Bufs Blank Rising Star 41-0 For Second Victory

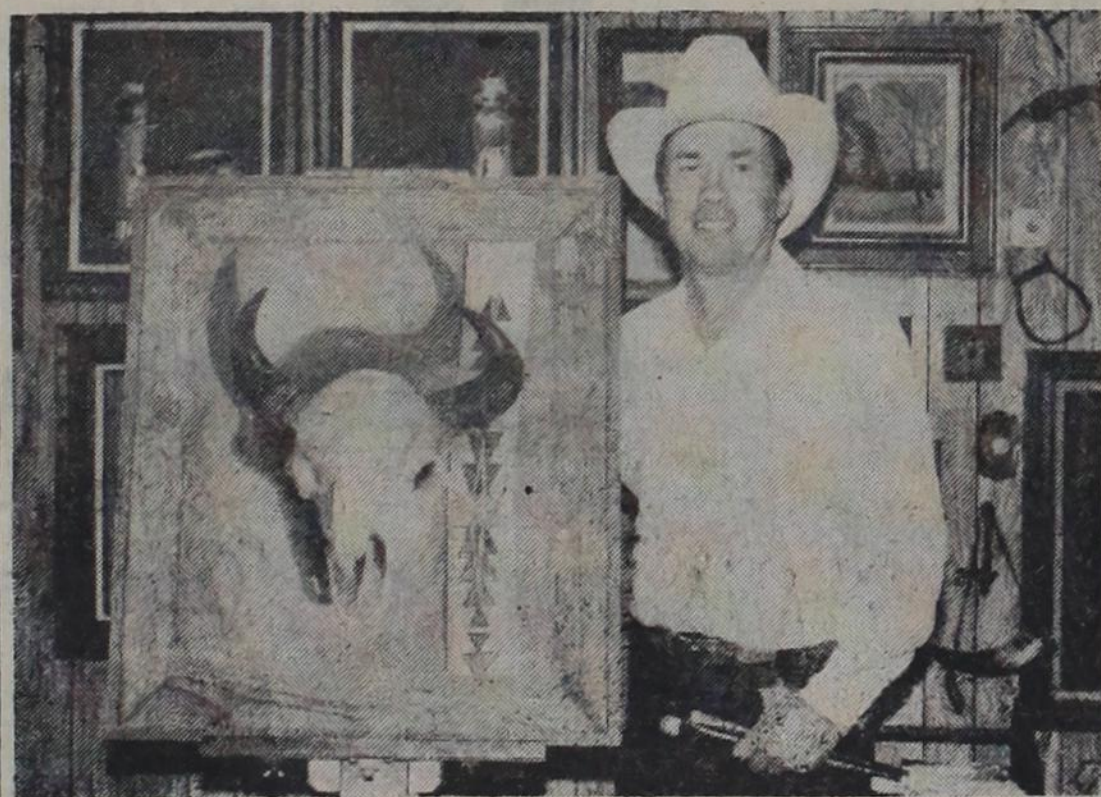

First Limited Print Show For Ex-Local Artist Set

The premiere showing of the first limited edition print presented by ex-local artist Larry McAnally will be held in a one-man show Saturday, Nov. 10, at Frames and Things framing gallery at 301 Center Avenue in Brownwood. This work, titled "My Boots", is a superb representation of McAnally's unique portrayals of Western still life. There exist only 750 prints, signed and numbered by the artist, and 100 artist's proofs in this limited edition.

McAnally's original oils are on display at Frames and Things from Monday, Nov. 5, through Saturday, Nov. 10, in addition to his limited edition print "My Boots" featured there. On Saturday, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., the artist will make a personal appearance to personalize any prints purchased.

The Central Texas native has brought the influence of his background and rural lifestyle into his art. Born in Santa Anna, Larry McAnally spent his early years in Coleman and Callahan counties as a farmer and rancher. He lived and received his edu-

cation in Cross Plains until he moved to Brownwood where he and his family have resided for 17 years.

