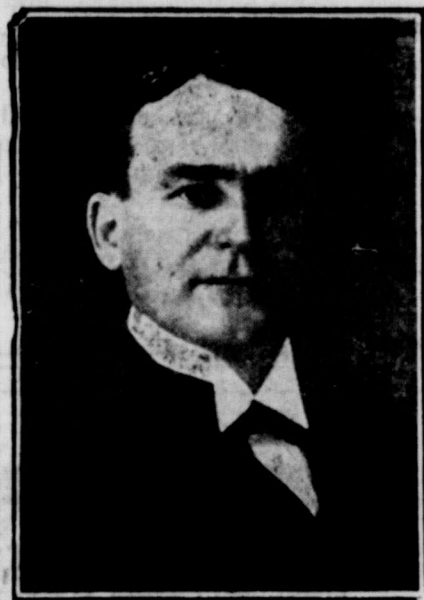

THOUSANDS THROG CITY FOR FAIR

Blanton Speaks to Good Crowd Thursday Night

Congressman Thomas L. Blanton received an almost unanimous endorsement for the United States Senate by a crowd which filled the court house Thursday night.

Despite the fact that the county fair was in progress and the town being filled with show attractions, a large crowd filled the large district court room and for two hours and a half listened to Mr. Blanton review his record in congress, closing with the proposition that he could better serve his constituents in the United States Senate, and would make the race if the people

pledged him their support, and to this proposition practically every man and woman in the court house stood up.

Congressman Blanton stated that it had been charged that he had no power in congress, that his political enemies charged he had lost his influence on account of fighting graft which existed in the various departments at Washington. To refute this charge Mr. Blanton quoted from the Congressional Record and from newspapers showing that he had killed numerous bills of waste and extravagance. He read from Washington papers, labor journals, which are his bitterest enemies, accounts of his fight on the bill increasing congressmen's salaries, and these papers and journals credited him with defeating the effort of congress to raise members' salaries from \$7,500 to \$12,500. "If I have lost my influence and have no power in congress," said Mr. Blanton, "how is it that I have saved millions of the people's money by fighting graft?"

Congressman Blanton told of how congress had given him the first, second and third degrees because he had fought the "machine" and blocked wasteful legislation. He took up the recent effort to expel him and stated that he was not given an opportunity to defend himself, stating that all rules of congress were violated when the resolutions to expel him were introduced by his enemies. He referred to the fact that when Victor Berger, a member of congress, who was charged with being a traitor to his country, was arraigned before congress on the charge, he was not only given three months to get up evidence in his own behalf, but was given \$2500 of the government's money to employ a lawyer to defend him.

Mr. Blanton paid his respects to the members who introduced the resolutions asking for his expulsion, and he called attention to the fact that he had challenged them to meet him on the stump before the people, and let them decide at the polls whether he deserved the punishment administered to him or not. In discussing this case, he reviewed how he had made a thorough investigation of the charges brought to him against the government printing office, and the document which was expurgated from the records, and for the publication of which congress attempted to expel him, was an affidavit made by a non-union printer, who was discharged from the government printing office. The affidavit contained obscene language which the foreman of the printing office used in "cussing out" the non-union printer, and was printed in an abbreviated form, which Mr. Blanton said was the custom in every case

CHINA'S RIGHTS ARE CONSIDERED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—The appointment of a sub-committee headed by Senator Lodge of the American delegation, to consider the question of extra-territorial rights of China was authorized today by the Pacific Far Eastern committee at the conference on disarmament.

The belief is expressed generally that the rights could not be given up immediately in view of conditions in China, but that the abolition should cease promptly as compatible with the present situation and progress of China. The Chinese delegation presented their statements strongly, urging abolishment of extra-territorial rights.

HOUSTON HELPS JOBLESS MEN

HOUSTON, Nov. 25.—The city government today offered employment to all who sought it. 200 men who applied before noon went to work in the park. City employment is the first move in the city's campaign to give a job to every man willing to take it and suggests a forcible long trial to those unwilling to work.

WOMEN THROW SNEEZE POWDER

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—Women communists and members of the Prussian Landtag who were angered by alleged cheating during a vote today, threw sneeze powder bombs containing foul smelling gases into the chamber. Afterwards they lit pipes and cigarettes and blew clouds of smoke into the face of the president of the body who had ordered members to quit smoking.

STRIKERS RETURN TO THEIR WORK

HOUSTON, Nov. 25.—Fifty trainmen on the International & Great Northern Railway at Houston and 600 on all the line, who walked out on October 28th, were put back to work this morning under orders of the federal court. The men are to go on thirty days' probation.

Officials of the road said they were unable to state whether or not any men who replaced the strikers would be retained. None of the new men in the local yards were given permanent places and 25 or 30 quit today it was said.

FAVORS SMALLER LEGISLATURE

BRYAN, Tex., Nov. 25.—Representatives Quaid of El Paso, and Rountree of Brazos, in a joint statement here today favored a smaller legislature movement with a limit of 62 members of the House.

