Baccalaureate Sermon For Senior Class Sunday Night

Ninety-eight candidates for graduation will take part in the baccalaureate sermon at the First Methodist church on Sunday night, when Rev. D. J. Murray will preach the sermon to the senior class. Revs. W. C. Willett, E. F. Cole, and J. C. Foster will have parts on the program and the high school choir will lead in the music.

Thirty-four of the number are boys and sixty-four are girls. R. B. Snell is president of the class. Virginia Lindsey is vice-president, and James McBride is secretary-treasurer. The highest ranking pupils in grades, as previously mentioned, are Shelby Howell, valedictorian, Travis Moore, salutatorian, Frances Harrell, leads the girls. SCHOOL PLANS AWAIT ACTION OF CONGRESS

The local school building plans for enlarging Lamesa Public School facilities are being held in abeyance pending the outcome of proposed legislation before the National Congress for the Public Works Administration, known locally as PWA and WPA, respectively.

The Lamesa district authorities have sought to be in position to make an application for the benefit of the district in the event the new measures pass the Congress and to be able to meet terms and conditions set forth in the measures. Passage is expected within two weeks.

Members of the faculty are eagerly expecting to be situated in at least part of the new facilities by late fall.

Accident Fatal to Jeff Dunn, Father of Local Residents

Terry County Stockman Died Following Fall From Horse

Injuries sustained last Friday afternoon in a fall from a horse proved fatal to Jeff Dunn, 76, veteran Terry county rancher and farmer, who resided north of Lou, and approximately 30 miles northwest of Lamesa. Dunn was riding one horse and leading another when the accident occurred. In some manner the rope was tangled up and the rider was thrown from his horse. His hip was broken and he suffered internal injuries. He was rushed to a Brownfield hospital where death resulted at 5 p. m. Wednesday.

Deceased was well-known in this county, where he had made many friends during the twenty-two years he resided in this section, and several members of his family reside in and near Lamesa.

Following his death, his body was brought to this city and prepared for burial. Services were conducted at the Missionary Baptist church, on Bryan Street, Thursday afternoon at 3:30. Interment was in Lamesa cemetery.

Surviving are his widow and six children, two boys who are Erick and James Dunn, of this county. His daughters are Mrs. F. M. Mitchell, Lamesa; Mrs. G. M. Perry and Mrs. R. M. Perry, both of Hamilton; Mrs. L. D. Ferguson, Pottsville. He is also survived by three brothers and a sister as follows: Gus Dunn, Del Rio; Bob Dunn, Wortham, Texas; Tom Dunn, Kansas City, and Mrs. Nancy Markham, Gene, Texas. In addition he leaves 30 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

BORDEN COUNTY RANCHERS AND FARMERS MET

A meeting of ranchers and other land owners in Borden county was held at Gail on Friday, May 6, for the purpose of setting up plans for the preservation of Game and other Wildlife.

Mr. R. E. Callender, game management specialist of the Texas Extension Service and J. D. Prewitt, district agent was present for the informal meeting.

Mr. Harris, district game warden of Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission went over from Lamesa to discuss various phases of game and fish problems with the group.

County Agent E. B. McLeary called this meeting of landowners in Borden county for the purpose of stimulating some sort of organized effort to create and maintain game and other wildlife in Borden county.

Tentative plans involve the organization of a game preserve demonstration on acreages signed up and operated by Borden county landowners under their own local organization in cooperation with the Texas Extension Service and the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission. Numerous counties in the state have already completed and put such an organization into effect.

Death Statistics Shows Increase

D. M. Campbell, justice of the peace, reports there were 145 deaths in Dawson county during 1937. Twenty-five of those over 65 years of age; 20 died with pneumonia; seven died in automobile accidents and 47 children under twelve months of age died according to the records. These are compared with the corresponding year when the same number of deaths occurred to persons over 65. This was considered an unusual coincidence. Pneumonia took a smaller toll, with twelve lives; automobiles claimed three and only eighteen children under twelve months of age died.

C. H. McCormick Funeral Conducted Tuesday Afternoon

Long-Time Resident Victim Of Heart Attack

Clemmons H. McCormick, 65, a prominent resident of Lamesa since 1915, suffered a fatal heart attack at his home, on North Fourth Street, Monday afternoon about three o'clock. Mr. McCormick was in the bath room when stricken and was dead when Mrs. McCormick reached him, after going to investigate. Doctors stated his death occurred instantly.

He was born in 1873 and came to Texas from Hill, Alabama, and settled at Topaz, Texas, where he engaged in mercantile and gin business for a few years before moving to Dublin. Here he married Miss Eliza Dixie Hare, on August 13, 1899 and to his union was born four children, a son, Roy, who died in infancy and three daughters who are living today. They are Ruth, Naomi and Martha Lorraine. The family moved to Lamesa twenty three years ago and Mr. McCormick

Mrs. W. A. Wallace, president of the Woman's Study club announces arrangements are complete for Mrs. Regina Tatum Cooke's appearance in Lamesa next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, when she will display her art paintings at the Dal-Paso hotel lobby.