McAnally expended his interest in drawing to an avocation in oil painting. For 12 years, his vocation was in commercial color control, which developed his concepts of color blending.

McAnally's focus on Texas landscapes and Western still life such as a ranchman's tools of trade and Indian artifacts reflect his true-life experience as a cowboy and his long-standing interest in Indian lore.

As a result, McAnally's works and reputation are gaining popularity.

McAnally has displayed his art in numerous shows throughout Texas, including one-man shows in Coleman, San Saba and Cross Plains. He recently appeared as a repeat artist at the Pecan Valley Arts Festival in Brownwood. He was one of 50 artists selected to show his work at the Chisolm Trail Days at the Fort Worth Stockyards. His works are now being displayed in private and commercial collections throughout the United States.

Doyle Lovell Tells Another Tale From His Coming Book

Editor's Note: Published below is another excerpt from Doyle Lovell's "Put My Thoughts Down", a book authored by the former Cottonwood resident. The well-known man in this area writes about his adventures and other happenings in the Cottonwood sector when he lived there during his childhood, youth and early manhood. WE NEVER EVEN GOT HIS NAME

In the waning years of the forties, the late D. T. Wrinkle and I took a fishing excursion to the Brownwood Lake. We stopped in at Tom Minton's "Boats and Bait", got permits and rented a boat. Tom had a peninsula that jutted out a few hundred yards north of his business. This spit of land was bordered on three sides by back waters of the lake. Tom told us the boats were dry docked in some willows to the left of the point and to pick out the one we wanted. Not having a motor we decided right away we'd take anyone of them that had automatic oars. It turned out that we were the automatic and the water the fluid drive.

We rowed around to the left and tied up to an old tree that had lost its leaves years before, soon after being almost covered up by lake waters. As soon as we got our lines rigged up and dropped the baited hooks into the water we began to catch bass. Then as suddenly as they began biting, they quit. So just about sundown, we assumed we'd caught all the fish out of the lake,

we pulled in our lines and headed for shore.

As we rowed across the channel towards the willows, we noticed a guy wading along the shore line about waist deep in the water and casting around for bass. We eased our boat around behind him as he waded on to the right towards the rocky outcropping of the peninsula point.

Just as we reached the landing where we'd originally got the boat and was dragging it up on the bank, we heard a commotion; like someone splashing and thrashing in the water and then a call for help.

We ran to the rocky point and on out into the water where the wader had stepped off a ledge into deep water and was floundering around trying to get back up. We grabbed an outstretched arm and pulled the man ashore. An older man and young boy were standing beside a vehicle. They were facing our direction and the man was yelling, "Are you O.K.?" "Are you O.K.?" The man we'd helped out answered, "Yeah I'm okay, these two men got me out." Then to D. T. and I, he said, "I lost my rod and reel." We told him we'd bring the boat around and make a grapple with trible hooks and maybe we could hook it. When we got around to the spot where the equipment was sunk we tied small rocks to our lines just above the hooks and pitched them out over the ledge. As we felt them hit bottom we'd drag, a little then pull out to see if we'd had any luck.

After several minutes of this procedure the young man on the bank said, "Oh that's alright fellows."

