directions are to the extent that sufficient rains have fallen and in some few instances torrential floods, doing some damage to crops, but not a great deal, according to reports.

The rain in Lamesa Wednesday began falling shortly after twelve o'clock noon and continued for possibly one hour and forty-five minutes. The streets over the town were regular rivers, and Sulphur Draw, which skirts Lamesa on the south, was running like a good size stream.

Crops over the area are reported in excellent condition and growing as rapidly as could be expected. Although much of the cotton is late, due to floods and winds in the early spring, it is developing rapidly and unless some unforeseen trouble arises, Dawson county should again harvest a large crop of cotton.

Due to the fact that the government program cuts the acreage a great deal from last year, it is practically impossible for the county to make as much cotton as last year, but it is figured that price increase which is expected, due to the government program, will offset the number of bales and the farmer will be in better condition than last year. It remains to be seen whether these calculations will be a reality or a fantasy.

Dawson County Citizens And Friends Of Judge Louis Reed Make Campaign Tour To-day

Judge Louis Reed's friends who have been making speaking engagements where there were conflicts which prevented his attendance report that their reception over the 106th judicial district have been most cordial. Will Receive Bids For Paving Gaines Road On East Side

The Texas Highway Department this week issued a call for bids on road projects in Texas to cost \$3,410,000.

Among the roads in this section of the county Highway Fifteen in Gaines county. The bids call for grading and drainage structure, flexible base and seal coat from Seminole east to the Dawson county line.

Road enthusiasts in this section will welcome this news as this project has been worked on for a number of years. The road west of Lamesa to the Gaines county line has been finished for some time and this will form an important link in the surfaced road development in this area. It will give a direct connection with the highway that runs north from Odessa to Lubbock, through Seminole, Seagraves and Brownfield. It is also another step in completing the paving on Highway Fifteen through to the New Mexico line. A meeting last week in Seminole of the East-West Highway Association worked on this road and the announcement from the Highway Department will be welcomed not only by citizens of Dawson and Gaines counties, but all along the route from the Louisiana line to E. Past.

BID RECEIVED ON LYNN COUNTY ROAD FOR PAVING

Bids were received by the Texas Highway Department last week on 15.7 miles of cutback asphaltic concrete pavement of highway nine from the Dawson county line to Tahoka. The Texas Bitulastic Company of Dallas was the low bidder.

Great Interest Is Shown As Voting Date Draws Near

Next Saturday the voters of Dawson county, as well as the State of Texas, will again march to the polls and select their officials for another two years. Indications are that there will be one of the largest votes ever polled in Texas. Up until a few weeks ago apparently there was little interest throughout the state as to who would be chosen. But during the past few days there has been a decided change and now it appears that this will be one of the hottest races between the gubernatorial candidates the state has seen in several years.

County politics have gone along quietly with apparently little interest manifest. There would seem to be more interest in the sheriff's race than any other. There are five candidates for this important office. Other offices in the county are for district clerk, there are two running, county judge, two county school superintendent, two, county treasurer, three, county clerk, two, county attorney, two, public weigher, three, constable, four, commissioner precinct 1, four, precinct two, four, three, two, and four, two.

Thus it will be seen that the majority of local offices will be settled in the first primary, as there are seven offices where there are only two candidates, while six offices have three or more candidates.

It has been decidedly clean race all the way through and there has been very little mud-slinging which characterizes many of the Texas primary elections.

With the fine group to select from the voters of Dawson county cannot be far wrong in their choice for officials, regardless of whom they may elect, for they are all fine people and well qualified to fill the office they seek. A sample ballot will be found on the front page of the second section of this issue of the Courier.

AN ORDINANCE
LEVYING A MEDICINAL PERMIT FEE OR OCCUPATION TAX AGAINST ALL RETAIL PHARMACISTS HOLDING A PERMIT FROM THE STATE OF TEXAS, TO SELL OR DISPENSE LIQUOR FOR MEDICINAL PURPOSES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAMESA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That all Retail Pharmacists be required to procure a City Permit to sell or dispense liquor for medicinal purposes and there is hereby levied and there shall be collected from every Retail Pharmacist, an annual permit fee or occupation tax in the amount of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).