Twenty-three oil paintings and six drawings have been exhibited for the past fifteen days at the Art Museum of Texas Technological College, and the famed artist will come to this city directly from Lubbock. As mentioned last week she is a resident of Taos, New Mexico, but is recognized throughout Texas and adjoining states for her talent. Much of her work has received for her national recognition and it is considered more than passing interest that she is bringing her exhibits to this city.

Mrs. Betty McGuire Freedy, local artist, who is a personal friend of Mrs. Cooke, deserves a great deal of credit for the local show, which is sponsored by the Woman's club. The public will share a part in making the exhibit a success. The small admission fee of 10 and 25 cents will defray the expenses of this education exhibit.

New Enrollment In Boy's 4-H Club Work Reported

Teams Will Enter State Judging Contest July 6th

Due to the fine showing of the 4-H club boys at the recent show and sale, and the good work done by R. B. Wilkerson and Arlee Gowan, who recently were awarded the honor of being in the group of 100 best club boys in the state, the enrollment of boys in club work is increasing daily, according to Joe C. Williams.

Twenty-three boys at Union have enrolled for the work and will carry on demonstrations during the year. While sixteen boys at Klondike enrolled in the club there. The demonstrations will range from watermelons, poultry, milo, hegar, poultry, hogs, dairy heifers and dairy cows, beef calves.

There will be a 4-H club boys and girls' Short Course held at the A. and M. College beginning July 6th and ending July 8th at this time the Gold Star club boys, who have earned the distinction of being among the selected one hundred best demonstrators in the state will be presented a suitable award for their fine work.

County Agent Williams is planning to take four judging teams to the short course for competition with other teams from over the state. The teams will be dairying, dairy products, crops, meat identification, and possibly livestock.

The field crop team represented the county in 1936 and won second place. The team was composed of C. L. Bankhead, Eugene Seale and R. H. Wilson, all of the Ballard community. To compete for these teams a boy must be carrying on a demonstration along the lines of the team that he expects to train for judging competition.

Six of the boys who expect to feed calves for their 1938 demonstrations have already bought their calves and will have them on feed in a few days. A number of those who purchased hogs for their demonstrations have been feeding for some time. At present there are seven active poultry demonstrations being carried on by club members.

Seven Youngsters Held On Burglary Charge Thursday

Dawson county cotton warehouse fires, all of which have been in the city, amounting to a total loss of about \$300,000 were being cleared up to a certain extent Thursday afternoon.

Investigation has disclosed some eight or ten boys are involved in the crimes. Seven have been charged in Juvenile court with burglary and were expected to have been assessed terms in the reformatory school during the session, this afternoon. Testimony had not been completed and will not likely be until Friday. It was revealed some of the number broke into four warehouses and took small quantities of cotton, which was sold to local consumers. It was not proven that they deliberately set fires to the buildings, but strong circumstantial evidence was centered around their activities.

Officers reported that other arrests were expected. It was intimated that the boys are pretty well organized and have been using the warehouses to play and smoke in. Others were charged with stealing the cotton.

It seemed to be the opinion of investigators that careless smoking may have resulted in some of the fires. It remains to be proven whether others are connected with the fires. This may require weeks, months or years, but a standing reward of \$1,000 for information leading to conviction may have a tendency to bring out this information.

It was stated Thursday one of the boys held confessed to setting fire to a bale of cotton a week before the last fire that razed Keisling & McBride's warehouse Thursday, May 5. He stated however, that others present poured water on the fire and put it out.

He just wanted to see it burn, he said. That was considered, but not proven, likely the case in some of the other fires, according to investigators.

Investigation has been under way since the first huge fire on the night of April 1. At that time a loss of \$190,000 was reported by owners of the

Mrs. J. L. Morris, local president of the Texas Home Demonstration Association, is planning to attend the meeting of the two most southwestern districts of the State association. From there she will go to Coleman, where District 7 will convene on May 20, and a meeting of the State Board has been called to make pre-convention plans for the annual convention held in connection with the A. and M. Short Course, which opens on July 2, at College Station.

At a recent meeting of District 6, held in Big Spring, Mrs. Morris paid a high compliment to the accomplishments of women who work together for the common good. She said in part: "When we remember that the first women to receive degrees from any college in the whole world was 1841, and that before that time it was thought only man's mind could grasp higher learning, we are able to measure the strides women have made in our educational realm since that date."

"In no field have women made such advancement as have Home Demonstration Women in leadership, art and music." Speaking on the influence of educated mothers she said, "when you educate a man you educate an individual, educate a mother and you educate a whole family."