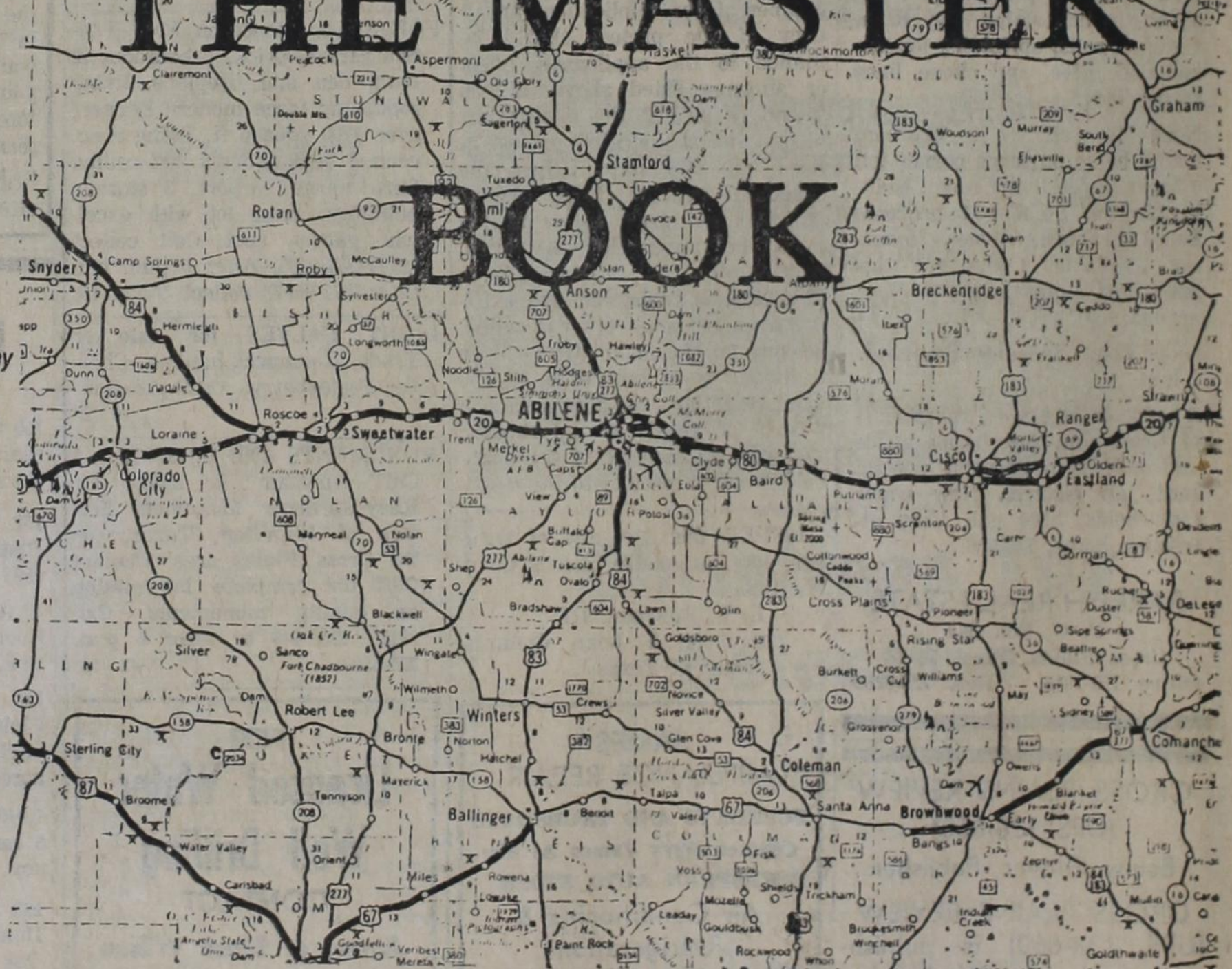

AUSTIN — While the Texas Secretary of State checks preliminary totals of the massive voter turnout in Tuesday's general election, political party leaders are sorting the ballot returns to dissect the largest voter registration was this state has witnessed.

A month ago, party chiefs and others knew the election result would hinge on how the more than one million new registrants would vote.

The Democrats targeted precincts that traditionally vote 65 percent Democrat or better, figuring that statistically they would pick up almost seven out of every 10 new voters.

The Republicans weren't sitting idly, either — they concentrated on their key precincts and on college campuses, trying to take advantage of the wave of conservatism there.

In the final days before the election each side claimed victory in the voter registration war, but privately most political observers felt that no one could say just who gained where. It will be a favorite subject of political reporting for weeks to come.

No Son of '82

This business of registering new voters was what Democrats were heavily banking on to overcome the point spreads that pollsters everywhere were shaking out of their computers. Until the last week end, virtually every poll made public indicated the Republicans — Ronald Reagan and Phil Gramm — were leading the Democrats in Texas, anywhere from 10 to 20 points.