SECTION 2. That all permit fees or taxes levied by section 1 hereof shall be paid to the City Tax Collector in advance for one year, unless such fee be collected for only a portion of the year. In such event, the fee required shall cover the period of time from the date of the permit to midnight of August 31st succeeding, and only the proportionate part of the fee levied for such permit shall be collected. The fractional part of any month remaining shall be counted as one month in calculating the fee that shall be due. A separate permit shall be obtained and a separate fee paid for each outlet of liquor in this City. No refund of permit fees shall for any reason be made by the City. All such permits shall expire at midnight on August 31st, each year.

SECTION 3. EMERGENCY CLAUSE.

The City of Lamesa now being without an ordinance covering the provisions herein contained, and it appearing that the public welfare demands this ordinance be immediately effective an emergency is hereby declared, and the rule prescribing three separate readings of an ordinance is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect, upon its passage and publication, as prescribed by law.

AN ORDINANCE
AN ORDINANCE LICENSING OF TRANSIENT SOLICITORS AND TRANSIENT AGENTS, DEFINING SAME, PROVIDING A PENALTY, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE City of Lamesa:

SECTION ONE: As used in this ordinance, the term "person" shall mean and include any individual, partnership, association or corporation, however formed.

The terms "transient solicitor" and "transient agent" shall mean and include any person carrying on a business or occupation in the City of Lamesa, by going from house to house or from place to place, and soliciting or taking orders for goods, wares, merchandise, or other articles, for the purpose of sale; or taking orders for same to be delivered later; or for the purpose of giving away same, and

selling coupons, or premiums as an inducement to buy merchandise or other property; also any person soliciting or taking orders for goods, wares, merchandise, or other articles who do not have a regularly established office, or place of business in said City; and any person who is not a recognized solicitor from an established wholesaler, soliciting or taking orders from an established retailer.

SECTION TWO: All persons engaged in, or conducting the business, occupation, or calling of transient solicitor, or transient agent within the City of Lamesa, shall obtain from the City Secretary of said City, a license so to do. The person obtaining said license shall pay the City Secretary, in advance a license fee of \$10.00 per day for each day or a part thereof, such person who desires to engage in such business.

SECTION THREE: Any person who shall fail or refuse to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined any sum not less than \$10.00, or more than \$200.00. Each day upon which a violation occurs shall be considered a separate offense.

SECTION FOUR: EMERGENCY:

It appearing that the City of Lamesa is now without proper ordinance covering the provisions herein contained, and it appearing that the public welfare demands this ordinance be immediately effective, an emergency is hereby declared, and the rule prescribing three separate readings of an ordinance is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication, as prescribed by law.

