CAMPBELL SOUP CO. COMES TO PARIS



WRIGHT PATMAN

(Excerpts from remarks by Congressman Wright Patman of the 1st District at the Paris Industrial Committee luncheon held Wednesday at the Holiday Inn in connection with the Campbell plant announcement.)

Campbell's Paris plant will provide an outlet for thousands of acres of vegetable crops grown over a 200-mile area. These crops will have a farm value of millions of dollars annually. Moreover, this plant will provide new employment opportunities for many people, thereby adding immensely to the annual payroll of the area.

New vegetable growers will find Campbell of invaluable assistance in getting crop know-how. Campbell has a long history of providing crop experts to work with vegetable growers. They help select the best fields. They have soil samples analyzed in Campbell laboratories. Fertilizer recommendations are then submitted to the growers to make certain the correct amount of additional nutrients is put into the soil to provide the crop with the food it needs for maximum growth. Throughout the growing season Campbell growers continue to receive technical advice and help from Campbell fieldmen.

I am confident that Campbell's coming to Paris will contribute immensely to the economic welfare of our vegetable growers and our entire business community. I view it as the greatest single forward step in this century to the vegetable crop industry in this part of the State.

Tower, Blakley Lead Senate Race;

Republican John Tower strongly led the field in Tuesday's special Senate election and will be in a run-off contest with a Democrat.

A tight race for runner-up developed between Interim Sen. William A. Blakley of Dallas and Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth.

Tower, a 35-year-old government professor from Wichita Falls, led over a field of 64 special election opponents. He lacked a majority and will be in a runoff election about six weeks from now with Blakley.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson of Dallas, who had never before lost an election, was fourth. Next in line were Maury Maverick Jr. and State Senator Henry Gonzalez.

For the first time in history, a Texas Republican was threatening in a Senate contest.

This is the second Senate bid by Blakley, 62. He was named interim Senator in 1957, but did not run in the special election won by Ralph W. Yarborough. He again was named interim Senator to fill the vacancy when Lyndon Johnson quit to become Vice President.

A total of 183 votes were cast in the special election on the court house repaid bond issue. It carried in Talco by 162 votes for to 116 votes against the issue.

Only 11 of the Senatorial candidates received votes. Interim Senator William A. Blakley received 49; State Attorney Will Wilson 48; Jim Wright 50; Maury Maverick Jr., 8; Republican John G. Tower, 21; Henry B. Gonzales, 5. The following received one vote each: Hoyt Wilson, Hugh Wilson, Tom E. Barton, Chester Brooks, John M. Echman.

Special election officials were Mmes. Mary Welch, Joe Morse, R. G. Hood, E. W. Smith and R. J. Ross, Messrs. D. E. Howard and V. L. Taylor.

Blakley received almost 40 per cent of Talco votes. His strength surprising to many political observers, was measured by 757 votes.