Mrs. Morris reports that the association is now affiliated with the Rural Women of the World, an international organization with headquarters in London.

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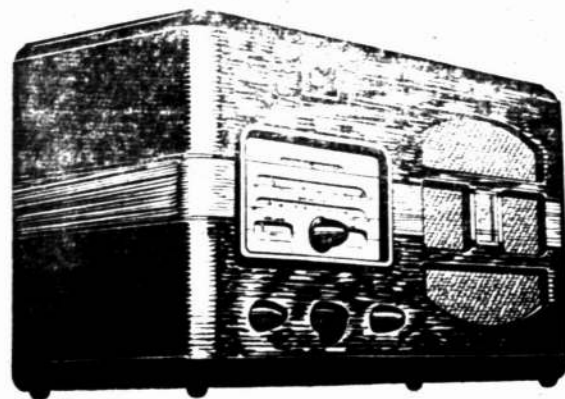

S. C. S. Notes-

Erosion control methods which the farmers are establishing on their farms in the Soil Conservation Service demonstration area near Lamesa can be seen to good advantage at this season of the year.

Contour cultivation, which simply means plowing level rows along the contour of the slopes rather than straight up and down the hill, can be seen on the land of farmers cooperating with the Soil Conservation Service. When this method of tillage is used, each row forms a small reservoir which checks the flow of run-off water across the slope.

After each heavy spring rain, water may be observed backed up behind terraces and standing in the contour furrows on fields where soil and moisture conservation practices are being used. On straight-row field, waters usually may be observed in small lakes

in low spots or running out into the road bar pits. Water held upon the land where it falls can soak into the soil and become available for growing plants, while that which runs off the slopes to form small lakes, or into roadside ditches, becomes lost for vegetative growth in the area where it fell.

Also it can be observed at this season that the first green grass to appear in pastures is along the contour furrows where water has been held and allowed to seep into the ground to aid vegetative growth.

These are only a few of the methods which cooperating farmers are combining into a unified program of erosion control on their farms. The primary purpose of this work is to demonstrate for the benefit of farmers throughout this entire section how these methods are being adapted to the conditions similar to those found on their own farms.