But the same polling results in '82 had Republicans overconfident that Gov. Bill Clements would defeat his challenger Mark White, the Democrat. And while the GOP basked in the security of summer poll results, the Democrats were changing the rules of the game; they were out registering new voters that the pollsters didn't even know about yet.

When the '82 returns came in, the Democrats knew that their registration drive, coupled with an energetic and modernized "Get-Out-The-Vote" effort, had done the impossible.

They tried to work that same plan again this year, but the Republicans had caught on, at least enough to neutralize the Democratic hopes of swelling the black and Hispanic percentages.

Breakdown

Some estimates of the '84 voter pool ranged at about 76 percent Anglo, 13 percent Hispanic and 11 percent black.

Voter registration increased in the following counties: Bexar, 7.3 percent; Dallas, 16.9 percent; El Paso 20.9 percent; Harris, 24 percent; Hidalgo, 30 percent; Jefferson, 14.7 percent; Lubbock, 13.2 percent; Nueces, 14.3 percent; Tarrant, 26 percent; and Travis 31.8 percent.

The Hispanic registration was a one point gain over the percentage signed up in '82, but Democrats counted heavily on Hispanics turning out in record numbers to vote for Walter Mondale and Lloyd Doggett.

Meanwhile, absentee balloting in rural counties across the Lone Star State indicated that the real key voter was the Independent Anglo, still the majority here.

More Polarization?

In the election aftermath, it may never be determined which party actually profited from the massive number of voter-citizens participating at the ballot box aside from the bottom line indicator of who won and who lost.

Two years ago, the Democrats swept the entire ballot and promptly installed a bevy of liberals in the party headquarters, alienating or angering the conservatives of the party. The bitter primary battle featuring personal attacks from liberals Lloyd Doggett against his two conservative rivals, Kent Hance and Bob Krueger, further divided the party. It was symptomatic of the thinking of some liberal Democrats that they could win without the conservatives once and for all because of the new minority voter registration.

But whatever the final, official outcome, the Republicans have bounced back from their shattering defeat only 24 months ago. Texas is again, and probably for all-time, a two-party state. All signals indicate that more polarization is likely to occur.

Or Reconciliation?

However ignored or overlooked the moderate voter was in this election, they could find themselves the target of persuasion from both parties in the coming months.

Conceivably, conservative Democrats could find themselves more at home in the GOP because of fiscal philosophy and more comfortable in the Democratic Party because of social issues.

Perhaps the most obvious factor will be how the liberal party leadership treats conservative Democrat Kent Hance, an all-but-announced candidate for some statewide office in '86. Whether they embrace his candidacy as good for party unity or whether they urge his final ousting on grounds of party purity will make a big difference on future elections.

FHA Assists Seven Callahan Farmers

The Callahan County Office of the Farmers Home Administration assisted seven county farmers with farm loans during 1984 fiscal year, FmHA County Supervisor Jack Phillips has said. The loans totaled \$284,260 during the 12 months ending September 30.

These loans were made to farmers who needed credit but did not qualify for loans from private lender, Phillips said. "The loan programs of the Farmers Home Administration helped these farmers continue their operations."

Breakdown of the loans for Callahan County is as follows.

Operating Loans, seven loans totaling \$199,620.

Ownership loans, one loan totaling \$15,700.

Disaster emergency loans, six loans totaling \$77,940.

Nationally, preliminary figures show FmHA provided 110,455 farm loans totaling \$4.4 billion during the fiscal year, Phillips said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers and ranchers who need credit but cannot obtain it elsewhere. All loans must be repaid in full, plus interest.

Clear Fork District Sponsors Fish Offer

"The Lower Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District is sponsoring a fish stocking program," says Steve Uselton, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Baird.

The district is offering two sizes of channel catfish, native bass, bluegill of three sizes, hybrid bluegill, and fathead minnows. "Fish orders will be accepted through November 16, 1984, with order blanks available at the Baird and Albany Soil Conservation Service offices," says Uselton. Fish will be delivered to Albany on November 20, 1984. Landowners who order fish will have to pick them up at the Albany SCS Office.