Talco Youth Hurt In Jeep Accident

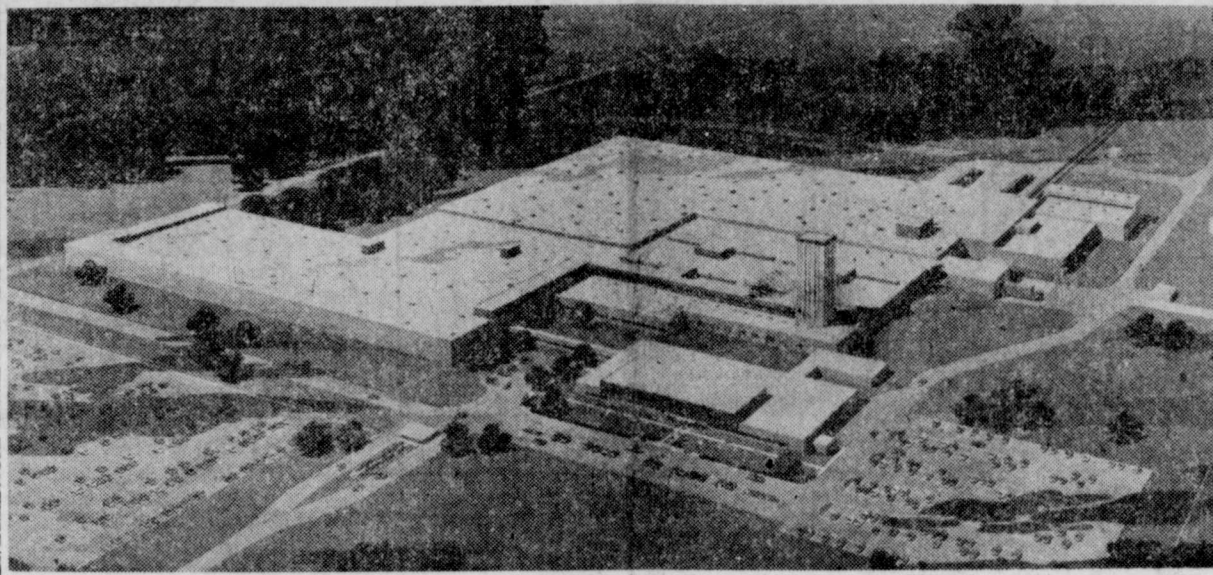
District Track Meets Are Set

Voters Name City Officials Tuesday

Most towns and cities named some new officials in city elections held Tuesday. Voters went to the polls according to interest in the immediate locality.

A total of 198 votes were cast in Talco city election Tuesday. J. J. (Jewel) Smith received 116 votes to be elected mayor over John Henry Dickerson, who received 80 votes. Jerry Jones received 132 votes, and Jack Winn 107 votes to be named city commissioners. Other candidates, Buck Clark received 30, Shepard Barber 53 and Elton Welch 60.

Retiring commissioners are Glen Gauden and A. G. Norwood. Jones, who was mayor, did not seek the post, having served three terms as mayor.

In the only contested race at Clarksville, Robert Whiteman was re-elected alderman, defeating Marie Slaton, 331 to 140. Unopposed for re-election were Maurice Wooley, Roy Erwin and Kelsey Dick.

One incumbent and two newcomers won the three city council posts at stake at Bogata. Incumbent Britt Lassiter had 60 votes, Harold Geese, 65 and W. S. Cody 64. Incumbent Lenox Hudson was out of the running with 41 votes.

Election officials in the city election were Ed Nugent, Mmes. M. E. Jones, B. L. Gieger, Ida Welch.

Dr. W. A. Ferguson was elected mayor without opposition at Mt. Pleasant and three aldermen were named from six candidates. Elected aldermen were incumbent Jack Cross, 348; incumbent Dean Redfearn, 357, and Rudy Ledeon, 331, over James Smith, 319; Dr. R. L. Hardman, 323, and Clayton Knox, 288.

Formal Announcement Made Of Campbell Soup Location In Paris

Paris, Texas, April 5. — Campbell Soup Company today announced plans to build a new food processing plant covering nearly 1,000,000-square feet on a 684-acre site near Paris.

Equipped for the production of soup, bean and spaghetti products initially, the plant will employ about 750 persons at the outset, increasing to about 1,200 persons ultimately. One out of every 12 employees will be concerned with quality control or supervision.

During its first years, the multi-million dollar plant will spend in excess of \$20,000,000 annually for ingredients, supplies, containers and miscellaneous items.

Although the latest in processing methods and automated material handling equipment will be used in the plant, the actual preparation, blending, and simmering of food products will follow the time-honored methods established over Campbell's 93-year history.

When completed in late 1963, the new plant will join 21 other Campbell processing facilities, including 13 in the U. S. and eight in Canada or overseas.

The company announced the plant's construction at a small luncheon given by the Paris Industrial Committee in Paris. Speakers included House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Congressman Wright Patman of the 1st district.

W. B. Murphy, Campbell president, said one factor affecting the decision to locate in northeast Texas was the rapid sales growth of convenience food in the Southwest. "The plant," he said, "will help us to further improve our service to customers in the region."

Mr. Murphy said the company also was disposed toward the area by the fact that many high-quality ingredients used by the plant could be grown locally. He added that the company has large-scale experiments under way to perfect a field-ripened tomato for summer harvesting that can be commercially grown in the area. (At present, most processing tomatoes are grown in the East, Midwest, and California, and almost none are grown as far south as Texas.)

The Campbell president said another factor in the selection of Paris was the favorable attitude of the state and locality toward new business.

The plant site is just northwest of this town of 25,000 on Loop Highway 286. The 1,120-by-1,240 foot structure will have a brick exterior. In the food preparation areas, the walls will be tiled and the floors will be constructed of a specially-treated concrete. Bids for excavation and grading will be requested in April. General construction bids will be invited in July.

Most work areas will be ventilated with air cooled by mechanical refrigeration. Locker rooms, medical facilities and cafeteria will be constructed for the employees. A visitors' lounge will be included.