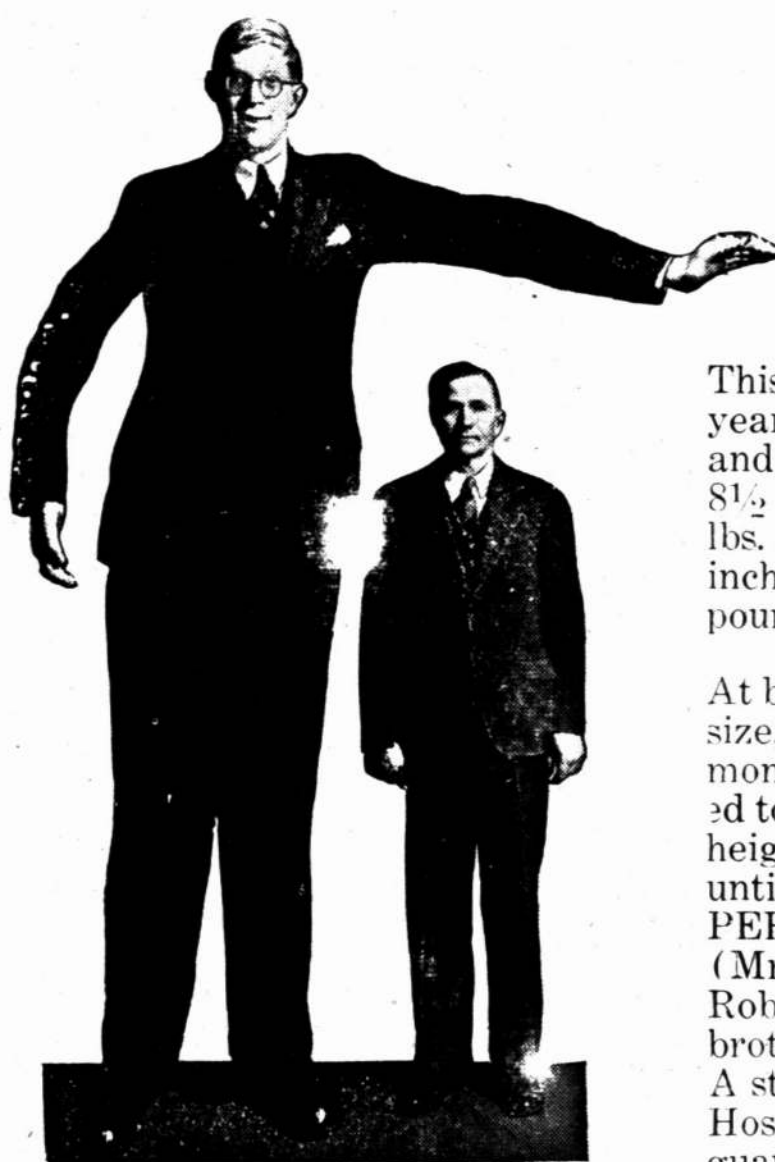

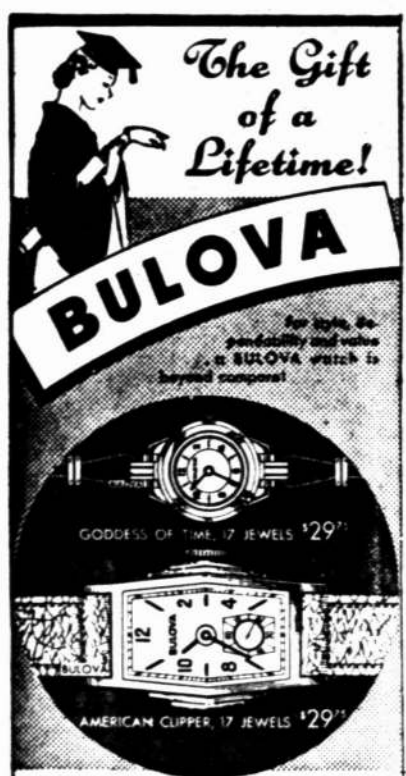

Advice For Snake Bites Released By Health Officer

Austin, Tex. May 9.—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, urges every one to be careful to prevent snake bites when in the country. In Texas the chief offender is the rattlesnake, and, contrary to common belief, it does not always rattle before it strikes.

If one is bitten, prompt action is necessary and a physician should be obtained as soon as possible. No time should be lost in removing the poison by suction; this can be done by a suction cup. First, a tourniquet should be applied above the wound, so as to increase congestion and assist in washing out the poison. A cross cut incision with a sharp, clean knife or razor blade should be made over each fang mark or preferably to connect the two fang punctures. These cuts should be at least a quarter of an inch deep and at least that long. Suction should be applied for at least a half hour. The tourniquet should be released ever ten to fifteen minutes for a minute at a time.

Texas Club Women Show Improvement On Yard Projects

College Station, May 2.—The 9955 Home Demonstration club members and 4-H club girls who carried on yard improvement work in 1937 under the supervision of county home demonstration agent, achieved excellent results with a total cash expenditure of only \$10.122, or an average of slightly more than \$10 a yard, according to Miss Sadie Hatfield, landscape gardening specialist of the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College.

There were 1,709 lawns leveled and sodded and 2,487 drives and walks constructed. The big improvement came in the addition of plants, with 25,372 nursery shrubs, 19,765 native shrubs and 18,006 trees for shade and background planted and living. In addition, 23,369 rose bushes were planted and are living.

Cutting beds produced 88,610 plants and shrubs which will make a showing in future years. This economical way of securing material for beautifying the home surroundings is growing in popularity. There were 36,333 cutting roots and 1936.

The work listed above does not include work done in 1937 on demonstrations of the past. The volume of accomplishments of these yards is indicated by 14,194 trees and 12,376 shrubs planted and living.

Miss Hatfield lists among the 1937 trends a movement to include the agricultural conservation program in yard improvement plans. One result of this trend has been to replace row crops around farm homes with permanent pastures of alfalfa fields.

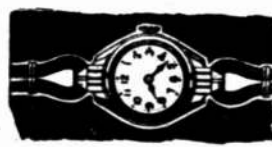

CCC ENROLLEES ASSISTED COUNTY COMMITTEES IN AIDING STORM VICINITY

During the recent disastrous storm which struck the small community of O K, and all but swept it from the face of the earth, the local CCC Camp and its officials offered all aid that was possible in assisting in collecting personal property and clearing the roads and fields of debris.

While it may seem to some, that the effort expended by the CCC officials and personnel, was very little, the aid rendered was all that could be possibly offered under the existing rules and regulations of the Civilian Conservation Corps.

In cases of flood, fire, or storm, in order to protect life and property, and to insure sanitary conditions, the Camp Commander and Camp Superintendent need no authority from higher officials

to take immediate steps in rendering whatever aid they deem necessary to a town or community.

The County Judge of Dawson County contacted the local CCC officials, the morning after the storm had struck the O K community, and asked their assistance in helping to clear away the debris. The Camp Commander and three Soil Conservation Service foremen, with approximately forty-five enrollees from the CCC camp, spent approximately four hours in the stricken community collecting personal property and clearing the roads and fields of debris. Further action could not be taken due to the fact that the emergency was over, and the only task which remained was the clearing the fields of the scattered debris.