IRISH PEACE VERY SERIOUS

LONDON, Nov. 25.—As Premier Craig of Ulster, went into conference with Lloyd George today it was admitted officially that the Irish peace negotiations had reached a grave and critical stage. Prominent members of the Sinn Fein bore this out. "The situation is too serious for talk," Craig said.

Premier Lloyd George is unable to give Ulster the assurance that the Sinn Fein will admit the point of allegiance to the king as king of Ireland. It appears now that if the Sinn Fein maintain their present attitude negotiations will be broken off, with the resumption of warfare an immediate possibility.

Winters Banker Dies from Gunshot Wound

ANOTHER BIG PARADE SAT.

Staged on a few hours notice a most creditable livestock parade was put on at two o'clock Friday afternoon. The parade brought in the crowd to the streets, and for more than an hour, there was a jam along Hutchings Avenue for three blocks.

The parade was headed by the volunteer fire department, followed by a free exhibition by the Diamond Amusement Co., with a long string of livestock following. Gillstrap's Rodeo horses and riders brought up the rear.

The success of the parade started a move for a big automobile parade at one-thirty Saturday afternoon. All those who will take part in this parade and help to make it a success, are requested to line up with their car on Strong Avenue from the livestock barns to the North end of the Court House block. It is expected that several hundred cars will take part in this parade, and parties are already at work decorating their autos.

Those who had not found time to visit the livestock exhibit were heard to express surprise at the showing of livestock made in the parade Friday, and the livestock exhibit barns were crowded with people following the parade.

FOUND PREACHER ON THANKSGIVING

Rev. B. A. Philpott was given a nice pounding for Thanksgiving. His church at Wall and Harriett, and some friends from San Angelo, came to Ballinger and took him by surprise, bringing with them lots of nice things to eat, and spent the day in a happy way with their pastor.

Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Lynn, of Winters, spent Thanksgiving in Ballinger with relatives.

D. M. Hillyard died at his home in Winters at eight o'clock on Thanksgiving evening, and the news was received in Ballinger a few minutes later. Mr. Hillyard made a hard fight against death, but as first reported there was no chance for him to recover from the wounds sustained when he accidentally shot himself last Tuesday.

Telephone reports were received in Ballinger hourly from the time the popular banker accidentally shot himself, until the news of his death came, and friends here were hoping against hope that he might pull through.

Mr. Hillyard died from the result of wounds sustained by the accidental discharge of a shotgun while he was crawling up on some birds in an effort to kill one for his sick wife shortly after noon last Tuesday. The circumstances and the statements made in connection with the awful tragedy indicate that he was dragging the shot-gun in his left hand as he crawled on the ground, and probably holding the gun close to the muzzle, it was accidentally discharged and the charge of shot plowed an ugly wound through the left side of his back.

Mrs. Hillyard returned home from a Temple sanitarium, where she had been for three months, on Sunday, and after a separation of three months, she has now been robbed of her husband for life. She had only been at home two days almost to an hour when the tragedy took place.

The funeral was held Friday afternoon and the remains laid to rest at Winters. Quite a number of friends from Ballinger went out to attend the funeral.

GRATEFUL FOLKS RELIEF FROM ATTEND SERVICES MOUTH-AILMENTS

The large auditorium of the Christian church on Broadway was filled with people Thursday morning, and a more successful Thanksgiving service was never held in this city.

The local pastors had charge of the services, with Rev. W. C. Kunze preaching the Thanksgiving sermon. The speaker for the occasion pointed out how God on down through the ages had made America His child of providence, and emphasized how God had directed the American nation since the landing of Columbus, and even had a hand in the establishing of this nation long before Columbus could interest his backers in the pilgrimage. Rev. Kunze illustrated how God in His providence, had led generations who have gone before in their fight for democratic freedom and religious liberty, even on up through the great World War. He told how God had made America His child of special providence.

Closing, the minister admonished his hearers of the great importance of taking advantage of the opportunities offered in holding up to the nations of the world the principles for which our forefathers fought and died, emphasizing the great fact that where there is such a special privilege there is always coupled with it a responsibility.

Following the Thanksgiving sermon the question of electing a charity committee for the ensuing year, and for taking an offering for the work, was taken up and successfully dispensed with. A motion was made and carried for the appointment of a committee to nominate a new charity committee to succeed the old committee, composed of T. S. Lankford, C. R. Crews and Dr. T. A. Rape, who had served for several terms very efficiently. Dr. Alvin Swindell, presiding at the service, appointed J. W. Clappitt, G. M. Vaughn and T. F. Bridwell, to place in nomination the names of three persons to constitute the new board.

The names of J. McGregor, Mrs. R. L. Harwell and E. A. Jeanes were nominated and unanimously elected, and the charity work of the next year will be in their hands.

While the nominating committee was deliberating a free will offering for support of local charity work was made, and \$143.84 in cash contributed. This is only a starter, and while those who attended the Thanksgiving service contributed liberally, those who for various reasons did not attend the service, are expected to swell the fund for the support of the united charity work.