After the food has been prepared, blended, cooked, inspected and tasted, automation takes over in rapidly labeling the cans, packing them into cases, and automatically loading the cases on pallets for shipment to customers or for warehousing.

Campbell has been conducting agricultural tests involving about 15 crops in several Texas agricultural areas dating back to 1953-54. In addition to tomatoes, the company has been working with asparagus, pole beans, beets, cabbage, carrots, lima beans, okra, onions, parsley, peas, peppers, white potatoes, sweet corn, and sweet potatoes.

The work on tomatoes has involved the development of a new heat-tolerant strain representing a cross between a small-fruited tomato from the Philippines and various Campbell varieties. The agricultural researchers concluded that the basic reason the southern states had not become prominent processing growers of vine-ripened tomatoes for summer harvesting was that the high night temperatures prevent "fruit-setting" during most of the growing season. Yields in these southern areas, therefore, tend to be low or erratic and the harvest season short.

Campbell's researchers hope that the newly-developed varieties of heat-tolerant tomatoes (which set fruit at high temperatures) can be grown commercially in the area.

Mr. Murphy said that most of the labor for the plant when put in operation will come from local sources and 50 per cent will be women. Contracts will be let locally to small farmers and the Campbell Company will furnish technical advice and every co-operation to growers who wish to raise the produce for them. Contracts will be started in the spring of 1963, when the plant is completed.

Deport Crash Injures Three

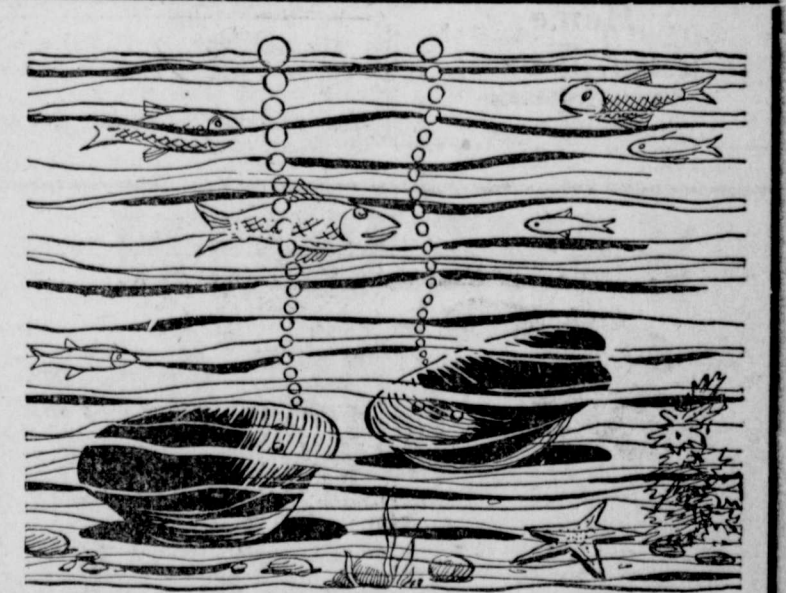

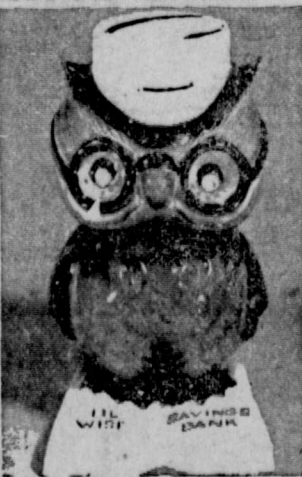

State Capital NEWS

Austin. — Texas Senate now has a tax bill—one designed to wipe out about half the deficit that is expected to be about \$63,000,000 when the new fiscal year starts September 1.

Revenue-raising measures must be passed by the House before they can be considered by the Senate, and the upper chamber has waited with polite impatience for the House to send it something to work on.

Passed 85-to-60 by the House was the so-called "loophole bill" by Rep. Charles Ballman of Borer.

It is a sort of catchall bill that (1) plugs up some leaks in the revenue bill passed last session, taxing central air conditioners, juke boxes, etc., (2) provides for a transfer of 1 per cent of the permanent school fund to the available school fund, (3) sets up a two-factor formula for corporate franchise taxes and (4) levies a state gift tax of one-half the federal gift tax.

Caption of the Ballman bill is broad enough that a variety of other money raising plans could be added to it should legislators be able to agree to them.

Meanwhile, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee has a lot of other tax bills in the mill. Three sales tax bills were sent to subcommittee, as well as a hotly debated proposal to levy a 10 per cent tax on trading stamps.