The Regional Office of the Soil Conservation Service at Amarillo and the District Office of the Civilian Conservation Corps at Fort Worth, Texas, were both contacted by the proper camp officials, in an effort to determine whether or not further assistance

could be offered. Due to the fact that both headquarters ruled that the emergency of saving lives and property and insuring sanitation, was over, further assistance could not be given. In view of the above, in case any emergency arises in the future if the local camp officials will be contacted immediately, all available assistance will be offered as soon as called upon, whether night or day.

McARTY P-T. A. MEETS

The McCarty P-T. A. met Thursday night, April 23, with a good crowd present. Joe M. Peterson gave an address on "Education For Home Life and Family Life" after which the program was turned over to Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, who gave a very interesting outline of her plans to put visual education in our public schools in Dawson County.

Her plans, which at first seemed prohibitive on account of the cost, were simplified and made possible through

help and cooperation of our county agent, the commissioners' court and the CCC boys, who aided in Miss Bulsterbaum's efforts to secure the necessary equipment to show moving pictures in the rural schools.

The state provided some of the equipment and educational films were secured from Austin. Miss Bulsterbaum then gave a demonstration of visual education by showing ten films, a comedy, a story of farm life and farming methods, the water sport of skiing in Canada, and local pictures of the 4-H club boys, their calves, etc.

Visual education will occupy a larger and larger place in the school curriculum and Miss Bulsterbaum deserves the support and cooperation of all the school patrons in the work she is doing along this line.

The McCarty P-T. A. will probably give a community picnic sometime before school is out to which all are invited to come.—Mrs. H. L. Slover.

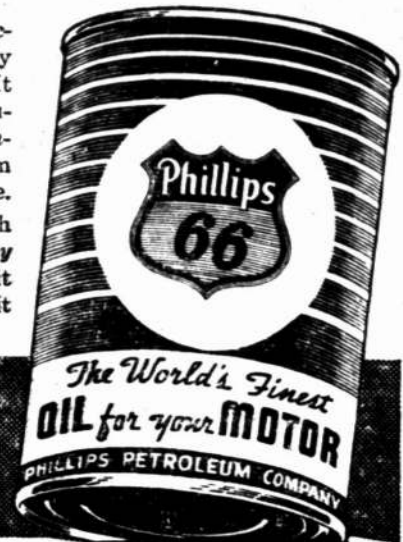

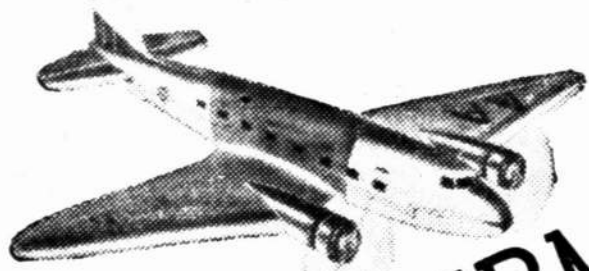

Dental Conditions Are Blamed For Many Disorders

Dawson county paying more than \$10,695.71 annually for school grade repeaters due to dental conditions. Taxpayers of Texas are paying more than thirteen million dollars annually for school grade repeaters. These figures are based on information by the State Department of Education and computed by the State Department of Health.

"This estimate can readily be accepted as conservative," according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, "when the high incidence of dental disease and its intimate relationship to other diseases and the general health of the body is taken into consideration. Reliable sources tell us that more than twenty-three million school children are in urgent need of dental care. This means that approximately one and one-half million Texas school children are in urgent need of dental care, and that is to say nothing of the infant, pre-school, and adult groups. Dental surveys over the United States have proved that from eighty-five to ninety-five per cent of school children are suffering from dental disease.

"The health of the mouth and the teeth is most important since they form the doorway to the body. It is through the mouth that all nutrition must pass and there the first steps of digestion take place, and it is also through the mouth and nose that most of our diseases enter the body. This is especially true of the diseases of childhood.

"All the licensed dentists in Texas working constantly could not correct all of the dental defects of all the people of Texas, so the natural place to start correction and protection is in the mouth of the child at an early age," Doctor Cox pointed out.

Prevention is the only equitable solution to this alarming health condition which is so seriously menacing the welfare of our people. Realizing the enormous health problem dental health presents and the staggering cost of its neglect the Dental Division of the State Department of Health joins other agencies concerned with child health in the May Day-Child Health Day program to make the State of Texas conscious of this phase of health work," Doctor Cox said.

Wheat Acreage Allotments Set For '38 Payments

College Station, May.—The Texas 1938 wheat acreage allotment of 4,146,400 acres, recently announced, will determine the amounts of wheat part of the AAA payments which Texas farmers can earn in the 1938 program, according to Geo. Slaughter, chairman of the state Agricultural Conservation committee.