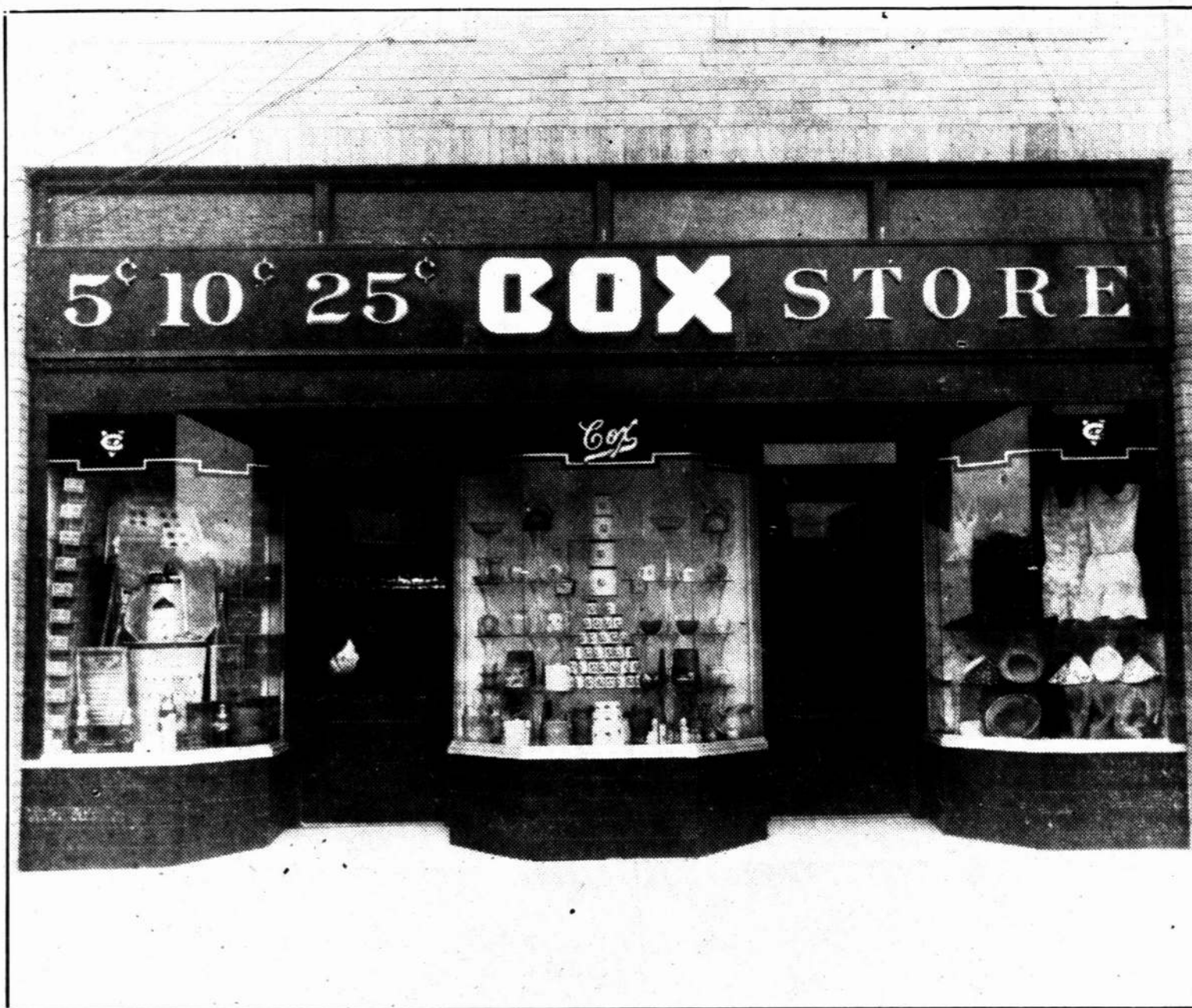

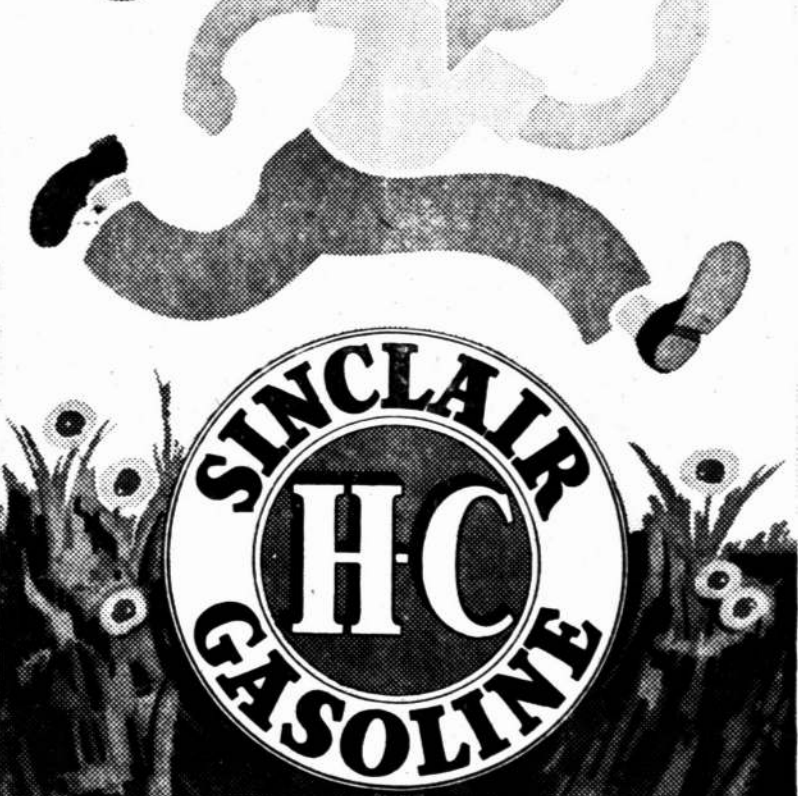

An employee working for an employer not covered under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act, is not covered for the time he works for such employer and receives no credit with the Unemployment Compensation Commission for his earnings. If he becomes unemployed, the Employment Service will help him find employment but he will not be eligible for unemployment benefits.