A trading company spokesman said there is only a three per cent profit on the operation and that a 10 per cent tax would put them out of business.

On the other hand, stamps were attacked as "counterfeit money" and an unnecessary burden on both merchant and consumer.

STRIKE THREE — Texas Supreme Court made short work of a 1959-passed tax law that many lawmakers had hoped would be a potent future revenue raiser.

Without issuing an opinion, the high court agreed with the trial court and civil appeals court that the severance beneficiary tax on gas is unconstitutional.

Although three state courts have turned thumbs down on the gas tax, the last chapter remains to be written by the U. S. Supreme Court. As passed in 1959, the gas tax was low (1½ per cent of market value), but supporters had indicated that if the law survived its court battles, the rate would be raised to bring in more money.

LADIES SCORE IN HOUSE — House has passed and sent to the Senate a proposed constitutional amendment that would automatically erase all statutes that treat women differently from men.

Rep. Ben Atwell's very brief amendment states that "equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex." It passed the House 135-to-10.

Senators have misgivings about causing such sweeping changes in the law. Some 44 statutes would be affected.

LOAN FIGHT SHAPES UP — House members are coming to grips with one of the session's touchiest issues—regulation of small loan companies.

House Committee on Banks and Banking reported to the floor a bill authorized by Rep. Criss Cole of Houston. It is being subjected to widespread criticism, but Cole, long-time veteran of the loan regulation effort, declared that no bill was going to satisfy all the interested factions.

Cole's bill sets up a sliding scale that would allow interest rates of just under 40 per cent on loans of \$100 and dropping gradually to about 11 per cent on a \$3,000 loan. It also allows for "reasonable insurance charges," at rates set by the State Board of Insurance.

Abner McCall of Waco, spokesman of a statewide committee for sound loan laws, said the interest rates were too high and that the limit on credit insurance charges should be clearly defined.

BREWERIES (PRO & CON) — Legal restrictions on breweries and the desirability of having breweries at all came up for spirited discussion before the Senate State Affairs Committee.

Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth is author of the House-passed bill that would give brewers of ale the privilege, as beer makers, to continue their operations in a territory after it is voted dry. It would also increase from one year to three years the time allowed a brewery to begin production after it got its license.

A large out-of-state manufacturer of ale is planning to build a \$20,000,000 plant in Tarrant County. Any change would, of course, affect the whole state.

Supporters of the bill emphasized the new jobs and payroll it would create. Opponents, mostly ministers and church leaders, declared it would contribute to the problems of alcoholism.

PHONE RATES STUDIED — House State Affairs Committee is studying a bill by Rep. Dan Struve of Campbellton that would place regulation of telephone service, within the state's borders, in the hands of the Texas Railroad Commission.

Representative Struve says Texas is one of two states that do not have this sort of regulation and that other states have lower rates.

Other witnesses testified that a long distance call within Texas borders costs more than one of the same distance that crosses the state line.

PRE-PAID FUNERALS DEBATED — Funeral directors and cemetery operators clashed before both House and Senate committee over a bill to restrict pre-paid funeral arrangements.

Funeral directors declared that their only desire was to protect the public by requiring that money paid in advance for funeral expenses be put in a trust fund.

Cemetery and mortuary operators retorted that the funeral directors wanted to discourage pre-paying of funeral expenses. They contended that families who make funeral arrangements at the time of bereavement spend more money than if arrangements are made in advance.

SHORT SNORTS — A test vote in the Senate indicated that Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's proposal to abolish the Court of Criminal Appeals and transfer its duties to the State Supreme Court, is short of enough support for passage. . . . Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston says he will introduce a bill to allow nurses registered in other states to practice in Texas, thus to help alleviate the shortage of registered nurses.

This is the way with a lot of progress. It finally becomes so unwieldy it defeats its purpose, like cars in a traffic jam, and the only answer is to work harder and put in a second phone for your use, and for the amount of work it takes to pay for both, you could walk over about as cheap and see in person the man you wanted to talk to on the phone in the first place.

Also, telephones are becoming too thorough. The purpose of a telephone, as far as I'm concerned, is to reach somebody without having to go see him, but they're working on new phones that'll reverse this, and make it possible for people to reach me on the same terms. If you're not at one number, the phone will automatically trace you to the next one; if your phone is busy, it'll wait till you hang up and then ring immediately. Why, even if you're off on a tractor, it's possible to reach you by phone. This is going to far.

As far as I'm concerned, a phone is to reach somebody else with, not for somebody else to reach me with. I'd better get back to working on Laos.