The amount of the wheat part of the payment will depend upon the yield per acre, as each farmer's wheat payments will be computed on the basis of 12 cents per bushel on the normal yield of his acreage allotment. The remainder of each farmer's payment will depend upon his general soil-depleting acreage allotments, and on any other special allotments made for his farm.

The wheat acreage allotments are not intended to affect wheat plantings for this year's crop because winter wheat had already been seeded when the new farm act was passed. Seedings of wheat and other soil-depleting crops, however, need to be held within total acreage allotments of an individual farm in order to qualify the farm for full 1938 payments.

Wheat acreage allotments ranging from 84 acres for Mississippi and 118 for Vermont to 12,619,879 for Kansas were announced for 42 states. North Dakota with 9,413,355 acres received the second largest allotment, while Oklahoma, in third place with 4,231,784 was given a slightly larger allotment than Texas. Other states which received allotments in excess of 3 million acres were Montana, Nebraska and South Dakota.

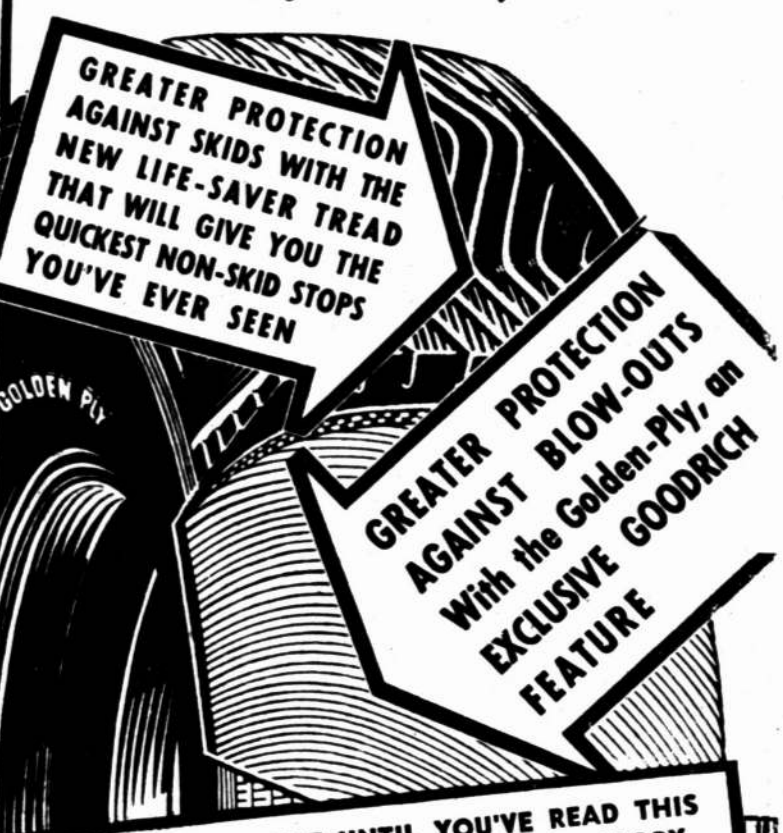

BALANCED FARM PROGRAM MEANS SOUNDER SYSTEM

College Station, May 9.—"The average farmer this year will devote around 33 per cent of his acreage to cotton, 37 to feed crops and 30 per cent to hay and soil improvement crops," according to H. H. Williamson, director of the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College, who believes that these figures indicate that Texas farmers are balancing their crops and their farm activities in a sound fashion.

"Out of the Texas farmers' present economic difficulties may come a sounder system of farming," the director points out. "In addition to the usual cash crops, farmers this year are planting larger proportions of home food and feed and soil improvement crops."

"Texas is fortunate in having a number of 'triple threat' crops from which to choose. Cotton and wheat, with grain sorghums, are of course our big cash crops, with rice in the coastal section, and flax showing some promise in southern and southwestern counties. It is probable that no other state enjoys such a wide variety of choice among crops for food and feed uses. In hay and soil improvement crops, we have a fair pick in the grasses, sweet sorghums, cowpeas, soybeans, velvet beans, hairy vetch, and some of the other clovers."

Williamson declared that our long seasons of high temperatures burn up humus more quickly than is the case in more temperate sections, and that this makes conservation work especially important here. County agricultural agents have estimated that more than five million Texas acres will be affected by soil improvement crops and conservation practices in 1938, of which about a million will be terraced and two and a half million contoured but not terraced.

The 1936 Agricultural Conservation program will encourage the use of conservation practice and soil improvement crops, according to the director, who added that long time agricultural planning, both on the part of individual farmers and by communities, counties and type of farming areas offers great possibilities of correcting the faults of Texas agriculture.