The Soil Conservation Service in Baird has information concerning the cost of fish, proper stocking numbers, and feeding and fertility programs for fish in farm ponds.

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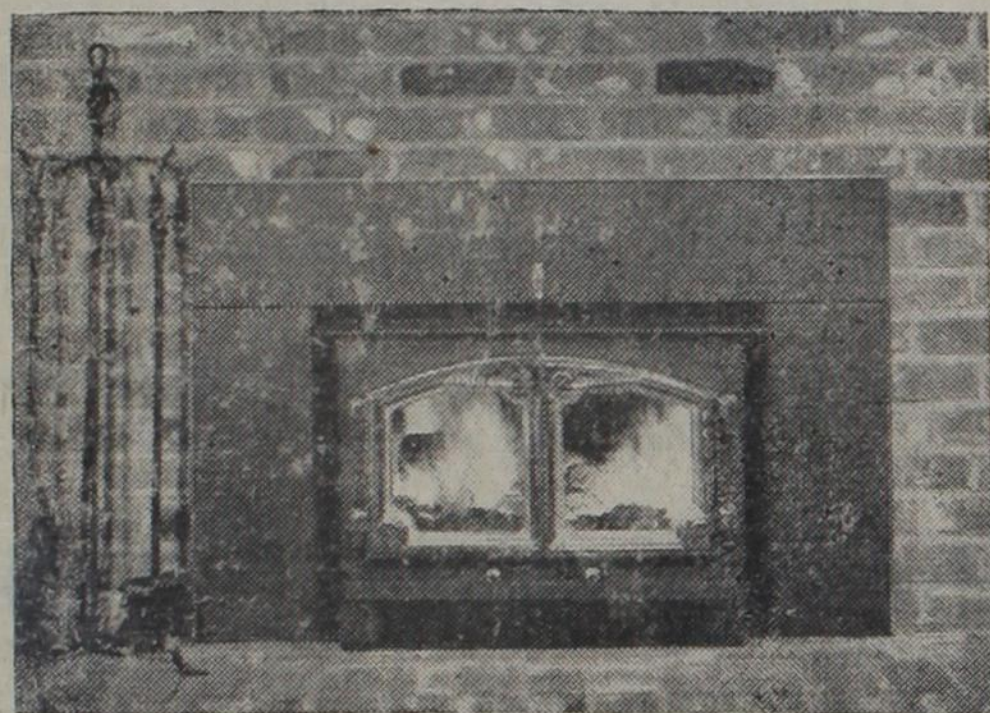
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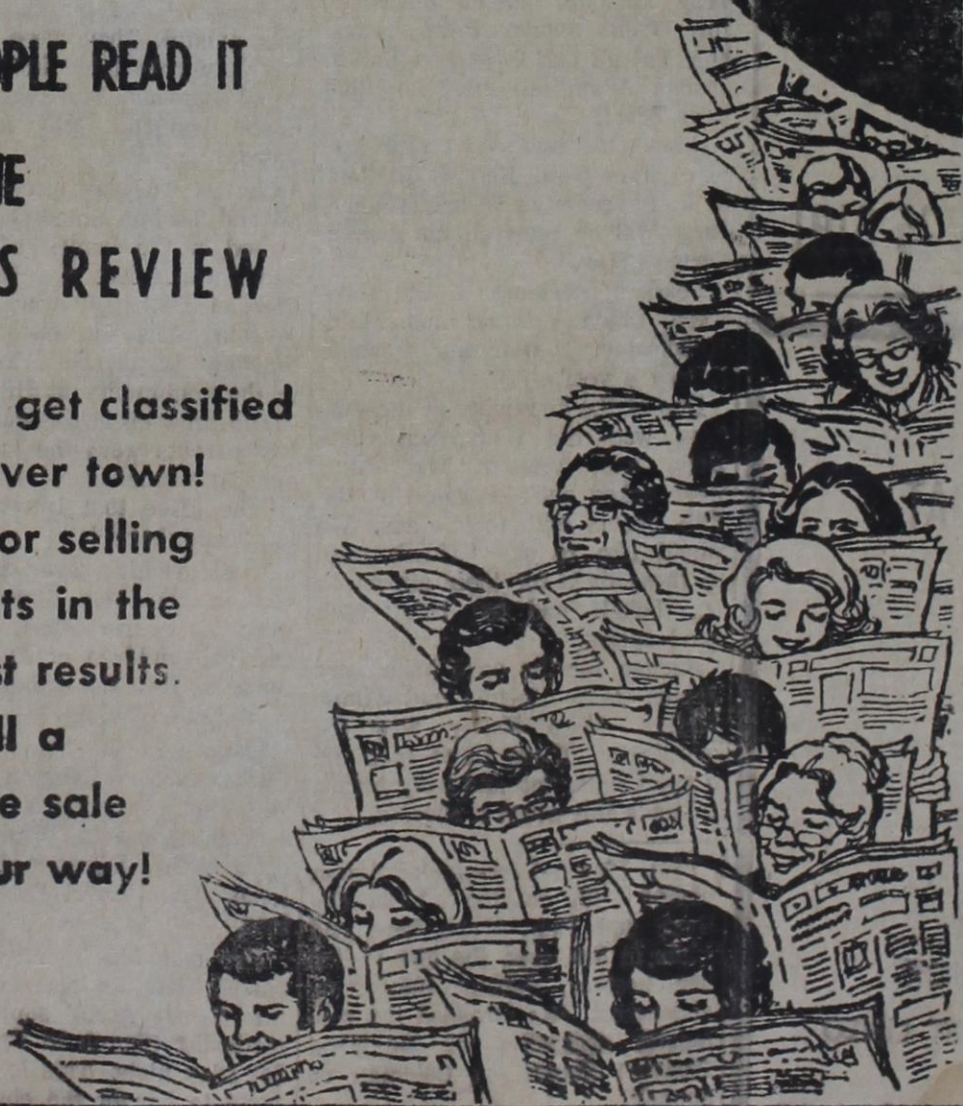