Liability under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act is as for a two year period even though an employer's total personnel occasionally falls below the minimum of eight. Texas employers must therefore make contributions for two years. They must show a full calendar year in which less than eight were employed before the commission is permitted by law to terminate their liability for contributions.

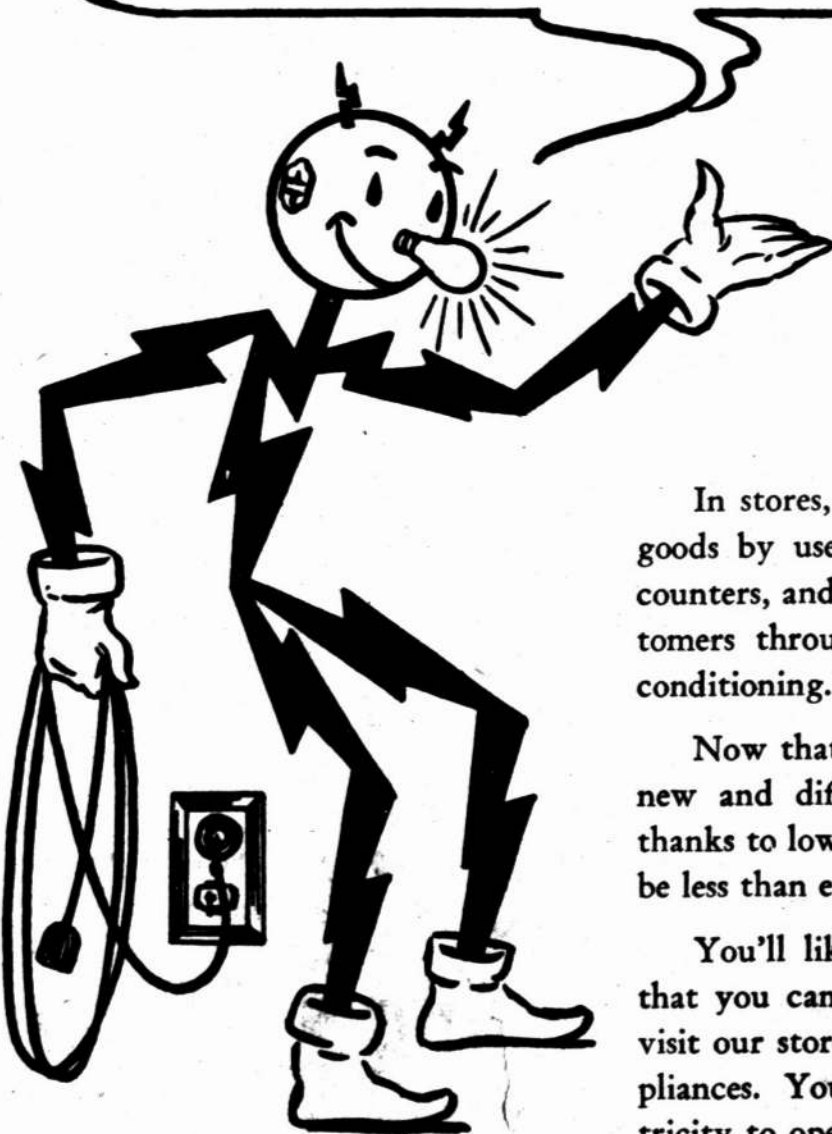

Underground Water Supply In Texas Is Limited Says Report

The Texas Planning board has repeatedly called attention to the rapidly diminishing supply of underground water in Texas. Several sections of the state even now are facing serious difficulties in obtaining sufficient underground water to meet the demands of industrial and domestic users.

The importance of underground water is seen in the fact that three out of every five persons in Texas are dependent upon water which is drawn from the ground. Eight of the larger

cities in the state are dependent upon underground water. Numerous rich agricultural regions rely entirely on underground water for irrigation purposes.