NATIONAL AIR MAIL WEEK

MAY 15-21, 1938

The entire South Plains will have a part in the observance of Air Mail Week. Amos Howard, Lubbock, postmaster, has announced plans are complete for a "feeder" service out of that city to various towns in this section on Thursday, May 19, when planes will pick up the air mail from the neighboring towns where there are no airports. The service is timed with a scheduled flight from Amarillo to San Angelo. Four "feeder" planes out of Lubbock will gather the air mail from Littlefield, Muleshoe, Levelland, Lamesa, Tahoka, Floydada, Lockney, Hale Center, Abilene, Slaton, Post, Spur and Ralls.

Every citizen in Lamesa is asked to have a part in this program. The plans will be completed Saturday, when the Air Mail Committee will visit here on that occasion to complete the necessary arrangements. The local committee will meet this plane at a site, which has been selected for the proposed aviation field, five miles north of town.

Residents are asked to write an air mail letter to some friend or business acquaintance in another part of the state, mailing this letter not later than 7:00 a. m. Thursday, in time to make connections with the special plane, which will pick up the Lamesa cachet at 2:35 in the afternoon.

This service is more or less a test experiment that will in all probability be put into effect within the next two or three years, and leaders here are working at present to promote a permanent aviation field. In this is accomplished then Lamesa and Dawson county will have the assurance of air mail service.

Contour Method Of Farming Showing Many Advantages

Running rows across slopes in the contour rather than up and down the slopes is a practice that will be followed by many farmers in this area this year. Reports indicate that contour farming is becoming one of the most popular of the erosion control practices in this section of the state. It is a conservation measure which tenants can also adopt as it does not necessitate any expenditures at all.

Conservation of moisture as well as reduction of soil losses is creating additional interest in contour farming. Rows that parallel terraces or rows that follow contour lines on untended fields reduce the amount of run-off water. Plow furrows along such rows serve as miniature terraces. They help to hold the raindrops where they fall and giving the soil an even distribution of moisture.

Many farmers report that farming on the contour has enabled them to establish longer rows on their fields than they ever had before. Along with the long rows there usually are some point rows. Some farmers use areas where point rows would be for the production of feed crops. Others re-arrange their field division fences, locating them on the contour so that there will be fewer point rows. Such fences make excellent permanent guides lines for contour farming.

"Creation of point rows has been cited as one of the outstanding disadvantages of contour farming, but reports from the many farmers who have practiced contour farming for one or more seasons indicate that even though nothing is done to reduce the number of the difficulties they present are just about offset by the increased number of long rows. Contour cultivation, by conserving moisture, also gives more assurance of a good crop."

State Civil Service Examinations Open In Several Cities

Merit examinations for the position of Junior Interviewer in the Texas State Employment Service has just been announced. Vacancies in the operating staff of the local employment offices will be filled from eligible lists established through these examinations.

Application forms and detailed announcements concerning the examinations may be obtained from Professor Emmette S. Redford, special representative of the United States Employment Service, Box 2119, University Station, Austin. Application forms must be returned to Mr. Redford by May 31, 1938.

The examinations are open to men and women who have been citizens of Texas for at least five years immediately preceding the date of employment.

Applicants must meet the following minimum requirements for participation in the examinations: (1) a high school education and three years of the required experience; or (2) a college education and one year of the required experience; or (3) an equivalent combination of (1) and (2) or (4) years of the required experience. Dawson County Warehouse Company Several members of the gang, ranging in ages from eight years old to fifteen, were apprehended shortly after the fire. Extensive grilling failed to "break" them and they were released after considerable light was given on the case. They were under observation for the time and were linked in the two other fires.

Despite the fact that officials were doing all they could to solve the case, public sentiment was roused by others who were threatened with the same disaster as experienced by warehouse owners. They employed extra watchmen, who were on duty day and night. A maximum penalty was imposed on Lamesa and although it was not generally known insurance cancellation was threatened. A few who knew the situation called a mass meeting for Tuesday night and a reward of \$1,000 was subscribed and posted for information leading to and conviction of the person or persons guilty.

The mass meeting was called on short notice with the arrival of Assistant State Fire Marshal James Byrne, arson investigator for the State Fire Commission. The meeting was also attended by E. L. Mitchell, State agent for the National Board of Underwriters whose headquarters office is in New York, and state office in Dallas. Cotton ginners, warehouse men, county and city officials, members of the fire department and merchants were present. The attendance was somewhat smaller than would have been had it been well advertised. There were about seventy present, but when a plea was issued to raise a reward of \$1,000 was subscribed within less than thirty minutes.

At the mass meeting it was brought out that Insurance Companies are paying one hundred per cent, but could not be expected to continue unless drastic steps were taken to prevent recurrence in the future. Therefore, the reward was posted.