Agent Relates Tips For Combating Memory Loss

Many people assume that aging and forgetfulness go hand-in-hand. But this is not true for all people, some continue with excellent memories, while others suffer a loss in memory. Some who lose their ability to easily remember do so quickly, and others lose their recall slowly.

People of any age can have trouble remembering. Perhaps they never learned what they want to remember very well in the first place, because it had little meaning to them at the time. Or they may be having trouble with recall!

According to extension specialists, psychologists have identified a number of things that make it more difficult to remember clearly as people grow older. For example, they can't see or hear as clearly as they used to, they may be learning or storing items very well in the first place, that may be one reason why some elderly people can clearly remember things that happened years ago, but have difficulty remembering things that happened yesterday.

Living longer also means that older people have a larger pool of items they have to search through in their minds in order to

remember something specific. This can take time.

If they have suffered any of the diseases that affect thinking, such as arteriosclerosis or Alzheimer's disease, then memory will be impaired.

Poor nutrition, lack of exercise, depression or lowered motivation and fatigue due to disturbed sleep, can all result in memory problems for older people.

In addition, there is sometimes a "psychological" factor. Some older people expect to lose their memories. They don't forgive themselves when they forget things and they see their slips of memory as a reminder of old-age.

While there is no "miraculous cure" for memory loss, here are some suggestions for improving memory.

Get plenty of exercise, eat well-balanced meals and stay active enough in the daytime that you can sleep at night.

Realize that you may be depressed, and you may need to talk to someone about how you're feeling before you start feeling better.

Make "memory joggers" to give you some extra signals that let you know what you need to know. For example, write down names and phone numbers; set out medicine cups labeled with the time of day; make routine times to check for things, and have routine places for those items you use regularly.

Give yourself plenty of time to learn things that you want to remember. You don't have to rush or do things at anybody else's pace. Concentrate on what you want to learn.

Forgive yourself when you forget things. Anxiety over forgetting makes it even harder to remember them.