Research by the planning board and other agencies interested in natural resources has proven the fallacy of the popular belief that underground water is inexhaustible. Underground water can be used faster than even a provident nature can replenish the supply and this is what is happening in many parts of Texas today. The water is being taken from the ground faster than nature can replace it.

Immediate conservation steps are necessary if Texas is to be insured a continuing and adequate supply of underground water. Just what these steps should be will be discussed at a statewide meeting in Austin on July 29th of all persons interested in underground water. The meeting was called by Gov. James V. Alfred, who is vitally interested in a sound and constructive program for the conservation and proper utilization of the natural resources of Texas.

Every citizen should be keenly interested in this problem and every city in the state dependent upon underground water should have representation at the Austin meeting.

Dr. Cox Says:

Austin, Tex. July 18.—If you work in such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content to become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fog. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as forty to fifty grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramps is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

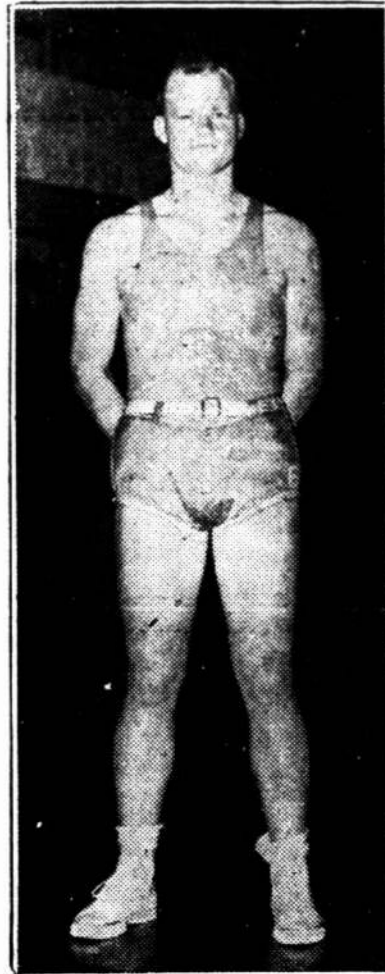

Klondike Elects An Athletic Director

Announcement was made this week that Donald White had been elected as football and basketball coach at Klondike school, in this county. His home is in San Angelo, where he played both basketball and football with the Junior College there. He also played with N. T. S. A. C. for the past three years he played basketball with Texas University and was voted all-Southwestern Conference guard in 1937. He captained State's team in '38.

FSA Gardners Will Harvest Big Crop

Indications are that this will be a banner year for gardens of families operating under loans from the Farm Security Administration, according to Miss Gladys Wright, home management supervisor for that agency in Dawson, Gaines, Borden and Andrews counties. While grasshoppers and other insects have caused some loss of fruit and vegetables in some portions of the country, better moisture in large areas has served to check the inroads of the pests. Everything possible is being done to combat them and build up producing gardens.

"Practically all FSA borrowers have baby chicks and most of them are getting some returns from their gardens," Miss Wright said. "Cash living costs are decreasing but due to the fact that some prices are still very low, the farm family is having to stick close by its budget to manage on its income."

Pointing to the lack of dust storms and increased moisture Miss Wright said many families are showing more interest in improvement of yards and are planting flowers, shrubbery and fruits as well as making repairs to their homes. Many families are setting out a few trees in spots near the home to provide shade and plots to serve as windbreaks to protect fields and check erosion.

During the next month or six weeks canning demonstrations will be held, Miss Wright said, and information on combatting garden pests and insects will be distributed.

Pointing to the stress FSA borrowers are placing on their home record books she said that farm families are realizing more and more the dollar and cents value of food produced on the farm and stored or preserved for winter use.

Due date for June contributions to the Unemployment Compensation Fund is Monday, August 1st. Reports for the quarter (April, May and June) are also due at the Unemployment Commission on that date.

Where an employee performs his services, and not his residence or the controlling company's location, is the main factor in determining the state to which contributions on wages should be paid by employers.

Officers of a corporation, whether or not they receive remuneration for their services, are considered as employees in determining liability under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act.