Those who contributed to the fund included Lamesa and Dawson County Warehouses, \$150 together; Keisling & McBride, \$100; Ed Britton and associates who have local warehouses in the north part of town, subscribed \$50 to this fund. \$25 for any warehouse fire and \$200 for information on any attempt made to burn their individual property; East Texas Compress & Warehouse Co., \$100; McDonald Gin Co., \$100; the city has a standing offer of \$100; Jesse Carroll \$50; Morris & Martin Insurance Co., \$100; Lamesa National Bank \$50; Jenkins & Co., \$25; C. Baldwin, \$20; Mrs. Naomi Moore \$25; Fire Department \$25, and the balance was underwritten by leading warehouse firms.

Mayor W. L. Marr re-appointed a three-man arson committee as a precaution in preventing future fires.

Brought to Light . . .

Postmaster Owen Taylor, was found down this week distributing stickers on National Air Mail Week, which will be observed in every post office throughout the United States from Sunday, May 15, through Saturday, June 11. Local folks are urged to send at least one air mail letter from the local department during the period. On Thursday a "feeder" plane from Lubbock will fly to Lamesa and pick up the local mail. This service will be rendered throughout the South Plains area and the planes will make connections to a schedule from Amarillo to San Angelo.

We are reminded today mail-carrying planes represent the last word in aerial invention for size, speed and comfort. A total of 63,826 miles now represents the routes of air-mail service in the domestic and foreign system combined and planes flew during the last fiscal year, with a total distance of more than seventy million miles—with one exception, air-mail service is available in every American State, and foreign routes cover Mexico, Central and South America, the West Indies, the Philippines and other islands of the sea, and the Orient, with the expectation that the service will soon be extended to Europe.

There is perhaps no other time more appropriate than during the celebration of National Air Mail Week for local citizens to concentrate their effort on the movement, already under way to secure an adequate aviation field for Lamesa.

With favorable conditions this year, and last there has been a steady trend by local men and women to invest money in new business enterprises. Almost each week there is a new business of some type opening in Lamesa. This week J. D. Dyer is opening an auto parts store and general hardware his building, on South First Street, has been re-modeled especially for this type of business and merchandise has been arriving and arranged for sale throughout the week.

Others are building new homes. One of the week's starters was that being erected on South Sixth Street for Mrs. L. A. Davis. The extreme south and southwest part of the city has seen much new construction lately. This week nine new homes were counted

along the rim of Sulphur Draugh. The new homes, none of which have been mentioned, apparently sprang up somewhat sudden like.

American leaders in every walk of life have combined forces in the United Council for Civilian Relief in China to aid millions of sufferers from the Japanese invasion of north and central China, according to announcement made in New York by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., national chairman of the newly formed council.

With the season of flies and mosquitoes near at hand, Miss Wright is also encouraging her farm women friends to make sure the homes are well screened, and damaged screens repaired. She is asking each farm wife to check drainage and garbage disposal facilities, nothing that dampness near the back doors is a great drawing card for filth-bearing flies. Elimination of places near the farm home, where flies and mosquitoes are most likely to breed is another concern of Miss Wright. She is especially anxious that farm women see that weeds are kept at a minimum and that outdoor toilets be kept as sanitary as possible.

"Although screens are an important factor in health and sanitation," Miss Wright said, "we should not stop there. Every farm home can now have one or more inexpensive, home-made fly traps as an added precaution against serious disease outbreaks during the hot summer months."

Miss Wright is anxious to help her farm women in raising and keeping high the health standards and has numerous suggestions which she will gladly give to them upon request.

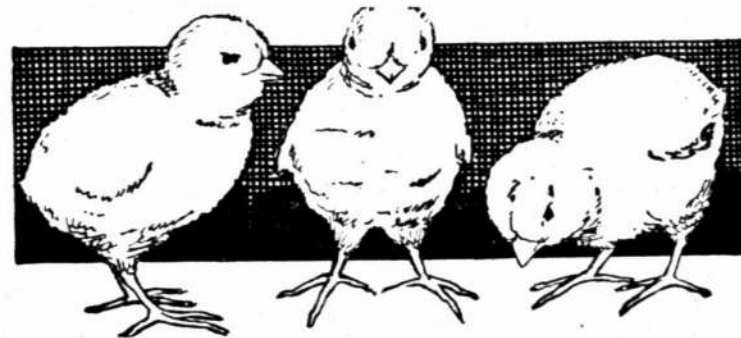

A striking demonstration of progress made in social science studies is evident in the Lamea elementary school where Mrs. Ralph Stuart's two seventh grade exhibits depict the history and development of America from the time of Columbus' historical voyage to the present day.

Hand carved miniatures of the Pinto Nina and Santa Maria, as well as beautifully illustrated posters of Columbus' three ships sailing the unknown seas, were the first scenes of this display.

Next in line was a poster showing the Pilgrims signing the Mayflower compact. This has been called, somewhat extravagantly perhaps, the first state constitution in American history, that is written plan defining the form and method for self-government for an American state.
